

One of 'those' weeks keep IP police busy

It was another one of "those" weeks for the Iowa Park Police Dept.

Among the 15 arrests reported during the past week, one solved the burglaries of four businesses, and nine were for public intoxication.

About the same time neighbors of Food Depot were calling the police station at 10 p.m. Wednesday of last week, another telephone call was received from a person inside the store.

After reaching the store's owner to unlock the building, they found a 14year-old male who attempted to explain he had been in the restroom and was locked inside when the business was closed for the evening.

That didn't set well with police, however, because they already were investigating other business burglaries which occurred under similar circum-

After some interrogation, the youth, who was in Iowa Park visiting with his grandparents, admitted he had burglarized Granny's Corner, Southern Gardens and on four different occasions Catlin Quick Change.

Total restitution of monies (some \$600), property and damage was made, police reported, and the youth's stay here with his grandparents was ended.

When an officer stopped a vehicle at Colorado and Lafayette shortly before 2 a.m. Saturday, all four occupants were arrested on public intoxication charges.

They included Nina Kaye Watson, 29, Jerry Branton Hobbs III, 24, Jimmy Edward Crowder, 28, and Kevin Charles Capsel, 34.

When the subjects were taken to the police station for booking, officers found less than two ounces of marijuana on Hobbs, so he was also charged with possession.

Hobbs was transported to the county jail on the possession charge. The other three were released after signing personal recognizance bonds, which amounted to \$81.50 for Watson and Capsel, and \$280 for Crowder.

Shortly before midnight Saturday, police were alerted by a citizen that a man was passed out at "middle lake," which is Lake Iowa Park.

Upon investigation, the officer found an apparent party underway, and three males were arrested on public intoxication charges.

Jeremy Dewayne Stringer, 19, and Lonnie Don Tucker, 22, both paid fines of \$81.50 and entered pleas. The third man, Mark Andrew Kennedy, 24, was charged with public intoxication and also resisting arrest, which resulted in his being transported to the county jail.

A resident in the 200 block of East Crystal called police at 5:24 p.m. Sunday about two suspicious persons sitting in a car.

Upon investigation, officers arrested William H. Rankin, 45, and Tommy Lee Brock, 51, on charges of public intoxication. They were released at 2:52 a.m. after signing promises to appear in municipal court.

Shortly before 1 a.m. Monday, a patrolling officer had a license plate check run on the state-wide computer network, and the return indicated the pickup had been reported as stolen out of Garland.

Garland police were contacted both by computer network and telephone, and received confirmation that the vehicle was stolen. In addition, photos were faxed to the local department from Garland of the two female suspects in the pickup.

The two, ages 24 and 22, were taken to the police station and then before Justice of the Peace Bill Robertson, who read to them their rights.

But then, a communication was received at 10:02 a.m. from Garland that the pickup's owner had refused to press charges. The owner came here to retrieve his pickup, and police said the two women left here on their own.

A resident of the 700 block of East Alameda contacted police at 7:32 p.m. Saturday, complaining that \$125 in cash had been taken from a bedroom.

The resident offered the name of a suspect who had been in the home earlier, contact was made, and the money was returned. The suspect was then referred to juvenile probation.

Students dig for history

Thirty-six elementary, junior high and high school students experienced the lessons they had learned in regular classes extended Thursday, when they participated in a summer historical and archeological trip.

The event was originally planned by the Bradford Elementary Gifted and Talented Class, taught by Keven Robertson.

The students departed at 6 a.m. from Bradford and travelled to several historic sites near the Red River, northeast of Punkin' Center.

Their first stop was the historical marker located at Tenth Cavalry Creek. Students read and discussed the marker, which commemorates a campsite used by the Buffalo Soldiers in the mid-1800s. It also describes the battle fought with Indians just north of the marker. Casualties were buried in a common grave at the site.

Next they went to an old farm house two miles west of Tenth Cavalry Creek. The land is currently owned by Robert Palmer, assistant superintendent, who explained it was part of a land grant from the Republic of Texas,

received by an elderly Scottish settler named Bateman.

In 1875, Bateman travelled to his land and built a half dugout house, which he later expanded to full size. In 1892 the house was abandoned and his descendants built another house just

south of the original structure. At the time Bateman built his house, Wichita County consisted primarily of Mabel Gilbert at what is now Burkburnett, the Banta family on Beaver Creek, Burnett land, and the Waggoner Ranch, located three miles

west of Bateman's house. The cook shack from the Waggoner Ranch headquarters is now part of the Ranch heritage Display at Texas Tech Univ. The post office for the ranch was named Toxana and was located between the ranch and the Bateman homestead.

At this location the students used their math skills to grid survey areas directly over the cabin site. The grid was measured and coordinated with a measuring wheel and compass to be precise with a survey marker loacted about 75 yards from the site. The survey marker was coordinated with a Supreme Court Bronze Bench Marker located on the south bend of the Red River, one mile north of the site.

Three students were assigned to each grid. The students first did a surface survey. All items of historical interest were bagged and tagged by grid number for later identification. The students then began a subsurface survey by removing the soil one inch at a time. All items found during this search were also bagged and tagged.

During the fall the students will chart the items and provide a profile of the cabin site. All of the items will be on display at Bradford Elementary.

Among the items found were square nails, the door knobs to the house and various household items including dishes and pottery.

The grids outside the house area contained wagon parts and tools and various buckles and horse-related items such as shoes, nails and a rasp for shaping horse hooves.

The students moved to the Red


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
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Neta Hughes and her husband. the late Pete Hughes, moved to Iowa Park from North Carolina in 1971, when he retired from the military.


Neta was born in Mountainair. N.M., and moved to Farwell, Tex. when she was young. She and Pete, who grew up in Farwell, both graduated from high school there.







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Council sets meeting

A meeting of the city council will be held at 7 p.m. Monday in council chambers.

Four of the nine-item agenda topics concern growth and improvements within the community.

A public hearing will be held concerning submission of an application to the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs for a grant under the Community Development Program.

Authorization will be considered for the administrator to advertise for proposals for the maintenance of the city's water and sewer system.

The administrator could be authorized to negotiate a contract for the first phase of looping the new elevated water tower with existing water lines.

And, following an executive session, the council could possibly take action on obtaining additional property for the girls' softball complex.

The contracting of maintenance on the sewer and water lines came about when the council decided to abolish that four-man department, and contract the work.

Though there was actually no vote

held on the change, it was developed during the budget workshops. Out of the workshops, funding was not provided for the four employees, three of whom were absorbed into other departments and one quit, and contract labor was increased in the new budget.

Another issue which could affect next year's budget is a possible contract with Wichita County for funding of rural firefighting.

Though a resolution concerning such a contract is on the meeting agenda, the commissioners court has yet to take any final action on requests from both Iowa Park and Burkburnett to have rural fire fighting funded above the annual \$14,400 now paid all volunteer departments in the county.

In their fourth and final workshop on the 1994-95 budget, aldermen fi-

nalized a \$2,828,050 budget, which is based on a one-cent tax reduction of 79 cents per \$100 valuation.

The tentative balanced budget calls for expenditures of \$1,754,450 in the general fund and \$1,082,600 in the water and sewer fund.

A public hearing will be held on the budget later this month, before a final vote is held by the council.




Four attend Crew Rally

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Methodist youth 'fools for Christ'

"Bring In the Clowns" -- and you will see a performance by 16 junior high and high school age young people, who with the use of theatrical greasepaint have white faces, exaggerated red or yellow mouths, and eyes that look out from heavily black painted eyebrows.

Although they wear the makeup and costumes of a clown, there is a difference in clowning and the Clown Ministry which this group represents.

Rather than playing the clown in the true sense of the word, -- "fool", an incompetent, with little or no common sense,-- they are being "fools for Christ"as stated in I Cor. 4:10.

The young people are from First United Methodist Church and perform under the direction of Stephanie Roberts, FUMC Youth Director.

It is the consensus of the group that "It makes you happy, to make other people happy."

The goal of Clown Ministry is to portray a Christian message through the use of skits with music, or mime techniques, depicting the parables, such as the Good Samaritan, or other topics with Biblical background of grace, stewardship, forgiveness, etc.

Stephanie first became interested in the Clown Ministry program when she spent a week at Perkins School of Youth Ministry in Dallas and saw a performance by a Clown Ministry

She explained that two of the major themes in this type of ministry is an understanding of the word, "servanthood", and of being vulnerable, "You give away your power in order to raise others to a position of worth," she said.

The term "clown ministry" was used for the first time in 1968 as Floyd Shaffer, who is regarded as the founder and leader of the clown ministry movement, prepared his church newsletter.

He later was asked the question, "What is a Christian clown?" To which Shaffer replied, "It depends on who is under the makeup."

The main difference in clowning and clown ministry is understanding the purpose and function. The participants use common, everyday experiences to illustrate the parables in simple, childlike ways.

One symbol of clown ministry is a red dot on the cheek, called the "mark of the clown". According to the founder, "the chief task is to be childlke, to give of oneself, and communicate clearly to others that they are loved".

Before starting the Clown Ministry in January of this year, the young

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people went to a Youth Workshop in Dallas, learning how to put on their clown makeup and about their costumes, etc.

During school the clown group meets Wednesday night of each week, or as needed.

They gave their first performance in March, the first of five since the program began. The group meets once a week to practice.

They have performed at Wichita Falls State Hospital, Burkburnett United Methodist Church, and conducted a youth service at First United Methodist Church here.

This summer they performed a children's program at Nueva Esperanza United Methodist Church, a Hispanic congregation in Dallas. They mimed one skit, did one to music, and one of the clowns gave the sermon.

They were in Dallas on a threeday mission trip, where they worked through the Wesley-Rankin Center. They painted the interior of the home belonging to a homebound member

of the Dallas congregation. Stephanie served as co-director of the Wichita Falls District Junior High Summer Camp in Bridgeport this year and the local Clown Ministry performed the closing night of the camp.

Members of the Ministry bake cakes for the Wichita Falls State Hospital once a month and every six to eight weeks they bake cookies and

take them to homebound members. The "Clowns for Christ" are

She graduated Iowa Park High School in 1991 and is a senior at Midwestern State University majoring in Special Education. When she graduates there her plans are to enter Perkins Seminary to earn her Master degree in Youth Ministry or Christian Education.

Finnell lambasts federal wildlife department

State Rep. Charles Finnell has blasted the federal intervention of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service in proposing that 33 central Texas counties be designated as "protected natural habitat" for the golden-cheeked warfiler, at the expense of taxpayers and their livelihood.

"The bird is not the problem ... it's the hollow-headed bureaucrats in Washington D.C. . . the same folks who have trampled for years on rights of property owners in northwestern

states in the name of the spotted owl," said Finnell, vice-chairman of the Texas House Committee on Agriculture and Wildlife Management.

"Just because the 13 counties of our district were spared this time is no reason to relax. Texas property owners in the counties contiguous to our own Jack and Young counties are under the gun at this time. If the federal agency fiat proves successful, propeny owners of our counties could be the next target of environmental extremists acting under this or another federal presext.

"I believe this is a governmental power-grab which must not go unchallenged. I'm urging rural Texas property taxpayers, the real endangered species, to contact their U.S. Congressmen immediately urging active intervention to rescind this proposal and to restrain the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service from its present unbridled course of action," said the state legislator from Holliday

Dangers of Secondhand Smoke

You don't have to be a smoker to suffer the ill effects of smoking. Exposure to secondhand smoke is a very real health hazard.

Secondhand smoke is a combination of the smoke from a burning cigarette and the smoke exhaled by the smoker.

It contaminates the air and lingers in clothing, curtains and furniture, but most importantly, it contains at least 40 different chemicals found to cause cancer.

Every year more than 3,000 non-smokers die of lung cancer and 36,000 from heart disease linked to secondhand smoke.

Secondhand smoke is dangerous to everyone, but infants and children are at the greatest risk because it causes damage to developing organs, such as the lungs and brain.

Smoking during pregnancy may cause birth defects and low birth weights.

Secondhand smoke triggers or worsens asthma attacks. It also increases the number of children's colds, sore throats, and ear infections.

There are several steps you can take to lessen your or your child's chances of being exposed to secondhand smoke:

- Stop smoking, if you do smoke. Talk to your doctor. There are a variety of pharmaceutical products available that can help you quit.
- If you have household members who smoke, help them stop. If it is not possible to stop their smoking, ask them, and any visitors, to smoke outside of your home.
- Do not allow smoking in your car.
- Be certain that your children's schools and daycare facilities are smoke free.
