## Costs causing city to close its landfill

Mounting costs are driving the city out of the sanitary landfill business.

The city council voted Monday night to stop accepting trash at the landfill Aug. 2, in order to have the pit closed by a targeted date of Oct. 8.

Federal and state mandates on the

operation of landfills are proving to be too expensive for smaller cities.

Where Iowa Park's trash will be buried is as yet undecided. Alternatives discussed were a tri-city facility formed by Iowa Park, Burkburnett and Vernon, paying the City of Wichita Falls to accept it, or turning to a private operation, such as Bell.

In order to comply with the government's Sub-Title D regulation, Iowa Park would have to first invest between \$150,000 and \$200,000 for a pit that is lined with a material deemed necessary to prevent any underground water contamination.

Then, besides that, various testing units, for both underground water and methane gas, would be required, a "clean-up" insurance policy of approximately \$1-million that would be in force 20 years, and then, when the pit was filled, an additional cost of approximately \$60,000 just to close the facility.

The projected cost to maintain a landfill of its own and continue to deposit an average of 16 tons daily would increase to \$112 per ton, according to an engineer's study. The average cost is now less than \$10.

Regardless of where the trash is taken, starting this fall, the city intends to mount an intensive recycling program that will include encouraging citizens to not dump lawn clippings along with their kitchen waste.

During the summer months, approximately 20 percent of the volume put in landfills is grass clippings.

City Administrator Mike Price, in proposing closing of the existing landfill by Oct. 8, said the cost to close it to meet the new regulations would be in excess of \$54,000, because it could be done only by contract labor.

To close it earlier, city workers can do the work, he said.

Regardless of where the city's trash is taken when the landfill is closed, aldermen indicated a transfer station would be necessary.

In other business, the council set priorities on streets to be worked on this summer, awarded a bid for concrete work, approved the sale of surplus equipment, voted on a represen-

tative to the Nortex 9-1-1 board of directors, and recognized the city's Employee of the Month.

Streets scheduled for asphalt overlay this summer include 100 North Jackson, 900 North First, 600 West Coleman and, if enough funds are available, 500 West Texas.

That project does not include construction of the 400 block of West Park.

Streets scheduled for slurry applications include: 100-300 blocks of East Aldine; 100-400 West Aldine; 100-400 East Magnolia; 100-500 East Jefferson; 100-300 West Jefferson; 100-400 West Diamond, James Drive and 200 block of West Garden.

Additional blocks are listed to be slurred, if funds are available and time permits, it was pointed out.

Nine concrete valley gutters to be constructed this summer were approved, as were 10 concrete alley returns (sloping dirt alleys that erode during heavy rains).

Luz Lerma Construction's bid to do the city's concrete work on streets was accepted. The bid, \$8,950, was less than the \$10,075 submitted by Ralph Garza Concrete Co.

The council approved a proposal made by Price to hold a public auction Tuesday, May 4, of surplus city equipment.

They include: 1990 Chevy car; 1983 Ford dump truck; 1983 Ford Ranger; mosquito fogger; two kerosene space heaters; propane fuel system for a pickup; ladder rack for van; lift mast off sanitation truck; tool box for pickup; Briggs and Stratton engine; four 15.5 R 25 Michelin tires; wooden pump house and trailer-mounted broom sweeper.

All bids received must first be approved by the council before the sale is completed, Price explained.

## Early voting turnout slow at polls

Early voting in the May 1 state, city and school elections got started off slowly, according to poll judges.

Only 19 votes had been cast in the state election just after noon Wednesday

at the county annex building, 14 at city hall, and none at the school administration building.

Early voting officially began Monday and will conclude when the

polls close Tuesday, April 27.

Cold, wet weather Wednesday was believed to be one deterrent to voters marking their ballots.

Besides electing a U.S. senator from a field of 24 at-large candidates, the other issues on the state ballot all concern public schools which require changes in the state constitution.

The first proposed amendment would, if approved, allow for the transfer of ad valorem taxes collected in a county to other counties; the second would prohibit unfunded mandates from the legislature, and the third would authorize general obligation or revenue

bonds for school construction that would be guaranteed by the permanent school fund.

In the city election, two of the three incumbent aldermen are being challenged.

They include: Place One, Virgil Woodfin and Mike Sellers; Place Three, Bob Hamilton and Chris Powell; and Place Five, Mark Raby.

Neither of the two school trustee incumbents is being challenged, which is probably the reason no early votes have been cast in that election.

Seeking re-election are Randy Catlin, in Place Six, and Keith Fisher, in Place Seven.

## Sales tax collections tell of local economy

An indication of the economic trend in Wichita County is shown in the sales taxes collected by the four cities in which the tax is collected.

Only one city, Electra, is not showing a gain over last year, and that city is less than one percent below this time last year, according to this month's tax collection report from Austin.

Iowa Park continues to lead all four cities in sales tax gain for the year.

The city's sales tax rebate, reflecting sales made in February and reported to the comptroller's office in March, was \$14,005.92, a 5.4-percent gain over the \$13,288.73 received the same month in 1992.

For the calendar year, Iowa Park has received \$69,058.43. That is 9.59 percent above last year.

Despite April's rebate being 7.93

percent less than last year, Wichita Falls is still 6.38 percent over 1992, and Burkburnett is a plus 3.54 percent.

Electra is a scant minus .70 percent.

A whopping 55.98 percent increase in April's check, over the same month in 1992, raised Holliday's increase for the year to 7.58 percent. Holliday has now collected \$21,752.25.

## Parade, ball games to open LL season

## The Bluebird

The bluebird is truly America's favorite bird, appearing in poetry, song and greeting cards more often than any other bird. And why not, it is the symbol of love, hope and happiness, Let Grandma's bluebirds bring happiness to you or your someone special.

Grandma's bluebirds are handmade one at a time (in the U.S.A.!) on the end of four foot steel rod. The craftsman twirls the rod in a pool of 2000 degree hot glass to bring out a pear shaped ball of glass. He then sits at a bench that looks like a steel arm chair with no back. The arms support the rod which rolls back and forth. Using a graphite block with a small trough carved in it, he rolls the ball of glass into a tube shape. Using large tweezers he pinches a beak and pokes two eyes on the hot tube. He then flips the bird over and with three tweezer pulls the tail is formed. It takes about 300 hours practice to pick up the skill, but the result is worth it.

It certainly didn't take me long to punch in my four choices on the state ballot, when I cast my early votes Wednesday.

Of course, voting should never take long, if you've studied the issues and can make up your mind about what you think is right and wrong.

To my way of thinking, there are only two candidates for U.S. senator, among the 24 names listed. Maybe those are the ones who've gotten all the press to date, I don't know.

But my choice was Kay Bailey Hutchinson, now serving as Texas' treasurer.

She has demonstrated she has a mind of her own, and is a winner as a campaigner. You may recall, she was the only Republican elected to a major Texas-wide office in the last election.

I believe she would use her common sense, as well as her ability to think and speak, to be a most successful representative of Texas in Washington.

Bob Krueger, who is serving as the governor's appointee in Lloyd Bentsen's place until the election, is Ann Richard's hand-picked choice.

Frankly, anyone Queen Ann would like, I almost instantly dislike . . . or distrust.

But I've been aware of Krueger since he got into the political game over 20 years ago. He's a professional politician.

The only things he's done, while not in an elected or appointed office, were to teach at a liberal university, and dabble in the family's businesses.

I use the term "dabble" because those he chose to participate in, which were inherited by the family when his father died, he either ran them into the ground or lost interest and sold them.

But, because of those actions, he can actually use the term "businessman" in his resume.

Despite some legislation that wasn't introduced until Tuesday, I still voted against the first of the three constitutional amendments.

That's the one that justifies the "Robin Hood" movement of ad valorem monies from one county to another.

Reading the story of the bill in yesterday's paper caused me to pause and evaluate it. The bill makes it look like there won't be any monies being moved from one county to another.

But then I remembered something else. It has only been offered for consideration, not as a fact.

Truth of the matter is, we voters are being asked to approve that first proposition, without knowing what will be in the final plan of action.

It's one of those famous sayings of our politicians: "Trust me. I'm here to help you."

Without the enabling legislation to be considered, the amendment is in fact a blank check to legislators to do with as they wish.

I don't like that.

The second amendment actually is proof of why we shouldn't trust legislators, until legislation is put in final wording so we who pay the bills know what the plan is.

Legislators have for 10 or more years been passing mandates down to the local school districts, all in the guise of improvements and accountability, without funding.

That's why local taxpayers pay a greater percentage of the cost of public education than does the state.

And those same legislators would come home from Austin, with their chests stuck out proudly, boasting that they hadn't passed any new state tax bills.

They also mandated the proving of their point. Local school boards are required, by legislative mandate, to have an ad printed in the local papers each time the local school board has

needed to raise ad valorem taxes, that it was the local board's fault, not the legislatures.

How's that for passing the buck?

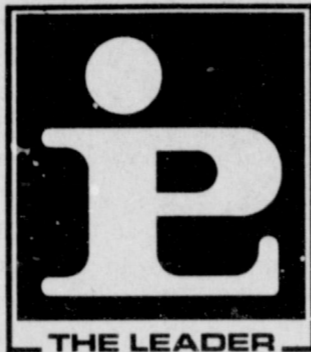
As for the third proposed amendment, I can't really find a problem with using the permanent school fund as a guarantee for bonds being issued to help school districts build facilities.

Actually, they're not asking for enough to anywhere do what is needed.

So, my ballot marking indicated I was for Hutchinson to serve me as my U.S. senator, I was against proposition one, and for the second and third.

Now, you can all go out and offset my votes. But I'll still have had my opinions counted.

That's more than those who stay home and don't vote can say.

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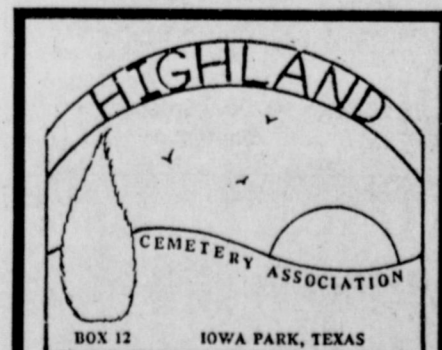


### Budget terms confusing

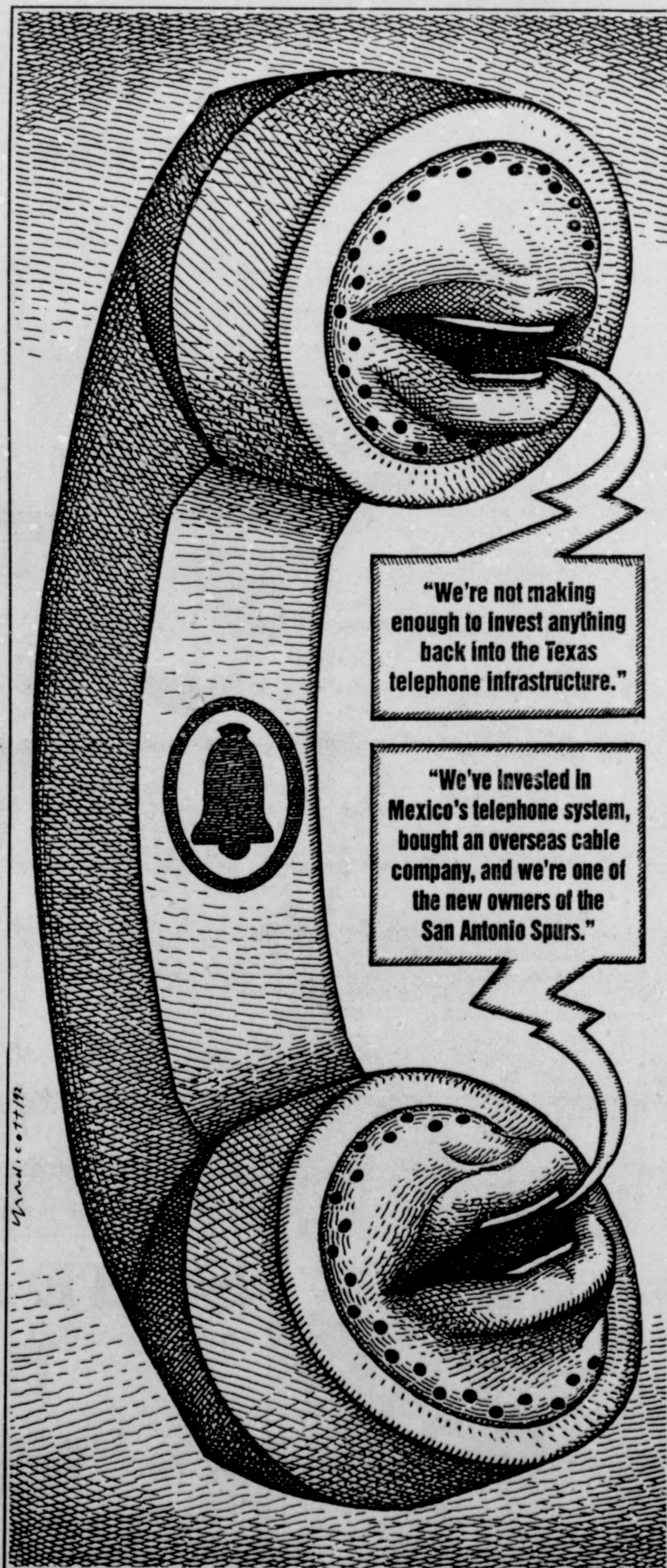
Are they using P.C. language on us, in the 1994 federal budget?

Their son Mike lives in Iowa Park, and daughter Donna lives in Cherokee. The Jenses have four grandchildren.

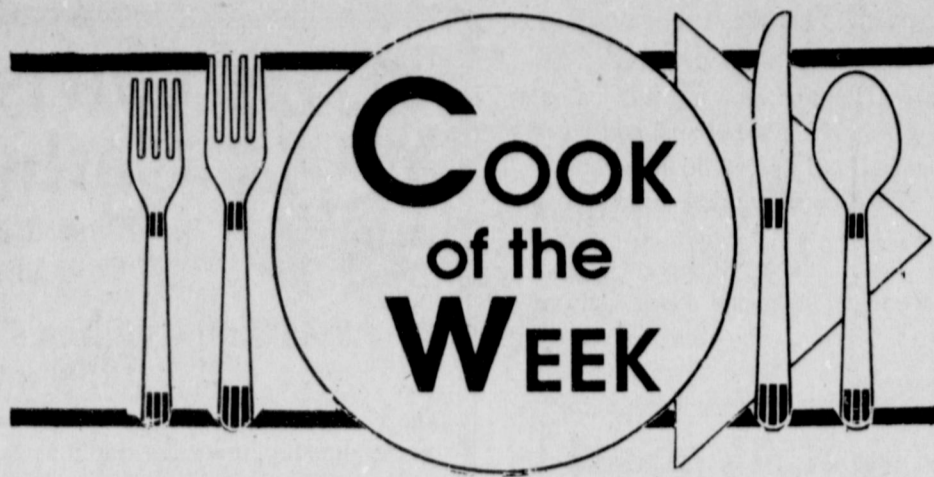

  - Simmer 10 minutes.
  - Crush:
  - 1 - 8 oz. bag Dorito taco flavored chips
  - Chop:
  - 1 large tomato
  - 1 med. onion
  - 1 small head lettuce
  - Grate:
  - 1/2 lb. Cheddar cheese
- Place crushed chips on plate, then add seasoned hamburger meat. Top with remaining ingredients of your choice. Add additional taco sauce if desired.

**Calico Beans**

- Brown:
  - 1 lb. hamburger meat
  - 1 cup chopped onions
  - Add:
  - 1/2 cup catsup
  - 1 tsp. salt
  - 3/4 cup brown sugar
  - 2 tps. vinegar
  - 1/2 cup white sugar
  - Drain:
  - 1 #2 lb. can kidney beans
  - 1 #2 lb. can lima beans (or Navy beans)
  - 1 #2 lb. can pork and beans
- Combine meat mixture and beans and mix well. Bake at 350 degrees 40 minutes. Also can be prepared in a crock pot, leaving lid ajar, and cooking 1 hour.

**Special K Bars**

- 6 cups Special K cereal
- 1 cup light corn syrup
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup peanut butter
- 1 cup chocolate chips

Add filling, then roll out top crust covering the filling. Brush with beaten egg whites. Bake at 400 degrees 30-40 minutes. Drizzle powdered sugar frosting over them. Serve either warm with ice cream or eat as a snack on the run.

**Macaroni Salad**

- Boil:
- 2 cups elbow, shell, etc. macaroni
- Drain and cool.
- Add any of your favorite raw vegetables. We enjoy the following in our: tomatoes, cucumbers, bell peppers, onions, grated carrots, celery.
- I usually use one of each, chopped or grated. Instead of using fresh celery, I have substituted 1/2 teaspoon of celery salt.

**Dressing**

- 1/2 cup white vinegar
  - 3/4 cup white sugar
  - 1/2 can Eagle Brand milk
  - 1 cup salad dressing
- Blend together and cover all ingredients in salad. Best if refrigerated for a couple of hours before serving.

What to do with last 1/2 can of Eagle Brand milk? I usually make a double amount of the dressing, because it will keep for a month refrigerated.

**HIGHLIGHTS**

AUSTIN — Districts drawn by the Legislature will be used in 1994 to elect state senators under an April 4 ruling by a panel of three federal judges.

Republicans winced at the ruling because it cancels the Jan. 8, 1992 court-imposed reapportionment that resulted in the election of 13 GOP senators last fall.

Now that the Democrat-controlled Legislature's plan has been approved, however, all 31 Senate seats would be up for re-election because boundary lines have been redrawn, casting some doubt as to which party will benefit most.

U.S. District Judge Harry Lee Hudspeth of El Paso and 5th Circuit Court of Appeals Judge Will Garwood of Austin favored the ruling. U.S. District Judge Walter Smith Jr. of Waco was the dissenter in the 2-1 ruling.

Attorney General Dan Morales said he considered the ruling favorable for Texas voters. But state GOP chairman Fred Meyer, echoing a contention by Judge Smith, criticized the action. Meyer and Smith claimed Garwood had reversed himself, pointing to the judge's December 1991 opinion that the Legislature's redistricting plan violated the federal Voting Rights Act.

**School Propositions Backed**  
Some of Texas' largest school districts announced last week they support the three May 1 ballot proposals to redistribute some local school tax money, restrict unfunded mandates and use state bonds to build classrooms.

"We believe that they will help bring some stability to Texas school

finance," said Hal Guthrie, president of the Texas School Alliance.

"Our school districts and employees need to be focused on teaching and learning, rather than on an uncertain future that clouded by possible public school closings," said Guthrie, who is superintendent of Houston's Spring Branch school district.

The alliance includes the school districts of Abilene, Amarillo, Arlington, Austin, Corpus Christi, Cypress-Fairbanks, Dallas, El Paso, Fort Worth, Houston, Garland, Irving, Lubbock, North-East in San Antonio, Waco, Wichita Falls and Ysleta.

The districts have an enrollment of more than one million students out of about 3.4 million in Texas.

**Relaxes School Regulations**

A House subcommittee has endorsed a bill that would shorten the school year, abolish a merit pay system for teachers and allow larger classes in elementary grades.

"I hope this accomplishes much-needed relief to our school districts," said Rep. Paul Sadler, chairman of the House Public Education Subcommittee.

"The clear shift in this bill is to give greater flexibility to districts in educating students," said Sadler, D-Henderson.

But some groups fear that the legislation is a retreat from state-mandated educational reforms.

The Texas Classroom Teachers Association and Texas Federation of Teachers oppose the bill because it weakens the 1984 state law prohibiting more than 22 students in any kindergarten through fourth-grade class.

**GOP Dissidents Group**

Republicans unhappy with the party's direction have formed an organization called Take It Back!

and opened an office in downtown Austin.

George Dutton of Arlington, the group's chairman, said "religious

extremists have hijacked the Republican Party in order to promote their own narrow social and theological agenda," such as banning abortions and opposing gay rights."

Carole Gates of Converse is the group's secretary and Katie Seewald of Amarillo is the treasurer.

**Krueger Pay Challenge**

U.S. Senator Bob Krueger called on his Republican opponents to join him in cutting their salaries and office budgets.

"Politicians should lead by example and start with themselves," said Krueger, who is returning 10 percent of his salary and office budget.

A GOP candidate called the move a publicity gimmick. U.S. Rep. Joe Barton, R-Ennis, last year returned 14 percent of his congressional budget, spokesman Craig Murphy said. "Krueger has just come onto this idea," he said. "He has no genuine interest in the subject."

**Drug Dealers to Pay**

A Senate committee has approved legislation that would make drug dealers pay for the lives they wreck.

The bill, by Sen. Buster Brown, R-Lake Jackson, would make drug peddlers liable for civil damages caused by the illegal substances they sell. Consider it a "sue-your-local-drug-dealer measure," sponsors say.

"Drug dealers often have a lot of expensive jewelry, big cars and airplanes that could be attached for a civil suit judgment," said Brown.

**Other Highlights**

■ The House has given prelimi-

nary approval of a bill by Rep. Glen Maxey, D-Austin, which would allow counties to abolish the elective office of public weigher by a local option election.

■ U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm and noted Houston trauma surgeon Dr. Red Duke testified last week in favor of a bill that would automatically revoke the driver's license of people caught driving while intoxicated. The bill by state Sen. Judith Zaffirini, D-Laredo, received committee approval, 13-0.



# Amity members visit Stompin' Grounds Gallery

A tour of sculptor Jack Stevens' Stompin' Grounds Gallery was the program for Amity Study Club's Monday meeting.

Stevens gave background information of the Wee Chi Tah larger than life bronze sculptures he is in the process of creating for the Streams and Valleys Association to be placed in a plaza on the Wichita River six-tenths of a mile east of the falls.

He told of the white man's legend that gave the most vivid explanation of where Wichita Falls got its name. The sculpture depicts an Indian girl testing the depth of the water. The squaw went into the river in search of a safe passage for her family and the horses.

She might have said, "Wee-chi-tah" or "waist deep." Riding in the heat of the day, she sank gratefully into the cool water. Her child, crouched at the edge of the falls, is ready to join her.

The warrior, patterned after the Comanche Indians, has won praise for Stevens from the Comanches as well as invitations to bring the finished pieces to area pow wows.

Stevens said he loads up the sculptures (all 3,000 pounds of them) and his teepee and heads out. He



displayed original Indian bow and quiver of arrows and a pipe given to him by Indian friends. Stevens also told of varied reactions he had received to the sculpture.

He has completed the six foot squaw who stands in the water, the warrior on horseback and a child who stands on the edge of the falls. He is completing detail work on a second warrior on horseback and will do a mare and foal to complete the eight piece sculpture.

"One of the most difficult things to get right is the flow of hair and clothing on each piece as it is blown by the wind", Stevens commented. All must have the same direction he said.

Stevens explained the process of creating the piece in styrofoam which is then painted with wax. The detail work is done in the wax. Steven's son, Jim, who works with him then molds the sections into plaster of paris.

When the molds are complete, the piece is heated and placed in sand and melted bronze is poured into the mold and left to set. The sections are welded together, then smoothed and finished.

Steven's Gallery had a display of 33 of his 58 original pieces. Originally he limited production to 50 each of his sculptures. He now creates only 15 of each, selling 12 and holding three for family members.

The artist only creates a new copy after the one on display is sold. His pieces depict animals, especially horses, children and dogs in whimsical situations Indians, Eagles, Owls, etc.

He takes details for much of his work from the days when he worked

on the Harvey Cattle Ranch in West Mexico as a young man of 18. Each piece bears some relation to a favorite Biblical scripture, which Stevens enjoyed sharing with club members.

Stevens says his paintings have had to take a back seat for now, but he is currently planning a Texas landscape, complete with bluebonnets.

The chief of the Wichita Indians has agreed to write the thumbnail sketch for the Indian Trails when the sculpture is complete.

"I hope everyone who looks upon this sculpture will see a people who loved their own, the land, the horses, things that The Great Creator gave, not to be sold and owned, but a way of life. Free, free to enjoy, free to live." Stevens said.

The business meeting of the club was in the home of Mrs. Randy Brown with Mrs. Robert Palmer serving as co-hostess.

The club voted to donate \$50 to Project Graduation.

Patricia Costello gave the meditation, "The Woman I Want to Be" from "Lord, Hold me Up a Little Longer" by Majorie Holmes.

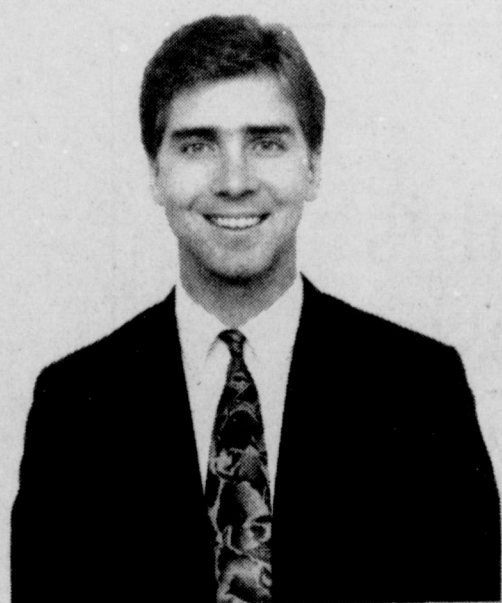

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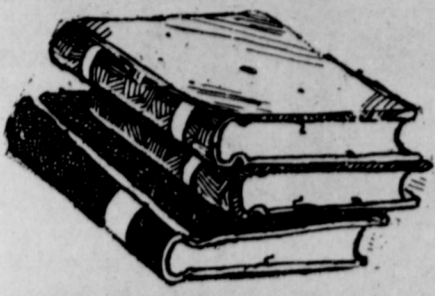

# Man reunited with family

The thrill and emotion of finally finding his family--a brother and two sisters, and all of them being together in March for "get-acquainted" activities--still lingers with 54-year-old Tod A. Moore.

The family gathering March 20 was the culmination of two years of dedicated search by Moore and his wife, Wyneth, for his biological mother.

Moore was adopted as an infant in 1938 from a home in Fort Worth by the late E.A. and Marcella Moore who lived in the Wichita Valley Farms community. Moore was chief meteorologist for the Wichita Falls Weather Bureau.

Tod is a 1957 graduate of Iowa Park High School where he played football and is proud of the fact he was on the bi-district team in 1956.

Tod had rheumatic fever when he was young that left him with a heart condition and later experienced other medical problems, including some kidney problems.

Because of his many problems, he wanted to find out something about his birth mother to see if he might have some hereditary problems that could have been passed on to his three children.

After the death of his adoptive mother in 1990, the Moores began the search for his birth mother. He had found papers about his adoption that gave him a clue where to start. He knew he was adopted, but had never questioned about it.

He found that the home where he was born had closed and that all of the adoption records had been sent to Austin. It was not an easy task the Moores undertook because of the stiff confidentiality laws in the State of Texas.

The Moores did some more investigation on their own and traveled to many places in Texas and New Mexico in their quest.

Quite by chance Moore lucked into a situation that finally helped him get some information from Austin.

Moore loves animals and has poodles. He occasionally sells some. An attorney, David Davis, came out to look at some he had to sell. In the course of conversation Moore mentioned to him the problem he was having in trying to find out any information about his natural mother. A judge in Fort Worth had not been very cooperative.

When Davis found out who the judge was he told Moore he had gone to law school with him and that he would see what he could do to help.

Davis was able to convince the Fort Worth judge to let Moore's adoption records be opened in February 1992.

The judge appointed an intermediary for Moore who was able to

make contact with the two sisters and brother in December, 1992, just at Christmas time.

Although the search was successful, it was too late for Moore to meet his birth mother, Lucille Weatherly. She had died in April, 1992.

But, the good part is that Moore, his brother, Robert Weatherly, and two sisters, Barbara Bott and Nancy Snell, had a joyful and tearful meeting March 19, marking a beautiful reward to the two year endeavor.

Moore's father and mother-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Harwell of Wichita Falls had a family dinner welcoming members of the "new" family.

Attending were the sisters, Nancy of Redlands, Calif., Barbara and husband, Carl Bott of Fallbrook, Calif., his brother, Robert and wife Vivian Weatherly and his niece, Tiffany Weatherly of Clinton, Miss.

Other relatives attending were Moore's cousin Katie and her husband John Howard and children of Waco, and an aunt of the four, Mrs. Lou Busbice of Waco, who was present with family pictures and family history.

All of the family attended church

March 21 with Mr. and Mrs. Moore and family at Loop 11 Church of Christ. Members of the church served the family a covered dish lunch following worship services.

Moore found out from his family that an uncle had died with prostate cancer, and that several members of the family had rheumatic fever, which is not considered hereditary, and that some others had experienced similar problems.

The Moores adopted a son, which he says he felt since someone had adopted him that was a way he could repay what his adoptive parents had done for him. They then had three children of their own.

Their children are Allen of Wichita Falls, Martha Marie Robertson and Russell David Moore both of Arlington, and Charmac Moore, a sophomore in Iowa Park High School.

Moore feels that he has had the best of two lives. He has nothing but praise for his adoptive parents. In addition to his raising, he also received his portion of their estate. Now, he has found a whole new family for which he is grateful.

The Moores now plan to start a search group of some kind similar to one they found in Dallas, so they can help others find their birth parents.
