Trustees agree to adjust tuition for CV transfers

IOWA PARK, WICHITA COUNTY, TEXAS 76367

In a relatively short regular session of the Iowa Park School Board Monday evening, trustees voted to accept payments received on a tuition agreement with the City View ISD for the 1992-93 school year.

Superintendent Glen Mitchell asked that the board accept City View's payment at fifty percent of the total tuition fee for the three City View students who enrolled at Iowa Park after January 1.

Apparently, there was a misunderstanding regarding the adjustment of rates for City View student transfers during the 1992-93 school year.

A written agreement for the 1992-93 school year that was approved by both school districts called for City View to pay Iowa Park CISD 60 percent of the tuition fee in January and the remaining 40 percent in June, plus any new students enrolled since January 1.

When City View ISD was billed by Iowa Park in June, the additional three students who had enrolled after January 1, were included. City View was billed the full-year amount of \$1,500 per student. Delbert Mahan, City View superintendent, said he interpreted a portion of the previous contract to mean an adjustment would be made in the actual fee.

The board accepted the payments made by City View ISD as full compensation for the 1992-93 school year. The total amount of funds receive from City View ISD for the school year was \$105,750.

A new tuition agreement between the school districts has since gone into

The new agreement entails actual tuition of \$188.89 per student on the last school day of each month, from September through May. City View ISD will be billed from those figures at the end of each semester. An additional monthly fee of \$26.98 will be charged for each period that a City View ISD student is enrolled in a special education class, and will be included in the final tuition billing.

In other business, trustees accepted a bid of \$19,012 from Patton Education Specialists, Inc. of Wichita Falls for high school library card catalog and circulation system hardware.

The bid includes one file server, network wiring, one librarian workstation, six student workstations and two printers.

High school principal Richard

Davis told board members that this equipment will complete the high school library, with the exception of

Board members also accepted a bid of \$5,850 from L.A. Environmental, Inc. of Dallas for the removal and dispoal of asbestos-containing insulation from the junior high school gymnasium.

The job is to begin Dec. 20 and is expected to take one day.

During the superintendent's report, Mitchell announced that enrollment is down 12 students from this time last year. Kidwell Elementary reflected the only drop in enrollment in the district, down 37 students from this time last year.

Mitchell also announced a "Real World Forum," scheduled for 7 p.m. Thursday at the junior high library.

The forum is set up to exchange ideas on what high school graduates should know and be able to do in the work place.

Assistant Superintendent Robert Palmer told trustees that the new high school special education facility is 75 percent complete, and should be ready to move in to by the start of the second

Iowa Park is growing

Iowa Park continues to grow.

The city council Monday night approved annexation of a tract of land in the north part of town, and held the first of two public hearings after receiving a petition to take in three lots in the south part.

The first portion of the new Park Place Addition, north of Mary Drive, was approved for annexation. That tract measures 9.758 acres.

At the first hearing concerning Park Place annexation, some aldermen suggested a larger tract be brought in, cutting down on the number of future annexations as the project grew.

However, Tommy Key, one of two partners in the development, said it would "not be in the interest of either party" to bring in more property at this

Leader's delivery to be late this week

A change in which Veteran's Day will be observed has caused the Iowa Park Leader to be delivered a day late this week.

He said the paper normally is printed in time for delivery on Wednesday, whenever mails are not delivered on a Thursday holiday.

The Leader will print a day early in two weeks, because Thanksgiving is observed on Thursday. However, next week's issue will not be affected and will be in the mail next Thursday.

presently in the city, petitioned for his property to be annexed.

During the required public hearing on the proposed annexation, there was no opposition to the request. The second hearing will be held at the council's next scheduled meeting, on Monday, Nov. 22.

Aldermen accepted a letter from Parker Square Bank, which offered an interest rate of 4.98 percent to finance a \$1 million bond which will be used for two major water and sewer projects.

The proposal, which would be financed over a 12-year period, would save the city as much as \$5,000, aldermen were informed.

The money will primarily be used to construct a new water tower north of U.S. 287, on land just east of Park Tank Trucking Service, and also to lay larger sewer lines in areas where problems have developed due to continuing growth and flow demand.

Aldermen voted to accept the lowest of 13 bids submitted for the janitorial service at city hall, police station, library and Recreational Activities Center.

Pro Clean submitted a bid of \$195 per week, with an alternate to charge \$25 extra should the RAC require a third cleaning, instead of the usual twice-weekly cleaning the other buildings will receive.

The highest of the bids opened was for a weekly charge of \$701, with \$105 for the extra RAC cleaning.

Aldermen also agreed to again join with the City of Wichita Falls in a group purchase program to buy a new police cruiser. Four Star Motors of Henrietta was the winning bidder this year, and the cruiser, which was included in this year's city budget, will cost \$12,953.

The city has purchased other motor equipment jointly through Wichita Falls, sharing in the volume-purchase savings.

Also approved was a proposal to advertise for the purchase of a brush chipper machine.

Street projects for next summer were tentatively approved by aldermen, including those where asphalt overlay will be applied, surfaces being coated with slurry, valley gutters installed and also alley returns built.

Those blocks designated to have asphalt overlays include the 500 block of West Texas, 100 through 400 blocks of South Jackson, and 600 and 700 blocks of Cornelia.

To receive slurry applications will be the 100-600 blocks of West Bank, 100-1000 East Bank, 100-800 West Cornelia, 100-400 South Colorado, 300-1400 West Smith, 100-400 East Pecan, 100-400 West Pecan, 100-400 West Daisy, and 500-800 blocks of South Park.

Valley gutters, which are concrete replacing asphalt for drainage purposes, will be at Cornelia and Fourth, Louisa and Van Horn, Lincoln and Fourth, Sunset and Westridge and Rebecca and Third.

The alley returns, which surfaces alleys where they intersect with streets and prevent erosion on the slopes, will be on three locations on West Garden, two on West Valley, 1200 South Park, 1300 Emma, 900 Lincoln, 200 Joy, and two sides on North First.

Mayor Wayne House read and presented a copy of a resolution to Optimist Club president Lisa Bushfield, concerning Youth Appreciation Week, Nov. 8-13.

Educators want opinions

What should high school graduates know and be able to do upon completion of their high school edu-

A 20-minute video tape prepared by the Texas Education Agency will be shown at the first of the meeting.

Following that, discussion groups will be identifying skills and knowledge they feel high school graduates should know and be able to do.

Near-centurian recalls past

Almost three-quarters of a century have passed since a pretty, slender, dark haired school-marm set foot on soil in the busy little oil town of Iowa Park.

It didn't take long for Perle E. Burkhead Pace to know just what her daddy was talking about when he told her he didn't think she should seek a teaching position in an oil town.

He had told the "proper" young Dallasite of the wild, rough and inconvenient conditions she would find He knew something about the ways of oil towns, he said.

Perle had graduated Southern Methodist University in 1919, with the first class to spend all four years at the new college.

She taught one year at Tulia and decided to return to SMU to begin work for her Masters degree. When school was out for the summer she returned to her parents' home in Dal-

In the meantime she learned the tuition and other costs had risen at the college and that she didn't have enough money to enroll, so she decided to teach another year.

One morning as she was reading The Dallas Morning News she noticed a classified ad for teachers of English, Math, History and Science in Iowa Park.

That was just what Perle wanted---- to teach history and science, so she answered the ad. But, did she really want to come to Iowa Park after what her dad had told her?

She made her decision and told her dad she had run out of money and that she could not be choosy if she wanted to return to college and get her Masters degree, even if it did mean coming to an oil town.

Perle's eyes sparkled as she laughed and said, "In the early days I acquired the nickname, 'Spitfire'.

She received a quick answer from the newly elected superintendent of

schools in Iowa Park, W.R. Bradford. He asked for her credentials and immediately after receiving them he notified her that she had been elected to teach. She was hired to teach four classes of history and one class of science in high school.

Perle possessed a rather adventuresome spirit and became thrilled at the prospect of teaching in an oil town, but primarily, she was thrilled because she could save her money and go back to college.

However, that plan never materialized because in her second year here she found something that interested her even more than the Master's degree. His name was Thomas J. Pace.

"I arrived in Wichita Falls on the Fort Worth and Denver train from Dallas in early September 1921, and was met by Mr. Bradford and several teachers," Perle said.

The teachers always attended a training session, known as the Teachers Institute in Wichita Falls, for a week before the beginning of school. By the end of the training session, "my excitement was at a high pitch," she commented.

As soon as the session was over, Bradford returned for the teachers. "That was the first indication I had of just what to expect of the roads around Iowa Park. He came to get us in his Model-T Ford sedan, but that was the roughest ride I ever had. It was always an ordeal to go to Wichita Falls until they got the road paved," Mrs. Pace continued.

She went on to explain that oilfield equipment had cut deep ruts in the country roads, making for a very rough and bumpy ride almost anywhere in or around Iowa Park.

There was not a lot of paving in the town of approximately 2,000 people in 1921. "And that included the men working in the oil fields and those who had come to make a 'fast' buck" Perle said.

"Mr. Bradford found good homes

where the teachers could room and have their meals," Perle said.

It didn't take long for her to go through the learning process of living in an oil town. "I was beginning to feel like a real pioneer by the time I looked around our room. My roommate was Edna Rather, the English teacher.

"Now, remember there was no running water to the houses and no city sewer system. I found the landlord had already drawn water for us from the well in the back yard of the house and had poured it into a large two-gallon bucket. It even had a dipper," Mrs. Pace continued.

She said, "One of the first things I learned was to heat my bath water on the stove and carry it to my room

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
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Byrd leads Hawks past Bearcats

Iowa Park's Hawks closed out the 1993 season with a 55-6 drubbing of the Henrietta Bearcats.

And, for senior tailback Scott Byrd, it will be a game he'll always remember. After missing all of his junior year and the first two games this season with reoccurring broken bones in his feet, Byrd scored touchdowns on five of the 13 times he was handed the ball, and accounted for 145 net vards rushing.

Actually, when the game was less than two minutes old, it looked like the Hawks were going to have 55 points before halftime.

The Bearcats took the opening kickoff, and on the third play from scrimmage, Bowie Farr and Josh Johnson hit the quarterback hard enough to send the ball bouncing into Henrietta's end zone. A Bearcat covered it for a safety, giving the Hawks a 2-0 lead only 1:18 deep in the game.


Then, after Michael Frazier had returned the following kickoff to the 'Cats' 43, Don Ellis bounced outside left end and raced untouched into the end zone. Jayson Houston's attempt to run for a two-point conversion failed, but Iowa Park held an 8-0 lead with 10:27 remaining in the first period.

But the Hawks wouldn't score again until the final 29 seconds of the opening quarter. Tony Lozipone set the touchdown up by intercepting a Bearcat pass on Henrietta's 46, and returning it to the 26. On the next play, Byrd rounded the left end and scored. Don Ellis' kick for the extra point was good, making the score 15-0.

Neither team was able to mount a sustained drive in the second quarter.

But the Hawks sent Byrd into the end zone four plays after the second half's kickoff, from 15 yards out. Brent Brown had returned the kickoff to the 50, and Houston advanced the ball 15 yards on the first play. Henrietta was assessed a 15-yard penalty at the end of Houston's run. Three plays later, Byrd's run and Ellis' kick raised the score to 22-0.

Byrd was to score twice more before the third quarter ended, on runs of 22 and 24 yards. After his 22-yarder, Ellis suffered his only missed extra point kick attempt of the entire season, when it sailed to the right of the standard. His kick was sure after the third, however, and the Hawks led 35-0 with 13:59 remaining in the game.

The following kickoff brought about a frustrating situation for Brown, the team and fans. Henrietta's receiver allowed the ball to bounce off his chest, hit the ground and up into Brown's hands. He raced into the end zone, believing he had scored an easy touchdown. But an inadvertant whistle by an official, who explained he had made a mistake, gave Henrietta possession at the Bearcat 30.

Henrietta made its only series of pass completions, and marched steadily down the field, capping the drive with a 12-yard pass. The extra point failed.

Frazier returned the following kickoff to the 'Cat 38, and four plays later, Lozipone raced 28 yards around right end for his evening's touchdown.

Four plays after the following kickoff, Byrd intercepted a Bearcat pass, and five plays later, racked up his fifth TD of the evening. All five were around left end.


Ellis capped his final game as a senior with his second touchdown of the game, a four-yard scamper over left tackle.

Hawk coaches gave a couple of their seniors their wish. Linebacker Jason Maxwell was allowed to carry the ball on one play, and picked up a yard. Then, after Byrd's final touchdown, Lozipone was told he could attempt the extra point kick. But it hardly got off the ground.

For the second consecutive week, the game was played in cold and windy conditions. But, unlike the previous week, Friday night was at least snowless.

The win gave Iowa Park a season record of 4-6, and 2-3 in district, while Henrietta finished 1-9 and 0-5.

without burning myself. And, to pour it into the large white china bowl on the washstand, using water from the nearby pitcher, if it needed cooling. With the handy bar of soap near the wash bowl, everything was ready for my 'sponge bath'".

She looked around the room and saw they had been furnished a "white American vessel", more commonly called a "slop jar", which they could

Perle was amused as she related that she and her roommate took turns singing while the "vessel" was used at night, because of the thin walls between the bedrooms.

The little wooden privy, located at the far end of the lot, that was furnished with a Sears Roebuck catalog, was used in the day time. But, Perle said, "My roommate and I could adjust very well to these primitive conditions and look forward to the next year when Iowa Park would have running water in the house and a city sewer

Perle remembered that at their first faculty meeting they learned the high school must attain its affiliation or accreditation. At the time they did not realize how much work by the teachers and high school students would be required.

They signed to teach a ninemonth school term for \$125 per month. They were also required at that time to sign another agreement.

"We were required to sign not to take more than one night "off" during the school week, to spend our time preparing lessons, grading papers, attending school meetings or programs. We also had to promise we would not dance," Mrs. Pace said.

They soon found out they didn't have any spare time because it was taken up with the work of obtaining accreditation. That may have been a built-in way of being sure they weren't able to go anywhere on school nights.

On the weekends the teachers had a variety of things they could do. But, teachers activities were closely watched by Bradford and school board members.

One weekend in particular stands out in Perle's mind. She related the incident, "All eight teachers in the school system and their dates were invited to attend a party at Sunshine

"When we arrived at the party we found beer iced down in tubs and the guests were 'wild oilfield' dancing. Since we had signed our agreement not to dance, we did not tarry long after we realized this was not our kind of entertainment."

They found out news traveled fast. Perle said the board had an early session the next morning and the teachers were all called into Bradford's office.

"But, Mr. Bradford told us he knew wedidn't know the kind of event that party would be, but that in the future we must be more careful about the invitations we accepted," Perle

Perle has good reason to remember the first PTA meeting after she came here. It was a pie supper and in those days people parked their cars near the school building. "I noticed that many of the young men were buying pies and then I noticed they were slicing them and throwing them on the cars," she related.

The next morning she was called to Bradford's office to witness punishment he was to give 14 of them who had thrown pies. He used the strap on

She had been asked to be "acting principal" the first year. In that capacity she was asked to witness the application of the strap. "It seemed awful for him to have to do this. But he had to do some things he didn't want to do because he had to enforce good discipline (almost unheard of now). That was one of the things that our affiliation depended on," Perle explained. "Believe me, we had good discipline, which is absolutely necessary if one is to teach effectively."

The teachers were expected to behave properly, but so were the stu-

Teachers had to arrive promptly at 8:15 a.m. and worked until nearly dark. "After classes dismissed at 3:30 p.m. we stayed in our rooms to plan the next day's lesson and help those students who were there to receive help, and to 'keep in' those who had caused discipline problems. After supper we worked at home on grading papers and notebooks until 11 o'clock or after," Perle said.

Because they were working for affiliation, many notebooks, themes, test papers and semester exam papers were sent periodically to the committee on affiliation at Austin.

"Most of the students cooperated with the high school teachers. We had to make hard assignments. It was tense times for both teachers and pupils, but the students realized what was at stake. We all dreaded the unexpected visits several times a year from the state committee," Perle said.

She said her greatest problem was teaching physiology without a well equipped laboratory. "I would send two boys out to kill rabbits and bring them to the lab so the students could dissect them, study their organs and compare them to those of humans. Because of the dissecting, my class was very popular with the boys. Some of the girls would get sick and some just said, 'I can't take this'," Perle

"I received affiliation in my three history classes and two science classes. By the end of two years we had received 16 units of affiliation. This meant Iowa Park High School graduates would receive diplomas

which would entitle them to enter any state college or university in Texas without having to take entrance exams," Perle said, adding "there was a lot of celebrating among students, teachers and Mr. Bradford. "

Perle mused, "Since then the ideals of these diligent and dedicated predecessors have been perpetuated by those who have come after."

The second year Perle taught in Iowa Park she stayed with Lottie Lochridge and her husband.

"As we were sitting on her front porch one evening, we saw a Mr. Tom Pace drive by. Lottie exclaimed, There goes the most eligible man in town'," Perle related.

I had known his brother, Caperton, at SMU, but he was called into service in WWII.

Perle had never had to sit and wait for someone to call her for a date. There were so many men in town that sometimes they would go to the school to get a date with the teachers to beat someone else having a chance to ask them out.

She remembered that Edna Love first introduced her to Thomas Pace and he became one of her "boy friends". "But I 'played the field' before I settled on Tom," Perle laughed. She commented that she dated the late Carroll Duke who old-timers here will remember. "But I was very particular who I dated".

After Perle and Tom started going together he began taking her to school, especially during inclement weather. "I enjoyed going out with many available young men, but my school work always came first.

"I soon found out I had a lot in common with Tom. He was a member of the Methodist Church as was I, and

he was close to his brother Caperton, he had taught school, and the way things worked out, I gradually went with Tom more than any other man".

She recalled one time when the teachers and their boy friends went for an outing to Medicine Park, accompanied by Mamie Dale as a chaperone.

Laughing, Perle said, "It began raining on us before we got to Lawton. The old Model-T Ford truck Tom was driving would hit 'high center'. The other men would get out and pick the truck up off high center by the four fenders. We finally spent the night in Lawton."

Perle said, "Tom finally asked me to marry him, and as was the custom in those days, he went to Dallas to ask my parents for me. They were pleased with my choice, so we were married a year later, on Dec. 26, 1923."

In addition to Perle being called a "spitfire", whether she deserved the moniker or not, she also displayed a certain dauntlessness (which she still shows today) when she decided to have a tonsilectomy during the Christmas holidays from school. She had her tonsils out on Tuesday and was married on Thursday.

She went back to teaching, but needed more rest and Tom thought she should resign, so she did after finishing that semester.

Pace was a native of the Valley View area, his first home was a halfdugout on the Pace farm near the Big Wichita River.

His parents encouraged their children to receive as much education as possible to prepare for life. Tom received his degree from Southwestem University.

After receiving his degree he was principal and coach of Belton High School three years. He also served in WWII and was commissioned second lieutenant. When the oil boom hit Iowa Park, Tom purchased a drilling rig and was in the oil business several years and continued to farm.

When Perle and Tom built their frame home on Jackson Street, which is the one she still lives in, it was still pasture land and was called "prairie dog town". Magnolia which is the cross street just north of their property was not a street at that time.

They later bricked the home and added a den and a second bath. She now has a rent house and garage apartment west of her home.

Pace had been mayor of Iowa Park and Perle said at one time there were former mayors living on the four corners of their block. They were Pace, Dr. Gordon G. Clark, Fenton Dale and Noel McKinney.

Tom and Perle's first child, Thomas, came along five years after their marriage, and in another five years they had a son, Bob. When the boys were older they built a tennis court and a croquet court on their lots. "Many of our sons' friends would come to our house to play tennis and croquet. We also had a pony they rode until he bucked them off," Perle remembered.

Mrs. Pace grew up in a very happy home and wanted her boys to have the same kind of home she had.

Her own father died when Perle was only six weeks old. He had gone hunting with friends when they lived in Cooke County. He picked up a gun and it accidently fired the shot that proved fatal for him.

Her mother later married a Methodist minister, O.P. Kiker, whose wife had died. At one time he was minister of the Iowa Park Methodist Church.

Perle's mother was a milliner (for readers who may not be familiar with the early-day term), she designed, made, trimmed and sold hats. Perle remembers all of the beautiful ones she made and the ones she wore.

When her sons were in school, Perle was active in school activities. "Our lives in those days were built around our family, church and school," she said. She remembered that she and the late Gladys James raised the money for Iowa Park's first school band.

She had a lot of praise for the Wichita County Fair (later Texas-Oklahoma Fair). "It certainly was a success. The fair was closely connected with the school. The juniors and seniors always had concession stands at the fair and the seniors made money for their trip to Mexico.

"I remember working with other room mothers in the senior's booth until 2 in the morning. One week we sold 2100 hamburgers. Those seniors probably have never forgotten their trips," Perle said.

She believes the fair here was superior to any she knew of because the whole town cooperated, and people were willing to give of their time to make it a success.

Mrs. Pace was a member of the Lioness Club and among the first members of the '23 Study Club that has just observed its 70 anniversary. She also served on the TB board for a number of years. At one time she managed nine rent houses they owned. She loved to work in her yard as long as she could.

In her conversation Perle continually thought of something else that" makes Iowa Park such a wonderful place to live". She mentioned a number of things she says Iowa Park can boast about that so many towns of its size does not have.

She says she is so thankful for "our good schools, our wonderful churches, the Friendly Door for senior citizens, and for the Park Clinic and its staff, and all of their capabilities to serve our city. So many smaller towns are not so fortunate. We certainly should count our blessings."

"Many older citizens of Iowa Park remember Mr. Bradford, Miss Ethyle Kidwell, Grace Reaves and others who gave so much of their lives in support of our school system, which we are so proud of. I am now 96 years old and I certainly remember what they contributed to our schools and community.

Both Perle and her husband through the years have done many philantrophic deeds also, which she continues today. They were always interested in helping those who were deserving and assisting others to get

an education.

Perle is thankful for her good health. She no longer takes blood pressure medicine and she attributes that to eating many fruits and vegetables. "I also ride a stationary bike for 30 minutes each day."

She does a lot of reading and is especially interested in scientific articles. She took a pre-med course in college and comes from a family of

Pace was a charter member of Wichita County Farm Bureau. He was on the Board of Directors of the Hardin Foundation that made it possible for needy and worthy students to receive assistance in attending Midwestern State University. He served as general manager of Wichta County Water Improvement District #2 from 1936 untl 1949, and was instrumental in District #2 receiving a loan from the Reconstruction Finance Corp., to call in outstanding indebtedness, and was cited by the board of directors for "saving and redeeming the District"

He was chairman of the Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District Board of Directors. When the need arose for a soil conservation building, Pace raised most of the money for it from friends. After his death the senate in session gave him a "Standing Vote of Recognition" for his outstanding work in the agricultural development of the area.

Their son, Thomas, was salutatorian of his class and got his degree from Southwesten University where his dad graduated. He taught high school two years, then several years at Midwestern University.

He got his PhD in Denver and while there met a professor that took a special interest in him and had him teaching classes under him. The professor changed to Southwestern Illinois University and took Thomas with him. He has taught there 24 years and will retire next summer.

Bob lives in Wichita Falls. When he was a senior he was manager of the high school annual and had a dark room back of their garage. He made many pictures for the annual and for his friends.

Bob went to SMU, his mother's alma mater, and received his law degree. He was a member of the staff of Southwestern Legal Foundation. Bob is a member of the Sherrill and Pace law firm and has his office at Parker Square Bank where he is president of the bank board.

Perle's 96 years have taken some toll on her body, but not on her mind. She has a great memory, is still in control of how she wants to live her life and as the years pass, she is even more thankful than ever for the 72 years she has been able to call the former little oil town with its dusty or muddy roads, home, and the 54 happy years she had with "the most eligible man in town".

She and her husband of six and a half years moved to just east of Iowa Park almost a year ago.

Both appear to have many irons in the fire, and seem to love it. At their home here, they have an orchard for fruit production, including pecans, peaches and apples. They also have a catfish farm in Elkhart.

Mrs. Commander is owner of Commander Quality Products, which includes a line of security products as well as a ceramic studio. Morris is a certified public accountant and vice president of United Electric.

Robin is originally from Scranton, Pa., where she lived 25 years.

She said she loves to cook, which apparently runs in her family. Many of her recipes come from family and have stories that go with them.

The recipe for Chalah, for instance, is a bread taken with wine on Fridays, the Jewish Sabbath. That recipe won Robin an award for Best All-Around Food at the Crockett County Fair.

The recipe for Mom's Chicken Soup (or Jewish Penicillin) is obviously one of her favorites. She said the recipe has been in her family for a long time, and she remembers her grandmother making it for the sick. It is also quite healthy otherwise. With a clear broth, since the fat is skimmed off, it is a low fat dish.

Together, the couple enjoys cooking, deer hunting, camping, fishing and hiking.

Robin said she also enjoys romance novels and doing ceramics.

Chalah

- 3 Tbsp. sugar
- 1 pkg. yeast 1/4 cup warm water
- 6 Tbsp. oil
- 2 large eggs 3 1/4 cup flour
- 1 1/2 tsp. salt Sesame seeds
- Stir 1 tsp. sugar, yeast and 1/4 cup warm water. Let rise for 10 minutes.

Mix with wisk, 1/2 cups cold water, oil and 1 egg. Mix into yeast mixture back and forth.

Mix flour salt and sugar. Add wet ingredients slowly.

Let rise 90 minutes on hot dryer. Cover bowl with very hot damp Turkish towel. After 90 minutes, punch. Repeat covering and let set 45 minutes and punch. Set again for 45 minutes.

Roll out dough, but not too thin. 1 can drained cherries



Cut into three strips and braid.

Take egg with pinch of salt and mix. Brush on dough. Cover with sesame seeds. Bake at 350 degrees for 45 minutes on greased cookie sheet. Some bake at 375 degree for 35 min-

Steamed Carrots

- 1 Tbsp. oil 2 Tbsp. water
- 1 onion, chopped
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. pepper
- 1 tsp. parsley flakes 1/2 tsp. garlic salt
- 2 Tbsp. margarine
- 1 pkg. carrots

Prepare carrots and slice diagonally. Use pot with a lid. Cook carrots and all other ingredients in pot at lowest setting for one hour. Stir frequently. When stirring, hold lid over carrots so the moisture can stay in pot.

Mom's Chicken Soup or Jewish Penicillin

- 8 cups water
- 1 whole chicken breast 2 or 3 carrots (peeled)
- 1 celery stick
- 1 parsnip (peeled) looks like white
- 1/2 bunch of parsley or cilantro, tied
- 1 small onion, peel but don't cut bot-
- Salt and pepper to taste 1 pkg. thin egg noodles

Put chicken and salt in water and bring to a boil. When it boils, fat comes to the top. Skim off fat and throw

Add carrots, celery and parsnip, then onion. Add a little bit of pepper and parsley on top. Cover and simmer about two hours.

Remove all vegetables except carrots and throw away. Cut up car-

Break up the chicken meat and either return to broth or use for a second meal. (Very good heated in a little oil with diced onions or for sandwiches.)

Cup the noodles, but do not put them in the soup. Put noodles in the bowl then add soup when ready to eat. Never put the noodles directly in the pot of soup.

Joan's Cheese Cake (New York Style)

- 4-8 oz. bars cream cheese 1 1/2 cups sugar

TAX TIPS

RETIREMENT PLANS - Last week I discussed two types of retirement plans available to selfemployed persons. Here is a little more information on each.

SIMPLIFIED EMPLOYEE PENSION (SEP) PLAN is similar to an IRA but allows for contributions up to 15% of compensation or \$30,000. The contribution is determined annually by the employer and is made on behalf of both the employer and the employees. Usually all employees over 21 participate in the plan, including part-time employees. The plan must be established and funded prior to the tax filing deadline.

KEOGH QUALIFIED RETIREMENT PLAN is more complex and allows for possible tax benefits upon distributions at retirement. It also allows for contributions up to \$30,000 based on a percentage of income depending on how the plan is established. Usually all employees over 21 participate in the plan; however part-time employees may be excluded. The plan must be established prior to the close of the business tax year (usually December 31), and funded before the tax filing deadline.




