Barney loves his fishing

Barney Barnett, a full-blood Creek Indian, is a sentient and multitalented man, who some say " is convinced God created the earth so he could fish."

And his workshop is a "fisherman's paradise" when it comes

Barney fishes every chance he has, whether it is at one of the lakes around Iowa Park--Lake Iowa Park, Gordon Lake or Lake Buffalo--or farther away like Lake Arrowhead, Lake Diversion or Kemp where he can use one of his two boats, or in individually owned stocked ponds that he has been given the privilege of using.

"I don't know how I ever got to fish while I was working. It seems since I retired I don't find enough time," Barnett said.

But, the unusual thing about Barney and his fishing is that he seldom keeps his catch. When he was young, his father, Sam Barnett, taught him a lot about nature, as well as sportsmanship.

"My dad told me, 'son if you don't need them for food, don't go out and hurt and kill the animals for the sport", Barney said.

Even though Barney was sent away to an all Indian school when he was only six years old, he said, "My dad and I were always very close.

"He could commune with the animals. He used to sit on the porch and chickens and squirrels would come and sit on his lap. All kinds of wild animals would come around and he would feed them. He would talk to them and tell them 'I don't bother you and you aren't to bother me.' And I don't remember anything ever being bothered by wild animals.

'We've always believed everything was put on earth for a purpose and have tried to respect that".

Barney added, "He always told me to treat people every day the way I wanted to be treated, and I've tried to do that."

Barney was born 66 years ago in Eufaula, Okla. His mother, Nellie, who was of the Creek Bird Clan, died when he was 18 months old. Until he was six, he was switched around from his dad, to first one relative and then

At age six he was sent to an all Indian School at Sapulpa, with the understanding that the child would speak only English and if he were caught speaking his tribal language he would be punished.

One time Barney was caught using his native language, but that was to help a small boy who had been sent to the school and had not learned

English. The child was lonesome and homesick.

It did not matter that Barney was trying to help the child in the only way he knew how to communicate with him. The weather was still hot, but Barney's punishment was to walk around the campus four hours.

He later attended Sequoyah Indian School at Tahlequah. He decided to quit school, but there was a

Barney explained. His father had married again (he outlived three wives) and moved into her home. Barney was left to feed the horses, cattle and hogs, do his own cooking and wash and iron his one shirt every night so he could wear it to school the next day.

Does he cook now? "Not if I can help it," Jaquita, his wife of 25 years answered, "he messes up the kitchen too much".

His uncle offered to have him come to their home near Holdenville and attend high school. Since Barney had inherited the Creeks' love of ball playing he decided to take him up on the offer. He played football through high school, served as team captain and earned four athletic scholarships. Instead of going on to college when he graduated high school he enlisted for four years in the Marine Corps.

Barney saw service during the Korean Conflict, and shortly before his time was up, he was injured. He was helping set up a machine gun nest on the side of a rocky hill. His foot slipped on a rock and Barney, machine gun and all rolled down the hillside.

He was sent to a hosptial in Japan, and when he was able he was sent back to his outfit in Korea, where he wanted to be discharged because his time would be up in three months. But, Barney carries the severe leg injury with him today, but has not agreed to surgery.

Although both his mother and father had received land in Oklahoma, Barney decided farming was not for him. He wanted to be a Forest Ranger, but the only place at that time he could receive the training was in Washington and he didn't want to go that far

in Okmulgee and began working in print shops. He had experience in both letterpress and offset printing. He worked twice for Humphrey Printing Co., in Wichita Falls. He also was a photographer and did lay-outs.

Later Barney worked at Sheppard Air Force Base. He worked for the Red Cross as an EMT and then for Gold Cross Ambulance Service. He set up Vernon's Ambulance Service and hired personnel.

Gold Cross asked him to come back to work for them. When he had a chance, he went back to Red Cross because of the long hours at Gold Cross. After going back to Red Cross he reinjured his left leg and the VA did not want him to do that type of work. He went back to work at Sheppard AFB where he retired April 1, 1989.

Probably one of the most potentially dangerous activities Barnett has been engaged in is the 18 years he spent as a rattlesnake hunter and handler, but it was one that he enjoyed.

He went to a Rattlesnake Roundup in Okeene, Okla., and became interested in hunting the snakes. "People are so afraid of rattlesnakes that I decided to do some research on them," Barney said. He took multitudious notes on them and became an expert on safety in handling the rattlesnake.

During the years he presented safety programs to Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts organizations, to the EMT classes at Midwestern University and for many other groups, he met many professors who were doing research on rattlesnakes. He donated several snakes to the University of Oklahoma for research purposes.

Barney said, "I gave lectures and demonstrations, I didn't put on a circus act, but tried to provide information for those to whom I spoke that would be beneficial to them. I also passed along information that I received from those doing research at the universities."

He served as judge for the Okeene Rattlesnake Roundup which is the world's largest. For a number of years he set up the Rattlesnake Roundups for Crowell, Haskell, Archer City, Gainesville, Munster and Petrolia.

Barnett became widely known among snake handlers, hunters and university researchers both in this country and abroad. He always impressed on his listeners not to be afraid of snakes, but to learn to respect them.

Barney was on national television for National Geographic Magazine demonstrating going to the den and pulling the snake out, to the handling of the snake.

He was asked to go to Australia for 18 months to collect rattlesnakes to be used in research. But he declined because it was not very long after his marriage to Jaquita and he did not want to leave her in a strange town by herself--Wichita Falls.

Barney still gets calls sometimes in the night to identify snakes, to remove them from some place, or by Animal Control for different reasons they think he can help with.

During the 18 years Barney handled snakes he received six bites. Only the last one gave him a scare.

"The reason it happened was because I broke one of my cardinal rules, 'never handle a snake by the tail and never turn your head away from the snake', that's just what I did when someone called my name, I turned my head and was struck on my thumb," Barney related. That call was too close for comfort, so he decided to hang up his "snake grabbers".

Through the years, Barnett's love of football remained with him. He served as coach nine years for the Top of Texas League for the Wichita Falls Boys Club. Six years with the Peewee and then with the Midgets. His teams were undefeated three and a half years. He is an alumni of Central Boys Club of Wichita Falls and made the semi-pro football league.

"When you're coaching 40 boys,

trying to teach them, you'd better be in shape yourself," Barney said, but he loves the game.

Barnett's ancestors came to Oklahoma on the infamous Trail of Tears. He isn't sure if they came from Georgia or Alabama.

His maternal great-great-grandfather, General Pleasant Porter, was Principal Chief of the Creek Nation. His services were invaluable to his race and he has been rated as the one man more than any other who shaped the destiny of his people. He was an educator and statesman of the Creek

Barney now displays Porter's old rifle in his home. Quite by accident, Barney's wife's father, who has booths in the Antique Mall in Muskogee, came across the old rifle and gave it to

Barney's uncle, Ben Porter, served on the Inter-tribal Council when the tribal government was organized and other tribal officials came to observe and get ideas for setting up their own

Barney's father, Sam, served as a council representative, and now his brother, Dan of Eufaula serves as a representative.

Barney votes in all of the elections, and his children and grandchildren are all certified.

Both of his brothers, Dan and Sam Jr., are Baptist preachers for Indian churches. Barney's family donated the land for the church in Eufaula.

The building is surrounded by furnished cabins and Barney remembers they used to go to their cabins Friday and spend the weekend. There were services Friday and Saturday nights and then on Sunday.

Jaquita recalls the first time she went there on the weekend and how unusual it was to her. The services are in the language of the Creek as is their singing. She remembers asking Barney what one of the songs was and his reply was, "The Old Rugged Cross", couldn't you tell?

Barney met Jaquita, who lived in Muskogee, the same town where his sister lived. They were introduced by

In about two and a half months er their introduction they were married. That was Oct. 22, 1968.

She had graduated high school at age 17 in 1960 and received a scholarship to nursing school at Baptist Memorial Hospital School of Nursing in Oklahoma City. Upon graduation she began working in pediatrics, then she worked in Intensive Care and Coronary Care at Muskogee General Hospital

five years. From there she went to Tulsa where she set up the coronary unit for a hospital there. After she and Barney married they moved to Wichita Falls and she went to work at Wichita General Hospital. Until 1975 Jaquita worked in recovery, then two years in coronary care.

She was house supervisor, then surgery supervisor, surgery critical care, and post partum nursery. In 1991 she became acting vice president of nurses, and vice president in March 1992. Her work now is administrative and she is over more than 500 employees.

She is on the board of directors of Texas Organization of Nurse Executives, THA (TONE). In her position she attends various seminars and is always accompanied by Barney, who is always accompanied by some of his fishing gear.

Mrs. Barnett is a collector of a number of things. Antiques are predominate. It makes it easy to collect a lot of nice pieces since her father sells antiques.

She loves to collect baskets and antique pitchers. Barney reminded her, "What about all of those sets of dishes you have collected?"

"Oh yes, and I also have a large collection of cookbooks," she replied.

Jaquita also loves to collect items for decorating at different seasons of the year. "Halloween is my favorite time to decorate," she admitted.

And when she retires she won't have any trouble keeping busy. She loves to do crafts, needlepoint and paint with oils. And they both enjoy reading as a pastime.

Other talents Barney has are visible around the house. He does woodcrafts, some of them may be seen in their yard in summer and at Christmas time their yard is filled with his handiwork and decorating ideas with lights.

He does charcoal drawings, primarily of Indian warriors, or portraits of chiefs or elderly Indian women. She decoupages them after he completes them by adding Indian signs, rattlers, or arrow heads. He goes to Oklahoma to pick up flintstone to make the arrowheads.

One year Jaquita decided to enter one of her paintings in the art show at the fair and asked him if she could enter one of his charcoals. He told her

definitely no. "He doesn't tell me no about many things. But, I kept thinking about it and I decided I was going to enter it anyway," she said.

One afternoon he told her, "Let's go see what they have in the art show." She feigned an excuse, maybe like "I'm too tired."

But the next day they went, and Barney may have been surprised to see his charcoal had won first place. Then again, Barney may have wanted

to see if she really entered one of them.

"I was a little disgusted, I didn't win a thing on my painting, but he took first place on something he didn't even want entered," Jaquita joked.

In April they completed major remodeling to their home they purchased 22 years ago when they moved to Iowa Park from Wichita Falls.

"We began at the carport and continued to the back of the house with the patio," she said, adding that Barney supervised every bit of it, even to the nails, she thinks.

They added a very large living area on the back of the house which affords a bedroom area and living area with a large entertainment center on one wall. Also there is a large bathroom with a skylight above the tub and a tv secured on the wall, so one can relax in the bath and not miss their favorite show. It has a separate glass enclosed shower and a huge walk-in closet.

There is a large patio area off the room at the back and a rock waterfall that Barney made using an old baptistry. On the steps leading into the baptistry he has potted plants.

Oh, that is another of his talents, he loves to garden, both vegetables and flowers. "He always has something else he has planted," Jaquita said.

She commented,"Well we accomplished four of our goals we wanted to complete by our 25th anniversary."

"We went to Branson, Mo.; our kids made sure that we had our portrait made together which we had never done; we were in the remodeling phase from January until April, and we were married in a rose garden and always said we were going to have a rose garden of our own. Barney did that this year," Jaquita said.

She and Barney have one son, Cody, who is attending Midwestern State University seeking a degree in radiology.

Barney has a daughter, Sandra Casey of Wichita Falls, and two sons, Jay Todd, a drafting engineer for CertainTeed, and Charles Barney, Jr., who is retired from the Air Force and lives in Okeemah, Okla. He also has three grandaughters and two grand-

Grand opening of the Wichita Falls Branch of State National Bank will be held Saturday, according to Gene Jordan, SNB president.



Rev. Keith Schweitzer, pastor of Trinity Lutheran Church, officated and burial was in Riverview Cemetery.


Mr. Dormier, brother of Johnny Dormier of Iowa Park, died Saturday

This was an unusual year for us, because of where it was held and some of the new officers elected to lead the organization.



Preheat grill. Place chicken on grill and baste with marinade, Grill 5 minutes on one side. Turn over and grill 5 - 9 minutes. Juice should run clear and chicken will be lightly brown.

Sourdough

- 2 pkgs. yeast
- 1 cup warm water 2/3 cup oil
- 2 cups buttermilk
- 5 cups self-rising flour
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. baking soda 2 1/2 Tbsps. sugar

Mix ingredients and shape as desired. Bake 20-25 minutes in 375 degree oven. Will keep 6 weeks in re-

Buttermilk Pie

1/2 cup butter 2 cups sugar

- 3 eggs
- 3 Tbsps. flour
- 1 cup buttermilk Dash of nutmeg

1 - 9-inch unbaked pie shell

Cream together butter and sugar. Mix in eggs and flour and beat until fluffy. Fold in buttermilk and nutmeg. Pour mixture into pie shell and bake 45-50 minutes at 350 degrees.

Bread Pudding

2 1/4 cup milk 2 eggs, slightly beaten 8 cups bread crust (or buns) 1/2 cup brown sugar

1/2 tsp. cinnamon

1 tsp. vanilla

1/4 tsp. salt

1/2 cup sugar Raisins, if desired

Mix all ingredients except bread crumbs (put in last) gently. Pour into greased baking pan and bake 45 min-

utes to 1 hour at 350 degrees. Cool and make Butter Sauce.

Butter Sauce

1/2 cup butter

3/4 cup sugar 3 Tbsps. flour

1 tsp. vanilla 1 cup boiling water

Put first four ingredients in a saucepan and add 1 cup boiling water. Cook until thick. Cut bread pudding and pour butter sauce over.

NOTE: It is best to use crust or buns (any kind). When pinching off into your 8 cups, don't compress down.

Texas Fudge Brownies

1/2 cup butter

- 1 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 16 oz. can Hershey's Syrup 4 eggs
- 1 cup flour
- 1 cup pecans

Blend butter, sugar and syrup. Add eggs one at a time. Mix well after each egg. Stir in flour and pecans. Bake in greased 9x13 pan at 350 grees 25 minutes or until done.

Frosting

- 1 cup butter
- 1 1/2 cup sugar 1/3 cup canned milk
- 1/2 cup chocolate chips

Melt butter in saucepan; add sugar and milk. Bring to a boil stirring constantly. Boil 2 minutes. Remove from heat; stir in chocolate chips until melted. Frost brownies.

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



Sixty of the 110 seniors who graduated Iowa Park High School in 1984 gathered on June 24 and 25, for their 10-year reunion.





Thompson's response was that one of the highest visibility spots in town (US 287 and Pacific) had head-high weeds, broken windows and was a general eyesore. "But until there's a complaint, it won't be worked on?" he asked.

Roy later said it might be possible for him to build a smaller fenced area on his lot, if he decided to go back into the recycling business, which he closed after some two years of operation.

OTHER BUSINESS

Mayor House had to break a tie vote when the zoning of Park Place Addition was decided by ordinance.

Both the developer, Richard Porter, and the planning and zoning board had recommended that the newest annexation to the city be zoned "R-2," which allows homes to be built with a minimum of 1,000 square feet as well as mobile homes and multi-family structures.

The addition is located on the northwest corner of US 287 and FM 368.

A tie developed when aldermen Virgil Woodfin and Bud Mercer voted approval, Bob Hamilton and Mark Raby against it, and Crawford abstained.

The mayor cast his vote in favor of the zoning as proposed.

Another issue of the evening, which passed but did not receive unanimous approval, was a format of contracting out the maintenance of the city's water and sewer system.

At issue was the city dissolving its four-man department that maintains the lines from the two treatment plants and the customer property, and turn







GARDENING HINTS

By MARK TERNING, COUNTY AGENT - HORTICULTURE

Late July and through August are tough, hot times for Texoma landscapes and gardens.

Follow this special garden check list to help keep your lawns, landscapes and gardens in top condition. Pest Control:

* Flea control requires a three prong approach. You must treat your yard areas, pets and the home for adequate control. Yard areas should be treated with yardex, Dursban, or Diazinon. Treat inside your home with a product that contains an insect growth regulator such as Precor. Vacuum thoroughly before treatment and discard the bag. Dogs and/or cats should be treated with dips or spray-on products containing an insect growth regulator such as Petcor. Make sure the product you are using is labeled for use on your animal. Pets with serious flea problems should be referred to a veterinarian. Heavy populations of fleas in the yard or home may require treatment by a pest control operator.

* Late July through early August are ideal times for grub worm control in lawn areas. If you find more than four grubs per square foot then treatment is justified. Apply Dursban or Diazinon granules for control. Water lawn before and after treatment.

* Treat for pecan weevil and hickory shuckworm in mid to late August. Sevin is an appropriate insecticide.

* Spider mites in tomato crops can be treated with Kelthane.

* Treat peaches and plums for borer control in late August. Use a chlorpyrifos spray.

Disease and Weed Control:

* Watch out for powdery mildew on crapemyrtle. Regular applications of Funginex will be necessary to reduce this disease.

* Treat grassy weeds in bermuds turf with MSMA. Do not use on St. Augustine. Broadleaf weeds can be controlled with a broadleaf weed killer such as Wipe-Out or Weed-B-Gone.

* Peas, beans, and tomato plants which are failing to set fruit may be a result of excessively high temperatures. Plant heat-set tomatoes for a fall harvest.

* Leaf drop and leaf scorch on trees is not a disease, but the result of high temperatures and moisture stress. Water deeply every two to three weeks.

* Container nursery stock can be planted at any time of year.

* Plant 'Surefire' fall tomatoes now

for a fall crop. * Plant warm-season grasses from seed, sod, plugs, or hydromulching by

early August. * Plant bluebonnet seed or transplants during later August.

* Check for special plant bargains at local nurseries and garden centers. Fertilizer:

* Apply a 3-1-2 or 4-1-2 ratio turf food with slow-release nitrogen to warm season lawns.

* Correct iron deficiency (yellow leaves with bright green veins) in plants




