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Key personnel contracts extended another year

Iowa Park school trustees voted to extend the contracts of administrative personnel during a regular meeting Monday night.

During a two and a half hour executive session, board members evaluated staff and later in open session, voted to extend contracts through the 1994-95 school years for key personnel.

They include Robert Palmer, assistant superintendent; Richard Davis, high school principal; Randy Lovelady, junior high principal; Patricia Cravens, Bradford Elementary principal; Ronald Woods, Kidwell Elementary principal; Dennis Brooks, assistant high school principal; Steve Moody, assistant junior high principal; and Robert Clensay, athletic director.

The board also voted to place Clensay on the step salary scale.

Contracts approved through the 1993-94 school year include LaRae Collins, high school counselor; Patricia Davis, junior high school counselor;

Diane Granbery, elementary counselor; and Allen Shewmake, tax collector.

Prior to the meeting, the board recognized Kenneth Schell, son of Mr. and Mrs. Glenn Schell, who was selected as a member of the All State Band.

Superintendent Glenn Mitchell then read from a memorandum issued by Gov. Ann Richards proclaiming the month of February as School Board Recognition Month.

The memorandum recognized Texas school board members for serving as advocates for children and giving of "their vision, knowledge, leadership, and time, with no expectation of salary, working purely for the common good." Mitchell concluded by presenting each trustee with a framed certificate.

Palmer gave a report on the SAT and ACT results from the 1990-91 school year. Palmer said that compared with seven other area schools,

Iowa Park students ranked third on the SAT and third on the ACT, and when the two rankings were combined, Iowa Park ranked first. Palmer noted that since different schools ranked ahead of Iowa Park in each area, Iowa Park's combined totals put them at the top.

Palmer also cited the importance of students taking the college entrance exams, saying that students may receive scholarships based solely on their SAT and ACT scores.

Trustees called for an election to be held May 1, designated polling places and appointed judges and clerks.

Positions to be voted on include places six and seven, currently held by Randy Catlin and Keith Fisher, respectively.

Council takes no action following closed session

The city council took no action following a closed-door session that lasted almost two hours.

Council members retired to another room for the executive session, which concerned personnel, and was described on the agenda as being "... in regards to city administrator's status and responsibilities."

However, when the meeting was re-opened to the public, Mayor Wayne House said no action would be taken, but elaborated on the closed meeting as being a "round table discussion on the duties of the administrator and mayor."

No other comments were forthcoming from the closed meeting, which lasted from 8:18 to 10:10.

The only official actions taken during the regular portion of the meeting was approval of two resolutions.

Also during the meeting, however, aldermen heard a request for rate relief by TU Electric representative Dale Cox, recognized police radio dispatcher Robert Snyder as the city's Employee of the Month for January, and heard four staff reports.

The first of the resolutions was to authorize Public Works Director Mike Price to apply for a grant from the Texas Water Commission to fund a used-oil drop-off center.

The other resolution urged the governor and state legislature to enact a provision calling for capital punishment of persons who abuse and murder children.

That resolution was requested by Garland alderman Vernon Gaston, who said in a letter he was asking support from all municipalities in his effort to get the legislation passed in Austin.

Gaston stated the legislation would cover abuse and murder of children

who were six years of age or younger.

Cox explained his utility company was seeking a system-wide rate increase that averaged 15.3 percent. Action by the council was deferred for further consideration.

City Secretary Janice Newman briefed the council on information she gathered from a meeting she recently attended in Austin, concerning the Texas Open Meetings Act.

Various points of possible violations were discussed, and it was decided to order a handbook on the Act which would be distributed to all council members for reference.

Administrator Gary Jones informed the council that extensive work was needed to repair the city's bulldozer used at the landfill.

Though aldermen were told used parts might be found that could get the tractor operating, the council decided to have new parts used in the repairs, at a cost of approximately \$15,000.

Jones also told the council of hav-

ing received a request for city water service to homes west of the city.

He explained reaching them might be possible, if the state would allow a tap on a two-inch line which serves the two highway rest stops.

Residents south of US 287 and north of the railroad are hauling water, and at least two homes are either being built or planned for construction, adding to those already in that area, Jones said.

Aldermen agreed to authorize Jones to contact the state for its response to the proposal.

The third discussion item listed on the agenda for Jones' presentation concerned a possible trip to the City of Gatesville, where it was understood an incinerator was being used for disposal of trash.

However, Jones said he had learned that incinerator, built in the 1950s, had been closed because it could not meet Environmental Protection Agency standards for clean air.

Dietician points out snack food perils

Roseann Ward, registered dietician at Wichita General Hospital, gave the program for the Evening Lions at their meeting Tuesday. She was introduced by Harvey Troutman, vice president.

Ward discussed the danger of eating too many snack foods and said that the consumption of these foods had reached a high peak in the United States during the last few years. She said that most snack foods are high in fat or salt, which makes the body retain water. She used potato chips for one example.

The dietician said that people eat snack foods because they think they are hungry, when drinking water or some other liquid would satisfy the urge for something to eat. She suggested eating fresh fruits, raw vegetables, unsalted pretzels, fig bars, angel food cake and yogurt, and said

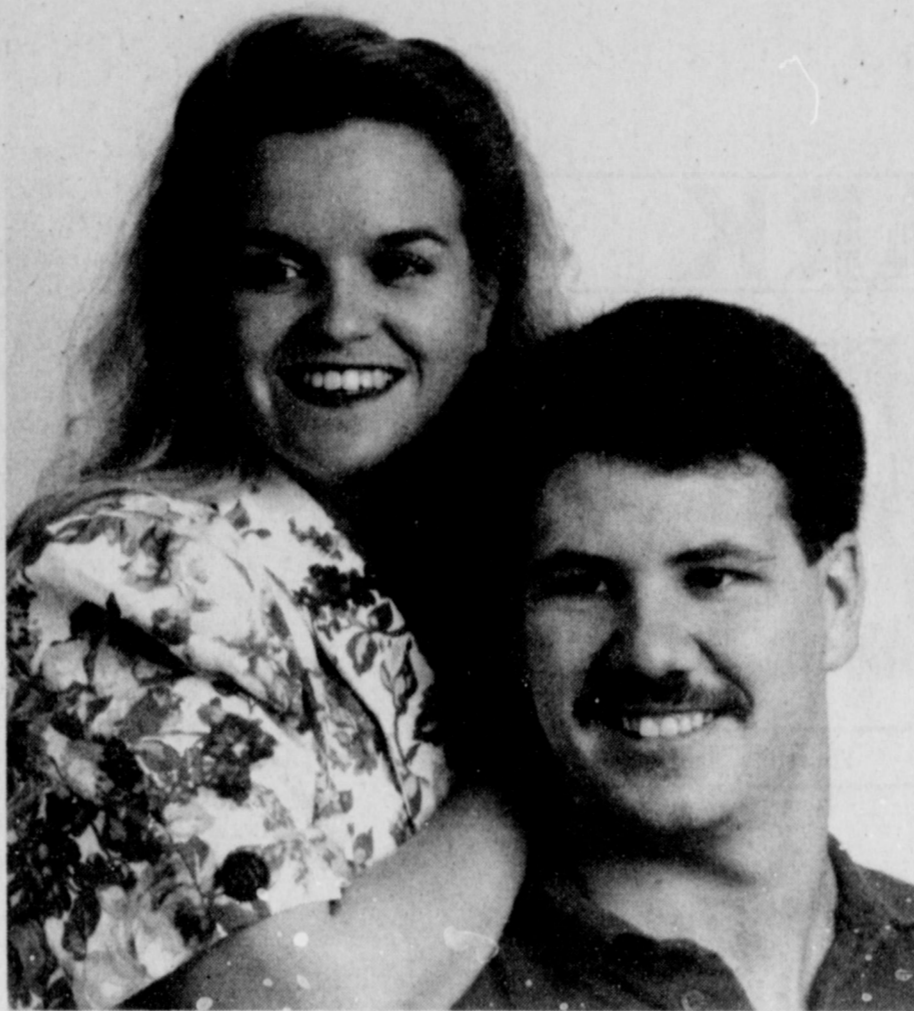
that Simple Pleasure ice cream is an excellent dessert. She warned against eating too many foods with hidden fats, using biscuits as an example. She told her listeners to read carefully the ingredients listed on the labels of food, warning that some of them could be misleading. She also recommended the use of pure corn oil in place of shortening, oleo and butter.

To close the program, she conducted a lengthy question and answer period which attested to the interest the club members, and their wives who attended, had in proper eating habits.

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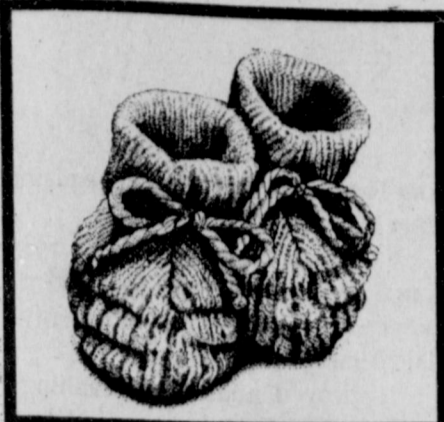

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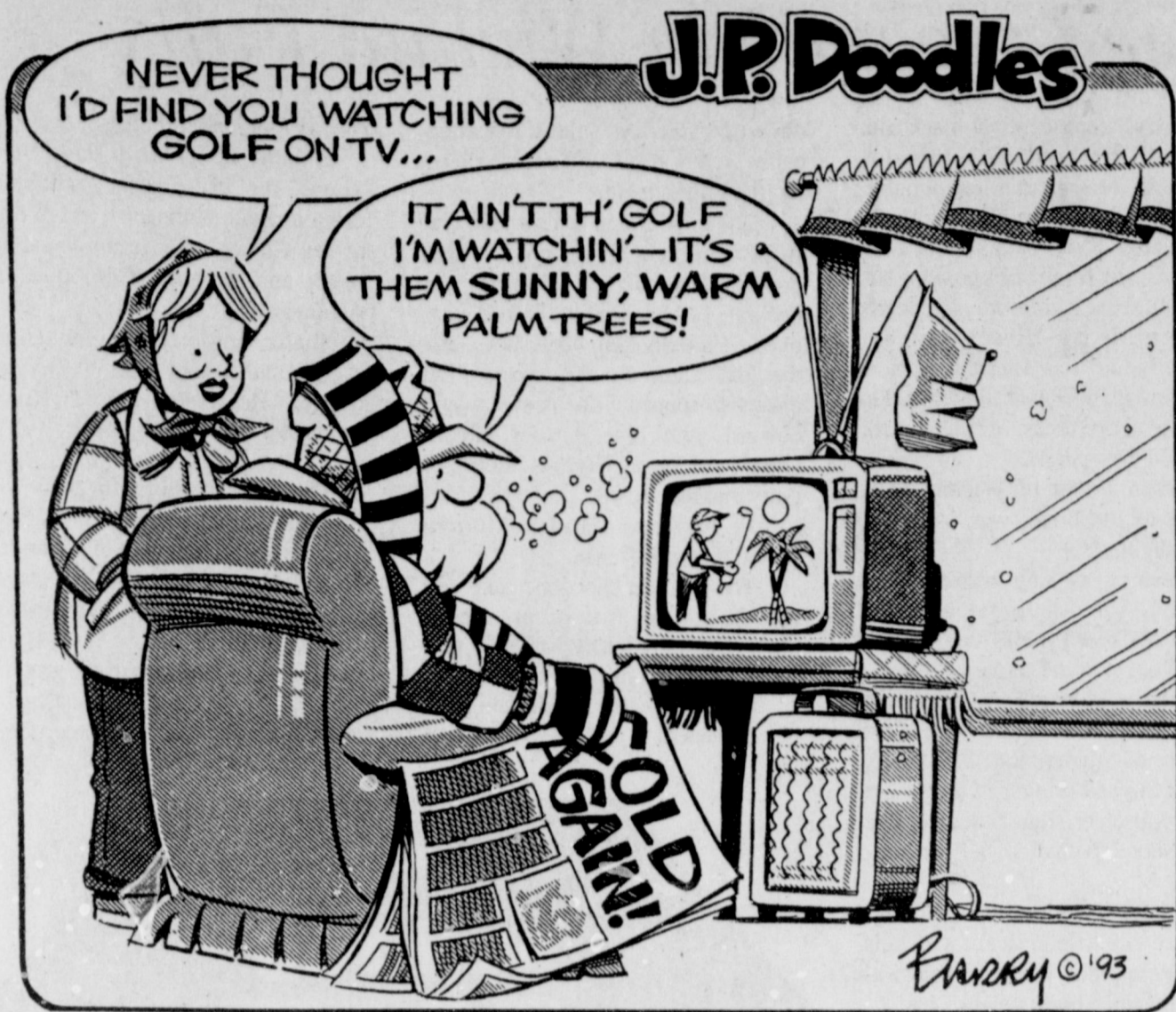
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As I See It... By Bob Hamilton

If you thought the federal political pots had stopped boiling with November's general election... think again.

The campaigning is hot and heavy in Texas to elect a U.S. senator replacing Lloyd Bentsen. That voting will be May 1.

U.S. Representative Bill Sarpalius was in Wichita Falls Monday, and was very critical of Sen. Phil Gramm, pointing out that Gramm used every opportunity to get public exposure, at taxpayer expense.

Gramm was to visit Sheppard AFB Tuesday, as he is most military bases in the state, to get reaction of personnel concerning the president's pledge to lift the ban on gays in the military.

I first of all felt it was odd that Bob Krueger, who was appointed by our governor to fill in for Bentsen until the May election, also showed up in Wichita Falls Tuesday.

A reporter asked Gramm about Sarpalius' criticism, and the former Texas A&M Univ. professor responded, "Well, I never get into an intellectual debate with him (Sarpalius), because it would be like dueling with an unarmed man."

Incidentally, no one I heard mentioned who paid Krueger's way to Wichita County, taxpayers, Democrats or Krueger himself.

Concerning the proposed lifting of the ban on homosexuals in the military, it appears one must go to a metropolitan area to find any support for such an action.

I'm certainly not hearing comments around Iowa Park that the gays are being mistreated. Rather, residents say it would be the "straights" who would feel imposed upon and threatened.

I noticed in Sunday's issue of the Canyon News a report from U.S. Con-

gressman Larry Combest as saying "We are getting more mail on this issue than ever in history."

"Combest said an official tally of the responses hadn't been made, but guessed that the sentiment is running about 100 to 1 from his constituents to disallow homosexuals in the military," the article said.

major problem area. The increased workload involving paperwork was described as a major "robber" of the time needed.

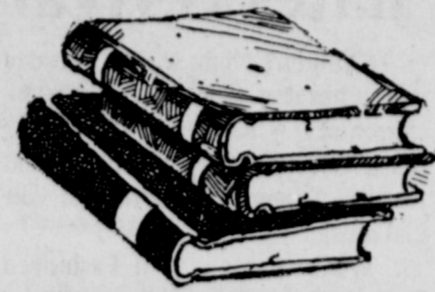

Angler recognition program explained

The Angler Recognition Program of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Dept. rewards anglers who catch large fish from public water bodies. There are four award categories: the State Fish Record, Big Fish Award, Lake Record, and the Lunker Catch and Release Program. These programs give certificates or pins to anglers who submit official affidavits for the catch of large fish from public waters. Big fish awards help to increase fishing interest and provide valuable information on the catches of large fish from Texas public lakes.

Currently, there are just a few lake record entries from our north Texas area lakes.

Species and area lakes not listed have never had a fish submitted for recognition. Establishing a lake record is a fairly simple process, basically requiring only that the fish be weighed on a Texas Department of Agriculture certified scale and that species identification be certified by a professional fisheries person. The Texas Parks and Wildlife office at 409 Chester in Wichita Falls would be glad to perform this service for any interested angler bringing a fish to their office. The fish need not be alive, but should not be frozen solid either. Anglers are encouraged to call 766-2383 first to be sure that one of the biologists will be in. Hopefully, with more fish submitted for awards, more of our lakes and anglers will get the recognition they deserve.

Lady Hawks' season ends; two games left for Hawks

Saurkraut Kutchen (Cake)

- 2/3 cup margarine
- 1 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 3 eggs
- 2 1/4 cups sifted flour
- 1 tsp. soda
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. baking powder
- 1/2 cup unsweetened cocoa
- 1 cup water
- 2/3 cup drained, rinsed and chopped saurkraut

Cream margarine and sugar. Add vanilla and eggs. Sift dry ingredients and add alternately with water. Fold in drained kraut. Turn into three 8-in. greased and floured pans. Bake about 30 minutes at 325 degrees. Cool and frost with Fudge Frosting.

Fudge Frosting

- 3/4 cup cocoa
- 1 box powdered sugar
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 1/2 cup margarine
- 1/2 cup evaporated milk

Mix cocoa and sugar. Cream margarine and vanilla. Add part of sugar mixture and part of milk. Beat. Add the remaining sugar and milk. Beat until spreading consistency. Sometimes additional milk may be needed.

Copper Carrots

- 1 green bell pepper, cut up
 - 1 onion, diced
 - 3 celery sticks, cut up
 - Cook pepper, celery and onions until tender. Pour off liquid.
 - Add:
 - 2 - 1 lb. cans carrots, drained
 - 1 cup sugar
 - 1/4 cup vinegar
 - 1 Tbsp. mustard
 - 2 Tbsp. Worcestershire sauce
 - 1 can tomato sauce
- Refrigerate overnight. Keeps for weeks covered in refrigerator.

Fresh Spinach Salad

- 1 lb. fresh spinach
- 1/4 lb. bacon, fried crisp and crumbled
- 1 hard-cooked egg, diced
- 1 small red onion, sliced into rings

Red Wine Vinegar Dressing

- 1/2 cup Crisco oil
 - 1/4 cup red wine vinegar
 - 1 tsp. salt
 - 1/2 tsp. black pepper
 - 1/8 tsp. oregano
- Pour over salad and mix well. Serve at once.

Corn Salad

- 1 can Mexican
 - 1 small jar jalapeno Cheez Whiz
 - Same amount of Miracle Whip as Cheez Whiz
 - Mix Cheez Whiz and Miracle Whip in bowl. Mix in drained corn. Just before serving, add a small bag of crushed Fritos.
- Recipe can be doubled by using large size Cheez Whiz and 2 cans Mexican.

Harvard Beets

- 1 cup sugar
 - 1 Tbsp. cornstarch
 - 1/2 cup water
 - 1/2 cup vinegar
 - 4 Tbsp. butter or oleo
 - 2 cans beets
- Mix and boil 5 minutes. Add beets and serve.
Note: If using fresh beets, cook before peeling until tender.

HEADACHES

Headaches are the most frequent reason people seek medical care. Pain from headaches ranges from mild to severe to the daily activities of many patients. Causes of headaches are genetics psychological, neurological, vascular, biomechanical, environmental, etc... One of the most commonly over-looked causes of headache is cervicogenic headache or headache related to the neck. Many headaches are caused by irritation to the nerves that exit the spine in the upper neck. These nerves provide most of the sensation to the back and sides of the head and to the forehead over the eyes. When these upper nerves are irritated, headache radiating from the back of the skull to the temple or over the eyes may result. Irritation of these nerves often caused by whiplash injuries, jobs that require one to hold their neck in a fixed posture for long intervals such as a secretary, assembly worker, telephone operator, dentist and factory workers.

The most appropriate treatment for this type of headache is chiropractic manipulation. There have been many studies done on manipulation as a treatment of cervicogenic headaches with the latest being done by researchers at Maribor General Hospital. A group of 100 patients with these headaches were treated with spinal manipulation. Within three weeks of treatment, 75% had a good reduction in the headaches. When questioned after one year, 25% had had no headaches, and 65% had maintained a good improvement in the number and severity of the headaches. These were exceptional results when it is considered that most of these patients had had their headaches on and off for years.

The more that is learned about headaches, the more apparent two facts become. The first is that many headaches are caused by nerve irritation in the upper neck, and the second is that chiropractic manipulation is an effective treatment for this common problem.

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
