## City okays annexing 21-acre housing tract

The city council Monday night approved the annexation of slightly more than 21 acres of land for a new housing addition.

The tract, to be known as Highland Park Addition, is located northwest of US 287 and FM 368.

Action on the annexation followed the third required public hearing. Approval of the annexation was

not unanimous among aldermen, however, as Bob Hamilton cast the lone dissenting vote.

As he had in earlier discussions on the proposed annexation, Hamilton expressed concern about the city's investment in extending utilities to the area.

He said the city has only estimates on the cost of extending water to the southwest corner of the tract, and installing a sewer line which includes a large lift station.

The city had already advertised for bids on the work, but the project is estimated to cost \$85,000, which is \$5,000 for the water line and \$80,000 to cross the expressway and install the lift station.

Hamilton also has said that the council should have learned its lesson of not "looping" a water line, because of pressure problems in the Shiloh Addition. That project, estimated cost

of \$15,000, was not included.

The 21.118-acre tract is the southern portion of the overall planned addition. Richard Porter, owner and developer, has agreed to have the other 23 acres annexed after the first of 1995.

The council approved a proposal offered by Administrator Mike Price to transfer some \$50,000 from the city's self-insured worker's compensation fund to the benefit trust fund which is the city's health insurance pool for employees.

Price explained the benefit trust fund was down to \$24,500, and the additional monies were needed for the balance of the city's fiscal year.

When asked if employees were continuing to utilize the more expensive health care route of going to the emergency rooms of hospitals when no emergency existed, Price said person-

## Police given 'breather' for week

Iowa Park police say they needed a lighter-load week, so they will have the time to clear up all the cases they had the previous week.

According to the police blotter, they had only one-tenth as many arrests during the past week as they did the previous week, when they posted 20 arrests.

Police responded to a domestic disturbance at 12:53 a.m. Wednesday in the 300 block of East Lafayette, and the result was one arrest.

Chris William Cournoyer, 27, was taken into custody on a charge of assault to prevent family violence. He was released at 5:05, after signing a

personal recognizance bond, according to the blotter entry.

John Paul Houston, 19, went to the

police station Tuesday afternoon to admit he had forgotten he was supposed to have appeared in municipal

court earlier in the day.

Houston was taken into custody once again, on five outstanding local warrants. They included public intoxication, improper drivers license of vehicle, failure to show proof of insurance, no Texas registration on vehicle, and no motor vehicle inspection sticker.

## Wichita Falls police arrest local couple

Wichita Falls police arrested an Iowa Park couple Tuesday in connection with a wide-spread series of forgery cases.

Charged with organized criminal

activity are Randy Lee and Kristi Kaye Gregory, both 28, who reside at 305 W. Pecan.

Two other Wichita Falls residents, Howard Roby South, 30, and Carol Alice Tsiboukas, 27, were charged with the same offense.

They, and possibly others, reportedly have been making purchases at chain discount stores in the area with forged checks, and then "returning" them at other stores in exchange for cash.

Iowa Park police filed charges several months ago against individuals reportedly involved in the activity, but no action has yet been taken by a grand jury.

Investigator Lynn Collins began piecing together the actions of the suspects and later filed the charges.

## May good for business, sales tax report indicates

After suffering an apparent setback in business in April, things changed considerably in May, according to this month's sales tax report from the state comptroller's office in Austin.

The City of Iowa Park received a sales tax rebate check for \$18,567.91, indicating a 27.99-percent gain in business over May of 1993.

June's rebate check showed a 1.77-percent decrease when compared with the same month in 1993.

For the year, Iowa Park has thus far received \$129,817.08 in rebated sales tax, reflecting one percent of all sales on which the tax is applied.

That is a 5.03-percent increase over the \$123,588.92 reported this same month last year. Last month's total gave Iowa Park only a 1.98 percent gain for the year.

Only Electra, with a 7.82 percent increase, has a larger increase for the year among Wichita County cities. Wichita Falls is up 6.32 percent, and Burkburnett a plus 3.37 percent.

Thus far in 1994, Holliday is a minus 13.75 percent for the year, according to the report.

July's rebate checks include taxes collected on May sales and reported to the comptroller in June by businesses filing monthly tax returns.

## Cash Street 'pocket park' improves vacant lot look

Grass at the new "pocket park" on West Cash Street received its first mowing this week.

A project of Iowa Park's beautification committee, Clean and Green, the lot had been vacant since the building occupied by Jim's Meat Market was destroyed by fire 10 years ago. The park is a result of the work of many people who donated their time, equipment, trees, flowers, and landscape rocks.

In addition to workers from Clean and Green, members of Amity Study Club and Roy Adam's Royal Ambassador group at Faith Baptist Church helped with preparation of the soil and planting of the trees, flowers and grass.

Monty Britt and Billy Gilmore donated their time and equipment to help prepare the site for planting, and Jimmy Green donated a load of dirt. Trees were donated by 23 Study Club and Epsilon Eta Sorority, the flowers were furnished by the high school horticulture class, and Rusty Spruiell donated a pickup load of landscape rocks. Wood chips for the pathway were supplied by the City of Iowa Park. The MuleSkinners are helping with the project by allowing the group to use their water.

Other plans for the park include the addition of benches, painting the trash container, shrubs, and the addition of a hybrid iris garden.

Ozbun's parents are Leland and Linda Ozbun of Lynn, Ind., and Westberg is a son of Ronald and Mary Westberg of Martinsburg, W. Va.

Lloyd Davidson, Church of Christ minister of Lawton, Okla., former youth minister of Loop 11 Church of Christ in Wichita Falls, directed the pledge of marriage vows for Julie and Ozbun, and Ronald Westberg, father of Kevin, minister of the Church of God of Prophecy in Martinsburg, directed the recitation of vows for his son and bride-to-be.

Centering the altar was a 15-branch fan candelabrum with heart shaped candelabra in flanking positions. Greenery and purple bows decorated the grouping. Completing the altar decorations were the double unity candle and white pedestals on either side of the central arrangement, where large baskets of magnolia blossoms rested.

The unity candle was set with two large purple candles in the center, flanked by four purple tapers, and decorated with purple pansies, greenery, purple ribbons and two flying doves. The candle was positioned on a tall white pedestal.

As Lacy Beggs and Angela Wheeler, nieces of the brides, lit the candles, David Carender and Lori Wheeler, brother and sister of the brides, sang, "Only God Could Love You More." As the mothers of both grooms and mother of both brides were ushered in, they sang, "To Me".

After the brides' father gave his daughters in marriage, Lori Wheeler sang, "And the Father Said I Do."

Kevin Westberg, groom of Jana, sang "Love Moves In Mysterious Ways" to his bride after she completed her vows. Kellie Dewlen sang "The Lord's Prayer" during the lighting of the unity candle.

Julie chose an elegant gown of white satin with Schifflli lace appliques trimmed with sequins and seed pearls. It was fashioned with fitted bodice that gently scooped into a basque waistline. The neckline was shaped with dropped shoulders and short puffed sleeves of white satin, accented with satin bows from under which a heavily embellished peplum fell. Back of the bodice was of sweetheart cut and also was trimmed with many appliques of Schifflli lace accented by sequins and pearls.

A large satin bow marked the center back waistline and held the train which extended to cathedral length and was scattered with more appliques of lace and was accented on each side by satin bows fashioned with iridescent sequins. The hem of the train and full skirt was bordered with scalloped lace sprinkled with sequins and pearls.

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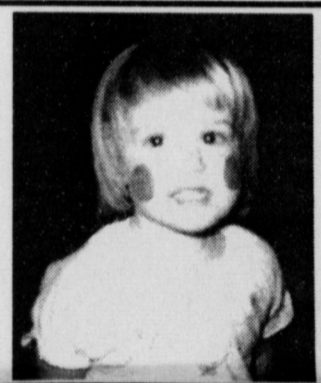

Professional baseball players, who as a whole average well over a million dollars a year in salaries, not including endorsements, figure to go out on strike sometime in the next 30 days.

As the employees of United Airlines were voting this week to purchase the company, one group of union

members, the mechanics that keep the crafts flying, was threatening to strike.

Union people at Caterpillar have been on strike for several months.

I understood, back in the old John L. Lewis days, why unions were needed and how they led to the improvement of member salaries.

But such is not the case these days. I doubt very seriously any union employee cannot live on the pay they earn. In the Lewis days, the plain fact was that they couldn't.

It seems that unions today complain that the employers are making too much money, and they should share it with the employees.

Take the ball players, for instance. They are quick to point out the millions and millions their owners take in each year. They never mention how much those same owners have invested, what the costs are to own and operate a team, and what their return on investment is.

In general, I don't think anybody who considers striking against an employer has ever paid a salary out of their own pocket. And I'm pretty sure they haven't paid all the taxes involved with ownership.

I worked almost as many years for others as I've worked for myself. And not once did I ever demand, much less ask for, more money.

I'll admit I moved several times, during the years following our marriage and just getting started working as a reporter.

Never once did I ever consider telling one of my bosses, "If you don't pay me what I want, I'll close your business down until you do."

Mayor House lauded the trio, as well as Chief Ray Smock, for having

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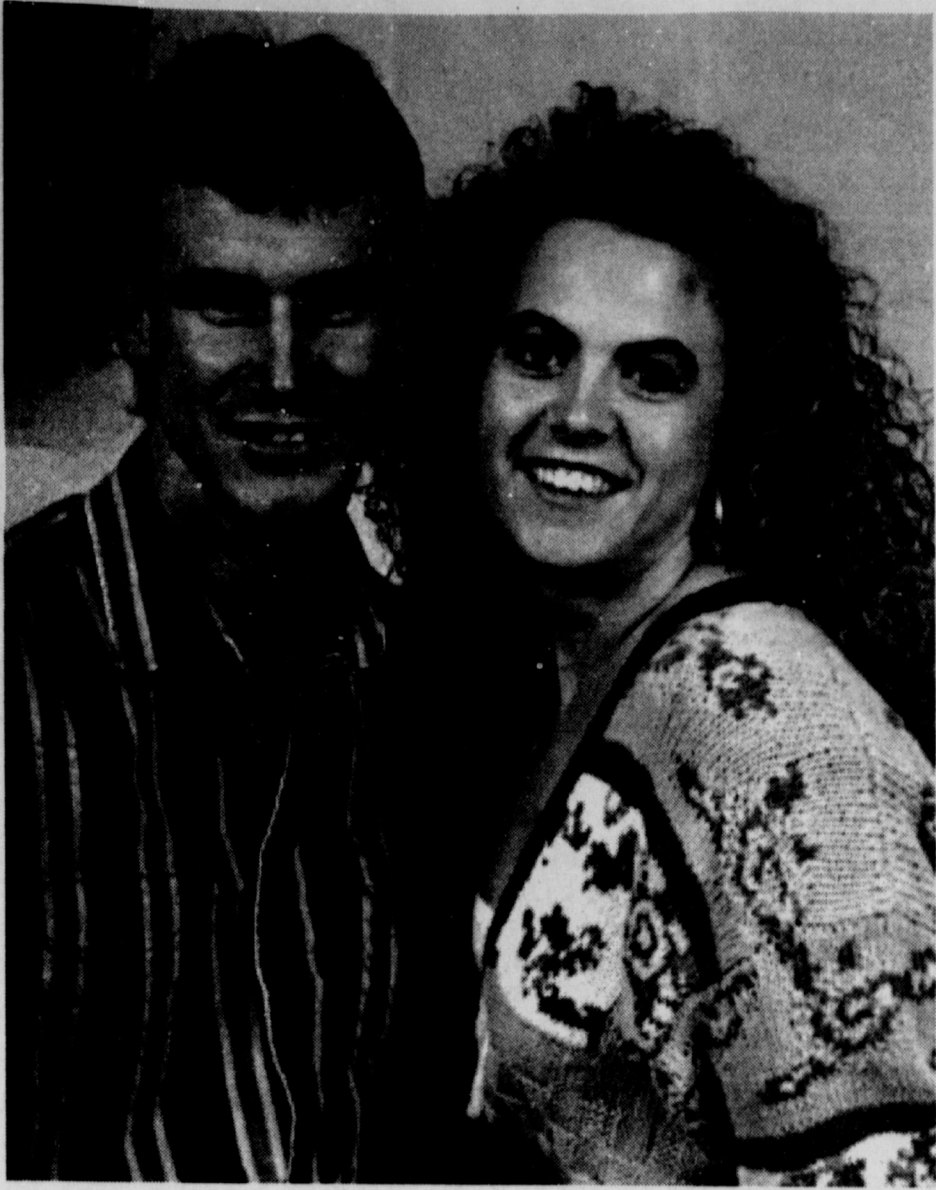

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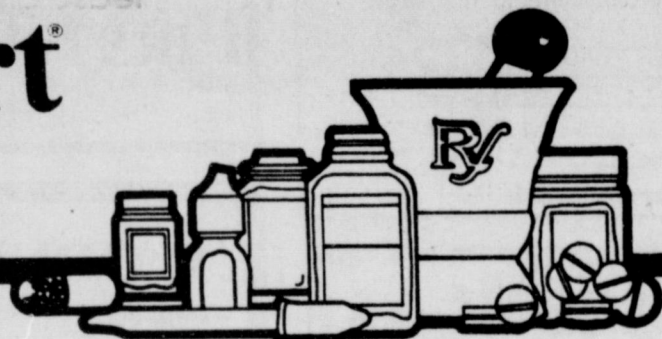

### Migraine — Not Just Another Headache

Migraine is a debilitating disease that affects an estimated one in eleven Americans.

People ages 30-45 are most likely to suffer from migraine. It tends to affect about three times more women than men.

Migraine is different from other types of headache. Severe pain occurs on just one side of the head and is accompanied by nausea and vomiting as well as extreme sensitivity to bright light and noise.

Migraine attacks last from 4 to 72 hours. Typically migraine sufferers experience an average of one attack per month.

There are two types of migraine: migraine with aura and migraine without aura.

Between 10-20% of migraine sufferers experience auras before pain begins. An aura may last 15-45 minutes. The person may see colors, flashes of light or bright spots, and may experience other symptoms: loss of vision, numbness or tingling, weakness in limbs, mental confusion and occasional hallucinations.

The exact cause of migraine is not understood. There may be a number of "triggers", including: emotional stress, certain foods and drinks (such as cheese, red wine, and chocolate), the menstrual cycle and changes in sleep or eating patterns.

Genetics may play a role, too — people with a family history of migraine are at greater risk.

If you suffer from migraine, or think that your headaches are migraine, it is important to see your doctor.

The first step in treatment is to determine the migraine trigger and try to avoid it.

If it is not possible to avoid the trigger, there are prescription medicines available that will help reduce the likelihood of an attack and others to help reduce the pain.

# COOK OF THE WEEK

## Peach Cobbler

5 cups fresh peach slices  
1 Tbsp. lemon juice  
1 cup brown sugar  
2 Tbsps. butter

Place peach slices in buttered 2-quart baking dish. Sprinkle with lemon juice and sugar. Dot with butter. Place in 400 degree oven while fixing biscuit topping.

### Biscuit topping:

2 cups flour  
3 tsps. baking powder  
1/2 tsp. salt  
1/4 cup sugar  
1 tsp. nutmeg  
1/2 tsp. cinnamon  
6 Tbsps. butter  
1 egg, beaten  
2/3 cup milk (about)  
1/2 cup chopped pecans (optional)

Sift dry ingredients. Cut in butter until mixture looks like cornmeal. Add milk to egg to make 1 cup; stir into flour mixture and mix only until moistened. Stir in nuts. Remove peaches from oven and drop dough by spoonfuls onto hot peaches. Return to oven and bake about 25 minutes. Makes 8 servings.

## Cake Cookies

1/2 cup butter or margarine (from tub)  
2 eggs  
1 cake mix (no pudding in the mix)

Cream together butter and eggs with electric mixer. Add cake mix and stir together until moist. On an ungreased cookie sheet, drop cookies by spoonfuls. Bake 8-10 minutes at 350 degrees. While cookies are still warm, place half a marachino cherry in the center. Cool on wire racks.

## Foolproof Icebox Rolls

Soften 2 packages dry yeast in lukewarm water. Scald 1 cup of milk. Add to hot milk:  
5 Tbsps. sugar  
8 Tbsps. shortening  
1 cup cold water

Cool to lukewarm and add yeast and 1 Tbsp. salt. Stir in flour to consistency of soft biscuit dough, using as little flour as possible. Knead lightly until it can be rolled. Cut into desired shape or size. Brush rolls with plenty of melted butter. Let rise in a warm place for about 45 minutes. Bake in preheated 400 degree oven about 15 minutes.

Mixture can be kept in refrigerator for several days and used as needed.

## Mexican Cornbread

1 cup corn meal  
2/3 cup buttermilk  
1/2 tsp. salt  
1/2 tsp. soda  
1/3 cup shortening  
1 small green pepper  
2 eggs  
1 cup grated Velveeta cheese  
1 can cream style corn

Pour 1/2 mix in hot skillet. Sprinkle green pepper and grated cheese over mix in skillet. Add rest of mix and bake 30-40 minutes at 375 degrees.

## Tamale Pie

1 lb. ground beef  
1 chopped onion  
1 can tomato soup  
2 cups water  
1/4 tsp. pepper  
1 tsp. salt  
2 Tbsps. chili powder  
1 can whole kernel corn

Brown meat and onion in skillet. Add soup, water, seasoning and corn. Simmer 15 minutes and pour into greased baking dish.

### Topping:

3/4 cup corn meal  
1 Tbsp. flour  
1 Tbsp. sugar  
1 beaten egg  
1/3 cup milk  
1 Tbsp. oil  
1 1/2 tsp. baking powder

Sift dry ingredients together. Add egg and milk. Stir lightly and fold in oil. Pour over meat mixture. Bake at 425 degrees 20 to 25 minutes or until cornbread is brown.

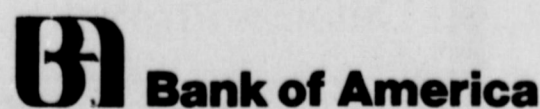

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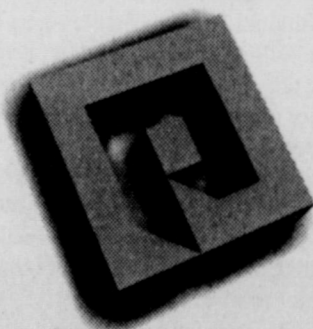
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
