Comeback Hawks meet Graham for region title

The Cardiac Kids will be gunning for a ticket to the state tournament in Austin, when they take on Graham's Steers Saturday in Fort Worth.

Iowa Park and Graham, Dist. 4-AAA runner-up and champion, respectively, will meet in the Region One final at 1 p.m. at Goldstein Stadium.

The Hawks earned their nickname by staging their second and third comeback victories Saturday and again Tuesday, to advance into the final.

After defeating Denver City 7-6 in their 11-inning bi-district game at Abilene, they traveled to Lubbock Saturday where they knocked off pre-

viously undefeated Canyon by another 7-6 margin, and Tuesday at Fort Worth they went nine innings before eliminating Abilene Wylie 9-7.

All three contests were drama-packed, leaving their faithful fans with just enough energy to give hoarse congratulations and hearty handshakes.

This will be the fourth meeting

this season between Iowa Park and Graham, a club that made it all the way to the state tourney last year.

Under first-year head coach David Fuhrman, the Hawks lost 10-4 to the Steers in the Wichita Falls tournament. Both their district games were much closer, however, with the Steers edging the Hawks 9-7 and 4-3.

Graham, playing in the same Fort Worth stadium after the Hawks' game Tuesday, also had to do some rallying before earning a 10-6 win over Southlake Carroll, to advance into Saturday's big contest.

A win Saturday would send the Hawks into the state tournament for only the second time in the school's history. It would mean a repeat of the 1975 Iowa Park club.

IOWA PARK 9, WYLIE 7

Tuesday's regional semi-final win over Abilene Wylie was a different kind of rally than their previous two playoff contests.

Wylie jumped out to a 1-0 lead in the first inning. Iowa Park came back in the top of the second with two runs, but their opponents evened the score in

the bottom of that frame.

The Hawks appeared to take command in the third with three runs, hold Wylie scoreless in the third, and then jumped out to a 7-2 lead in the top of the fourth.

But from that point on, the Hawks were fighting for their lives.

Wylie scored twice in the bottom of the fourth, tacked on the fifth run in the fifth, and tied the score with two runs in the seventh, forcing the game into extra innings.

The high drama of the contest consisted of Iowa Park being forced to use four different pitchers, holding Wylie scoreless in the eighth with a triple play, and a game-saving diving catch in the bottom of the ninth.

Chad Thompson was Iowa Park's starting pitcher. Before being relieved in the fourth inning, he had struck out two batters and walked one, but gave up three singles, two doubles and the game's only home run.

Brown walked four, struck out two, but gave up three singles, two of them leading off the seventh inning, before he was replaced on the mound by Jason Young.

Young worked only two batters, but the first of those drove in the tying score with a single. He walked the other on four straight pitches.

That's when Coach Fuhrman called on his ace hurler, Ralph Dillard, who had worked 17 complete innings in the previous two games, including throwing 117 pitches against Canyon.

When Dillard took the mound, the score was tied, it was the bottom of the seventh inning, runners were on first and second, and no outs.

That's when the triple play was made.

The batter smashed a screaming line shot about head high directly at second baseman Patric Kennedy. At the sound of the bat making contact, both Wylie runners broke to run.

Kennedy calmly snagged the ball one-handed, tossed it to shortstop Tony Lozipone, who alertly had started toward second base, and he fired the ball to first baseman Scott McNeely for the triple, and retire the side.

After taking the lead once again in the top of the ninth, Dillard struck out the first Wylie batter, but walked the next, and then gave up a single.

The runner on first was picked off by alert catcher Clint Scobee, who saw the Wylie player taking his time touching the bag between pitches, and fired the ball to McNeely for the putout.

It was then that Brown had the opportunity to make up for his time on the mound. The left fielder made a spectacular diving catch -- almost exactly the same game-ending type catch as Thompson had against Canyon -- to send the fifth-ranked Wylie club home for the year.

Brown was pounced upon by his teammates in a congratulatory dogpile.

In his brief time on the mound, Dillard had struck out three, walked

two and allowed a single.

Third baseman Hollis finished as the Hawks' leading hitter for the contest, collecting three hits, including a double, in four official at-bats.

IOWA PARK 7, CANYON 6

The Hawks were trailing 5-0 going into the bottom sixth inning Saturday against the top-ranked Eagles, but they exploded with all seven of their runs, and then held on to secure their 16th victory of the season.

In attacking the Panhandle's first-ever high school baseball team to complete the season undefeated, Iowa Park relied on outstanding pitching and defensive play, to win the area contest.

Dillard, after a shaky first inning in which he issued three walks and a single that gave the Eagles a 4-0 lead, went the distance. He struck out seven batters, gave up an additional two walks for a total of four, and allowed five hits, all singles except a triple.

The defensive-minded Hawks were credited with a pair of double plays, one in the third and the other in the fifth.

The first double was a grounder to Lozipone who forced out a runner on first and threw to McNeely for the other out.

In the fifth inning, Brown caught a fly deep in left field, and then threw out a runner who had broken toward second base and was trying to get back to first, but didn't make it.

Canyon had a rally working in the top of the seventh, and it almost worked.

The first Eagle singled safely and later scored Canyon's sixth run. Two other batters reached bases safely after one out, before Brown caught a fly in left field for the second.

Then, with an opportunity to either tie or go ahead, a short "blooper" into shallow right center field looked like it would drop in safely. But Thompson made a diving catch just before the ball touched the turf, ending the game.

He said later that his teammates almost killed him when they piled on dogpile fashion to congratulate him for securing the victory that sent the proud Eagles home with a 28-1 season record.

That big sixth-inning rally started off with Kennedy walking. McNeely followed with a fly to the left fielder.

Then Maxwell singled into right field, and Scobee banged a fast roller through the infield to left field, sending Kennedy home.

Hollis followed with a two-run single into center field that brought Maxwell and Scobee to home plate.

Canyon changed pitchers, but the substitute issued a single to Dillard, who hit the ball over shortstop into left field. Jason Miller reached first base on a walk.

Thompson's single into center field scored both Hollis and Dillard.

Then Lozipone sacrificed a punt that allowed Thompson to score.

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HAWKS ACCEPT CONGRATULATIONS FROM FANS AFTER BEATING ABILENE WYLIE

School board facing lengthy agenda Monday

Iowa Park school trustees are gearing for a long night Monday. Their 7:30 p.m. meeting, to be held in the junior high library, has 29 items on the tentative agenda.

And four of those 29 items have sub-topics.

Under the listing of "personnel," which includes accepting resignations and employing new personnel, trustees are to consider placing additional teachers on Levels Two and Three of the career ladder, as well as increasing the number of work days for the school nurse from 129 to 140.

Bids will be considered for the construction of a special education building at the high school campus.

Other bid items to be considered are athletic medical supplies, girls' basketball supplies, and removal of asbestos from the old boiler room in the junior high gymnasium.

Also on the agenda are:

- * administer oath of office to the two trustees re-elected in May, followed by election of officers;
- * presentation of Texas Safety Honor Roll certificates;
- * recognize patrons wishing to address the board;

* report on the Academic Excellence Indicator System for 1992-93;

* report on Texas Assessment of Academic Skills scores;

* report from district site based decision making committee;

* hear campus committee reports;

* public hearing on Chapter Two expenditures;

* consider a request by Midwestern State Univ. to play a football game Oct. 2 in Hawk Stadium;

* consider a request by Tammy Gann to use high school auditorium for a children's dance recital Aug. 28;

* consider a revised school calendar for 1993-94 for staff development days;

* consider interlocal agreement for education of City View District students in grades 9-12;

* consider board policies update 43;

* consider a plan for overnight out-of-town trips for athletic contests;

* superintendent's report on final enrollment and attendance for 1992-93 year, and setting dates to inspect buildings as well as a review of the proposed 1993-94 budget;

* appointment of the superintendent to the Regional Advisory Committee;

* reports on taxes, summer maintenance, transportation and cafeteria.

Senatorial runoff election Saturday

Voters will return to the polls Saturday for the second time in slightly more than a month, to decide who will serve as a U.S. Senator from Texas.

The only issue on the ballot is the runoff between Republican Kay Kailey Hutchinson and Democrat Robert (Bob) Krueger.

The four area polls will be the same as were used in the May 1 election: Precinct 32, Wichita County Agriculture Building, 220 West Park; Precinct 33, Faith Baptist Church, 411 South Wall; Precinct 34, West Wichita Coop Building at Valley View, and Precinct 35, Chaparral Baptist Assembly, 3784 Church Camp Road.

All polls are to open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m.

Neither Hutchinson nor Krueger were able to attract half or more of the state-wide votes in the first election. They were among 24 candidates who wanted to complete the term to which Lloyd Bentsen was elected.

After Bentsen resigned to accept appointment as Secretary of the Treasury, Gov. Ann Richards appointed Krueger as interim senator in January, to serve until the special election was held.

Of the 735 votes cast in the four area election precincts, Hutchinson was the favorite, receiving 184 votes, or 25 percent.

Krueger, who attracted only 12 percent of the area votes with 91, actually was fourth choice in the four boxes.

How to find the stadium

For Hawk fans who are planning to see Saturday's regional championship game between Iowa Park and Graham, several have suggested that you plan to arrive well ahead of the 1 o'clock starting time, because of limited seating capacity in Goldstein Stadium.

There were at least as many fans standing on the sidelines to watch Tuesday's game between Graham and Southlake Carroll, as the 1,700-seat stands could hold, according to Susan Dillard.

Adding to the crowd, Iowa Park schools will furnish a bus for students currently enrolled here.

Students will need money for their ticket to the game and two meals. The bus will leave at 8:30 a.m. from the student parking lot, and return approximately four hours after the game's end.

Goldstein Stadium is on the campus of Tarrant County Junior College, in the southeast part of that city.

Fans can reach it by traveling either on US 35 or through Jacksboro. On the Jacksboro route, they should take the Fort Worth Loop to the South, and on US 35 they should exit on I-20 East.

Get off I-20 or the Loop at Wichita Street, turn north under the expressway, and the stadium is about five blocks to the Northwest, behind a football stadium.

Finnell has good voting record

According to two publications this week, State Rep. Charles Finnell of Holliday hasn't missed a vote in the legislature since the killer tornado of 1979 devastated Wilbarger, Wichita and Clay counties in Finnell's northwest Texas legislative district.

In the current 73rd regular session, only Finnell and Rep. Bob Hunter of Abilene have 100 percent voting records, according to statistics released by the Texas Legislative Service and reported in Sunday's Houston Chronicle this week.

At least one legislator from Dallas County has been absent more than half the time this session, according to the report. Several state representatives and senators have been absent more than 25 percent of the time.

This session Rep. Finnell purposely limited his legislation to nine bills in order to focus concentration on the vital issue of school finance. Dist. Judge Scott McCown has threatened to cut off all state funding to public schools on Tuesday, June 1 if the issue is not resolved.

"The school finance plan must be fair and equitable, constitutional and be approved by the court this week," Finnell said. "I feel the responsibility to be present and voting for my constituents at all times."

The only time Rep. Finnell missed a legislative vote was when the mas-

sive tornado in his district killed 49 people and caused millions of dollars in property damage. He and then Gov. Bill Clements, flew to the disaster area to assess damage and to facilitate relief to the many victims of the storms.

The Evening Lioness Club concluded activities for the current club year Thursday with a covered dish meal in the Lions building.

Highlight of the meeting was one of the most outstanding installation services in the club's history. Herb Adcock offered the invocation before the meal.

Kenneth Via, installing officer, used roses and their characteristics for the theme of the ceremony. He presented each officer with a prized fresh rose from the beautiful rose display at the home of his parents-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Glen Miller.

In his opening remarks, he said the rose is probably the most fabled and favorite flower in the world, certainly in the western world. He added there is nothing quite like it for beauty, elegance, color or fragrance.

As Via installed Mrs. Herman Daymude, Lioness tamer, he reminded her that a good rose bush will cost more than annuals that last for only one season, whereas, if properly cared for, the rose bush will last for years.

He told her that it behooved her to be conscientious about the club's property and paraphernalia, and to distribute bulletins or literature as needed.

Mrs. T.C. Berry, tail twister, was reminded that today's roses are the result of centuries of resuffling the combination of both nature and men, and the rose is now the most popular flower.

He continued by saying that 50 million families now have at least one rose bush. Via challenged Mrs. Berry as the greeter of the club to be responsible for promoting good fellowship and harmony.

As he installed Mrs. V.I. Woodfin, treasurer, Via gave some interesting historical facts about the rose.

These included supervising the rose fragrance and creating the first rose potpourri by the pharaohs of Egypt; bottling rose oil by the Persians; the using of rose water as a main cooking flavoring by the Persians;

the using of rose water as a cooking flavoring by the Arabs; and the use of it in Turkey to replace catsup, salt and pepper.

He reminded Mrs. Woodfin that the monetary value varies with its use and that she must deal with the supply and demands of the club's money by keeping accurate records and books, make deposits and pay bills.

Via gave more of the early history of the rose as he installed Mrs. Herb Adcock secretary. He mentioned that roses were used in the design of Babylon's Hanging Gardens; also that they came from Persia to western civilization; the Greeks cultivated rose gardens, and the Romans spread plantings throughout the reaches of their empire.

He reminded Mrs. Adcock that "today's empires" are the domain of hybridizers, who use a lot of patience and paper work just as her position as secretary does as she maintains the roster, keeps attendance records and handles correspondence for the club.

The installing officer told Mrs. Don Jagger, who took office as vice president, that roses are subjected to testing by the American Rose Society, and that a rating of 10.0 is the highest rating any rose can achieve.

He went on to say that the surprising result of the testing of 1,300 roses a few years ago was that only 14 rated 9-0, outstanding, but not perfect. He reminded her that she should strive for programs which exemplify the club's motto "we serve".

It is a rare occasion when one who is installing new officers has the privilege of installing his wife. Glenna (Mrs. Kenneth) Via was installed president of the club.

He stressed how the roses have a built-in determination to live, and this "will to live" accounts for their ability to grow wild in all temperate regions, under a great variety of soil and climatic conditions.

Via said that the same determination is a necessary ingredient of the president's office as she presides and

prepares the agenda for the meeting, co-ordinates with the sponsoring Lions Club, and is familiar with the duties of the other officers.

The last officers installed were Mmes. C.L. Thompson and Berry, directors. Via told some of the "ups and downs" of the rose which has been around for many years.

One of the "downs" was during the Dark Ages when the church considered the rose a pagan emblem, and the most important "up" was when it returned to favor during the Renaissance.

The new directors were reminded that they are the foundation of the club, as the executive board with the authority to oversee expenditures and policy, provide an annual audit of the books and accounts.

Via concluded the ceremony by reminding all club members never to be satisfied with the status quo and never stop improving knowledge, regardless of how well their garden grows.

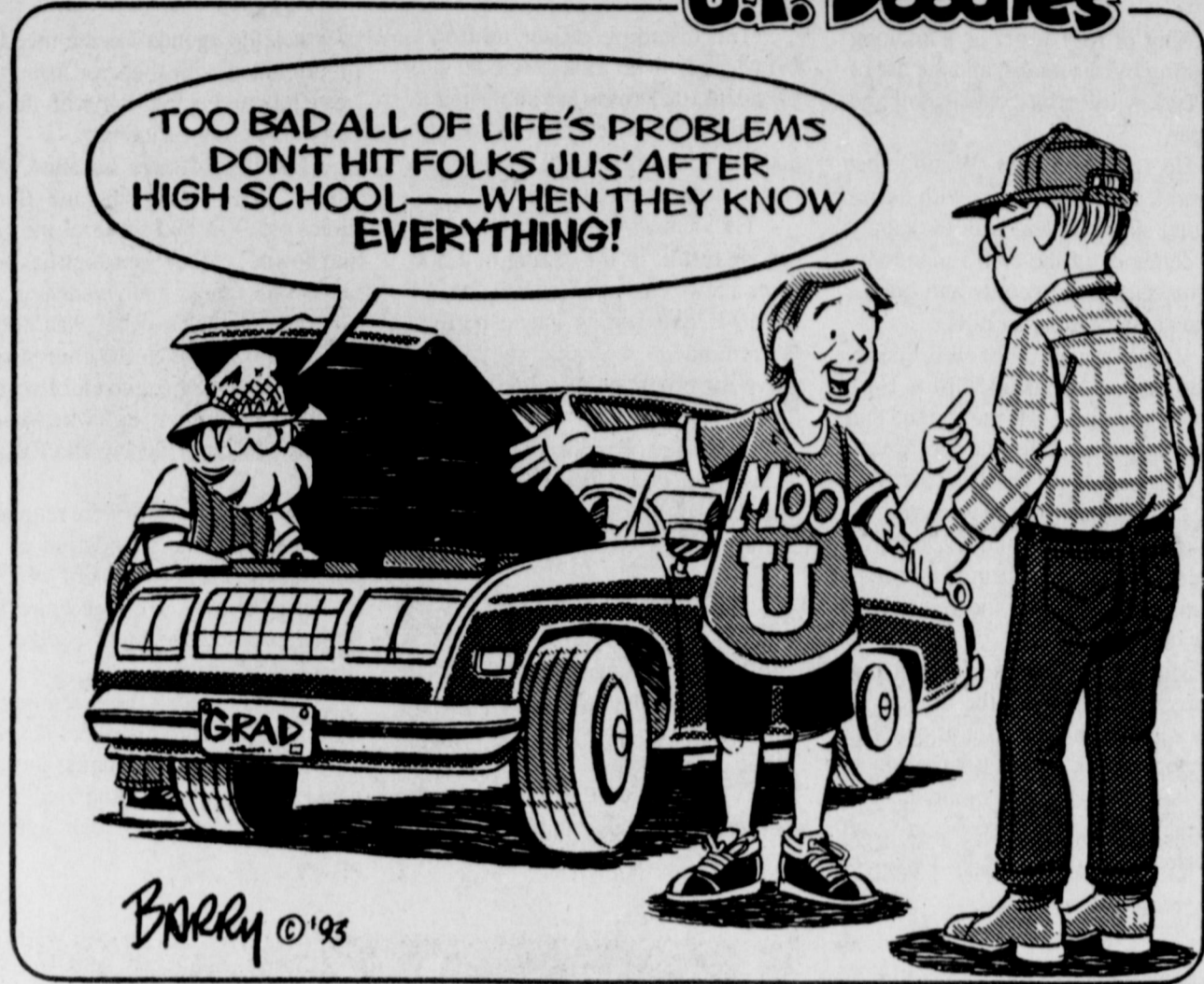

We hate to mention it but we doubt the national media will bring it up anytime soon. They're too busy gushing, ooh'ing and aah'ing along with those Hollywood celebrities.

But during President Clinton's inaugural address on the steps of the Capitol, he chastised the Washington establishment "for forgetting those people whose toil and sweat send us here and pays our way."

He vowed: "Let us give this capital back to the people, to whom it belongs." Wal, as usual, words sound better than action.

Among the 20 cabinet-level appointees, 16 have law degrees or doctorates. At least four, like Clinton, studied in England and a half dozen attended those ivied halls of liberalism, Harvard, Yale, and Georgetown.

One of the 14 appointed to cabinet posts earned \$100,000 last year. The rest earned over a half-million dollars in 1992.

The elite education that most received translated into substantial wealth. Most made personal fortunes in those nasty old "get rich" 80's that Clinton so successfully ran against.

The wealth of Robert Rubin, new head of the national Economic Council, is valued at \$100 million. The net worth of the Treasury Secretary, Lloyd Bentsen, is estimated at \$5.6 million and Ira Magaziner, named as senior White House adviser, sold his business consulting firm in 1986 for \$6 million.

Labor secretary Robert Reich, Harvard professor, supplemented his salary of \$75,000 a year with a few speaking engagements that boosted his total to \$540,000 last year.

Ron Brown, nominated to take over Commerce, earned \$580,000 last year from a Washington law firm; Mickey Kantor, nominated as U.S. trade rep, made \$314,000 last year. The guy picked to be education secretary earned \$568,000, and Warren Christopher, new secretary of state, made almost \$1 million from a law Angeles law firm in 1992.

The gal who didn't want to pay social security on her baby sitter and her husband, Zoe Baird, and withdrew yesterday from her nomination as attorney general, earned \$500,000 last year and her husband kicked in another \$126,000 and the net worth of the couple

is estimated at \$2.3 million.

And those people are supposed to relate to us working stiff's of the middle class?

If you're like us, we don't even know anybody personally that makes a half-million dollars a year.

How does that old adage go: the more things change, the more they stay the same... especially in Washington.

- (2) Some increase in noise, dust or other nuisance levels may occur during the project; however, such disturbances will be temporary and will cease on the completion of the project;
- (3) None of the activities to be undertaken will affect any known local, state or national historic, architectural or archaeological resource presently listed, or potentially eligible for listing, in the National Register of Historical Places or in any state or local registry;
- (4) No impact is anticipated upon the floodplain or other flood hazard areas;
- (5) No effect is expected on protected or endangered wildlife or vegetation; and
- (6) No farmland will be taken from use or otherwise adversely impacted.

An Environmental Review Record respecting the within project has been made by the above-named Municipality which documents the environmental review of the project and more fully sets forth

the reasons why such Statement is not required. This Environmental Review Record is on file at the above address and is available for public examination and copying, upon request, at the City Secretary's office during normal business hours.

Public Comments on Finding

All interested agencies, groups, and persons disagreeing with this decision are invited to submit written comments for consideration by the Municipality to the Office of the Mayor on or before June 20, 1993. All such comments so received will be considered and the Municipality will not request the release of Federal funds or take any administrative action on the within project prior to the date specified in the preceding sentence.

RELEASE OF FUNDS

The City of Iowa Park will undertake the project described above with Texas Community Development Program funds from the Texas Department of Housing & Community Affairs (TDHCA) under Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, as amended. The City of Iowa Park is certifying to the Texas Department of Housing & Community Affairs that the City of Iowa Park and Wayne House, in his official capacity as Mayor, consent to accept the jurisdiction of the Federal courts if an action is brought to enforce responsibilities in relation to environmental assessments, decision-making, and action; and that these responsibilities have been satisfied. The legal effect of the certification is that upon its approval, the City of Iowa Park may use the Texas Community Development Program funds, and the Texas Department of Housing & Community Affairs will have satisfied its responsibilities under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 and 24 CFR Part 58.

Objections to State Release of Funds

The Texas Department of Housing & Community Affairs will accept an objection to its approval of the release of funds and acceptance of the certification only if it is on one of the following bases: (a) that the certification was not in fact executed by the chief executive officer or other certifying officer of the Contractor approved by TDHCA; or (b) that the Contractor's Environmental Review Record for the project indicates omission of a required decision, finding, or step applicable to the project in the environmental review process. Objections must be prepared and submitted in accordance with the required procedure (24 CFR 58), and may be addressed to the Texas Department of Housing & Community Affairs, Community Development Division, P.O. Box 13941, Austin, Texas 78711-3941.

Objections to the release of funds on bases other than those stated above will not be considered by the Texas Department of Housing & Community Affairs. No objection received after July 12, 1993 will be considered by the Texas Department of Housing & Community Affairs.

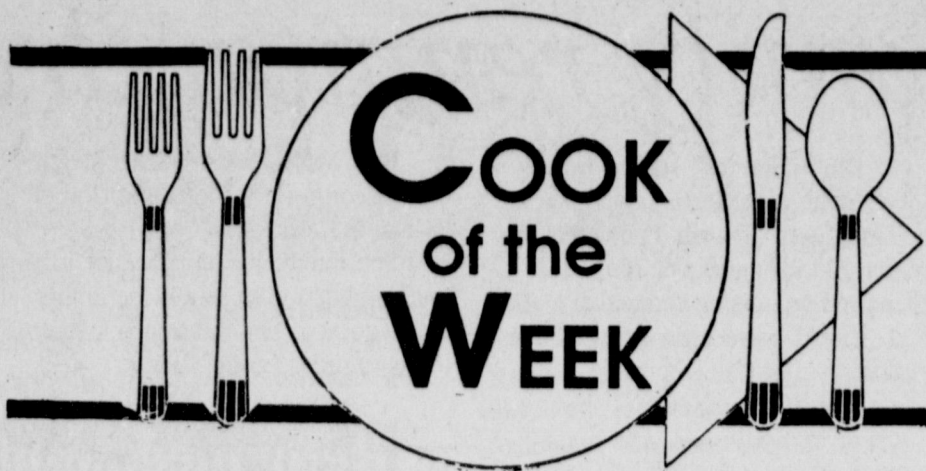
Robert has a race car, so in addition to ball games, the family likes to go to the drag races on Friday nights.

- 1 can Ro-tel tomatoes

- 1 bag shrimp
- Salt and pepper



Cook rice according to package directions. Saute sausage and ham in oil. Saute onion, garlic and peppers in butter about 6 minutes. Add tomatoes, sugar, broth, basil, lemon juice, chili powder and thyme. Cook 5 minutes.

Transfer to large bowl. Stir in ham, sausage, shrimp and rice. Add salt and pepper. Pour into glass baking dish and bake 30 minutes at 350 degrees. This freezes well.

Chocolate Velvet Pudding Pie

- 1 graham cracker pie crust
- 1 - 6 oz. pkg. Jello chocolate instant pudding and pie filling
- 1 cup cold milk
- 2 squares semi-sweet chocolate, melted

Enchilada Casserole

- 2 lbs. ground beef
- 1 cup chopped onion
- Salt and pepper to taste
- 1 can cream of mushroom soup
- 1 can cream of chicken soup
- 1 can hot enchilada sauce
- 2 cans western beans
- Green chilies, chopped
- 1 pkg. Mozzarella cheese
- 6-8 corn tortillas cut in half

Tamale Pie

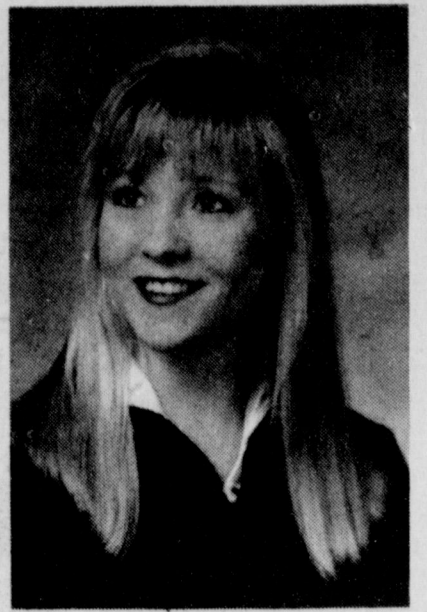
- 2 pkgs. corn muffin mix

- 1/2 lb. pork sausage
- 1/2 cup onion, chopped
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 1 - 16 oz. can stewed tomatoes, drained
- 1 - 12 oz. can whole kernel corn, drained
- 1 - 6 oz. can tomato paste
- 1 can Ro-tel tomatoes
- 2 tps. chili powder

Mix corn muffin mix, egg and milk until just moistened. Set aside.

Brown ground beef, sausage, onion and garlic until browned. Drain. Stir in tomatoes, corn, tomato paste, chili powder and salt. Cook until thickens. Pour into 8x8" baking dish.

Spread corn muffin mixture over beef mixture and cook 15-20 minutes at 350 degrees until cornbread is done.

Sprinkle with cheese and paprika the final 2-3 minutes of cooking.

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Juvenile crime rate is steady

U.S. juvenile crime rate has remained steady during the last two decades despite efforts to toughen punishment, said Texas Christian University criminologist.

"If we look at arrest rates that consider the size of the juvenile population and compare the level of crime given the size of the population, we see those rates have remained remarkably stable over the last 20 years," said Dr. Preston Elrod.

While the crime rate has been relatively constant, Elrod noted that the level of incarceration for juvenile offenders has grown nearly 50 percent since the mid-1970s.

Elrod explained that authorities now are more willing to send youth offenders to juvenile court and process them through the system as opposed to warning them or taking them home to their parents.

Surprisingly, the more conserva-

tive approach has yielded little change in the number of crimes being committed, he said.

Elrod argued that punitive measures have been especially ineffective with serious juvenile crime because the actions have failed to address the motivation prompting deviant behavior.

"As long as we continue just to respond to the problem by making the

laws more severe and incarcerating more people, we're not going to make much headway in dealing with it, because we are not dealing with the basic reasons why many youngsters find criminal activity an attractive choice," he said.

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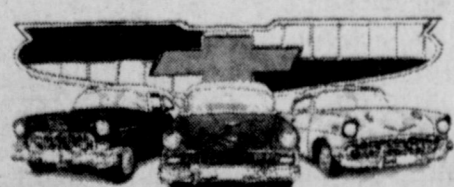

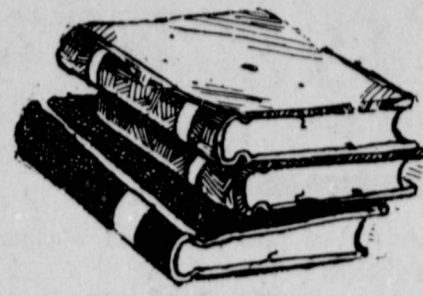

Crossbred fish are released in Gordon to help crappie

Gordon Lake has been targeted by the Texas Parks and Wildlife's inland fisheries division to increase the size of the crappie population, according to Mike Price, city administrator.

State workers released 900 saugeye fish in the Gordon Wednesday of last week.

Saugeye is a cross between a sauger and a walleye, and relatively new to Texas. They are eatable and "put up a good fight" when hooked, Price, a fishing enthusiast, said.

Gordon is among only six lakes in the state where the saugeye is being released. It is a predator to the crappie.

Biologists with the department have conducted fish studies on the Gordon, and have found an extreme over abundance of small crappie in the lake which has led to many fish being stunted in growth.

"The saugeye will thin the crappie population down to the point the lake's food source will be adequate to sustain larger crappie," says Mark Howell, biologist with the inland fisheries division.

Size limit for keeping a saugeye has been set by the state to be 16 inches and Howell said these fish should reach that size within three years.

Howell also confirmed that Lake Gordon is scheduled to receive approximately 1,000 more channel catfish in the fall.

His department is continuing with fish studies on all the city's three lakes to increase fish populations and sizes.

AUSTIN - The Senate, trying again to end the state's school finance crisis, last week approved a compromise funding plan that would give high-wealth school districts several options to share their property taxes.

Senators approved the legislation 25-6. A House vote was expected at least two days before the session ends May 31, and Gov. Ann Richards has indicated that she will sign the measure when it reaches her desk.

The Senate action came five days before the June 1 deadline set by the Texas Supreme Court for revamping the \$15 billion-a-year school finance system.

The share-the-wealth proposal would shift \$400 million to \$600 million a year in property tax revenues from 109 high-wealth districts.

Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock predicted the plan - which originated in the House - would meet with the court's approval.

"We have adopted the House plan, which I believe will meet the court order that threatened to close our schools," Bullock said.

Sen. Bill Ratliff, R-Mount Pleasant, chairman of the Senate education committee, also was optimistic. "I absolutely believe this comes as close as humanly possible to meet the test (of the court)," he said.

Bill Provides Five Choices

These are the five choices that high-wealth districts would have under the equalization plan:

- Send property tax revenues to the state to pay for educating students in low-wealth districts.

- Contract with specific low-wealth districts to help fund their educational programs.

- Set up a new taxing district that includes the property of the high-wealth and one or more low-wealth districts.

- Consolidate voluntarily with one or more districts with less property wealth.

- Transfer some business and commercial property to the tax rolls of low-wealth districts.

The first three options require approval of voters in the districts. If, by October 1993, a district did not select one of the options or voters reject one of the options, the district would be forced to take the last choice, giving up some business and commercial property.

Tough Penal Code

Anti-crime legislation designed to keep violent offenders in prison longer and curb stealing and drug use was approved last week by the Senate. The House is expected to approve the measure.

The two-bill package will streamline and toughen punishments in Texas' criminal laws. The legislation also calls for construction of 20,000 cells in a new system of state jails for nonviolent convicts.

Under the bill, the penal code will mandate that the most violent lawbreakers - people convicted of murder, aggravated robberies, rapes, kidnapping and assaults with weapons - must serve at least half of their sentence. They now must serve only a fourth of their sentence.

"Hard work and perseverance have paid off," Lt. Gov. Bullock said after the package passed. "This legislation will do more than anything that has been done at anytime in the last 20 years to make Texas a safer place to live."

Texas Lottery Success

The Texas Lottery marked its first anniversary May 29, and state officials say it's been a year in which sales topped all projections.

State Comptroller John Sharp, whose office oversees the game, initially opposed the state-sanctioned gambling. "If we're going to have one, I'm certainly proud it's been a success," Sharp said.

The games were expected to bring the state \$461 million during the two-year budget cycle ending Aug. 31. State proceeds hit \$580 million in mid-May, and the profit now is projected at \$731 million, 58 percent higher than originally estimated, Sharp said.

'Harmless Tax' Bill Passed

The Senate has approved a bill that would end the state's practice of paying its employees' share of their Social Security taxes. The bill, by Sen. Teel Bivins, R-Amarillo, would save the state \$29 million over the next two years.

Bivins said employees "would be held harmless" because their pay would be increased to offset the Social Security taxes. However, new employees would not receive the same benefit.

The state began paying employees' share of the taxes in 1983 as a way of giving them a benefit that, officials assumed, would not be taxed, Bivins said. But it turned out that federal income taxes did apply, he said.

Other Highlights

- The Senate sent a bill to Gov. Richards last week that would allow Texas, Maine and Vermont to dump radioactive waste at a site in Hudspeth County, about 90 miles east of El Paso. An aide said the governor likely would sign the bill. Maine and Vermont each would be charged \$25 million.
