## State champ Brahmas scuttle Hawks' hopes

A wise veteran high school coach once said, "A superior team can make a good team look like it's playing badly."

That's what happened to Iowa Park's proud Hawk baseball team Thursday at the University Interscholastic League state tournament in Austin.

They were shut out 7-0 by the Bellville Brahmas in the tournament's semi-finals.

The following day, Bellville went on to earn the Class AAA championship--having been one victory short in 1992--with a decisive 6-2 win over Falfurrias.

Either the Hawks had worn out their rabbits foot in the four playoffs to get to Austin, or Bellville had too much pitching, speed and bats.

Whichever, Iowa Park closed out its season with a record of 18-9-1 under first-year head coach David Fuhrman, and now must look forward to the 1994 season.

The Brahmas collected seven hits off senior hurler Ralph Dillard. But, more importantly, they were credited with nine stolen bases, which helped to get into scoring opportunities.

But they didn't stop their stealing ways Thursday. They registered five more thefts against Falfurrias to establish a state tournament record in that category of 14.

Bellville's outstanding senior Chris Nolen earned his 12th victory of the season by allowing Iowa Park only two hits, both in the first inning, by leadoff batter Jason Miller and Tony Lozipone.

Iowa Park left only five batters on the bases in the seven-inning contest.

Nolen, the Brahmas' leadoff batter, singled on a 3-2 pitch to get the game started, and scored the first run on an error after stealing both second and third bases. One more run was posted before the top of the inning was ended.

No Bellville player reached the bases in the second inning, and only one got on in the third, but failed to score.

Nolen led off the fourth inning, in which the Brahmas scored twice more. He hit the ball off Dillard's foot, but before the Hawk hurler could get off

the mound, pick the ball up and toss it to Scott McNeely on first, Nolen had already touched the bag. He later scored

## City council paves way for housing development

The city council Monday night voted to comply with a housing developer's request that is expected to eventually cover a large vacant area in the 700 block of West Magnolia.

Developer Bill Swan, who has constructed numerous homes, and an apartment complex, in the city in the 1980s, had proposed a development plat that required the relocation on Aldine Street.

Swan explained he wanted the street moved Northward about 50 feet, so the lots for 7 of the 10 homes would have more "reasonable" depth.

Additionally, the proposed plat called for Aldine to be only one block long, with a culdisac on the East end. Entry to the street would be off Third Street.

The remaining block of undeveloped property, which extends South to Magnolia, will be used either for an apartment complex for elderly, retired persons, or additional homes.

Should Swan decide to complete the block with homes, the addition would contain 26, he explained. The block's plat has not been completed.

The developer also said he plans to construct two homes in the \$80,000 range, but the other eight would be slightly lower in cost.

Swan's proposed initial plat had been considered the previous week by the Planning and Zoning Board, but no action had been taken, because no motion to accept or reject was ever made.

Three members of the Board were in the audience for the council's meeting, and were asked about the proposal. David Padgett said he was concerned about moving Aldine, as it would not be in alignment with the

dedicated street should it ever be opened.

Alderman Bob Hamilton pointed out that none of the streets intersecting with Third, from the east or west, was in alignment between Magnolia and the Access Road. He added he doubted Aldine would be opened from the 600 block, because of the cost of crossing a drainage area.

Prior to the council's vote to abandon Aldine and then to relocate it as proposed, each alderman expressed individual approval of the proposal.

Council members then voted to officially close the dedicated street, and then to dedicate it as proposed, both requiring ordinances.

Following that, aldermen voted to accept the proposed plat.

Because the city is a member of the Nortex 9-1-1 Communications District, the organization's budget must be approved by the council as well as all other municipal and county bodies

annually.

The \$521,339 budget was approved as presented.

The council decided to interview one of five candidates for the vacant position of public works director, at the June 28 meeting.

Aldermen voted confirmation of three appointees offered by Mayor Wayne House to the city's electrical board. They included Kenneth McCreary, Stewart Moss and Kenneth Via.

The mayor explained a fourth appointment would be forthcoming, but he had not conferred with the candidate he had in mind.

During Administrator Mike Price's report on current projects report, Hamilton said he had received a complaint from at least one business in the 400 block of West Park, because of the lack of progress in work on that street.

He said management of B&R

## Police report two arrests

Iowa Park continues its lead over the other three cities of Wichita County, in percentage of gain for the year for sales tax collections.

Though April's gain over the same month in 1992 was not as great as Burkburnett's, Iowa Park continues a lead it has held over two years in percentage of increase for the year, according to a report this month from the state comptroller's office.

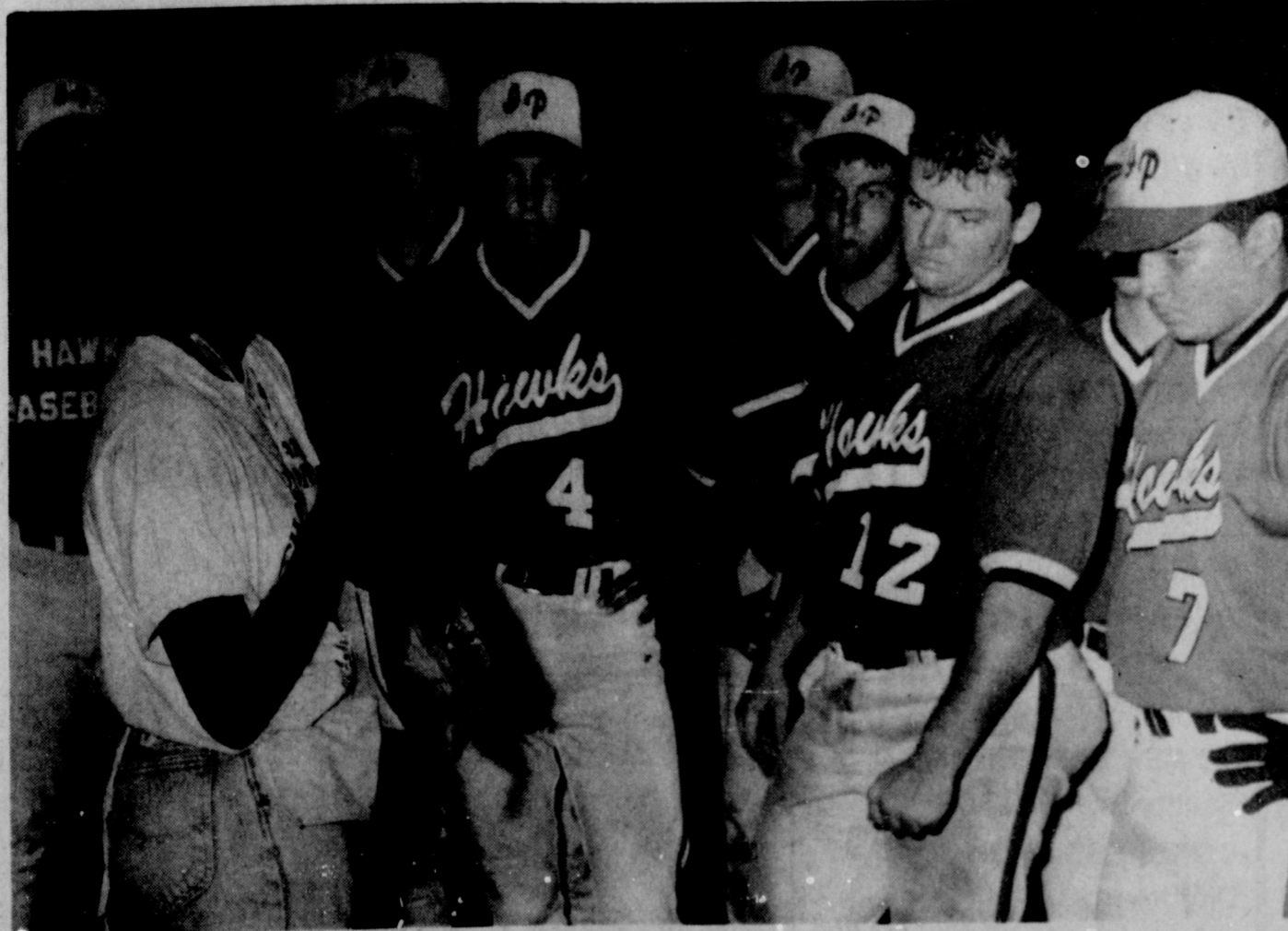
The city received a check for \$14,187.92 in May, a 1.47-percent increase over the same month last year. Burkburnett was the only other city in

the county on the plus side, 10.86 for the month.

Those April sales taxes collected raised the year's total to \$108,082.58, a 7.28-percent increase over 1992, for Iowa Park.

Burkburnett is 6.63 over last year and Wichita Falls is 5.80. Electra is a minus 8.89 percent for the year, when compared with this same time in 1992.

Holliday is showing a 7.37-percent gain over this time last year. May's check reflects sales taxes collected on April sales and reported to the comptroller in May, by businesses filing monthly tax returns.

## Insect Bites

The best protection against insect bites is prevention. Following these steps will reduce your risk of getting bitten:

- If you will be traveling overseas, check with your pharmacist, doctor, or local U.S. Public Health Service. Some insect bites can cause serious or even fatal reactions, and you need to be informed and prepared.

# As I See It. . .

By Bob Hamilton



Let me start off with the statement that this column is in no means intended as criticism of any parent, but its information can hopefully be used in the future to develop greater understanding and prevent any tragedies.

We had a serious accident shortly before midnight Friday on West Highway, in front of Ken's Pizza.

Two little girls were riding their bicycles, and one of them was struck by an automobile. The driver, himself the father of two daughters, plainly did not see the rider until she came flying over his hood and crashed into the car's windshield.

A report on the accident is on the front page of this issue.

People, bicycles have no business on streets or highways any time after

sundown. I don't care how old the rider is.

This accident took place within three weeks of when I almost hit a young boy in virtually the same area, while going home after a meeting of the city council.

I told my wife when I arrived home that someone was going to get killed, riding on the streets at night.

This isn't just here. I've seen it on FM 369 and other areas, where grownups apparently were using their off-work time to train for some big ride.

About a month ago, a 26-year-old man was killed riding on a highway East of Dallas . . . at 2:30 in the morning.

State law requires bicycles oper-

ated at night to have a head lamp that is visible at least 500 feet. Tail lights are not required, but rear reflectors are, and must be visible from at least 50 to 300 feet.

In fact, state law governing vehicles apply just the same to bicycles, such as:

- \* operating the vehicle by traveling as close to the right curb as practical. That's the right curb, and not facing on-coming traffic, you will notice.

- \* two riders can ride side by side, not three or more, as long as their speed does not impede other roadway traffic.

- \* just like an automobile, a bicycle is not allowed by law to be operated on a sidewalk. The city has an ordinance prohibiting bicycle riding on sidewalks in any business district, but state law says absolutely no operation on any sidewalk. Period.

- \* bicycles must be equipped with a brake which will enable the operator to skid wheels on dry, level and clean pavement.

- \* and it is an absolute no-no for a rider to grab hold of a motorized vehicle to "hitch" a ride.

I received a positive response from Police Chief Ray Smock that his office put on a rider and parent safety class two or three times a year.

This should help parents know what the laws are, before allowing their children to venture out of the yard on their bicycles.

Actually, I'd like to see it made a law, that any parent purchasing a bicycle for their child being required to attend such a seminar.

No one doubts a parent's love and concern when it comes to the child. But, if the parent doesn't know the law, how can the parent be expected to properly instruct the child how to safely ride and enjoy the two-wheel vehicle?

Thriftway had complained that until the street project is completed, his customers had only one entry that also served as the exit, and had asked that an area to the west of the building be smoothed for traffic.

The aldermen said he had been told the contractor on the concrete curb work had worked only about five days since commencing the project at least a month earlier.

Charles Lee, who was in the audience, told the council he had heard the city might be considering selling land on the East side of Lake Gordon, and he was interested in bidding on the land should it ever become available.

Mayor House told him the land, should the council ever decide to sell it, would be advertised for bids.

One problem the council faces, should it decide to make the property available for home sites, is displacement of two soccer practice fields.

House said the city is considering developing a six-field site on city property at the south edge of the city, which could be used for the youth program. It would have off-street parking available.

This mystery (Romans 16:25; Ephesians 1:9; 3:3, 4, 9; 6:19; Colossians 1:26, 27; 2:2; 4:3) is now made known through the gospel (2 Timothy 1:10) and centers in Christ and the church. The ancient prophets discuss in prophetic terms the church as it is mentioned in various references to the "kingdom of God" (Daniel 2:44, 45). The church was in the mind of God before the world began.

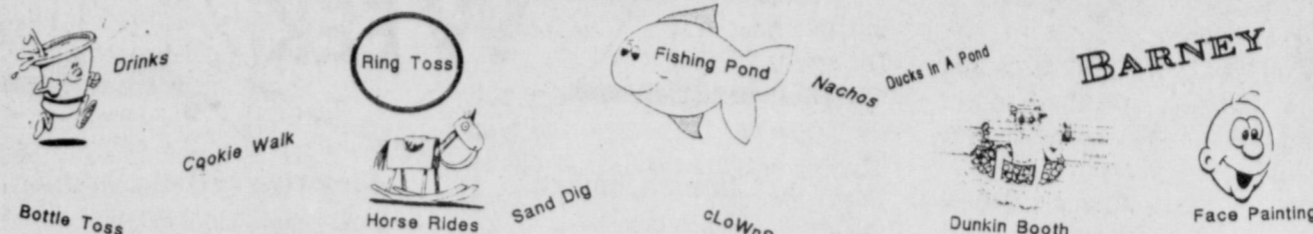

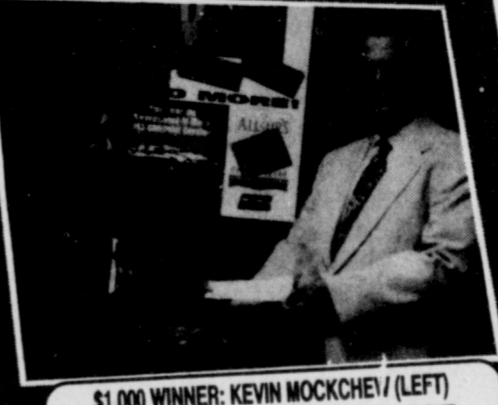

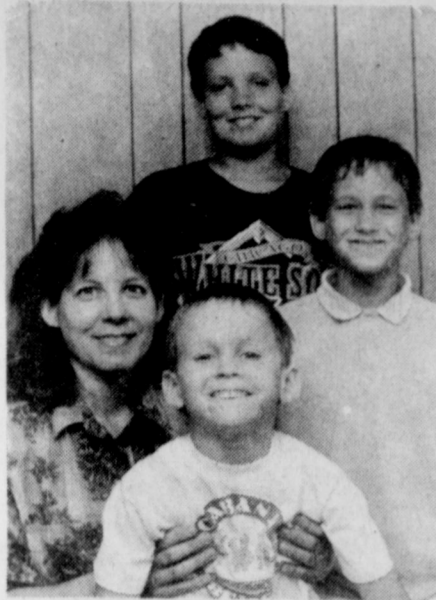

**Smothered Steak**

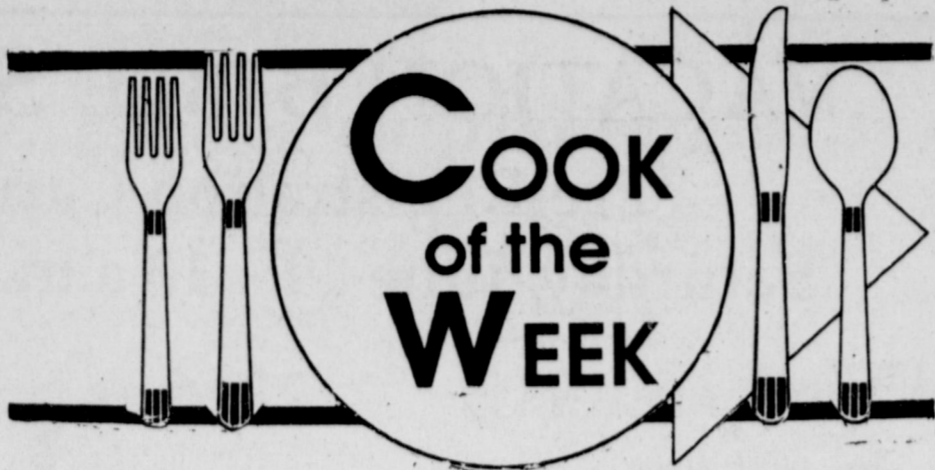
Serves 6

2 eggs  
1 cup sugar  
2 cups flour  
1/4 tsp. salt  
1 tsp. baking powder  
1 cup sour cream  
1 tsp. baking soda  
1 tsp. vanilla  
Cinnamon  
Sugar  
Walnuts (optional)

Cream together butter, sugar and eggs.

Combine flour, salt and baking powder and add to creamed mixture.

Combine sour cream, baking soda and vanilla and add to mixture.

Put 1/2 the batter in a square 8-inch greased pan. Sprinkle liberally with sugar and cinnamon (and walnuts) cover with remaining batter and sprinkle with sugar and sugar (and walnuts).

Bake 45 minutes at 350 degrees.

I always double this recipe as it is a real favorite and bake in 9x12 pan or bundt pan.

**Boston Cream Pie**

*My family's favorite dessert*

1 box yellow cake mix  
Milk chocolate frosting  
1 large vanilla "cook & serve" pudding  
1 3/4 cup milk

Bake cake in two round 9" cake pans. Allow to cool 15 minutes, remove from pans and place on 2 separate plates. Microwave (or cook) vanilla pudding mix and 1 3/4 cup milk. Once pudding boils, allow to cool in refrigerator. Place most of the cooled pudding mixture on one of the layers. Place other cake layer on top. Ice cake and place immediately in the refrigerator. Allow to cool several hours before serving.

**Strawberry Jello Salad**

1 - 8 oz. (small) Cool Whip  
1 - 16 oz. Naturipe strawberry slices, frozen with juice  
1 large pkg. strawberry jello (or raspberry can be used)

Make sure Cool Whip is not frozen. Make jello (2 cups hot water). Take out strawberries (don't defrost) and ease into bowl with hot jello. Break up strawberries, then add Cool Whip and, with wire whisk, work in a bit (looks curdled). Keep whipping it - mix well - cover and leave in refrigerator overnight.

Very delicious. We double this recipe and take to holiday gatherings.

cluding nursing homes, civic and religious groups, in addition to public concerts annually that funds their tours and activities.

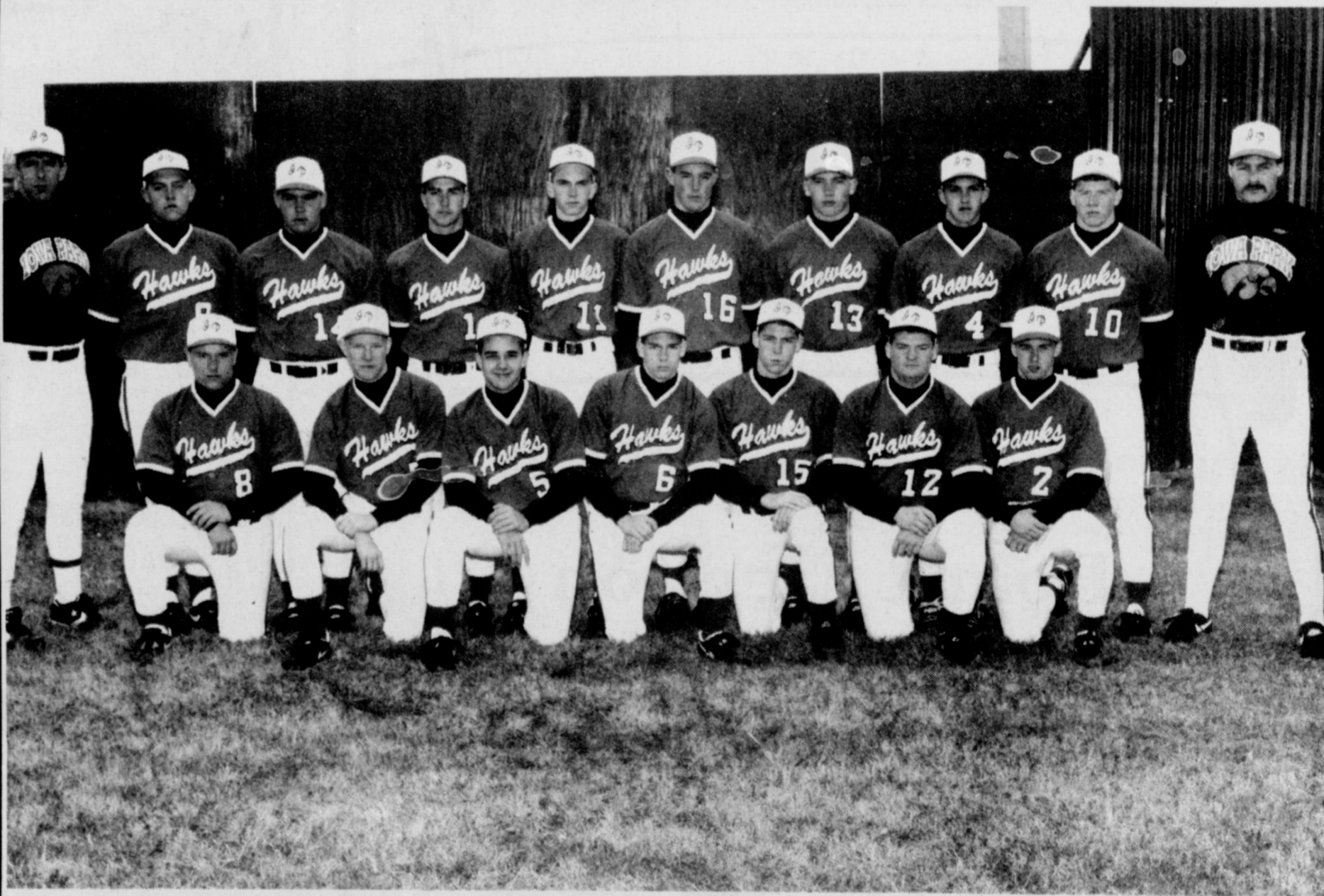

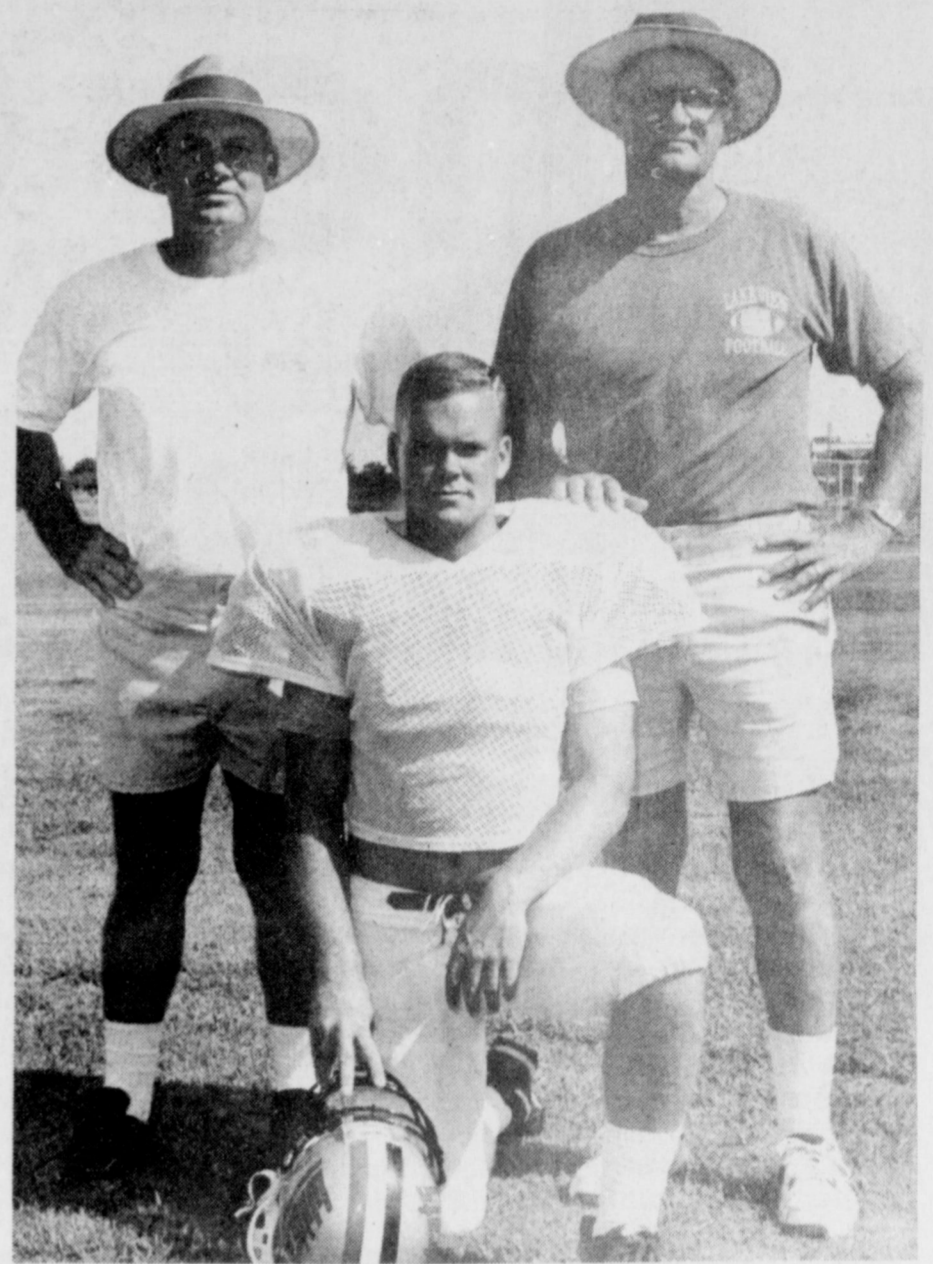

**AUSTIN** - With State Treasurer Kay Bailey Hutchison going to Washington as Texas' junior U.S. Senator, Comptroller John Sharp said last week the time is right to make state government more efficient by merging the treasury with his office.

It's not a new idea. Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock suggested it almost 15 years ago when he was state comptroller. And auditors on 100 occasions suggested to Sharp that the office should be merged.

Sharp said he rejected the recommendations because he didn't want to be accused of engaging in partisan politics. Sharp is a Democrat; Hutchison is a Republican.

Sharp said he and Gov. Ann Richards recently discussed merging the agencies. "Ann asked me, if Krueger doesn't win, how many folks it would take to operate the state treasury. We could cut it 75 percent, probably more."

But the suggestion received a cold reception from Hutchison.

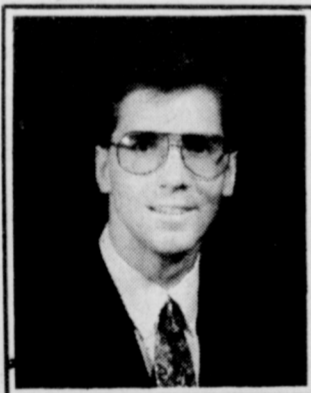
