The Iowa Park High School Jazz Ensemble has been selected as an "Outstanding Medium Ensemble," Director Ed Hefti was notified last week.


The musicians competed in the University Interscholastic League Solo and Ensemble contest May 30 at San Marcos.



# City council paves way for housing development

The city council Monday night voted to comply with a housing developer's request that is expected to eventually cover a large vacant area in the 700 block of West Magnolia.

Developer Bill Swan, who has constructed numerous homes, and an apartment complex, in the city in the 1980s, had proposed a development plat that required the relocation on Aldine Street.

Swan explained he wanted the street moved Northward about 50 feet, so the lots for 7 of the 10 homes would have more "reasonable" depth.

Additionally, the proposed plat called for Aldine to be only one block long, with a culdisac on the East end. Entry to the street would be off Third Street.

The remaining block of undeveloped property, which extends South to Magnolia, will be used either for an apartment complex for elderly, retired persons, or additional homes.

Should Swan decide to complete the block with homes, the addition would contain 26, he explained. The block's plat has not been completed.

The developer also said he plans to construct two homes in the \$80,000 range, but the other eight would be slightly lower in cost.

Swan's proposed initial plat had been considered the previous week by the Planning and Zoning Board, but no action had been taken, because no motion to accept or reject was ever made.

Three members of the Board were in the audience for the council's neeting, and were asked about the I oposal. David Padgett said he was concerned about moving Aldine, as it would not be in alignment with the dedicated street should it ever be opened.

Alderman Bob Hamilton pointed out that none of the streets intersecting with Third, from the east or west, was in alignment between Magnolia and the Access Road. He added he doubted Aldine would be opened from the 600 block, because of the cost of crossing a drainage area.

Prior to the council's vote to abandon Aldine and then to relocate it as proposed, each alderman expressed individual approval of the proposal.

Council members then voted to officially close the dedicated street, and then to dedicate it as proposed, both requiring ordinances.

Following that, aldermen voted to accept the proposed plat.

Because the city is a member of the Nortex 9-1-1 Communications District, the organization's budget must be approved by the council as well as all other municipal and county bodies

The \$521,339 budget was approved as presented.

The council decided to interview one of five candidates for the vacant position of public works director, at the June 28 meeting.

Aldermen voted confirmation of three appointees offered by Mayor Wayne House to the city's electrical board. They included Kenneth McCreary, Stewart Moss and Kenneth Via.

The mayor explained a fourth appointment would be forthcoming, but he had not conferred with the candidate he had in mind.

During Administrator Mike Price's report on current projects report, Hamilton said he had received a complaint from at least one business in the 400 block of West Park, because of the lack of progress in work on that street. He said management of B&R

### **Police report two arrests**

Iowa Park continues its lead over the other three cities of Wichita County, in percentage of gain for the year for sales tax collections.

Though April's gain over the same month in 1992 was not as great as Burkburnett's, Iowa Park continues a lead it has held over two years in percentage of increase for the year, according to a report this month from the state comptroller's office.

The city received a check for \$14,187.92 in May, a 1.47-percent increase over the same month last year. Burkburnett was the only other city in the county on the plus side, 10.86 for the month.

Those April sales taxes collected raised the year's total to \$108,082.58, a 7.28-percent increase over 1992, for Iowa Park.

Burkburnett is 6.63 over last year and Wichita Falls is 5.80. Electra is a minus 8.89 percent for the year, when compared with this same time in 1992.

Holliday is showing a 7.37-percent gain over this time last year.

May's check reflects sales taxes collected on April sales and reported to the comptroller in May, by businesses filing monthly tax returns.





Let me start off with the statement that this column is in no means intended as criticism of any parent, but its information can hopefully be used in the future to develop greater understanding and prevent any tragedies.

We had a serious accident shortly before midnight Friday on West Highway, in front of Ken's Pizza.

Two little girls were riding their bicycles, and one of them was struck by an automobile. The driver, himself the father of two daughters, plainly did not see the rider until she came flying over his hood and crashed into the car's windshield.

A report on the accident is on the front page of this issue.

People, bicycles have no business on streets or highways any time after

sundown. I don't care how old the rider is.

This accident took place within three weeks of when I almost hit a young boy in virtually the same area. while going home after a meeting of the city council.

I told my wife when I arrived home that someone was going to get killed, riding on the streets at night.

This isn't just here. I've seen it on FM 369 and other areas, where grownups apparently were using their off-work time to train for some big ride.

About a month ago, a 26-year-old man was killed riding on a highway East of Dallas . . . at 2:30 in the morning.

State law requires bicycles oper-

ated at night to have a head lamp that is visible at least 500 feet. Tail lights are not required, but rear reflectors are, and must be visible from at least 50 to 300 feet.

In fact, state law governing vehicles apply just the same to bicycles, such as:

\* operating the vehicle by traveling as close to the right curb as practical. That's the right curb, and not facing on-coming traffic, you will notice.

\* two riders can ride side by side, not three or more, as long as their speed does not impede other roadway traffic.

\* just like an automobile, a bicycle is not allowed by law to be operated on a sidewalk. The city has an ordinance prohibiting bicycle riding on sidewalks in any business district, but state law says absolutely no operation on any sidewalk. Period.

\* bicycles must be equipped with a brake which will enable the operator to skid wheels on dry, level and clean pavement.

\* and it is an absolute no-no for a rider to grab hold of a motorized vehicle to "hitch" a ride.

I received a positive response from Police Chief Ray Smock that his office put on a rider and parent safety class two or three times a year.

This should help parents know what the laws are, before allowing their children to venture out of the yard on their bicycles.

Actually, I'd like to see it made a law, that any parent purchasing a bicycle for their child being required to attend such a seminar.

No one doubts a parent's love and concern when it comes to the child. But, if the parent doesn't know the law, how can the parent be expected to properly instruct the child how to safely ride and enjoy the two-wheel vehicle?

Two men were arrested, another issued citations and one theft were included on the past week's police blotter.







This mystery (Romans 16:25; Ephesians 1:9; 3:3, 4, 9; 6:19; Colossians 1:26, 27; 2:2; 4:3) is now made known through the gospel (2 Timothy 1:10) and centers in Christ and the church. The ancient prophets discuss in prophetic terms the church as it is mentioned in various references to the "kingdom of God" (Daniel 2:44, 45). The church was in the mind of God before the world began.


Wayne "Red" Collier Services for Wayne "Red" Collier, 68, were at 10 a.m. Saturday at Owens & Brumley Funeral Home.


