City truck, equipment stolen, recovered

"I haven't seen a week like that in all my years here," said Iowa Park Police Chief Ray Smock.

And he had good cause to make the statement about activities carried on by his department.

Those activities including solving the theft of a new city-owned truck with several thousands of dollars worth of equipment, and 20 arrests, which did not include the thief of the city's truck.

Besides recovering the city truck and equipment, police also apparently solved, or at least have an idea, of what happened to several other vehicles that have been stolen in the area.

Lynn Stone, an employee of the city's water department, discovered the truck's disappearance at 7:45 a.m. Monday, when he went to the city complex on FM 368 on the south side of town.

The missing vehicle was picked up Tuesday afternoon, after having been located on River View Road -better known as River Rat Road -- 1.3 miles north of 1206.

The vehicle was being dusted Wednesday morning by Investigator Lynn Collins for fingerprints, and a warrant for the arrest of a suspect was said to be imminent.

When Stone approached the city complex, he found the area's gate standing open, as was one of the building's overhead doors.

Investigation determined a oneton diesel Chevrolet truck, with less than 1,900 miles on it, gone. The truck, without a tool bed, was valued at \$19,000.

Also missing was a five horsepower water pump valued at \$350, two line locators valued at \$500 each, a 1,250 hydraulic cutter, a gasolinepowered generator valued at \$450, and a cutting torch with fuel tank valued at \$200, as well as several hundreds of dollars worth of plumbing parts and supplies.

Because the complex is located outside the city limits, an investigator from the sheriff's department was called in to assist with the investigation.

A neighboring resident told officers of having been awakened by a noise about 2:30 a.m. Monday, and having seen two dark colored vehicles parked along the roadway. But because city workers often are called out at night, police were not alerted.

City and county personnel both had looked in the River Rat Road area for the equipment, but were unable to locate any of the missing equipment. But that is where a white Shetland

poney came into play. It was known that the suspect had purchased such an animal. It had been seen in a fenced area in that neighborhood by a deputy. The fenced area had a metal gate with a "no trespass" sign posted on it.

However, Smock said the tracts of land on either side of the fenced area were open, and officers could go there and view the enclosed area, where they found an old metal barn.

There, they could see a white vehicle inside, but could not make a positive identification.

So they asked for the assistance of Lindemann Oil Co. of Archer City, that owns a helicopter.

The craft flew two officers over the site, and they were able to view the inside of the building from the Wichita River side. They made their identification.

Back at the police department, Collins was filling out a search warrant which he was able to complete with information provided by the two officers in the helicopter.


Exercising the warrant, officers not only recovered the city truck and equipment, but a trailer with a jet ski which also was reported stolen Monday from Wichita Falls.


They also found parts of a Silverado pickup, of which portions were discovered in a mobile home earlier here in Iowa Park, as well as three vehicle license plates, all of which checked out to be from vehicles reported stolen earlier.

Equipment was on the site believed to be used to tear down vehicles for parts that are sold to salvage yards.

Police had found parts of a vehicle reportedly stolen from Wichita Falls on May 7, in a mobile home in the 400 block of East Pecan. Eldron Andrew Loyd, 24, was arrested in that case, according to the police blotter.

Following the third and final public hearing on the proposed annexation of land north of US 287 and west of FM 368, aldermen will consider adopting an ordinance completing annexation. Another part of the same subject

will be consideration of a final plat of the tract, to be known as Highland Park Addition.

The council will consider a request from the Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Department to close the 100 and 200 blocks of Cash Street on Aug. 27 for a street dance.

Authorization will be considered for the city administrator to transfer funds from the Workman's Compen-

Council seeks water, sewer bids

The city council, meeting in a called session Tuesday morning, voted to authorize the city administrator to initiate action to provide utilities to a new housing subdivision.

Administrator Mike Price was instructed to have the engineering done to extend water and sewer service to a tract north of US 287 and west of FM 368, and after that is completed, to advertise for bids on the project.

The action was in response to a request from the developer, Richard Porter, who explained by letter that he needed the commitment from the city before he could coordinate development financing.

94 years haven't slowed him

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Not every 94-year-old is still able to ride their bicycle every day. But then, not every person that age can still mow their yard, take care of many of their plumbing problems, do minor repairs to their washing machine when something goes wrong, or cut their own hair----but Albert Weiss can, and does.

"Yah," Weiss said in his distinct German accent, "I could do most anything, now it seems I can't do nothin'."

Weiss was born during President William McKinley's administration, Feb. 19, 1900 in Lockhart, one of five sons of John F. Weiss and Bertha Schaefer, who were both born in Germany.

He was named Olbark (later Americanized to Albert) Conje Weiss. He has one brother still living, Seigfried, called Zack, of Wichita Falls.

When Weiss was six years old, the family moved to Mountainview, Okla., then in six more years they moved to Thornberry in Clay County.

Albert got to complete the fourth grade in school. "You had to work back then. You didn't have time to go to school, you had to help make a living.

"We helped our daddy on the farm, cutting and shocking wheat, tying bundles, and farming cotton with a team of big horses. And you got a spanking if you didn't work," Weiss explained.

The couple's daughter, Peggy Joyce Ingram, said even though her dad did just complete the fourth grade, she remembers when she was in Iowa Park High School that her dad could always get the right answers to her algebra problems, although he didn't always work them by the same method.

In 1930 Albert and his brother Zack moved to the Dale Ranch at Dean and farmed. This is also where they, his wife's brother and a neighbor had a "sideline" business.

Weiss can laugh about it now. The four made beer and rye whiskey, "cooking it off" in the cellar of the how they made the whiskey. "I could still make it if I wanted to," he commented, but using both hands in a negative gesture, he added, "No more, no more."

Weiss later moved to the H. Kampler Ranch and went to work for his future wife Esther's father, Jakob Wiist. Both of Esther's parents, Jakob and Elizabeth Hurd Wiist were born in Russia.

Esther was one of eight children, five brothers and two sisters. She was born in Hearnville May 9, 1917. Her folks moved to the Dean Ranch when she was young. She also worked in the cotton fields and plowed.

Albert and Esther met, "mostly just joshing around," she said. "We went together a couple of years and in 1934 we were married in Wichita Falls by the judge." They recently observed their 60th anniversary.

After working about 12 years on the Edwin Luecke Farm and for R.O. Harvey and the Kimball Ranch, Albert and Esther moved to Wichita Falls in 1947 and he went to work for the Wichita County Irrigation District No. 2.

Mrs. Weiss understands and speaks some German and she also speaks Russian. She said anytime her husband's family got together they would speak German most of the time. Not because they didn't want you to know what they were talking about, but because it seemed the thing to do, she explained.

When the couple moved to Iowa Park in 1948, they bought the house where they still live today. He later bought the adjoining lot.

Weiss does all of his own yard work, which is a pretty big yard. He has a riding lawn mower, but if something happens to it and he doesn't have time to fix it before the grass needs cutting, Albert just pulls out his push mower.

After being married to Albert 60 years, there is still one way Esther doesn't trust him. When discussing how he cuts his own hair, with the use of mirrors, she vowed, "I don't want him cutting mine, I don't trust him." He rides his bicycle about a mile a their yard that is now very large and makes a great shade. He likes the outdoors and now he spends some time during the day relaxing in the shade of that tree.

Weiss retired from the Irrigation District in 1966, but not from working. He had several jobs after his retirement.

The spankings his dad gave Albert must have made an impression, since he still hasn't stopped working.

After retirement he worked for Roy Fortner Plumbing, for the lumber yard, and several other odd jobs until a few years ago. "I worked at anything I could find to do,"

Weiss started out working for the Wichita County Irrigation District No. 2 as a laborer, shoveling dirt for flumes. Now it is all done by machinery.

He remembers, "I worked from sunup to sundown, a lot of times wading in water to do my work, for nearly nothing," he said. He was making 57 cents an hour. But, he added, "One time I worked in the fields for 10 cents an hour--10 hours-\$1."

Jimmy Banks, now general manager of the Irrigation District, started working when he was 16 years old. Weiss was already working then. He said he remembers what hard work it was, but that he never heard Weiss complain about the work or conditions.

When Weiss retired from the District he was service man for all of the equipment. Eventually the District acquired three draglines and a bulldozer to take care of the 40,000 acres and two lakes, Lake Diversion ad Lake Kemp.

Banks said Weiss could tear down equipment to skeleton dimensions and put everything back faster than anyone he every saw.

The Weiss home is just across the street from the Irrigation District barn. He goes over and visits with the employees and entertains them with stories of earlier years.

Bill Dickerson, another retired employee, who was a dragline operator, said every once in a while he

thinks about some of the stories Albert could tell.

He remembers one in particular when Weiss was laughing and telling about he and his brother making "white lightnin'. He drank some of the whiskey and ate a banana and it made him so sick that he still will not eat bananas. "He could tell that story and really make you laugh," Bill said.

Dickerson told about one time when a dragline operator was on vacation and Weiss was to run it. He was to fill a truck with five yards of dirt, which took three buckets. The first bucket he dumped went on the cab of the truck and the second missed it, but on the third Weiss managed to dump the dirt in the bed of the truck. "He was really proud of himself," Bill said.

He remembered how Weiss would always have a fire built in the winter and by the time the other employees got there the barn was warm. He commended Weiss for being such a good worker and very dependable.

Albert can still cook. He used to make breads, cakes, pies, or anthing else he wanted to. "I don't do much of anything like that anymore. Esther does most of the cooking. "But I still could," he said.

He says he can also do the housework. "I remember how my mother used to get on her knees to mop the floors."

Weiss still drives his car and takes them anywhere they want to go. He has been called "Mr. Independent" by some of those who know him best.

They are members of the Friendly Door Senior Citizens Center and eat there almost every day. They love to play dominoes and "42". Their children remember they used to like to play as a family.

They have two children, Lee Roy, who married an Iowa Park girl, Helen Birkman. They live in Lakewood, Colo., and he is office manager for Ford Motor Co.

Their daughter, Mrs. Keith (Peggy Joyce) Ingram is a science teacher in Clovis, N.M.. She was scheduled to go on the Challenger if something had

Albert and Esther also have one grandson and two granddaughters and one great-grandson and two greatgranddaughters.


Peggy pays tribute to their parents, as being the kind that always did without things for themsleves so she and her brother could have what they needed.



They moved to Iowa Park, in April, from Hope, Ark.



Stir in rice; reduce heat. Cover tightly and simmer 5 minutes. Stir in beans and chopped tomatoes. Remove from heat. Let stand covered about 5 minutes until all liquid is absorbed. Sprinkle with cheese. Makes 4 servings.





That comment comes to mind as the Wichita Falls city council has launched a series of public meetings to determine what improvements citizens of that city want.

After the series is held, the council has said the suggestions will be considered, put in priority, and done. . . along with some of the improvement projects council members and staff already have in mind.

Why was I impressed with his clothing? It was 108 degrees, rather hot for all he was wearing!

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

It is simple because tub culture (small water gardens) don't require recycling pumps and elaborate designs. This is a closed system.


All the equipment a person really needs to begin the aquatic plant growing adventure is a large container which holds water.

washed or lined with a flexible liner. Do not use redwood which is toxic under water. Use a chlorine neutralizer to eliminate chlorine and chloramine from city water. Follow label directions on these types of products which are available at most garden centers or pond supply outlets.

It is economical because one water lily can produce more than 100 blooms per season. An estimated cost for a simple set up (\$15 container, \$25-\$30 water lily plant, \$5-\$8 oxygenated plants and \$8-\$10 aesthetically pleasing companion plant) is less than \$70.

It doesn't take a mathematician to conclude the cost per flower is very cost effective -- 70 cents per bloom.
