Board names Debra Brandt

Iowa Park school trustees are to hold their second meeting in a week's period tonight, beginning at 6:45 in the junior high library.

In a called meeting last Thursday, the board hired Debra Brandt as assistant principal at the junior high school, and Yeada Gunter as junior high counselor.

The moves were necessary after former junior high assistant principal Steve Moody was named principal of Kidwell Elementary, and Pat Davis resigned her junior high counselor position to accept employment at the

Region Nine Education Service Center.

Mrs. Brandt has been speech therapist and early childhood instructor at Kidwell, and Mrs. Gunter taught remedial reading at Kidwell.

Also Thursday night, an aide position at Bradford Elementary was approved to care for a wheelchair-bound student. The aide will be paid an hourly wage, according to the approved motion.

Following the business portion of the called meeting, trustees held their second work session on the 1994-95

school year budget.

Another study session also is scheduled for this evening's meeting, followed by the setting of a date to adopt the new budget, according to the meeting agenda.

A provision included on tonight's agenda calls for accepting resignations (no names announced), and employing of new personnel.

Other topics on tonight's meeting agenda include:

- * consider a parent request that software be purchased from Creative Education, Inc. to help children with special learning disabilities;

- * report on the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills Tests and the Iowa Tests of Basic Skills;

- * consider the Energy Management Conservation policy;

- * hold the first reading of the Localized Policy Manual Update 45;

- * approve the June and July tax reports and adjustments, as well as accepting the certified appraisal values.

City closing department; approves purchase of land

The city council Monday night approved a proposal to advertise for bids to maintain water and sewer transmission lines, and also to purchase property to expand the girls' softball program.

The majority of the council has agreed to displace a four-person water and sewer maintenance staff with a private company, to be determined on a bid basis.

Bids will be submitted for a one-

year contract, automatically renewable the second and third years, if all work is approved during the first year.


Three of the four men who were on the staff have been assigned to other departments, and the fourth quit some three weeks ago.

Council members approved the purchase of Block 77 of the original townsite, which is the block immediately south of the current softball complex on Atlantic.

Besides providing the desired space for vehicle parking, a problem that has developed during summer play over the past two years, space also will be available to develop a T-ball field.

The council had been negotiating the lease of property to the northeast,

Burglaries, arrests reported

Reports of two burglaries and four unrelated arrests were included on the police blotter for the past week.

A resident in the 300 block of North Hawthorn called police Friday afternoon after having found several jewelry items missing.

Part of the \$8,000 worth of jewelry missing was reclaimed from a pawn shop in Wichita Falls, and the balance from an individual.

A formal complaint has been filed with police, and a warrant is pending against the individual, police said.

The other burglary reported was of a missing battery charger. A resident in the 600 block of North Park said the charger was taken from the home's garage sometime between Saturday and Monday.

Police took Christy Marie Bowen, 19, into custody in the 200 block of South Colorado Friday afternoon. Bowen was wanted on an outstanding warrant issued by the Clay County sheriff's office. She was later turned over to a Clay County deputy.

Cody Wayne Williams, 18, was arrested Friday evening on charges of criminal mischief and Class C assault, according to the police blotter.

The assault charge was the result of Williams reportedly threatening to kill the complainant, and the criminal mischief charge was for allegedly breaking out a vehicle windshield.

No formal complaint was filed on

the criminal mischief charge, but William's fine of \$81.50 was paid on the assault charge, and he was released.

Police arrested two persons at 3:25 a.m. Wednesday at Yosemite and West Highway, both on public intoxication charges.

Johnny Ojeda, 60, was released after posting a bond of \$280, as was Regina Ann Alexander, 21, whose bond was \$81.50.

A driver notified police Tuesday afternoon that someone had used a sharp object to deface the side of a vehicle while it was parked at the high school.

Police are still trying to solve the riddle of a boat missing from Lake Iowa Park.

A citizen told police Monday that the fishing boat had been left abandoned on the west shore of the lake for the past two days.

Contact was made with the registered owner in Burkburnett, who told police it was not stolen, but rather he had left it there after removing the motor and battery.

In the meantime, a local resident

had obtained permission from police to pick up the boat, both to remove it from an area where it could be vandalized and also to "be first in line to purchase it" should no one claim ownership.

When the individual went out to the lake Tuesday afternoon, however, the boat was missing, and the reported owner said he had not picked it up.

Local schools operate at lower cost than most

School tax rates increased only a penny last year, and property values were up by one percent, but school tax revenue increased by \$500 million.

Homeowners had to pay an additional \$398 million from the loss of the 20% exemption by county education districts. The tax on an \$80,000 homestead increased by \$108 or 12.6%.

These figures come from the latest issue of *Bench Marks 1993-1994 School District Budgets in Texas*, an annual publication of the Austin-based Texas Research League, an educational corporation engaged in governmental research.

School budgets were increased \$396 million last fall to a total of \$18.9

billion. However, capital outlay was cut by \$425 million making an additional \$821 million available for current operations.

Classroom teachers received two dollars in five of the additional spending. Schools added 14,447 employees -- an average of one new employee for each 5.2 additional students.

An average of \$4,403 per student for current operations plus \$332 for repayment of debt and another \$513 for capital outlay was budgeted last year.

Iowa Park Consolidated Independent School District's budget for 1993-94 provided \$3,485.93 per student for current operations, \$124.52 for debt

service, and \$178.09 for capital outlay based on 2,023 students enrolled in October 1993.

The average base salary for classroom teachers paid by the Iowa Park District in October 1993 was \$27,806 plus supplements for career ladder and residence in the district.

The average for administrators was \$43,043, and \$30,385 for other professional support employees (librarians, counselors, nurses, supervisors, etc.).

Statewide, four dollars in each five were spent for salaries, and payroll expense averaged \$3,551 per student, as compared to \$2,741.44 in Iowa Park.

Taxpayers provided one teacher for 17.0 students in Iowa Park while the statewide pupil-teacher ratio was 15.9 to one.

School districts imposed a property tax at the rate of \$1.425 per \$100 of appraised value, or 97.9% of market value (selling price). The "true tax rate" was \$1.396 \$1.425 times 97.9% statewide.

Locally, the Iowa Park District imposed a rate of \$1.120. Property was appraised at 103.2% of its market value making the true rate \$1.155 per \$100 of market value (selling price).

The report points out that the calculation of a true tax rate based on market value rather than on appraised

value is necessary to make a valid comparison of tax levels with other schools.

The tax on a house that would sell for \$80,000 in the Iowa Park District would have been \$908. If the homeowner were eligible for homestead exemptions, the tax would have been \$852. That compares with statewide average tax bills of \$1,090 and \$962 respectively for an \$80,000 house.

Last year Iowa Park's revenue from the property tax decreased by a minus .4% for 1993-94 as compared to a 6.8% increase statewide.

The state and local share of the foundation program averaged \$3,038 per student last year and was \$2,795 in

the Iowa Park District.

Local school districts can levy property taxes to enrich the foundation program. Enrichment last year averaged \$1,025 per pupil to which the state added an average of \$358 per student to guarantee the tax yield in property-poor districts.

Enrichment by the Iowa Park District was \$360; the state guaranteed added \$224 per student. The state aid was \$1,937. Local property taxes plus state aid totaled \$3,379 per student in the Iowa Park District, as compared to \$4,420 statewide.

Local school districts must adopt a budget for next year before Sept. 1 and set a tax rate.

COOK OF THE WEEK

Steak Diane

- 1 cup sliced mushroom (fresh)
- 2 Tbsps. diced onions
- 1 clove garlic, diced
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- Juice of 1/2 lemon
- 3 tps. Worcestershire sauce
- 1/2 cup butter or margarine
- 2 Tbsps. diced parsley
- 2 Tbsps. butter or margarine
- 1 1/2 lb. beef tenderloin or ribeye steak cut into 10 slices

Cook and stir mushrooms, onion, garlic, salt, lemon juice and Worcestershire sauce in 1/2 cup butter until mushrooms are tender. Stir in parsley; keep sauce warm.

Melt 2 tablespoons butter in skillet. Turning once, cook tenderloin slices over medium-high heat to medium doneness, about 3-4 minutes on each side. Serve with mushroom-butter sauce.

Serves 5.

Broccoli in Cheese Sauce

- 2 lbs. fresh broccoli
- Wash; cook or steam until tender. Drain.

Cheese Sauce:

- 3 Tbsps. margarine
- 3 Tbsps. flour
- 2 cups milk (warmed in microwave)
- 4 oz. Velveta or Cheddar cheese, cubed

Cook flour and margarine in microwave about 1 minute. Add milk and stir with wire whisk. Microwave 1 minute and add cheese. Microwave 3 minutes or until thick. Pour over cooked broccoli.

Serves 5.

Baked Tomatoes

- 1 large tomato per person
- Bread crumbs
- Seasoned salt
- Margarine

Cut ripe tomatoes in 2 equal cuts about half way through. Sprinkle each tomato with bread crumbs and dash of seasoned salt. Dab margarine on top and bake 20 minutes at 350 degrees.

Egg Mimosa

Preheat oven to 350 degrees
Boil 6 eggs; set aside
Toast 6 slices of bread; set aside
Grate 8 oz. cheese

Prepare white gravy:

- 4 Tbsps. margarine
- 4 Tbsps. flour
- 2 1/2 cups milk
- Salt & pepper to taste

Melt margarine in pan; add flour and cook 1 minute. Add milk, salt and pepper. Stir with whisk until gravy is thick and remove from heat.

Peel boiled eggs and cut in half lengthwise. Place toast on cookie sheet with 2 egg halves on each toast. Pour gravy on top, sprinkle with cheese, and bake in oven until cheese melts.

Banana Bread

- 1/2 cup margarine
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 eggs
- 2 cups sifted flour
- 1 tsp. soda
- 4 ripe bananas (mashed)
- 1 cup chopped nuts (optional)

Cream margarine and sugar together. Add eggs and flour, 1 cup at a time. Add bananas and nuts, mixing thoroughly. Divide mixture in half and pour into 2 loaf pans. Bake 40 minutes

in 350 degree oven. Check for doneness with toothpick. If done, toothpick comes out clean. This bread freezes well.

WHEN WE GATHER

The late arrivals simply found a place by the wall for by then it was standing room only. It was a crowd that one does not even see at Easter. People won't stand at Easter, but for "Dutch" George, they stood.

Hymns were sung; prayers were prayed; Scripture was read; and a sermon, masterfully presented, was offered to the gathered assembly. Some cried, some laughed, many embraced as they did what the faithful do when one of their own steps over the line between the Church Militant on earth and the Church Triumphant in heaven. It was enough to make even the most seasoned funeral-goers among us reflect with deep gratitude upon the community called church as the communion of saints.

They came to say that "Precious Lord, take my hand" still speaks softly and eloquently the church's faith in the presence of God in all of the changing seasons of our lives.

They came to point to the future as a future that is held by Almighty God. They came to invoke God's presence and guidance as they sang, "Be though my vision, O Lord of my heart..."

And at the service of death and resurrection for his father, our friend Larry George, in his characteristically hospitable manner, invited us all "to come by the house" for iced tea and cake so that he and his family might have the opportunity to express their gratitude for the presence of friends. At the time of death that's what the church is: a community of believers united to God and one another. Thanks be to God!"

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Texas Beef Council acts to increase beef servings

The Texas Beef Council's board of directors will promote additional beef consumption in coming months through the authorization of \$300,000 worth of programs funded with Texas beef checkoff dollars.

The funds will come from other budgeted programs and from higher-than-projected checkoff revenues for 1993-94.

The action was approved June 2 to help move the huge amount of beef in the marketplace that currently is depressing live cattle prices. The board emphasized that the measures complement a number of proactive measures on the national level to help reduce the current oversupply situation.

"The checkoff program was never meant to be used as a bandage whenever cattle prices were hurting," says Harlan Huffman of McGregor, chairman of the TBC board of directors. "It is meant to build long-term demand for beef."

Yet, he added, existing programs can be supplemented, extended or re-directed to increase consumer awareness of beef during times of price declines.

"The diverted funds will extend radio buys and consumer access to beef cooking ideas," Huffman says. "Our goal is to increase the servings of beef within Texas by 680,000 per week."

This means that over 10 weeks, Texans will eat approximately 6.8 million additional servings of beef because of these programs. Overall, these increases will affect cattle prices by less than \$1 per head, but the board also felt the promotion will contribute to further meal increases in the fall.

In approving the additional expenditures, the board funded these actions:

These books will include "30 Meals in 30 Minutes" and "Great Grilled Beef." Research by Leo Burnett, the beef industry's ad agency, shows that increased beef servings are achieved through distribution of cookbooks to consumers.

"The radio ads also will provide information about beef and beef specials that the Beef Industry Council (BIC) is coordinating in more than 29,000 supermarkets nationwide from June 12 to Aug. 26.

The radio ads will run in Amarillo, Austin, Dallas-Fort Worth, Houston, Lubbock and San Antonio. They will be targeted at women between the ages of 25 and 54 approximately 100 times per week.

"The summer radio program will be complemented by a supermarket cookbook dissemination program. Members of Texas CattleWomen and Act Media representatives will distribute more than 160,000 cookbooks in 330 Texas supermarkets as well as answer basic questions about beef.

*Calls to a toll-free number will generate direct mailings of 60,000 additional cookbooks.

National programs conducted with beef checkoff dollars by the BIC include the featuring program, which historically has generated a 25:1 return on checkoff investments; National TV advertising, which will kick off June 13, national print advertising in target women's magazines, and dissemination of Cut & Save labels that

show consumers how to achieve savings by buying beef in bulk at a lower per pound cost.



Students, Parents, Rules and Regulations

Although most people think negative thoughts when the terms "rules and regulations" are mentioned, most people agree that it would be impossible to have an effective school district without a proper set of guidelines.

It is the intent of the Iowa Park CISD to be fair and consistent in the administration of its rules and regulations. Areas governed by special policy include: student conduct on buses, individual campus discipline systems including attendance and dress code, and conduct at school activities.

At the beginning of school, parents will be sent, by the student, a copy of the bus rules and a copy of the individual campus student handbook. The parents will be asked to sign a sheet acknowledging that they received the material. It is important that parents read and understand the guidelines.

The school district realizes that it is important that parents and faculty work together for the good of the student. The guidelines create a common ground for effectively directing the student as he or she moves toward their eventual goal of graduation. Parents are encouraged to contact school officials if there are areas that may lead to misunderstanding and need to be clarified.

Bus Routes Remain Same

School bus routes in the school district will remain the same for 1994-95. Minor time variations may occur because of varying student loads. New students will need to go to the school administration building to obtain a bus pass. Re-enrolling students who have not moved and will attend the same school will not need to obtain a pass.

All Kidwell students riding the bus for the first time will have a tag put on them showing their name, their address and their bus number. Parents should expect these students to be about 30 minutes late the first few days. Students below the second grade will not be let off the bus if they cannot point to their house.

Test Scores Show Solid School District

The Iowa Park CISD testing program reaffirmed what most people already knew. Iowa Park has a solid school district that fully prepares students for life in a competitive world.

Major tests given include: the Iowa Tests of Basic Skills for students in grades K-2, TAAS (the Texas required test) for grades 3-8 and exit, and the ACT and SAT given at various locations for students planning to enter college. In addition to these tests, other tests are given to students entering special programs. All of the tests are carefully analyzed and designed for use as a resource in curriculum planning.

Special attention this year was given to the high school college preparatory program when it was announced that the Texas Education Agency was recognizing the high school for outstanding ACT and SAT scores.

AUSTIN — Texas should be one of five states to test a program aimed at shutting illegal aliens out of the job market, Barbara Jordan, chairwoman of the U.S. Commission on Immigration Reform, told a Senate committee last week.

The former Texas congresswoman's testimony was criticized by civil rights groups, who said it was a disguised attempt at forcing Americans to carry a national identification card.

"Jordan is bowing to politics and to public pressure," said Jeanne Butterfield of the American Immigration Lawyers Association.

Jordan, who denied the allegations, said there currently is no easy way to check the immigration status of new workers as required by law. Under the current system, 29 different documents can be presented as proof of citizenship, or legal residence.

Jordan wants Texas, California, Florida, Illinois and New York to give employers access to Social Security databases. Job seekers would be asked for their Social Security numbers, and employers would check to see if the number

was valid.

AG Files Immigration Suit
State Attorney General Dan Morales sued the federal government last week in an attempt to recoup \$5 billion for services that officials say Texas provided to undocumented immigrants over the past six years.

Morales denied charges of "immigrant bashing," saying the lawsuit did not seek elimination of any services to immigrants. He said the suit simply asks for restitution for Texas.

Joining Texas in the lawsuit filed in U.S. District Court in Brownsville, were Dallas, Harris, and Hidalgo counties; the El Paso and La Joya school districts; and the city of Odessa.

State Jail Chief Named
Thomas A. Baker, retired commander of Bergstrom Air Force Base in Austin, was named last week as director of the new state jail division. Baker started his new job immediately.

The state jail program, which by next year will include space and rehabilitation programs for about 25,000 nonviolent inmates, is scheduled to begin Sept. 1.

Spring rains have delayed the construction of the first jail in Beaumont until at least October. But state leaders worked out a stopgap measure to house the first inmates in existing community facilities or in a partitioned area of prison.

The delay has drawn the ire of Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock, who earlier criticized the Texas Board of Criminal Justice for what he termed a lack of planning.

TDCJ executive director James "Andy" Collins said programming has been planned and construction is continuing on schedule.

By late 1995, 18 state jails are

expected to be in operation.

Baker, who holds a master's degree in business administration, retired as an Air Force lieutenant general in August 1993. He has served as deputy director of operations in the Pentagon.

Super Collider Settlement
Faced with the alternative of expensive, lengthy litigation, members of the commission that oversees Texas' investment in the super collider last week approved a settlement with the U.S. Department of Energy.

Texas contributed \$539 million of the more than \$2 billion spent on the atom smasher and wants to

recoup its losses.

The proposed settlement was approved by the National Research Laboratory and now goes to Congress for approval. It would give Texas title to the buildings and land on the collider's campus and \$145 million in cash.

Texas could receive another \$65 million if its plan for a cancer treatment center is approved.

But GOP gubernatorial candidate, George W. Bush, wasn't impressed with the proposed settlement.

"The state of Texas is entitled to compensation for its investment in the super collider, but it's unfortunate the state is being forced to settle for a consolation prize," Bush said.

"The only agreement to brag about would have been if Gov. Richards and President Clinton

had been able to convince their fellow Democrats to keep the super collider and its Texas jobs and scientific potential alive."

Inmates P.O.'ed About Pants
Most male state prisoners don't like to pull down their pants to relieve themselves, but the new flyless version of the standard-issue white cotton pants being phased in by the Texas Department of Criminal Justice leaves them no choice.

Inmate Alan Wade Johnson, serving a life sentence for rape and robbery at the Mark Stiles Unit in Beaumont, sent a letter to Lt. Gov. Bullock, a few legislators and the media, according to a report in the *Austin American-Statesman*.

"You (may) crack a smile and laugh about it, but give it time to sink in and think about the consequences of over 100,000 male prisoners wearing female attire and I believe you'll understand (it's) not so funny," wrote Johnson, who urged Bullock to "consider the emotional impact of those of us who will be forced to dress like a woman."

Larry Kyle, assistant director of industry for the prison system, said the new pants, though cheaper and easier for inmates to manufacture, have resulted in an outcry, because the design is less "user-friendly."

Sessions Pulls Stinky Stunt
Republican congressional candidate Pete Sessions last week pulled a trailer load of horse manure on his campaign stops to dramatize his

stand on the health-care issue.

"I know what's in this horse trailer smells awfully bad, but the Clinton House Ways and Means Committee health-care plan smells even worse," he told a crowd in Tyler, where he launched a two-day, 12-city "Manure Tour" in his challenge to incumbent U.S. Rep. John Bryant, D-Dallas, to represent an 11-county area that stretches from Dallas to Bryan.

Carlton Carl, a spokesman for Bryant, called Sessions' tour "childish," and Lorrie McHugh, a White House health care spokeswoman, suggested that "perhaps (Sessions) should tell the 108,000 members of working families in his own district who don't have health insurance why he is not fighting for real health care reform with universal coverage."

Sessions, the son of former FBI director William Sessions, accused Bryant of supporting the Clinton plan, which he said would raise taxes on businesses, increase the federal budget deficit and use tax dollars to finance abortions.

allow banks to operate across state lines.

The amendment, by Gonzalez, D-San Antonio, passed on a 4-3 vote. U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm, R-Texas, however, opposed the measure saying the home equity debate should be resolved by the courts and the Texas Legislature.

Gramm, a member of the Senate Banking Committee, said he had the backing of 43 organizations in Texas. The Austin-based Texas Bankers Association also criticized the Gonzalez amendment.

Earlier this year, the 5th U.S. Court of Appeals said the savings and loans in Texas could make home equity loans, though the Texas Constitution prohibits them. The state then appealed the appellate court's decision to the U.S. Supreme Court, which has not decided whether to hear the case.

Meanwhile, if the House and Senate approve the bill after a vote expected by mid-August, the court ruling would become moot.



Friday of next week, the Hawks are scheduled to scrimmage against the Wichita Falls High Coyotes.

The Hawks are to open their 1994 season here Sept. 2 against traditional opponent Burk Burnett.

across Washington, for a parking area, when it became known the property was available.

A public hearing was conducted concerning an application for a grant under the Texas Community Development Program.

Suggestions, all from council members, were primarily to replace original townsite water lines, and also to consider additional fire hydrants in some areas of the city.

Administrator Mike Price was authorized to accept a bid to have a valve installed on the water transmission line from Wichita Falls.

The valve, to be installed by

Bowles Construction, will cost \$7,335. It will be used as part of the city's contract to provide water to the Horse-shoe Lake area.

Also concerning water from Wichita Falls, Mayor Wayne House informed the audience that the July bill from that city had been drastically reduced for this past month, as compared with July 1993.

The bill for July of last year was \$28,687, House said, and was only \$34.52 last month.

He explained it was the result of the city's increasing staffing to work extra hours at the local water treatment plant, as why less water was purchased from Wichita Falls.

Also approved was a \$13,175 bid from the Bowles firm to install a water

line from the new elevated water tower on US 287 to the west, and connect it with an existing water line.

In response to a suggestion made earlier by Steve Hammonds, that the city plant a tree in memory of the late Dutch George, the council approved such a purchase.

A large tree is to be planted at the Tom Burnett Memorial Library and be permanently marked as being in George's memory.



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GARDENING HINTS

By MARK TERNING, COUNTY AGENT - HORTICULTURE

Early August is a tough time for annual flowers and the people who love them.

This means it is much too early to plant pansies, but the intense summer heat has hammered most of the earlier planted annuals to a frazzle.

Is there a bedding plant which can rescue you from these doldrums? You bet there is, and it's called a Mari-Mum.

The name Mari-Mum is derived from a combination of the terms marigold and chrysanthemum and denotes large flowered American marigolds which look like and are used as a late summer and fall color plant like chrysanthemums.

Mari-mums are hybrids which bloom earlier and produce large flowers with a great deal of uniformity among plants. Several years of testing in Wichita Falls and across the state by extension horticulturists have revealed many attributes exhibited by Mari-Mums.

For example, they: 1. are very low maintenance flowering annuals; 2. are extremely easy to grow when planted in full-sun areas; 3. produce more blooms, and retain better flower color as a late summer to fall crop, and 4. possess tremendous visual impact even at a distance.

Mari-Mums will bloom two or three times longer than fall-planted chrysanthemums and they are less expensive to purchase which gives you more flowers for your gardening buck.

At this point, many of you are probably thinking how beautiful Mari-Mums will be as a fall crop, but you're worried that spider mites, the arch enemy of marigolds, will make their ugly presence known. Study of spider mite biology shows that while mites love hot weather, their rate of reproduction is greater reduced by cool fall temperatures. So by first removing any mite-infested plants from the flower bed, and then planting fresh Mari-Mums now, you can avoid significant mite problems.

The super Mari-Mum cultivars recommended for planting this summer are "Discovery Yellow" and "Discovery Orange," dwarf plants which reach 8-10 inches in height, and "Voyager Yellow," a somewhat larger cultivar at 14-16 inches in height. Transplant Mari-Mums into the home landscape now through mid-August to insure a prolonged period of spectacular late summer and fall bloom.

Recent Extension Service testing has proven that to enjoy true Mari-Mum performance, you should purchase transplants with foliage only or in bud, but not in full bloom. Transplants in full-bloom at planting devote all of their energy to supporting that tremendous bloom load at the expense of root growth and proper establishment. Local garden centers and nurseries will be selling Mari-Mum transplants in the proper stage of growth (foliage or bud only) so that you can enjoy the full measure of this high-performance plant.

Plant Mari-Mums in well-drained soils in a full-sun location. Add organic matter to bed areas and incorporate 1-2 pounds of a slow-release lawn fertilizer per 100 square feet of bed area unless soil tests dictate otherwise. Space "Discovery Yellow" or "Discovery Orange" plants eight inches apart and "Voyager Yellow" 12 inches apart. Mulch around new plants to reduce water loss. Water thoroughly after planting. Massing these plants in the accent corner of your back yard or planting along the front edge of a

bed, backed by evergreen or deciduous shrubs, for a knock-out color display.

Mari-Mums also perform well in containers on the patio or deck. The neat, compact growth habit of "Discovery Yellow" is perfect for edging walkways and garden paths.

Check with your local nursery or garden center today for Mari-Mums. You will soon discover the outstanding landscape value of these colorful new marigolds.

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
