Hawks hold second place in district's baseball race

Though they can finish no lower than second place in the first half of district play, the Baseball Hawks are aware they must do equally well in the second half, if they are to return to the state playoffs.

Iowa Park posted wins over Breckenridge and Graham in the last two outings, and travels Friday to Henrietta to wind up the first half of the round robin schedule.

The Hawks are 3-1 in district play and 13-6 on the season.

Tuesday, they travel to Vernon and will have a chance to revenge that 4-1 loss to the Lions in the district opener. Vernon goes into the final game of the first half with a 4-0 loop record and stands 10-7 overall.

Shortstop Tony Lozipone proved his back was better -- he had missed several games with a pulled muscle -- when he hit the ball out of the park Saturday at Breckenridge, producing a 4-3 victory over the Buckaroos.

With the score tied at 3-3, Lozipone led off the top of the seventh inning

with the over-the-fence blast. It was his second hit of four trips to the plate.

Clint Scobee posted a double, as the Hawk batters collected eight hits for the game.

Third baseman David Hollis had the hot bat in Tuesday's game here against Graham. He drove in three runs on a pair of doubles that led to Iowa Park's 5-3 victory over the Steers.

The second of Hollis' came in the bottom of the sixth inning, after the visiting Steers had evened the score at 3-3.

Senior Brent Brown went the distance on the mound, giving up six hits.

Pancake feed set Saturday

A pancake feed Saturday will give residents an opportunity to not only satisfy their appetites, but improve the appearance of the community.

The feed, sponsored by the Iowa Park Clean and Green Committee, is to begin at 7 a.m. and conclude at 1 p.m.

Cooked by the MuleSkinners, it will be served at the MuleBarn, 111 West Cash.

To be served will be pancakes, sausage, bacon, coffee and orange juice. The charge will be \$4 for adults and \$2 for children (12 and under).

All proceeds will be used to help beautify the community, such as the "pocket park" that is located next to the MuleBarn.

Co-chairmen of the pancake feed project are Francis George and Lisa Ezzell.

Council sets Monday meeting

Members of the city council will discuss Monday night what they want the new water tower under construction to look like once completed.

Aldermen are to discuss both the painting and lighting of the structure, now being built by the access road just west of Johnson Road.

Besides the water supply needs in the area north of US 287, another issue for that area has concerns for some residents and could be resolved by council action.

Aldermen will consider authorizing the city administrator to advertise for bids for construction of a storm

water sewer system on Douglas Street.

Drainage in that area has long been a problem, and with the development of Park Place Addition, the need for an improved drainage system could prove to be a solution.

A "paperwork" resolution will be considered, authorizing individuals to sign checks and other financial instruments for the 1993 Texas Community Development Program Grant project in the south part of the city.

The mayor is to read a proclamation declaring May 5 as National Day of Prayer for America in Iowa Park.

The meeting is to begin at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

Early voting turnout low

Interest in the May 7 school and city elections was not indicated by the low turnout after early voting opened Monday, according to poll judges.

Only three early voting ballots were cast by Wednesday in the school election, and two in the city's.

Early voting will close Tuesday, May 3.

None of the city council incumbents, Mayor Wayne House and aldermen Johnny Crawford and Bud

Mercer, drew challenges.

But all four of the school trustee incumbents has at least one challenger. They are, in order appearing on the ballots:

Kamay ballots are expected

Residents living in the Kamay area should receive their ballots about the middle of June on a proposal to receive toll-free telephone service to area cities.

Residents with telephone number prefix 438 have petitioned the state's Public Utilities Commission for the opportunity to hold an election on the proposal.

The ballots should be mailed to those residents by the middle of June, according to Clovis McAllister, spokesman for GTE.

If approved, those residents would no longer be required to pay long distance charges to call Iowa Park, Holliday and Wichita Falls.

"Getting the people to return the ballots will be the main issue," explained Shirley Cravens, Valley View resident who has coordinated the petition effort.

She said once residents do receive their ballots, they must be returned within a 15-day period, and there must be 70 percent of the people responding with affirmative votes.

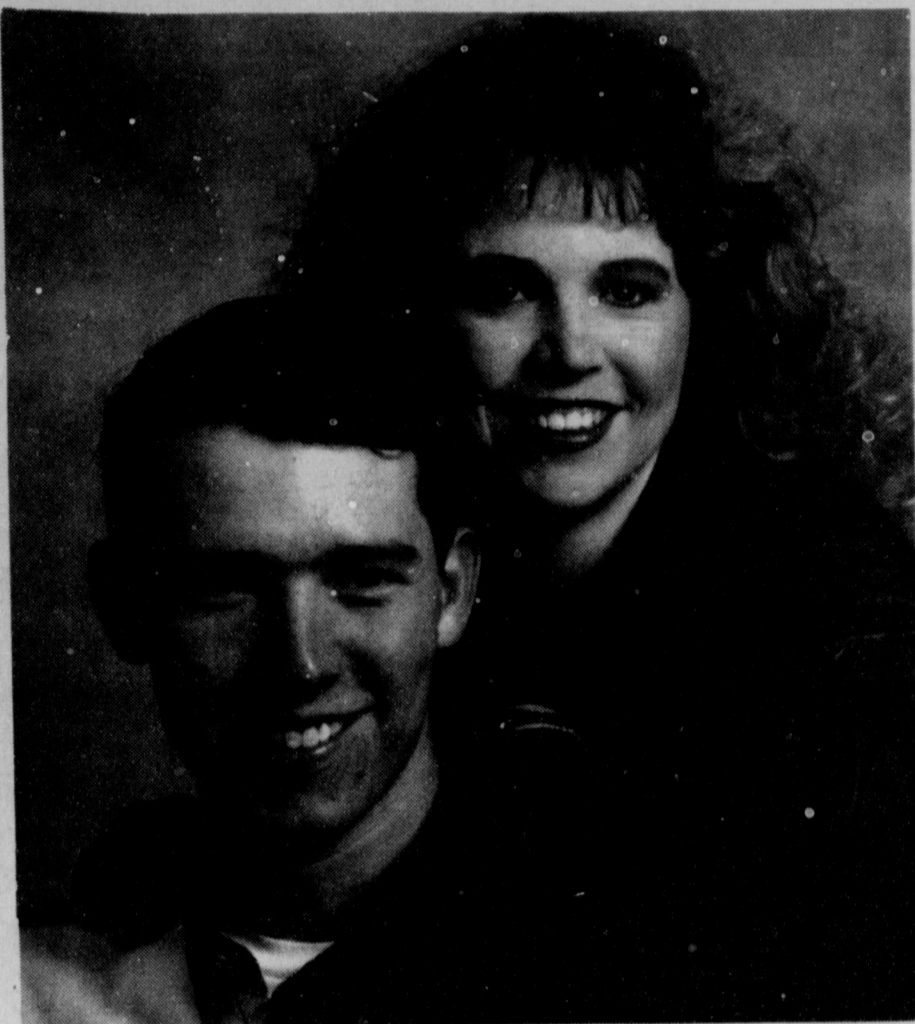
Summer Schedule

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As I See It . . . By Bob Hamilton



Even if I weren't a Republican, I'd have to take issue with a statement contributed to Gov. Ann Richards in Wednesday's Dallas Morning News.

The "Queen" is quoted as calling candidate George W. Bush a "phantom."

"The Democratic governor offered the unflattering description of Mr. Bush when she was asked about a Bush campaign press release on Tuesday criticizing Mrs. Richards for not speaking out against the Clinton health care plan," stated a paragraph of the article.

Continuing, "We have someone who is running for governor who does not have a philosophy, does not have anything but position papers and a press group."

"I'm sure you don't have any remarks on camera because none of this is ever done in public. It is always just done with a press release issued so you (reporters) all come ask me a question

so I will say something."

The governor made her comments after speaking to the Police Chiefs Association meeting in Austin.

I find her comments not only incorrect, but from first-hand knowledge, outright lies. Let me give you an example.

In January and again last Friday, candidate Bush stated his positions very plainly to the press.

Bush spoke in January to the mid-winter convention of the Texas Press Association, in Houston. And last week he was speaker at the annual meeting of the North and East Texas Press Association in McKinney.

Richards was also invited to speak at the McKinney meeting, but declined. Something to do with scheduling.

And if she thinks Bush doesn't have a stand on a wide range of issues facing Texas, it apparently is because she watches the Disney Channel, and

doesn't read newspapers.

Bush has opinions on the current growth, and cost, of state government, changes needed in public education, on law enforcement, and the need to allow local governments and businesses to function without time-consuming, expensive mandates of state and federal governments.

You will recall that I started this article by pointing out that I am a member of the Republican Party. But I want to make the point that it is not my party affiliation that brings me to write this criticism.

Had it been just the opposite situation, where Gov. Richards had responded to invitations to speak to the TPA and N&ETPA, and Bush had rejected invitations and then made that "phantom" remark, I'd be saying this very collection of words.

I hate lies, no matter who tells them.



Leader writer earns award

CofC to sponsor another sale

The Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce board of directors voted to sponsor "City-Wide Back to School Garage Sale" in August.

At the board's monthly meeting Monday, President Cathy Riggins reported the response to Saturday's city-wide garage sale was "outstanding," and because of that and last summer's back to school promotion, should be

considered. Directors responded with an unanimous vote, and the sale was scheduled to be held in August.

Riggins appointed Derrell Monday, Tommy Key, Kenneth Via and Joe Hughes to form a committee to consider rule changes for the annual Whoop-T-Do.

This year's event will be held Oct. 15.

Worth Quoting

After many years of hard work, the Perryton Economic Development Corporation has struck pay dirt with the new strawboard plant. Planned to open in six to seven months, Stramit, U.S.A., L.L.C. will convert wheat straw into building materials.

Though the strawboard has been used extensively in Europe for over 40 years, it is a new product for this country. Several factors indicate that its introduction will be a success.

First, the price of lumber and other building materials based on wood products has soared in recent months. Builders to do-it-yourself are astounded by the prices that boards and plywood are bringing.

Lumber yards are also facing another problem -- supply. There is no consistent delivery schedule for most lumber products. As a result, the lumber yards are getting material from many sources and the quality suffers.

Many of the plywood products that are coming from the Far East have the most quality control problems. One local yard told me that they are ashamed to sell such low quality products at such a high price, but it is all they can get. It is either the shoddy foreign plywood or no plywood at all.

The same problems plague the rest of the lumber industry. Shortages have been caused by the increased demand to rebuild the destruction caused by the California earthquake, the Mid-Western floods and the lingering damage from the Florida hurricane.

Other factors have aggravated those shortages. Cutting restrictions in the Northeastern forests have cut supplies. Environmental restrictions on the chemicals that can be used in the manufacture of wood products has slowed production, further reducing supplies.

It looks as if strawboard will enter the market at a very opportune time. The only ingredient in the product, other than a little boric acid to repel bugs, is wheat straw. Each year millions of tons of wheat straw are produced across the High Plains. There is no danger of running out of the basic resource.

Because strawboard is made from a renewable material, it has an appeal to environmental minded individuals. Currently, wheat straw is either burned or plowed back into the ground. It makes sense to use the straw to produce building products.

Already, PEDCo has had inquiries about strawboard from a major manufacturer of doors and other similar products. They will begin testing the material soon and hope to use it for the inner core of their products.

PEDCo should be congratulated for their efforts in behalf of our community. The new Stramit plant will employ at least 12 people in the beginning and, if the product gains acceptance, will hire more people over the coming years.

Strawboard production is a perfect match for our community. It has no

environmental impact, uses what was previously an agricultural waste product and is not so large that it overwhelms our existing governmental services.

Thanks, PEDCo, for a job well done.

What was so good about the old days?

A reader sent in a list of things that he thinks were different and better about the old days:

* The community was a drug-free society, except for a few alcohol abusers who fell under the label of "town drunks."

* No stigma was attached to being poor, since it was such a common affliction.

* A strong respect for the rights and property of others was the general rule. Vandalism consisted of a few outhouses being pushed over on Halloween. Few home owners or churches felt it necessary to lock their doors. There was no fear of venturing out after dark. No elderly ladies were mugged and injured on residential sidewalks or business area parking lots in the middle of the day. And no one had even thought about carjacking or drive-by shooting.

* There existed a pride in working for a living rather than stealing with a gun or bankruptcy claim. Few people figured that society owed them a living.

* Less government control and intervention in private lives and activities existed. Individuals and families assisted one another without the need of social agencies.

* Marriage, family and church were foundations for daily living. Love and security extended over a lifetime.

Divorce was a last resort.

* A contract consisted of your word and a hand shake. It was seldom broken and the services of a law firm were rarely required.

* Right was right and wrong was wrong, without a large and complicated gray area between.

* Government and individuals operated under the premise that no more could be expended than was received. Credit cards were still a future evil.

A new report by the Texas Research League shows that the number of state employees grew by 4.2 percent or 10,000 last year. At the close of the fiscal year, we had 245,847 people on the state payroll.

AUSTIN — With the primary and runoff elections now history, nominees are asking Texas voters to turn their attention to the Nov. 8 general election.

New Prison Chief Named

James "Andy" Collins, a long-time prison official, was named last week to head the rapidly growing state criminal justice system.

In picking Collins as executive director of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice, members of the Texas Board of Criminal Justice praised him for his experience and his commitment to vocational training and drug counseling for

inmates.

Collins, 43, has spent more than half his life working in the Texas Prison system. His most recent job has been director of the department's Institutional Division, where he has been overseeing a \$700 million prison expansion.

In his new position, which pays an annual salary of \$94,416, Collins will be responsible for 77,000 inmates, 26,000 employees and a \$1.5 billion budget.

Collins succeeds James Ly-naugh, who resigned in September and now works for the University of Texas Medical Branch in Galveston. In the interim, James Riley has served as executive director.

Bullock Aided Collins?

Meanwhile, sources familiar with the selection process, said the support of Lt. Gov. Bullock helped convince the Department of Criminal Justice board to select Collins to run the state's corrections system.

Although the corrections board voted 9-0 to select Collins, sources said it was a reluctant vote by some board members.

Glen Castlebury, a spokesman for Bullock, acknowledged Bullock spoke highly of Collins at an appreciation dinner in Palestine for state Rep. Elton Bomer, D-Montalba.

Castlebury said Bullock's comments were not intended to influence the corrections board.

"If they took it as lobbying, they mistook it," Castlebury said. "But if they appreciated Gov. Bullock's judgment about that, they just recognize good judgment when they see it. But he would never attempt to lobby a board like that."

Other Highlights

Ross Perot has pledged money and people to aid ailing Persian Gulf war veterans who are suffering from mysterious illnesses. Mark Blahnik, an employee of the Dallas billionaire, said Perot had set up a database at his office that eventually will include names, addresses and phone numbers of afflicted soldiers.

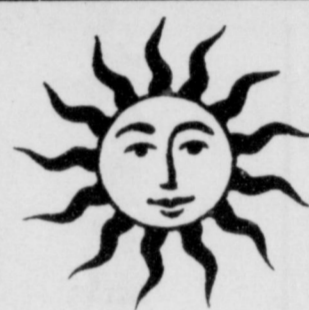

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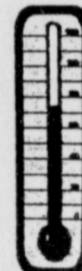
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GARDENING HINTS

By MARK TERNING, COUNTY AGENT - HORTICULTURE

Mid April through early May is a prime time for warm-season lawn fertilization and flower planting.

Follow this garden check list for all of your lawn care and landscape endeavors during the next few weeks.

PLANTING

* Install warm-season annuals for color in your landscape. Plant in beds, containers and hanging baskets.

* Establish warm-season lawns (Bermuda, St. Augustine) during late April and early May. Use seed, plugs, sod, or hydromulch.

* Plant warm-season vegetables such as tomato, pepper, squash, beans, melons, okra, and cucumber.

* Plant container grown trees, shrubs, vines, and groundcovers. Selections are great at local garden centers and nurseries.

* Plant container-grown roses for many years of enjoyment.

* Plant herbs in containers or prepared garden beds.

FERTILIZATION

* Feed warm-season lawns with a 3-1-2 or 4-1-2 ratio lawn food which contains slow-release nitrogen. Fertilizers such as 21-7-4, 16-4-8, or 15-5-10 are appropriate.

* Begin zinc sprays on pecan trees to develop healthy, early-season growth.

* Use slow-release fertilizers such as Osmocote in container potting mixes for flowers and vegetables.

PRUNING

* Prune spring blooming shrubs and vines soon after blooming.

* Reshape hedges for better growth and form.

* Mow warm-season lawns on a regular schedule.

PEST AND WEED CONTROL

* Control fleas and ticks in lawn areas with Dursban, Diazinon, or Yardex. Serious infestations can be referred to a pest control professional.

* Apply Funginex on regular intervals for control of blackspot on roses.

* Use slug, snail, and pill bug baits where these pests are a problem.

* Apply fruit tree sprays such as Tripleaction or Home Orchard spray on a regular basis to control insects and disease.

* Galls on oak trees cannot be

controlled at this time of year. These unusual growths are alarming, however, they do not cause any measurable plant damage.

* Follow all label directions and rates when using any pesticide or fertilizer.

4 eggs
Butter - size of egg
Dash of salt
1/4 tsp. cinnamon

Pour scalded milk over bread and butter. Cover and let sit for 10 minutes. Use whisk to mix the above mixture. Beat eggs with fork and add to milk mixture. Add the remaining ingredients to milk mixture.

Spray baking dish with Pam. Bake at 350 degrees until done in the center.

Lemon Sauce

1 cup milk
1/2 to 3/4 cup sugar
2 Tbsps. cornstarch
Dash of salt
Juice of a lemon
1 tsp. vanilla

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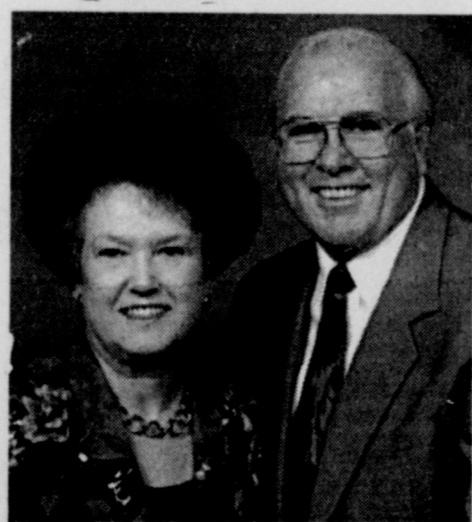
