accept theresignationsof seven school employees, including Suzanne Ashlock, Darlene Barrington, Jimmie Cain, Dary1 Frazier, Bill Thomas, Mary Pike and Ron Woods. No action
taken to employ new personnel taken to employ new personnel. career ladder level two to level three carcer lader level two to level three,
and four were placed on level two. Teachers placed on career ladder level three include Tim Clark, Gayle Cleghorn, Leslie Crumb, Ray Dillard, Alice Dyer, Karen Lamberth, George Martin, Mozelle Sullivan and Tandra Williams.
Those placed on Level Two include Vicki Dillard, Vickie Jordan, Sharon Pepiton and Linda ickersham.
Campus committee reports consumed the lengthiest portion of the open meeung. Each campus principal
and staff gave reports on campus goals and priorities, as well as future needs.
Kidwell Elementary Principal Ron Woods told trustees the most pressing need at the Kidwell campus was additional classroom space. He said three kindergarten classes are surrently housed in temporary buildings, and kindergarten enrollment is already some 20 percent above last years initial enrollmen. Also he said he gifted and talented the coach's office.
Woods also cited additional personnel as a need at Kidwell, including another kindergarten teacher, a fullime computer teacher, full-time counselor, and an additional physical education teacher.

He also said the building was in need of a paint job, new floor tile, and the classrooms need lockers.

Bradford Elementary Principal PatCravens said her campuscommittee set goals for reading, writing, and computer literacy. The committee also agreed to continue the sustaine, reading time for students and school day Cravens said a full-time counselor is also needed at her school.
Randy Lovelady, junior high principal, gave the report for the junier high campus. Lovelady stated a En for an additional math teacher, En glish teacher, reading teacher, band

## Lovelady said some of mo

 Lovelady said some of the goalsor the campus include increasing the attendance to 98 percent, and increasing the percentage of those students nastering all areas of the TAAS test. A summer computer literacy course has been implemented at the junior high this year, with 16 students already enrolled. Lovelady said students passing all classes during their seventh grade year will be permitted to enroll in the class. Tuition is being Lovelady said. Those completing the course. will be allowed to take two electives during their eighthgrade year. Lovelady told board members that consideration is being given to ending the tradition of eighth grade graduation due to expens: to parents, loss of classroom time in preparation for the event, and a lack of meaning to the students. He said that in place of graduation, he eigh grade teachers dents to Six Flags, with students earn ing the tip ro a point system. Richard Davis, high school cipal cited the goals of the high school in his campus report. He was assisted by members of his committee in his presentation.

LaRae Collins, high school counselor, told trustees that emphasis would be placed on preparation for $A C T$ and SAT college entrance exams, withpossible after-school seminars and workshops being plansed. She also work program for the high school level, have a career day in the spring, and encourage extra-curricular activities.
Jean Johnson and Diana Collins gave reports on the math and science departments, respectively

Each cited needs for additional departments.
Mrs. Johnson announced to the board that some of her algebra students took the standardized state final in Algebra, and placed first in our district and 13th among all 3A schools in Texas.

In other business, Assistant Su perintendent Robert Palmer gave a
report on the results of the 1992-93 report on the results of the 1992-93 TAAS in some areas were down from the previous year, Iowa Park still exceeded the state level in all areas and grade levels.
Palmer told board members the
standards on the tests in 1991-92 and

1992-93 had changed, and said comparing the students' scores from year to year was like "comparing apples
and oranges." He said the same kids were tested but the tests standards varied.

Tests scores for fourth graders mprovedseven percent in writing, but were down 17 and 19 percent, respectively in reading and math. Eighth grade tests scores were up five percedin wing and wree percent in
math.
Tenth graders upped their writing scores by six percent, but fell eight percent in both reading and math. Trustees tabled any action calling for an Interlocal Agreement for Education of City View ISD students or considering requests for first-time ransfer students from City View pending further discussion with that chool district.

In the traditional Democratic Party stronghold of Precinct 33, she still beat Kruger by more 104-45.

knocked the Hawks out $9-6$ in the first round in '75.
Another comparison is the record of the Hawks and their's back then.
You'll remember that Iowa Park lost both its conference games to dis trict champion Graham, and suffered a tie with Vernon this season. And so the Hawks have been the underdogs, considering the state rankings of team and Denver City, in the playoffs.

They enter the game tonight with They enter the game tonight with wins of the other conference teams in the tournament.
Well, that 1975 club at one time wind up with a $13-10$ record. Brenham had made it to the stat meet as many times as Iowa Park had fielded a school baseball team -- four years. Then-coach Greg Clary had an the late David "Red Hoss" Ross, Mas Carter Wayne Schroeder Kont, Mark Ken Scheffe, Tony Singer, Barry Spruiell, Lynn Fonville and Dale Pittman, to name a few off the top of my head.

We have claimed Iowa Park back in time the Star Telegram, and especially the Sports section decided to quit giving any ink to Iowa Park. don't know why, I just know that the did. In the last few days this condition has been blatant. Iowa Park's basebal team finished 2nd in District 4-3A to a good Graham team. In fact, Grahan beat them three times in district play However lowa Park Hawks had a good enough record that they got into the playpens. Why? Because I never ger any news about them from the Star Telegram. Having lived in Tarrant County since 1956 and North Richland Hills since 1961, you might define that as long-suffering.

"I did not know what he planned to do. He got a group together and they began praying for me, but night I got sleepy and went to sleep night I got sleepy and went to sleep
without any medication for the first time in a long time.
"The next moming a friend called and asked how I was feeling. Itold her what had happened the night befor and that I felt better that moming than
I usually did. That was when I learned I usually did. That was when I learne they had had a prayer vigil for me.
"Of course, I was not alrigh overnight, but I did begin to improve and from then on it was uphill and did not have to give up my boys. learned then to never give up hoping and that God does answer prayer

ity was thrown into doubt when lawyers for property-poor districts announced they would challenge its constitutionality. "There are still inequities in the system," said Al Kauffman, an
attorney for the Mexican American Legal Defense and Educational Fund that represeuts tue plainiiffs in the long-running school finance lawsuit.
