Weldon Nelms named athletic program head

Weldon Nelms was named new athletic director and head football coach during a called meeting Monday night of the school board.

Nelms, 37, has held a similar position at Wimberley, a Class AA school southwest of Austin.

He will replace Robert Clensay, who was reassigned by the board in February after holding the position a year and a half.

Though the new Head Hawk will not officially assume his new position until April 4, he is expecting to be here on brief visits until then.

Nelms' contract extends through the 1994-95 school year. For his 220-day year he will be paid \$46,800 plus \$100 a month travel expenses. He also will receive \$2,000 for moving expenses.

His salary for the remainder of this year will be prorated, according to the motion approved unanimously by trustees.

Nelms was selected from a field of 58 applicants. Those were narrowed down to a final five, which included former assistant Hawk coach James Ivy of Sanger, Gary Reeves of Bells, Dean Bates of Floydada and Danny Stour of Alvarado.

The Monday meeting followed another called meeting held Sunday afternoon, during which details of Nelms' contract were hammered out.

Trustee Wendall House, who was a member of a committee which traveled to Wimberley to check the applicant's background, commented Monday, "I've never been any place where so much unanimous support was apparent for an individual."

Nelms said he hopes to move his family -- wife Casey and daughters Randi, 12, Sara, 10, and Vanessa, five -- to Iowa Park by May 1, if housing is available.

The new AD interviewed most of the athletic coaches on staff during Monday. He is to announce his recommendations of whom he will retain prior to the next board meeting.

No coaches' names were on the list of professional personnel whose contracts were extended earlier this month.

He said he was awaiting his inter-

views before he would announce how many assistants he would bring with him.

Nelms was graduated from Plains High School in 1975. He attended New Mexico Military College the following year, and completed his BA degree in physical education and health at Western New Mexico Univ. in 1980.

He was a student assistant coach at Western New Mexico his final year, serving as defensive secondary coach.

He was defensive coordinator, varsity boys track, JV boys basketball and seventh grade girls coach 1980-82 at Springlake-Earth High School, north

of Littlefield. The Wolverines were district football champs in '80 and won the track crown in both 1981 and '82.

Nelms was elevated to head football coach at S-E for the 1982-84 season.

HAWK RELAYS SATURDAY First Track Hall of Fame inductee to be Bill Carter

Induction of the first Hawk Track Hall of Fame recipient will highlight Saturday's running of the annual Iowa Park Lions Club Hawk Relays.

Coach Bill Carter, who led Iowa Park to its first-ever state championship and helped put the community on the athletic map, has been chosen as the first to be inducted.

Mayor Wayne House has proclaimed Saturday as Coach Bill Carter Day in Iowa Park.

Presentation of the plaque will be made just before the 1:30 p.m. running event finals in Hawk Stadium.

Several members of the 1960 state Class A championship team and possibly some of Carter's assistant coaches, have been invited to attend the event.

Besides a personal plaque he can take home, a permanent plaque and base have been erected next to the flag pole on the east end of Hawk Stadium.

Field events are scheduled to get underway at 8:30 a.m., and the first running event, the 3200-meter run, is to start at 9. Preliminaries in most running events will be held during the morning.

Also new this year will be the new medals, especially designed for the annual track meet, which will be

Electrical blackout problem for police

Resources of the Iowa Park Police Dept. were stretched beyond their limit for about two and a half hours Sunday evening.

The major problem was an electrical outage caused when a transformer blew up in the 600 block of West Smith.

An officer on patrol witnessed the accompanying flash that occurred, at 7:43 p.m. He immediately attempted to inform the radio dispatcher of the incident, and the fact that the pole on which the transformer was attached had ignited into flames.

The officer's contact with the dispatcher was temporarily interrupted, however, until the department's emergency generator got started, renewing radio communications.

The dispatcher then had problems attempting to inform the volunteer firemen, because two trucks had been dispatched to a grassfire only two minutes before the electrical problem, and they were on their way to Church Camp Road.

Electricity service was successfully rerouted to most parts of the city

in a short period, except in the business district.

There was no electricity reaching a three-block strip from Bond to West Highway.

A Department of Public Safety trooper who resides here was aware of the situation, and offered to call in troopers from the area to assist local police in patrolling the business district until electric service was fully restored, and four units responded to his call.

It took one of the two local police officers a few minutes before he could join in the patrolling and traffic control. He had just made an arrest, and had to put his suspect in jail before joining the others on patrol.

Businesses in the affected area were encouraged to close for the night, and did.

Disruption of electrical service caused burglar alarms to sound off at several businesses, and those buildings had to be checked out and secured.

Traffic, especially on the old highway, was especially heavy during the outage.

One observer suggested that was caused by the normal traffic for that time of evening being joined by people who had been in the businesses or at church, the usual observers whenever a problem develops, and those who would normally have been watching television but couldn't because the cable tv service was interrupted due to no power.

Police reported they had no problems with attempted burglaries during the darkened period.

Firemen called in units from the West Wichita department to take over their grassfire on Church Road and responded to the one caused by the transformer on Smith Road.

Full electrical service was returned about 10:00, according to the police department.

The suspect the officer had under arrest when the outage problem developed was Billy Gene Morrow Jr., 20.

Morrow had been stopped in the 1000 block of Cornelia on an outstanding traffic warrant. While in custody, it was determined he had in his possession less than two ounces of marijuana.

He was transferred from here to the county jail on the possession charge at 11:23 p.m., according to the police blotter.

Only one other arrest was made during the past week.

When police responded to a disturbance in the 300 block of West Pecan Saturday evening, the result was taking Danny Louis Ainsworth, 37, into custody on a charge of disorderly conduct.

Ainsworth was released at 12:12 a.m. Sunday on a personal recognizance bond, according to the blotter entry.

A 15-year-old male who was already on probation was taken into custody Friday morning after allegedly wrecking another youth's bicycle.

The suspect was transported to the county juvenile detention center in Wichita Falls.

Curfew on agenda for council meeting

The city council will consider passage of another curfew ordinance during Monday night's meeting.

The meeting is to begin at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

Iowa Park joined most other cities a few years ago in abolishing its curfew ordinance, after a federal court ruled some ordinances were unconstitutional.

However, in the past few months, some cities, including Wichita Falls, have written new ordinances which have stood the test of court, and other municipalities, such as Iowa Park, have fashioned their's with similar wording.

A representative of the Optimist Club has requested a public appearance, to propose the city provide land next to the Recreational Activities Center for a gymnasium.

Optimist members have been discussing construction of a gym for

youth programs several years.

The tract of land is similar to the tract leased long-term to the senior citizens center, and would be located on the opposite of the RAC from the Friendly Door.

Administrator Mike Price is to discuss proposed changes in the lease agreement at Lake Iowa Park, with the Acropolis Golf Club, which is proposing to build a course there.

Also on tap for action is the third and final public hearing on a request to annex a tract of land in Quail Valley Estates, with an ordinance completing the process to follow.

Other topics listed on the meeting agenda include:

Trustee incumbents attract competition

Iowa Park school district voters will have plenty of candidates from which to choose when they vote on four trustee positions May 7.

A host of last-minute filings has developed competition for all four of the incumbents in that election.

However, none of the three city council incumbents apparently will be challenged.

Candidates for school trustee include:

Place One - Incumbent Martha Dudley, George Bushfield and Carmen Lozipone;

Place Two - Incumbent Wendall House and Larry Dutton;

Place Three - Incumbent Sherri Kennedy and Bert Williamson, and

Place Five - Incumbent Dennis Yeager, Mary Biddy, Pat Pelz and Mike Swenson.

Whomever wins the Place Five race will serve only one year. The position was first filled by Robert Cook, but he had to resign when he moved outside the school district. Yeager was appointed by the board to complete the first year of the two-year term of office.

At presstime, none of the three city council incumbents had drawn competition.

They include Mayor Wayne House and Aldermen Bud Mercer and Johnny Crawford.

Deadline to file in either election was 5 p.m. Wednesday. However, any hopefuls seeking to run as write-in candidates must file declarations of write-in candidacy by April 7, according to the election code.

Early voting will begin April 18 and close May 3.

Sullivans honored on 50th anniversary

Mr. and Mrs. Harrel Sullivan were honored at a 50th wedding anniversary reception Saturday from 2 to 4 o'clock in the ballroom of Tom Burnett Memorial Library.

Hosting the courtesy were the couple's son and daughter-in-law, Roger and Carol Sullivan and their children, Brian and Staci Grapevine.

Forming the receiving line were the Sullivans and their children. Mrs. Sullivan's sister, Harriette Laird, also assisted in greeting guests.

One hundred and seventy five guests from across Texas, Arkansas, and New Mexico, were registered by Mrs. Louis Oliver of Silver City, N. M., and Mrs. Keith Brenton of Little Rock, Ark., niece of Mrs. Sullivan.

Members of the house party included Mrs. Grafton Partney, Mrs. Norman Williams, Mrs. Bill Martin, Mrs. Norma Fortner, Mrs. Carl Huddleston of Cleburne, Mrs. Brenton and Mrs. Oliver.

Those in the houseparty and feminine members in the receiving line wore corsages of pink spray roses tied with pink and yellow ribbon. The men's boutonnieres were white spray roses tied with pink and yellow ribbon.

"His and Her" tables were covered with white cloths that featured two-tiered floor length skirts of lace. Mrs. Sullivan's table, with mirrored top, was centered with a large arrangement of white gladioli mixed with greenery and gold leaves. On either side of the arrangement were white tapers in golden candleholders. The punch bowl and serving pieces were gold.

Four cascading corner bouquets of yellow, white and pink daisies, depicting the couple's wedding colors, were tied with pink, yellow and gold ribbon that extended across the table, connecting each bouquet to the central arrangement.

Mrs. Sullivan's all white tiered cake was topped with gold wedding bells. White napkins with the couple's names and wedding date were lettered in gold leaf.

Adding interest to the table was a honeydew melon carved in the shape of a swan and a carved pineapple. Gold serving trays holding fresh fruit, and white, gold and pink mints, completed the table decor. In the background was a lighted ficus tree.

Colors of red, white and blue were used as decorative accents on Sullivan's table, indicative of his years of service as a U.S. Army pilot during World War II and his years in the Reserve.

A sterling silver container held red, white and blue carnations highlighted by a miniature American flag. The table was edged in greenery dotted with red, white and blue flowers. Large white and red bows marked each extremity of the table.

His chocolate cake was iced in white. It was decorated with blue stars, and was centered with a confection brown and black bald eagle with outspread wings and a red, white and blue shield.

A photograph of Sullivan made in his dress uniform during the time

he was a pilot, and an exact replica of the plane he flew in the European Theatre with the 93rd Troop Carrier Squadron were featured decorations on the table. The plane rested on a wooden base that displayed his captain's bars, wings and decorations.

Photographs of the couple at the time of their marriage and a current portrait were displayed on the piano, along with a large arrangement of mauve silk roses in a crystal vase that was sent to them by a friend.

During the reception hours, a video was shown of pictures made of the couple through the years from the time they met until the present. It was accompanied by a background of music that was popular during the time the pictures were made. This was a special surprise gift from the couple's son and his family.

Sullivan and Peggie Rogers were married March 11, 1944 in 5th and Highland Church of Christ in her home town of Abilene.

Mrs. Sullivan graduated Abilene Christian College and began teaching in Iowa Park High School. The couple met here while Sullivan was still in service and were married a year and half later.

Sullivan moved to Iowa Park with his parents when he was 18 months old. After his stint in the U.S. Army, he spent many years actively supporting Iowa Park and its business community.

After their marriage Peggie quit teaching and began working with her husband in his feed store until 1950 when he went back into service for two years. When he received his discharge in 1952, Sullivan was Adjutant of Wing Headquarters Squadron.

In 1953 he opened White's Auto Store and later opened Parkway True Value and Furniture Store. He sold the auto store and they continued to operate their other businesses until they retired 10 years ago.

Sullivan served two terms on the city council and five years with the Volunteer Fire Department. During his tenure on the council Garden Valley was developed and Buffalo Lake was in the planning stages.

Sullivan also served several years on the board of directors of State National Bank, nine years on the Wichita County Draft Board, and has been a member of the Industrial Board of Iowa Park since it was formed.

Sullivan built two business buildings and 19 houses in Iowa Park.

After living in town 26 years, the couple built a brick home of Sullivan's design 22 years ago on Bell Road south.

After retirement Harrel and Peggie had more time for their hobbies, following the pattern of working side by side and complementing each other in their work through a half century.

Harrel's hobby is woodworking and Peggie paints what he makes and does ceramics. She also likes to collect meaningful items. They do not sell the beautiful work they do, but give much of it away to friends.

The Sullivans are members of Iowa Park Church of Christ. He has served as an elder many years and Peggie teaches a Ladies Bible Class, which she had done several years. They both do a lot of volunteer work for the church, and are responsible for many special church related activities.

Just to test my pace of recovery, I decided to try my hand at my favorite activity, golf, Saturday afternoon.

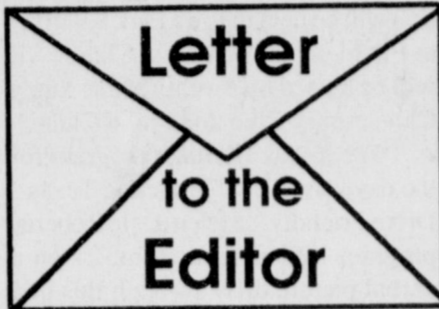
Though I lasted only nine holes before tiring out, I surprised myself and shot the front side of River Creek Golf Course in 42.

sons, winning 16 and losing 14. As assistant track coach at 5-A Estacado High in Lubbock, his teams won the regional title in 1985 and 1987, and state in 1986.

He also was assistant football coach at Estacado, working with both the offensive and defensive lines.

Nelms' next head coaching position was at Rotan, from 1987 through 1990, where his teams went 27-9-2. (Former IPHS coach Tommy Watkins held that position prior to his first tour as Head Hawk.)

Moving from Rotan to Wimberley, Nelms guided that school to lofty heights, accumulating a 40-9-1 record, including advancing to the state quarterfinals last fall. His teams garnered five district and bi-district titles, won area three times, and regional and quarterfinals both 1988 and 1993.

Overall, Nelms' record in football is 83-32-3.

"To be a good coach," Nelms says, "I feel I must be a very positive person and be able to sell my program. I feel each coach should be a role model and live his life somewhat as an open book."

"Winning and attitude is contagious and it always starts with the top. I feel a coach should always be able to talk, discipline, and give advice to each boy."

"He has to be organized and well-prepared for all meetings, practices and games. The desire to always do better and be better is an absolute must!"

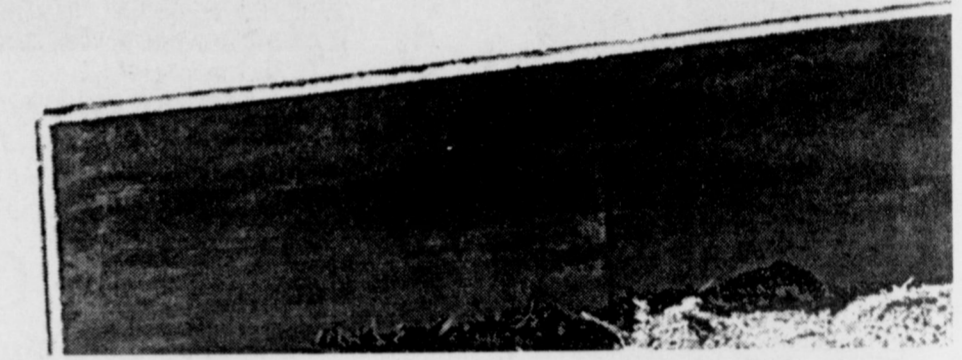

Worth Quoting

If we taxed common sense in this country, they wouldn't pay a dime in Washington.

Municipal landfills are a case in point.

After months and months of work by mayors and city managers out in this part of the country, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) finally got around to granting an exemption to landfills that received less than 20 tons of material each day and had an average of less than 25 inches of precipitation each year.

The exemption also did away with the required drilling of wells to monitor the groundwater around a landfill.

The exemption could save thousands of dollars to cities in West Texas and keep many landfills open that would otherwise close at expensive costs to residents.

The exemption was one of the few instances where practicality rules rather than those stringent, obscure, and expensive EPA rules.

But wouldn't you know it, one of those federal judges in the District of Columbia, prodded by the wailing and gnashing of teeth by all those hug-a-tree, save-the-earth do-gooders, ruled that the EPA could not grant such an exemption. He held that the law passed by Congress, required all areas of the country to be treated uniformly under the code.

The judge, typical of the residents of the Washington beltway syndrome that believe that the sun, moon, and other plants all revolve around this nation's capitol, refused to recognize the difference in rainfall, temperature, climate, geology, and terrain in this country.

The news this week could drive home to new first graders that what's good for Missouri isn't necessarily right for Texas.

It just doesn't make sense to try and apply one rule to all the various sections of this variable, diverse country.

Protection of groundwater should be a concern not only to EPA but every citizen but a little common sense should accompany the rules.

We think it's to the credit of Congressman Larry Combest and Bill Sarpalius and 41 other members of the House to support a bill that would grant exemptions to small West Texas landfills.

The bill would empower the EPA to grant exceptions or exemptions to landfill rules.

The bill deserves the support not only of West Texans but all Americans who would like a little common sense injected into the rules and regulations of the federal government.

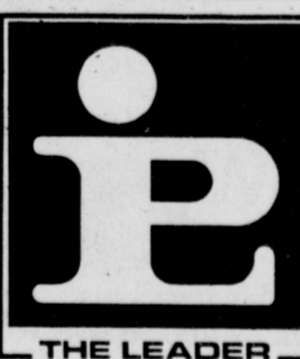

If she was a collector she would love to collect teapots, but not just any old teapot...very special ones.

Donna is sharing with our readers one very special recipe that she has been asked for many times when she takes it to pot-luck meals, but has never shared. It is unique and she said she really doesn't know how to classify it, but it usually winds up with the salads. It would be a good side dish with ham.

Baked Pineapple & Cheese

1 20-oz can crushed pineapple
3/4 lb. mild cheddar cheese
1 1/2 cups sugar
1/2 cup flour

Drain pineapple; save juice. Grate cheese. Mix together flour and sugar and add juice. Mix in pineapple and cheese and pour in 6x11 baking dish. Top with buttered bread crumbs. Cook covered at 325 degrees about 45 minutes.

Donna says kids usually love the next dessert she shares. It is especially a good summertime dessert.

Oreo Cookie Dessert

Crush 30 Oreos. Mix with 1/4 cup melted margarine. Spread in 9x12 inch pan and pat down. Empty 1/2 gallon vanilla ice cream into large bowl and stir until soft like whipped cream. Spread over Oreos and put in freezer while making sauce.

Sauce

Melt together: 1/4 cup butter or margarine; 2/3 cup sugar, and two squares baking chocolate. After it is melted, add one small can evaporated milk. Cook until thick. Add 1 tsp. vanilla. Cool completely (May be refrigerated to cool).

When cool, spread over ice cream. Freeze until firm. Cover with Cool Whip. Sprinkle with chopped nuts. Freeze completely before serving.

Butter Dips

Donna says you get the homemade bread taste, without all of the work, with this recipe.

In oven, melt 1 stick butter in 13x9 inch baking dish. Remove dish as soon as butter is melted.

Sift together 2 1/4 cups sifted flour, 1 Tbsp. sugar, 3 1/2 tsp. baking powder, 1 1/2 tsp. salt. Add 1 cup milk. Stir slowly with fork until dough just clings together (about 30 strokes).

Turn out on well floured board. Roll over to coat with flour. Knead lightly about 10 times. Roll out 1/2 inch thick into a rectangle, 12x8 inches. With floured knife, cut dough in half lengthwise, then crosswise, into strips.

Dip each strip in butter on both sides and lay close together in two rows in pan. Bake at 450 degrees for 15-20 minutes until golden brown.

Chicken Stroganoff

A twist on Beef Stroganoff. Donna likes to cook with chicken, so her family especially like this dish.

2 large chicken breasts
butter or margarine
1 med. onion, sliced
1/2 lb. fresh mushrooms, sliced
1 Tbsp. flour

1 chicken flavored bouillon cube or envelope
1 1/2 cups water
1 8-oz. carton sour cream
4-oz. medium noodles
4-oz. spinach noodles

Slice chicken into 1/8 inch slices. In 12-inch skillet over medium heat melt 2 Tbsp. butter. Cook chicken stirring constantly until tender, 2-3 minutes. Remove chicken. Add 2 Tbsp. butter to skillet and saute onion and mushrooms until tender. Stir in flour and bouillon until blended. Cook one minute. Gradually stir in water. Cook, stirring constantly until thick and smooth. Reduce heat. Stir in sour cream. Add chicken. Heat thoroughly, stirring constantly. Do not let it boil.

Prepare noodles and serve with chicken sauce mixture.

German Potato Salad

The following recipe is one of Jeff's mother's. Donna says she is a fabulous cook.

Dash celery seed
Dash garlic salt
6 slices bacon
2 Tbsp. green onion, finely chopped
1 1/2 tsp. flour
1 tsp. sugar
1/2 tsp. salt
3 Tbsp. water
2 Tbsp. vinegar
1 16-oz can sliced potatoes

Fry bacon until crisp and drain. In 2 Tbsp. bacon grease, cook onion until tender, but not brown. Stir in flour, sugar, salt, water and vinegar. Cook and stir 3 minutes. Add potatoes, heat thoroughly. Crumble bacon over top and sprinkle with celery seed and garlic salt. Serve warm. (Works well in electric skillet).

Broccoli with Sour Cream Sauce

Our cook says a lot of people ask for this recipe because it uses sour cream instead of the usual cheese sauce.

2 Tbsp. flour
1 cup sour cream
1 Tbsp. prepared horseradish
1 tsp. vinegar
salt and pepper

Add flour to sour cream. Mix until smooth. Cook over low heat until thickened, stirring constantly. Add horseradish and vinegar. Season with salt and pepper. Pour over cooked broccoli.





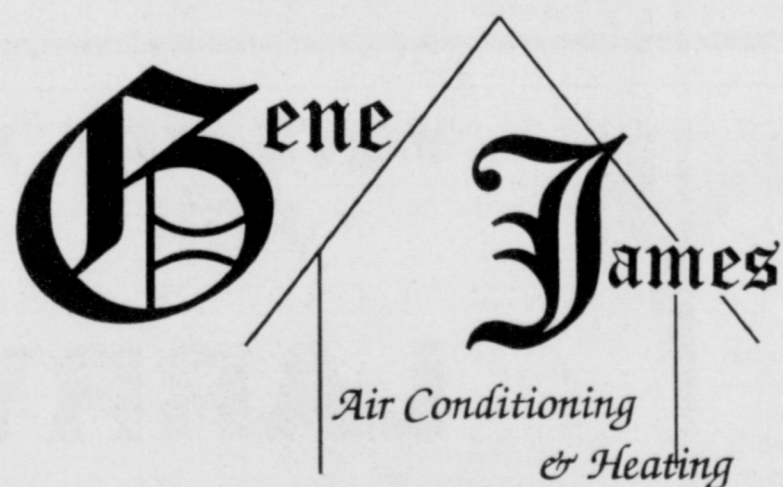

Recalling Carter years

(Editor's note: Gard was a member of the great Hawk track teams coached by Bill Carter, and recalls those winning years.)

Thirty-plus years have passed but I can vividly remember the sheer excitement of it.

Before football championships in the late 60's, Iowa Park was for a time the premier small track school in the state. The green and white performed from Commerce to Amarillo, from Wichita Falls to Austin. Almost always winning championships.

This period started in 1958 when Bill Carter was hired away from Holliday to be head coach. In addition to football he would also be head track coach. The school didn't know it at the time but it was this add-on duty that would propel Iowa Park into the state spotlight.

The Hawks ran, jumped and threw to two regional titles, one state championship and a state runner-up between 1959 and 1962.

It was entertaining and electrifying to be from Iowa Park at a major track meet. Up-starts from around the state took turns challenging the Hawks but seldom did they succeed. Some wanted simply to be in the same heat with the Hawks, thinking some of the magic would rub off and make them faster.

The district meets of 1959, 1960 and 1961 have a great many wonderful memories for me. These were the smallest contests we entered but they were the starting point for regional and state competitions.

A performer or relay team had to finish first or second to continue to the next level. The big invitational meets were like warm-ups for the march to state. A bad day, a dropped baton and it was all over.

In 1959 I was out for track but really didn't understand the dedication and discipline needed until the district meet. I spent the year fooling around with the 220, throwing the shot put and sometimes running a leg on the 440 relay.

In '59, Iowa Park was going to win the district championship maybe for the first time ever. I had a ribbon for the afternoon so the world was at peace.

I've told this story many times and in different ways. For my business associates, it's really the story of an accidental happening and an awakening.

Usually with business associates, the theme from "Chariots of Fire" would play softly in the background as the story unfolds.

In reality it was a cool, windy day in Wichita Falls. As was the custom, I was laying on the team blanket when the bad news started making the round.

Somebody on the mile relay was coughing and didn't feel well so an alternate would have to be selected to run. Someone already finished for the afternoon who really hadn't trained for the 400. Who would that be? Not me, I hoped.

The delima was how to be there with the team but remain invisible. My tactic would be to turn over and appear to be asleep. While my private battle was raging, apparently so were several others because the blanked area suddenly sounded alive like a whooping cough ward.

I had been immediately outflanked by several upper classmen. Sleeping was nowhere near as bad as coughing. Undaunted, I stayed with my original ploy. The other members of the mile relay were warming up so a decision was very near.

Out of the corner of my eye I saw Coach Carter nearing. He walked once around the blanket listening to the coughing which had just gotten a lot worse.

Darn, why did I choose sleeping? I was even believing some of those guys coughing.

Again, his shoes appeared in view and again they went away. On his third lap around the blanket, he stopped right at my head and I knew I better start coughing. Still hoping, I didn't move until he called my name.

"How do you feel," he asked, and it was at that point my life changed.

"Okay," I said.
"Here's what I want you to do," he said.

Some people seek out and embrace responsibility, others have it slipped in their pocket and happen to find it.

Iowa Park won the mile relay and finished fifth at regional two weeks later. At an awards assembly near the end of school, the teams all displayed their trophies and presented them to the school.

Coach Carter did his part and mentioned that the mile relay had given a good account at regional and he expected good progress in the future.

David Parkey, Bob Gilbreath, and I ran together for two more years, losing only one race. Donald Thompson joined us in 1960 and Jack Brooks replaced him in 1961.

The district track meet of 1960 was a little like the marines against the Cub Scouts. Iowa Park was a seasoned track team with victories at big meets. We had sprinters like Tony Waters and Donald Thompson, we had a great weight man in Lyndell Glenn. We had relays and we had Gilbreath.

It just wasn't fair to the other members of District 1-A-11. We won 11 of 14 events and finished second in two more. Twelve new district records were set and we set 10 of those.

In 1960, Iowa Park was a juggernaut. I even got a fourth in the shot put. It was nearly 10 feet behind Lyndell, but it was four points.

The district meet of 1961 was unusual for several reasons. Iowa Park moved up in class to AA and faced new and bigger schools, but with much the same results.

The most unusual thing, however, was the hail storm and tornado that occurred while I was running the mile relay.

TORNADO DURING RACE

Coach Carter knew we would win in a walk so he let Bobby (Gilbreath) run another event while I anchored the mile relay. During the first leg it started raining; during the second leg the wind started howling and during the third

leg the sky went black.

As the baton was passed to me it started hailing. The wind was so bad that with it to my back I ran off the rack and into the street trying to make the final curve. The hail was so bad that visibility was cut to 10 feet.

One runner, that was behind, tried to cut across the field but got lost and couldn't find the other side. A tornado hit the main gate at Sheppard AFB, about two miles away while all this was occurring.

At the end of the race, I kept on running to my mother's car, where she had taken shelter. Everyone had taken shelter so it was a while before the track meet could resume so it could end.

One positive was that at the regional meet the slowest team gets a good lane assignment. We were the best team in the state, but also had the slowest district time so we got the good lane.

For me, there are certain sounds and actions that can make the blood flow and the adrenaline pump hit at 80 pounds per square inch. The Marine Corps Hymn is one, a bugle playing any command is another. And the passing of the baton on any relay at a track meet is another.

It is a pleasure in my memory to lace up the green and white spikes and hear Coach Carter call, "We have to win the mile relay to win the meet."

We did it, time and again. We had the pleasure of learning that if we trained hard, really hard, and did our best, then

the results would take care of themselves.

Success is merely a by-product of these qualities. Winning or losing was not the important issue. Doing your best

while winning or losing was.

Our avenue was track, but it could have been band, or scouting, or any other extra-curricular activity where we had a Bill Carter to teach us.

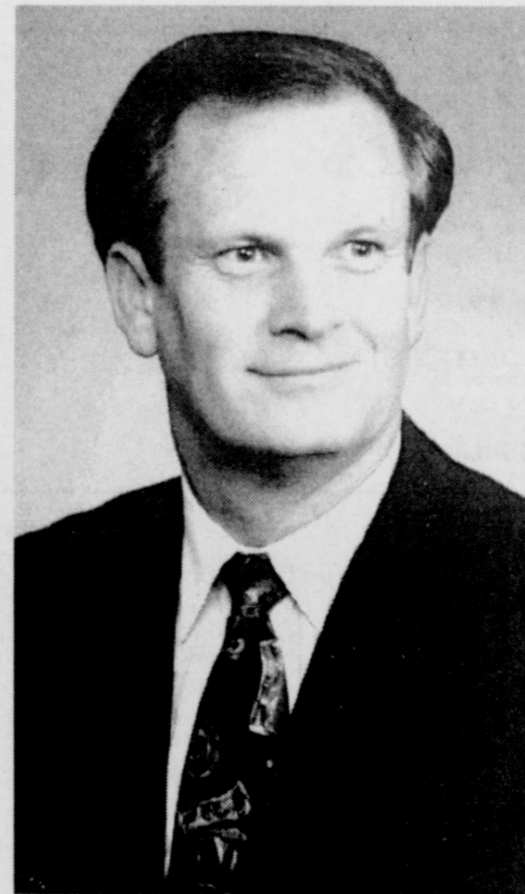

GARDENING HINTS

By MARK TERNING, COUNTY AGENT - HORTICULTURE

Late March and throughout April are prime landscaping and gardening months for the Texoma area.

Vegetable gardeners and flower lovers will find an abundance of beautiful plants at local nurseries, garden centers, and feed stores. Follow this garden check list for your upcoming lawn, landscape, and garden endeavors.

Planting

* Complete all cool-season vegetable planting as soon as possible.

* Tomato transplants can be planted after our last average killing frost date - March 25. Several excellent home garden varieties of tomatoes are: Celebrity, Carnival, President, Champion, Merced and Superfantastic.

* Plant containerized fruit, pecan and shade trees. Nurseries have excellent selections at this time of year.

* Plant warm-season annual flowers in April for summer-long color in landscape beds and containers.

* Establish new lawns from sod, hydromulch, plugs, or seed in later April.

* Utilize shade-loving groundcovers in dense shade areas such as under large trees now.

Fertilizers

* Apply a lawn food with a 3-1-2 or 4-1-2 ratio in mid-April to warm

season lawns. Use a product which contains slow-release nitrogen. These types of fertilizers are also fine for shrubs, trees and even groundcover.

* Test garden soil every two years to determine pH levels, and nutrient needs. Local county extension offices and garden centers have soil test information.

* Use slow-release fertilizers such as Osmocote in containers for top flower performance.

* Begin zinc sprays on pecan trees at budbreak.

Pruning

* Clean up lawn areas by mowing a slightly lower cutting height.

* Prune spring flowering shrubs and vines soon after blooming.

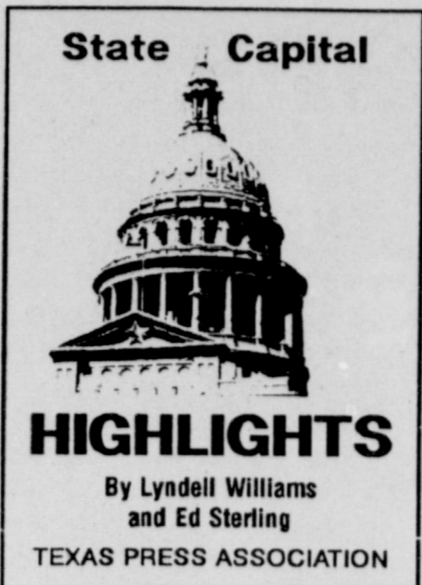
Pest, Disease and Weed Control

* Apply a broadleaf weed control such as Weed-B-Gone or Wipeout for broadleaf weeds in lawns.

* Begin a regular spray program on peaches, plums and apricots when flower petals begin to fall. Multi-purpose fruit tree sprays are available at local garden centers or pest control outlets.

* Control black spot on roses with regular applications of Funginex.

* Use floating row-covers such as Gro-Web on tomato cages for insect and disease suppression.



AUSTIN — Thirty U.S. House members from Texas and 77 other members of Congress are calling on President Clinton to convene an energy summit to find ways to shore up the battered domestic energy industry.

In a letter to Clinton, the bipartisan group of lawmakers from 29 states pointed to the "alarming deterioration" of the industry.

Since oil prices slumped last October, more than 13,500 jobs have been lost in the domestic industry — which lost half a million jobs in the last decade.

"The statistics speak clearly to the crisis which the domestic industry and nation face," the lawmakers wrote in the letter coordinated by Sen. David Boren, D-Okla.

Last year, the nation posted its lowest domestic oil production since 1958, averaging 6.8 million barrels a day.

The members representing one-fifth of Congress, want to talk to Clinton about tax incentives to encourage new drilling, production and regulatory relief.

"The collapse of oil prices that began last October has driven U.S. prices below the cost of much of our domestic production, the congressmen wrote.

The White House has stood firm against intervention to halt the downward spiral of oil prices and the administration rebuffed attempts by independent producers to obtain a floor on import prices or an oil import fee.

Meanwhile, the Index of Leading Texas Economic Indicators indicates moderate growth during the third quarter of the year, according to the state comptroller's office.

"Last month, some of our indicators dipped slightly, suggesting that there might be a few clouds on the summer horizon," said Comptroller John Sharp. "But those clouds seem to have blown over."

Sharp said the price of oil, down 25 percent from a year ago, is the only negative economic indicator on the index.

Bullet Train in Jeopardy

A proposed bullet train may be derailed unless the franchise-holder responds by the end of this month.

State officials last week notified Texas TGV Corp. that they will consider termination of the franchise to build an \$8.4 billion high-speed rail system.

Texas TGV, a French-American group was awarded the franchise in 1991 to link the state's major cities.

The company missed a deadline Dec. 31, 1993, to come up with \$170 million in equity financing.

Grace expanding overseas

W.R. Grace & Co. recently announced a \$70 million expansion plan for its worldwide Grace Packaging operations to increase production capabilities for its Cryovac shrink film product line.

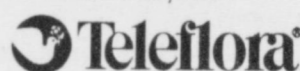

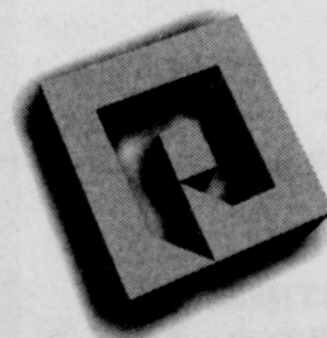

Long distance dialing change is announced

Your fingers are going to have to do more walking to make long distance calls next week.

Beginning at 12:01 a.m. Wednesday, Mar. 30, all long distance telephone calls dialed within the 817 area code must be dialed with the area code.

That will mean dialing "1+817+seven digit number" or "0+817+seven digit number."

Dialing "1+ or 0+seven digit number" will not work.

"We're nearing the point where we will run out of phone numbers in 817," said Bob McJilton, area manager for Southwestern Bell Telephone. "We have implemented this change to match growth without creating a new area code."

McJilton said dialing 817 is now required because new local dialing prefixes that resemble area codes will be created for new phone numbers in

the non-metro area of 817.

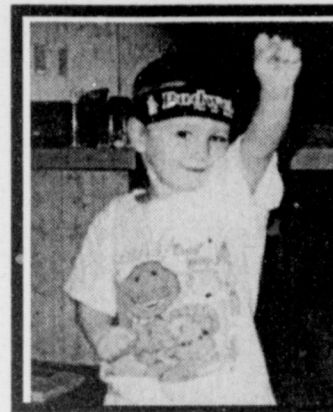
The new prefixes will have an "0" or a "1" as a middle digit, as do area codes. Local number prefixes in this area do not have such a configuration at this time, according to McJilton.

"This means programmed long distance numbers within the area, such as those used with speed dialing or call forwarding, must be programmed to include the 817 area code," he said.

"Without dialing 817, you'll reach a recording saying you must dial 817 to complete your call," McJilton added.

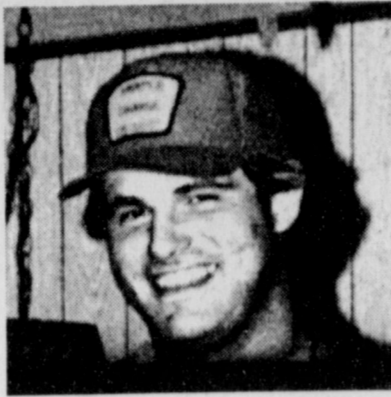
Mrs. Lewis was born March 27, 1912, in Iowa Park, and graduated W.F. High School. She moved from Iowa Park to Arlington in 1992.

Loving died Thursday in a Fort Worth hospital.

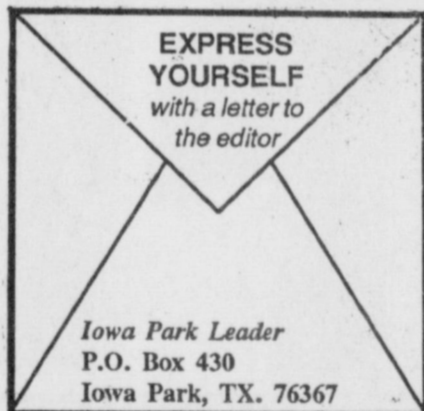
