

# Trustees extend contracts

The school board approved contracts for next year for auxiliary employees, accepted two resignations, and approved application of a waiver request for eighth grade TAAS test dates.

traveling north at the time.

Following a short, 12-minute executive session, trustees voted to extend the contracts for auxiliary employees through the 1994-95 school year.

The two resignations acted on were from Brad Lewis, junior high coach and science teacher, and Debbie Rowland, computer aide at Kidwell Elementary.

Junior High Principal Randy Lovelady explained to the board his reason for asking test date changing next year for eighth grade students was to "spread out the testing more."

If approved by the Texas Education Agency, the changes would affect the science and history TAAS test dates.

Lovelady told the board that, as it now stands, those test dates are immediately before final examinations in the spring, causing considerable stress on the students, as well as allowing

little or no time for pre-test reviewing. George Brandt, who has been administering the district's energy education program, told the board the savings had not been as great as had been anticipated.

The program is part of a contract with a private corporation, which was begun a year ago with the promise the savings would far exceed the cost of

The third required public hearing that, the council will consider action on an ordinance completing the process.


If approved, it will be the second such annexation in as many meetings of the council.

# TU Electric introduces program at junior high

The seventh grade class at Iowa Park Junior High School is about to learn some good driving habits long before they are old enough to get their license. These students will be taking part in a course to benefit the environment that will be introduced this week at the school.

Dolores Hamilton, chairman of the Iowa Park Clean and Green beautification committee, will help Iowa Park Independent School District officials launch the new program with a pep talk in conjunction with demonstrations of environmentally-sound uses of energy at an assembly of seventh grade students at 9:05 Wednesday morning in the girls gymnasium.

Called "In Concert With the Environment (TM)," this new program teaches students how to protect the environment by changing the way they from car-pooling and regular cartuneups to efficient use of electric appli-

ances and recycling. TU Electric is bringing this program to junior high and middle schools throughout their service territory. The company plans to make it available to more than 100,000 seventh grade students over the next five years.

The seven-day course introduces a brand-new concept called an EcoWatt to measure the environmental impact of daily energy use. Students learn that EcoWatt Benefits result whenever energy is used more wisely, water is not wasted or air is not polluted.

We're trying to prepare students now for the societal roles that will be needed in the future. Protecting the environment will be very important, and this program prepares them to use natural resources wisely," said Randy Lovelady, Iowa Park Junior High principal.

EcoWatt Benefits are calculated by each student using a computer program to show the results of their energy-saving actions, such as good driving habits, changing cooling or heating thermostat settings, using less

hot water and recycling cans. They also learn how poor energy-use habits damage the environment.

The interactive computer-based program is a science curriculum course developed two years ago by EcoGroup, Inc. for use in partnership with electric utilities. It has reached about 70,000 students in 250 schools in 15 states from New York to Hawaii.

"This program continues our longterm commitment to protect the environment," said Dale Cox, TU Electric manager. "By encouraging energy conservation, it also meets the company's goals to keep growth in peak electric load down in order to reduce the need for future power generating facilities."

In Concert With the Environment (TM) provides studentss comprehensive information about how natural resources are converted into energy for the home, transportation and other uses and how these conversions affect the environment. They complete an individualized energy audit to gather data on their own and their family's use of energy. Parent involvement is encouraged and parents will be invited to visit the classroom during the course.

Students input their research data into a computer to generate a personalized action plan that outlines how many energy dollars can be saved and how many EcoWatt Benefits can be gained by changing the way they and their families use energy. For example, a student's report might show that recycling cans would result in an energy dollar savings of \$1 per month and an environmental benefit of 194 EcoWatts, and that weatherizing the family's home would save \$100 a year in energy costs and 80 EcoWatt Benefits.

Course materials and computer data have been customized to reflect the energy use, fuel resources, residential electric rates and weather data in this part of Texas.


In addition to farming, Thomas works for ABB Control in Wichita

#### Topping

1 Tbsp. sugar 1/2 tsp. cinnamon

Beat together flour, salt, baking powder and uncooked pudding mix, 1/ 4 cup sugar, milk and egg. Pour into greased 10" pie pan.

Drain peaches, save juice. Pour peaches over batter. Beat together cream cheese, 1/2 cup sugar and 3 Tbsps. peach juice until smooth. Spoon over peaches to within 1-inch of pan

Combine sugar and cinnamon, and sprinkle over top. Bake 30-35 minutes at 350 degrees.

#### **Cherry Nut Crunch**

2 cups crushed corn flakes 1 can cherry pie filling 1/2 cup nuts

1 stick margarine, melted

Combine corn flakes (I use Total) and cake mix. Spread pie filling in 8x8 inch baking dish. Sprinkle cake mix and crumb mixture evenly over the top of the filling. Drizzle margarine over the top, making sure it's completely covered.

Bake about one hour at 350 degrees. Top with nuts the last ten minSeve with ice cream while still

NOTE: For a lighter dessert, use a light cake mix, margarine and pie filling.

#### Veggie Pizza

1 pkg. crescent rolls 1 - 8 oz. pkg. cream cheese 2/4 cup Miracle Whip 1 pkg. Hidden Valley Ranch dressing Diced vegetables

Roll crescent rolls onto large cookie sheet. Bake 10 minutes at 350 degrees, then let cool.

Mix cream cheese, Miracle Whip and dressing and spread over crescent rolls. Top with all of your favorite veggies. I use broccoli, carrots, bell peppers, radishes, black olives, cauliflower and green onions. The more colors, the prettier it is.

#### **Homemade Rolls**


3 cups flour 1 cup warm water

1 pkg. dry yeast 1/2 tsp. salt

1/4 cup sugar

1 egg, beaten 1 Tbsps. oil

Dissolve yeast in warm water. Add sugar, salt, egg and oil. Stir well and add flour. Mix together, then cover and let rise until double in size. Punch down. Pour a little oil in your baking pan. Form rolls, dip in oil, and let rise again. Bake 10 minutes at 350 degrees. Makes 1 dozen rolls.

While living in Iowa Park they were active in the community throughout their marriage.



Mr. and Mrs. Rains and their daughter hold fond memories of their years in Iowa Park.



I hope you agree, and do your part. And for those who don't, I'll just put on my best sneer as I drive by your place. And maybe mutter a few unkind words under my breath.






## The Often Chronic Discomfort of Allergies

- · Each year, more than 40 million Americans suffer from allergic rhinitis, also known as hay fever.
- · These "allergic bouts" of a stuffy head and watery eyes can occur one or more times a year, or they last practically all year round.
- · Three million work days and two million school days are lost each year to allergy attacks.
- Normally harmless substances can cause allergic reactions in sensitive people. These substances commonly include: pollen from plants, dust, mold, foods, and dander (skin particles) from animals.
- · Americans spend an estimated \$500 million each year on allergy treatments. Although there is no cure, there are a number of ways to fight allergies.
- Over-the-counter medications and prescription medicines are the most common forms of treatment. Immunotherapy, or injection therapy, is both expensive and time-consuming, so it is generally used only in severe or chronic situations.
- · Avoidance, in principle, is the simplest therapy. Once the allergen has been identified, the sufferer can try to avoid it.
- · Some of the most common allergy symptoms are:

Eyes - itching, tearing, reddening, or swelling

Nose - sneezing (often repetitive), itching, congestion, or runniness Skin - a rash develops that is almost always itchy and consists of spots that are raised, flat, red, or white, hive-like, or raw and oozing Digestive tract - nausea, vomiting, cramps, loose stools, or diarrhea from eating a particular food.







## Texas-Korea beef trade likely, says a leader of beef industry

The next major trading partner for Texas beef producers may be the Republic of Korea, says Texas beef industry leader Harlan Huffman of McGregor.

Huffman, a Texas rancher and farmer, was one of four directors of the Texas Beef Council (TBC) who recently returned from six days of meetings with representatives of Korean "supergroups" that handle sales of imported beef.

The Texas team evaluated the potential for beef trade between Korea and Texas under a new beef merchandising arrangement that became effective June 26, 1993. The agreement was negotiated and signed by the governments of Korea and the United States under the terms of the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (GATT).


The U.S. Meat Export Federation (USMEF) played a major role in the negotiations by providing technical and market information. USMEF also promotes the advantages of U.S. beef in Korea through promotion, marketing and trade servicing.

A major provision of the new agreement, Huffman says, is a Simultaneous Buy-Sell (SBS) system SBS allows U.S. marketers to deal directly with end users--restaurants, hotels and supermarkets--for 10 percent of the imported beef Korea will buy in 1993.

The SBS portion will increase an additional 10 percent annually until full liberalization of the Korean market occurs in 1997. Before this agreement, the Korean government and livestock groups controlled access to that country's beef markets.

Huffman says the new terms on market access will greatly increase opportunities for exports to Korea from major cattle-producing states like Texas. By 2000, Korea's beef purchases could propel that country into

second place among U.S. customers... To reach the Korean market, Huffman says, U.S. beef producers will have to battle for market share with Australia and New Zealand. These



two countries also have signed beef agreements with Korea.

At present, they share two-thirds of the Korean market compared to the one-third share held by the U.S. However, Australian and New Zealand beef is produced mostly on grass. The average Korean meat buyer perceives that product as lower in quality than grain-fed U.S. beef.

"Through the effort of USMEF and the attitudes of the supergroups, we'll get our portion of the market," Huffman said. "We'll have to continue to maintain contact with buyers in Korea and reassure them that we will move our product in a way that benefits both countries."

Before returning to the U.S., Huffman and the Texas trade team members also met with beef importers on the island of Taiwan. Huffman says the Taiwanese market also offers great opportunity.


