# Family friend's influence led Bondurant to decision

"I credit Newt Newman with planting the embryo that generated my desire to become a lawyer," said Alyce Bondurant, women's and children's advocate and the first woman to practice law in Iowa Park.

She remembers that in the eighth grade she wrote in her occupational theme paper that her future plan was to become a lawyer.

Alyce explained that Newt and Estelline Newman and her father and mother, Dr. Clark and June Bondurant, were best friends when she was growing up. Also Newman was Dr. Bondurant's lawyer.

An additional factor in her decision to become a lawyer could be because the Perry Mason television show was her mother's favorite. Alyce always watched it with her and she decided being a lawyer would really be an interesting career. She has not been disappointed.

"Newt has been a great influence on my life and continues to be my mentor," said Alyce, whose office is in the same building and across the hall from Newman's.

This month marks the eighth anniversary of Alyce's graduation from law school and earning her license to practice law. She immediately came back to Iowa Park to begin her long

planned career. Primarily her practice spans family law, including divorce, modifications, and adoptions, called the Happy Law, because it is the only fun thing lawyers get to do. " That is because you make both the child and the

adoptive parents happy", Alyce said. She also does simple probate wills. "Newt does the stickier ones," Alyce commented. And she handles child support cases. But, she does not handle criminal cases.

Alert action of two men early Sunday morning led to the arrest of two other men on charges of theft over

\$750. Clint William Holmes, 22, and James Coy Williams, 26, were charged shortly after midnight Saturday with theft and transported to county jail, according to the police blotter.

The theft reportedly took place in the 400 block of East Washington.

One of the alert residents walked out his back door after hearing his dog barking, and told police he could see, with the help of a bright light in the neighborhood, two men pushing

something down the alley. When he called for his friend and also for his wife to alert the police, the suspects reportedly dropped a motorcyle they had taken from a nearby home and began running.

The chase was on. One of the suspects, Holmes, was caught soon afterward, attempting to hide under a mobile home. But Williams could not

Holmes was transported to the city jail for booking. He had not, however, identified his accomplice.

Soon afterward, a resident in the 400 block of East Alameda called police, telling them a man was lying in their front yard.

When police arrived, they found Williams, and arrested him on a public intoxication charge. He was taken to the city jail.

The alert men who had reported the theft had gone to the police station to make their statements. After completing that, they were about to leave when they looked up at the television monitor that oversees the jail cells, and told police, "That's the other guy, right

It was Williams. He was then booked for theft, and the two were later transported to county jail.

Another arrest was noted on the blotter, about eight hours before the motorcycle theft incident.

Local police were notified by the county sheriff's department that it had a warrant for the arrest of Rickie Dee Smith, 35, on a charge of aggravated sexual assault.

Smith was located at 5:54 p.m. in a residence in the 400 block of West Magnolia, and taken into custody. He was later released to a county deputy to be transported to county jail.

In the meantime, negotiations continue in an effort to develop a small regional landfill operation near Burkburnett, which would include that city, Iowa Park and Vernon.

During the discussion on the transfer station, Price pointed out that fire protection would be required by the state at the facility. That would mean extending a six-inch water line to the site, he said.

Price also said the cost of opening the 400 block of West Park would be somewhat greater than first projected.

He explained that workers on the project have discovered large amounts of concrete below the parking lot covering which previously served as foundations for the old fair grounds

building. The additional cost will be the demolition and removal of the concrete, Price said.

The administrator also told aldermen Sue Hatcher was handling the duties of inspections on building projects, having taken over that chore after David Collins resigned.

# Disaster preparedness topic of Evening Lions program

Major Bernard Hassen, chief of the disaster preparedness element at Sheppard AFB, gave a slide program Tuesday for the Evening Lions. He showed how disaster preparedness relates to the weather during the tornado season. He was introduced by Harvey Troutman.







#### Drumming up business? Dear Bob.

On Monday, May 10, the Visual Screening Van from Lawton paid a visit here to give Visual Screening Tests (VST) to the senior citizens. Taken at face value this looks like an altruistic endeavor. But, if the truth were known, the main reason for this seemingly samaritanious effort is to conerate cataract patients for the Cata act Center in Lawton. The surgical fees so produced more than pay for the elaborate van and one Doctor of Optometry and two assistants.

Potential cataract surgery patients should be aware of the fact that Medicare has cut the fees for cataract surgery by 44% so there is more competition for smaller pieces of the pie. Also, the General Accounting Office stated on April 21 that 25% of Medicare reimbursed cataract surgery may be unnecessary. Facing reduced income and fewer potential cataract patients many opthalmologists (M.D.) are opting for a quick course in Radialkeratotomy (R.K.). Also referred to as "Slash for Cash."

The bottom line is that, with medical doctors now advertising and aggressively seeking patients as less lofty professionals seek customers, it would be wise for a patient who is advised to have cataract (or R.K.) surgery to get a second or even third opinion as surgery is mostly irrevers-

# Storm warnings explained

Numerous questions have been posed recently, especially from families who have lived in Iowa Park only a short time, concerning how residents are alerted in case of a tornado warning and where they can seek shelter.

When notified by the proper authorities that a tomado is threatening the city, the sirens are sounded in one long blast lasting three minutes.

The same type siren signal also is used to let residents know when the threat no longer exists.

Sirens normally are used to alert firemen and emergency medical personnel when they are needed, but the siren blast does not last three minutes.

The city has long held a policy that emergency personnel will be notified by radio, rather than sounding the sirens, whenever threatening weather is in the area. That, however, is not always observed.

Iowa Park schools open two stormproof facilities, whenever a tornado threatens the community. The basement of the high school is

available for residents who have no where else to go. Pets are not allowed in the basement, however. This is the first year that Bradford

Elementary is opening its gymnasium as a shelter.

The city council several months a go adopted a plan of action, in case a disaster such as a tornado should strike. However, no meetings to coordinate actions of those responsible has ever



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

- 3 med. potatoes, pared and quartered 2 stalks celery, cut into 2-inch chunks





One of the great tragedies of our time is lost children. Sometimes it is only after one loses something, that one comes to their senses and appreciates what has been lost. The losing of many children is without excitement although it is very real and sad.

Many fathers lost their children because they were too busy to sit down and talk to their children. Many fathers have placed their focus on television and the professional athlete instead of placing a focus upon the needs of their children and the problems they encounter.

Many mothers lose their children because they also were too busy with other activities that time was never taken to read stories, hear prayers, teach good morals, go to Bible class, or to talk with their offspring about problems they were facing. Too many mothers have turned over their responsibilities to the baby-sitters, school teachers, or school counselors. Many mothers have let small fingers slip through their grasp and the children are now lost to mothers.

Some very basic facts are obvious. Someone must take time to know a child. Someone must take time to love and protect a child. Someone must spend the long tiring, yet rewarding hours that parenting requires for children to have confidence and trust anchored safely that little hearts need. Who fulfills this need? Too often children of necessity must look to friends and playmates who are only children themselves. Usually when children follow a playmates's advice, deep trouble is the result physically. emotionally, and spiritually. This is how many children become lost. began working for Texas Comptroller Bob Bullock in Dallas and Austin.

Her goal was not yet reached so she entered Texas Tech at Lubbock to pursue her law degree. She rented a room from her Grandmother Bondurant in Lubbock three years.

"So many young people never have a chance to really get to know their grandparents," Alyce said, "so I feel very fortunate to have spent that much time with my grandmother."

Her grandmother was a Lubbock pioneer and Alyce learned a lot about the Llano Estacado of West Texas.

Since Alyce has been back in Iowa Park she has had a avid interest in First Step Inc., and volunteers her services there.

She occupies the office that had been Michael Dodd's. When she came back, he was leaving Iowa Park.

Dodd was also interested in family law and had an interest in the family violence program. So, he was at least partially responsible for Alyce getting invovled with that pro-

Alyce is an affiliate of the Texas Council on Family Violence on both the state and local levels. "I guess I'm just a bleeding heart," she commented, "but I want to help people who have family problems.'

"I guess 1990 was my year," Alyce said. That year she received the "Volunteer of the Year Award" from the Texas Council on Family Violence and also from First Step, Inc. She laughed as she commented, "Oh yes, and at my 20th year class reunion I was voted the least changed since graduation."

Alyce serves as the judge appointed Ad Litem in child welfare and family law cases. She also represents the patients in Wichita Falls State Hospital in committment proceedings. This is an interesting phase of her work, she says.

"I can't let myself become emotionally involved with the adoption cases, and there are real fine lines in divorces and child support cases,"

She said at First Step there are some abused women and children who go back home as many as 10 times, trying to work things out, or just to accept what they know they will have to put up with. Or, eventually they will be killed or maybe commit suicide.

Alyce said so many times the women feel they deserve what they are getting....that in some way it is their fault they are being abused.

"Of course, secondary to that is that the children many times grow up to abuse their own wives and chil-

Even those who have seen their mothers beaten to death think in some way that is just a 'part of it", Alyce said.

Those who seek help there goes from one extreme to another, age-wise. She said you see the very young and you see many elderly women who are abused by their husbands, and even by their own children.

Alyce says they do have a few men to come to the shelter for help. "We can't keep them there, but we can put them in a hotel or motel and help them there."

Alyce had words of praise for First Step volunteers. She said they are a very organized group and have been taught how to relate to the people who are in these abusive situations.

She also commented, "We have an exceptional group of family law judges now."

Alyce believes the economics have had a lot to do with family situations. "I do not have many clients who have a lot of problems when they divorce, because most of them do not have a lot of property to have trouble over who will get it, " she said.

"After all Texas has been broke ever since I started practicing law." she added.

Alyce has a sister, June Davison of Wichita Falls, who is a state parole officer. But, the real "light of her life" is her nephew, five-year-old Drew. He soon will have to share that devotion with a little brother or sister, and she doesn't know how that is going to

Alyce serves as chair for the Wichita County Child Welfare Board and is a member of the Regional Board of Girl Scouts of America. She also serves on the board of the Arthritis Foundation, and is currently serving

as secretary of the Wichita County Bar Association.

The young lawyer voiced her opinion on women in the work place.

She thinks women are being more accepted and that people are getting a different impression of women in responsible positions and are not thinking about them all as "feminists".

"I believe people are not thinking of women like they did a few years ago when the 'radicals' seemed to get all of the media attention, giving people the wrong impression of what most women wanted to accomplish," she said.

She added that she believes women are "coming into their own" in Wichita County as well as in other places, judging from the number of women who are now serving in politi-

"I feel that I am very fair and honest in the way I practice law, and I always try to do the best I can for my clients, a trait I think I inherited from my parents, and was reinforced by Newt", Alyce said.
