Council to consider landfill bids Monday

The city council is expected to take action on a bid to sell the landfill and equipment, as well as turning over solid waste collection responsibilities, during Monday night's meeting.

The meeting is to begin at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

Building permit total well above past two years

Two new homes provided the bulk of August's building permit total, according to the monthly report issued by city hall.

August's total was \$216,825, elevating the year's total to \$1,469,122.

That represents a major increase over the past two years, when the same period totals were \$448,230 in 1992, and \$376,614 in 1991.

Related to the contractual agreement is a 10-year contract, with two one-year extensions, for the collection and disposal of solid waste.

The council has been studying alternatives to its landfill operation more than two years, with the knowledge that to continue its operation and meet the mandates of "Subtitle D" would be too expensive.

Requirements of the mandates handed down by the Environmental Protection Agency would have increased the city's expense of disposing of trash from about \$8 per ton to more than \$110 per ton, according to the city's engineer.

Oversight of landfills was turned over to a state agency, now known as the Texas Natural Resource Conserva-

The original deadline for closing landfills not intending to continue operating under the new requirements was to be Oct. 9. However, the state agency recently announced it was proposing a six-month extension.

No announcement of approval of the proposed extension was ever made public.

At the meeting when the council voted to sell all its solid waste operation to Bell, it was pointed out that the city would receive free disposal of

trash 10 years in return.

One of two ordinances on the city's tentative meeting agenda deals with a new housing development in the north

part of town.

The final plat of Park Place Addition has been approved by the city's planning and zoning commission, and

is expected to be approved by alder-

men

The addition is located north of Country Hills Estates.

The other ordinance amends the city's electrical code.

First item on the agenda is a public hearing to discuss the 1993-94 operating budget.

Four resolutions also are on the agenda, two of them dealing with the 1993-94 city finances, one on water and the other on the city's application for a state grant.

Aldermen will be asked to accept the certified tax rolls for next year, which officially begins Oct. 1, and the other adopts the year's budget.

The resolution concerning water would accept "the Municipal Water Pollution Environmental Audit for the year beginning April 1, 1992 and ending March 31, 1993; establishing actions necessary to maintain the permit requirements and establishing time frames for any corrective actions."

The fourth resolution would authorize "the submission of a Texas Community Development Program application to the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs for the Community Development Fund; and authorizing the Mayor to act as the city's Executive Officer and authorized representative in all matters" pertaining to the program.

Administrator Mike Price will ask council's approval of a capital improvements list for the water and sewer system.

Price will also seek authorization to have plans and specifications designed for the capital improvements.

Additionally, the council will be asked permission to close portions of Cash and North Wall on Saturday, Oct. 2, for the annual Whoop-T-Do, sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce.

Hawks travel Friday in search of first win

HAWK QUARTERBACK Tony Lozipone picks up six yards on the first play of Friday night's season-

Iowa Park's Hawks will be shooting for their first win over the Childress Bobcats since 1969, when they travel Friday to Childress.

Actually, the two clubs have met only three times since the year the Hawks earned the AA state title and knocked off the Bobcats 41-14 en route.

Childress was in the same district with Iowa Park back then. They began playing each other in non-conference competition in 1990, and the Bobcats have won all three.

The kickoff is to be at 8 p.m., and fans will need to arrive early because there are no advance tickets available locally. Ticket prices at the gate are \$3 for adults and \$1 for students.

Childress defeated Iowa Park 22-6 in 1990, the year the Bobcats made it all the way to the state quarterfinals.

In their two following meetings, turnovers have doomed Hawk hopes. They lost two fumbles and two interceptions in the 28-13 loss in '91, and last year coughed up three fumbles and three interceptions for a 26-14 deci-

While the Hawks stumbled in their season opener Friday, 18-14 to Burkburnett, the Bobcats were knocking off the Memphis Cyclones, another club on Iowa Park's schedule this year, 20-

opening football game between Iowa Park and Burkburnett.

The Bobcats are coached by Charlie Johnston, one of the deans of Texas schoolboy football, who has built a dynasty at the city on the caprock. Johnston's roster of players includes 13 seniors, 11 juniors and seven sophomores.

Largest of Johnston's offensive starters is sophomore tackle Jimmy Meyer. Childress has another player even larger in 285-pound senior Bennie Vitela, but he doesn't start on either offense or defense.

Key on the Bobcat team is Wade Keys, a 164-pound senior who is the Bobcats' quarterback and also lines up as a cornerback on defense.

Iowa Park's defense is expected to be bolstered with the return of senior Scott Byrd in the defensive secondary. Byrd actually has played very little since his sophomore year, being held out last year by twice breaking a bone in his foot. Then, early in two-a-day practice this year, he broke a bone in the other foot.

Hawk coaches were hoping that

wide receiver and cornerback Scott Tigrett would be back in action Friday, but he is expected to be held out of action at least another week.

Tigrett suffered a muscle pull in his back prior to last week's opener against Burkburnett.

Otherwise, the only injuries suffered by the rest of the varsity Hawks last week was to their pride, losing 18-14 to Burkburnett.

Head Coach Robert Clensay expressed his disappointment when he said, "I thought we got beat by a team we were better than. I was very disappointed in the loss."

However, besides a few breakdowns, such as the blocked quick kick and the "gimme" pass in the first half that "gave" the Bulldogs touchdowns, the Head Hawk said he was impressed with the effort of all his players.

Clensay continues to express his opinion that this year's Hawks can beat anybody on their schedule, if they play up to their potential. But he adds that if they don't play to their potential, any team on the schedule can beat them.

Tator Tot Hot Dish

- 1 lb. hamburger meat
- 1 pkg. tator tots 1 can cream of mushroom soup
- 1 can cream of chicken soup 1 can milk

Brown hamburger meat; drain. Layer the hamburger meat, then the tator tots in a casserole dish. Combine soups and milk and pour over. Bake 1 hour at 350 degrees.

Coleslaw Sour Cream Dressing

1/2 pt. sour cream

- 2 tsps. salt
- 1/2 tsp. pepper
- 2 tsps. celery seed 1/4 cup vinegar
- 2 tsps. sugar
- 2 tsps. dry mustard

Orange Candy Slice Cake

- 2 sticks butter or margarine
- 2 cups sugar
- 4 eggs
- 1 1/2 cups buttermilk 1 tsp. soda
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 4 cups flour
- 1 lb. dates, chopped
- 1 lb. orange jelly candy slices, halved 2 cups pecans, chopped

Cream the butter and sugar. Add eggs one at a time, beating well. Add 1 cup buttermilk. Beat well. Add soda to other 1/2 cup buttermilk. Add to mixture. Combine dry ingredients, add candy, then the dates and nuts, blend. Bake in greased tube pan or similar pan at 275 degrees 2 1/2 hours.

To ice: To one small can of frozen orange juice concentrate, thawed, add 1/2 cup brown sugar. Let stand while cake bakes. Pour on cake while hot. Let cake cool in pan before removing.

Peach Bread

3 cups chopped peaches

- 3 Tbsps. orange juice 2/3 cup honey
- 1/3 cup butter 2 eggs, beaten
- 2 cups whole wheat pastry flour
- 1 cup soy flour
- 1 tsp. baking powder 1/2 tsp. baking soda
- 2/3 cup oats
- 1/2 cup walnuts

Puree 1 cup peaches in blender with orange juice and set aside.

In a large bowl, cream together honey and butter. In another bowl, mix together flours, baking powder, soda, oats and nuts. Add to liquid mixture with remaining two cups of peaches. Bake 50-60 minutes at 350 degrees.

Icebox Christmas Roll

- 1 large box vanilla wafers
- 1 can Eagle Brand milk 1/4 tsp. salt
- 2 cups walnuts
- 1 cup almonds
- 2 cups pecans
- 2 cups Brazil nuts 1 lb. seedless white raisins
- 1 lb. chopped dates
- 1 large jar maraschino cherries
- 1 lb. candied fruit

Crush vanilla wafers until mealy. Add Eagle Brand milk and salt. Mix well. Add nuts (chopped). To this add raisins, dates and cherries, juice and all, and candied fruit. Wet hands and mix until it holds together. Shape into

4 rolls and roll in coconut until well

coated. Wrap in waxed paper and re-

Cover and bake 1 1/2 hours or until tender. Spoon away any let from casserole. Sprinkle steaks with cheese and heat 5 minutes or until cheese is melted. Serves 6.

Scotch Cake

- 2 cups flour 2 cups sugar
- 1 stick margarine
- 1/2 cup vegetable shortening
- 4 Tbsps. cocoa
- 1 cup water
- 1/2 cup buttermilk
- 2 eggs 1 tsp. soda
- 1 tsp. ground cinnamon
- 1 tsp. vanilla

Combine flour and sugar in a large mixing bowl. In a saucepan, put margarine, shortening, cocoa and water; bring to a rapid boil and then pour into flour and sugar mixture. Mix well. Add other ingredients and mix well. Put into a greased 11x16 pan and bake 30 minutes at 400 degrees. Make icing before cake has finished baking.

Icing

- 1 stick margarine
- 4 Tbsps. cocoa
- 6 Tbsps. milk
- 1 box powdered sugar 1 tsp. vanilla
- 1 cup chopped pecans
- 1 cup flaked coconut

The group has received several barrels to use as trash recepticles, and Mrs. Kennedy said she would check with the high school art class to see if they would consider painting them.


Mrs. Hickman, social chairman, gave an outline on activities for the year, and Mrs. Mercer reported that the Ways and Means had completed their budget for the year.



As a newspaper publisher and member of the city council, I take the letter on this page concerning the city's actions on the landfill issue as a slap in the face, personally.

For more than four years, I've been warning you readers about problems relating to the landfill having been brought about by the Environmental Protection Agency.

These pages have detailed, step by step, every action that has led up to the anticipated sale of the landfill to Bell Processing.

And for anyone who has sat at home, and not attended any of these council meetings, to say they are uninformed tells me they either didn't care enough to attend a meeting, don't read the paper, and expect someone to take them by the hand and explain everything to them.

To my recollection, not one of the persons who signed the letter ever attended a council meeting during which the landfill's future was discussed. And there were a lot of such meetings.

Only one point in the letter, that point pertaining to the number of trucks that would be hauling trash to the landfill, has not been previously

printed. Information dealing with that was discussed in the council's executive session. Truth is, we don't know, but don't expect more than half a dozen daily, if that many.

As to the claim that a big stack of smelly trash will be visible and smelled from as far away as the football stadium, I can only ask how many have said they could see the city's operation at that same location all these years?

The acreage where the expanded landfill operation would be can only be viewed from Smith Road or from the

As to threats to health . . . and let me say here I expect to live here as long as any of those who signed the letter, and likely have more grandchildren who will follow . . . I can assure you that one study of the EPA's Subtitle D regulations will tell you that landfills will not pose any health problems.

Landfills are inspected on a regular basis, and will be inspected even more regularly in the future. All sorts of testing equipment, including ground water and air, are required. And at considerable expense, I might add.

Then, landfill operators are re-


quired to have either funds on deposit or insurance policies to cover the cost of any cleanup that might be deemed necessary. And here we're talking about more than a million dollars. You don't get sloppy with that kind of penalty hanging over your head.

Bell Processing has received some bad press recently, on their industrial landfill operation at Barnett Road. That was all brought about by a NIMBY group (Not In My Back Yard). And, from the list of signers of this letter, I can only say we have a similar situa-

I consider virtually every one of the signators friends of mine. I just hope that continues. I value their friendships, as much as I value my family, my home, my business and my community. And I wouldn't do anything to injure any of them.

My decision to join with the rest of the aldermen in agreeing to sell the landfill operation was based on years of study, reasonable knowledge of the situation, costs to be shared by all residents of Iowa Park, and my community's future.

I really don't know what more I, or the rest of the council, could do.







Syndrome examined at Methodist Hospital

Some people really can't stand the sight of blood.

If you pass out at the sight of blood, you may have something known to doctors as vaso vagal syndrome, a condition brought on by frightening, upsetting, exciting or otherwise stimulating circumstances.

"Unlike ventricular tachycardia or ventricular fibrillation, abnormally fast heart rates that are almost certain to case death, vaso vagal syndrome is not life-threatening," says Dr. Antonio Pacifico, director of the Electrophysiology Laboratory at The Methodist Hospital in Houston.

Vaso vagal syndrome commonly occurs when someone goes from a sitting to standing position. The brain tells the vessels carrying blood to the brain to dilate rather than constrict, causing the flow of blood to the brain to be cut off. Syncope, or passing out, occurs when the brain does not get the blood it needs.

Patients who experience unexplained episodes of passing out may be examined on a "tilt table." The patient is strapped to the table and given a medication similar to adrenalin, then the table is tilted to an upright position so the doctor can see if the patient will pass out.


If the patient passes out, the doctor may prescribe medication which

can prevent future episodes of this syndrome.

If the patient does not pass out on the tilt table, an electrophysiology study may be ordered to take a closer look at the patient's heart.

"It's important to recognize that not everyone who passes out is having a stroke or has heart disease," says Pacifico. "But anyone who has passed out and does not have a reasonable explanation for the episode should consult their doctor."

Vaso vagal syndrome seems to occur most often in people in their twenties. "But I have seen patients as young as 10 and as old as 70 who have this syndrome," says Pacifico.





Voter Registration Trivia that everyone should learn the answers, so they don't get upset on election day.

- 1. The difference between: a. Being qualified to Register.

- 7. Number 6 above is a TRUE statement; when is it NOT?
- 8. Approximately 63,000 new voter registration certificates will be mailed out the latter part of November 1993. They will be Yellow and White. They are valid if all the information on the face of the certificate is correctly maintained by the Voter. If not the certificates will come back to our office. Usually 12 to 14,000 of them by January 1st. These returns are automatically cancelled on August 16, 1994 if the Voter does not turn in a change to the Voter Registrar.



Bulldogs edge Hawks 18-14 in opener

Burkburnett's Bulldogs twice turned back Hawk scoring opportunities in the final moments of Friday's season opener in Hawk Stadium to record their fourth consecutive win over Iowa Park, 18-14.

A fumble and a poor punt gave Iowa Park opportunties at the Bulldog 22 yard line two times in the final 5:23 of the game. The Hawks made it to the nine on the first of the two possessions, and suffered a pass interception on the second.

Two of the game's touchdowns were scored by the defensive units. Burk lit up the scoreboard with 1:16 remaining in the first period, when a quick kick by Tony Lozipone was blocked and returned five yards into the end zone. Then, with 1:55 left in the first half, Mike Frazier picked up a Bulldog kickoff return fumble about the Burk 28 and ran it in for a touchdown.

Fans who went to the concession stand just before the halftime break likely missed Iowa Park's two touchdowns. Only 10 seconds ticked off the scoreboard clock between the two.

Trailing 12-0, Hawk runningback Don Ellis broke loose on a 65-yard scamper that stopped the clock with 2:05 remaining in the half. And when Frazier crossed the goal line with his TD, the clock showed 1:55 still remaining in the second quarter.




BRENT BROWN LANDS AFTER ONE-HANDED CATCH

Ellis, who skirted his left end on his long run and put a move on the safety at the Dog 45 to break free en route to the end zone, kicked both extra points that gave Iowa Park the lead until the fourth quarter.

The long run gave Ellis, a senior, a net 83 yards for the night on 13 carries. Jayson Houston picked up 17 yards on five plays and Chad Simpson averaged four yards on his two fourth-quarter carries.

Lozipone completed seven passes on 15 plays for 92 yards. Most of those receptions were to Brent Brown, who caught four for 57 yards. One of those receptions came when the senior leaped up between two defenders and made a one-hand catch.

Burk's first touchdown was set up by a punt to the Hawks' 24 yard line. Iowa Park lost 12 yards on two consecutive plays. At that point, Lozipone was instructed to quick kick out of trouble. But the Bulldogs weren't surprised, put on a hard rush and blocked the ball. Scotty Ellis picked it up on the five and scored the game's first touchdown. A bad snap on the extra point kick attempt held the score at 6-0.

The visitors then went ahead 12-0 just 23 seconds before the half when Burk's Bo Witherspoon snagged a pass between two Hawk defenders, who appeared to knock each other off the receiver, and scampered 76 yards to score. That extra point also failed.

Burk's final touchdown capped a 64-yard drive that was assessed by a 15-yard penalty against Iowa Park for pass interference. A 23-yard pass to the one yard line led to Kobe McFadden's touchdown. The Bulldogs tried a two-point conversion run, but failed.

Josh Johnson covered a Bulldog fumble, one of three made by Burk in the game, at the Bulldog 22. After driving to the nine, two losses set the ball back to the 16, where Burk took over possession with 3:15 remaining on the clock.

A big tackle by Keith Hoover and Tim Denton set the ball back on the 11 on third down. Burk's punt went high into the air and bounced in Iowa Park's favor, coming to rest on the 22 yard line.

With 1:50 left in the game, Lozipone attempted to roll to his right and force a pass at the sideline, but it was intercepted, killing Iowa Park's final shot at pulling the game out from defeat.

AUSTIN — U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison and her attorneys received "formal invitation" letters from a Travis County grand jury last week asking her to appear either Wednesday or Thursday to testify in an investigation of alleged improprieties during her tenure in the state treasurer's office.

Last week, Hutchison said she would not appear voluntarily before a grand jury, increasing speculation that she may be subpoenaed.

Earlier, Hutchison's attorneys said she will not appear because prosecutors reneged on an agreement to first meet with them outside the jury's presence to brief them on what the grand jury wants to know.

Hutchison lawyer John Dowd of Washington, D.C., said he and Hutchison attorney Jim Darnell and two prosecutors made the agreement Aug. 3.

But First Assistant Travis County District Attorney Steve McCleery said no such agreement had been made. District Attorney Ronnie Earle said in a statement issued last week, "On Aug. 11, Sen. Hutchison was asked through her lawyers to appear before the grand jury on any date between the week of Aug. 30th through Sept. 3 or Sept. 7th and 8th.

"This office has been informed repeatedly by Sen. Hutchison's lawyers that she will not appear voluntarily before the grand jury as requested."

On June 10 prosecutors and po-

lice raided the state treasury, seizing paper and computer records, and a grand jury investigation began over alleged improprieties during the senator's tenure as state treasurer. The grand jury is scheduled to disband by the end of September.

Harris Quits, Parker Runs

Republican Sen. O.H. "Ike" Harris of Dallas announced last week he would not seek reelection, but Sen. Carl Parker, D-Port Arthur, said he will be back for yet another campaign.

As dean of the Texas Senate, Harris, 61, was known as an effective legislator, but was criticized for helping special interests such as the insurance, liquor and horse racing industries.

After months of consideration, Parker, 59, decided to run for office again instead of returning full-time to his law practice.

Harris was elected to the Senate in a special election in 1967 after serving a term in the House.

Parker served in the House from 1963-76. He won a seat in the Senate in 1977. Parker has been noted for his strong stands in support of education.

Harris said he will return to his law practice, while pursuing legal

activities with the Legislature and state government.

Prison Chief to Quit

James Lynbaugh, executive director of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice, will resign this fall after six years on the job.

Lynbaugh, 53, who has faced increased opposition from Gov. Ann Richards' appointees to the criminal justice board, will go to work for the University of Texas Medical Branch.

Gov. Richards, an advocate of substance abuse treatment for convicts, said changes are needed in the administration of the prison system.

David Nunnelee, a spokesman for the prison system, said Lynbaugh will be taking a financial director's position at the UT Medical

Perot to Host Talk Show

Ross Perot who amassed record air time in his failed presidential bid last year, will host CNBC's "Talk Live" program on Sept. 25.

CNBC programming executive Andy Friendly said the cable network hopes Perot's appearance, his first as a host, might lead to a regular program featuring Perot.

Perot's guests on the hour-long show haven't been announced.

CNBC, owned by NBC, is a 24-hour cable television network features business and financial programs during the day and talk and call-in programs during prime

Meanwhile, Perot is suing the Dallas County appraisal district over the valuation of his North Dallas home.

The billionionaire has filed a lawsuit in state District Court contending that his mansion and the surrounding property are worth less than the \$13.1 million estimated by appraisal district.

Eckels to Challenge Mauro

State Rep. Robert Eckels, R-Houston, said last week he will run for Texas land commissioner, a post held by Democrat Garry Mauro since 1982. Mauro has said he will seek a fourth term.

Eckels, 36, said he will announce a steering committee for his campaign in a few weeks.

The Big Boys in Washington have really landed a blow below the tax belt. Many of the changes resulting from the new tax law have been made effective as of the beginning of this year. I can tolerate changes that tax our future income; however, taxing income that we've already earned and spent is hard

The new rates now range from 15% to 36% with an additional surtax of 10% applied to taxable income in excess of \$250,000. These rates are effective January 1, 1993; therefore, tax estimates and withholding may need to be adjusted for the remainder of the year to reflect these new rates. However, taxpayers can elect to pay their additional taxes resulting from the tax rate increases in three annual interest and penalty free installments beginning on or before April 15, 1994.

GOOD NEWS for ranchers and business owners. The first year expensing allowance of equipment, breeding herds, etc. has been increased from \$10,000 to \$17,500.

MORE GOOD NEWS! Maximum capital gains rate remains at 28%.

BEWARE! Beginning in 1994, up to 85% of social security benefits will be subject to tax if provisional income exceeds \$44,000 for marrieds or \$34,000 for singles. Non-taxable income will be used to figure provisional income.

BAD NEWS! Tax rate for personal service corporations is now 35% effective January 1, 1993. MORE BAD NEWS! High wage earners and self-employed individuals get popped with additional social security tax. Effective January 1, 1994 the medicare portion of the social security tax is applied to all wages including self employment income. It appears that the sky's the limit with this tax. Not surprising to any of us, the new tax law is already referred to as the largest tax increase in history.

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GARDENING HINTS

County Agent - Horticulture Lawns need special care now to ensure weed-free, healthy turf this winter and next spring.

Home and commercial property owners should begin applying preemergent herbicides now to prevent cool-season annuals such as henbit and annual winter grasses from invading lawn areas.

Pre-emergent herbicides properly applied and timed will prevent certain weed seeds from germinating. Existing weeds are not controlled with preemergents, however, these herbicides do form a barrier in the upper level of the soil which inhibits weed seed emergence.

Apply pre-emergentherbicides by Sept. 5 in the Texoma area for best results.

Certain precautions must be kept in mind to safely utilize pre-emergents:

- 1. Only well-established lawns which are included on the product label should receive a pre-emergent treat-
- 2. If you are planning on overseeding with rye grass or establishing a new fescue lawn from seed this fall, do not use any pre-emergent. The herbicide will halt rye grass and fescue seed from germinating.
- 3. Apply pre-emergent herbicides according to label rates. Most people tend to over-apply pre-emergent and lawn damage results.
- 4. Apply pre-emergent uniformly over the lawn area and water the granular material into the soil if natural rainfall is not expected in the near

Most commonly you will find preemergent herbicides in a granular form. These products are easily applied with a common broadcast type fertilizer spreader.

Commercial lawn care companies and pest control operators also offer custom applications of pre-emergents if you are unable to make the application yourself.

Pre-emergent herbicides are available at local garden centers, pest control outlets and feed stores.



BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION **NOVEMBER 2, 1993**

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 9 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Texas Legislature to provide for the issuance of bonds for the state financing of start-up costs for historically underutilized businesses. The amendment provides that the legislature by law may establish a Texas historically underutilized business capital growth and start-up fund. The money in the fund may be used without further appropriation and only for a program established by the legislature to aid in the start-up costs of a historically underutilized business, as defined by the legislature. To carry out the program, the legislature may issue up to \$50 million of general obligation bonds to provide funding. The legislature may require review and approval of the issuance of bonds, the use of the bond proceeds, or of the rules adopted by an agency to govern use of the bond proceeds. Bonds authorized by the amendment constitute a general obligation of the state.

on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for the issuance of \$50 million of general obligation bonds for the recovery and further development of the state's economy and for increasing job opportunities and other benefits for Texas residents through state financing of the start-up costs of historically underutilized businesses."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 86 proposes a constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature, by general law, to exempt from ad valorem taxation all or part of real and personal property used, constructed, acquired, or installed wholly or partly to meet or exceed rules or regulations adopted by any environmental protection agency of the United States, Texas, or a political subdivision of this state for the prevention, monitoring, control, or reduction of air, water, or land pollution. The amendment applies to real and personal property used as a facility, device, or method for the control of air, water, or land pollution that would otherwise be taxable for the first time on or after January 1, 1994. The amendment does not authorize the exemption from ad valorem taxation of real or personal property that was subject to a tax abatement agreement executed before January 1, 1994.

The proposed amendment will appear

"The constitutional amendment to promote the reduction of pollution and to encourage the preservation of jobs by authorizing the exemption from ad valorem taxation of real and personal property used for the control of air, water, or land pollution."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 3 proposes a constitutional amendment to clear land titles in which the State of Texas relinquishes and releases any claim of sovereign ownership or title to an undivided one-third interest in and to the lands and minerals within the Shelby, Frazier, and McCormick League (now located in Fort Bend and Austin counties) arising out of the interest in that league originally granted under the Mexican Colonization Law of 1823 to John McCormick on or about July 24, 1824, and subsequently voided by the governing body of Austin's Original Colony on or about December 15, 1830. Title to such interest in the lands and minerals is confirmed to the owners of the remaining interests in such lands and minerals.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the clearing of land titles by the release of a state claim in a fractional interest, arising out of the voiding of an interest under a Mexican land grant, to the owners of certain property in Fort Bend and Austin

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 49 proposes a constitutional amendment that would prohibit a state personal income tax without voter approval and would dedicate the proceeds of any income tax, if enacted, to property tax relief and education. The amendment provides that a general law enacted by the legislature that imposes a tax on the net incomes of natural persons, including a person's share of partnership and unincorporated association income, must provide that the portion of the law imposing the tax not take effect until approved by a majority of the registered voters voting in a statewide referendum held on the question of imposing the tax. The referendum must specify the rate of the tax that will apply to taxable income.

The amendment also provides that a general law enacted by the legislature that increases the rate of the tax, or changes the tax in a manner that results in an increase in the combined income tax liability of all persons subject to the tax, te effect until approved by a majority of the registered voters voting in a statewide referendum held on the question of increasing the income tax. The referendum must specify the manner in which the proposed law would increase the combined tax liability of all persons subject to the tax. The legislature may repeal, or amend without increasing, a tax approved by the voters without submitting the amendment or the repeal to the voters. If the legislature repeals a tax approved by the voters, the legislature may only reenact the tax without voter approval if the effective date of the reenactment of the tax is within one year of the effective date of the repeal of the tax.

The amendment also provides that, in

the first year in which an income tax is imposed, and during the first year of any increase in the tax, not less than twothirds of all net revenues from the tax shall be used to reduce the rate of ad valorem maintenance and operation taxes levied for the support of primary and secondary education. In subsequent years, not less than two-thirds of all net revenues of the tax shall be used to continue such ad valorem tax relief. The net revenues of the tax remaining after the dedication of money for reduction of ad valorem maintenance and operation taxes shall be used for support of education. The maximum rate at which a school district may impose ad valorem maintenance and operation taxes is reduced by an amount equal to one cent per \$100 valuation for each one cent per \$100 valuation that the school district's ad valorem maintenance and operation tax is reduced by the minimum amount of money dedicated under the amendment, provided that a school district may subsequently increase the maximum ad valorem maintenance and operation tax rate if the increased maximum rate is approved by a majority of the voters of the school district voting at an election called and held for that purpose. The portions of the amendment relating to dedicating tax revenues to reduce the rate of ad valorem maintenance and operation taxes apply on or after the first January 1 after the date on which an income tax takes effect, except that if the income tax begins to apply on a January 1, the amendment applies to ad valorem maintenance and operation taxes levied on or after that date.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment prohibiting a personal income tax without voter approval and, if an income tax is enacted, dedicating the revenue to education and limiting the rate of local school taxes.

PROPOSITION NO. 5

ON THE BALLOT Senate Joint Resolution 18 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the legislature to prescribe the qualifications of sheriffs. Currently, the constitution authorizes the legislature to prescribe the duties, perquisites, and fees of office, but not the qualifications for the office of sheriff.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to prescribe the qualifications of sheriffs.

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 21 proposes a constitutional amendment that would abolish the office of county surveyor in Jackson County. The amendment also provides for the powers, duties, and functions of the county surveyor to be transferred to the county officer designated by the commissioners court.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment abolishing the office of county surveyor in Jackson County."

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 57 proposes a constitutional amendment that repeals article XII, section 6, of the Texas Constitution, which currently provides that no corporation shall issue stock or bonds except for money paid, labor done, or property actually received, and that all fictitious increase of stock or indebtedness shall be void.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment repealing certain restrictions on the ability of corporations to raise capital."

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 22 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the commissioners court of McLennan County to call an election to abolish the office of county surveyor. The office of county surveyor will be abolished if a majority of the qualified voters of McLennan County voting on the question favor the abolition. If the office of county surveyor is abolished, the amendment requires the maps, field notes, and other records in the custody of the county surveyor to be transferred to the county clerk of McLennan County. After abolition, the amendment also grants the commissioners court of McLennan County the authority to employ or contract with a qualified person to perform any of the functions that would have been performed by the county surveyor if the office had not been abolished.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to abolish the office of county surveyor in McLennan County."

PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 19 proposes an amendment to article VIII, section 13 of the Texas Constitution that would modify the provisions for the redemption of real property sold at a tax sale. The amendment deletes current language in article VIII, section 13 that allows the legislature to provide for the sale of property without trial to pay for delinquent taxes. It also states that the deed to the new owner vests a good and perfect title subject only to redemption as set out in this amendment or impeachment for fraud. Language is added limiting application of the current two-year redemption period to former owners of residence homesteads and land designated for agricultural use sold for unpaid taxes. When property is sold as the result of a suit to enforce collection of unpaid taxes, the amendment would allow the legislature to limit redemption to property used as a residence homestead or designated for agricultural use at the time the suit was filed. The amendment creates a second type of redemption for former owners of real property when property is neither a residence homestead, nor designated for agricultural use. These owners would have a six-month period in which to redeem their property by paying the amount of money paid for the property, including the Tax Deed Recording Fee, all taxes, penalties, interest, and costs paid plus an amount not exceeding 25 percent of the aggregate total. The amendment applies to redemption of properties sold at a tax sale for which the purchaser's deed is filed on or after January 1, 1994. For redemption of properties sold at a tax sale for which the purchaser's deed was filed before January 1, 1994, the former law is applicable and remains in effect.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to modify the provisions for the redemption of real property sold at a tax

PROPOSITION NO. 10 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 34 proposes a constitutional amendment that adds a new section 49-b-2 to article III of the Texas Constitution. This new section provides that, in addition to the general obligation bonds authorized to be issued and sold by the Veterans' Land Board (the "Board") by sections 49-b (\$950 million) and 49-b-1 (\$1.3 billion) of article III, the board may provide for, issue, and sell general obligation bonds of the state in an amount not to exceed \$750 million to provide financing to Texas veterans. \$250 million of the bonds authorized by this new section shall be used to augment the Veterans' Land Fund (the "Land Fund"). The Land Fund shall be used by the Board to purchase lands situated in Texas owned by the United States government, an agency of the United States government, the State of Texas, a political subdivision or agency of the State of Texas, or a person, firm, or corporation. The lands shall be sold to veterans in quantities, on terms, at prices, and at fixed, variable, floating, or other rates of interest determined by the Board. Lands in the Land Fund that are offered for sale to veterans and that are not sold may be sold or resold to the purchasers in quantities, terms, prices, and rates of interest determined by the Board. New section 49-b-2 creates the Vet-

erans' Housing Assistance Fund II (the "Housing Fund II"), and \$500 million of the general obligation bonds authorized by the section shall be used for the Housing Fund II. The Housing Fund II is a separate and distinct fund from the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund (the "Housing Fund") established under section 49-b-1 of article III. Money in the Housing Fund II shall be administered by the Board and shall be used to make home mortgage loans to veterans for housing within this state in quantities, on terms, and at fixed, variable, floating, or other rates of interest determined by the Board. The principal of, and interest on. the general obligation bonds authorized by this section for the benefit of the Housing Fund II shall be paid out of the money of the Housing Fund II. The principal of, and interest on, the general obligation bonds authorized by section 49-b-1 of article III for the benefit of the Housing Fund shall be paid out of money in the Housing Fund. If there is not enough money in the Land Fund, the Housing Fund, or the Housing Fund II, as the case may be, available to pay the principal of, and interest on, the general obligation bonds authorized by this section or by sections 49-b or 49-b-1 of article III, there is appropriated out of the first money coming into the treasury in each fiscal year an amount that is sufficient to pay the principal of, and interest on, the general obligation bonds that mature or become due during that fiscal year.

If the Board determines that assets from the Land Fund, the Housing Fund, or the Housing Fund II are not required for purposes of the fund, the Board may transfer the assets to another of those funds or use the assets to secure revenue bonds issued by the Board. The revenue bonds shall be special obligations of the Board and payable only from and secured by receipts of the funds, assets transferred from the funds, and other revenues as determined by the Board and shall not constitute indebtedness of the State of Texas or the Board. The Board may issue revenue bonds from time to time, which bonds may not exceed an aggregate principal amount that the Board determines can be fully retired from the receipts of the funds. The revenue bonds shall be sold in forms, denominations, and in installments, and bear a rate or rates of interest as the Board determines.

The general obligation bonds authorized to be issued by the Board by this section or be sections 49-b and 49-b-1 of article III shall be issued and sold in forms and denominations, on terms, at times, in the manner, at places, in installments, and shall bear a rate or rates of interest the Board determines. The bonds shall be incontestable after execution by the Board, approval by the Attorney General of Texas, and delivery to the purchaser.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing issuance of \$750 million in general obligation bonds to augment the Veterans' Land Fund and the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund and to fund the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund II."

PROPOSITION NO. 11 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 31 proposes a constitutional amendment relating to the duties of trustees of local retirement systems which provide retirement and related disability and death benefits for public officers and employees and that do not belong to a statewide retirement system. The amendment provides that the

board of trustees of such a system shall (1) administer the system of benefits; (2) hold the assets of the system for the exclusive purposes of providing benefits to participants and their beneficiaries and defraying reasonable expenses of administering the system; and (3) select legal counsel and an actuary and adopt sound actuarial assumptions to be used by the

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing that the trustees of a local public pension system must administer the system for the benefit of the system's participants and beneficiaries."

PROPOSITION NO. 12 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 23 proposes a constitutional amendment providing that any person accused of a violent or sexual offense committed while under the supervision of a criminal justice agency of this state or a political subdivision of this state for a prior felony may, after a hearing and evidence substantially showing the guilt of the accused, be denied bail pending trial. If the accused is not, however, accorded a trial within 60 days from the time of his incarceration upon the accusation or indictment, the order denying bail shall be set aside unless a continuance is obtained upon the request of the accused. In the amendment, the term "violent offense" means murder, aggravated assault (if a deadly weapon was used or exhibited during the commission of the assault), aggravated kidnapping, or aggravated robbery. The term "sexual offense" means aggravated sexual assault, sexual assault, or indecency with a

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment permitting the denial of bail to certain persons charged with certain violent or sexual offenses committed while under the supervision of a criminal justice agency of the state or a political subdivision of the state.'

PROPOSITION NO. 13 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 13 proposes a constitutional amendment that amends article VII, section 17(a), of the Texas Constitution to provide that, of the \$100 million currently appropriated by that section for the use of public institutions of higher education during each fiscal year, those institutions may also utilize this money to pay for acquiring, constructing, or equipping or for major repair or rehabilitation of buildings, facilities, other permanent improvements, or capital equipment used jointly for educational and general activities and for auxiliary enterprises to the extent of their use for educational and general activities. For the five-year period beginning on September 1, 2000, and for each five-year period thereafter, the legislature, during a regular session that is nearest, but preceding, a five-year period may, by a twothirds vote of the membership of each house, increase the amount of the \$100 million constitutional appropriation for the five-year period. The amendment also reflects name changes that have been made to some of the institutions of higher education for which such funding is available. The amendment adds the Texas State Technical College System to those institutions eligible to receive such funding, but limits its allocation of the annual appropriation to 2.2 percent of the total appropriation each fiscal year. The amendment also provides that each governing board authorized to participate in the distribution of money under article III, section 17, may also issue bonds and notes for the purposes of refunding bonds or notes issued under that section or prior law for the purposes of acquiring capital equipment, library books and library materials, paying for acquiring, constructing, or equipping or for major repair or rehabilitation of buildings, facilities, other permanent improvements, or capital equipment used jointly for educational and general activities and for auxiliary enterprises to the extent of their use for educational and general activities. The amendment deletes language in article III, section 17, which authorizes the legislature to designate a single agency to issue such bonds or notes in lieu of the governing bodies, and to transfer to that agency the authority to collect and pledge money to the payment of such bonds and notes as directed by the governing body of each eligible institution. Funds appropriated under article III, section 17, may not be used for the purpose of construct-

ing, equipping, repairing, or rehabilitat-ing buildings or other permanent im-

provements that are to be used only for student housing, intercollegiate athletics, or auxiliary enterprises.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment relating to the amount and expenditure of certain constitutionally dedicated funding for public institutions of higher education."

PROPOSITION NO. 14 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 45 proposes a constitutional amendment that adds a new subsection (e) to article III, section 49-h, of the Texas Constitution. The new subsection provides that, in addition to the amounts authorized by subsections (a) (\$500 million), (c) (\$400 million), and (d) (\$1.1 billion) of section 49-h, the legislature may authorize the issuance of up to \$1 billion in general obligation bonds and may use the proceeds of the bonds for acquiring, constructing, or equipping new corrections institutions, including youth corrections institutions, and mental health and mental retardation institutions and for major repair or renovation of existing facilities of those corrections and mental health and mental retardation facilities. The amendment also provides that the provisions of subsection (a) of section 49-h, relating to the review and approval of bonds, and the provisions of subsection (b) of section 49-h, relating to the status of the bonds as a general obligation of the state and to the manner in which the principal and interest on the bonds are paid, apply to bonds authorized by this amendment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of up to \$1 billion in general obligation bonds payable from the general revenues of the state for projects relating to facilities of corrections and mental health and mental retardation institutions.

PROPOSITION NO. 15 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 37 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the county commissioners court of a county to call an election to abolish the office of county surveyor. The office of county surveyor is abolished if a majority of voters of the county voting in the election approve the measure. If the office of county surveyor is abolished, the maps, field notes, and other records of the county surveyor are transferred to the county officer or employee designated by the commissioners court.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to permit the voters of a county to decide, at an election called by the commissioners court, whether to abolish the office of county surveyor in the county.'

PROPOSITION NO. 16 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 44 proposes an amendment to article III, section 49-i(b) of the Texas Constitution, which currently limits the principal amount of bonds outstanding at one time for the Texas agricultural fund to \$25 million and for the rural microenterprise development fund to \$5 million. The amendment would raise the principal amount limit for the Texas agricultural fund to \$100 million. The amendment would also make the principal amount limit for each fund apply to the total principal amounts of both bonds and notes issued or sold rather than just the principal amounts of bonds outstanding at one time.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing up to a total of \$100 million in bonds and notes to be issued or sold to finance the Texas agricultural fund for providing financial assistance to develop, increase, improve, or expand the production, processing, marketing, or export of crops or products grown or produced primarily in this state by agricultural businesses domiciled in the state."






