## Facts About Cholesterol

## A high level of cholesterol in the blood, over 240 mg/dl (milligrams

 per deciliter), could indicate the presence of heart disease.A cholesterol level of 200 to $\mathbf{2 4 0}$ is borderline for risk of heart disease Half of U.S. adults have cholesterol levels of 200 or greater.
If your blood cholesterol level is 200 or less, you can assiume that as far as cholesterol goes, you are at a low risk for heart disease. Cholesterol contains HDLs and LDLs. HDLs are considered "good." It is believed that they take cholesterol away from the arteries and back to the liver where it can be removed. LDLs are "bad" because they may deposit cholesterol on artery walls.
Cholesterol is an odorless, tasteless, white, powdery substance present in all foods of animal origin
The three major dietary influences on blood cholesterol are saturated fat, cholesterol, and polyunsaturated fat. Saturated fat and cholestero raise the blood cholesterol level. Polyunsaturated fats lower it

- A low-fat diet can lower cholesterol levels. To cut down on saturated fat and cholesterol, eat more fruits, vegetables, grains, and starches
Eat oniy moderate portions of fish, poultry, and lean meats. Remove skin from chicken before eating and fat from meats before cooking. Avoid organ meats, sausage, bacon, and processed luncheon meats.
Use low- or non-fat dairy products. Eat fewer than three eggs a week. Avoid commercial baked goods and fried foods.
With you doctor's permission, exercise. Aerobic exercise, in particular, has been shown to lower blood cholesterol levels significantly
Maintain a normal body weight and quit smoking
Your cholesterol can be easily measured from a small amount of blood. Follow you doctor's advice. on how often to have it checked.

## failed to pass all or part of the test this

The figure is less than one percent here, according to Principal Richard Davis.
With With slightly more than 100 members of the senior class, only one did not pass all the elements of the test. Over the state, 13,377 students could not pass the reading, writing and math exam portions of the test. And because the test is peingent last year, In Dallas schools, roughly 10 percent of this year's class failed. Davis says he fears next year and
others in the future, also because more others in the future, also because more
and more tougher changes are being added annually to the test.

While Davis appreciates the fact that the local schools are well below the state's average of failures, he is among the first to say "even one is too many."

## Perkins D.A.R.E.'s to keep kids off drugs

By MYRNA SMITH
Attractive, vivacious, and looking sharp in her uniform of the lowa isn't in that uniform to patrol the streets looking for law offenders. Rather, she is D.A.R.E.-ing to keep kids off drugs, and to prevent criminal acts.

Laura is D.A.R.E. Officer/Crime Prevention for the Iowa Park Police Deparment.

She has just completed teaching a 17 -week D.A.R.E. session to fifth School. More than 160 students have been involved in the program. been involved in the program. Abuse Resistance Education sessions, Laura took an 80 -hour, two week intensive training course at Kerrville. This week she is in Dallas where she is taking a one week 40 -hour course in Crime Prevention at the Dallas Police Academy

Laura began working for the Poa part time dispatcher, later going into full time and then to communications supervisor.

She has never been on patrol. She says, "I have always perferred public relations."

The Wichita Falls native has lived in lowa Park 12 years and is married to Jackie Perkins. He is an employee of Associated Milk Producers in Windthorst. They have two children, a son Jacob, 12, and a daughter,
Lynette, 8 . Lynette, 8.
"Last year when DeeDee (Alderson) was gning to quit teach-
ing the D.A.R.E progran, was beginning to get tirus of dispalching. I wanted to do more, so 1 spplis $d$ for her job," Laura said.

She admitted another factor that sparked her interest to teach the program was that Jacob would be in the fifth grade the current school year.
The Perkins family is active in Floral Heights United Methodis Church in Wichita Falls. Their chil-
dren are involved in sports, and dren are involved in sports, and Laura also is active in the Student Outreach Program sponsored by the Iowa Park RAC
Laura loves the job she is doing, just like she thought she would. When she returned from her the study Kerrville, which included the study of the D.A.R.E. curriculum, classroom management and public speaking, she began planning for the classes
need.
"Actually," Laura said, "it was
Actually," Laura said, "it was
more of a 'wish list' because I felt sure more of a 'wish list because I felt sure

"I believe incentives are extremely important for children, so I T-shirts, workbooks, diplomas, rulers, bookmarks, bumper stickers and ID bracelets."
In a report Laura gave at a recent City Council meeting, she told council members she was given a check for approximately $\$ 1,100$ from the schoo board's Drug Education Fund. The D.A.R.E. education progran is unique in that it is laught in public schools by a Angeles Unified School District Angeles Unified School District and
is now nationwide
D.A.R.E. program training for police officers is provided by the school district in conjunction with the police department.

Lessons for the program are structured by the national organiza tion. The curriculum teaches students the skills necessary to resist drug experimentation.
Laura explained that the officer must follow guidelines on how to present the curriculum, or the pro-
gram cannot be taught. A classroom gram cannot be taught. A classroom
teacher must stay in the room with the
D.A.R.E. officer, a requirement of the state.

Although there is $\operatorname{DAB}$ program curriculum designed for K through fourth grades, it was thought best at this time to target fifth grade students, nearer the time they will be facing peer pressure in the higher grades, Laura said.

During the school year she spent about eight hours each week in the classroom during the Health and Sc ence class periods.

She also spent time with the students in the cafeteria and on the playgound, helping to encourage a
friendly relationsinip between the tudents and the police depariment. Students also are allowed to dis cuss their feelings with their peers and there is a relations'ip of trus: built with the officer
She said,"Drug peddling and the number on drugs is not as bad here as places with a larger population, but the kids WILL BE approached to try drugs, not MIGHT BE. Laura added "I believe I can
safely say there is no safely say there is no drug use here among fifth grade students." Those familiar with the D.A.R.E
program seem to agree with the LA

The D.A.R.E. officer is adamant
on the subject of building self-esteem. She says it is one of the biggest issue with children and drug abuse as well as to keep them from joining gangs. need a support system working for neem," Laura said

In discussing
"n discussing the "support sys easier for a child to be a confident and assertive person when one feels good about himself.
D When it is all wrapped up, D.A.R.E. teaches that everyone need affection, a feeling of belonging and recognition.
"The sense of beinn ging is simply the need to be reated with dig nity, regardless of differences in
