Weldon Nelms named athletic program head

Weldon Nelms was named new athletic director and head football coach during a called meeting Monday night of the school board.

Nelms, 37, has held a similar position at Wimberley, a Class AA school southwest of Austin.

He will replace Robert Clensay, who was reassigned by the board in February after holding the position a year and a half.

Though the new Head Hawk will not officially assume his new position until April 4, he is expecting to be here on brief visits until then.

Nelms' contract extends through the 1994-95 school year. For his 220day year he will be paid \$46,800 plus \$100 a month travel expenses. He also will receive \$2,000 for moving expenses.

His salary for the remainder of this year will be prorated, according to the motion approved unanimously by trustees.

Nelms was selected from a field of 58 applicants. Those were narrowed

Candidates for school trustee include:

Place One - Incumbent Martha Dudley, George Bushfield and Carmen Lozipone;

Place Two - Incumbent Wendall House and Larry Dutton;

Place Three - Incumbent Sherri Kennedy and Bert Williamson, and

Place Five - Incumbent Dennis Yeager, Mary Biddy, Pat Pelz and Mike Swenson. Whomever wins the Place Five race will serve only one year. The position was first filled by Robert Cook, but he had to resign when he moved outside the school district. Yeager was appointed by the board to complete the first year of the two-year term of office.

At presstime, none of the three city council incumbents had drawn competition.

Deadline to file in either election was 5 p.m. Wednesday. However, any hopefuls seeking to run as write-in candidates must file declarations of write-in candidacy by April 7, according to the election code.

HAWK RELAYS SATURDAY First Track Hall of Fame inductee to be Bill Carter

Induction of the first Hawk Track Hall of Fame recipient will highlight Saturday's running of the annual Iowa Park Lions Club Hawk Relays.

Coach Bill Carter, who led Iowa Park to its first-ever state championship and helped put the community on the athletic map, has been chosen as the first to be inducted.

Mayor Wayne House has proclaimed Saturday as Coach Bill Carter Day in Iowa Park.

Presentation of the plaque will be made just before the 1:30 p.m. running event finals in Hawk Stadium.

Several members of the 1960 state Class A championship team and possibly some of Carter's assistant coaches, have been invited to attend the event.

Besides a personal plaque he can take home, a permanent plaque and base have been erected next to the flag poll on the east end of Hawk Stadium.

Field events are scheduled to get underway at 8:30 a.m., and the first running event, the 3200-meter run, is to start at 9. Preliminaries in most running events will be held during the morning.

Also new this year will be the new metals, especially designed for the annual track meet, which will be awarded to the winners of each event. The meet is organized and sponsored by the Iowa Park Lions Club.

Besides guiding the Hawk thinclads to the state A title in 1960, Carter's crew returned to the big Austin meet the following year and, despite having been moved up to Class AA, finished in second place.

In those years, Class A was the same as AA now, and AA would now be AAA.

Carter moved from Holliday to Iowa Park as head football and track coach in 1958. He organized the school's first-ever track meet in 1959, attracting 16 teams.

By 1963, the meet had grown to two divisions and attracted 53 teams.

The coaches and athletes worked to prepare the dirt surface track at the old W.F. George High School stadium.

The track was graded smooth, then bladed, rolled, oiled, and the process repeated. The only problem was, as Jim Gard recalls, the school would not allow Carter to take out poles on the west end, making the "curve" almost square.

Rest is one of my problems. My addled brain won't let me sleep as late as I'd like in the mornings. This business of getting up between 4 and 5 in the morning is aggravating! Just to test my pace of recovery, I

decided to try my hand at my favorite activity, golf, Saturday afternoon.

Though I lasted only nine holes before tiring out, I surprised myself and shot the front side of River Creek Golf Course in 42.

Frankly, that's better than I sometimes score.

As I mentioned in this space last week, I continue to be humbled by the interest and well-wishes of so many people who've expressed concern about my health.

While I want to believe they are all earnest and sincere in wishing for my well being, I can't help but wonder if they aren't more concerned that if I became incapacitated, they wouldn't be able to reau all of my criticisms and complaints anymore.

If we taxed common sense in this country, they wouldn't pay a dime in Washington.

Municipal landfills are a case in point.

After months and months of work by mayors and city managers out in this part of the country, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) finally got around to granting an exemption to landfills that received less than 20 tons of material each day and had an average of less than 25 inches of precipitation each year.

The exemption also did away with the required drilling of wells to monitor the groundwater around a landfill.

The exemption could save thousands of dollars to cities in West Texas and keep many landfills open that would otherwise close at expensive costs to residents.

The exemption was one of the few instances where practicality rules rather than those stringent, obscure, and expensive EPA rules.

But wouldn't you know it, one of those federal judges in the District of Columbia, prodded by the wailing and gnashing of teeth by all those hug-atree, save-the-earth do-gooders, ruled that the EPA could not grant such an exemption. He held that the law passed by Congress, required all areas of the country to be treated uniformly under the code. The judge, typical of the residents of the Washington beltway syndrome that believe that the sun, moon, and other plants all revolve around this nation's capitol, refused to recognize the difference in rainfall, temperature, climate, geology, and terrain in this country.

Seven states are being raped and ravaged by an angry Mississippi river swollen from too much rainfall too often. Yet in the Dallas-Ft. Worth-Waco area, they haven't had a rain since June 26th and are suffering from 100 degree temperatures.

Here, with seven months of the year gone, we've had a magnificent three inches in July for a four-inch total for the year . . . and we're supposed to worry about runoff from our landfill.

And the snow has yet to melt on some peaks in the Colorado mountains.

It just doesn't make sense to try and apply one rule to all the various sections of this variable, diverse country.

Protection of groundwater should be a concern not only to EPA but every citizen but a little common sense should accompany the rules.

We think it's to the credit of Congressman Larry Combest and Bill Sarpalius and 41 other members of the House to support a bill that would grant exemptions to small West Texas landfills.

The bill would empower the EPA to grant exceptions or exemptions to

Estacado High in Lubbock, his teams won the regional title in 1985 and 1987, and state in 1986.

He also was assistant football coach at Estacado, working with both the offensive and defensive lines.

Nelms' next head coaching position was at Rotan, from 1987 through 1990, where his teams went 27-9-2. (Former IPHS coach Tommy Watkins held that position prior to his first tour as Head Hawk.)

Moving from Rotan to Wimberley, Nelms guided that school to lofty heights, accumulating a 40-9-1 record, including advancing to the state quarterfinals last fall. His teams garnered five district and bi-district titles, won area three times, and regional and quarterfinals both 1988 and 1993.

Overall, Nelms' record in football is 83-32-3.

"To be a good coach," Nelms says, "I feel I must be a very positive person and be able to sell my program. I feel each coach should be a role model and live his life somewhat as an open book.

"Winning and attitude is contagious and it always starts with the top. I feel a coach should always be able to talk, discipline, and give advice to each boy.

"He has to be organized and wellprepared for all meetings, practices and games. The desire to always do better and be better is an absolute must!"

He adds, "I believe you need to cooperate with the administration, faculty, coaching staff, students and parents. School policies and community traditions are very important and should be considered, not only in my professional life, but also in my personal life.

"School tradition and pride has to be felt throughout the entire school system. If one wins we all win!"

It was Iowa Park's tradition in athletics that appeals most to the new Head Hawk.

"The surface was darn fast for dirt," Gard recalls. "Since the team worked out there every day, it was always exciting to go to a meet with a modern surface to see what you could really run."

Members of that 1960 team and number of events in which they competed at state included: Bob Gilbreath, four; Tony Waters, four; Donald Thompson, three; Lyndell Glen, two; David Parkey, two, and Gard, one.

They accumulated 96 points to earn the state championship, well ahead of runner-up Anahuac's 37. Coach Carter left Iowa Park in January of 1963 to accept the track coach position at Amarillo Tascosa.






And, Donna says she already loves it here, even though she hasn't had much time to get acquainted with a lot of people.

Fry bacon until crisp and drain. In 2 Tbsp. bacon grease, cook onion until tender, but not brown. Stir in flour, sugar, salt, water and vinegar. Cook and stir 3 minutes. Add potatoes, heat thoroughly. Crumble bacon over top and sprinkle with celery seed and garlic salt. Serve warm. (Works well in electric skillet).





Recalling Carter years

By JIM GARD (Editor's note: Gard was a member of the great Hawk track teams coached by Bill Carter, and recalls those winning years.)

EADER

Thirty-plus years have passed but I can vividly remember the sheer exitement of it.

Before football championships in the late 60's, Iowa Park was for a time the premier small track school in the state. The green and white performed from Commerce to Amarillo, from Wichita Falls to Austin. Almost always winning championships.

This period started in 1958 when Bill Carter was hired away from Holliday to be head coach. In addition to football he would also be head track coach. The school didn't know it at the time but it was this add-on duty that would propel Iowa Park into the state spotlight.

The Hawks ran, jumped and threw to two regional titles, one state championship and a state runner-up between 1959 and 1962.

It was entertaining and electrifying to be from Iowa Park at a major track meet. Up-starts from around the state took turns challenging the Hawks but seldom did they succeed. Some wanted simply to be in the same heat with the Hawks, thinking some of the magic would rub off and make them faster.

The district meets of 1959, 1960 and 1961 have a great many wonderful memories for me. These were the smallest contests we entered but they were the starting point for regional and state competitions.

A performer or relay team had to finish first or second to continue to the next level. The big invitational meets were like warm-ups for the march to state. A bad day, a dropped baton and it was all over.

In 1959 I was out for track but really didn't understand the dedication and discipline needed until the district meet. I spent the year fooling around with the 220, throwing the shot put and sometimes running a leg on the 440 relay.

In '59, Iowa Park was going to win

Usually with business associates, the theme from "Chariots of Fire" would play softly in the background as the story unfolds.

In reality it was a cool, windy day in Wichita Falls. As was the custom, I was laying on the team blanket when the bad news started making the round.

Somebody on the mile relay was coughing and didn't feel well so an alternate would have to be selected to run. Someone already finished for the afternoon who really hadn't trained for the 400. Who would that be? Not me, I hoped.

The delima was how to be there with the team but remain invisible. My tactic would be to turn over and appear to be asleep. While my private battle was raging, apparently so were several others because the blanked area suddenly sounded alive like a whooping cough ward.

I had been immediately outflanked by several upper classmen. Sleeping was nowhere near as bad as coughing. Undaunted, I stayed with my original ploy. The other members of the mile relay were warming up so a decision was very near.

Out of the corner of my eye I saw Coach Carter nearing. He walked once around the blanket listening to the coughing which had just gotten a lot worse.

Darn, why did I choose sleeping? I was even believing some of those guys coughing.

Again, his shoes appeared in view and again they went away. On his third lap around the blanket, he stopped right at my head and I knew I better start coughing. Still hoping, I didn't move until he called my name.

"How do you feel," he asked, and it was at that point my life changed. "Okay," I said.

"Here's what I want you to do," he said.

Some people seek out and embrace responsibility, others have it slipped in their pocket and happen to find it.

Iowa Park won the mile relay and finished fifth at regional two weeks later. At an awards assembly near the

David Parkey, Bob Gilbreath, and I ran together for two more years, losing only one race. Donald Thompson joined us in 1960 and Jack Brooks replaced him in 1961.

The district track meet of 1960 was a little like the marines against the Cub Scouts. Iowa Park was a seasoned track team with victories at big meets. We had sprinters like Tony Waters and Donald Thompson, we had a great weight man in Lyndell Glenn. We had relays and we had Gilbreath.

It just wasn't fair to the other members of District 1-A-11. We won 11 of 14 events and finished second in two more. Twelve new district records were set and we set 10 of those.

In 1960, Iowa Park was a jugernaut. I even got a fourth in the shot put. It was nearly 10 feet behind Lyndell, but it was four points.

The district meet of 1961 was unusual for several reasons. Iowa Park moved up in class to AA and faced new and bigger schools, but with much the same results.

The most unusual thing, however, was the hail storm and tornado that occurred while I was running the mile relay.

TORNADO DURING RACE

Coach Carter knew we would win in a walk so he let Bobby (Gilbreath) run another event while I anchored the mile relay. During the first leg it started raining; during the second leg the wind started howling and during the third leg the sky went black.

As the baton was passed to me it started hailing. The wind was so bad that with it to my back I ran off the rack and into the street trying to make the final curve. The hail was so bad that visibility was cut to 10 feet.

One runner, that was behind, tried to cut across the field but got lost and couldn't find the other side. A tornado hit the main gate at Sheppard AFB, about two miles away while all this was occuring.

At the end of the race, I kept on running to my mother's car, where she had taken shelter. Everyone had taken shelter so it was a while before the track meet could resume so it could end.

One positive was that at the regional meet the slowest team gets a good lane assignment. We were the best team in the state, but also had the slowest district time so we got the good lane.

For me, there are certain sounds and actions that can make the blood flow and the adrenaline pump hit at 80 pounds per square inch. The Marine Corps Hymn is one, a bugle playing any command is another. And the passing of the baton on any relay at a track meet is another.

It is a pleasure in my memory to lace up the green and white spikes and hear Coach Carter call, "We have to win the mile relay to win the meet."





GARDENING HINTS

By MARK TERNING, COUNTY AGENT - HORTICULTURE

Late March and throughout April are prime landscaping and gardening months for the Texoma area.

Vegetable gardeners and flower lovers will find an abundance of beautiful plants at local nurseries, garden centers, and feed stores. Follow this garden check list for your upcoming lawn, landscape, and garden endeavors.

Planting

* Complete all cool-season vegetable planting as soon as possible.

* Tomato transplants can be planted after our last average killing frost date - March 25. Several excellent home garden varieties of tomatoes are: Celebrity, Carnival, President, Champion, Merced and Sujperfantastic.

* Plant containerized fruit, pecan and shade trees. Nurseries have excellent selections at this time of year.

* Plant warm-season annual flowers in April for summer-long color in landscape beds and containers.

* Establish new lawns from sod, hydromulch, plugs, or seed in later April.

* Utilize shade-loving groundcovers in dense shade areas such as under large trees now. Fertilizers

* Apply a lawn food with a 3-1-2 or 4-1-2 ratio in mid-April to warm season lawns. Use a product which contains slow-release nitrogen. These types of fertilizers are also fine for shrubs, trees and even groundcover.

* Test garden soil every two years to determine pH levels, and nutrient needs. Local county extension offices and garden centers have soil test information.

* Use slow-release fertilizers such as Osmocote in containers for top flower performance.

* Begin zinc sprays on pecan trees at budbreak.

Pruning

* Clean up lawn areas by mowing a slightly lower cutting height.

* Prune spring flowering shrubs and vines soon after blooming.

Pest. Diesase and Weed Control * Apply a broadleaf weed control

such as Weed-B-Gone or Wipeout for broadleaf weeds in lawns.

* Begin a regular spray program on peaches, plums and apricots when flower petals begin to fall. Multipurpose fruit tree sprays are available at local garden centers or pest control outlets.

* Control black spot on roses with regular applications of Funginex.

* Use floating row-covers such as Gro-Web on tomato cages for insect and disease suppression.



AUSTIN — Thirty U.S. House members from Texas and 77 other members of Congress are calling on President Clinton to convene an energy summit to find ways to shore up the battered domestic energy industry.

In a letter to Clinton, the bipartisan group of lawmakers from 29 states pointed to the "alarming deterioration" of the industry.

Since oil prices slumped last October, more than 13,500 jobs have been lost in the domestic industry — which lost half a million jobs in the last decade.

"The statistics speak clearly to the crisis which the domestic industry and nation face," the lawmakers wrote in the letter coordinated by Sen. David Boren, D-Okla.

Last year, the nation posted its lowest domestic oil production since 1958, averaging 6.8 million barrels a day.

The members representing onefifth of Congress, want to talk to Clinton about tax incentives to encourage new drilling, production and regulatory relief.

"The collapse of oil prices that began last October has driven U.S. prices below the cost of much of our domestic production, the congressmen wrote.

The White House has stood firm against intervention to halt the downward spiral of oil prices and the administration rebuffed attempts by independent producers

to obtain a floor on import prices or an oil import fee.

Meanwhile, the Index of Leading Texas Economic Indicators indicates moderate growth during the third quarter of the year, according to the state comptroller's office.



Long distance dialing change is announced

Your fingers are going to have to do more walking to make long distance calls next week.

Beginning at 12:01 a.m. Wednesday, Mar. 30, all long distance telephone calls dialed within the 817 area code must be dialed with the area code.

That will mean dialing "1+817+seven digit number" or "0+817+seven digit number."

Dialing "1+ or 0+seven digit number" will not work.

"We're nearing the point where we will run out of phone numbers in 817," said Bob McJilton, area manager for Southwestern Bell Telephone."We have implemented this change to match growth without creating a new area code."

McJilton said dialing 817 is now required because new local dialing prefixes that resemble area codes will be created for new phone numbers in the non-metro area of 817.


The new prefixes will have an "0" or a "1" as a middle digit, as do area codes. Local number prefixes in this area do not have such a configeration at this time, according to McJilton.


"This means programmed long distance numbers within the area, such as those used with speed dialing or call forwarding, must be programmed to include the 817 area code," he said.


"Without dialing 817, you'll reach a recording saying you must dial 817 to complete your call," McJilton added.
