## Chief Jailer, Terry Addison Resigns, Effective Feb. 29

(EDITOR'S NOTE: The following is a letter of resignation from the chief Jailer, Terry Addison, anything in this letter does not necessarily reflect the views of this paper.)

February 14, 1980

Mr. Bill Skinner, Sheriff  
Callahan County, Texas

Dear Sheriff,

Please accept this as my resignation to be effective February 29, 1980, as Deputy Sheriff and chief Jailer of the Callahan County Sheriffs Office.

I would also like to state that the departments I have worked with such as the department of Public Safety, the City Police departments in the county and the county officers are as good a group as I have ever worked with and trust them whenever I need a backup. I have no complaint with any of these departments or officers.

The first reason I am leaving is because of the condition of the jail. At the present time this jail does not meet most of the standards set up by the Texas Commission on jail standards. This jail is unsafe. There is not even a safe place to book in a prisoner. As far as the officers safety goes there is no way to stop contraband from coming into this jail. Every time an officer goes to the upper floor you know not what to expect for any type of weapon can be passed up thru the upstairs windows.

If the people who rule over this county cannot help provide some safety for the officers, why should they be expected

to take the risk.

We had an incident on January 18, 1980 in which we had two employees of the sheriffs dept. were held hostage at the point of a .45 automatic pistol. At this time I tried to disable and disarm this suspect by shooting the gun out of his hand. I was charged with aggravated assault with a deadly weapon and the case was taken before the grand jury, which no billed me.

The sheriffs dept. followed the law and charged this subject with aggravated kidnapping and filed the case with the proper authorities in an effort to get this juvenile certified and tried as an adult, but some of the elected officials in this county felt that the county did not have the money to prosecute this case. As a result this subject was released from custody with no charges being filed.

He was taken to North Carolina to face aut theft charges.

This makes me wonder just how much the elected officials in this county think an employees life is worth and if they want good law enforcement for the tax paying citizens of this county. To me this is a very sad situation because the people pay taxes for good law enforcement and the people deserve it.

Again, to the men in law enforcement of Callahan County, I have enjoyed working with each and every one of you, and I wish you all the best.

## City of Baird Files Countersuit Against Phone Co.

The City of Baird filed a countersuit against Continental Telephone Co. here February 1, 1980 in 42nd district court.

The suit filed by the City is asking \$100,000 in damages. The original suit filed by Continental Telephone ask that the City of Baird be ordered to correct the unsafe condition of Electric utility poles owned and maintained by the City.

Continental officials said it was impossible for them to continue plans to rewire the Baird exchange and install a new

computerized switching center.

Continental is also seeking monetary damages from the City for costs incurred in reprogramming the switching equipment for use in another area.

On the other side of these two suits, is the people of Baird and surrounding area, the citizens are bound to suffer for like of service until something is done about the situation that exist, and who knows how long that will be.

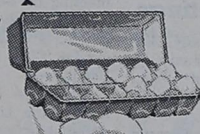

Go Oil Corp., Jacksboro, will drill No. 1 Nuemann as a proposed 4,500-foot wildcat in Callahan County.

Location is five miles north of Putnam on a 941-acre lease. It spots 467 feet from the south and east lines of Section 134, University Lands Survey.

Another wildcat location was staked two miles southeast of Putnam as Brazos Resources Inc., College Station No. 1 Jobe.

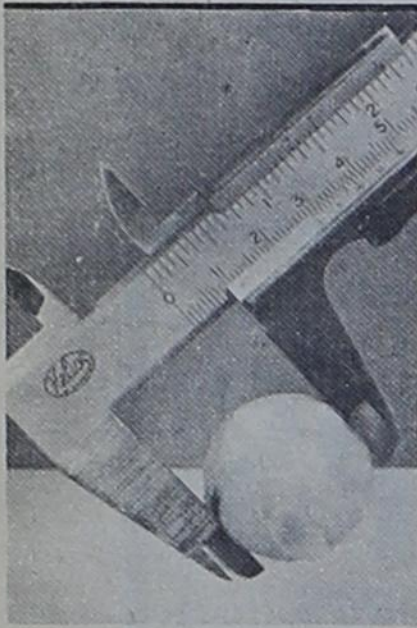

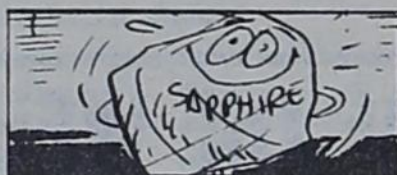
It is up to each of us to turn this situation around, and put Baird back on the right track. If you care about your town, take an active part in the government. VOTE!

Operators have filed applications to drill seven wildcats in Callahan County.

Jones Co., Albany, No. 1 2976 Williams is slated for 4,400 feet.

The prospect will be drilled two miles north of Putnam on an 80-acre lease.

Drillsite is 393 feet from the south and 735 feet from the east lines of Section 2976, TE&L Survey.

Union Exploration, Lamesa, staked four of the tests with each venture slated for 4,500 feet.

No. 1 Dorothy Miller will be drilled nine and one half miles north of Putnam on a 100-acre lease.

It spots 1,583 feet from the north and 774 feet from

the east lines of Section 127 University Lands Survey, A-1863.

No. 3 Luther Rogers will be drilled nine miles north of Putnam on a 160 acre lease.

Drillsite is 487 feet from the north and 469 feet from the west lines of Section 2050, TE&L Survey.
