Couple arrested on sex charge

An Iowa Park couple was arrested by local police Thursday on a warrant issued in Wichita Falls, on a charge of

"sexual performance by a child." They were released Monday after

posting \$10,000 bond each. Iowa Park police were notified by Child Protective Services last month, that their office had obtained what they determined to be poronographic pho-

tos of adults and children. The agency determined there was a need to remove the children from the home, which is in the northeastern part of the city, and at the same time, ob-

tained a search warrant. A team of Wichita Falls Police tactical squad, with the coopration of Iowa Park police, executed the search warrant Oct. 10. Other items reportedly were obtained during the search.

Child Protective Services was successful in having a warrant for the couple's arrest on the charge. Iowa Park, according to Chief Ray Smock, was notified of the warrant Nov. 17.

The couple was observed by an officer driving their car near the intersection of Seneca and Pasadena, at 3:34 p.m. Friday, at which time they were taken into custody.

The couple -- the husband is 41 and the wife 23 -- was booked in at the local police station and later transported to the county jail by sheriff's

Their names are not being publicized, in order to protect the children, who include a small baby and a threeyear-old daughter.

In unrelated cases, four other arrests were made by Iowa Park officers during the past week, according to the police blotter.

A resident told police Friday that someone had stolen a tool box and tools valued at more than \$200 from his pickup.

Slightly longer than an hour later, because one of the officers remembered the item's description, officers made an arrest and recovered the missing box and tools.

Charged with theft over \$200 was John Edd Henson, 40, who was also found to have an outstanding warrant for his arrest by the sheriff's office for driving while license was suspended.

Henson was turned over to a deputy to be transported to the county jail.

City to purchase two trucks

The city council Monday night made quick work of an unusually short agenda, and then called an even shorter special called meeting for next Mon-

day. Aldermen quickly approved proposals to advertise for the purchase of two trucks, took action on a "housekeeping" resolution, and approved a suggestion to meet only once in De-

cember, instead of twice. Their called meeting will begin at 7 p.m. in council chambers. At that time they are expected to adopt an ordinance for the issuance of certificates of obligation, to fund construction of a new water tower and some

major sewer line improvements. The bond, which will be purchased by Parker Square Bank, is in the amount of \$1 million. Aldermen, at their Nov. 8 meeting, accepted a proposal from the bank to charge 4.98 percent interest on the bond.

The two trucks the council plans to purchase are to replace vehicles used by the water department and fighting grassfires by the fire department. Aldermen approved a resolution

which permits the transfer of \$25,000 from the city's short term self insurance account and re-investing it in the long term self insurance account.

During the general discussion period, City Administrator Mike Price informed the council of the following situations:

* a portion of the fence along

Johnson Road has been removed, in advance of construction of Park Place Addition, a new housing addition:

* Engineers are completing plans for the construction of a new water tower, which will be located on property recently purchased along Access Road next to Park Tank Truck Service:

* The contractor is not expected to lay asphalt on Washington Street until next spring, but work to complete driveway replacements continues;

* City crews are starting work to develop George Hammonds Park at Lake Iowa Park.

After the hours spent on preparing a delicious Thanksgiving dinner, most of us just want to make sandwiches out of the leftover turkey.

But for those who still have the desire to create other tasty and interesting dishes from the remains of the turkey, ham, vegetables, etc., the following recipes will provide you with a few new ideas.

Turkey Casserole

- 1 10 oz. pkg. frozen green beans
- 2 cups chopped cooked turkey
- 1 cup (4 oz.) shredded Swiss cheese
- 1 can cream of chicken soup 1/8 tsp. ground nutmeg
- 1 cup biscuit mix
- 1 egg, beaten
- 1/4 cup butter or margarine, melted 2 Tbsps. milk
- 1 Tbsp. chopped parsley

Cook green beans according to package directions, omitting seasonings. Drain. Add turkey, cheese, soup, and nutmeg and stir well. Spoon mixture into a greased 1 1/2 qt. casserole.

Place biscuit mix in a medium bowl. Combine egg, butter and milk. Add to biscuit mix, stirring just until blended. Spoon biscuit mixture around edge of casserole, leaving center open. Sprinkle parsley in center of casserole. Bake 25 to 30 minutes at 350 degrees.

Sweet Potato Pie

- 2 1/2 cups cooked, mashed sweet potatoes
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. allspice
- 1/4 tsp. nutmeg 1/4 tsp. cinnamon
- 1 Tbsp. butter or margarine, melted
- 3 eggs 3/4 cup milk
- 2/3 cup maple-flavored syrup
- 1 tsp. vanilla extract
- 1 unbaked 9-inch pastry shell Whipped cream (optional)

Combine first 7 ingredients in a large mixing bowl; stir well and set aside. Beat eggs; gradually add milk, syrup and vanilla, stirring until blended. Gradually stir egg mixture into sweet potato mixture and pour filling into pastry shell.

Bake 10 minutes at 425 degrees; reduce heat to 325 degrees and bake 1 hour and 5 to 10 minutes or until knife inserted in center comes out clean. Let cool and serve with whipped cream.

Turkey-Carrot Salad

- 1 3/4 cups chopped cooked turkey
- 2/3 cup chopped celery 1 medium carrot, scraped and grated
- 3 Tbsps. chopped onion
- 1/4 cup mayonnaise 1 Tbsp. prepared mustard
- 1 1/2 tsps. sugar Combine all ingredients in a medium bowl and toss gently. Chill at

Easy Potato Rolls

- 2/3 cup shortening
- 2/3 cup sugar 2 1/2 tsps. salt

least 1 hour.

- 1 cup cooked, mashed potatoes
- 2 eggs
- 2 pkgs. dry yeast
- 1 1/3 cups warm water (105 to 115 degrees) divided
- 6 to 6 1/2 cups all-purpose flour

Cream shortening and gradually add sugar, beating until fluffy. Add salt, potatoes and eggs; beat until

Dissolve yeast in 2/3 cup warm water. Add yeast mixture and remaining 2/3 cup warm water to creamed mixture and beat until smooth. Gradually stir in enough flour to make a soft dough. Cover and let rise in a warm place, free from drafts, 1 1/2 hour or until dough is doubled in bulk.

Punch dough down; turn out onto a floured surface. Knead lightly 3 or 4 times. Divide dough into thirds. Shape one portion into 15 balls, and place in a well-greased 9-inch round cakepan.

Repeat procedure with remaining portions. Cover and let rise in a warm place, free from drafts, 1 hour or until doubled in size. Bake at 375 degrees 20 to 25 minutes or until browned.

1/4 to 1/2 cup sliced almonds Melt butter in a saucepan; add flour and stir until smooth. Add half and half stirring until well blended. Add broth and salt cooking slowly until thickened. Remove from heat and add egg yolks, lemon juice and nut-

meg; blend well. In a shallow baking dish layer 2 cups of turkey, then mushrooms, then remaining turkey, then water chestnuts and cover all with cream sauce. Sprinkle almonds over the top and bake at 350 degrees until bubbly. This freezes well.

- Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Lightly grease a 9x13 baking dish.

large silver punch bowl on a silver tray rested at one end of the table. The bride and groom's wedding cake graced the opposite extremity.


The three-tiered wedding cake was iced in white and decorated with fuchsia flowets.





AUSTIN -- State Treasurer Martha Whitehead shocked more than a few political observers last week when she recommended the abolishment of her office.

Whitehead, who was appointed in July by Gov. Ann Richards after then-Treasurer Kay Bailey Hutchison was elected to the U.S. Senate, said she believes the duties of the State Treasury Department can be merged into the office of the state comptroller.

The former Longview mayor said she will ask voters to approve a constitutional amendment to abolish the Treasury Department.

The department, with about 250 employees and an \$11 million annual budget, manages the state's investments, administers unclaimed property laws and enforces tobacco taxes.

The comptroller's office, which has about 2,900 employees and a \$120 million annual budget, serves as the state's revenue collection agency, enforces tax laws and issues economic forecasts.

Shortly after Whitehead's announcement, Comptroller John Sharp issued a statement calling it a "historic day in Texas state government."

Merging the treasury with the comptroller's office has been suggested many times. Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock once said, "You could fold that office into the comptroller's office, change the phones and you'd never know the difference."

But Republicans were critical of Whitehead's suggestion. "It's basic

Accounting 101," said Karen Hughes, executive director of the Republican Party of Texas. "The same person who receives the money should not spend the money.'

Gibson to Texas Chamber Bruce Gibson, executive assistant to Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock, will become president and chief executive officer of the Texas Chamber of Commerce in January.

Succeeding Gibson will be Charles Bailey, 45, who has been serving as Bullock's chief of staff and general counsel.

Gibson, 40, will succeed Larry Milner, who will become president of the Texas Chamber Service Corp., a non-profit organization that offers consulting services to local chambers.

Gibson said he will work with the 400 local chambers to develop a legislative agenda. Obvious issues, he said, include tort reform, workers' compensation insurance, health care, education and taxes.

Officials Want Tuition Hike The presidents of the University

of Texas and Southwest Texas State University said last week it is time for lawmakers to increase college tuition.

"I remain an advocate of higher tuition," UT President Robert Berdahl told the University Council, a legislative body at the school, last

"When students complain about tuition here, I urge them to find a day-care center in the city of Austin that is as inexpensive as the university," Berdahl said.

"I believe the time is right for us to consider an increase in tuition," Jerome Supple, president of Southwest Texas State University in San Marcos, told a higher education summit in Corpus Christi.

But Texas Higher Education Commissioner Kenneth Ashworth told the UT University Council, "legislators do not want to raise tuition," he said.

Texas is one of the few states where the legislature sets tuition levels. "Most states delegate that to presidents and the boards of regents so they can take the heat," Ashworth said.

Abortion Clause Questioned

The Texas Department of Insurance has proposed guidelines for a new health insurance plan for small businesses that would cover the expenses from an abortion if the life of the mother is endangered, the fetus is diagnosed as nonviable or the pregnancy resulted from rape or incest.

But Bill Price, president of Texans United for Life, said the guidelines should be clarified. If the guidelines are adopted, he said, small businesses would be forced to pay for abortions because "an unborn baby at three weeks is clearly nonviable."

Jim Davis, spokesman for the state Department of Insurance, said the proposed guidelines are based on common insurance practices and do not require any employer to buy health care.

United Telephone Overearned?

United Telephone is earning profits greater than authorized, based on the past year's figures, according to a staff analysis by the Public Utility Commission.

United Telephone disputes the PUC's findings, which show the company overearned at least \$3 million in 1992.

The PUC and United Telephone are negotiating for a settlement to avoid a possible lengthy and costly hearing in which the company would have to prove it is not overearning.

The Killeen-based company serves 118,000 customers in North Central and East Texas.

Other Highlights

Gov. Richards has appointed Lukin T. Gilliland Jr., 42, a San Antonio businessman and restaurateur to the Texas Racing Commission. He replaces Hugh Fitzsimons Jr. of Carrizo Springs, whose term expired.

■ Public Utility Commission examiners have recommended that TU Electric get less than the 15.3 percent rate increase it began charging customers in August. Examiners recommended a 10.6 percent rate increase, which would generate about \$530 million in additional revenue.





Texas beef industry promotes food safety

The Texas beef industry from the "gate to the plate" took a positive stance on food safety recently in Fort Worth by emphasizing its commitment to producing a safe and wholesome beef supply. It further committed itself to educating consumers on how to handle, store and prepare food safely in every Texas kitchen.

Twenty representatives of all segments of the beef ndustry participated in the "United for Food Safety" press conference at the Fort Worth Livestock Excannge Building.

Following the media conference, industry representatives had their pohtograph taken with a typical beef steer. The historic shot will be the centerpiece of a year-long emphasis on food safety.

"The different groups and individuals committed themselves to working together in this special event several months ago," says Anne I. Anderson, executive director of the Texas Beef Council...

"Coincidentally, nine isolated cases of foodborne illnesses associated with raw or undercooked beef were reported to Texas health authorities just days before we met."

Anderson said the illnesses reinforced the need for the Texas beef industry to remind consumers that beef comes to them as a safe and wholesome product, but it also must be handled, prepared and stored properly by the consumer. That was one goal of the conference.

Conference speakers emphasized that the Centers for Disease Control say just over two percent of foodborne illnesses is a result of problems in the production and processing stage.

These figures indicate that growth of illness-causing bacteria may occur during the handling, storage and cooking of meat products at foodservice and by the consumer.

One speaker was Vickie Detwiler of Bellingham, Wash. She is the mother of a 17-month-old son who was killed by secondary infection from E. Coli 0157:H7 bacterial in February 1993.

He had contracted the bacteria in day school from another child who had eaten an undercooked hamburger. Detwiler told the group that her son's death could have been avoided through proper cooking of the meat. That same caution was reinforced by medical and government speakers throughout the media conference.

Industry spokesmen said they would face the challenge of getting this message to consumers through an intensive campaign through the Texas Beef Council.

Texas consumers can receive information through brochures available at many foodservice and retail companies.

Easy-to-understand food safety messages in Spanish and English in more than 6.000 restaurants across the state will reach food-handling employees.

In January 1994, more than 1.2 million refrigerator magnets carrying food safety tips will be provided to Texas consumers through direct mail, pediatricians, and schools.

"The most visible reminder of this year's food safety information and education campaign will be the group photo of the different segments taken after the conference," Anderson said.' "It includes production, feeding, marketing, packing/processing, research distribution, foodservice and retail representatives."

The photo will run in a two-page advertisement in Texas Monthly in January 1994. The ad's copy will emphasize the industry's commitment to food safety. The photo also will appear at consumer events and food shows across the nation.

"This photo and the food safety program it represents are proactive gestures by the beef industry to address a dangerous problem," Anderson said.

"Fortunately, it is a problem that experts believe can be solved easily. We hope to do just that by educating an entire new generation of Texans about how to handle, store and prepare food so they and their families can consume beef with confidence," Anderson added.



GARDENING HINTS

By MARK TERNING, COUNTY AGENT - HORTICULTURE

LADY HAWK VARSITY

After trailing 17-8 at the end of the first quarter Friday night here against Nocona, the Lady Hawks outscored their visitors in each of the following periods to win 60-46, and chalk up their second win of the season.

Iowa Park narrowed Nocona's lead to 24-21 by halftime, and a strong, 21-10 third period gave them a lead they never relinquished.

Dusti Welch was dominating, racking up 27 points for Iowa Park.

Both the varsity and junior varsity were scheduled to travel Tuesday night (after the Leader's printing deadline) to Archer City. The Lady Hawks went into that contest with a 2-0 season record.

HAWK VARSITY

After suffering a disappointing season opener here Friday night against the Nocona Indians, when the Hawks lost 65-51, Iowa Park rebounded three nights later to defeat Weatherford by a one-point margin, 76-75.

The Hawks led the Indians through the first half, taking a 13-11 first-quarter lead and a healthy 31-24 by half-

But Iowa Park turnovers spelled defeat, according to Coach Tim Clark. Nocona took advantage of the situation and jumped out to a 43-38 lead during the third period, and outscored their hosts 22-13 in the final frame.

Brandon Ashlock led Hawk scorers with 12 points, while Rudy Hawkins and Michael Stanford contributed 10 apiece.

But Monday night's game was just the opposite of Friday's, for Iowa Park.

The Kangaroos looked like world beaters, jumping out to a 24-6 lead in the first quarter and stretching that to 44-21 by halftime.

It was the second half where the Hawks hit their stride. They narrowed the 'Roos' lead to 59-48 during the third quarter, and tied the score at 63-all to send the game into overtime.

Hawkins had the hot hand for Iowa Park, racking up 24 points, while Stanford hit 19 and Michael Fallon chipped in 11.

The big win evened Iowa Park's season record at 1-1.

GIRLS' JUNIOR VARSITY

The Lady Hawk JV also advanced their record to 2-0 Friday, and in outstanding fashion. Especially when they had to come from behind in the final quarter to beat Wichita Falls High in their season opener.

They almost shut out Nocona Friday, in a game Amber Ashley racked

That final score, an unbelievable 68-1.

Nocona's lone point wasn't posted until the fourth quarter.

tournament last weekend. Iowa Park eased past Olney 47-45 in the first round, and then took measure of host Seymour 48-34 to ad-


vance into the championship final. In that contest, Iowa Park dumped Archer City 34-30.





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
