## Family friend's influence led Bondurant to decision

"I credit Newt Newman with planting the embryo that generated my desire to become a lawyer," said Alyce Bondurant, women's and children's advocate and the first woman to practice law in Iowa Park.

She remembers that in the eighth grade she wrote in her occupational theme paper that her future plan was to become a lawyer.

Alyce explained that Newt and Estelline Newman and her father and mother, Dr. Clark and June Bondurant, were best friends when she was growing up. Also Newman was Dr. Bondurant's lawyer.

An additional factor in her decision to become a lawyer could be because the Perry Mason television show was her mother's favorite. Alyce always watched it with her and she decided being a lawyer would really be an interesting career. She has not been disappointed.

"Newt has been a great influence on my life and continues to be my mentor," said Alyce, whose office is in the same building and across the hall from Newman's.

This month marks the eighth anniversary of Alyce's graduation from law school and earning her license to practice law. She immediately came back to Iowa Park to begin her long planned career.

Primarily her practice spans family law, including divorce, modifications, and adoptions, called the Happy Law, because it is the only fun thing lawyers get to do. "That is because you make both the child and the adoptive parents happy," Alyce said.

She also does simple probate wills. "Newt does the stickier ones," Alyce commented. And she handles child support cases. But, she does not handle criminal cases.

Alyce was born in Dallas while her father was a medical intern there.

They later moved to Wichita Falls and Dr. Bondurant was an anesthesiologist at Bethania Hospital.

The Bondurants moved to Iowa Park when Alyce was in the sixth grade. They purchased the old Underwood place north of town, which she still maintains as her home.

Her mother was a lab technician and worked to help Dr. Bondurant

finish medical school. She also did a lot of research. When she died she had started on her second career as a CPA, Alyce said.

Alyce graduated Iowa Park High School in 1972. She earned her bachelor and master degrees from Midwestern State University. She

## Sewer improvement project to correct south side problems

Major steps toward an aggressive sewer-improvement project designed to increase the city's capacity to handle sewage flow and reduce back-up flooding in the south part of town were taken Monday night by the city council.

The council awarded a contract for administrative/management consultant services for the city's recently approved grant from the Texas Community Development Program, as well as selecting the engineering firm to work on the project.

The total project is estimated to cost \$113,400, of which \$30,000 will be contributed by the city as in-kind labor and equipment use.

Governmental Service Agency, represented by David Lewis, was selected for consultant services, at a cost of \$12,000.

When the rankings of three engineering firms who submitted applications to design the project were considered, it was found the council had selected the Wichita Falls firm of Biggs and Mathews.

Administrator Mike Price was authorized to negotiate the firm's fee for its work on the project. In such cases, firms do not submit bids to be considered.

Lewis said the actual project should be completed within 90 days, once actual construction got underway. However, once the final inspections and reports were completed, the overall time consumed would likely be next May, he told the council.

The action came shortly after the oath of office was administered to Mark Raby and Bob Hamilton, winners of the May 1 city council election. The third winner, Virgil Woodfin, was unable to attend Monday's meeting, and took his oath earlier in the day.

Council members approved the sale of items bid on during last week's surplus property auction, with one exception. They rejected a bid on a butane fuel system for a pickup, and expect to negotiate for a higher price at a later date.

Discounting the bid on the fuel system, total receipts produced by the auction was \$3,310, Price reported.

During his report to the council, Price said he had contacted engineer Kerry Maroney to begin drafting plans for a garbage transfer station to be developed at the current landfill site.

The council has already decided to close the landfill and begin hauling trash to another site, because the cost of meeting federal and state mandates for

landfills would be excessive.

No action was taken to change the previously-announced date Aug. 2 as a cutoff date for accepting trash at the landfill, even though it was announced this week that a six-month delay in putting the mandates into action.

However, action is expected at a future meeting to change the cutoff date.

In the meantime, negotiations continue in an effort to develop a small regional landfill operation near Burkburnett, which would include that city, Iowa Park and Vernon.

During the discussion on the transfer station, Price pointed out that fire protection would be required by the state at the facility. That would mean extending a six-inch water line to the site, he said.

Price also said the cost of opening the 400 block of West Park would be somewhat greater than first projected.

He explained that workers on the project have discovered large amounts of concrete below the parking lot covering which previously served as foundations for the old fair grounds building.

The additional cost will be the

demolition and removal of the concrete, Price said.

The administrator also told aldermen Sue Hatcher was handling the duties of inspections on building projects, having taken over that chore after David Collins resigned.

Mrs. Hatcher has done some of that work previously, having been trained and certified.

During the general discussion period, topics included problems expressed by residents in the flood plain area, complaints received from motorists and neighbors concerning parking at the girls' softball field as well as at baseball practice areas, and consideration of installing a new culvert over the creek crossed by Bell Road.

Sheria Fowler was recognized as the city's Employee of the Month for April.

Mayor Wayne House also read a proclamation declaring Friday, May 14, as "Myrna Robinson Day in Iowa Park." Mrs. Robinson is retiring that day as administrator of the Friendly Door senior citizen center.

## Alert neighbors credited with arrests of thieves

Alert action of two men early Sunday morning led to the arrest of two other men on charges of theft over \$750.

Clint William Holmes, 22, and James Coy Williams, 26, were charged shortly after midnight Saturday with theft and transported to county jail, according to the police blotter.

The theft reportedly took place in the 400 block of East Washington.

One of the alert residents walked out his back door after hearing his dog barking, and told police he could see, with the help of a bright light in the neighborhood, two men pushing something down the alley.

When he called for his friend and also for his wife to alert the police, the suspects reportedly dropped a motorcycle they had taken from a nearby home and began running.

The chase was on. One of the suspects, Holmes, was caught soon afterward, attempting to hide under a mobile home. But Williams could not be found.

Holmes was transported to the city jail for booking. He had not, however,

identified his accomplice.

Soon afterward, a resident in the 400 block of East Alameda called police, telling them a man was lying in their front yard.

When police arrived, they found Williams, and arrested him on a public intoxication charge. He was taken to the city jail.

The alert men who had reported the theft had gone to the police station to make their statements. After completing that, they were about to leave when they looked up at the television monitor that oversees the jail cells, and told police, "That's the other guy, right there."

It was Williams. He was then booked for theft, and the two were later transported to county jail.

Another arrest was noted on the blotter, about eight hours before the motorcycle theft incident.

Local police were notified by the county sheriff's department that it had a warrant for the arrest of Rickie Dee Smith, 35, on a charge of aggravated sexual assault.

Smith was located at 5:54 p.m. in a residence in the 400 block of West Magnolia, and taken into custody. He was later released to a county deputy to be transported to county jail.

A resident in the 300 block of East Washington filed a complaint Friday that five rings, valued at \$2,235, were missing from a box kept in the home's bedroom.

The complainant said the rings had last been seen May 1.

Police took a criminal mischief report Thursday from Ron Woods, principal of Kidwell Elementary, who told officers of damage done to the exterior of the new gymnasium building.

The damage, which was 45 holes knocked in the stucco siding of the structure, apparently by rocks or balls, was similar to damage found some two years earlier.

The new damage was on the west side of the building, while the first damage was on the east side.

No estimate of damage was included in the report.

## News Briefs

### Students selling subscriptions

Iowa Park Junior High band students will again be selling subscriptions to the *Iowa Park Leader* this weekend, as they have the past several years.

The band shares a percentage of the sales, with the money being used to purchase equipment.

Individually, three students also

will earn special prizes. They are the student who sells the most subscriptions, the one selling the most new subscriptions and the other selling the most renewals.

Winners will be announced during the band's annual Spring Concert in the high school auditorium next Thursday.

### Month's rainfall over 3 inches

Iowa Park has received more than three inches of precipitation thus far this month.

Those, when added with the .88 that fell Saturday, May 1, brings the May total to 3.08 inches.

U.S.D.A. food commodities will be distributed next week to qualified recipients, at the First Christian Church Fellowship Hall.

From 3 to 6 p.m. Thursday, May 20, butter, peanut butter and pork are on the list for distribution, according to Frances Park.

## Disaster preparedness topic of Evening Lions program

Major Bernard Hassen, chief of the disaster preparedness element at Sheppard AFB, gave a slide program Tuesday for the Evening Lions. He showed how disaster preparedness relates to the weather during the tornado season. He was introduced by Harvey Troutman.

Major Hassen said that at this time when tornadoes are striking in this area and many places in Texas and other states that it behooved people to think ahead and make plans to protect themselves from thunderstorms, lightning, floods and the threat of deep water on the streets and roads. He stressed the importance of listening to the weather report on television and radio and explained the difference between weather watch and weather warning.

The speaker said that it is important for people to keep calm, listen and wait, locate the best shelter which

would be a storm cellar or a room in the house with no outside walls. He advised families to make plans and practice them, and tell members of the family about the plans if a tornado strikes. He also advised having a battery operated radio, medicines and other supplies in the place of safety. He said that the worst places to be during a tornado were a mobile home, a car and outside walking.

In conclusion, the major showed pictures of the 1979 tornado to jog the memory of those who viewed the slides and heard his comments, and to remind them that the destruction they viewed could happen anywhere a tornado strikes.

Pete Elliston presided during the business following the program. Thompson gave a report on the District 2E-1 meeting held at Electra which he and Claude Johnson attended. The theme of the meeting was "SightFirst."

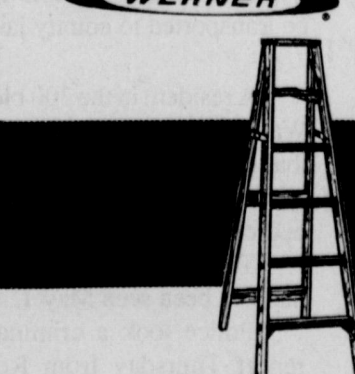

## 'Orphan Train' topic of Philia presentation

"Orphan Train" was subject of the presentation made at Philia Study Club Monday evening by Beverly McClure, local elementary school teacher.

"More than 150,000 orphan children were sent by rail from New York City to foster homes and adoptive parents in the south and southwest between 1854 and 1929," stated Mrs. McClure.

"It was believed that these homeless children would be better off in a home environment rather than in an orphanage, or living on the streets of New York," continued the speaker.

Mrs. McClure's own mother was an Orphan Train child who was sent to Bowie when she was nine years old. A family adopted her and later sent for her younger sister, who also was adopted.

This program was the beginning of the foster care program and also of Children's Aid Society, according to Mrs. McClure.

The Orphan Train Heritage Society of America was founded to preserve this part of America's history. One of the society's goals is to have the

history of the Orphan Train included in school text books.

Mrs. McClure displayed a poster featuring a picture of an Orphan Train, pictures of her mother and aunt, and other children. She also stated that a documentary film is now being made about the Orphan Train.

Following the interesting and informative presentation, Mrs. McClure answered questions from club members.

The meditation was presented by Mrs. Gayle Gafford. Following the pledge to the flag, Mrs. Helen Burrell led the singing of "This Land Is Your Land."

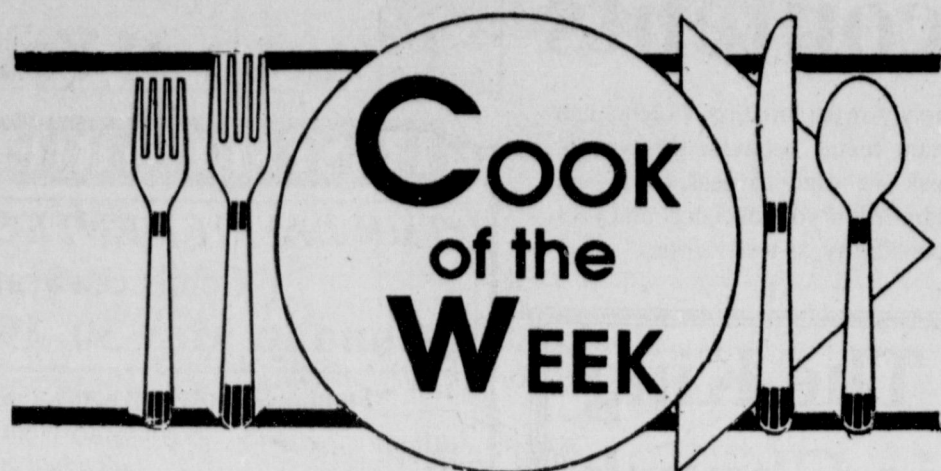

**Hobo Packs**

A summer favorite for those late practices. Just add a salad!

- 1 1/2 lb. chuck steak, 1-inch thick
- 1 can cream of mushroom soup
- 1 envelope dry onion soup
- 3 med. carrots, quartered
- 3 med. potatoes, pared and quartered
- 2 stalks celery, cut into 2-inch chunks
- 2 Tbsps. water

Pre-heat oven to 450 degrees. Put a sheet of heavy duty foil in a cake pan. Place meat on foil.

Stir together mushroom soup and onion soup mix and spread over meat. Top with vegetables and sprinkle with water. Put foil over the top and cover tightly. Bake 1 1/2 hours or until tender. About 4 servings.

**Chicken Enchiladas**

- 1 chicken, boiled, skinned & deboned
- 1 can cream of mushroom soup
- 1 can cream of chicken soup
- 1 small can diced jalapeno peppers
- 1 pkg. flour tortillas
- Mozzarella cheese

Shred cooked chicken. Combine soups and jalapeno peppers and heat. Tear tortillas into strips. In casserole dish, layer soup mixture, chicken and tortilla strips and top with shredded cheese. Bake in 350 degree oven 20 minutes until heated through and cheese is melted.

**Twenty-two Minute Cake**

- 2 cups sugar
- 2 cups flour
- 1/2 cup buttermilk
- 1/2 tsp. vanilla
- 1 stick butter
- 2 eggs
- 1/2 tsp. baking soda
- 1/2 cup shortening
- 3 1/2 Tbsps. cocoa
- 1/2 cup water

Mix flour and sugar in one bowl, then mix eggs, baking soda, vanilla and buttermilk in separate bowl. Put shortening, butter, water and cocoa in saucepan and melt together. Pour mixture in with flour and sugar and mix well. Then combine with buttermilk and egg mixture and pour into greased and floured cake pan. Bake 18 minutes then start your icing:

- Melt 1 stick butter and add:
- 3 1/2 Tbsps. cocoa
- 1/2 cup water
- 1 box powdered sugar
- 1 cup pecans, optional

Finish your cake cooking time as you mix your icing.

**El Pollo Chicken**

- Chicken, cut up
- 1 pkg. taco seasoning
- Dash of cumin
- 1/2 to 1 cup orange juice

Marinate chicken in this sauce overnight.

Put on grill and cook until tender, brushing occasionally with sauce.

Serve with Spanish rice, pinto beans, or with a salad.

**Shrimp Creole**

- 1/3 cup shortening
- 1/4 cup flour
- 1 lb. cleaned raw shrimp
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 2 Tbsps. chopped parsley
- 1/2 cup bell pepper
- 1 cup water
- 2 tsps. salt
- 2 bay leaves
- 1/2 tsp. red pepper - more if you like it hot
- 8 oz. can tomato sauce

Melt shortening in skillet over high heat. Gradually add flour and stir until light brown. Lower heat and add chopped vegetables and raw shrimp. Stir 2 to 3 minutes, then add water and remaining ingredients. Simmer, covered, 25 to 30 minutes. Serve over hot rice.

**Fruit Pizza**

- Pillsbury sugar cookie roll
- 1 - 8 oz. pkg. cream cheese
- 1 1/2 - 2 cups powdered sugar

Fruit: Strawberries, bananas, peaches, blueberries, kiwi. Any kind of fruit will do.

Take cookie dough and spread on pizza pan. Following cooking directions on package.

After cookie dough bakes, let it cool. Mix softened cream cheese and sugar until smooth. This mixture shouldn't be runny. Spread on baked cookie dough and top with sliced fruit. Chill or serve right away.

**Peppermint Ice Cream**

- 2 large cans Pet milk
- 1 lb. peppermint candy, crushed
- 2 drops vanilla extract
- 6 eggs
- 1/2 gal. homogenized milk

Put Pet milk and crushed peppermint in double boiler and cook over low heat until candy is dissolved.

In bowl, beat 6 eggs and add vanilla extract. Mix well.

After candy mixture has melted, pour into ice cream freezer with the egg mixture. Fill the freezer with 1/2 gal. homogenized milk. Freeze and enjoy!

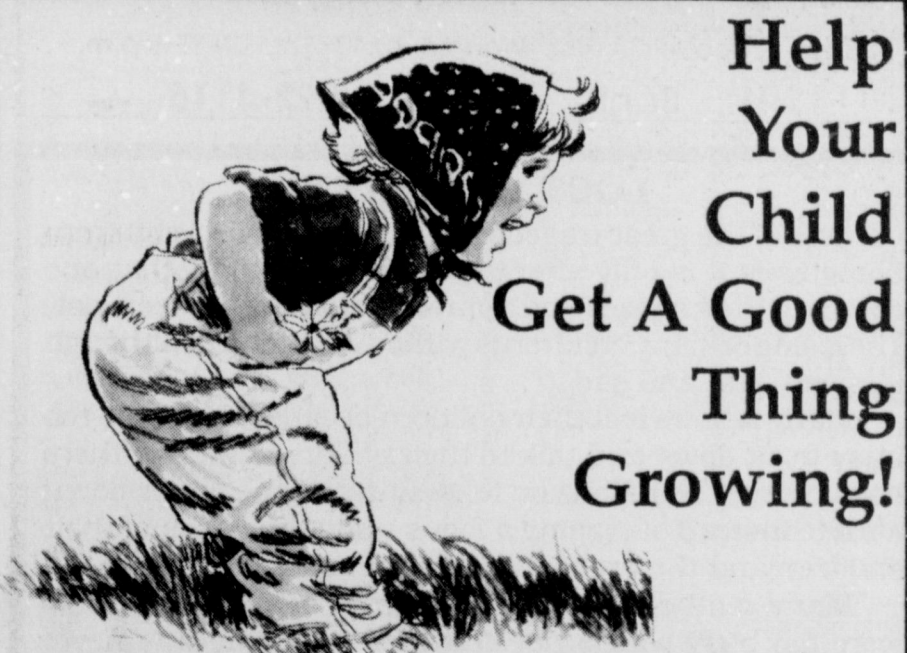

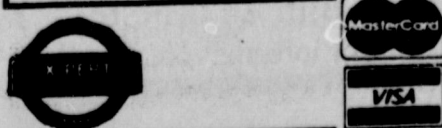

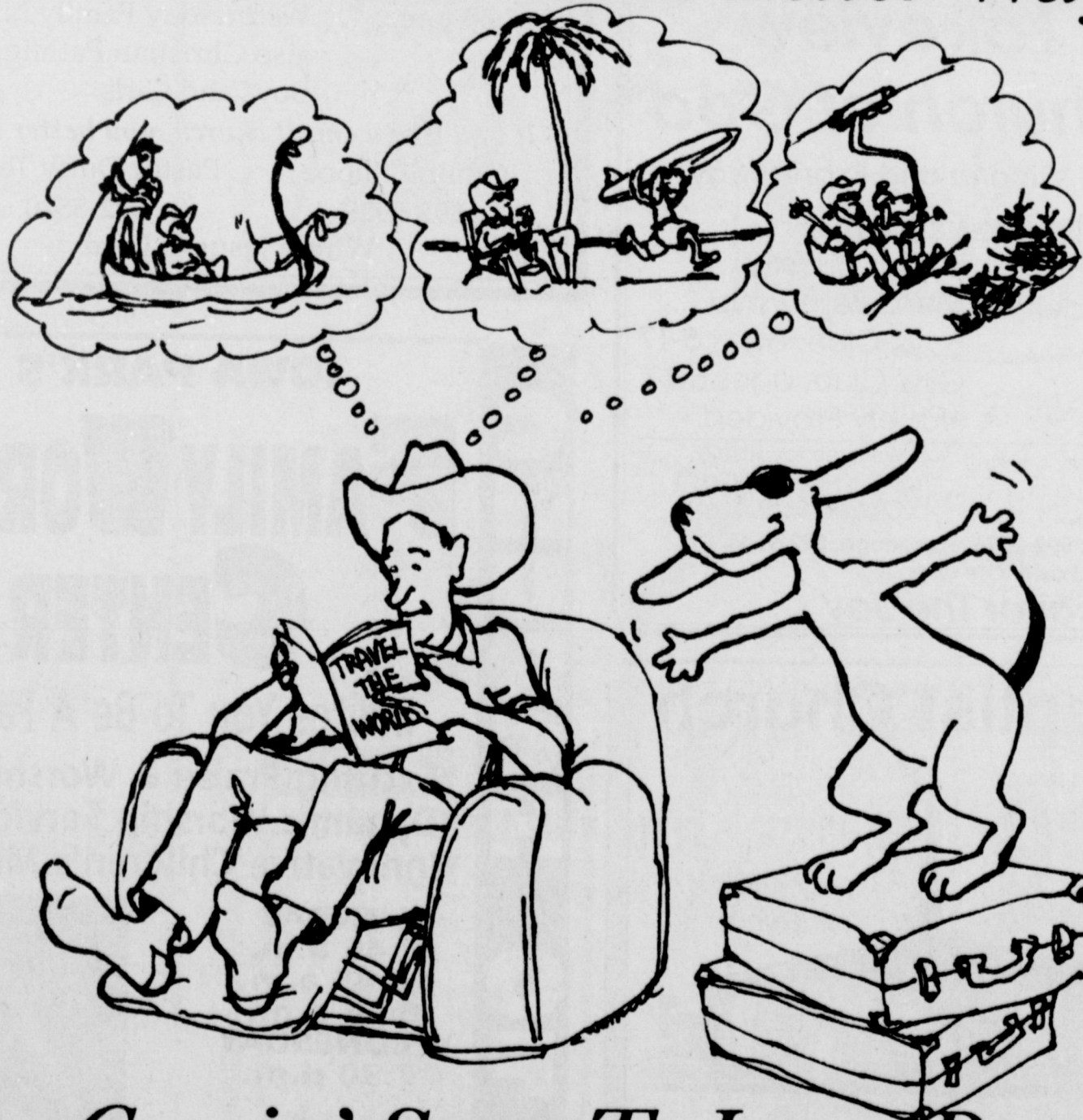

# Preachers protest comic book contents

Members of the Iowa Park Ministerial Alliance are attempting to influence the management of a book store in Wichita Falls to remove certain materials from its shelves.

A letter, signed by Rev. Karl Klaus, president, over the entire membership's listing, was sent May 6 to Hastings Books, Music and Video.

The letter stated:  
"We, the members of the Ministerial Alliance of Iowa Park would like to voice our opinion concerning the selling of extremely violent and near-pornographic material to children. "Comic" books, (if you can call them that), such as "Dinosaur's for Hire,"

"Sex Warriors," "The Trouble with Girls," etc. are not suitable for children. We understand that an adult has the right to purchase such material as you have the right to sell it. However, these books exploit women, condone heinous violence, and graphically depict scenes which are not for children.

"Therefore, we implore you to remove them from your shelves and other such material. If you insist on selling this material, at least set it apart in an 'Adult Only' section and control its sale to minors. This was brought to our attention by a parent with a twelve year old who purchases these books from you.

"We are sure you would agree that society has an awesome responsibility to instill values, ethics and morals in our children. We call on you to follow through with your responsibility to

society. Are exploitation, violence and deviant sexual behavior the type of values we want to pass on to our children? It is your decision, and your responsibility, as well as ours."



**LOST CHILDREN**  
One of the great tragedies of our time is lost children. Sometimes it is only after one loses something, that one comes to their senses and appreciates what has been lost. The losing of many children is without excitement although it is very real and sad.  
Many fathers lost their children because they were too busy to sit down and talk to their children. Many fathers have placed their focus on television and the professional athlete instead of placing a focus upon the needs of their children and the problems they encounter.

Too many mothers have turned over their responsibilities to the baby-sitters, school teachers, or school counselors. Usually when children follow a playmate's advice, deep trouble is the result physically, emotionally, and spiritually. This is how many children become lost. # Bondurant city's first female attorney

began working for Texas Comptroller Bob Bullock in Dallas and Austin.

Her goal was not yet reached so she entered Texas Tech at Lubbock to pursue her law degree. She rented a room from her Grandmother Bondurant in Lubbock three years.

"So many young people never have a chance to really get to know their grandparents," Alyce said, "so I feel very fortunate to have spent that much time with my grandmother."

Her grandmother was a Lubbock pioneer and Alyce learned a lot about the Llano Estacado of West Texas.

Since Alyce has been back in Iowa Park she has had an avid interest in First Step Inc., and volunteers her services there.

She occupies the office that had been Michael Dodd's. When she came back, he was leaving Iowa Park.

Dodd was also interested in family law and had an interest in the family violence program. So, he was at least partially responsible for Alyce getting involved with that program.

Alyce is an affiliate of the Texas Council on Family Violence on both the state and local levels. "I guess I'm just a bleeding heart," she commented, "but I want to help people who have family problems."

"I guess 1990 was my year," Alyce said. That year she received the "Volunteer of the Year Award" from the Texas Council on Family Violence and also from First Step, Inc. She laughed as she commented, "Oh yes, and at my 20th year class reunion I was voted the least changed since graduation."

Alyce serves as the judge appointed Ad Litem in child welfare and family law cases. She also represents the patients in Wichita Falls State Hospital in commitment proceedings. This is an interesting phase of her work, she says.

"I can't let myself become emotionally involved with the adoption cases, and there are real fine lines in divorces and child support cases," Alyce said.

She said at First Step there are some abused women and children who go back home as many as 10 times, trying to work things out, or just to accept what they know they will have to put up with. Or, eventually they will be killed or maybe commit suicide.

Alyce said so many times the women feel they deserve what they are getting...that in some way it is their fault they are being abused.

"Of course, secondary to that is that the children many times grow up to abuse their own wives and chil-

dren. Even those who have seen their mothers beaten to death think in some way that is just a 'part of it'," Alyce said.

Those who seek help there goes from one extreme to another, age-wise. She said you see the very young and you see many elderly women who are abused by their husbands, and even by their own children.

Alyce says they do have a few men to come to the shelter for help. "We can't keep them there, but we can put them in a hotel or motel and help them there."

Alyce had words of praise for First Step volunteers. She said they are a very organized group and have been taught how to relate to the people who are in these abusive situations.

She also commented, "We have an exceptional group of family law judges now."

Alyce believes the economics have had a lot to do with family situations. "I do not have many clients who have a lot of problems when they divorce, because most of them do not have a lot of property to have trouble over who will get it," she said.

"After all Texas has been broke ever since I started practicing law," she added.

Alyce has a sister, June Davison of Wichita Falls, who is a state parole officer. But, the real "light of her life" is her nephew, five-year-old Drew. He soon will have to share that devotion with a little brother or sister, and she doesn't know how that is going to work.

Alyce serves as chair for the Wichita County Child Welfare Board and is a member of the Regional Board of Girl Scouts of America. She also serves on the board of the Arthritis Foundation, and is currently serving

as secretary of the Wichita County Bar Association.

The young lawyer voiced her opinion on women in the work place.

She thinks women are being more accepted and that people are getting a different impression of women in responsible positions and are not thinking about them all as "feminists".

"I believe people are not thinking of women like they did a few years ago when the 'radicals' seemed to get all of the media attention, giving people the wrong impression of what most women wanted to accomplish," she said.

She added that she believes women are "coming into their own" in Wichita County as well as in other places, judging from the number of women who are now serving in political offices.

"I feel that I am very fair and honest in the way I practice law, and I always try to do the best I can for my clients, a trait I think I inherited from my parents, and was reinforced by Newt", Alyce said.
