City truck, equipment stolen, recovered

"I haven't seen a week like that in all my years here," said Iowa Park Police Chief Ray Smock.

And he had good cause to make the statement about activities carried on by his department.

Those activities including solving the theft of a new city-owned truck with several thousands of dollars worth of equipment, and 20 arrests, which did not include the thief of the city's truck.

Besides recovering the city truck and equipment, police also apparently solved, or at least have an idea, of what happened to several other vehicles that have been stolen in the area.

Lynn Stone, an employee of the city's water department, discovered the truck's disappearance at 7:45 a.m. Monday, when he went to the city complex on FM 368 on the south side of town.

The missing vehicle was picked up Tuesday afternoon, after having been located on River View Road -- better known as River Rat Road -- 1.3 miles north of 1206.

The vehicle was being dusted Wednesday morning by Investigator Lynn Collins for fingerprints, and a warrant for the arrest of a suspect was said to be imminent.

When Stone approached the city complex, he found the area's gate standing open, as was one of the building's overhead doors.

Investigation determined a one-ton diesel Chevrolet truck, with less

than 1,900 miles on it, gone. The truck, without a tool bed, was valued at \$19,000.

Also missing was a five-horsepower water pump valued at \$350, two line locators valued at \$500 each, a 1,250 hydraulic cutter, a gasoline-powered generator valued at \$450, and a cutting torch with fuel tank valued at \$200, as well as several hundreds of dollars worth of plumbing parts and supplies.

Because the complex is located outside the city limits, an investigator from the sheriff's department was called in to assist with the investigation.

A neighboring resident told officers of having been awakened by a noise about 2:30 a.m. Monday, and having seen two dark colored vehicles parked along the roadway. But because city workers often are called out at night, police were not alerted.

City and county personnel both had looked in the River Rat Road area for the equipment, but were unable to locate any of the missing equipment.

But that is where a white Shetland pony came into play.

It was known that the suspect had purchased such an animal. It had been seen in a fenced area in that neighborhood by a deputy. The fenced area had a metal gate with a "no trespass" sign posted on it.

However, Smock said the tracts of land on either side of the fenced area were open, and officers could go there and view the enclosed area, where they

found an old metal barn.

There, they could see a white vehicle inside, but could not make a positive identification.

So they asked for the assistance of Lindemann Oil Co. of Archer City, that owns a helicopter.

The craft flew two officers over the site, and they were able to view the inside of the building from the Wichita River side. They made their identification.

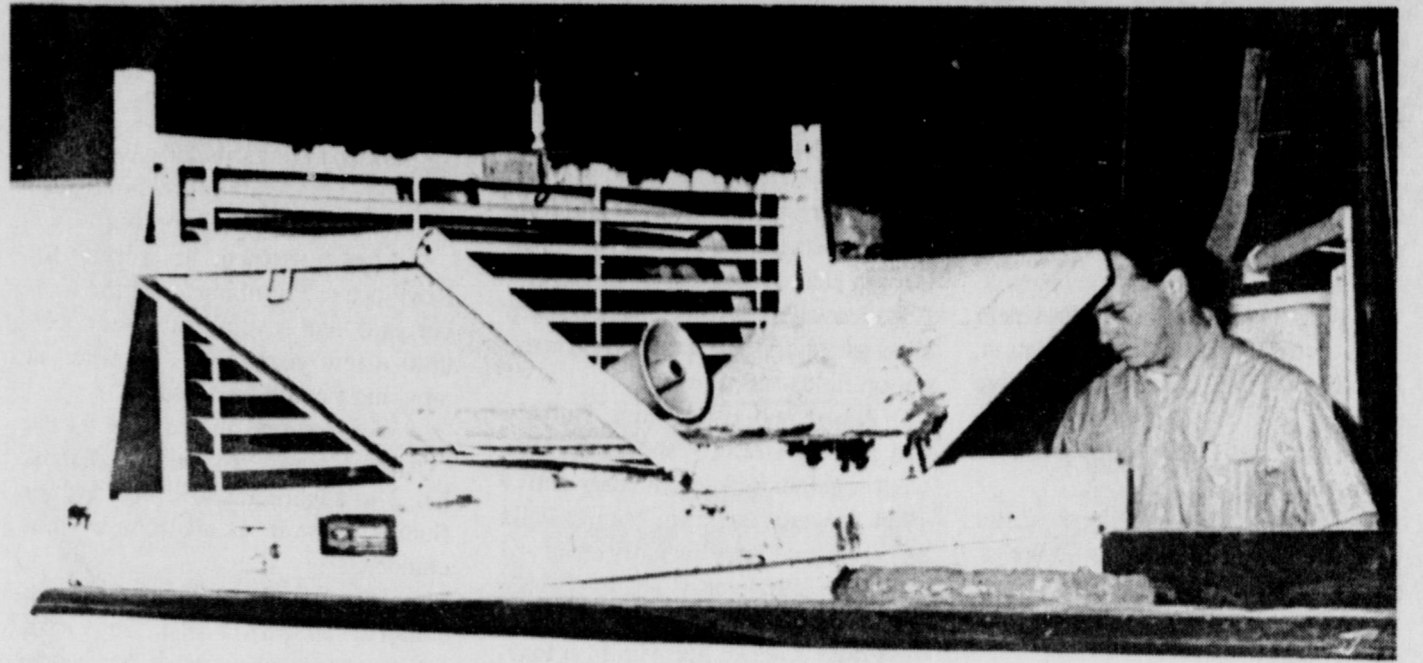
Back at the police department, Collins was filling out a search warrant which he was able to complete with information provided by the two officers in the helicopter.

Exercising the warrant, officers not only recovered the city truck and equipment, but a trailer with a jet ski which also was reported stolen Monday from Wichita Falls.

They also found parts of a Silverado pickup, of which portions were discovered in a mobile home earlier here in Iowa Park, as well as three vehicle license plates, all of which checked out to be from vehicles reported stolen earlier.

Equipment was on the site believed to be used to tear down vehicles for parts that are sold to salvage yards.

Police had found parts of a vehicle reportedly stolen from Wichita Falls on May 7, in a mobile home in the 400 block of East Pecan. Eldron Andrew Loyd, 24, was arrested in that case, according to the police blotter.

Busy week for police, 20 arrests reported

At 12:20 a.m. Sunday, police arrested John Wadjun and Jeffrey Bryan Peyton, both 37, in the 600 block of East Highway on public intoxication charges. They were released at 5:15 a.m. when Wadjun paid a \$280 fine and Peyton a \$81.50 fine.

Sims was transported to the county jail in Wichita Falls.

Michael Leroy Sellers, 41, was charged with Class C assault, and Jeremy Dell Sellers, 17, was taken into custody on an outstanding warrant for speeding. They were released after posting an \$81.50 bond and paying a \$106 fine, respectively.

Christy Marie Bowen, 19, was arrested in the 200 block of South Colorado Saturday afternoon on an outstanding warrant issued by Clay County, where she was wanted on a forgery charge. She was later released to a Clay County deputy to be transported to Henrietta.

Annexation on city agenda

Iowa Park's city limits could possibly enlarge by more than 21 acres, if the city council approves a proposed annexation of land at its meeting Monday afternoon.

To begin at 4 p.m., the meeting will be held in council chambers at city hall.

Following the third and final public hearing on the proposed annexation of land north of US 287 and west of FM 368, aldermen will consider adopting

an ordinance completing annexation.

Another part of the same subject will be consideration of a final plat of the tract, to be known as Highland Park Addition.

The council will consider a request from the Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Department to close the 100 and 200 blocks of Cash Street on Aug. 27 for a street dance.

Authorization will be considered for the city administrator to transfer funds from the Workman's Compen-

sation Fund into the Benefit Trust Fund, according to the tentative agenda.

A public appearance has been requested by former alderman Bud Thompson, concerning application of the city's code of ordinances.

Also, a resolution will be proposed in which the city will express appreciation to Doug Lindemann for "his assistance in recovering stolen property belonging to the City of Iowa Park."

Council seeks water, sewer bids

The city council, meeting in a called session Tuesday morning, voted to authorize the city administrator to initiate action to provide utilities to a new housing subdivision.

Administrator Mike Price was instructed to have the engineering done to extend water and sewer service to a tract north of US 287 and west of FM 368, and after that is completed, to advertise for bids on the project.

The action was in response to a request from the developer, Richard Porter, who explained by letter that he needed the commitment from the city before he could coordinate development financing.

Extension of the utilities is esti-

mated to cost the city approximately \$85,000, of which \$80,000 will be for a sewer lift station.

In their meeting the previous week, aldermen had decided the city should wait until Porter had built the streets, installed the utilities and poured the foundations of at least six houses, before making the investment.

Two of the three required public hearings have already been held on the proposed annexation of the development, to be known as Highland Park subdivision, and the final hearing is to be held this coming Monday.

However, Porter has offered only slightly more than 21 acres of the 46

acres he owns and has cleared for development. Some aldermen expressed the opinion that the entire tract should be brought into the city, in part to justify the utility investment.

Porter, in his correspondence since that meeting, pledged to bring in the additional 25 acres after the first of 1995.

The city's project is to extend a six-inch water line from the property owned by the Industrial Development Corporation, to the southwest corner of the subdivision, and install a lift station in the southeast corner which is to carry sewer under the expressway to existing sewer lines.

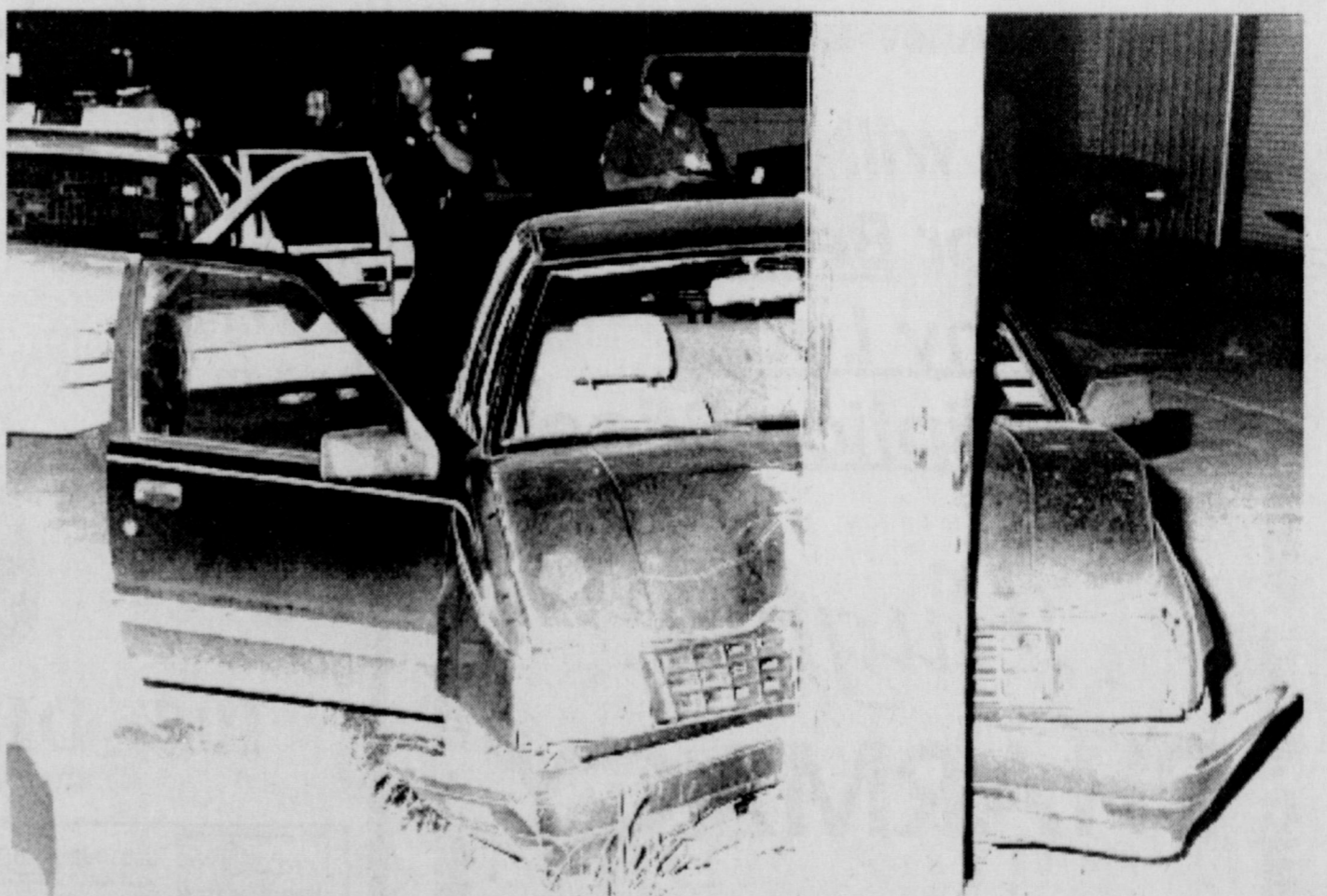
News Briefs

An early-morning storm drenched the city with almost an inch of rain Wednesday.

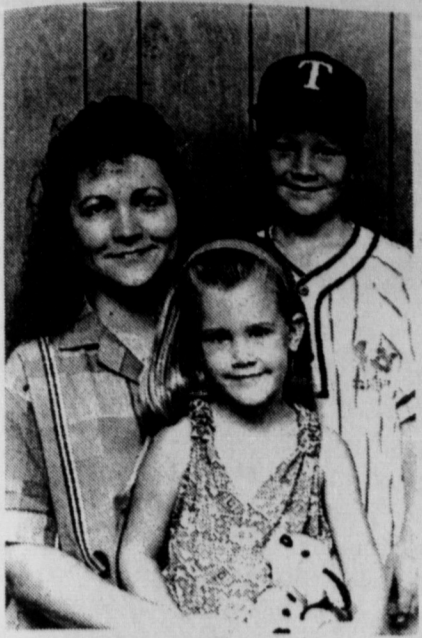
Virgil Woodfin measured .85 of an inch at his home.

The recipes she is sharing this week are the ones people ask her for the most. Sandra's children agreed that "Southwest Chicken & Brown Rice" is their favorite dish.

Southwest Chicken & Rice

A real favorite at our house!
3/4 lb. boneless, skinless chicken breast, cut into short, thin strips
1 tsp. ground cumin
1 tsp. chili powder
1/2 tsp. salt (optional)
1 Tbsp. oil
1 small onion, sliced and separated into rings
1 clove garlic, minced
1 - 8 oz. can tomatoes
1/3 cup picante sauce (or 1/4 cup water)
1 cup quick brown rice ("ready in 10 minutes" type)
1 - 8 oz. can kidney beans, drained and rinsed
1/4 cup shredded cheese (optional)
Sprinkle chicken with cumin, chili powder and salt. Cook chicken till no longer pink in hot oil over medium heat. Add onion and garlic; cook and

stir 2 minutes. Drain tomatoes, reserving liquid. Coarsely chop tomatoes; set aside. Add water to reserved liquid to make 3/4 cup. Add liquid and picante sauce to skillet. Bring to a boil. Stir in rice; reduce heat. Cover tightly and simmer 5 minutes. Stir in beans and chopped tomatoes. Remove from heat. Let stand covered about 5 minutes until all liquid is absorbed. Sprinkle with cheese. Makes 4 servings.
** I usually double this recipe because it is so well received at my house.*

Broccoli/Bacon Salad

This salad sounds strange, but is delicious
2 large bunches broccoli, chopped medium fine
12 slices bacon, cooked and crumbled
1/2 medium onion, chopped
1/2 cup raisins
Dressing
1 cup mayonnaise (I use fat free type)
1/2 cup sugar
2 Tbsps. white vinegar

Fresh Peach Pie

2 Tbsps. cornstarch
3/4 cup sugar
3/4 cup peach puree (3-4 peaches processed in blender or food processor)

2 Tbsps. water
2 Tbsps. lemon juice
8 oz. cream cheese
1/2 cup powdered sugar
4 cups sliced peaches
1 (9-in.) baked pie shell
In a pan, combine cornstarch and sugar. Blend in peach puree, water, and lemon juice. Bring to a boil, stirring constantly to prevent sticking or scorching. Boil until thickened and clear. Remove from heat; set aside to cool.
Beat together cream cheese and sugar until smooth. Spread evenly over the bottom of baked pie shell. Spoon sliced peaches over cream cheese. Pour cooled puree mixture over the peaches. Chill well before serving.

Fruit Crisp

Topping:
1 1/2 cup quick oats
1 1/2 cup brown sugar
1 cup flour
1 cup margarine

Fruit:
This recipe is very versatile. You may use fresh, frozen or canned fruit. Use any of the following:
- 1 large can sliced peaches (with half the liquid)
- 4 fresh apples (peeled, cored, sliced)
- 4 cups fresh or frozen fruit such as peaches, blueberries, apples/cranberries, etc.

In a bowl, melt margarine and combine with dry topping ingredients. Spray a baking dish with cooking spray and place fruit over the bottom of the dish. Dollop the topping over the fruit and bake at 350 degrees 35-40 minutes until golden brown.

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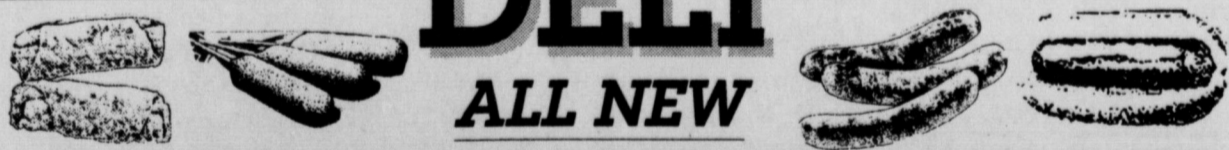

I can tell you from the experience I've gathered as a member of the city council, there's just no telling how many things a tax-collecting political entity can do to improve things, if enough money is available.

That comment comes to mind as the Wichita Falls city council has launched a series of public meetings to determine what improvements citizens of that city want.

After the series is held, the council has said the suggestions will be considered, put in priority, and done... along with some of the improvement projects council members and staff already have in mind.

And where is this additional money to come from? An additional half-cent sales tax, that's where. Of course, that idea failed miserably in an election only a few months ago. But the public hadn't been given the same opportunity to express itself before the vote was held.

I understand the first public meeting was held Tuesday night. I didn't attend, of course.

But I wonder if anyone remembered to ask the council if the improvement projects the citizens are being asked to finance could have been funded by some of that \$9 million the Wichita Falls council spent for the Multiple Purpose Center?

Since I've already done my share in funding the MPC, through my county taxes, I doubt if I'll be making many purchases in Wichita Falls, if the additional sales tax is approved this time.

You may remember, our Wichita Falls dominated county commissioners court also chipped in \$9 million for the MPC, which I've termed as that city's urban renewal project.

I try real hard to be on good terms with my neighbors, but when they keep wanting more and more of my money, I kinda get my back up.

Has anyone noticed the apparent increase in mosquitoes the first part of this week?

Two or three people have commented to me that the city needs to get the mosquito fogger out and operating, because the pests were so numerous and bothersome.

Frankly, I don't think the fogger will do much good, because that equipment doesn't get to the source, as I see it.

Let me explain.

Was it because of bees, I asked. Nope, it was because of mosquitoes.

Why was I impressed with his clothing? It was 108 degrees, rather hot for all he was wearing!

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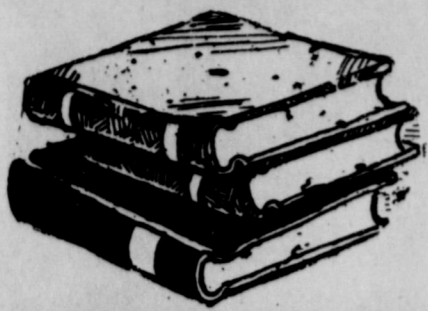

Thank You to Sue Henson from the International Students at Midwestern for spending the morning with us during last Thursday's classes.

We also wish to thank Toru Hosoda, HIKARU Hiruta, Ann Rekaló and Hiromi Hiraoka for sharing with us some of their customs and culture.

Ann is from the state of Ukraine and has only been in Wichita Falls two weeks. She is a teacher at a university and told us that she makes \$10 a month. She also shared that a loaf of bread costs 10 cents and a gallon of milk is 25 cents.

She told us that most families grow their own vegetables and fruits as they are too expensive to buy. We also learned that the children all sleep in the same room while they are growing up.

We also learned from the visitors that in Japan the area in which most families live is not much bigger than our room upstairs (in the library) and that they eat and sleep all in the same room. They do not have beds, instead sleep on mats upon the floor.

Immunization clinic is slated

A pre-school immunization clinic will be held Saturday, Aug. 6, at Kidwell Elementary, according to a spokeswoman for the Wichita Falls City/County Health Dept.

Between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m., students of all ages will be able to update their immunization shots, as required by the Texas Education Agency.

Classes are to begin in all Iowa Park schools on Aug. 18, according to the adopted school calendar.

Students, accompanied by their parents, should have with them their immunization records, if available.

The cost of the shots will be based on family income, but the most that will be charged is \$8. However, no one will be refused shots, the spokeswoman said.

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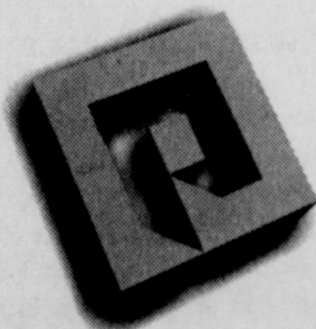

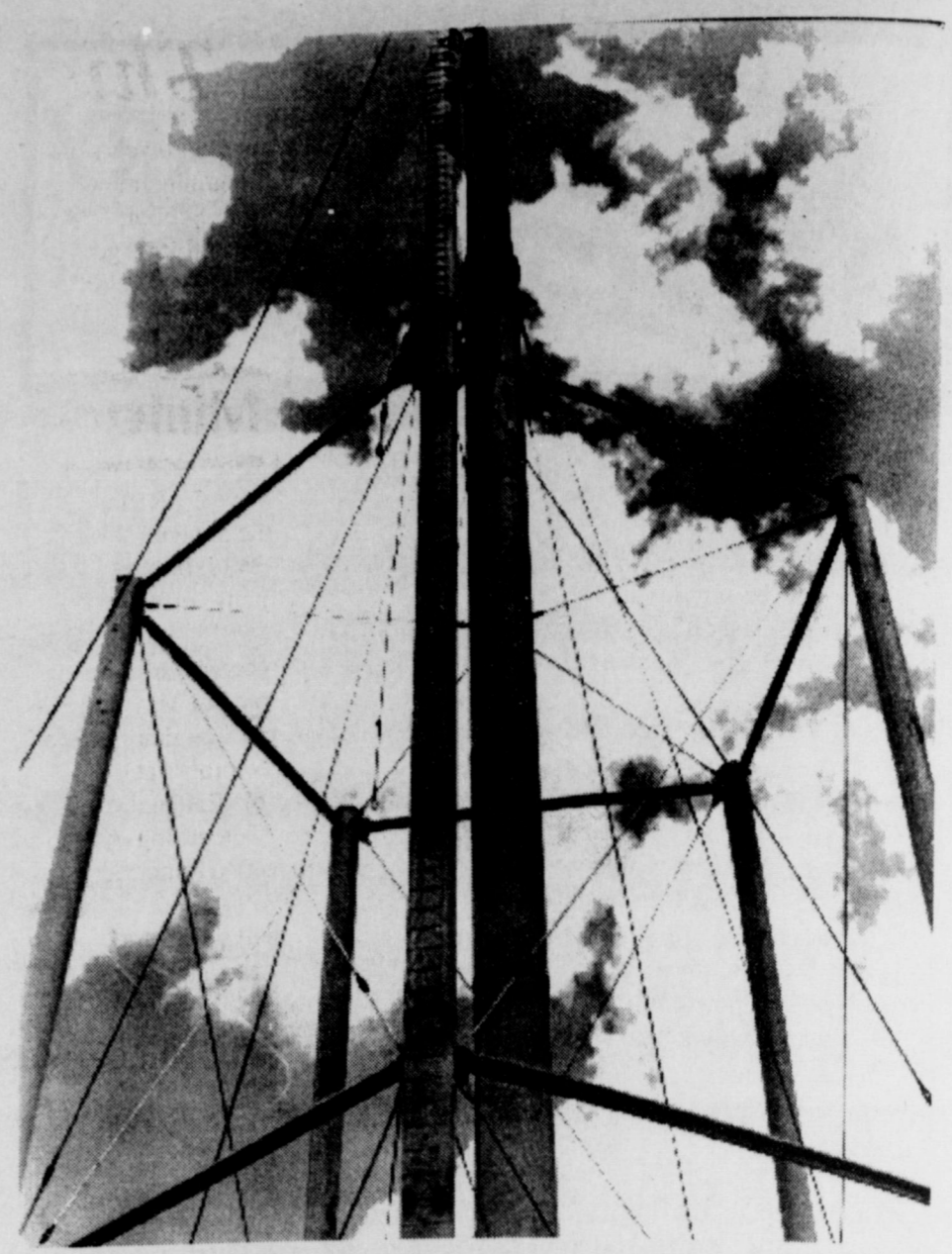

GARDENING HINTS

By MARK TERNING, COUNTY AGENT - HORTICULTURE

Water gardening can help take the heat out of your summer landscape.

Learn about building and maintaining your very own garden pond at the 1994 Garden Pond Clinic. Your chance to find out just how easy and enjoyable water gardening can be will happen at 7:00 this evening at the Extension office, 1626 Midwestern Parkway in Wichita Falls.

Anyone who is interested is encouraged to attend. There will be a \$2 fee per person to cover copy fees on printed information materials.

This special water gardening clinic will feature guest speakers from Garden Ponds and More (a local water gardening supplier from Iowa Park). The program is sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Wichita County Landscape committee.

People are discovering how easy and enjoyable water gardening really is. It is affordable since a small preformed liner or even a water holding

container can be used as a pond structure.

It is simple because tub culture (small water gardens) don't require recycling pumps and elaborate designs. This is a closed system.

All the equipment a person really needs to begin the aquatic plant growing adventure is a large container which holds water.

Your tub should hold at least 15 gallons of water, be at least a bushel size and be completely sealed. Fresh whiskey barrels should be thoroughly

washed or lined with a flexible liner. Do not use redwood which is toxic under water. Use a chlorine neutralizer to eliminate chlorine and chloramine from city water. Follow label directions on these types of products which are available at most garden centers or pond supply outlets.

It is economical because one water lily can produce more than 100 blooms per season. An estimated cost for a simple set up (\$15 container, \$25-\$30 water lily plant, \$5-\$8 oxygenated plants and \$8-\$10 aesthetically pleasing companion plant) is less than \$70.

It doesn't take a mathematician to conclude the cost per flower is very cost effective -- 70 cents per bloom.

Lyme Disease

- Lyme disease results from bacteria transmitted to humans from a deer tick.
- In its early stages, the disease is characterized by a circular rash and flu-like symptoms. If left untreated, Lyme disease can become severe, involving heart palpitations and arthritis.
- More than 1,500 cases of Lyme disease are reported annually, and the number is rising.
- The bacteria-infected tick is commonly found in wooded and grassy areas along both coasts, beginning in May and continuing through September.
- To lessen your chances of contracting Lyme disease, avoid tick-infested areas if possible.
- When hiking in the woods, protect extremities with clothing. Pull socks over the bottoms of pants so ticks don't have an entry onto the legs.
- Walk in the middle of paths.
- Check for ticks after every walk.
- To remove a tick, put some gasoline or kerosene on a cotton ball and tape it loosely over the tick for 15-20 minutes. If the tick does not back itself out, use a fine pair of tweezers and grasp the tick and pull it slowly straight out. Use a magnifying glass and make sure you've got the tick's head.
- Contact your doctor immediately if you are unable to remove the tick, or if you see symptoms of the disease.

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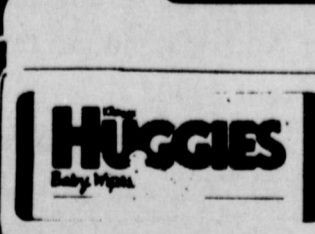

Once a year, for the past 26 years, ranchers, farmers, businesses and individuals have joined together for a common cause called the Rehab Auction.

"The Rehab Auction" refers to three days filled with a variety of auctions: the three-hour TV auction on Thursday, July 14, 7-10 p.m.; the

livestock auction held Friday, July 15 at 10 a.m. at Arrowhead Sales Barn in Wichita Falls and other livestock commissions throughout the area; the Saturday, July 16 event, featuring an all-day silent auction, and a huge merchandise auction at 7 p.m. at the Wichita Falls Activity Center.

The auction committee starts work about a month in advance of the three-

day extravaganza to gather merchandise and livestock from the multiple county area.

The auctions remain the major source of revenue for the charitable services provided at North Texas Easter Seal Rehabilitation Center.

Approximately 1,400 people and their families will receive service from the Center this year, with about 55 percent, or \$600,000 of the service being charitable.

Miles Castles, president of the Rehab Center, says, "This event is our largest fund raiser and we are really dependent upon everyone's support. The generosity of the great folks in North Texas and Southern Oklahoma has provided an ongoing financial stability that allows us to continue to provide the needed medical rehabilitation treatment in our service area."

Another major source of revenue for the Rehab Center is the annual Texas Ranch Roundup, held at the Wichita Mounted Patrol Arena on FM 369.

The 14th edition is scheduled August 19-20.

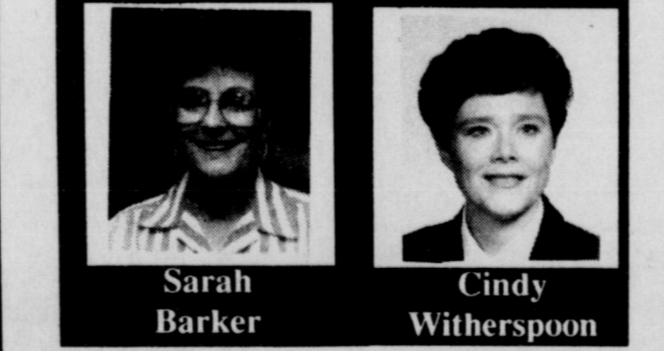
