## Barney loves his fishing

By MYRNA SMITH Barney Barnett, a full-blood Creek Indian, is a sentient and multitalented man, who some say " is convinced God created the earth so he could fish."
And his workshop is a
"fisherman's to fishing gear.

Barney fishes every chance he has, whether it is at one of the lakes around Iowa Park--Lake Iowa Park Gordon Lake or Lake Buffalo--or far ther away like Lake Arrowhead, Lake Diversion or Kemp where he can use one of his two boats, or in individually owned stocked ponds that he has been given the privilege of using. fish while I know how I ever got to fish while I was working. It seems
since I retired I don't find enough since I retired I
time," Barnett said.

But, the unusual thing about Barney and his fishing is that he young his father Sam Bernet taught him a lot about nature, as well as sportsmanship.
"My dad told me, son if you don't need them for food, don't go out and hurt and kill the animals for the sport", Barney said.

Even though Barney was sent away to an all Indian school when he was only six years old, he said, "My dad and I were always very close. animals. could commune with the animals. He used to sit on the porch and sit on his lap. All kinds of wild animals would come around and he would feed them. He would talk to them and tell them 'I don't bother you and you aren't to bother me.' And I don't remember anything ever being bothered by wild animals.
. and have tried on earth for a purpose and have tried to respect that".

Barney added, "He always told me to treat people every day the way I wanted to be treated, and I've tried to do that."

Barney was born 66 years ago in wha was ofla. His mother, Nellie, when he was 18 months old. Until he was six, he was switched around from his dad, to first one relative and then another.
At age six he was sent to an all Indian School at Sapulpa, with the understanding that the child would speak only English and if he were caught speaking his tribal language he ould be punished.
One time Barney was caught was to help a small boy whe, but that sent to the school and had not learned

It did not matter that Barney was trying to help the child in the only way he knew how to communicate with him. The weather was still hot, but Barney's punishment was to walk around the campus four hours.

He later attended Sequoyah Indian School at Tahlequah. He decided to quit school, but there was a cason.

Barney explained. His father had married again (he outived three wives) left to feed the horses, caule and hogs do his own cooking and wash and iron, do his own cooking and wash and iron
his one shirt every night so he could wear it to school the next day. Does he cook now? "Not if $I$ can help it," Jaquita, his wife of 25 years answered, "he messes up the kitchen much"
His uncle offered to have him come to their home near Holdenville and attend high school. Since Barney had inherited the Creeks' love of ball playing he decided to take him up on high school, served as tcam captain
earned four athletic scholarships. Instead of going on to college when he graduated high school he enlisted for four years in the Marine Orps.
Barney saw service during the Korean Conflict, and shorlly before his time was up, he was injured. He was helping set up a machine gun nest on the side of a rocky hill. His foot slippedon a rock and Barney, machine un and all rolled down the hillside. He was sent to a hosptial in apan, and when he was able he was he wanted to be discharged because he wanted to be discharged because
his time would be up in three months. his time would be up in three months.

jury with him today, but has not greed to surgery.

Although both his mother and father had received land in Oklahoma, Barney decided farming was not for him. He wanted to be a Forest Ranger, but the only place at that time he could receive the training was in Washington and he didn't want to go that far away.

Barney's father, Sam, served as a councir representaive, and now his brother, Dan
representative.

Barney votes in all of the elec tions, and his children and grandchil dren are all certified.

Bothof his brothers, Dan and San Jr., are Baptist preachers for Indian churches. Barney's family donate the land for the church in Eufaula. The building is surrounded by furnished cabins and Barney remem bers they used to go to their cabin Friday and spend he weekend. There nights and then on Sunday.

Jaquita recalls the first time she went there on the weekend and how unusual it was to her. The services are in the language of the Creek as is their
singing. Sheremembersasking what one of the songs was and his reply was, "The Old Rugged Cross couldn't you tell?

Barney met Jaquita, who lived in Muskogee, the same town where his sister lived. They were introduced by
his sister.
In about two and a half month after their introduction they wer
