

Five local candidates returned in light vote

In a surprisingly-light turnout for Saturday's elections, all five city and school incumbent candidates were returned to their offices.

And, at other polls the same day, voters in the four area boxes favored Kay Bailey Hutchinson as their choice for U.S. Senator, while rejecting Proposition One state constitution

amendment.

Alderman Virgil Woodfin defeated challenger Mike Sellers 262-176 for Place One on the council. He won both boxes, 219-148 in Precinct 32 and 43-28 in Precinct 33.

Bob Hamilton was returned to a second term on the council by a 253-184 vote margin over Chris Powell. He had a 208-157 lead in Precinct 32 and

45-27 in Precinct 33.

Mark Raby, who did not draw an opponent, received 60 votes in Precinct 33 and 298 in Precinct 32, for a total of 358.

Neither of the two school trustee incumbents was challenged. Randy Catlin received 382 votes and Keith Fisher 373.

None of the 24 candidates for U.S.

Senator received half or more of the votes, forcing a runoff in June.

Hutchinson drew 25 percent of the votes cast in that election in the four area boxes, and was one of the two who will be in the runoff.

Bob Krueger received some 500 fewer votes, state-wide, than Hutchinson to advance into the runoff. But he was not the second-high candidate locally, receiving only 12 percent of the votes.

The runner-up locally was Richard Fisher, who received 15 percent of the 735 votes cast in the area boxes.

The other two top vote receivers locally were Joe Barton, with nine percent, and Jack Fields, who drew eight percent.

State-wide, all three proposed amendments to the state constitution failed.

Locally, Proposition One, often referred to as the "Robin Hood" amendment, failed badly.

Proposition Two passed in two of the local boxes and failed by a narrow margin in the other two. The third proposition failed in all four boxes.

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Trustees add teachers on upper career ladder

Thirty-three Iowa Park teachers were placed on Career Ladder Level Three and 36 on Level Two, following an hour-long executive session of trustees Monday night.

Two projects being considered by the board were delayed, until state funding for public education is formulated by the state legislature.

Building permits higher

For the third consecutive month, building permits issued at city hall have exceeded \$100,000.

The total for April was \$116,533, which raised the sum for the year to \$615,209, according to the report issued this week.

While most of the permits were for carports, storage sheds and roofing, one was for construction of a new residence.

The projects included construction of a special education facility on the high school campus, and removal of asbestos at the junior high gymnasium.

The 1993-94 school calendar was adopted, calling for classes to commence Aug. 18 and end May 27.

Board members canvassed the results of Saturday's election, and declared Randy Catlin and Keith Fisher the winners. They will receive their oaths of office at the June 7 meeting.

Five third grade students and their teacher, Mrs. Glen Mitchell, demonstrated a pilot program for math they are using.

Called "Math the Saxon Way," the 22 students in Mrs. Mitchell's class have demonstrated their development on the subject, as 20 are carrying "A" on their report cards, the teacher told the board.

Though the course is not yet adopted to the state's list, the program is expected to be expanded on the Bradford Elementary campus.

Trustees approved a list of 55 student transfers into the district for next year, as well as one for the balance of this school year.

Transfers on the list included eight seniors, 20 juniors, 22 sophomores and four elementary students who are children of school personnel employed here.

Approval was granted for the Hot Spurs soccer team to use the upper

practice field at the high school for workouts, as well as Coach John Hoelter's request for the Wichita Falls Area Girls' Summer Basketball League to compete through the month of June in the high school gymnasium.

Trustees Sheri Kennedy and Max Henderson were appointed delegate and alternate, respectively, to the TASA/TASB convention in Dallas Sept. 25-27.

While discussing board goals for the future, Fisher, board chairman, proposed that a recycling of materials in the schools be adopted among those goals. The issue is expected to be on a future meeting agenda for adoption.

Supt. Glen Mitchell reported the district has 1,998 students enrolled, as compared with 1,942 this same time in 1992.

Joseph Jay Jameson, 24, was taken before a justice of the peace on the Class B misdemeanor charge, and then taken to county jail under a \$200 bond.

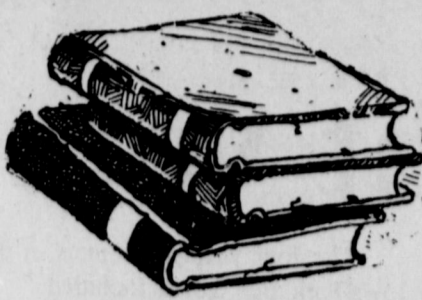
The arrest was possible because of an origin tracing after the complaining recipient had requested it from Southwestern Bell Telephone.

Texoma Eye Care Project's Vision Van will be in the Iowa Park area to provide free eye screenings for persons 55 years of age or more.

Monday, May 10, the van will be at the Iowa Park Friendly Door Senior Citizens Center, 100 W. Cash, from 10:30 a.m. to 1 p.m.

Dr. Russell Hopkins is program director for the Vision Van and will conduct the actual vision screening. A licensed optometric physician, trained in ocular diseases, will screen persons for glaucoma, cataracts, diabetic retinopathy and external diseases of the eye. Each screening will take about 10 minutes and no appointment is necessary.

Texoma Eye Care Project is sponsored by Dr. J. J. Young of The Cataract Center of Lawton, Okla.

In operation several years, the Vision Van has helped thousands of Texoma area residents protect their vision by providing regularly scheduled vision screenings. It is the only formal program of its type in Texoma with a licensed doctor performing the actual vision tests.

If a vision problem is detected, the Vision Van staff will fully explain the vision disorder and provide persons with information about services available in their local area.

Free Sight Shuttle transportation to The Cataract Center is also available for persons wishing to schedule an appointment with Dr. Young.

Lyme Disease

- Lyme disease results from bacteria transmitted to humans from a deer tick.
- In its early stages, the disease is characterized by a crawling rash and flu-like symptoms. If left untreated, Lyme disease can become severe, involving heart palpitations and arthritis.
- More than 1,500 cases of Lyme disease are reported annually, and the number is rising.
- The bacteria-infected tick is commonly found in wooded and grassy areas along both coasts, beginning in May and continuing through September.
- To lessen your chances of contracting Lyme disease, avoid tick-infested areas if possible.
- When hiking in the woods, protect extremities with clothing. Pull socks over the bottoms of pants so ticks don't have an easy onto the legs.
- Walk in the middle of paths.
- Check for ticks after every walk.
- To remove a tick, pin some fine-pointed forceps on a cotton ball and tape it loosely over the tick for 15-20 minutes. If the tick does not back itself out, use a fine pair of tweezers and grasp the tick and pull it out slowly straight out. Use a magnifying glass and make sure you've got the tick's head.
- Contact your doctor immediately if you are unable to remove the tick, or if you see symptoms of the disease.

Melanie moved to Iowa Park when she was in the seventh grade. Now she and her sister-in-law, Janet Gould, operate a day care center.

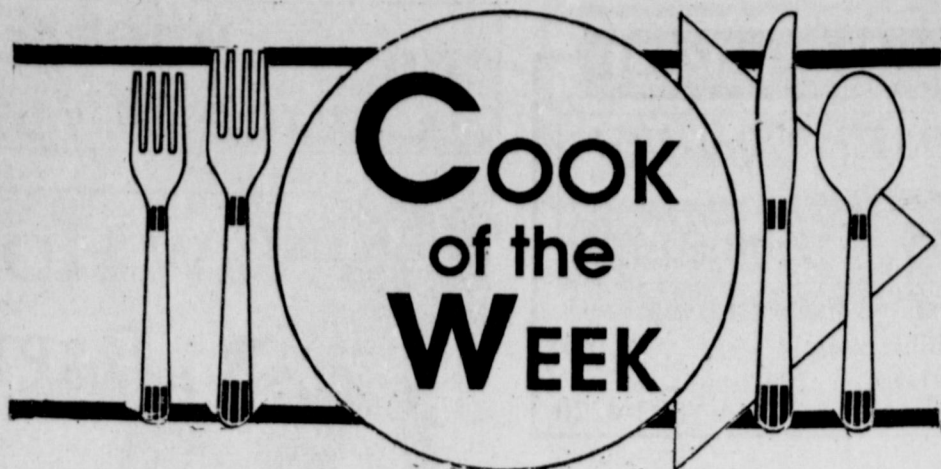

- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 1 small can tomato sauce

Mix all ingredients (except tomato sauce) by hand. Pat in a casserole dish. Bake at 350 degrees 45 minutes. Take out and pour tomato sauce over top. Return to oven for 15 minutes. Slice and serve with beans and cornbread.



Famous Meat Sauce

- 1 lb. ground beef
- 1 small onion
- 1 garlic clove, minced
- 1 - 28 oz. can tomatoes
- 1 - 6 oz. can tomato paste
- 1 tsp. sugar
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. oregano leaves
- 1/2 tsp. cracked pepper

Cook meat, onion, and garlic on high until grease is gone. Stir in remaining ingredients and simmer 30 minutes.

This sauce is great for spaghetti and lasagna.

Brownie Pie

- 1 stick oleo
- 3 Tbsps. cocoa
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1/2 cup flour
- 1 tsp. vanilla

Melt oleo over low heat. Add remaining ingredients, stirring frequently. Pour into floured pie pan. Bake at 325 degrees about 30 minutes.

Serve with a topping of your choice. Suggestion: cherry pie filling.

Lemon Cake

- 1 box yellow cake mix
- Lemon jello
- 3/4 cup oil
- 1 tsp. lemon flavoring
- 2 eggs

Mix eggs and oil into cake mix. Then mix jello and 3/4 cup hot water and add to mix. Bake at 350 degrees until done.

Glaze

- 1 cup powdered sugar
- 1/4 cup lemon juice

Combine and pour over hot cake.

MY MOTHER IS RESPONSIBLE!

An acquaintance of mine, Stephen Bilak, wrote the following inspirational work. "One Sunday morning, Bill Nichols started his Bible class by asking, 'Who is responsible for your actions?' All adults answered that they are responsible for their actions. His seven year old daughter responded without hesitation, 'My mother is!' There is much truth in this little girl's statement. When I think of my mother, I must admit it is my mother who is responsible to a great extent for what I am and do.

In March 1942, the Germans took me and many other youth to forced labor. As my sister, brothers, mother and grandmother accompanied me outside the village where several wagons were waiting to take us to Germany, my mother gave me her final exhortation: 'My son, we may never see each other again (we never did), therefore, I want to tell you for the last time the things I have been teaching you. This shall be my testament. Wherever you will be and whatever will happen in your life, believe in God, work hard, economize, respect what I respect and taught you to respect. Remember who you are (Ukrainian) and not be ashamed of it. Live an honest and exemplary life, as though I, your mother, am constantly watching you. Above all, search for the truth, run after the truth. Remember and do this, and God will bless you."

My mother's last testament became my 'magnificent obsession.' I tried to put it into daily practice, and God has blessed me beyond my imagination. In 1945, I heard about the Truth as I had never heard before. This happened in Kolishka's place in DP camp in Germany, when I was invited for supper and to spend the evening listening to a historical biographical lecture on John Huss, a Czech martyr for the Truth. Huss was a restoration leader who called, 'Listen to the Truth, learn from the Truth, and defend the Truth until your death.' He died on June 6, 1415, burned at the stake for the truth he proclaimed.

The life and death of John Huss made a great impression upon me and I remember my mother's exhortation, 'Search for the Truth.' I started to search and found the Truth in the New Testament that the Kolishkas gave me, and on October 1, 1946, I obeyed the Truth. Since that day I dedicated my life to live and proclaim Jesus Christ, the Truth. Jesus declared, 'I am the Way, the Truth, and the Life.' (John 14:6)

Hawks hosting Steers in big district battle

The baseball Hawks could strengthen their hold on second place in Dist. 4-AAA, with a win against league-leading Graham here Friday.

In Tuesday's game at Breckenridge, the Hawks jumped out with a two-run lead in the first inning, but the Bucks answered in the second with

three of their own.

But Iowa Park jumped on the hosts with five big runs in the fifth, and was never headed again. Breckenridge narrowed the margin with three crossing the plate in the fifth, but the victors tacked on one more in the sixth to wind up the scoring.

Jason Young allowed only six hits in the five innings he worked on the mound. He was relieved in the sixth by Thompson, who blanked Buck batters.

McNeely was four-for-four at the plate, knocking in one RBI. Kennedy had two hits in his three at-bats, and was credited with a pair of runs batted in.

One of Tony Lozipone's two hits was a double, and Ralph Dillard went two-for-four.

Thompson helped his own cause with a double on his only hit.

The Hawks will close out their regular season schedule at 4:30 p.m. Tuesday against the Bearcats at Henrietta.

The highest finish among the seven was Dusti Welch, who placed fourth in the 800-meter run with a 2:24.2. Despite being boxed in going into the final curve, she still posted her best time of the season.

Despite an injury, Brandi Catlin still competed Friday in the 3200-meter run, but was clocked in 13:35 and did not place. She withdrew from the 1600-meter event Saturday.

To honor Mrs. Robinson, a retirement celebration is planned that day at the Center. At least 100 people are expected to attend the celebration and the appreciation program at 11 a.m. that will precede the luncheon.

Myrna has been the only director of the Senior Citizens Center has had since its beginning.

An advisory committee, that became the first board of directors, was made up of Bill Stegar, Margaret Soell, Mrs. Charlie Lee, Mike Hubbard, Bill Bates, Don Flowers, R.L. Good, Mrs. Miles Hines, Taylor George, and the late Ethyle Kidwell.

"They approached me and asked if I would be director of the Center when it was organized. I consented and have never regretted that I did," Myrna said.

With her attractive presence and

gregarious personality, Myrna has endeared herself to those who attend the Center activities, as well as to townspeople.

She grew up at Loving, in Young County, the youngest of 10 children, which more or less set the stage for her to love and enjoy being around older people. "I had nieces and nephews that were older than I," Myrna commented.

Because of her being the youngest in the family it fell her lot to take care of her mother in her later years. She cared for her mother until her death when she was 86.

Myrna now sees after a sister who is in the nursing home, and helps take care of another sister when she is needed.

When Myrna referred to an earlier desire, she had felt she was called to do missionary work, but her mother was getting older and didn't want Myrna to be away.

When she thinks about how much the Center has helped senior citizens through the years to give them something to do and somewhere to be among their peers in a social and fun situation, she feels that perhaps the past 16 years has been her mission.

Although Mrs. Robinson was hired to work six hours, many times she spends a lot more time than that. She is known for "going the second mile", and when one of the senior citizens needs to go to a doctor appointment, or has another need, Myrna sees to that.

Sherry Wood, who has served as assistant director four years, will take over Myrna's duties.

The Robinsons have lived in Iowa Park since 1960. In fact they met in Iowa Park at the Texas-Oklahoma Fair while Myrna was attending Draughon's Business College in Wichita Falls.

Her husband, Bill Robinson, currently Justice of the Peace, one time commented although she was going to college, he really thought she was looking for a husband.

After their marriage they lived in Wichita Falls. She worked for the City of Wichita Falls and Robinson worked as parts manager for White's Auto Store, after he served in the military for two years during the Korean Conflict.

In 1960 Myrna and Bill moved to Iowa Park and started their own business, a service station on the Barbour Trucking Co. corner. After five years they sold their business and opened White's Auto Store here. After they sold it Myrna worked for Parkway Furniture and in May 1977 she began working as director of the Senior Citizens Center.

Myrna loves to work in the yard and has some plans for that, and for helping Judge Robinson with his work in his Fix-It Shop, if he will let her. From a comment her husband once made, he may let her work in the Fix-It Shop, just as long as she doesn't go into his office and try to clean off his desk.

The Robinsons love to travel and they are planning to do some of that now that she is retiring.

A proposed state law to set new minimum standards for mammography machines, their operators and doctors who interpret whether the tests have revealed breast cancer is being supported by University of Texas health science institutions.

An estimated 2,300 women in Texas will die of breast cancer in 1993. Rep. Brian McCall of Plano, a Republican, who introduced the bill calling for new standards, says these deaths are not necessary because the disease has a high cure rate if detected early.

He is concerned that only 158 of the 548 mammography facilities are accredited for safety and accuracy by the American College of Radiology.

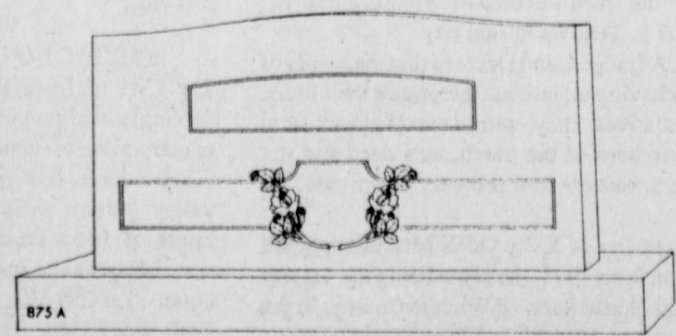
