#### RULES OF THE ROAD

1. Keep on the right side of the road when meeting other vehicles coming in the opposite direction. 2. Always sound your horn and pass on the left side when passing other vehicles (except street cars) going in the same direction. Never try to pass another vehicle going in the same direction at street intersections, on curves, or when go ing up or down a hill.

3. At street intersections give the right-of-way to the vehicle on your right. Do not presume too much when you have the right-of-way; the other fellow may not know you

4. Always signal when preparing to stop, start, or turn. If possible, signal by extending the arm.

5. All traffic signs, including those used for the control of traffic at intersections, should be obeyed promptly and to the letter. "Slow Down" signs near schools and caution signs at railroad crossings should always be observed and your actions governed accordingly.

6. Never "Crash" a light. When a change is indicated from "Go" to "Stop" (or vice versa) in the traffic control system at intersections allating wasses

7. When intending to turn to the left, give the signal at least 50 feet before reaching the turning point. Move over to the center line of the street (unless local rules require otherwise), slow down passing the intersection of the street and then

8. In turning either right or left, vehicles.

9. Do not leave the curb or parking area without signaling and seeing that your way is clear to drive into moving traffic. A moving line of traffic has the right-of-way.

10. See that your license tags are installed in the position specified by law and that they are clearly visible under all conditions. Keep them clean.

11. Drive at a safe speed-a speed consistent with the type of highway you are on, and always note whether the road is dry or wet. Each varying condition on the highway means adjusting your speed accordingly.

12. Always adjust your actions on the road to traffic conditions. If traffic is heavy drive slowly; if traffic is light, you have an opportunity to see the ever changing scenery. of the State of Texas: Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding to said Article a new Section, to be known and designated as Section 62-c, reading as follows:

"Section 62-c. The Legislature is authorized to provide for the creation of Civil Service Systems for county employees in the respective counties of this State, but any system so authorized and established shall be approved by a vote of the people in said county. Any Civil Service System established by virtue of this Section shall apply to appointive offices only, and the limitation on term of office heretofore provided by Section 30 of this Article shall not apply, but the duration of such offices shall be governed by the provisions of such Civil Service System. 



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
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
