Young girl found home after all-night search

Only minutes before searchers were to put a team of bloodhounds on her trail, nine-year-old Nina Martin was found Wednesday morning.

She was safe, unhurt, slightly hungry, and apparently had never left the premises of her home at 718 East Cash.

For approximately 11 hours, the youth had remained undetected by the largest posse assembled here in more than three decades.

Little Nina was listed as a possible runaway after she was determined as missing from the front porch of her home. She had been put there by her mother after an argument with her older brother, so the two would be separated.

At 4:34 p.m., the mother reported to police that she was missing.

Family and police immediately launched a search of the area. And before dark, called in members of the local volunteer fire department.

Before finding her, hiding curled up on the ground near an abandoned car at 3:30 a.m., more than 50 searchers had been combing the entire city, as well as all three lake areas.

Joining the initial search groups were officers from the county sheriff's office, deputies from Archer County, Wichita Falls Fire Department, and civilian volunteers.

A team of bloodhounds from Children Education Search and Rescue, a private Fort Worth company, had just arrived on the scene to join the others, when the youngster was located.

Though the fear she had been kidnapped was never broadcast over the police radio, the knowledge that such situations involving young girls that have been reported nationally was on the minds of those in the search.

Wichita Falls television stations were notified of the girls' missing, in hopes someone might see and report her.

At one time, a neighbor alerted

police of having seen a white automobile stopped in the street in front of the home and seeing a young girl run from the house and get in it.

That information also was transmitted. But it was later determined that a family friend had heard a report of the girl's missing, and had gone to check on the family, and told officials that had been their vehicle.

OTHER POLICE ACTIVITIES

Seven arrests were made during the past week, according to police blotter entries.

Police were called to the 700 block of West Alameda at 12:57 a.m. Sunday, where it was suspected three persons were violating the city's newly-enacted curfew ordinance.

The parents of two juveniles were called to pick their youngsters up, but a third person, Michael Keith Smith, 19, was arrested on a disorderly conduct charge and taken to the police department.

When an officer stopped a vehicle at 6:32 a.m. Sunday in the 600 block of West Highway, it was determined the driver, Jimmie Don Miller, 38 had an outstanding warrant for his arrest issued by the sheriff's office for violation of probation.

Miller was held in the local jail until being transported to Wichita Falls at 7:36 a.m., according to the blotter entry.

Saturday morning, police were called to Wal-Mart where a suspected shoplifter was being detained by store personnel.

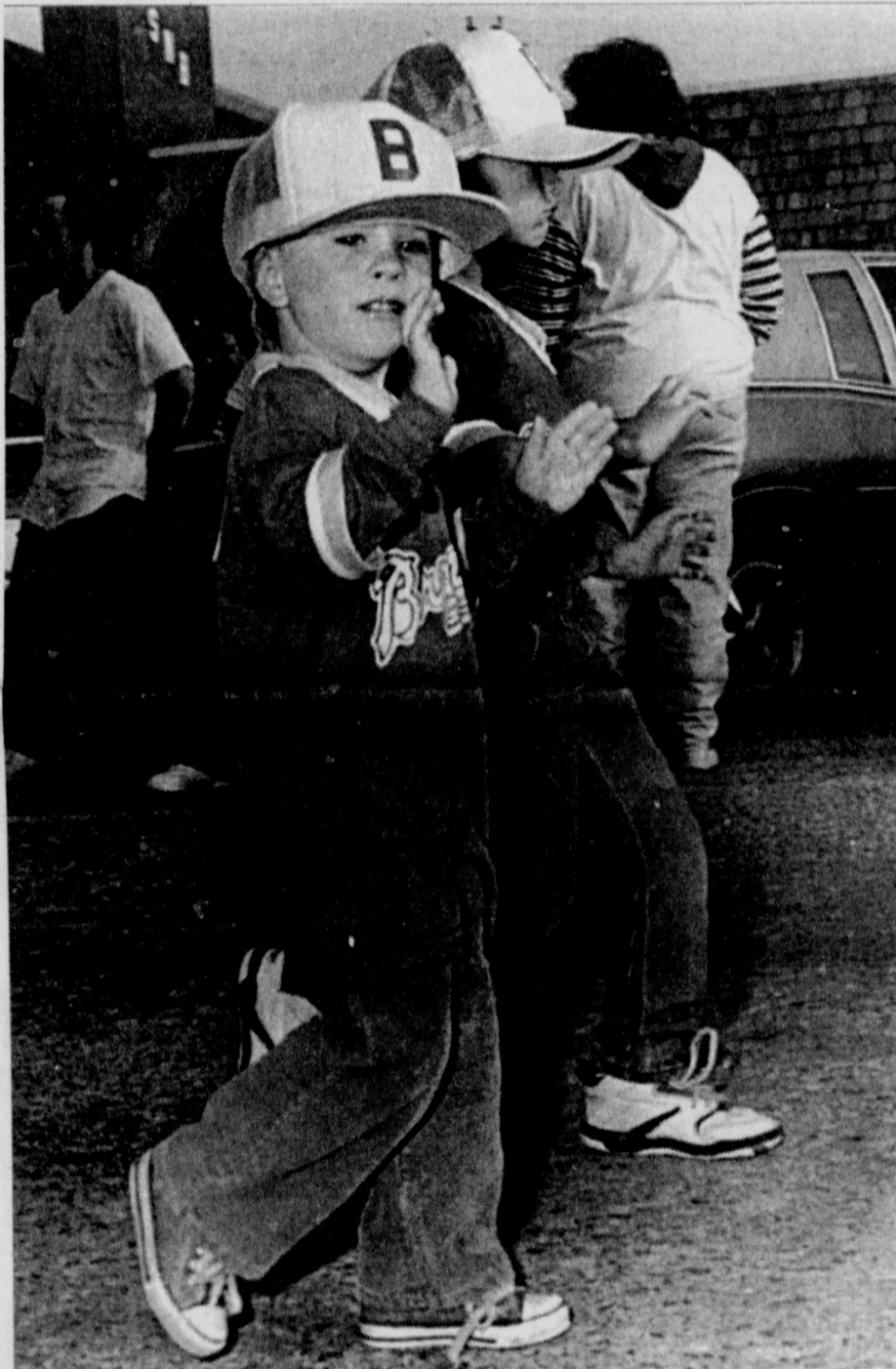

County not paying share to fight rural fires - House

Based on figures compiled over the past five years, Iowa Park taxpayers are supplementing the county government \$58,000 annually to finance rural firefighting.

Those figures were presented to the city council during Monday night's regular council meeting.

Over the past five years, 74 percent of the fires fought by the Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Department have been outside the city limits.

The city's fire department budget this year is \$98,040. That is partially offset by \$14,400 received from Wichita County, but the remaining \$72,550 is financed by city taxes.

The county has, for the past few years, been allotting \$14,400 to each of the volunteer fire departments of the county, regardless of how many fires they respond to.

City aldermen voted to authorize Mayor Wayne House and Administrator Mike Price to approach the

commissioners court, during its next budget-making process, to more fully fund the cost of rural firefighting costs.

"I have a hard time asking our city taxpayers to finance the cost of fighting fires outside the city," the mayor said.

According to figures shown the council, Iowa Park's equipment was used to fight an average of 93 rural fires annually over the past five years, and only 33 inside the city.

Local firemen responded to 123 rural fire calls in 1993, 63 in 1992, 59 in 1991, 116 in 1990 and 105 in 1989, the report indicated, for a total of 466.

At the same time, only 166 fire calls were made inside the city.

It also was pointed out that Iowa Park receives the same county funding as West Wichita Volunteer Fire Department, which had a total of 268 rural fires during those same five years.

Figures for the other volunteer departments of the county were not available.

OTHER BUSINESS

An ordinance concerning traffic flow on newly-rebuilt Washington Street was approved by the council.

The only stop signs located on Washington will be at Bell Road, Victoria, Wall, Pacific and West Highway.

Yield signs controlling north and south traffic on streets intersecting Washington will be located on Yosemite, Jackson and First streets.

A resolution authorizing the mayor to execute a lease agreement with the Optimist Club, to construct a gymnasium at the Recreational Activities Center, was approved by the council.

No term is indicated in the agreement, but it can be cancelled should the civic organization cease to exist, or the gymnasium not be used for the public's benefit.

Two other ordinances also were approved by aldermen. One dealt with

ADD: adds up to children and adults who seem to get others out of control

Anger, reprimands, punishment, anxiety, despair, guilt and tears. "Mother, he kicked the puppy again." "Daddy, he hit me." "He didn't finish picking up his toys and he's gone out to play."

This frustrating scenario, or similar ones, go on day after day and parents wonder, "What is wrong, how can I cope with this? It's driving me crazy. What am I doing wrong? What is the answer?" "No matter how much I take away his privileges, or punish him, it doesn't seem to do any good."

Remembering there are thousands across the United States just like their child does not ease the worry and tension for parents of a child with Attention Deficit Disorder (ADD).

It is estimated by some that between three and 10 percent of the schoolage population across the nation have ADD. Some professionals place the figure higher, at 15 percent. And their needs are diverse and unique.

The estimate locally is that two percent of the students in Iowa Park schools have the problem. Early testing and diagnostic programs are very important.

Fortunately the program is implemented at both Kidwell and Bradford Elementary schools, but many schools across the country the

size of Iowa Park, and larger do not have the program set-up.

Counselors at both schools emphasize the importance of a child with ADD having special understanding, support and help from his parents, siblings, and caregivers. In fact, they need the patience of Job.

Although Attention Deficit Disorder has been receiving more publicity in the past year or more, there still are parents, particularly of pre-school children, who may not realize that is their child's problem.

A lot of times parents, especially younger parents, are told by others, "Oh, he's just being a boy, he'll outgrow it." To themselves, they may think, "What he needs is some good spankings and more disciplining."

Many times the parents, family, friends and even teachers misunderstand the child's actions and think of him as being difficult, hyperactive, needs to be disciplined, and sometimes they are, very harshly. In some situations, they are abused emotionally also.

Children who have not yet been diagnosed having ADD hear words like lazy, troublesome, bad, a trouble-maker.

One of the side-effects emotionally is that the individual is put down and it makes him question his self-

worth, or he grows up believing he is no good, just a bad person, dumb and clumsy. He lives with the legacy of scoldings and blame that remains for life. Blame is the main perspective from which his life is structured.

There are many facets of Attention Deficit Disorder and ways in which it effects a person's behavior. Once diagnosed with ADD, the prognosis is-- there is no cure--it is a life-long condition.

ADD undermines the abilities and personality of the individual. Its damage spreads to the relationships that are an inevitable part of each person's life.

Professionals who work with ADD patients believe it may occur from four to 12 times more often in males than females.

But, with medication, sometimes therapy, and help and understanding, by adulthood, the individual is able to work around most of his behavior problems. However, according to professionals, most children with Attention Deficit Disorder have to take medication throughout their lifetime.

Dianne Granbery, counselor at Bradford Elementary School, said when a teacher comes to her and tells her she has a child in her room that she cannot tolerate his behavior and has done all she knows to do, Mrs.

Granbery calls the child's parents. She has questionnaires that she sends to the parents to fill out, and also one for the teacher.

After questionnaires are returned if they indicate the child may have Attention Deficit Disorder, they are referred to Dr. Larry Lyford, or Drs. Scott or Keith Williamson in Wichita Falls for diagnosis.

Doctors impress that understanding the symptoms and their range and diversity and means of dealing with them is something every parent with an ADD child needs to know.

As a rule, Attention Deficit Disorder children have normal to above normal intelligence and may or may not be hyperactive. The professional community knows that all hyperactive children also have ADD, but that not all children with ADD are hyperactive.

The electrical, biochemical, anatomical, and developmental characteristics of ADD symptoms are now recognized as involving the central nervous system.

Dr. Lyford lists some points that parents, teachers, and caregivers should remember.

An ADD person can take in everything around them, but lack the ability to select what is important and block out what is not important. They

have divided attention problems; every stimulus is noticed and responded to, often in an accentuated way.

Attention Deficit children are very emotional and respond to every emotion in the room.

They are very impulsive and by the time they think about what they are going to do, they are already doing it. If asked about the consequences of their actions, they know them, but consequences do not enter into their decision process of whether or not to act, and they do not learn from their mistakes as well as others. It would stand to reason under these conditions that a child cannot help, physical punishment would do little good.

They start something, but do not finish, completion is not a goal. Here positive reinforcement is better than negative reinforcement.

Some of the things that increase Attention Deficit are insecurity, tension and rejection. Tension causes the person to act as if a voltage amplifier goes into them.

ADD patients tend to have poor self-esteem, because they are yelled at, compared to someone else, or are criticized so often.

ADD children usually have more problems in a group situation than when they are one on one. The reason is because they are easily distracted

both visually and auditorily.

These children are prone to have temper outbursts and unpredictable behaviors and parents may sometimes worry that these children have no conscience.

They may have difficulty keeping friends because they usually play rougher than the average child. The more overly active children may sometimes appear to have never ending energy, and need less sleep than most children.

Many ADD children are afraid of the dark and some become extremely dependent upon their mothers. Some develop separation anxiety to the point of being afraid to go to school because they fear their mother will not come to get them. Others do not seem to be afraid of the dark, or anything else.

ADD children accuse other people. Their primary defense mechanism is projection. They blame outside influences for their getting into trouble.

However, many of these children may show genuine remorse for misbehaviors incurred earlier. But, this doesn't necessarily curb the misbehaviors.

"What a delicious dish! May I have your recipe? These are the words any cook loves to hear, and makes the art of cooking a pure joy," said Carlah Chapman, this week's featured cook.

One of the recipes she is sharing this week, "Banana Hawaiian Delight," is a recipe that will draw such requests. It was given to her back in the 50's by a home economics teacher in Los Angeles, Calif. who told her to "pass it on."

Carlah grew up in Fairfax, Okla. where she lived with her grandmother who reared 16 children and six of her grandchildren.

Carlah said that her grandmother was an excellent cook and continued cooking up until a month before she died at the age of 97. "By the time I was five or six, I had learned how to cook, clean house, and take care of babies," she said.

Carlah went through high school in Belleville, Ill., and received a degree in business administration from Clarendon College at Pampa, Tx.

Carlah's husband, Fred, died in 1979. She has one daughter, Pat Hall of Iowa Park, and four grandchildren. Between 1961 and 1978, Carlah also raised 75 foster children.

She moved to Iowa Park in 1988, and operates a day care center. She also is state manager for Travelers Motor Club where she trains and oversees their district managers.

In her spare time, Carlah likes to sew, cook, and ride horses. She is a member of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints where she participates in the Relief Society, a member of the FOE Eagles Auxiliary, and an honorary member of the VFW.

Carlah cooks a lot for one, and many of her recipes can be divided to accommodate cooking a smaller amount.

COOK OF THE WEEK

Two of her favorite recipes, "Mable's Pumpkin Roll" and "Mable's Frozen Pumpkin Dessert," were given to her by her grandmother.

Mable's Pumpkin Roll

Pre-heat oven to 375 degrees. Preparation time: 25 minutes; cooking time: 15 minutes; chilling time: 1 to 2 hours.

For 1 roll, 8 to 10 servings, you will need:

- 3 eggs
- 1 cup sugar
- 2/3 cup canned pumpkin
- 3/4 cup all-purpose flour
- 1 tsp. baking powder
- 2 tps. cinnamon
- 1 tsp. ginger
- 1/2 tsp. nutmeg
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- Filling (recipe follows)
- Mint leaves for garnish (optional)
- Orange slices for garnish (optional)

Filling

Beat together, 1 - 8 oz. pkg. cream cheese and 4 tablespoons butter or margarine. Stir in 1 cup powdered sugar and 1 teaspoon vanilla extract, blending until smooth.

Preparation:

In a large bowl, combine eggs and sugar, beating well. Add pumpkin, mixing until blended.

In a separate bowl, combine flour, baking powder, spices and salt. Add to egg mixture, mixing well.

Spread batter into a greased and wax paper-lined 10x15-inch jelly roll pan.

Bake 15 minutes at 375 degrees. Remove from pan.

Cool 15 minutes; place cake on clean tea towel and cool 10 minutes longer.

From 10-inch side, roll cake up in towel and set aside. Meanwhile, prepare filling.

Unroll cake and place on plastic wrap. Evenly spread filling over cake. Roll up cake and cover with plastic wrap. Place cake, seam-side down and chill for at least 2 hours.

When serving, cut cake in even slices. Garnish with mint leaves and/or orange slices if desired.

Chicken Creole

For 4 servings you will need:

- 2 whole chicken breasts, skinned and boned
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 1 Tbsp. oil

Sauce:

- 3 Tbsps. oil
- 1 cup finely chopped onions
- 1/2 cup finely sliced celery
- 1/2 cup finely diced green peppers
- 2 cloves garlic, minced or pressed
- 1 can (14 1/2 oz.) whole peeled tomatoes
- 1/2 cup water
- 1 1/2 tsp. paprika
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- Dash cayenne pepper
- 1 bay leaf
- 1 tsp. cornstarch
- 1 Tbsp. cold water
- Minced celery leaves for garnish (optional)

Preparation time: 30 minutes; Cooking time: 35 minutes.

Wash chicken, trim off any excess fat; pat dry. With kitchen shears, cut chicken into 1-inch pieces. Toss with salt and pepper.

In a large skillet, heat oil. Add chicken and cook over medium-high to high heat - about 5 minutes or until chicken is opaque on all sides and very slightly golden. Turn chicken frequently. Remove chicken and juices and set aside.

In same skillet, heat oil. Add onions, celery, green pepper and garlic and saute until vegetables are tender.

Stir in tomatoes and their liquid. Break up with spoon. Stir in 1/2 cup water, paprika, salt, cayenne pepper and bay leaf. Bring to a boil; cover and simmer over low to medium heat about 10 minutes. Stir in chicken and juices.

Blend together cornstarch and 1 tablespoon water. Stir into chicken mixture. Uncover and simmer over low heat 10 to 15 minutes or until chicken is done and tender.

Serve with rice.

NOTE: For 1 or 2 people, divide into 4 freezer bags, freeze and microwave as needed.

Mable's Frozen Pumpkin Dessert

Makes 4 to 6 servings. You will need:

- 1 cup cooked pumpkin
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/2 tsp. each salt, ground ginger, cinnamon, and nutmeg
- 1/2 cup chopped pecans, toasted
- 4 cups (half of a 1/2 gal. container) vanilla ice cream, softened
- 2 cups gingersnap cookie crumbs
- Kiwi and raspberries for garnish

Preparation time: 10 minutes; Freezing time: 5 hours.

In a medium bowl combine pumpkin, sugar, salt, ginger, cinnamon and nutmeg. Stir in pecans.

In a large chilled bowl, fold pumpkin mixture into softened ice cream.

Place 1 cup cookie crumbs in bottom of a glass serving dish. Spread half of the ice cream mixture on top. Sprinkle with remaining crumbs. (Reserve some for the top)

Spoon on the rest of the ice cream mixture. Sprinkle top with some cookie crumbs. Cover tightly with plastic wrap and freeze for 5 hours or until firm. Garnish with Kiwi, raspberries or other fruits or berries.

Potato and Cheese Casserole

Here is a sophisticated version of an American classic. It is well-suited for a dinner party. Assemble in advance and bake just before serving.

For 4 servings you will need:

- 2 lbs. baking potatoes, peeled & diced into 2-inch pieces
- 1 clove garlic, minced or pressed
- 1/2 cup thinly sliced green onion
- 2 Tbsps. butter or margarine
- 4 oz. cream cheese, softened and cut into cubes
- 1/2 cup half and half
- 3/4 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 8 oz. cold Brie or Camembert cheese with rind removed, diced into 1/2-inch pieces.

Thyme or parsley for garnish

Preparation time: 30 minutes; Cooking time: 15 minutes.

Preheat oven to 450 degrees.

Cook potatoes in boiling, salted water 15 minutes or until tender. drain well.

Meanwhile, saute garlic and green onion in butter for 2 minutes or until soft.

Mash potatoes and beat in garlic butter mixture, cream cheese, half and half, salt and pepper. Fold in Brie or Camembert cheese and place in 1 1/2 quart casserole. Bake at 450 degrees 15 minutes or until top begins to lightly brown. Garnish with thyme or parsley. Serve at once.

Good served with broiled steak, lamb or pork chops and a tossed green salad.

NOTE: If desired, substitute 5 to 8 ozs. crumbled blue cheese for Brie cheese.

Kansas City Steak Strips

- Serves 4. You will need:
- 2 sirloin strip steaks, about 12 oz. each
 - 3 Tbsps. butter or margarine
 - 1 cup thinly sliced green onions, tops included
 - 1/2 cup beef broth
 - 1/2 cup chili sauce
 - Dash salt
 - Dash black pepper
 - 1 - 9 oz. pkg. frozen green beans

Preparation time: 15 minutes; Cooking time: 15 minutes.

Cut meat into strips. Heat half the butter in a skillet. Add meat and saute over med. high heat until meat is brown and cooked to your liking. Do not overcook! Remove meat and keep warm.

Add remaining butter to pan. Add green onions. Saute over med. high heat 4 or 5 minutes until onions are soft but not brown. Remove.

Add broth to pan. Heat and scrape pan brownings. Add chili sauce. Add green beans and heat for a few minutes. Add meat and green onions and stir to blend well.

Cook over high heat for a few minutes until mixture is hot. Add salt and pepper if desired. Serve immediately.

NOTE: This dish is simple to prepare and excellent for unexpected guests. Serve with pasta or rice and a salad.

Banana Hawaiian Delight

- 1/2 pint whipping cream
 - 1 cup sour cream
 - 2 Tbsps. confectioners sugar
 - 6 firm bananas cut into 2-inch long pieces
 - 1 - 8 oz. can flaked coconut
- Whip cream until stiff; add sour cream and sugar. Whip at low speed until just blended.
- Dip bananas into cream mixture, coating well. Roll in coconut.
- Serve on tray with chilled fruit.
- May be prepared several hours in advance.
- Yield: 18 servings.

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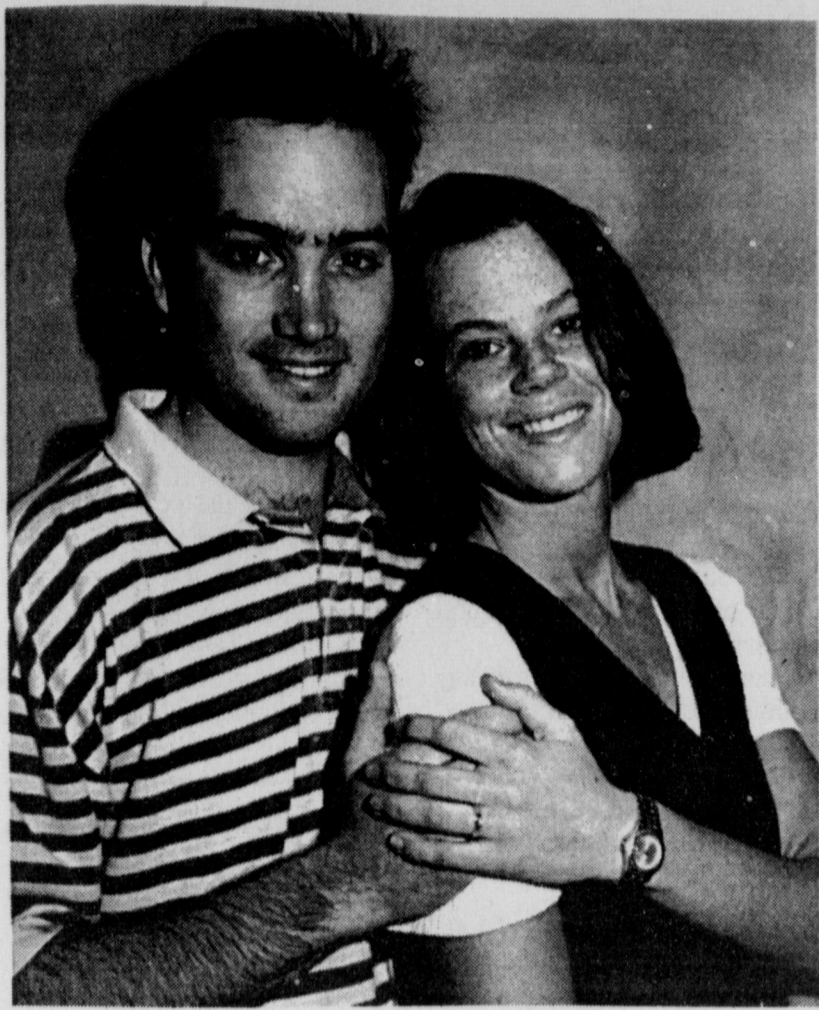

Activities of "Clean and Green" told to Garden Club

The activities and goals of Iowa Park's Clean and Green beautification committee was the topic of a program presented to members of the Iowa Park Garden Club who met Friday morning at the Recreational Activities Center.

Dolores Hamilton, chairman of Iowa Park Clean and Green, told how the organization is working under the guidelines of Keep Texas Beautiful and the Texas Department of Transportation in an effort to clean up and beautify the city. A future goal is to win the Governor's Achievement Award, and she explained that to receive this recognition involves more than just planting trees and flowers. A major factor is educating the public on recycling, and community involvement in clean-up projects.

Outlining projects the committee has worked on during the past year, Mrs. Hamilton mentioned the work at Oscar Park. Several members picked up trash, pruned trees, cleaned out the underbrush, and painted picnic tables. Members also manned a booth for KTB at the Nortex Environmental Exposition, and high school art students have painted barrels to be placed around town for trash containers.

Current projects include developing a "pocket park" in the downtown area, working with the highway department in landscaping areas along the expressway, and increasing the number wildflowers along U.S. 287. Long-range plans include the possibility of having a walking path with a

bridge at Oscar Park, along with many more improvements.

Since the committee was formed a year ago, they have been selling engraved bricks to be placed around a flag pole at the RAC, and are taking donations of aluminum cans to be recycled, with proceeds going to fund the different projects. Another fundraiser will be a Pancake Feed to be held at the Mule Barn on April 23, with the MuleSkinners doing the cooking.

Mrs. Hamilton closed by saying that the key to a successful beautification program is getting the community involved. "In Iowa Park, that hasn't been difficult because so many people take pride in the appearance of the city. During the past year almost everyone in the community has contributed to this effort in one way or another," she said.

During the conservation report, it was announced that the State Hospital is accepting newspapers for recycling.

Also, Bonnie Illingworth gave each member a hand-out with information on the "Don't Bag It Lawn Care Plan" from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The plan includes a fertilization, mowing, and watering plan for the lawn which, if followed, will allow the homeowner to never bag grass clippings again. This will conserve space and keep the landfills from filling up with grass clippings.

Norma Fortner, club president, said that members would be cleaning the Library grounds on Thursday to help with Clean-Up Week in the city.

Mrs. Fortner also brought a pink hydrangea to the meeting for the horticulture display.

Hostesses for the meeting were Charlette Kennedy and Reba Snow. They used a basket filled with fresh English ivy and silk spring flowers for the centerpiece on the serving table.

Nineteen members were in attendance.

The way I figure it, this is like getting a bill for overhauling my car from the garage, each individual mechanic and floor sweeper employed, the parts man and the night watchman.

And it brings about a concern I hope no fly-by-night operator thinks up.

It would be fairly easy, for someone not too legitimate, to have a pipeline in a hospital to gather information on patients who had been hospitalized and released.

The no-gooder could have a proper-looking statement printed up,

Local teachers attend convention

Attending the Association of Texas Professional Educators annual convention in Dallas April 7-9, from Iowa Park were Betty Cash and Debbie Brandt.

Texas educators issued a call to state legislators for increased health insurance, support for public school choice within districts and increased funding to combat school violence.

Those were among several official positions adopted by the 62,300-member ATPE at the convention.

Republican gubernatorial nominee George W. Bush addressed the group. Bush supports "home school districts" and decreasing the regulatory powers of the Texas Education Agency.

The group's president said ATPE does not support sending public dollars to private schools, and it will be among those opposing private school vouchers when the legislature meets in January.

"We as much as anyone want to improve our public education system," said Beth Graham, ATPE state president. "Rather than creating another tier of education, the state legislature should make public education a higher priority by providing the funding necessary for all children of Texas to receive a quality education."

The group made headlines last year when its convention delegates voted for a state income tax dedicated to public education.

Diabetes and Exercise

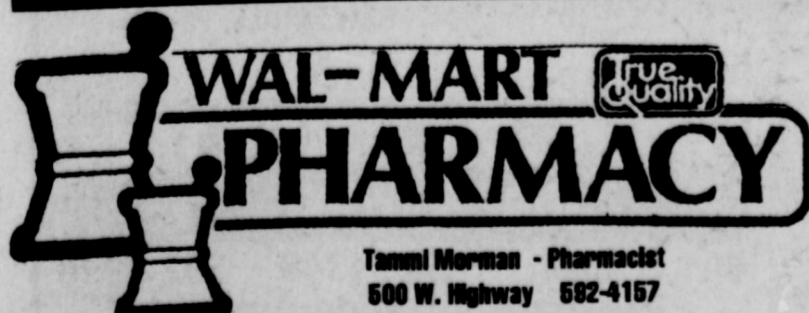
Exercise is a good way to help maintain optimum health.

Regular exercise is especially beneficial for most people with diabetes. It reduces emotional and physiological stress associated with the disease, and helps keep blood sugar levels under control.

Most people with diabetes can exercise safely. However, it is important to take the following precautions:

- Have a thorough medical check-up before you begin any exercise program.
- Consider exercising in a medically supervised program if you have diabetes-related complications.
- The kind and amount of exercise you should do depends on your age and physical condition. Select activities you enjoy that are appropriate for you.
- Tell your doctor about any unusual symptoms you experience during or after exercise.
- Your body's requirements may change when you exercise. If you take insulin, you may need to adjust the dosage or your meal plan, or both. Check with your doctor.
- Exercise regularly and about the same time every day.
- Learn how to prevent and treat low blood glucose levels. Monitor your blood glucose levels before, during, and after exercise.
- Do not exercise outside if the weather is too hot or too cold.
- Always warm up before exercising and take the time to cool down afterwards.
- Pay special attention to your footwear. Make sure your shoes fit properly. Inspect your feet daily, and always after you exercise.

Each student auditioned for the orchestra, which is conducted by Ray Davidson.

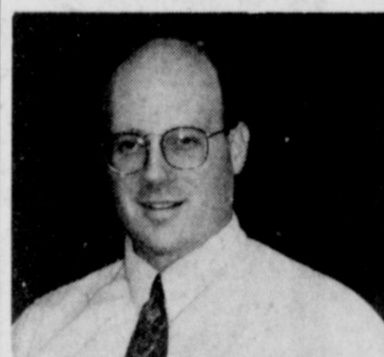

Solid waste management topic of April 20 meeting

Agriculture's role in solving problems related to solid waste management will be the topic of a meeting April 20 at the Research and Extension Center in Vernon.

A bio-solids symposium will be held to help educate decision makers, agricultural producers and concerned citizens about opportunities for interaction between municipalities and agriculture that can solve problems related to solid waste management.

The Texas A&M Univ. system and Nortex Regional Planning Commission, in cooperation with the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission, have coordinated efforts to prepare the symposium.

Various speakers will address the benefits and concerns related to the land applications of biosolids, processing of biosolids utilizing composting and methods of land application, regulations affecting mu-

nicipalities generating and the receiver of biosolids, utilizing paper to increase organic matter and dust control, and using a chain diker to incorporate the organic material and boost rainfall retention on the solid surface.

There will also be an overview of MERCO, a company presently applying biosolids to rangeland east of El Paso.

Participants also will be able to watch a demonstration of a spreader

applying compost and will be able to take a tour of the Vernon research facility.

The program is to begin at 9 a.m. and adjourn about 3:30 p.m.

There is a \$10 pre-registration fee, and \$12.50 at the door. The fee includes a meal and related publications.

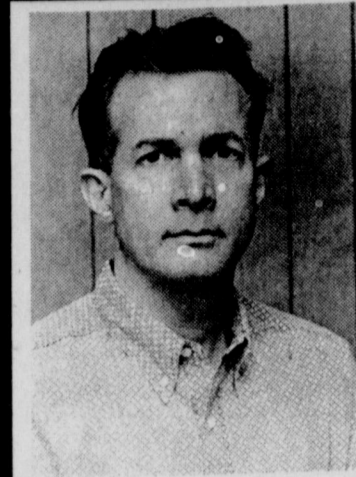

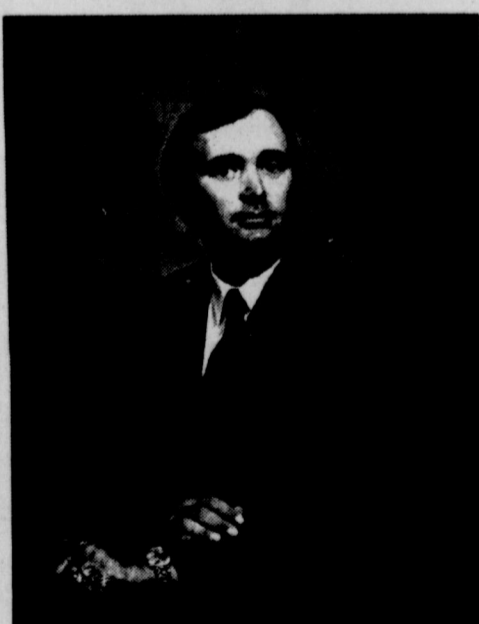

tioned problems, it may be easier to understand why these children may have trouble keeping friends. They play too rough, they blame others, they want to be the boss, and they throw temper tantrums.

Sometimes they pout and sulk. They can love pets one minute and be cruel to them the next. And when they sit down for a meal they may keep jumping up between bites, because they think of something else they "need" to do.

Some positive aspects are that they love life, are forgiving, gregarious, have high energy, they may make poor choices, but usually not choosing to be rebellious, and are good at what they do.

Remember two of the things that do work with an ADD child are love and acceptance of the situation. The ADD person has a disorder from birth, he did not choose to be this way. Avoid tension, such as yelling as much as possible, give the child positive instruction, such as how to do something, rather than telling them "don't"; provide quiet surroundings and decrease distractions, such as the TV or radio while they are doing their homework.

The medication Ritalin is commonly given ADD children to help them get themselves to do what they really want to do. Most children do not want to be disruptive in groups or insensitive to the needs of others.

The adult with ADD is a mass of unfinished tasks, broken promises, and unfulfilled potential, subject to uncontrollable temper outbursts, fidgeting, resistance to being touched, and a tendency toward drug and alcohol abuse or other compulsive behavior.

His behavior both creates and expresses a deep frustration and confusion, and a fearful sense of not being in control of his life. Professionals say the symptoms exhibited during childhood don't disappear. They simply take on a different guise.

There is no doubt that parents get to the point of exasperation, and do not know how else to handle their child. They need to have others who understand what they are going through, just as the child needs understanding.

That is the reason Jamie Prunty started the ball rolling to get an ADD support group started in Iowa Park last May. Also, she has an eight year old grandson with ADD that she has taken care of since birth.

Mrs. Prunty recognized the symptoms before he started school,

because she had dealt with the problem in her family before.

She was assisted in organizing the support group by Laura Perkins, Iowa Park Police Department D.A.R.E. officer, and Judy Preston from Region IX.

The group meets once a month on Tuesday night at the RAC. They average from five to 15 parents at the meetings.

Mrs. Prunty would like for more parents to attend the meetings and take advantage of being able to talk to other parents who understand their problems, share their own experiences that might be helpful to others, and to provide an outlet for their frustrations.

She said she tries to have someone very knowledgeable about Attention Deficit Disorder to speak at the support meetings. But, it is embarrassing to have a busy professional person come and take an evening to speak to five people. And the parents are missing a lot of good information by not hearing the speakers.

The group will meet at 7 p.m. Tuesday, April 19 at the RAC. The speaker will be Martin Barrick, psycho-therapist, specializing in Attention Deficit Disorders.

Mrs. Prunty said she would like to get business people involved in helping with the organization financially so they could have flyers printed, pay for postage, and a permit for mailing newsletters.

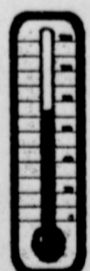
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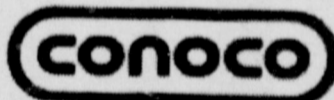


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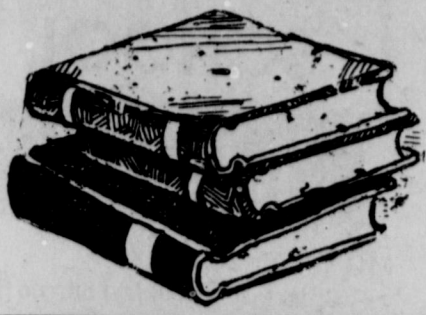

The next meeting will be Monday night, April 18, when members will make Mother's Day gifts.

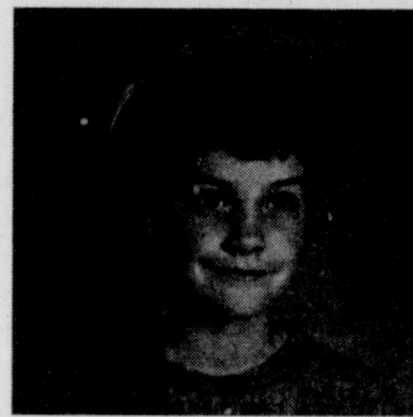
ADD support group to hear psycho-therapist

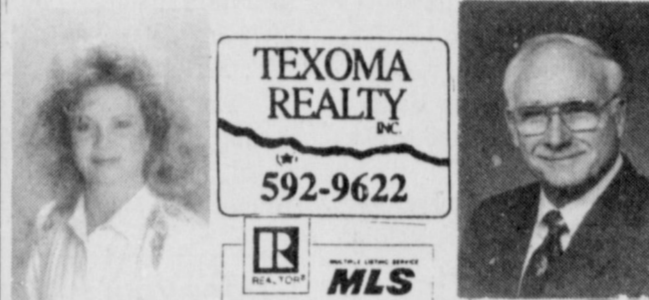

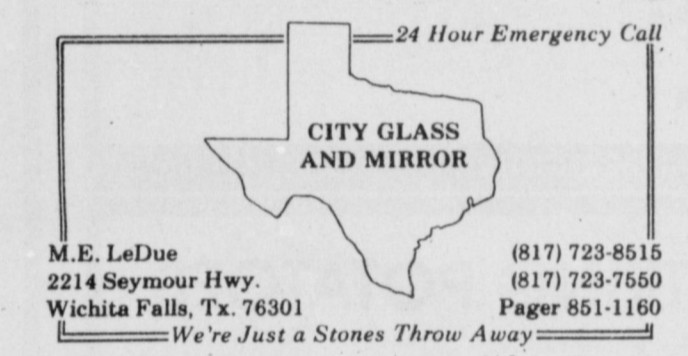

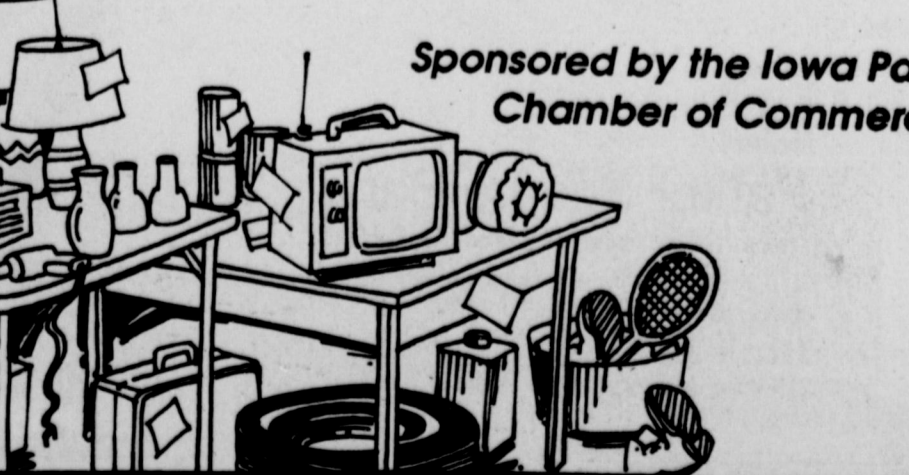

AUSTIN — Comptroller John Sharp's fresh audit of the state's prison system shows room for 5,500 more convicts in the Texas Department of Corrections, he said last week, but other state officials winced at Sharp's recommendations.

According to the audit, the beds could be added by moving minimum security prisoners to older prison units, moving maximum security prisoners to newer, more secure units, and by double-bunking some cells and all trusty camps.

Sharp recommended some 200 operational policy changes that he said would save about \$175 million in the next five years. Those changes would cut waste and correct management flaws found in the present system, he said.

Judge Rips Report

But state District Judge Scott McCown, who acted as a liaison in the audit for Gov. Ann Richards, said the report was "full of inaccuracies, mischaracterizations and oversimplification of complex processes."

In a letter to Richards, McCown said that increasing the prison capacity as Sharp recommends would violate court agreements.

Sharp responded: "He (McCown) is not the state's attorney general. If he wants to be the state's lawyer, he should run for the office."

Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock and House Speaker Pete Laney said Sharp's recommendations might lead to the reopening of the Ruiz case, a lengthy federal case in which a prisoner claimed his constitutional rights were being violated by the overcrowded conditions in the Texas prison system.

Richards said the audit was helpful, but stressed the importance of the state maintaining control of its prisons.

George W. Bush, Richards' GOP opponent in the November general election, said the audit highlights the governor's ineffectiveness.

Governor's Tax Return

Gov. Richards' 1993 federal income tax return shows she owes \$27,639 in taxes on income of \$110,645. Her income was composed of \$94,086 in salary, \$4,520 in interest on savings and \$12,039 from mutual funds, her campaign said last week.

Because she overpaid, Richards gets a refund of \$1,232, which she applied to her 1994 estimated tax.

Richards has made her returns public every year since entering public office as a county commissioner in 1976.

Her spokesman, Chuck McDonald, called on Bush to release his tax returns.

Bush campaign spokeswoman Deborah Burstion-Wade said Bush would release his returns by the federal filing deadline of April 15.

And Reggie Bashur, a spokesman for the campaign, said returns would be released for 1991-93.

Tax Overhaul Needed: Laney

The state's tax system is overdue for an overhaul, House Speaker Pete Laney told members of the Texas Association of Business last week.

But change won't happen until lawmakers are certain Texans want it," Laney said.

"We need a tax system that produces enough revenue to pay for services that promote economic expansion, and a tax system that does not discourage business investment."

Laney, D-Hale Center, urged

TAB members to convince other Texans "that our future depends on the investments we make today

in education, public safety, and criminal justice."

Court to Hear School Case

The Texas Supreme Court will hear arguments May 25 on the state's public school funding law, which is being challenged by property-rich and property-poor school districts.

The law, which requires the school districts with the most property wealth to share some of it with property-poor districts, was upheld last year by Judge McCown of Austin.

But McCown gave the Legislature until Sept. 1, 1995 to come up with an equitable way to pay for school construction.

The Supreme Court has found three previous school funding laws unconstitutional since 1989.

Bullock Names School Panel

Meanwhile, Lt. Gov. Bullock has appointed an interim committee to explore state government's role in paying for public school facilities.

Bullock said the committee is needed because of Judge McCown's order requiring the Legislature to address inequities in funding.

Bullock picked Sen. Teel Bivins, R-Amarillo, to chair the committee. Other members are Sens. John Montford, D-Lubbock, and Bill Ratliff, R-Mount Pleasant.

The committee will issue a final report by December. The Legislature convenes in January.

Other Highlights

■ The Texas Racing Commission cleared the way last week for Lubbock Downs to proceed with financing plans for a new mid-size pari-mutuel horse racetrack. The \$9.9 million project would be financed largely through bonds guaranteed by the cities of Lubbock and Slaton.



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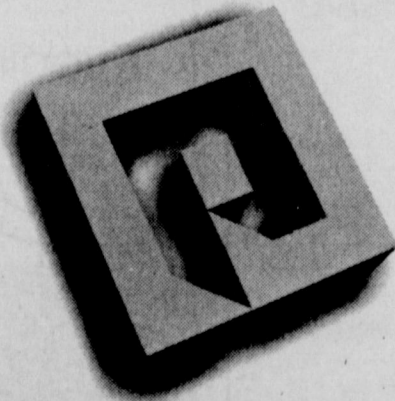
