The Faimess in Broadcasting Act or (Fairness Doctrine) is a bill being proposed in Congress that would
regulate radio and television broadcasts in regard to program content and casts in regard to program content and
subject matter. And Congress is quieuly trying to sncak the bill through by attaching it to an unrelated-bill.

The Fairness Doctrine would force stations to give free, cqual time to both sides of any controversial issuc. Poli-
ticians and government regulators would then have the power to decide
what issues were too controversial and
if the coverage of those issues was fair if the coverage of those issues was fair.
This would not only be costly to some This would not only be costly to some
stations (especially smaller ones), but stations (especially smaller ones), but
it would also censor coverage of issues. The Fairness Doctrine was found to be unnecessary and possibly un-
constitutional in the 1980s by the Federal Communications Commission when they decided that it interfered with broadcasters' abilities to freely discuss issues of public importance.

## Vitamin Basics

- Vitamins and minerals work together to keep the blood, bones, teeth, hormonal systems, muscles and nerves functioning properly. Vitamins and minerals cannot be manufactured by the body, but are present in food in small amounts.
Generally, adequate amounts of vitamins and minerals can be acquired through a sound diet which includes daily selections of food from the fruit and vegetable group, the bread and cereal group, the dairy group and the protein group.
Unfortunately, even though a large variety of foods are available, many of us do not have nutritionally adequate diets. We eat the wrong foods, or inadequate amounts of the right foods.
Stress is another factor which can greatly increase an individual's need for water-soluble vitamins, such as $\mathbf{B}$-complex and Vitamin $\mathbf{C}$.
- Unlike fat-soluble vitamins, such as Vitamins A, D, E and K, most of the water-soluble vitamins are not stored in the body.
Vitamin and mineral supplements may be needed when: the diet is unbalanced or restricted due to a weight reduction program, food faddism or special diets for disease management; alcohol consumption is high;
oral contraceptives are being taken;
stress, illness, overwork or injury have occurred;
certain medicines are being taken that may change the body's ability to utilize vitamins properly;
a woman is pregnant or nursing
certain ages are reached, for example, infants and children have special requirements due to growth patterns; also, some elderly people eat irregularly due to dental or economic problems.

"The mixture goes deeply into the lungs, where the drug is really needed, says Dr. Vernon Knight, a senior at tending Internal Medicine physicia at Methodist. "We found the lipid aerosol to be much more effective than the present way of administering eclamethasone."

Currently the drug is available only in a pressurized canister, whic he patient sprays into his mouth.
"The problem with that metho hat the vapor comes out too fast, and deposits most of the drug in the nose and throat, where it's not as effective, says Knight. Another drawback is tha says Knight. Researchers found the lipid aero sol remains in lung tissue longer. Test in non-asthmatic patients conducted with Methodist's Nuclear Medicine lab showed that 90 percent of the beclamethasone compound remained first inhaled.
"The new method has a lot of potential," says Dr. William Eschenbacher, a pulmonary specialis spray with Knight and Dr. Josept Rodarte, also a pulmonary specialist "It's very effective for treating asthma and we hope that eventually we can administer other types of drugs in th same fashion."

The goal of Shots Across Texas is to immunize at least 90 percent of Texas children two and younger by 1996.

Dr. David R. Smith, Texas commissioner of health, said the need for Shots Across Texas is critical.
"Currently, fewer than 60 percent of Texas children younger than two are fully immunized," Dr. Smith explained. "Texas ranks among the last in the United States and is behind many na-
tions in providing immunizations tions in providing immunizations against polio, meas for our children.
rces aren't available. It's that many people are unaware of how important it is to immunize their children. That's why Shots Across Texas is so critically

According torecent surveys, man Texas parents are unaware of the risk associated with immunization-preventable disease, including brain damage and even death.

A recent Houston study revealed that, while four out of five parents said their children were fully immunized, medical records indicated fewer than half that number actually were.

care during the spring and summer months to perform their very best． Grecn，lush turf is fairly easy to grow ir you know he basics of fert ity，watering，mowing and weed con－ trol．W．

Warm season grasses such as bermuda and St．Augustine should be fertilizers．The three numbers on a bag of fertilizer refer to nitrogen，phos－ phorus and potassium．
You should purchase and apply
fertilizers such as 12－4－8，15－5－10， 21 $7-14$ or $16-4-8$ for best results．These three numbers will appear on the front of the fertilizer bag．
You will also find slow－relcase
nitrogen ferilizers nitrogen fertilizers at your local gar－
den center or fertilizer distributor． den center or fertiizer distributor．
These products are designed to pro－ These products are designed to pro－
duce slow，even growthof lawn grasses． Slow－release fertilizers are avail－
Sle able in 3－1－2 and 4－1－2 ratios，however a portion of the nitrogen in the bag is slow release．These slow release products are ideal for those of you who mulch your grass clippings．These
products are always labeled as slow－ relcase nitrogen．
As important as using the right
kind of fertilizer is applying it at kind of fertilizer is applying it at the proper time．
Common bermuda should be fer－
tilized on April 15 ， tilized on April 15，June 1，July 15，and
Scptember 1．St．Augustine should be September 1．St．Augustine should be
fertilized on April 15，June 1，and fertilized on
September 1.
Cool－season grasses such as fes－ cue should not be fertilized until Sep－ tember 15 ．
Ferilizers are easily applied with a broadcast spreader which can often be borrowed from a nursery or garden
Always follow recommended la－ bel rates and directions for fertilizer applications．Most people tend to ap
ply more fertilizer than necessary． During the driest period of During the driest period of sum mer，out lawns usually require abou one inchof walerevery five tosix infrequent watering encourages Deep，infrequent watering encourage
stronger root systems which produce
healthier lawns．
Remember that fescue may require an inch of water every three or four days when the heat of summer is on． Water in the morning before 10 a．m．so that less moisturetion．Morning watering also evaporation．Morning watering grass to dry out during the day reducing disease occurrence． day reducing discase occurrence．
Weed problems can be broken down into two major groups．There are grassy weeds such as dallisgrass and crabgrass and broadleaf weeds such as dandelion and clover．
On bermuda lawns you can con－ trol broadleaf weeds with herbicides such as Wecd－B－Gone or Wipcout ac－ cording to all label directions． Grassy weeds in bermuda lawns can be controlled with a produce called

lawns for a short period，however，the lurf recovers if you use the correct on us for your needs．

St．Augustine on the other hand is extremely sensitive 10 many chemi－
cals，therefore you are limited as to what you can use．You cannot use MSMA on St Augustine．

There are some broadleaf herbi－ cides registered for use on St．Augus－ tinc．Check all chemical labels care－ fully to make sure the one you are using is labeled for St．Augustine turf or cere damage will result． Last but not least is mowing． Common bermuda should be mowed to one and a halr inches，St．
Augustine to two inches，and fescue to Augustine to two inches，and fescue
two and a half inches iwo and a half inches．
