Council to discuss lowering lake level

The city council will be asked Monday night for authority to excavate a drainage ditch for the purpose of temporarily lowering the water level at Lake Buffalo.

The regularly-scheduled meeting is to begin at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

Because the lake's level has reached

a height City Administrator Mike Price said no one ever felt it would reach, it has caused concern over the dam's ability to withhold any higher levels.

The lake began overflowing in a drawdown tube almost a month ago. Riprap protection for the earthen dam is actually below the water level, and authorities worry about water action on the unprotected dirt.

Alternatives for lowering the lake level were discussed at the Mar. 8 council meeting, and Price made the suggestion that cutting a ditch in the emergency spillway area might be the most effective and inexpensive.

Aldermen also will be asked to act on a new organizational chart for city employees, as well as establishing standards for utilizing city equipment on private property.

The council is expected to take action on a bid received to sell 1101 North Jackson, one of three lots where a water tower once was located at Gordon Lake.

If the sale is approved, resolutions authorizing the execution of deeds of trust for that lot and another already approved to be sold will be acted on.

Another resolution for council consideration will be the renewal of a lease agreement with Billy James, for a portion of right of way on South Park and East Smith.

Mayor Wayne House also is to proclaim March 29 through April 4 as Clean-up and Fix-Up Week in Iowa Park.

The council held a called meeting Monday, primarily to work on the code of ordinances concerning personnel, but also took action on a water line project.

Aldermen approved a recommendation made by Price to hire Monty's Plumbing to lay a six-inch water line in the 300 and 400 blocks of East Washington. The work would cost \$4,900, with all materials being provided by the city.

Price explained employees did not have time to complete all the work that is needed in order for a federally-funded reworking of Washington, all the way from West Highway to Bell Road.

Besides the amount of sewer and water lines that must be changed prior to construction, weather has prevented city employees from meeting a time schedule, Price said.

The council met almost two hours in their effort to finalize the section of the code book, and realized more meetings would be necessary before the work is completed.

So, they decided to meet each Monday evening, other than regular meeting nights, until the chapter is finished.

Raging fire destroys Lakey home

A raging fire, enhanced by wind gusts 30 miles per hour or greater, completely destroyed the home and possessions of Mr. and Mrs. E.C. Lakey Monday afternoon.

When police responded to an Emergency 9-1-1 telephone call received by the radio dispatcher, they described the home at 303 North Hawthorne as being "completely engulfed."

Officers assisted Mr. and Mrs. Lakey from the structure they had made their home more than 50 years, and neither was injured.

The 9-1-1 call was made by their great-grandson, Eric Stevens, nine, who was dispatched by Mrs. Lakey to see what was burning after she smelled smoke.

Those who arrived early said the initial flames appeared to have begun

either inside or in front of the carport, which faced the south from where the high winds were blowing.

Despite the efforts of volunteer firemen, who used two pumper trucks, they were unable to save the wood-structure home, as well as everything inside, including their automobile.

Because of the trees and growth around the home, firemen had to concentrate much of their effort to preventing flames reaching neighboring homes to the north.

Assistance, mostly men to relieve local firefighters, was received from the volunteer departments of West Wichita, Cameron Gardens and Burkburnett.

A drive to generate donations of money, clothing and furniture has been initiated by Faith Baptist Church, according to Rev. Greg Ammons, pastor.

592-2716 for clothing sizes and items in most need, he said.

The Lakeys own two other homes locally, but both are rented at the time.

They are staying at the home of their daughter, Mrs. Charles (Nina) Quick, until arrangements for moving can be completed.

NO TRUSTEE RACES

Two city incumbents facing challengers

Only one additional candidate filed during the past and final week in either the city or school elections, to be held May 1.

Chris Powell turned in his application at city hall, as a candidate for Place Three, held by Bob Hamilton, who is seeking re-election.

City Secretary Janice Newman said a drawing would be held at 3 p.m. today for the order in which names would be printed in the contested alderman races.

Place One incumbent Virgil Woodfin is being challenged by Mike

Sellers, and Place Five incumbent alderman Mark Raby is unchallenged.

There were no candidates to challenge either of the school trustee incumbents, in their bids for re-election. They are Randy Catlin, Place Six, and Keith Fisher, Place Seven.

Had any candidates for the school board decided to file this week, they would have to have done so at the school tax office. The administration building, which had been designated as the filing place, was closed for Spring Break.

Early voting in both elections will begin April 12 and conclude April 27.

January sales lower here

Sales tax collections in Iowa Park fell off drastically in January, as compared with the same month in 1992, but the city remains ahead of last year for the two-month period.

The monthly report provided by the state comptroller's office indicated Iowa Park's sales tax collections dropped 21.87-percent from February of last year.

Only \$13,365.61 was reported from business in February, down from the \$17,106.72 the previous year.

However, the two-month total remains on the plus side, 10.71 percent, with \$55,052.51 collected this year as compared with \$49,727.31 last year, according to the report.

Even with the February shrinkage, Iowa Park remains the leader in gains for the year among Wichita County cities.

Wichita Falls, which had a 5.7-percent increase in February, stands at 10.32 percent gain for 1993, and Burkburnett is a plus 3.18. Only Electra, at a minus 2.78 percent, is below collections this year as compared with 1992.

Holiday is almost even with 1992 collections, at a minus .30 percent.

This month's sales tax rebates include taxes collected on January sales and reported to Austin in February on businesses filing monthly tax returns.

Bogus 9-1-1 calls a bother to police

A considerable amount of police manhours are being wasted by bogus or erroneous Emergency 9-1-1 calls.

Iowa Park Chief Ray Smock said he couldn't explain the reason for so many non-emergency calls being made recently, other than the fact that some of them are residents attempting to program their telephones with the number, and in some cases, moisture getting into the lines.

But the fact is, there were 13 calls made to the police radio dispatcher from Wednesday of last week through Tuesday, and only one of them was actually an emergency.

The others were classified as being misdials, mischief or juveniles playing.

The police observe a policy of go-

ing to the point of origin of every call made on 9-1-1, regardless of whether someone answers or not.

That policy possibly saved the lives of two elderly people Monday afternoon, when the emergency number was dialed and the telephone then went dead. They were extracted from their burning home on North Hawthorne by police.

While officers were not answering the emergency phone calls during the past week, they made one arrest, took reports on two thefts, and confiscated a pellet gun.

A patrolman made a traffic stop of a vehicle at 10:49 p.m. Saturday in the 500 block of East Highway, and during

Chamber replaces 2 board members

Two new board members were elected during Monday's monthly meeting of Chamber of Commerce directors.

They included Guy Traylor, owner of Subway, to succeed Sheri Kennedy, and Mike Price, who takes the place of Gary Jones.

Policy changes for the annual Chamber-sponsored Whoop-T-Do also were approved.

They were: to allow a non-profit organization sponsor a commercial-type ride, after consideration on a case-by-case basis; not allow a political candidate or party to purchase booth space, and set non-profit organization booth fees at 10 percent of profit or \$25,

whichever is greater.

President Larry Dutton told the board he would like to see more coverage of Iowa Park in the Wichita Falls newspaper, at least on an equal basis to that which has been written about Burkburnett.

"There are more communities in Wichita County than Wichita Falls and Burkburnett," Dutton said.

Three directors volunteered to serve on a committee to develop a direct-mail promotion to area residents, pointing out the benefits of shopping with Iowa Park businesses.

They were Sherry Powell, Joe Hughes and Bob Hamilton.

Her husband, Philip, is pastor of the First Presbyterian Church in Iowa Park and Trinity Presbyterian Church in Wichita Falls.

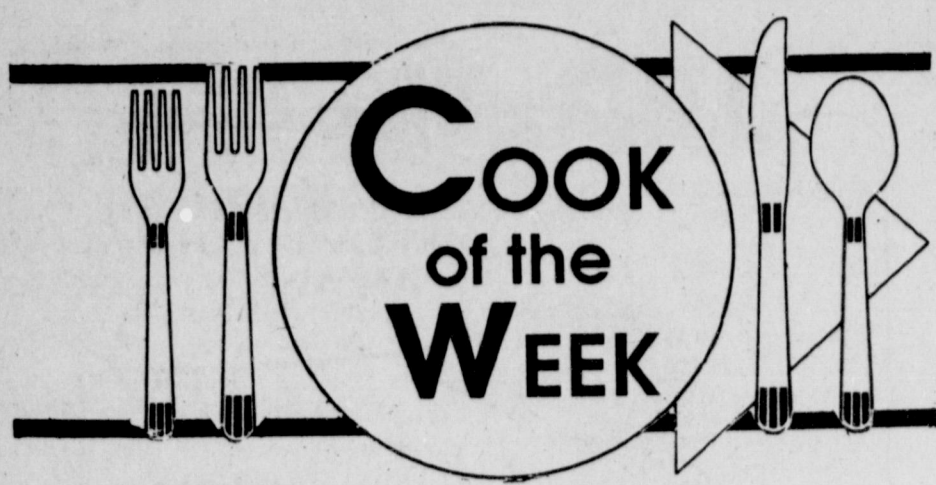

Donna heads her list of interests with "my family." This is followed with sailing, square dancing, cooking, and Longhorn cattle.

She and Philip purchased a used sailboat about three years ago. They repaired and refinished it, and have enjoyed many hours of sailing at Lake Arrowhead. Most of Donna's recipes came from family members. "Jailhouse Rolls" is a recipe used by Donna's mother. Phil's mother gave her the recipe for "Banana Nut Bread" and the instructions for bread pudding and tea cakes came from her grandmothers.



Banana Nut Bread
 1 cup sugar
 1/2 cup Crisco or 1 stick margarine
 2 eggs
 2 cups flour sifted
 1 tsp. soda
 2-3 ripe bananas, mashed
 1/2 cup chopped pecans
 Mix in order given and bake in 1 large or 2 small greased loaf pans in a 325 degree oven 1 hour (small loaf), or 1 hour, 15 minutes (large loaf).

Jailhouse Rolls
 1 cup mashed potatoes
 2 sticks margarine
 3 eggs, beaten
 7 cups flour
 1 1/2 tsp. salt
 1 1/2 cup lukewarm water
 1 cup sugar
 1 pkg. dry yeast
 Mix dry yeast in water, blend and set aside. Mix potatoes, margarine, eggs, salt and sugar. Blend into flour and add water and yeast. Blend well and pour into greased bowl. (Dough can be refrigerated at this point until ready for use.) Roll out dough to 1/4-inch thick and cut rolls. Brush butter on top and let stand uncovered to rise, about 3 hours. Bake at 400 degrees until golden. Makes 4 1/2 dozen rolls. This recipe also makes good dough for cinnamon rolls.

Jalapeno Cornbread
 Preheat oven to 350 degrees.
 2 cups yellow corn meal
 1 tsp. salt
 2 Tbsps. sugar
 1/2 tsp. soda
 1 cup sweet milk
 2 eggs
 1 cup chopped onions

1/4 cup pimento
 2-4 chopped jalapeno peppers
 1/2 lb. grated cheese
 Mix dry ingredients; add milk and eggs; mix well. Add remaining ingredients with exception of cheese. Beat vigorously 1 minute. Pour half mixture into greased 8x8-inch pan. Sprinkle batter with cheese and add remaining mixture. Bake 35 minutes or until firm.

Grandma's Bread Pudding
 1/2 loaf bread
 1 1/2 cup milk
 3 eggs
 2 cups sugar
 1/2 tsp. vanilla
 Raisins, if desired
 Mix all ingredients and bake 1 hour.

Grandma's Tea Cakes
 4 cups flour
 2 cups sugar
 2 Tbsps. shortening or butter
 3 eggs
 1 1/2 cup milk
 3 tps. baking powder
 1 tsp. vanilla or lemon extract
 Cream sugar and shortening. Add eggs, vanilla and milk. Sift together flour, baking powder. Mix together. Roll out to 1/4 inch thick and cut cookies. Bake at 350 degrees 10 minutes or until brown.

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As I See It . . . By Bob Hamilton



A couple of situations kinda spoiled an otherwise good week for me.

The first was a run-in I had with a baseball official, and the other was an entire sack of newspapers somehow mishandled by the Postal Service.

For some reason or purpose yet unexplained to me, the Wichita Falls chapter of baseball officials has laid down a restriction on photographers that has completely clipped my wings.

Hawk Coach David Fuhrman had told me of the ruling, which I don't believe is a University Interscholastic League rule, at the season opening game.

I observed it as best I could, until Iowa Park's tournament opener Thursday in Wichita Falls.

A Wichita Falls photographer told me the rule had been relaxed. So I made my way out to the area near first base about the third inning, and was ready to work, camera in hand. I was even having a pleasant conversation with the first base official.

The next thing I know, the umpire was walking my direction, hollering for me to move over to the fence. While trying to explain I don't have a camera with a "long lens," he informed me I could either move to the fence or off the

field. I left, because I've never attempted to have a confrontation with a sports official -- at least not with a game in progress.

Never once in all my years of photographing sports, have I ever interfered with officials or players, because of my positioning.

That fence, by the way, is 60 or more feet from the playing field. That requires a telephoto lens on a camera, which I've never had and don't plan to ever have.

You see, I can't justify the expenditure of tossing away the two cameras I now have, a six month's supply of film, and all my darkroom equipment.

To do that, and purchase the new equipment, would cost me in excess of \$5,000.

I've used all the shots I intend to,

taken from the dugout of a batter warming up and the coach giving signals.

So, you'll not see any baseball action shots in the *Leader*, at least not until that stupid rule is relaxed.

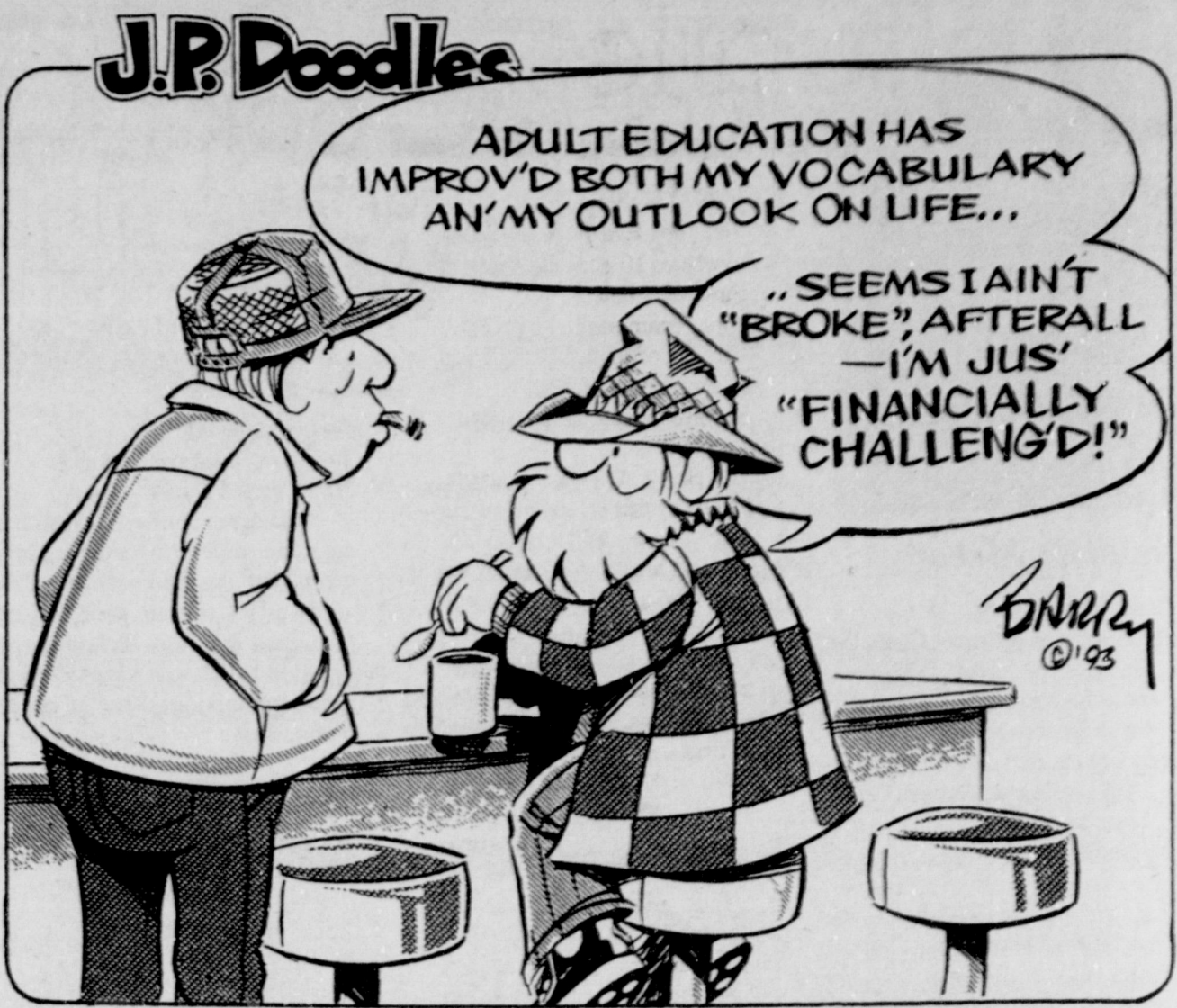
If you don't like it, take it up with the officials. I'm perfectly willing -- even anxious -- to return to the field to record game action on film.

So, if you get this week's paper and didn't get last week's, I want you to know that both your editor and postmaster apologize.



Worth Quoting

Our heart goes out to those people facing layoffs at the military bases and installations targeted for closing in the near future.

California, Florida, and South Carolina will be hit the hardest with over 40,000 civilians facing layoffs in Charleston when the navy shipyard closes.

Despite soothing words by the Clinton administration to the contrary, those people cannot possibly find equal jobs in the private sector.

The big firms that have the kind of jobs those people are qualified for, are themselves downsizing and cutting payroll's.

We're sure that there's lots of fat and waste in the military complex and certainly this country no longer needs as many installations as we've had in the past. And some of the bases should have been closed years ago.

But it seems to us that a gradual reduction of downsizing ought to be the rule for this administration.

We recently read a book about how Adolph Hitler used the turmoil, inflation, instability of Germany in the late twenties and early thirties to rise to power.

And with the current problems in the dissolution of the Soviet empire, the similarities are striking and convincing.

As we've stated in this space before, a country cannot convert from communism to capitalism overnight -- it's a long drawn-out process.

And until stability returns to Russia, we ought to proceed slowly and cautiously with the downsizing of the military-industrial complex in this country.

But anyway you cut it, it's going to be a painful, lasting hurt to a lot of people.

The boy turned to his silent friend and said, "Show him your tooth, Raymond!"

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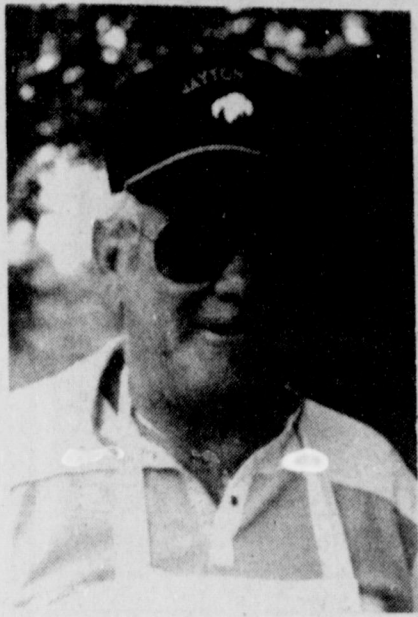

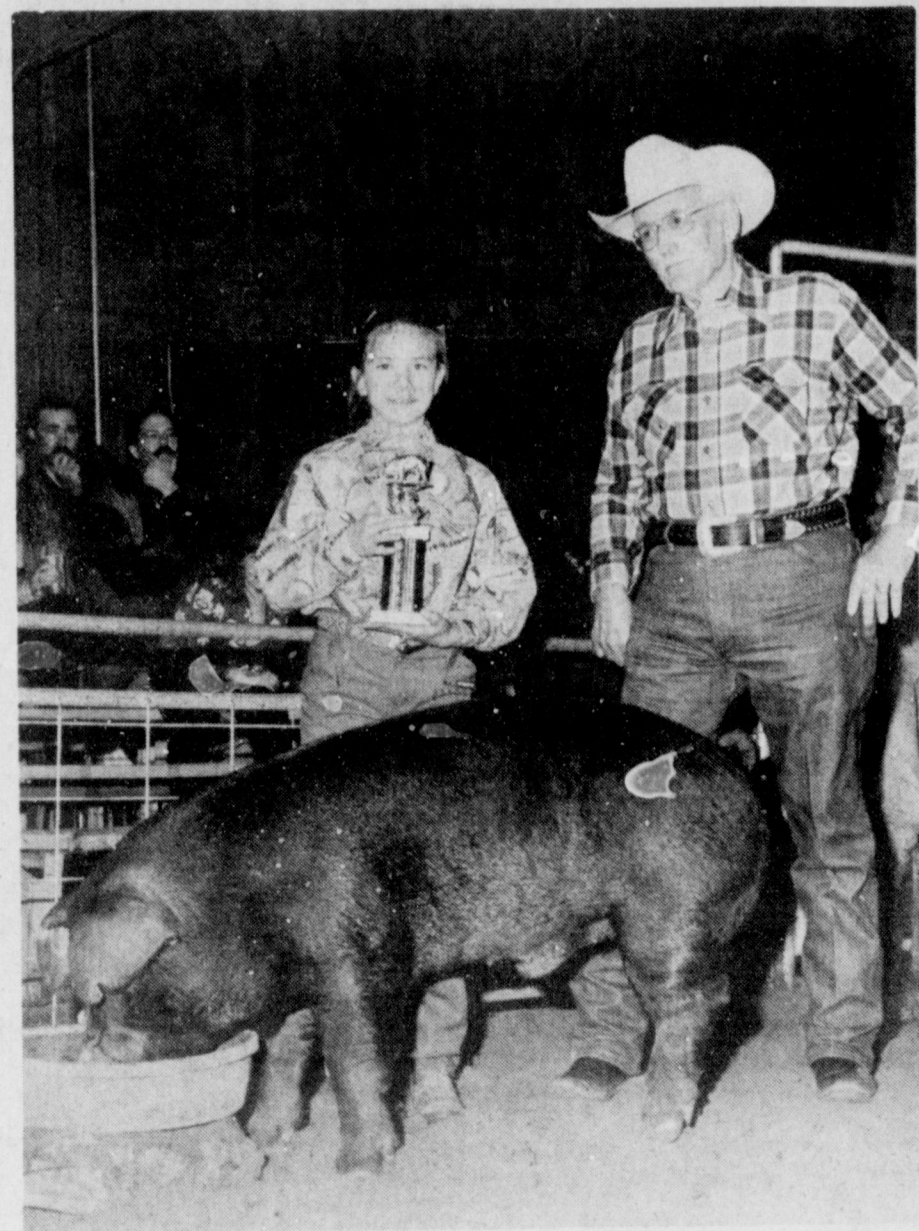
