# Police investigating thefts

Thieves apparently went on a rampage Monday night, attacking vehicles in several parts of the city, according to this week's police blotter.

Police received four reports of thefts from vehicles Tuesday, as well as the theft of a tandem trailer.

The first of the four thefts actually was discovered by police on patrol, when at 4:47 a.m. the officer noticed the doors of a pickup parked in the 700 block of North Wall standing open.

Additionally, several items of clothing were lying on the ground beside the vehicle.

After summoning the owner from the home, it was ascertained stereo equipment valued at \$400 and approximately \$150 in clothing were missing.

The owner said he had last seen the pickup at 9:30 p.m.

At 8:28 a.m. Tuesday, a resident of the 700 block of North Yosemite reported missing a tool box from that location. Total value of the box and tools was set at \$500.

The occupant said a noise had been heard at 2:30 a.m., and upon looking outside saw the vehicle's doors standing open.

A wallet and contents were reported as having been taken some time Monday night from an unlocked vehicle in the 800 block of Van Horn.

A contractor notified police

Monday that a 12-foot tandem trailer loaded with broken sheetrock had been taken from a location on Hope Lane. It had been towed away despite three flat tires, according to the report.

Police also are looking for a suspect who allegedly bilked B&R Thriftway out of \$31.80 Tuesday.

A man walked into the store about noon time, and walked back to the meat department. Shortly afterward, he carried a packaged ham to the checkout counter, showed the wrapping had been cut and a slice of meat missing, and requested a refund.

The amount was paid, but after the suspect had left, an employee remembered having seen the individual enter, but had nothing in his hands.

Another theft from a vehicle was reported to police Saturday. A resident said \$110 worth of food stamps and a wallet had been taken from a vehicle while it was parked in the 1200 block of South Wall.

Eight persons were arrested during the past week, according to the report.

Officers took Billy Ray Hill, 53, into custody at 8:05 p.m. Friday on a charge of public intoxication. He was released at 2:15 a.m. after paying a fine of \$130.

fine, according to the report.

# Hawks take on the champs

Just like the Old Grey Mare, the Southlake Carroll Dragons ain't what they used to be.

The Dragons, winners of 72 straight regular season games, three Class 3A State championships including backto-back titles the last two years, are proving they are beatable as they head into Friday night's non-district game against Iowa Park that is scheduled to kickoff at 8 p.m.

Southlake, having moved to 4A this year, comes in riding a two-game loosing streak. After beating Bridgeport 28-14 for its 72nd straight regular season victory, the Dragons were blasted by Gainesville 43-21 two weeks ago and blanked by Mesquite Poteet last week 36-0. The shutout was the

first Southlake has been delt since before 1980 when Bob Ledbetter took over as head football coach.

"They're struggling right now just like we are," Iowa Park head coach Weldon Nelms said. "I didn't figure I'd be saying this. I thought they would be coming into our game 3-0 and rolling like they have in the past. They may be 1-2 but look at the two teams they have lost to. I hope our guys aren't intimidated by the tradition of their ballclub, because overall, I don't think they will be any more physical than the teams we've played so far.

"They don't have the speed they've had in the past," Nelms added. "And their defense is not as overpowering. They are a well coached bunch of kids who have been in the same system for a long time, they just don't have the athletes they've had in the past."

The Dragons limp into the game against the Hawks as their starting quarterback, senior Kris Brown was hurt in the Gainesville game and his replacement, junior Chance Caple has struggled to move the team offensively.

Southlakes' biggest threat is senior tailback Derek Sargent who comes into the game with 220 yards rushing on 37 carries for an average of 5.9 yards. Their passing game is not much to talk about at this point of the season as Brown has completed only 7-of-20 with a pair of interceptions while Caple is a mere 5-of-22 for only 19 yards.

"We need to control the ball like we did in the second half of the Hamlin game," Nelms said. "They're not going to beat themselves with a lot of mistakes so we have to stay out of situations where we turn the ball over. Our kids felt like they gave a great effort last week and when they walked off the field, even though the outcome wasn't what we wanted, I think they realized we were getting closer to where we wanted to be as a football team."

Defensively the Dragons haven't stopped anybody yet, giving up 810 yards rushing in their previous three games for an average of 270 per game. Overall they are allowing 317 total yards per game and 31 points per

"We should be able to run the ball on them," Nelms added. "We did a good job last week moving the ball on the ground especially in the second half after we made some adjustments in our blocking assignments. Our kids are anxious to play Southlake. They've always wanted to play them and I think we'll be ready to play.

"I think the game will be played with a lot of emotion," said Nelms. "They are a team that is used to winning all the time and right now they are having to deal with losing, while on

# She's 'grandma' to more than her's

She's called "grandma" by many young people, however she has only three grandchildren and one greatgrandchild. But, Ida Lehman had endeared

herself to young people long before her only child, Garland, was born-more than eight years after she and her late husband, Rex, were married.

Their home was always a "come and go" place for young people. And it still is. She and Rex shared a love for children and always wanted them around.

"In fact," Ida said, "our house was built to entertain kids."

While we were visiting during this interview, three young boys walked in the front door. After they spoke, one asked Ida a question, prefacing it with "Grandma". The three went to the kitchen, looked in the refrigerator, then on to another part of

I asked, "Was that one of your grandsons?" She replied, "Oh no, just some of the young people who come around and make themselves at home."

Then she explained, "Boys have always liked to come here for some reason. Some who come now are friends of my grandsons. But several years ago some of the boys asked me if they could call me 'grandma', and of course I said they could".

Some of the boys are ones she has known a long time, or ones she has

befriended in some way. Both Ida Mae and Rex worked with young people since the early days of their marriage, through their church, 4-H clubs, and entertaining for them. They always found a way to make them feel special.

Idamadea point of finding a child's special talent and encouraging him to develop it. She never made a distinction between the children she worked with. If they were handicapped in anyway, she treated them like she did all of the other children.

"I love my kids," Ida said. "If one stumbles, that is when he needs to be made to feel he belongs and that is when he needs love and help," she

A lot of weekends the Lehmans would have 25 and 30 young people at their house. Smiling, Ida remembered that at times she would cite an incident to make a point, and sometimes they'd say, "Well Grandma, this is not the 'olden' days."

She received numerous awards and recognition through the years for her work with young people.

While her husband was living, they would have four to eight children from the Tipton (Okla.) Home come here to spend their vacation time with

Ida was active in PTA and other school groups during Garland's school days, and was always active in community groups and any others that would be helping young people.

The Lehmans were always planning entertainment of some kind for young people. They would have what they called "souping" parties.

Ida would prepare the meat and the young people would bring whatever they wanted to go in the soup and a box of crackers. The soup was made in a big black wash pot down on the

For many years Ida was an adult 4-H club leader. Through the years she made trips with the 4-H'ers who went to state and national events.

On that phase of her life, Graham Purcell just about said it all in a letter which stated, "She is widely recognized in her community and county for her unselfish and dedicated service to others"-----"She was the first Gold Star Girl in Young County in 13 years, and was personal supervisor to four state 4-H winners and approximately 75 county, district and state winners.

"The Altrusa Club of Wichita Falls recognized her in 1964 as area outstanding citizen. She was the first state and local leader for Farmers Union young people. She serves on the City-County Welfare Board, in addition to being active in church work and fund drives."

Ida has a large plaque she was presented by the Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce during the centennial year celebration for having lived in Iowa Park 56 years.

She was born to Amos and Esther Stowe, March 18, 1909, at Newport in Clay County, the beginning of more

# Chamber making Whoop-T-Do plans

Susan Dillard, Chamber secretary, said she had received booth reservations from only seven organizations, even after extending the deadline to Sept. 20.

Tuesday's reservation deadline applies only those organizations wishing to retain the same activities they held the previous year. Final deadline will be Oct. 13.

Rules and regulations for the Whoop-T-Do, proposed by the rules committee and adopted by the board,

1. The Whoop-T-Do shall be open to any non-profit chartered organization group in the Iowa Park School District.

2. First choice or type of booths

goes to previous year's operator. 3. All food and drink booths must

be approved by the Whoop-T-Do committee (limit of one to three items per booth).

4. A booth constitutes one game or one food-service stand.

5. All booths must be set up by 9:00 a.m. and all vehicles moved out of 6. The charge per booth will be

\$25 (deposit) or 10% NET of sales for organizations and \$15 for arts and crafts. 7. Organization booth space is

8x10 feet and arts and crafts 10x10. Additional space requires more than

8. All reservations must be called in and paid for to the Chamber of Commerce office by 4 p.m. Thursday (date will change each year). No reservations will be accepted after this

9. The turtle trot will be the first event Saturday morning.

10. No political booths allowed.

11. All decisions of the committee

## Council meeting slated

Three public appearances and action amending the city's plumbing code highlight the agenda for Monday's meeting of the city council.

The meeting is to commence at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

Two public appearances actually are continuations from the council's meeting two weeks earlier, and both concern water:

Steve · Moody and H.K. Gregg spoke at the earlier meeting, with requests for water, but neither was on the meeting's agenda so the council was prohibited from taking any action.

Moody explained he plans to build a home on Harmony Road, and is asking permission to extend an existing treated water line to that site.

Gregg asked that the city allow him to fill a stock tank from a raw water transmission line which crosses his pasture.

He told the council that when he granted permission to cross his land with the line, he was told he could have water from it whenever needed. He did not say who made the promise.

Gregg explained his stock tank was virtually empty because of dry weather conditions and he needed the water for his cattle.

The third public appearance on the tentative agenda is by a spokesman for the Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Dept., who will request a waiver from the city's solicitation permit requirement for a fund-raising project.

be considered in the plumbing code is a request made at the last meeting by Randy Gibson.

Gibson explained he wanted to have a lawn sprinkler system installed in his yard, but was not allowed a permit because the controls did not comply with the city's interpretation of the Standard Plumbing Code.

Aldermen, especially Johnny Crawford, said Gibson's request should be allowed, because the control system he proposed to use would prevent any backflow contamination of the water system.

At issue is whether the sprinkler control can be put in a vault below the ground level, or be elevated above any sprinkler head.

Gibson explained the elevated control box would be unattractive to the front of his home, where he wanted it to be located.

Action will be considered by the council on three different proposals. They include executing a contract for sanitary sewer improvements on Chestnut, advertising for bids to construct a six-inch water main and sewer lift station in Highland Park Addition, and authorizing the administrator to advertise for bids to sell surplus equipment.

The Hawks' offensive output has increased each week from 112 total yards against Burkburnett, to 242 against Electra and last week Iowa Park finished with 273 total yards.

Defensively Iowa Park has showed the same improvement giving up fewer yards than the week before. The Hawks allowed the Bulldogs 411 total yards, the Tigers 170 yards and held the Pipers to only 159 total yards.

The Hawks are coming into the Southlake game averaging 209 total yards per game, 123.7 of that coming on the ground and 85.3 through the air. Fullback Chad Simpson, who finished the Hamlin game with 115 yards rushing, has picked up 172 yards on 46 carries for an average of 3.7 while teammate Corky Petty has rushed for 109 yards on 26 tries for an average of 4.2 yards per game.

#### **Grand jury** 'no-bills' McGuinn

The Wichita County grand jury voted yesterday to no-bill Iowa Park Police Sgt. Jack McGuinn, in the Sept. 2 shooting death of Mark Allen Swanson.

According to Iowa Park Chief Ray Smock's information, members of the grand jury voted unanimously that Swanson's death was "justifiable homicide."

Review by a grand jury following any death relating to a police action is standard procedure in Texas law.

Sgt. McGuinn was called to the Swanson residence in the 300 block of East Lafayette at 10:20, where a domestic disturbance was reported.

In the darkness of the home's back yard, McGuinn said he was threatened by Swenson who was holding a large piece of wood and refused to drop it after being so ordered.

McGuinn was alone and had no backup at the time, as other members of the police department were still directing traffic following the Iowa Park vs. Burkburnett football game.

Swenson reportedly was intoxicated, and had been knocking out windows of the home prior to McGuinn's arrival.

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# Hawks win everything except the score

For the second week in a row, the stats didn't paint a true picture of what happened in Iowa Park's football game Friday night.

The Hawks did a better job running, passing and controlling the football against Hamlin but came out on the short end of a 22-14 decision to fall to 0-3 for the season.

The Pied Pipers were out-rushed by 48 yards, out-passed by 66 yards and ran 29 fewer offensive plays than the Hawks did, yet came away with the win to improve to 2-1 for the

Hamlin opened the scoreing when James Clawson hauled in a 25-yard touchdown pass from Eric Brown to cap a nine-play 75-yard drive with 6:20 remaining in the first period.

The Pied Pipers looked to build on their 7-0 lead when they broke through the line on a fourth down play and blocked Corky Petty's punt. Hamlin recovered the ball at the Iowa Park 28 but the Hawk defense stiffened and forced the Pipers to try a 32 yard field goal that sailed wide left to keep Iowa Park close.

Neither team managed to move the ball much in the second quarter as both teams went to the locker room with the score still 7-0.

The Hawks took the ball to open the second half and looked like a totally different ball club than they did in the first half.


Iowa Park, held to only two first downs and 56 total yards in the first half, marched 75 yards in 11 plays to start the third quarter and pulled to within 7-6 at the 6:59 mark when Troy Radford went over his right tackle to score from the one. The point after was blocked leaving the Hawks trailing by one.

The defense, inspired by the long TD drive, forced Hamlin to punt the ball away after only three plays and Iowa Park took over at the Pipers' 47 yard line.

It took the Hawks just six plays to cover the distance with 37 of that coming on a touchdown pass from Jason Young to Petty. The ball was tipped by a Hamlin defender and Petty alertly hauled it in and ran in untouched to put his team on top 12-7 with 2:09 left to play in the third quarter. Young ran in for the two-point conversion to make the score 14-7.

"We made a couple of changes in our blocking assignments at halftime," head coach Weldon Nelms said. "And we just did a better job executing in the second half. It was good to go into the locker room still in the game where we could make some adjustments."

Just two plays later, the Hawks recovered a



Piper fumble and took over at their own 44 yard line with 1:53 still left in the third. Iowa Park moved to the Hamlin 43 and was forced to punt. Petty's punt sailed to the 10 yard line where it was fielded by the Pipers' Dekendrick Woodard who promptly took it 90 yards for the touchdown to make it 14-13 with 9:09 left in the game.

Hamlin decieded to go for two and was successful when Don Clawson caught the pass from Brown to put the Pipers up 15-14.

"Our kicking game is hurting us right now," Nelms said. "We were trying to kick the ball out of bounds but we were still in pretty good shape, we just didn't run in our lanes like we should have."

With the Hawks trailing by one and moving the ball, facing a second-and-17 from the Hamlin 23, Young's pass went off the hands of Greg Sullivan and into the hands of Hamlin's Bruce Cooper.

But once again the Hawk defense, which allowed the Pipers to run only nine offensive plays in the second half, held forcing a punt. Iowa Park took over at the Hamlin 18 and on first down, Young had his pass picked off by

James Clawson who returned it 25 yards for the score that put the Pipers on top 22-14.

The Hawks couldn't get any closer than their own 42 as time expired.

#### **Oatmeal-Date Cookies**

2 cups white sugar 2 cups brown sugar

2 cups shortening

4 eggs

1 tsp. salt

2 tsps. baking soda 3 1/2 cups flour (all-purpose)

3 cups oats

1 cup coconut 1 cup dates or raisins

1 cup chopped nuts

Cream sugars and shortening. Add eggs and mix well. Mix salt, soda and flour together and add to mixture. Then add remaining four ingredients to the mixture and blend well. Drop mixture by spoonfuls on baking sheet and bake 7 minutes at 375 degrees. This make a big batch of moist cookies.

1 can (46 ozs.) beef broth

2 cups water

1 can (28 ozs.) whole peeled tomatoes,

2 medium potatoes, peeled and diced 1/2 small head of cabbage, shredded 1 pkg. (9 oz.) frozen cut green beans 2 medium zucchini, diced

1 can (16 oz.) red kidney or white cannellini beans, drained

1 1/2 cups pasta in a kid-friendly shape

Sait and pepper to taste Grated Parmesan or Romano cheese

In a large, heavy soup pot, heat the oil over medium-high heat. Add the celery, carrots, and onion. Cook, stirring frequently for seven to ten minutes or until the vegetables are tender. Add the broth, water, tomatoes, potatoes, cabbage, and green beans. Cover and simmer for one hour, stirring occasionally. Add the zucchini, beans, and pasta and simmer fifteen to twenty minutes longer, or until the pasta is tender. Season with salt and pepper and serve. Garnish with the grated cheese. Makes about 10 servings.

The flavor of the soup gets better as it ages - for up to a week in the refrigerator.

Late Saturday afternoon, firemen doused a grassfire on Love Road. Monday, they answered a call to put out a grassfire on Continental Road.



Anglers should not try to remove the tag from the fish, as this will injure the fish and may cause it to die.

The tagged fish ranged in size from 10 to 13 3/4 inches in length. Minimum length limit for largemouth bass at Lake Kemp is 14 inches, and all bass less than the minimum, including

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
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
