## What will you do in case of a Tornado Warning

"How am I to know that a tornado is approaching Iowa Park and what should I do when one does?"

Because of tornado activity in North Texas this week, and so many new residents in the community, those are common questions being asked.

Residents of this area can rest assured every effort will be made to warn them in case of a tornado warning.

The U.S. Weather Bureau alerts agencies in the area, who in turn alert each local community whenever a tornado alert is issued.

When that happens, members of the Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Dept. deploy in various directions of the city

and watch the clouds for any signs of a tornado.

Working with them are members of a civilian radio organization who supplement their efforts.

In case a funnel cloud is observed by the trained spotters, the police radio dispatcher is alerted, and an elongated sounding of the sirens is made.

That is the signal for residents to take cover.

Many families have already made arrangements of what they should do in case a tornado threatens the city.

Some either have storm shelters, or have made arrangements with a nearby neighbor to use their's.

During hours when students are not in schools, arrangements have been made for the high school and two elementary schools to be opened for the public to seek shelter there.

The high school has six classrooms underground, and the two elementary school gymnasiums are both designed as storm shelters.

Residents should not attempt to take their pets with them into the schools when seeking shelter, school authorities request. Dogs, cats and other pets have proven to be problems and also take up needed space, authorities point out.

Research done by Texas Tech Univ. following the 1979 tornado in Wichita Falls pointed out that people are usually safest if they remain in their homes -- if they are not mobile homes -- rather than attempting to travel any distance seeking shelter, or attempting to move from the tornado's path.

Those experts pointed out that the safest place in a home is in the center of the structure, usually in a closet or

## Police chase in car, afoot

What started out as a normal attempt to stop a motorcyclist who wasn't wearing his helmet wound up as a high-speed chase that evolved into a foot race and finally a trip to the county jail.

An officer on patrol Friday morning in the southeastern part of the city noticed a motorcycle driver had a helmet, but not on his head.

The policeman attempted to pull the man over, but a man attempted to elude the officer. Their route wound through several streets and finally leaving the city headed toward Wichita Falls on Old Highway.

When the cyclist reached Rifle Range Road, he abandoned his vehicle and began running through a field.

In a short time, he was confronted by two other officers from the local department, who had been called to back up the arresting officer.

Bradley Bunch, 27, was taken into custody on charges of driving while license was suspended and attempting to elude an officer.

Bunch was placed in the county jail under a total of \$800 in bonds.

Only two other arrests were reported by police during the past week, and both were for public intoxication.

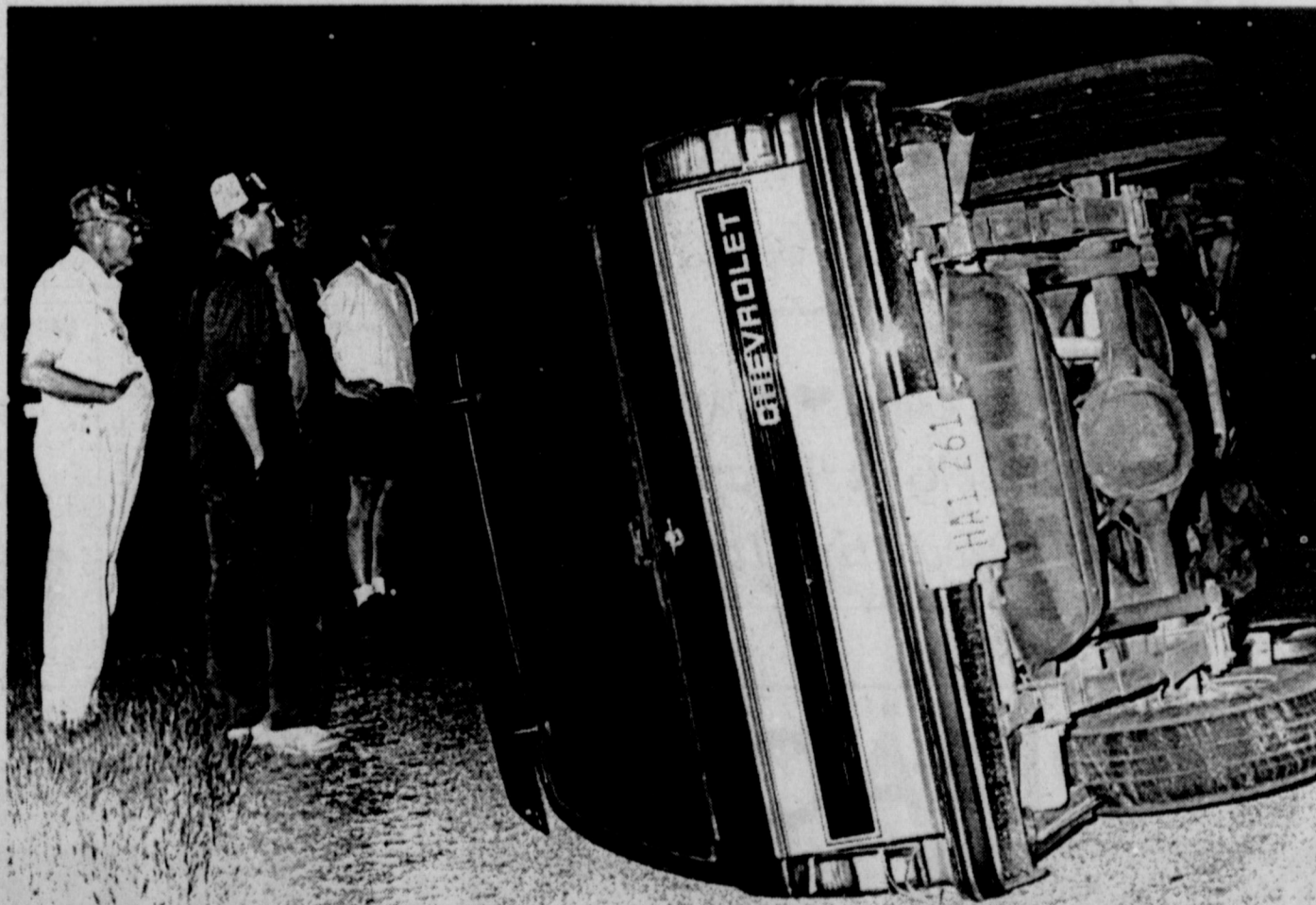

One of the students is to file an assault complaint against the other in municipal court, according to police.

## Storm drain considered for flood problem area

Action taken Monday by the city council could lead to prevention of flooding problems residents along Douglas Street have fought for several years.

The council decided to seek bids for a storm water drainage system that would carry runoff water underground from Mary Drive to the Access Road.

Residents, particularly those on the West side of Douglas, have had

problems after heavy rains when the runoff water went over the street curb and flooded their yards. Sometimes it even got into their garages, it was reported.

With the construction of Park Place Addition to the north, additional water runoff is expected, and that encouraged the council to take a look at the cost of building the drainage system.

Estimates range between \$60,000 to \$125,000, aldermen were told.

Administrator Mike Price said the underground line would likely be built down the middle of Douglas.

Joe Voyles approached the council seeking permission to tap into the water transmission line between here and Wichita Falls, for water service to a site he recently acquired on Haws Road to build a home.

Aldermen agreed to permit the tap, but it was understood by two aldermen that permission also was required from the city of Wichita Falls for such a tap.

Administrator Price told the council he has received numerous complaints from residents in the North part of the city, primarily those on the West side of Johnson Road, concerning low water pressure.

He said some complainants had criticized the city for issuing new

building permits, when those homes already occupied have less than adequate water service.

The consensus of the council was to make no changes on building permits, because construction of a new water tower is already underway to alleviate the pressure problem.

Price said the new tower possibly will be in service by late June or early July.

The council was told the tower construction crew is supposed to begin its work within two weeks. Laying of the water transmission line from the Johnson Road tower to the new tower site is expected to be completed by early next week.

A discussion of the lettering and possible lighting for the new tower was held, but no decision was reached.

A resolution was approved naming city personnel empowered to sign checks for payment of an eight-inch sewer main to be installed down West Chestnut.

The project is part of a Texas Community Development Grant.

Mayor Wayne House read two proclamations, one stating May 5 as National Day of Prayer for America in Iowa Park, and the other naming May 1-7 as Respect of Law Week, proposed by the Iowa Park Optimist Club.

## Early voting turnout picks up

More voters are taking interest in the May 7 school and city elections, according to the number of early votes cast during the past week.

The early election polls will close at the end of business Tuesday. The school's poll is at the administration building and the city's at city hall.

As of noon Wednesday, a total of 28 votes had been cast at the school's poll and eight at the city's. Those are increases of 25 and six votes, respectively, since last week.

None of the three city candidates have any opposition, but all four of the school trustee positions are challenged.

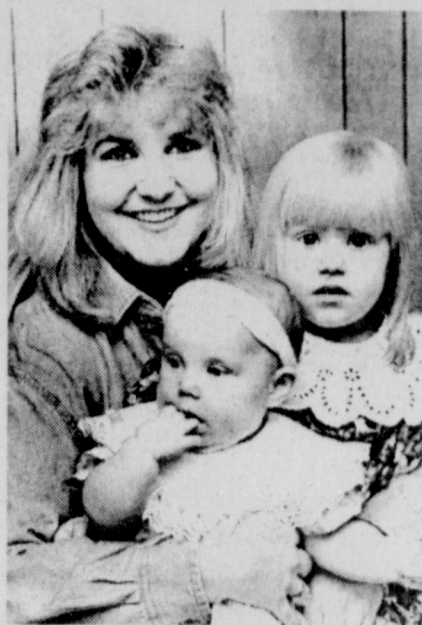
bouquets of tiny wine frosting flowers.

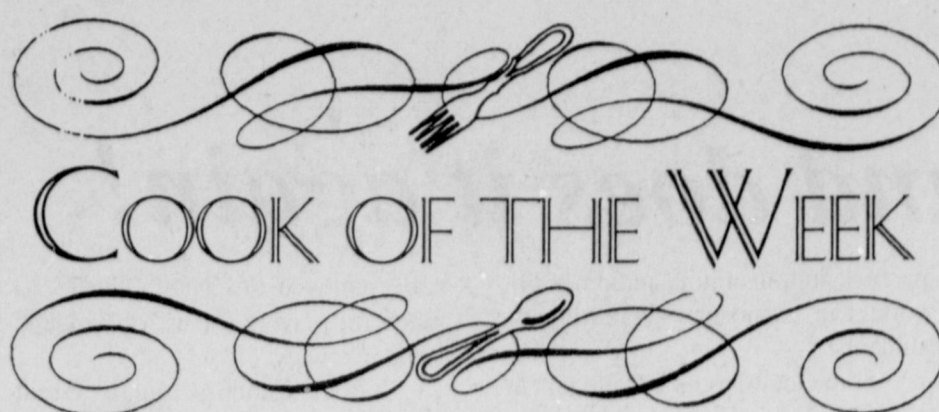

### Mexican Corn Bread

Brown 1 lb. ground meat. Drain grease and add 1 pkg. Williams Chili Seasoning mix and salt.

Grate 1/2 lb. mild Cheddar cheese.

Mix:

1 cup corn meal

2 eggs

1/2 cup milk

1/2 tsp. soda

3/4 tsp. salt

1 - 16 1/2 oz. can cream style corn

1 can green chilies

Pour 1/2 meal mixture into hot greased iron skillet.

Spread meat, onions (optional), and cheese. Cover with rest of meal mixture. Bake 50 minutes to 1 hour at 350 degrees.

### Enchiladas

Melt 1 lb. Velveeta cheese and 1 can Rotel tomatoes. When melted, add 1 cup sour cream.

Brown 1 or 2 lbs. ground meat, 1 med. onion, 1 pkg. Williams Chili Seasoning mix, salt, and 1 can green chilies (optional).

Roll the meat in steamed tortillas and place in baking pan. Pour cheese over the top and cover the top of pan with foil. Bake at 350 degrees until hot (20 - 30 minutes.)

### Green Chili Rice

3 cups cooked rice

2 cans green chilies

2 cups sour cream

3/4 lb. Monterrey Jack cheese

Combine all ingredients and pour into baking dish. Cover top with Cheddar cheese.

Bake at 350 degrees until bubbly, about 30 minutes.

### Corn Pudding

1 No. 2 can cream style corn

1 cup diced cheese

2 Tbsps. flour

1 tsp. salt

2 eggs, beaten

1 cup of milk, heated

1 Tbsp. sugar (or Sweet & Low)

2 Tbsps. butter

1/8 tsp. pepper

1/2 cup bread crumbs (optional)

Add cheese, flour, sugar and other seasonings to corn. Add to beaten eggs and combine with heated milk. Add bread crumbs if desired.

Bake at 350 degrees until done (about 1-1 1/2 hours).

### Honey Popcorn

6 cups popped corn

Melt together:

1/4 to 1/2 cup butter

1/2 cup honey

1 can peanuts

Combine with popcorn and spread on cookie sheet. Bake at 350 degrees 5 to 10 minutes, stirring a couple of times.

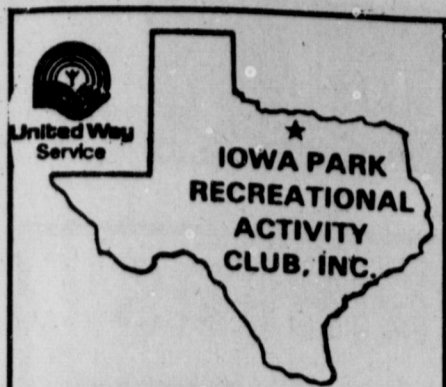

One of the hardest things for folks to understand about our newspaper, is its deadlines and policies, and why we even have any.

First of all, deadlines are necessary in order for any newspaper to be printed and distributed.

We have extremely liberal deadlines, when compared with many newspapers.

Our deadline for display advertising is 4 p.m. Tuesday. Display ads, for the most part, are those with borders around them.

Immediately after that deadline arrives, I "dummy" the pages for that edition. That means, I do a layout of the paper, placing the ads on pages which they will be printed. Then, we begin

the process of putting the pages together.

Classified advertising deadline is 12-noon on Wednesday.

Since we try to go to press around 5 p.m. on Wednesday, those deadlines would seem reasonable to me, and, like I said, very liberal.

Some newspapers in the area, that also carry the same Thursday dateline as ours, have a Monday cutoff on advertising as well as news.

We ask for news, other than what happens Tuesday or is late-breaking, to be turned in by noon Tuesday.

As far as our policies are concerned, they are established for a number of reasons.

Foremost, they are to ensure that

everything and everyone are treated alike. Any exceptions to our policies are very, very rare.

An important purpose of policy is to be sure what we do and report is legal. This sometimes causes some folks problems, but we attempt to keep abreast with the laws of liable and other issues that could cause us problems.

I guess the policy that causes the most concern is using names in our police reports. I can assure you, we have never knowingly left out a name of someone who has been arrested.

And that goes for members of my own family. So save yourself breath, if you think you can talk me into breaking one of my own policies.

### Feels parents ignored

To the parents of IPCISD,

As a concerned parent of children in the Iowa Park School District I am writing to ask for your support at the upcoming school board meeting concerning changes in the proposed dress code for the 94-95 school year.

I have attended two dress code meetings in the last week, the Jr High board and the District board. Both times I left very frustrated and angry. As a parent I felt I had been treated very poorly. They want parents to be involved but we were either not asked our opinion or our opinions were completely ignored. I serve on the Parent Advisory Board at the Jr High and the Kidwell PTA Board so this is not the only time I have been involved in school activities.

We have dress code boards who are appointed by the principals of each campus. They consist of teachers, parents, and some students. At both meetings the opinions of the parents were shot down unless they were the opinions of the majority of the board, mostly consisting of teachers and faculty. These opinions were their own not those of all the teachers. I attended the District Board meeting Monday with approximately 75 to 80 other parents and students. About 20 to 25 parents expressed their views on the length of the shorts and dresses worn at the Jr High and High School. I, for one, am very proud of that, but I don't feel that they are doing so because of our dress code -- more likely it is because of our academic attitude. Please help our students feel like they are going to school to learn instead of to be punished for not wearing what their parents could not buy.

We are pleased that shorts were not banned, as proposed by the Jr. High dress code committee, however; allowing shorts at the unreasonable required length is only worse, not better. ### Criticizes bill

Dear Editor,

The Fairness in Broadcasting Act or (Fairness Doctrine) is a bill being proposed in Congress that would regulate radio and television broadcasts in regard to program content and subject matter. And Congress is quietly trying to sneak the bill through by attaching it to an unrelated bill.

The Fairness Doctrine would force stations to give free, equal time to both sides of any controversial issue. Politicians and government regulators would then have the power to decide

what issues were too controversial and if the coverage of those issues was fair. This would not only be costly to some stations (especially smaller ones), but it would also censor coverage of issues.

The Fairness Doctrine was found to be unnecessary and possibly unconstitutional in the 1980s by the Federal Communications Commission when they decided that it interfered with broadcasters' abilities to freely discuss issues of public importance.

But now, politicians are trying to revive the bill by quietly attaching it to another bill; possibly a campaign finance reform bill.

An organization to which I belong, Citizens United, did a poll of House members asking if they would support or oppose the Fairness in Broadcasting Act. While most said they opposed it, many would undoubtedly vote for it if it were attached to another bill with which they agreed.

If the Fairness in Broadcasting Act is such a good idea that our Congressional leaders will knowingly impose it on the American people, then it should be able to stand on its own, rather than being quietly attached to another bill. But if the idea is so bad that most members of Congress oppose it, then why will they vote for it in any form?

Congress needs to be sent a clear message. The Fairness Doctrine is a bad idea, and the American people do not want legislation passed that is so questionable that it must be passed secretly.

### Dissatisfied with decision

Dear Sir:

I have just returned home from a 2 1/2 hour meeting where approximately 70 parents expressed their views to the school board dress code committee.

With one exception, all parents asked for a relaxation of the dress code as it relates to the wearing of shorts by students. These parents asked that students be allowed to wear shorts 2-3 inches above the knee; the present policy allows only knee-length shorts.

Against the request of 99% of the parents attending, the committee voted to maintain the current dress code: five to three with one abstaining. The recommendation will be made to the school board at the May 9th meeting.

I hope that the voters of our school district will ask the school board candidates how they feel prior to the upcoming election. These good people represent the majority, as well they should.

I would remind the school administration that they earn their paycheck from money deriving directly from us, the taxpayer.

## Hodges to hold senior exhibition

Midwestern State Univ. student Lisa Hodges will hold her senior exhibition May 6 through July 8 in the University Art Gallery of Fine Arts Center.

She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Hodges and a graduate of Iowa Park High School.

Her exhibition is entitled "Traditions and Keepsakes," and features steel sculpture and silver jewelry.

The pieces, created specifically for the show, comes from her family history, traditions, spiritual and rural images, she explains.

The gallery installation will complete the final credit toward a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree and a May graduation.

"I began this body of work in order to respond to a personal desire to seek connections with my cultural background and family history," said Hodges. "I wanted to create work that explored my emotional, intellectual, and historical self."

"In this approach, I can better understand my parents, family, personal values, and how these elements influ-

ence my life. Piece by piece, I have been trying to put together the evolving puzzle of myself as an artist and as a person."

The steel sculptures are made by traditional methods of construction such as welding, forging, and shaping. Objects such as small tools are incorporated into the pieces.

Jewelry of sterling silver and copper is fabricated by box-construction and soldering techniques. Photographs are added to convey a more personal image.

Works on display vary in size and

value from two pairs of earrings, one and a half by one and three quarter inches, at \$35 per pair, to a piece called "My American Gothic Church" which is six feet five inches by 15 inches, valued at \$715.

While attending MSU, Miss Hodges has exhibited work in the past "Annual Student Exhibition" five years and more recently at the "National Student Juried Slide Presentation for the Society of North American Goldsmiths Annual Conference in Cincinnati, Ohio.

## Agency seeks applications

The Local Federal Coordinating Committee is opening its period of processing applications from non-profit agencies, for this fall's Combined Federal Campaign.

The Combined Federal Campaign (CFC) is the charitable fund raising program conducted annually among all Federal employees.

The CFC includes all Federal military and civilian employees in Wichita, Clay, Montague and Wilbarger counties.

The coordinating committee is responsible for certifying local agencies' eligibility for the North Texas CFC campaign. Only certified agencies can receive CFC contributions.

Some requirements include: local applicant agencies must certify that they are voluntary, non-profit human health and welfare organizations,

which provide services, benefits or assistants, and conduct activities affecting human health and welfare.

The applicant agencies must also certify a substantial presence in the geographical area covered by the local campaign.

"Substantial presence" is defined as a staffed facility, office or portion of a residence dedicated exclusively to that organization, available to its clientele or members of the public seeking the voluntary agency's services or benefits, and which is open at least 15 hours a week.

Deadline for applications is 4 p.m. Friday, April 29.

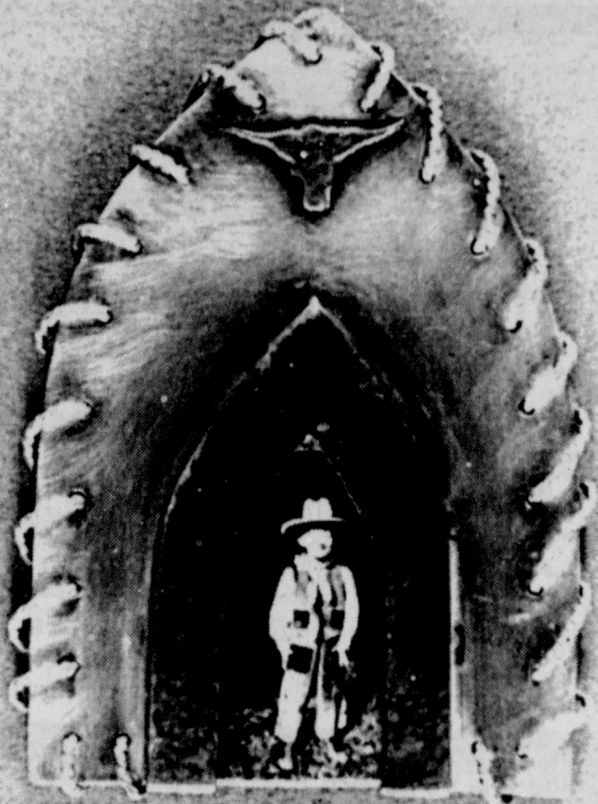

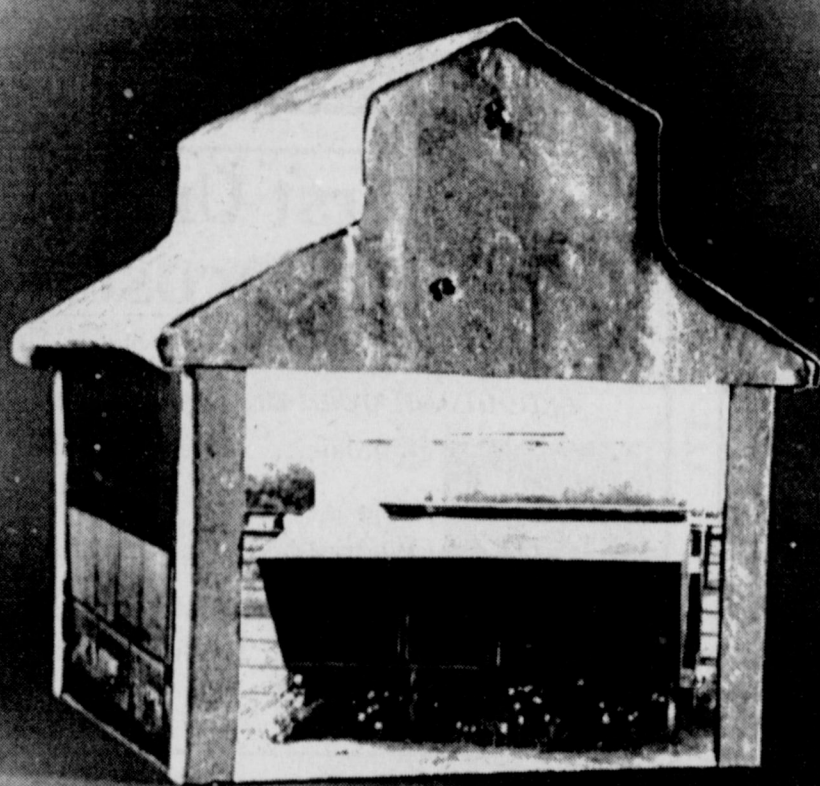

## Pharm/alert Health Tips



### Vitamin Basics

- Vitamins and minerals work together to keep the blood, bones, teeth, hormonal systems, muscles and nerves functioning properly.
- Vitamins and minerals cannot be manufactured by the body, but are present in food in small amounts.
- Generally, adequate amounts of vitamins and minerals can be acquired through a sound diet which includes daily selections of food from the fruit and vegetable group, the bread and cereal group, the dairy group and the protein group.
- Unfortunately, even though a large variety of foods are available, many of us do not have nutritionally adequate diets. We eat the wrong foods, or inadequate amounts of the right foods.
- Stress is another factor which can greatly increase an individual's need for water-soluble vitamins, such as B-complex and Vitamin C.
- Unlike fat-soluble vitamins, such as Vitamins A, D, E and K, most of the water-soluble vitamins are not stored in the body.
- Vitamin and mineral supplements may be needed when:
  - the diet is unbalanced or restricted due to a weight reduction program, food faddism or special diets for disease management;
  - alcohol consumption is high;
  - oral contraceptives are being taken;
  - stress, illness, overwork or injury have occurred;
  - certain medicines are being taken that may change the body's ability to utilize vitamins properly;
  - a woman is pregnant or nursing;
  - certain ages are reached, for example, infants and children have special requirements due to growth patterns; also, some elderly people eat irregularly due to dental or economic problems.

The Neals moved from Calvary Baptist Church in Hope, Ark, where he served in a similar position.

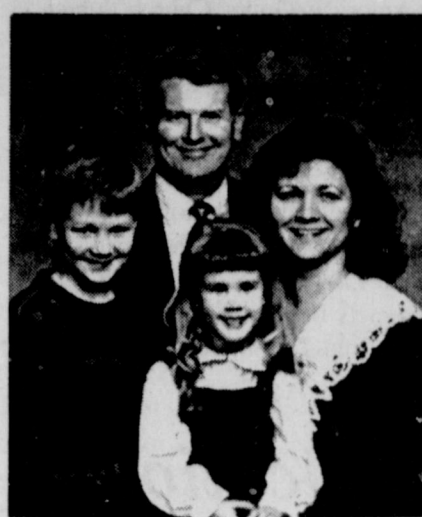
Neal and his wife Sandra are natives of Bokchito, Okla. They have two children, Matthew, 8, and Caitlin, 4.

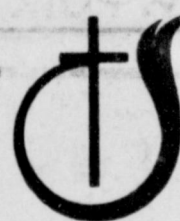

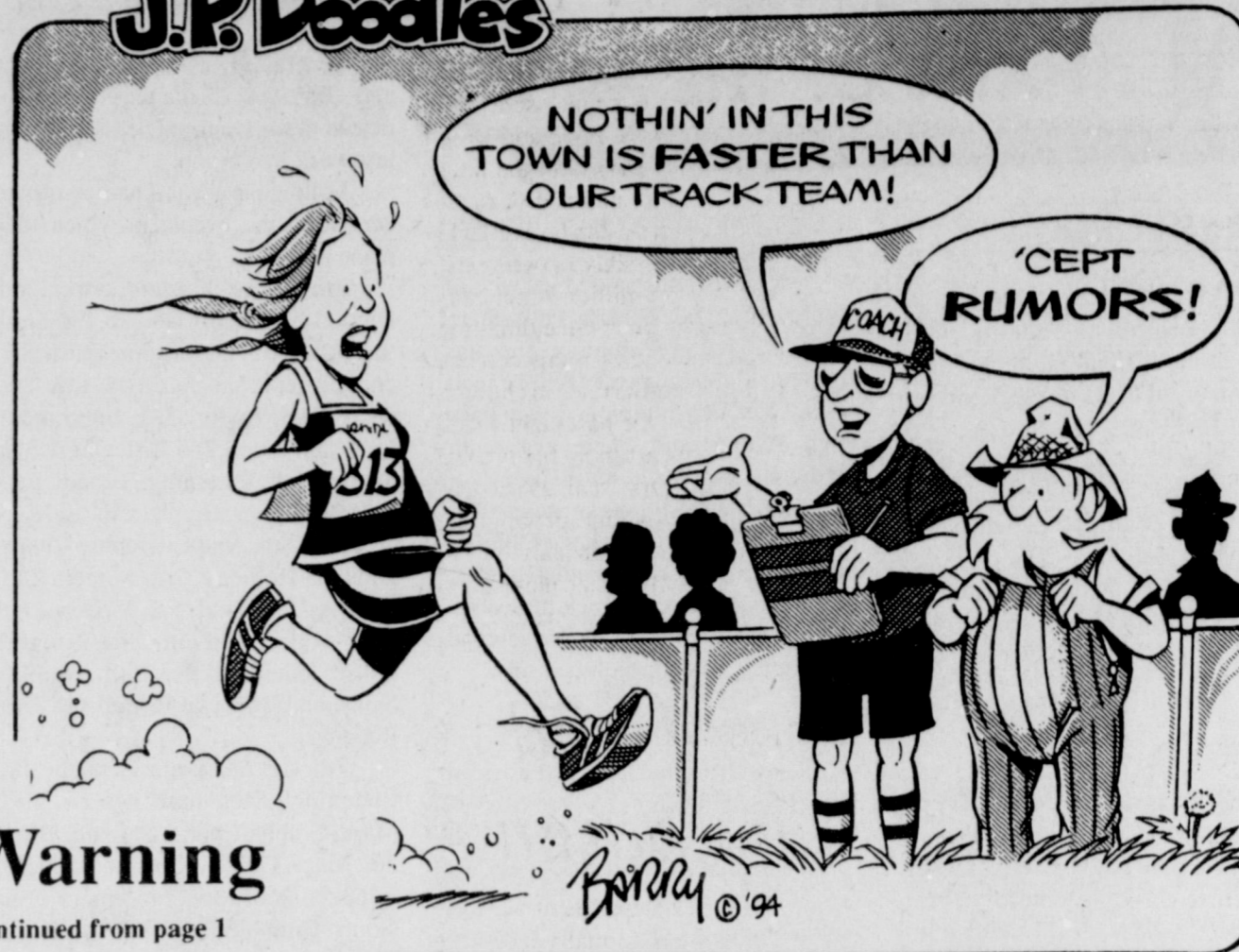

hallway, that is away from any outside wall and not exposed to windows.

The majority of fatalities when Wichita Falls was struck were people in their vehicles who had left their homes or buildings and were either attempting to move out of the funnel's path or outrun it.

Residents can educate themselves to the sound of the "take cover" siren signal when the fire department tests its sirens at 7 p.m. every second Tuesday of the month.

That testing, which is done to make sure the units are in working order, is not carried out whenever there is any threat of a severe storm in the area.

Also, the storm alert sirens are not the same as the siren that signals volunteer firemen in case of a fire.

Should a tornado or severe storm strike the community, the city and county already has in place a plan of response. Departments and individuals already know their areas of responsibility and will spring into action.

One of those actions will be to check all known storm shelters, to determine if anyone is trapped inside.

For that reason, residents with such shelters are asked to notify the police department of the shelter's location, prior to any storm or resulting damage.

## Experimental spray being developed

More effective relief from asthma symptoms may be just around the corner, thanks to an experimental spray being developed at The Methodist Hospital in Houston.

Researchers from Methodist and Baylor College of Medicine have developed a way to place a powerful asthma drug in a spray that reaches areas of the body most affected by asthma and stays there for a longer period of time.

Doctors here mix the drug beclomethasone--widely used to treat lung inflammation resulting from asthma--with lipid compounds, or harmless, fatty substances found in the blood. The compound is then mixed into a water vapor, which can be inhaled through a nebulizer.

"The mixture goes deeply into the lungs, where the drug is really needed," says Dr. Vernon Knight, a senior attending Internal Medicine physician at Methodist. "We found the lipid aerosol to be much more effective than the present way of administering beclomethasone."

Currently the drug is available only in a pressurized canister, which the patient sprays into his mouth.

"The problem with that method is that the vapor comes out too fast, and deposits most of the drug in the nose and throat, where it's not as effective," says Knight. Another drawback is that the currently used aerosol releases fluorocarbons into the atmosphere which are believed to contribute to deterioration of the earth's protective ozone layer.

Researchers found the lipid aerosol remains in lung tissue longer. Tests in non-asthmatic patients conducted with Methodist's Nuclear Medicine lab showed that 90 percent of the beclomethasone compound remained in the lungs three hours after it was first inhaled.

"The new method has a lot of potential," says Dr. William Eschenbacher, a pulmonary specialist at Methodist who researched the new spray with Knight and Dr. Joseph Rodarte, also a pulmonary specialist. "It's very effective for treating asthma and we hope that eventually we can administer other types of drugs in the same fashion."

Both beclomethasone and the lipid compounds used in the new spray are approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA), but the lipid aerosol will require more FDA-regulated testing before it can be available for general use, possibly in two years.

More than 15 million Americans have asthma, which is three times the number of asthmatics in this country 20 years ago. Asthma rates in children have tripled over the past eight years, because children are more likely to be exposed to "triggers" such as second-hand cigarette smoke and air pollution.

Asthma patients can learn how to avoid triggers and educate themselves about their condition through the

Asthma Institute of Houston, a joint project of The Methodist Hospital and Baylor College of Medicine. Specialists at the Institute work with a patient's primary physician to develop a plan to manage asthma and its effects.

Doctors from the Asthma Institute will participate in a free seminar, "Controlling Your Asthma Through Self-Management," Saturday, May 14, at the Ramada Astrodome, 2100 South Braeswood. The program will be presented in English at 9:30 a.m., and in Spanish at 11:15 a.m.

The seminar is co-sponsored by the Asthma Institute of Houston, The Methodist Hospital, and the American Lung Association.

## State-wide immunization campaign introduced

The Texas Department of Health (TDH) last week formally kicked off what state officials are calling the largest immunization campaign in Texas history.

Shots Across Texas, a comprehensive campaign to raise the immunization rates of Texans age two and younger, was unveiled at a press conference that brought together state health officials, political leaders and volunteers.

The goal of Shots Across Texas is to immunize at least 90 percent of Texas children two and younger by 1996.

Dr. David R. Smith, Texas commissioner of health, said the need for Shots Across Texas is critical.

"Currently, fewer than 60 percent of Texas children younger than two are fully immunized," Dr. Smith explained. "Texas ranks among the last in the United States and is behind many nations in providing immunizations against polio, measles and diphtheria for our children."

"The problem isn't that the resources aren't available. It's that many people are unaware of how important it is to immunize their children. That's why Shots Across Texas is so critically needed."

According to recent surveys, many Texas parents are unaware of the risks associated with immunization-preventable disease, including brain damage and even death.

A recent Houston study revealed that, while four out of five parents said their children were fully immunized, medical records indicated fewer than half that number actually were.

Last year, the Texas Legislature passed a law requiring the age-appropriate immunization of Texas children regardless of their families' ability to pay.

Sponsored by TDH, Shots Across Texas also is supported by Texas Medical Association, Texas Medical Association Alliance, a number of other organizations and about 260 local coalitions throughout the state.

In addition to billboards and public service announcements, Shots Across Texas will include hundreds of immunization clinics and other activities organized by the local coalitions.

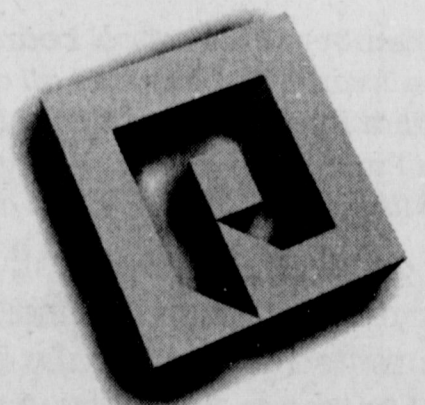

AUSTIN — Texas should appeal or even violate the two-year-old Ruiz federal prison lawsuit that required the state to operate its prisons within the limits of the U.S. Constitution, Republican gubernatorial candidate George W. Bush said last week.

In a speech to the Texas Police Chiefs Association in Austin, Bush suggested that tents be pitched on prison sites to house inmates to relieve overcrowding in county jails that are forced to house state prisoners.

Bush granted that Richards did stop the "revolving door" that let convicts out on parole, but he

pointed out that the move only saddled county jails with 34,000 state inmates and transferred the burden to county sheriffs.

But Chuck McDonald, a spokesman for Gov. Ann Richards' re-election campaign, said if the settlement between the state and the federal courts were violated, it would bring a federal fine of \$800,000 per day, or \$300 million per year.

"No one would take \$300 million in taxpayer money and shred it just to be a tough guy," said McDonald. A month of fines would come to \$25 million — money that would be better spent on building a prison, McDonald said. "No right-thinking person wants to get back into that financial nightmare."

Texas Attorney General Dan Morales has approved the use of tents on a temporary basis to house inmates. But he has warned that if Texas violated the prison settlement, the federal courts would limit how many inmates could be housed in prisons now under construction.

Bush also told police chiefs that he supports the right of Texans to carry concealed handguns.

He said he would have approved a bill that Richards vetoed last year that would have allowed Texans to vote on whether they should be allowed to carry handguns.

Harris Defends Ballpark Bill

State Sen. Chris Harris, R-Arlington, said his sponsoring of a 1991 legislative bill that allowed the construction of The Ballpark in Arlington was appropriate, though his family owned land less than a mile from the stadium site.

John Steiner, executive director of the Texas Ethics Commission, said he found no conflict of interest in Harris' ownership of the land, although state law forbids lawmakers from voting on measures that will directly benefit a specific business transaction of a business entity in which the member has a controlling interest.

Steiner noted that Harris and his family have owned the land for more than 20 years. He said he doesn't believe there was a special intent on Harris' part to pass legislation to help his own business interests.

Harris said carrying the bill — which had the backing of Arlington voters and city officials — was a duty performed for his constituents.

The senator said he has a 5 percent interest in his family's 29-acre tract, which is zoned for apartments and actually is harmed by the traffic brought by games at the \$189 million ballpark.

Teacher Pay Hike: Meno

Education Commissioner Lionel "Skip" Meno says Texas teachers

deserve a 5 percent pay raise, but teachers' groups said such a raise would not go far enough.

Meno recommended the pay hike as a part of a package of proposed education improvements he sent to a select committee studying Texas' public education system.

The proposal calls for a minimum annual pay for beginning teachers of \$17,850 for a 10-month contract, an increase of \$850.

The top minimum salary would be \$31,020 for a teacher with a bachelor's degree and at least 12

years' experience.

Other Highlights

Gov. Richards named Kleberg County Sheriff Adan Munoz Jr. to head her criminal justice division, which is responsible for administering \$60 million in state and federal money for various programs. Munoz, 46, succeeds Doyne Bailey, who resigned to become executive director of the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission.

The Texas High Speed Rail Authority will meet April 27 to

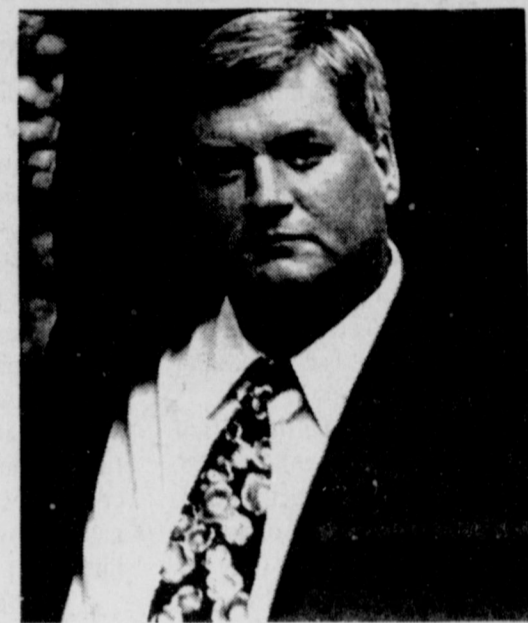
consider whether to revoke Texas TGV Corp.'s franchise to build and operate a high-speed railroad in Texas. TGV officials were unable to raise \$170 million in initial financing for the project by a Dec. 31, 1993 deadline.

Amarillo businessman Jerry Hodge has resigned from the Texas Board of Criminal Justice to devote more time to his health care business. Hodge was appointed in 1987 by then-Gov. Bill Clements. His departure leaves one Republican — San Antonio lawyer Alan Polunsky — on the 9-member panel.

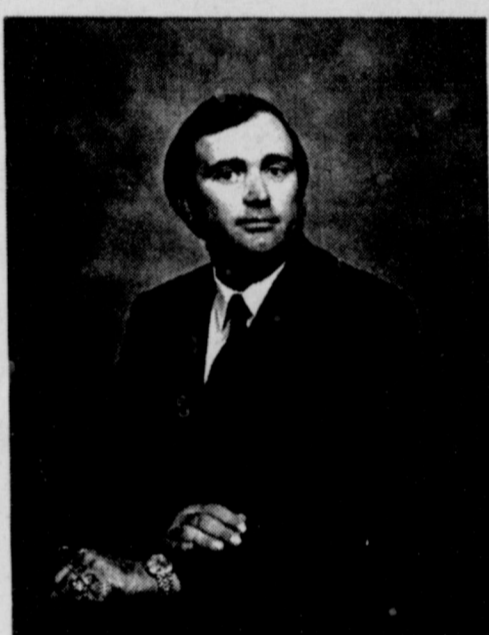

# Worth Quoting

Jesus took five loaves of bread and two fishes and fed the multitude - but that was before EPA.

Here in the 20th century, the Environmental Protection Agency wants to outlaw the smell of fresh-baked bread -- particularly that baked by Mrs. Baird's Bakery in Fort Worth.

For most of us, the delicious aroma of baked bread conjures up fond memories from the past of busy kitchens filled with the odor from busy ovens on Saturday preparing for Sunday's repasts.

Not so for the staffers of the EPA. Their sniffers get all bent out of shape sniffing the aroma of baking bread drifting across Interstate 35 from the new Baird Bakery. The smell of baking bread, it turns out, is a form of air pollution.

To most of us, bread is the staff of life, but to the environmental police, it's a clarion call for immediate action. Knead together flour, water, and yeast and apply heat, and you not only get delicious aroma but also ethanol, a non-toxic substance that contributes to ozone formation.

According to EPA, ethanol is a "volatile organic compound" or VOC in EPA language. Ethanol is vaporized and released when the internal temperature of bread reaches 174 degrees Fahrenheit -- the point where the aroma smells the best.

Those eager sniffers in the EPA want the nation's biggest bakers to spend millions of dollars to install new emission controls. Doing so will limit the VOCs -- and the smells.

All states, including Texas, must put into effect plans to reduce ground level ozone 15% in big cities by 1996 to comply with federal law.

This ethanol thing is a classic example of a muddled Uncle Sam that knoweth not what his hands -- or agency personnel are doing.

Consider this: at the very time that EPA is demanding that bakeries limit ethanol emissions, the same agency is subsidizing the ethanol industry by \$550 million a year.

In December, EPA proposed a rule to mandate the use of ethanol and an ethanol derivative in the reformulated gasoline metropolitan areas must start using to meet Clean Air Act standards.

A total of 51 senators wrote a letter to EPA administrator Carol Browner claiming that the "ethanol industry is

already one of the most subsidized industries in the world."

The agency has decided, with the strong help of corn growers, that 30 percent of all oxygenated fuels used in reformulated gasoline should be derived from renewable fuels. In common language, that means that the new gasoline used in big cities must have ethanol -- a fuel made from corn -- and Mrs. Baird's bakery.

It's downright confounding! One section of EPA is demanding that a bakery quit emitting ethanol while another section of the same agency is proposing that all gasoline used in big cities be formulated with 30% ethanol.

Even the Sierra Club and the Environmental Defense Fund argue that ethanol has dubious environmental benefits. And the Exxon company has said that if the EPA passes the 30% ruling, there's no way that gasoline companies can make the reformulated gasoline by January when the law goes into effect.

Perhaps what we need to do is send Bob Zugg and his gas control units into Fort Worth and install the equipment necessary to capture the odor of baking bread and put it in the gas tank of Fort Worth drivers.

The EPA could do something useful -- like outlawing the cooking of cabbage or at least capture the odor. Our experience with cabbage suggests that that particular aroma could power most of the city transit vehicles in both Fort Worth and Dallas -- and at least equal the smell of burnt diesel.

Holy Toledo! What if those nosy staff sniffers of EPA take in after cornbread next?

**GARDENING HINTS**

Texoma lawns need tender loving care during the spring and summer months to perform their very best.

Green, lush turf is fairly easy to grow if you know the basics of fertility, watering, mowing and weed control.

Warm season grasses such as bermuda and St. Augustine should be fertilized with 3-1-2 or 4-1-2 ratio fertilizers. The three numbers on a bag of fertilizer refer to nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium.

You should purchase and apply fertilizers such as 12-4-8, 15-5-10, 21-7-14 or 16-4-8 for best results. These three numbers will appear on the front of the fertilizer bag.

You will also find slow-release nitrogen fertilizers at your local garden center or fertilizer distributor. These products are designed to produce slow, even growth of lawn grasses.

Slow-release fertilizers are available in 3-1-2 and 4-1-2 ratios, however a portion of the nitrogen in the bag is slow release. These slow release products are ideal for those of you who mulch your grass clippings. These products are always labeled as slow-release nitrogen.

As important as using the right kind of fertilizer is applying it at the proper time.

Common bermuda should be fertilized on April 15, June 1, July 15, and September 1. St. Augustine should be fertilized on April 15, June 1, and September 1.

Cool-season grasses such as fescue should not be fertilized until September 15.

Fertilizers are easily applied with a broadcast spreader which can often be borrowed from a nursery or garden center.

Always follow recommended label rates and directions for fertilizer applications. Most people tend to apply more fertilizer than necessary.

During the driest period of summer, out lawns usually require about one inch of water every five to six days. Deep, infrequent watering encourages stronger root systems which produce

healthier lawns.

Remember that fescue may require an inch of water every three or four days when the heat of summer is on.

Water in the morning before 10 a.m. so that less moisture is lost to evaporation. Morning watering also allows the grass to dry out during the day reducing disease occurrence.

Weed problems can be broken down into two major groups. There are grassy weeds such as dallisgrass and crabgrass and broadleaf weeds such as dandelion and clover.

On bermuda lawns you can control broadleaf weeds with herbicides such as Weed-B-Gone or Wipeout according to all label directions.

Grassy weeds in bermuda lawns can be controlled with a product called MSMA. MSMA will yellow bermuda lawns for a short period, however, the turf recovers if you use the correct rates. Again you should use the correct rates.

St. Augustine on the other hand is extremely sensitive to many chemicals, therefore you are limited as to what you can use. You cannot use MSMA on St. Augustine.

There are some broadleaf herbicides registered for use on St. Augustine. Check all chemical labels carefully to make sure the one you are using is labeled for St. Augustine turf or severe damage will result.

Last but not least is mowing.


Common bermuda should be mowed to one and a half inches, St. Augustine to two inches, and fescue to two and a half inches.

Never remove any more than one-third of the leaf blade at any one time. If you are mulching your grass you need to mow at least every five days for best results.

Follow all these lawn care tips for a quality turf. Additional fact sheets on lawn establishment and care are available through your county extension office.
