Beautification program ideas are expressed here

Six division chairmen for the Iowa Park beautification project gave outlines of their plans for the year when the group met Thursday.

Sheri Kennedy, Education chairman, said her plans were expected to be put into full force when school opens in the fall.

Police Chief Ray Smock talked about city ordinances dealing with littering, junk vehicles, old appliances, and overgrown grass and weeds. It

was decided to begin a campaign to educate and inform the public on ordinances concerning these items. Smock is chairman of the Law Enforcement committee.

Iowa Park's annual Clean-Up Day in April was discussed by Susan Dillard, chairman of the Clean-Up Committee. A discussion was held on the possibility of having another clean-up day before the city landfill closes in August.

Kari Collins' plans for Public Awareness included articles in the newspaper, keeping a record of public service announcements and programs on radio and tv that deal with littering and recycling, and announcements at public events. Also, she suggested asking organizations to schedule programs on anti-littering and recycling, and members of the beautification committee speaking to different groups about the project. Another idea was to find sponsors to fund litter bags to distribute.

Ways to handle recycling and the benefits of composting were some of the items brought up by Marc Newman, co-chairman of the Solid Waste Management/Recycling committee. He suggested beginning an aggressive campaign to let citizens know that the landfill is closing and urge people to clean around their homes and dispose of their large items of junk now.

The possibility of having city trucks parked on different streets each night during the clean-up campaign was discussed. This would enable residents to discard of objects too large or unsuitable for the dumpsters.

Also, the forming of a group that would assist elderly or disabled citizens in cleaning their property and loading heavy articles into the trucks was suggested.

For the beautification part of the project, the group decided to focus, in the beginning, on Oscar Park and Gordan Lake. Chairman Steve Hammonds along with Sue Hatcher and Ray Dillard will present a plan for the area at the next meeting, which will be at 5 p.m., June 3, at the Recreational Activities Center.

Early voting polls open

Early voting was begun Wednesday in the June 5 U.S. Senatorial runoff election between Democrat Bob Krueger and Republican Kay Bailey Hutchinson.

The two emerged as the leading vote-getters in the May 1 election in which 24 candidates ran. Neither was able to garner 50 percent or more of the votes, however.

As in the case of the May 1 election, early voting in Iowa Park is at the Wichita County Agricultural Building, 220 West Park. Hours are 8 a.m. to 12-noon and 1-5 p.m.

Early voting will conclude June 1,

but all polls will be closed May 31, which is Memorial Day. The polls are also closed on weekends.

The same voting precinct polls that were used May 1 will be used June 5. They were: County Agriculture Building, Precinct 32; Faith Baptist Church, Precinct 33; West Wichita Co-op Building, Precinct 34, and Chaparral Baptist Assembly, Precinct 35.

Including early voting, there were 735 ballots cast in the May 1 election. Hutchinson received 184 votes, or 25 percent, in the four area precincts, and Krueger drew 91, or 12 percent.

Council to hear proposals

The city council is to hear requests for assistance in developing a housing area north of the city, when members meet Monday at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

According to the tentative meeting agenda, realtor Tommy Key is to make a public appearance, requesting the city provide utilities and streets for a new subdivision.

As part of the request, the city would be reimbursed for its investment as lots and houses were sold.

The development reportedly adjoins the north side of the city, East of

Johnson Road.

Key also is to ask the city to assume control and maintenance of a three-inch water main that serves Moorhouse Cattle Co. Ranch.

Four contracts for street work will be considered by the council, including valley gutter construction and concrete alley returns, crush run base material and asphalt paving.

Administrator Mike Price will report on setting of a budget workshop for next year, as well as briefing the council on various projects and their progress.

Chamber tourney planned

Registrations for the third-annual All Iowa Park Golf Tournament, sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce, is expected to pick up considerably before the June 1 deadline.

The tournament was among several projects discussed Monday, during the monthly board of directors' meeting.

Registration forms are available at the Chamber office. Participants must either reside or work full time in the Iowa Park school district. The fee is \$20.

Both male and female contestants will be vying for numerous prizes, including low scratch and handicap score, long driving and closest to the pin.

Directors voted to sponsor an on-

going city-wide beautification project, and a new booklet on the city, similar to the one published two years ago by Bankers Publishing Inc.

Also approved was a proposal to have the monthly meal catered, on a rotating basis, by food businesses with memberships in the Chamber.

President Larry Dutton told board members of his trip, with representatives of Wichita Falls and Burkburnett, to Lowrey AFB in Denver, to discuss the communities with personnel who will be transferred in the near future to Sheppard AFB.

Dutton reported that most of those with whom he visited expressed interest in moving to smaller communities, such as Iowa Park and Burkburnett.

Part of First Street to be closed

Weather permitting, city street workers will remove the existing pavement in the 900 block of North First, according to Mike Price, city administrator.

The sermon this year will be given by Rev. Karl Klaus, pastor of First United Methodist Church. He will follow a reading of the scripture by Rev. F.M. Small of the Church of God.

Invocation will be given by Rev. Greg Ammons, Faith Baptist Church pastor, and the benediction by Rev. Ole Olds, pastor of Lakeview Church of God.

The school choir will provide special music, under the direction of Debi Walters, who also will play the processional and recessional.

Commencement exercise will be held at 8 p.m. the following Friday, in Hawk Stadium.

Police investigating thefts

Police continue investigating two thefts that apparently took place Sunday night and were reported Monday. Both were in the same neighborhood.

An officer on patrol shortly before 4 a.m. in the 600 block of Manes noticed doors to the tool boxes on a pickup owned by Iowa Park Air Conditioning were standing open, and notified the owner, Russell Guyette.

Guyette later conducted an inventory which determined two bags of assorted tools were missing, valued at approximately \$1,200.

At 2:20 p.m. Monday, a resident in the 600 block of Coleman told police someone had taken a lawn mower from the garage, valued over \$200.

The investigating officer said the thief apparently "hand picked" the mower he wanted, because there were two other mowers right next to where the missing mower had stood.

Another theft, which apparently took place inside the city, was discovered when an abandoned car on a rural road was found Monday to have a sticker off a Barbour Trucking trailer.

The sticker is believed to have been removed from the license plate of a trailer parked in a Barbour facility.

That theft investigation is being carried out by the sheriff's department.

A "burglary of a vehicle" case was reported by telephone, which the caller said was still in progress.

The theft reportedly was soft drinks being taken from a Dr. Pepper delivery truck while it was parked at Wal-Mart.

Officers located three juveniles near Washington and Pacific, and detained them for a brief period, according to the police blotter.

At the request of the Burkburnett Police Dept., a vehicle was parked on East Highway near Hawthorne, and its occupants identified.

When notified of finding the vehicle, police in that city asked that the couple be detained until its owner could drive here to confiscate it.

The couple, a 20-year-old male and a 23-year-old female, explained to the Iowa Park officer that they were moving to Paris, Tex.

While they waited for the owner to arrive, the couple emptied their belongings, according to the blotter.

Two officers and members of the volunteer fire department, along with a game warden, responded to a call at 10:16 p.m. Saturday from a man who was concerned about an "elderly" friend who had been fishing all day at Lake Iowa Park, but had not returned home.

Boats were launched, and the fisherman was found, alive and well, at 10:54. There was no notation in the entry whether the man had caught his limit.

Sales tax receipts improving

Sales taxes collected through March of this calendar year have now generated \$94,894.66 for the City of Iowa Park's general revenue fund.

The state comptroller's office reports that Iowa Park continues to lead the other four Wichita County cities in percentage increase over 1992.

March sales produced \$25,836.23, a 4.66-percent increase over the same

month last year.

The increase allowed the city's increase over the same period in 1992 of 8.20 percent. Wichita Falls is a plus 7.36 and Burkburnett 5.95, but Electra is a minus 8.39 percent for the year.

Holiday is experiencing a 6.78-percent increase over 1992, having received \$29,478.19 thus far this year, according to the report from Austin.

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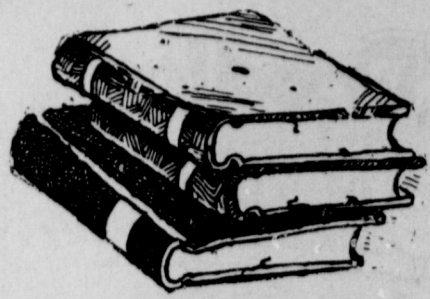

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As I See It

I hope you will pay close attention to a series of stories we intend to start about the middle of June, and absorb the information in the articles.

They can very possibly save you money you could use in ways to your own liking, rather than paying for something most of us have always taken for granted.

The city council still plans to close its landfill -- known to many as the trash dump -- the first of August.

Our articles will be encouraging you to clean up areas and things you don't want, so they can be taken to the landfill before it is closed.

Also, articles concerning how to recycle those things which can be put to use other than filling a hole in the ground will be presented.

In general, we'll be discussing ways to reduce what we have always just figured the trash man would haul away.

Yes, it'll be in part the project to make Iowa Park more attractive. But it also, as I said, will be geared to saving you money on your trash bill.

The landfill will be closed, because the city -- and that means you,

the taxpayers -- will not be able to pay the cost of maintaining our own landfill. Not with the new federal and state mandates regarding trash dumps.

Our landfill must be completely out of operation, including the pit filled and leveled, by Oct. 8.

Why? Well, right now the cost of operating the landfill, including the hauling and burying, is right at \$8 per ton. The city averages 16 tons per weekday.

Should we continue to operate our own landfill, the city's engineer calculates the cost of meeting all mandates will drive that cost up to \$112 per ton!

The council is trying to create a three-city landfill cooperative near Burkburnett, with that city and Vernon. Estimates are that the cost could be around \$20 per ton to dispose of trash, but don't hold me to that figure.

We checked with some people in Austin late Friday afternoon and it appears that the school issue is still up in the air.

One senator told us that his office had received 65 phone calls opposing the House version of consolidation and only one call against the Senate version of transferring business taxes to fund public schools.

Another said that the Senate proposal was receiving little opposition but many legislators were concerned about the legality of carving up a school district's tax base and assigning it to neighboring and poorer schools.

Andrews school district would be one of the carv-ees under the Senate plan to take away commercial, industrial and business property from those districts who have above \$280,000 assessed value per student.

If the Senate version prevails, it would appear to penalize all county-wide school districts who had the foresight and intestinal fortitude to consolidate years ago.

For example, in the twenties, Andrews county had six school districts: Whalen, Cobb, Shafter Lake, Florey, Dollarhide and Andrews. By 1936, only two school districts remained in the county, Florey and Andrews.

Florey had two teachers and 30 students. Andrews had nine teachers and 250 students. Florey was spending \$386 per student and Andrews was spending \$180 per student.

In December, 1938, the two schools were consolidated into the Andrews Independent School and made county-wide.

It was a good move at the time but if the Senate version prevails, perhaps the time has come to turn the clock back 55 years and un-consolidate.

Perhaps we could draw a line down the middle of the county and create East and West school districts. The West school district would have the high school and middle school and the East district would have all the elementary and kindergarten schools.

Each district could contract with

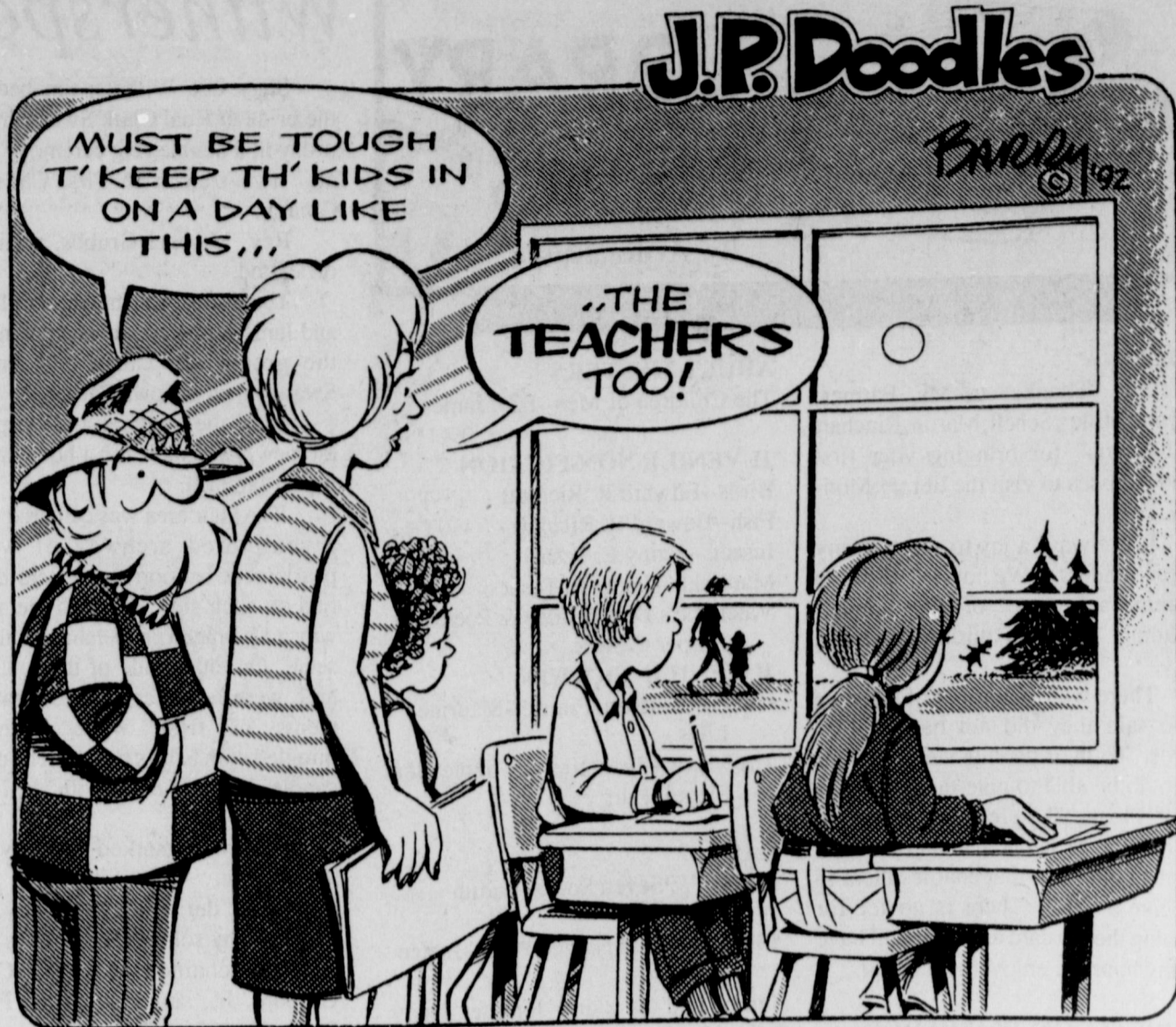
If we were to contract with the City of Wichita Falls, to accept trash we would haul, the predicted charge is said to be \$40 per ton. And that's with us picking it up at the homes, and hauling it to their landfill.

I'm told the Environmental Protection Agency of the federal government has set a goal four years into the future for all municipalities to cut their trash being buried by 40 percent.

The rest we are supposed to reuse, reduce or recycle.

Anyway, we're going to attempt to find everything we can which will assist us and our fellow Iowa Parkans to reduce our trash load, through our series of articles this summer.

They hopefully will help each of us save money, and if they help make Iowa Park a more attractive place in which to live and visit, they will serve a dual purpose.

the other to provide grades, classes, and transportation it didn't have.

Two districts in the county would reduce the taxable value of each to about \$250,000 per student -- but we would keep Andrews tax money for Andrews students.

It makes about as much sense as any of the other proposals floating around Austin.

Incidentally, John Sharp, state comptroller, gave the legislators some good news this week. He projected that for the next two year budget, state revenues would be \$600 million more than projected.

But don't get your hopes up -- about half of that had already been assumed in the projected budget.

Despite his claim that he is interested in job creation, President Bill Clinton is doing his dead level best to shrink the number of jobs in this nation. Two proposals have recently surfaced that are proven job killers.

The first is the tried and failed policy of the Democrats to increase the

minimum wage. Statistics have proven that each time the minimum wage is raised the number of entry level jobs fall and teen unemployment increases.

There is no mystery in those results. Employers simply cannot afford to pay more for unskilled labor. What politicians cannot fathom is that money used to pay salaries in private business comes from sales of products or services, not from an unending stream of tax funds.

In the very competitive environment of today the key to remaining in business is to maximize revenues and decrease costs to keep product prices competitive. If employers are forced to pay higher wages they will react by finding ways to eliminate those jobs.

Over the past 20 years we have seen such entry occupations as gas station attendant, movie usher, teenage custodian and others pass by the wayside as the minimum wage climbed. Today we are a largely self service economy because the high cost of labor has forced a change in the way products and services are delivered.

The second proposal that will kill jobs is found in the outline of the Hillary Clinton health plan. The plan

contains a portion that would place an additional one to two percent payroll tax on all employers to finance the plan.

That tax would be in addition to the 15.3 percent tax currently paid by employers and employees. It would increase the payroll tax by 13 percent. To the employer that translates to a higher cost of labor.

A general rule is that if you tax anything you get less of it. That rule would apply to jobs.

Most employers would not immediately fire an employee because the payroll tax increased. But if that position is vacated, most employers would think long and hard about re-filling the job. Other employees would be reshuffled and the work absorbed somewhere else in the company. The net effect would be a reduction in employment because of the increased payroll tax.

For an administration that used job creation as its entree to the White House, President Clinton is doing his best to stop job creation in this country. He needs to look no further than the immediate past to realize that increasing the minimum wage and adding to

the payroll tax burden on business is a sure way to kill, rather than create, jobs.

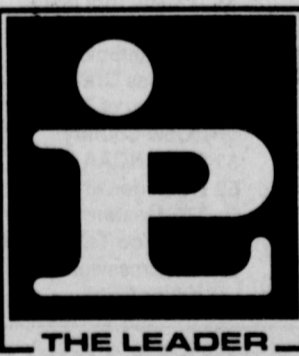

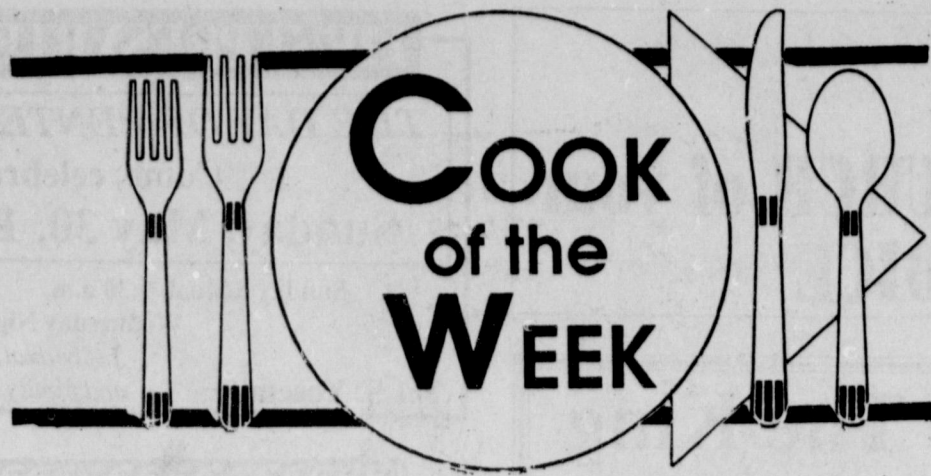

Mississippi Mud

- 4 eggs
- 2 cups sugar
- 1 cup butter, melted
- 1/2 cup flour
- 1/3 cup cocoa
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 1 cup coconut
- 2 cups walnuts
- 1 - 7 oz. jar marshmallow creme

Combine eggs and sugar; mix at high speed for 5 minutes. Combine rest of ingredients except marshmallow creme in a separate bowl. Combine the mixture and mix well. Don't



grease pan, but spray small amount of Pam on bottom of 9x13 pan. Bake 30 minutes at 350 degrees. Spread marshmallow creme over cake as soon as you remove it from the oven. Frosting is optional. Let set 2 hours, then cut into small pieces.

Frosting

- 1/2 cup melted butter
- 1/2 cup cocoa
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 6 Tbsps. milk
- 4 cups powdered sugar
- 2 cups nuts

Mix all together and spread over cake.

Make-Ahead Mexican Casserole

- 1 lb. ground beef
- 1 large onion, chopped
- 1 - 10 oz. can tomatoes with green chiles
- 1 - can cream of mushroom soup, undiluted
- 1 can cream of chicken soup, undiluted
- 1 - 10 oz. can enchilada sauce
- 2 dozen corn tortillas, cut into eighths
- 2 cups shredded Cheddar cheese

Saute ground beef and onion until lightly browned, stirring to crumble meat.

Stir in remaining ingredients except tortillas and cheese. Alternately layer meat mixture and tortillas, beginning and ending with meat mixture, in a greased 13x9x2-inch pan. Sprinkle with cheese. Cover with aluminum foil and seal securely. Label and freeze.

Dixie Pork Chops

- 8 pork chops
- 3 Tbsps. shortening
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. sage
- 4 apples, cored and cut in rings
- 1/4 cup brown sugar
- 2 Tbsps. flour
- 1 to 1 1/4 cup hot water
- Few drops vinegar

Brown chops in hot shortening. Remove chops to baking dish; sprinkle with salt and sage. Top with apple rings and sprinkle with sugar. Combine flour, water and vinegar with fat in skillet; cook until thick. Pour over chops. Bake uncovered at 350 degrees 1 hour.

"Zips" Chocolate Pie

- 1 cup sugar
- 5 Tbsps. flour
- 4 Tbsps. cocoa
- Dash salt
- 2 cups milk
- 3 egg yolks
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 2 Tbsps. margarine

Mix sugar, flour, cocoa, and salt. Stir in 2 cups milk; add egg yolks. Cook until warm and add margarine. Cook on medium high until thick. Remove from heat and add vanilla. Pour into baked pie crust and chill 3 hours.

Garden Club tours Charlie greenhouse

During a field trip to Charlie Friday morning, members of the Iowa Park Garden Club toured the Cooper Young Greenhouses.

Joyce Young conducted the tour of the six greenhouses where specially lettuce and water cress are grown using hydroponics.

This method consisted of growing the plants in individual holes, spaced

evenly apart, in long plastic pipes. The plants are fed by recirculating water and fertilizer which runs through the pipes. Mrs. Young said that the greenhouses are environmentally safe, using ladybugs instead of herbicides to take care of the insects.

The Young Greenhouses, which have been in business fifteen years, sell only wholesale to the Dallas and Houston areas. The lettuce is picked

three times a week and trucked to the Dallas area.

After the tour, the group had lunch in Burkburnett. They were met there by Cindy and Ryan Geer, daughter and grandson of club member Bonnie Illingworth.

The next meeting of the club will be May 28, at the Women's Forum in Wichita Falls, where the new officers will be installed.

Sherry Wood has the keys

Although she has served as assistant director four years, Sherry Wood began her first full week Monday as new full time director of the Iowa Park Friendly Door Senior Citizens Center.

Sherry is taking the position vacated last week by Myrna Robinson who had been director of the Center 16 years.

"I will not try to fill Myrna's shoes, I will just do the best that I can to continue the activities and be here for our members whenever they need me," Sherry said.

Sherry may have been a little nervous about taking over the director's job. She told her husband, Greg, she had dreamed she came to work and that no one came for games and lunch....but when she arrived her first day, she knew it was just a dream when 49 showed up by noon.

Both Sherry and Greg are natives of Abilene. Shortly after she graduated high school there, they were married and she began working.

They lived in Snyder five years before moving to Iowa Park eight years ago. Greg is employed by Scurlock Permian Oil Transport.

Sherry was manager of a sandwich shop while living in Snyder, and worked at school cafeterias in both Abilene and Snyder.

After moving to Iowa Park Sherry worked as a substitute at the school cafeterias and worked for Tommy Key when he owned a dry cleaning shop. Just before she began working as assistant director at the Friendly Door she was meat cook at Bradford Elementary School cafeteria and was director of the First Baptist Church Nursery.

"I always liked to help people," Sherry said, "and since I was a little girl I thought I would like to be a nurse." Since that goal never materialized, Sherry commented, "This is the next best thing to being a nurse, because I am getting to help people."

Greg is a volunteer fireman and Sherry is a member of the Ladies Auxiliary of the Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Department, which she served as president last year.

The Auxiliary has fund-raising events to help purchase equipment for the fire department. The members provide water and food for the firemen when they have a fire of long duration, and have other activities to assist the firemen and the department.

This year Sherry is serving as third vice president of the Wichita, Archer and Clay Firemen and Fire Marshals Association.

The Woods have three daughters, Randa, 18, Valarie, 12, and Whitney, 6.

For a number of years Sherry was active in Girl Scouts. She was a member of Girl Scouts and her mother was her leader. Later, Sherry was a leader five years when her own daughter, Randa, was in Scouts. In fact Sherry was presented the Daisy Award, the top volunteer award, by the organization in Snyder.

Greg, Sherry and the girls are members of First Baptist Church. Sherry is a member of the Hospitality Committee.

Since Sherry's job had become more demanding, she and her husband have not had much time to pursue their hobby of wood crafts, but they work with them any time they can.

Sherry also does ceramics and has her own kiln. "My grandmother got me started in ceramics, and I love

to do that when I can find time," Sherry said.

The Friendly Door has conducted its membership drive this month. Presently there are 60 renewal and new memberships. Dues, which amount to a donation, are only \$2.

A top priority for the Friendly Door Senior Citizens Center currently is to acquire a new building for their meetings and activities.

A building fund account has been established at State National Bank. Anyone who makes as much as a \$100 contribution toward the building will have their name placed on a permanent plaque to be placed in the new building.

"Some people make donations to the building fund as a memorial for someone, to honor an individual, or just to help the senior citizens get a place to meet," Sherry said.

"More room is needed for meeting and this year work must begin toward meeting the requirements of the American Disabilities Act. We need to show proof that something is being done in order for us to keep meeting here," Sherry added.

The first meeting of the Friendly Door 16 years ago was in First United Methodist Church. Later they moved to the present site of the Evening Lions Club Building which they rent for \$1 a month, plus utilities.

Because of the historical value of the building where the Friendly Door now meets, the Evening Lions do not wish to make major changes which would eventually have to be made to comply with ADA requirements. Some changes are really needed now because of some who are members of Senior Citizens.

The building, commonly known as the Tanner Building since shortly after the turn of the century, is one of the most historical in Iowa Park.

The board of directors of the Friendly Door Senior Citizens is working with Dee Decker, director of North Texas Center for Nonprofit

Management, toward obtaining a grant to help fund a new building.

The Friendly Door is funded by United Way and Nortex Regional Planning Commission.

The Center fills a need for seniors in several ways. In addition to providing a place for senior citizens to meet where lunch is prepared for them and a place where they can meet with their peers, it provides other amenities helpful to seniors.

There are 45 who regularly attend the luncheons each day and approximately 25 meals are delivered to homebound seniors each day by volunteer groups.

Center personnel provide transportation for members to and from the Center if they need it. They also take the seniors grocery shopping once a week and take them to their doctor or dentist.

Once a month each member has a blood pressure and blood sugar check free of charge by Park Home Health. They receive free manicures and pedicures by Etoy Chapman.

The second Monday of each month, those having birthdays that month are treated to a birthday lunch, birthday cake, provided free by Kathy Hicks, and a potted plant from Iowa Park Florist. Names of the birthday people are drawn to see who gets to take the plant home.

Special programs are provided for the seniors, by local ministers and musicians. Also personnel at Tom Burnett Memorial Library show films each month.

Some of the seniors have gone to Kidwell school this year to conduct a special story hour for students, which has worked well for both seniors and students.

Four seminars are planned this summer for the Friendly Door by Vernon Regional Junior College in corporation with Nortex Regional Planning Center.
