Council to discuss lowering lake level

The city council will be asked a height City Administrator Mike Price Monday night for authority to excavate a drainage ditch for the purpose of temporarily lowering the water level at Lake Buffalo.

The regularly-scheduled meeting is to begin at 7 p.m. in council cham-

Because the lake's level has reached

said no one ever felt it would reach, it has caused concern over the dam's ability to withhold any higher levels.

The lake began overflowing in a drawdown tube almost a month ago. Riprap protection for the earthen dam is actually below the water level, and authorities worry about water action on the unprotected dirt.

Alternatives for lowering the lake level were discussed at the Mar. 8 council meeting, and Price made the suggestion that cutting a ditch in the emergency spillway area might be the most effective and inexpensive.

Aldermen also will be asked to act on a new organizational chart for city employees, as well as establishing standards for utilizing city equipment on private property.

The council is expected to take action on a bid received to sell 1101 North Jackson, one of three lots where a water tower once was located at Gordon Lake.

If the sale is approved, resolutions authorizing the execution of deeds of trust for that lot and another already approved to be sold will be acted on.

Another resolution for council consideration will be the renewal of a lease agreement with Billy James, for a portion of right of way on South Park and East Smith.

Mayor Wayne House also is to proclaim March 29 through April 4 as Clean-up and Fix-Up Week in Iowa

The council held a called meeting Monday, primarily to work on the code of ordinances concerning personnel, but also took action on a water line project.


Aldermen approved a recommendation made by Price to hire Monty's Plumbing to lay a six-inch water line in the 300 and 400 blocks of East Washington. The work would cost \$4,900, with all materials being provided by the

Price explained employees did not have time to complete all the work that is needed in order for a federally-funded reworking of Washington, all the way from West Highway to Bell Road.

Besides the amount of sewer and water lines that must be changed prior to construction, weather has prevented city employees from meeting a time schedule, Price said.

The council met almost two hours in their effort to finalize the section of the code book, and realized more meetings would be necessary before the work is completed.

So, they decided to meet each Monday evening, other than regular meeting nights, until the chapter is fin-



A considerable amount of police ing to the point of origin of every call erroneous Emergency 9-1-1 calls.

Iowa Park Chief Ray Smock said he couldn't explain the reason for so many non-emergency calls being made recently, other than the fact that some of them are residents attempting to program their telephones with the number, and in some cases, moisture getting into the lines.

But the fact is, there were 13 calls made to the police radio dispatcher from Wednesday of last week through Tuesday, and only one of them was actually an emergency.

The others were classified as being misdials, mischief or juveniles playing. The police observe a policy of go-

manhours are being wasted by bogus or made on 9-1-1, regardless of whether someone answers or not.

That policy possibly saved the lives of two elderly people Monday afternoon, when the emergency number was dialed and the telephone then went dead. They were extracted from their burning home on North Hawthorne by police.

While officers were not answering the emergency phone calls during the past week, they made one arrest, took reports on two thefts, and confiscated a pellet gun.

A patrolman made a traffic stop of a vehicle at 10:49 p.m. Saturday in the 500 block of East Highway, and during

NO ONE INJURED

Raging fire destroys Lakey home

A raging fire, enhanced by wind gusts 30 miles per hour or greater, completely destroyed the home and possessions of Mr. and Mrs. E.C. Lakey Monday afternoon.

When police responded to an Emergency 9-1-1 telephone call received by the radio dispatcher, they described the home at 303 North Hawthorne as being "completely engulfed.'

Officers assisted Mr. and Mrs. Lakey from the strugture they had made their home more than 50 years, and neither was injured.

The 9-1-1 call was made by their great-grandson, Eric Stevens, nine, who was dispatched by Mrs. Lakey to see what was burning after she smelled smoke.

Those who arrived early said the initial flames appeared to have begun

either inside or in front of the carport, which faced the south from where the high winds were blowing.

Despite the efforts of volunteer firemen, who used two pumper trucks, they were unable to save the woodstructure home, as well as everything inside, including their automobile.

Because of the trees and growth around the home, firemen had to concentrate much of their effort to preventing flames reaching neighboring homes to the north.

Assistance, mostly men to relieve local firefighters, was received from the volunteer departments of West Wichita, Cameron Gardens and Burkburnett.

A drive to generate donations of money, clothing and furniture has been initiated by Faith Baptist Church, according to Rev. Greg Ammons, pastor.

January sales lower here

Sales tax collections in Iowa Park fell off drastically in January, as compared with the same month in 1992, but the city remains ahead of last year for the two-month period.

The monthly report provided by the state comptroller's office indicated IowaPark's sales tax collections dropped 21.87-percent from February of last year.

Only \$13,365.61 was reported from business in February, down from the \$17,106.72 the previous year.

However, the two-month total remains on the plus side, 10.71 percent, with \$55,052.51 collected this year as compared with \$49,727.31 last year, according to the report.

Even with the February shrinkage, Iowa Park remains the leader in gains for the year among Wichita County

Wichita Falls, which had a 5.7percent increase in February, stands at 10.32 percent gain for 1993, and Burkburnett is a plus 3.18. Only Electra, at a minus 2.78 percent, is below collections this year as compared with 1992.

Holliday is almost even with 1992 collections, at a minus .30 percent.

This month's sales tax rebates include taxes collected on January sales and reported to Austin in February on businesses filing monthly tax returns.

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
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Mrs. Philip McLarty

Most of Donna's recipes from family members. "Jailhouse Rolls' is a recipe used by Donna's mother. Phil's mother gave her the recipe for "Banana Nut Bread," and the instructions for bread pudding and tea cakes came from her grandmothers.





Banana Nut Bread

- 1 cup sugar 1/2 cup Crisco or 1 stick margarine
- 2 eggs 2 cups flour sifted
- 1 tsp. soda
- 2-3 ripe bananas, mashed 1/2 cup chopped pecans

Mix in order given and bake in 1 large or 2 small greased loaf pans in a 325 degree oven 1 hour (small loaf), or 1 hour, 15 minutes (large loaf).

Jailhouse Rolls

- 1 cup mashed potatoes
- 2 sticks margarine
- 3 eggs, beaten 7 cups flour
- 1 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1 1/2 cup lukewarm water
- 1 cup sugar

1 pkg. dry yeast

Mix dry yeast in water, blend and set aside. Mix potatoes, margarine, eggs, salt and sugar. Blend into flour and add water and yeast. Blend well and pour into greased bowl. (Dough can be refrigerated at this point until ready for use.) Roll out dough to 1/4inch thick and cut rolls. Brush butter on top and let stand uncovered to rise, about 3 hours. Bake at 400 degrees until golden. Makes 4 1/2 dozen rolls. This recipe also makes good dough for cinnamon rolls.

Jalapeno Cornbread

- Preheat oven to 350 degrees.
- 2 cups yellow corn meal
- 1 tsp. salt
- 2 Tbsps. sugar
- 1/2 tsp. soda 1 cup sweet milk
- 2 eggs
- 1 cup chopped onions

1/4 cup pimento

- 2-4 chopped jalapeno peppers 1/2 lb. grated cheese
- Mix dry ingredients; add milk and eggs; mix well. Add remaining ingredients with exception of cheese. Beat vigorously 1 minute. Pour half mixture into greased 8x8-inch pan. Sprinkle batter with cheese and add remaining mixture. Bake 35 minutes or until firm.

Grandma's Bread Pudding

- 1/2 loaf bread
- 1 1/2 cup milk
- 3 eggs
- 2 cups sugar
- 1/2 tsp. vanilla Raisins, if desired
- Mix all ingredients and bake 1

Grandma's Tea Cakes


- 4 cups flour
- 2 cups sugar 2 Tbsps. shortening or butter
- 3 eggs
- 1 1/2 cup milk
- 3 tsps. baking powder
- 1 tsp. vanilla or lemon extract

Cream sugar and shortening. Add eggs, vanilla and milk. Sift together flour, baking powder. Mix together. Roll out to 1/4 inch thick and cut cookies. Bake at 350 degrees 10 minutes or until brown.






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"Stage" gives program for Philia Study Club

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PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED: CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION MAY 1, 1993

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Section 1 of Senate Joint Resolution 7

proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to redistribute among other school districts ad valorem taxes levied and collected by a school district. The amendment would also allow the legislature to create county education districts with the taxable property of existing school districts in one or more counties combined. County education distri-*s may levy, collect, and distribute ad valorem taxes as authorized by general law. The legislature would be allowed to set the rate of the ad valorem tax to be imposed in a school district or county education district or it may authorize the board of trustees of each school district or county education district to set the rate, provided that the rate of county education district ad valorem taxes may not exceed \$1.00 per \$100 valuation of taxable property, unless a higher rate is approved by the voters of the district. The amendment also provides that the amount of ad valorem taxes redistributed among school districts by the legislature and effectively redistributed within a county through county education districts may not exceed 2.75 percent of the sum of the state revenue appropriated for public schools and the revenue from local ad valorem taxes levied and collected for public schools. The term "state revenue" does not include revenue from ad valorem taxes, revenue for the provision of free textbooks, or contributions to a retirement system. Finally, the amendment provides that it does not affect the distribution of the available school fund under article VII, section 5, of the Texas Constitution.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment allowing limited redistribution of ad valorem taxes for schools, authorizing the legislature or local districts to set

a minimum tax rate in county education districts, and placing a cap on the ad valorem tax levied by county eracation districts.

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Section 2 of Senate Joint Resolution 7 proposes a constitutional amendment that would provide that, except for state educational mandates imposed in compliance with the Texas Constitution or federal law, or unless enacted by a vote of at least two-thirds of the members elected to each house of the legislature, a school district may not be required to comply with an obligation requiring ex-penditure of school district funds unless the obligation is fully funded. The amendment also requires the legislature to provide by law a procedure for determining whether an obligation is fully funded. In the absence of such a procedure, and at the request of a school district's board of trustees, the comptroller of public accounts shall determine whether or not an obligation is fully funded. This amendment applies only to state educational mandates enacted after December 31,

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment exempting a school district from the obligation to comply with unfunded state educational mandates."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 4 proposes an amendment to article VII, section 5(b), of the constitution, which currently authorizes the legislature to provide for using the permanent school fund to guarantee bonds issued by school districts and certain education-related revenue bonds issued by the state. The amendment would repeal the provision authorizing

the use of the permanent school fund to guarantee state revenue bonds, but would permit the legislature to provide by law for the issuance of general obligation bonds or revenue bonds of the state for the purpose of making loans to, or purchasing bonds of, school districts for the purpose of acquisition, construction, or improvement of instructional facilities, including all furnishings. The amendment also provides that the state, pursuant to general law, may forgive the payment of principal and interest on all or part of a loan made to a school district under the amendment to partially imance an instructional facility. The cap of \$750 million on the amount of bonds that could be issued under article VII, section 5(b), as amended, would be retained. The amendment would repeal the current provision of the constitution permitting the legislature to authorize bonds in excess of \$750 million by two-thirds record vote of both houses of the legislature. While any of the general obligation bonds issued under the amendment or any of the interest on those bonds is outstanding and unpaid, there would be appropriated out of the first money coming into the state treasury in each fiscal year, not otherwise appropriated by the constitution, the amount sufficient to pay the principal and interest on the bonds that matured or became due that fiscal year.

AUSTIN - The Legislature advanced several anti-crime bills last week and debated how much school property taxes will be hiked if voters approve the "Robin Hood" amendment on the May 1 ballot.

Meanwhile, former Attorney General Jim Mattox announced he will not run for the U.S. Senate in the special election to avoid a bloody fight among Texas Democrats.

The mystery issue for the moment is how much the Robin Hood plan would cost Texans in new taxes; debate is split along party lines.

Gov. Ann Richards and party Democrats are campaigning to convince voters to adopt the plan, but they will wait until after the election to fund it, so no one knows the price tag.

This strategy is driving Repub licans bonkers because they know that Democrats, with majorities in both houses, can price it as high as they want.

Early Estimates High

Last week, after funding estimates started surfacing, State Rep. John Culberson, R-Houston, charged Robin Hood would raise local school property taxes statewide by \$2.50 per \$100 valuation, or \$2,500 for a \$100,000 home.

Democrats responded they plan to cap it at \$1.50, or \$1,500.

Gun Control Bills

Gov. Richards has vowed to veto legislation allowing Texans to carry concealed weapons, but

House sponsors worked the bill to the floor and said they'll override her veto.

Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock has said he won't let it get to the Senate floor.

The bill includes some safeguards with a lengthy permitting process for citizens who pass a gun safety course and a criminal background check.

House members also approved a bill making it a crime to stalk. Stalking is defined as repeated behavior to harm, harass or torment, but the offender would have to threaten the victim's family or property in order to be charged with a crime. A second offense becomes a third-degree felony.

More Gas Tax to Schools

Rep. Jerry Yost, R-Longview, has filed a proposed constitutional amendment that would devote more of the state gasoline tax to public education.

The state constitution requires that 75 pc cent of the revenue generated by the 20-cents-per-gallon gas tax goes to the Texas Department of Transportation. The remaining 25 percent goes to public education.

Changing the formula to 65 percent for transportation and 35 percent for education would free up an additional \$351 million for schools during the 1994-95 biennium. Yost said.

"This is the people's money," Yost said, adding that voters should be allowed to re-examine how the money is spent."

But Yost said he expects strong opposition from the highway lobby. Rep. Rob Junell, D-San Angelo, chairman of the House appropriations Committee, agreed. "There's going to be a good fight over that," he predicted.

Credit Union Problem

Texas Credit Union Commissioner John Hale is under the heavy scrutiny of a legislative committee for seizing a healthy credit union's deposit insurance fund last year, spending its money without accounting to members, and paying refunds less than promised.

Credit union officials statewide are angry at Hale for paying a consultant more than \$16,000 monthly to manage the fund.

Cabinet's Second Texan

Most Texans don't know they have a second Texan in the Clinton cabinet: Transportation Secretary Federico Pena, former Denver mayor, is a Brownsville native.

Hometown friend, Dr. William C. Davis, recalls that in 1968, when University of Texas student politics were dominated by frats and Frank Erwin, Pena masterminded a coalition to run Mickey Mouse for student body president.

Despite the nonsense, Mickey's campaign finished third, but was courted for a runoff endorsement, which Pena used to negotiate minority issues then simmering on campus. Pena's political career was born.

Davis, now a UT-Brownsville professor, uses his connections to lobby for higher education in


