Key personnel contracts extended another year

Iowa Park school trustees voted to extend the contracts of administrative personnel during a regular meeting Monday night.

During a two and a half hour executive session, board members evaluated staff and later in open session, voted to extend contracts through the 1994-95 school years for key per-

They include Robert Palmer, assistant superintendent; Richard Davis, high school principal; Randy Lovelady, junior high principal; Patricia Cravens, Bradford Elementary principal; Ronald Woods, Kidwell Elementary principal; Dennis Brooks, assistant high school principal; Steve Moody, assistant junior high principal; and Robert Clensay, athletic director.

The board also voted to place Clensay on the step salary scale.

Contracts approved through the 1993-93 school year include LaRae Collins, high school counselor; Patricia Davis, junior high school counselor; Diane Granbery, elementary counselor; and Allen Shewmake, tax col-

Prior to the meeting, the board recognized Kenneth Schell, son of Mr. and Mrs. Glenn Schell, who was selected as a member of the All State

Superintendent Glenn Mitchell then read from a memorandum issued by Gov. Ann Richards proclaiming the month of February as School Board Recognition Month.

The memorandum recognized Texas school board members for serving as advocates for children and giving of "their vision, knowledge, leadership, and time, with no expectation of salary, working purely for the common good." Mitchell concluded by presenting each trustee with a framed certificates.

Palmer gave a report on the SAT and ACT results from the 1990-91 school year. Palmer said that compared with seven other area schools.

Iowa Park students ranked third on the SAT and third on the ACT, and when the two rankings were combined, Iowa Park ranked first. Palmer noted that since different schools ranked ahead of Iowa Park in each area, Iowa Park's combined totals put them at the top.

Palmer also cited the importance of students taking the college entrance exams, saying that students may receive scholarships based solely on their SAT and ACT scores.

Trustees called for an election to be held May 1, designated polling places and appointed judges and clerks.

Positions to be voted on include places six and seven, currently held by Randy Catlin and Keith Fisher, respectively.

Heavy workload for police

Iowa Park police handled a wide variety of complaints during the past week, ranging from criminal mischief to a person having a gun pointed at him.

Police were informed at 1:32 Sunday that a driver was parked in front of a store in Park West Shopping Center, when a van occupied by three males pulled up beside him, and the driver pointed a gun in his direction.

The three occupants were known to the parked driver and their identities were given to the officer. Officers later located the van, and took two BB pistols as evidence.

Monday, the van's driver, Bobby Vanspeybroeck, 19, was arrested on a locally-issued warrant, and transported to county jail.

The other van occupants identified

were James Michael Winkler, 18, and Anthony James Moulton, 17, according to the police blotter.

Council takes no action following closed session

The city council took no action following a closed-door session that lasted almost two hours.

Council members retired to another room for the executive session, which concerned personnel, and was described on the agenda as being "... in regards to city administrator's status and respon-

However, when the meeting was re-opened to the public, Mayor Wayne House said no action would be taken, but elaborated on the closed meeting as being a "round table discussion on the duties of the administrator and mayor.'

No other comments were forthcoming on the closed meeting, which lasted from 8:18 to 10:10.

The only official actions taken during the regular portion of the meeting was approval of two resolutions.

Also during the meeting, however, aldermen heard a request for rate relief by TU Electric representative Dale Cox, recognized police radio dispatcher Robert Snyder as the city's Employee of the Month for January, and heard four staff reports.

The first of the resolutions was to authorize Public Works Director Mike Price to apply for a grant from the Texas Water Commission to fund a used-oil drop-off center.

The other resolution urged the governor and state legislature to enact a provision calling for capital punishment of persons who abuse and murder chil-

That resolution was requested by Garland alderman Vernon Gaston, who said in a letter he was asking support from all municipalities in his effort to get the legislation passed in Austin.

Gaston stated the legislation would cover abuse and murder of children

School leaders holding series to plan future

Iowa Park school trustees and administrators met Saturday for the second in a series of meetings, designed to develop a plan for the future operation of the district.

The focus was aimed toward determining a "vision statement" of what the district should be, and then developing specific goals designed to make the vision become a reality.

Special guests at the session were student counselors of the district: Diane Granbery, elementary; Pat Davis, junior high, and LaRae Collins, high school.

Counselors spoke concerning the increasing numbers of students with home and personal problems. A need for more counseling help was stressed. The counselors identified time as a



Jo Farr and Carolyn Morrow served the bride's cake.


The groom's chocolate cake was decorated with two team ropers. Shelia Shafer and Kaylynn Byrd presided at the groom's table.

Angler recognition program explained

The Angler Recognition Program of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Dept. rewards anglers who catch large fish from public water bodies. There are four award categories: the State Fish Record, Big Fish Award, Lake Record, and the Lunker Catch and Release Program. These programs give certificates or pins to anglers who submit official affidavits for the catch of large fish from public waters. Big fish awards help to increase fishing interest and provide valuable information on the catches of large fish from Texas public lakes.

Currently, there are just a few lake record entries from our north Texas area lakes.

Species and area lakes not listed have never had a fish submitted for recognition. Establishing a lake record is a fairly simple process, basically requiring only that the fish be weighed on a Texas Department of Agriculture certified scale and that species identification be certified by a professional fisheries person. The Texas Parks and Wildlife office at 409 Chester in Wichita Falls would be glad to perform this service for any interested angler bringing a fish to their office. The fish need not be alive, but should not be frozen solid either. Anglers are encouraged to call 766-2383 first to be sure that one of the biologists will be in. Hopefully, with more fish submitted for awards, more of our lakes and anglers will get the recognition they deserve.

Bowie was "upset" Tuesday by


Henrietta, 51-42.

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
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
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
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
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Mrs. K.B. Coats Jr.

K.B. retired in 1987 after working 31 years for the county as a heavy equipment operator. He is also a pumper in the oil fields.


Ruby drove a bus for the Electra Independent School District 19 years.

Saurkraut Kutchen (Cake)

2/3 cup margarine 1 1/2 cup sugar

1 tsp. vanilla

3 eggs 2 1/4 cups sifted flour

1 tsp. soda 1/2 tsp. salt

1 tsp. baking powder

1/2 cup unsweetened ocoa 1 cup water

2/3 cup drained, rinsed and chopped saurkraut

Cream margarine and sugar. Add vanilla and eggs. Sift dry ingredients and add alternately with water. Fold in drained kraut. Turn into three 8-in. greased and floured pans. Bake about 30 minutes at 325 degrees. Cool and frost with Fudge Frosting.

Fudge Frosting

3/4 cup cocoa 1 box powdered sugar 1 tsp. vanilla

1/2 cup margarine 1/2 cup evaporated milk

Mix cocoa and sugar. Cream margarine and vanilla. Add part of sugar mixture and part of milk. Beat. Add the remaining sugar and milk. Beat until speading consistancy. Sometimes additional milk may be needed.

Copper Carrots

1 green bell pepper, cut up

1 onion, diced 3 celery sticks, cut up

Cook pepper, celery and onions until tender. Pour off liquid.

2 - 1 lb. cans carrots, drained

1 cup sugar 1/4 cup vinegar

1 Tbsp. mustard

2 Tbsps. Worchestershire sauce 1 can tomato sauce

Refrigerate overnight. Keeps for weeks covered in refrigerator.

Fresh Spinach Salad

1 lb. fresh spinach 1/4 lb. bacon, fried crisp and crumbled 1 hard-coc'ted egg, diced

1 small red onion, sliced into rings

Red Wine Vinegar Dressing 1/2 cup Crisco oil 1/4 cup red wine vinegar

1 tsp. salt

1/2 tsp. black pepper 1/8 tsp. oregano

Pour over salad and mix well. Serve at once.

Corn Salad

1 can Mexicorn 1 small jar jalapeno Cheez Whiz Same amount of Miracle Whip as Cheez Whiz

Mix Cheez Whiz and Miracle Whip in bowl. Mix in drained corn. Just before serving, add a small bag of crushed Fritos.

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HEADACHES

Headaches are the most frequent reason people seek medical care. Pain from headaches ranges from mild to severe to the daily activities of many patients. Causes of headaches are genetics psychological, neurological, vascular, biomechanical, environmental, etc...One of the most commonly over-looked causes of headache is cervicogenic headache or headache related to the neck. Many headaches are caused by irritation to the nerves that exit the spine in the upper neck. A group of 100 patients with these headaches were treated with spinal manipulation. Within three weeks of treatment, 75% had a good reduction in the headaches. When questioned after one year, 25% had had no headaches, and 65% had maintained a good improvement in the number and severity of the headaches. These were exceptional results when it is considered that most of these patients had had their headaches on and off for years.

The more that is learned about headaches, the more apparent two facts become. The first is that many headaches are caused by nerve irritation in the upper neck, and the second is that chiropractic manipulation is an effective treatment for this common problem.

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
