## Hawks to visit Pojoland

When Iowa Park travels to Springtown to take on the Porcupines Friday night at 7:30, the Hawks will be looking to snap a four-game losing streak and trying to get ready for the district opener next week against a tough Vernon squad.

Springtown comes into the game against the Hawks with a 2-2 record, thanks to a last-second come from behind win over Brewer last week.

The Porcupines downed Azle 32-9 to open the season before falling to Alvarado 33-9 and then blew a 21-0 halftime lead against Breckenridge to loose to the Buckaroos 26-21 in week three. Springtown had to rally to edge Brewer 22-19 last week to even its record at 2-2.

Offensively for the Porcupines, Dakon Doggett, a 180-lb. running back is joined by three juniors, quarterback Mark Mathis, running back Corey Gilley and fullback Donnie Hamilton. All have speed and run the ball well.

Mathis also has a good arm and looks to wide out Chris Caldwell, a 165-pound junior flanker as his favorite target in passing situations. Springtown's offensive line averages 210 pounds and does a good job providing both running lanes and time to pass the ball.

"They're not real big on the offensive side of the ball," Hawks' head coach Weldon Nelms said. "But they all have good speed, especially in the backfield. Their quarterback is a good runner and throws the ball fairly well and they're completing over 56 percent of their passes and for a high school team that's above average. They mix it up a lot on first downs and have a lot of the same similarities that Southlake had.

"We're real happy with the way our defense played against Southlake," Nelms added. "We shut down a pretty good football team except for a couple of mistakes and it will take another

effort like that to be successful against Springtown."

The Porcupines come into the game against the Hawks giving up a little over three touchdowns per game while scoring about the same in their first four games of the season.

"Defensively, they like to run a lot of different fronts to try to confuse your blocking assignments," Nelms said. "And with their speed they run to the ball real well. I think our type of offense with all the misdirection is a hardship to them and forces them to stay at home. They're a team that's up and down. They couldn't hold a 21 point lead against Breckenridge yet they came from behind last week with 40 seconds left to beat Brewer. We need to get on them early and I think it could be a big benefit to us.

"We've been making some good decisions on offense lately," Nelms

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## City approves requests

The city council awarded a bid and approved three requests during Monday night's regularly-scheduled meeting.

Jalyn Construction Co. submitted the lowest of four bids received to replace with larger pipe a sewer line along Chestnut Street.

The company's bid was \$109,415, most of which will be paid for with a grant from the Texas Community Development Program.

Two of the requests that were approved concerned water.

Steve Moody asked permission to tie onto an existing treated water line on Harmony Road, where he plans to build a home.

And H.K. Gregg sought permission to take untreated water from the transmission line that crosses his property, located between the city and Lake Buffalo, to fill a stock tank used by his cattle.

Administrator Mike Price told the council a tap and meter would be necessary in order to allow Gregg to get the water. However, Price said a minor leak in the line has been found, and the tap could be made when workers correct the leak.

Besides paying for the tap and meter, Gregg will be charged 80 cents per 1,000 gallons of raw water taken from the line.

Danny Skinner, chief of the Volunteer Fire Department, asked for a waiver of the city's solicitation ordi-

nance fee for a fund-raising activity.

He explained the firemen had contracted with a photography studio in Burkburnett to sell \$10 coupons for family portraits, and salespersons from the studio would be canvassing door to door in residential neighborhoods.

The Department is to receive \$10 for each coupon turned in by residents when they have their portraits taken during a two-day session Oct. 15-16.

All three of the requests were made during personal appearances before the council.

Also approved were authorizations for the city administrator to advertise two different projects.

One project is for bids to construct a six-inch water main and sewer lift station for Highland Park Addition, which is a new housing area north of US 287 and on the west side of FM 368.

The other project is the sale of surplus property, which will be held at 10 a.m. this Saturday at the city barn at 104 West Texas.

A resolution approved by aldermen was a bookkeeping measure that concerned a fund which had been established, but never used, to self insure workers' compensation.

Rates charged for workers' compensation insurance were lowered after the council had decided to establish the self-insurance fund. Monies in the fund will be returned to the general fund and water and sewer fund, it was explained.

Also approved was an ordinance amending the city's code which changes the requirements for certain lawn sprinkler control units.

The new code allows for the installation of double-check valves underground, if an air gap is created and all openings are plugged off when not in use.

Following a discussion on the city's library policy and procedure manual, the administrator was instructed to have the city attorney make a ruling on the legality of a requirement.

## Roberts' home a 'family affair'

It's definitely a "family affair" at the home of Rollin and Helen Dale Clark Roberts--and that includes their five children who now have homes of their own.

They all like most of the same things and like to plan things as a group. The entire Roberts family are sports fans and attend all Texas Christian University football games, no matter where they are played.

They all love to travel, and plan their vacations together.

Both Rollin and Helen Dale are graduates of TCU, as are four of their children. The one daughter who attended TCU three years, but graduated Midwestern State University, is a little embarrassed that she is the lone family member to be different.

But Helen Dale said, "We tell her that's alright, because a Clark family relative, Lee Clark, was instrumental in the beginning of MSU.

Mrs. Roberts, born and raised in Iowa Park, her roots go deep-- three generations deep. She is a descendant of the Clark and Dale families who came to Iowa Park in the early days and helped build the town and surrounding community.

And, there has been a member of one or both families in Iowa Park since the arrival of Z. P. and Mamie Dale in 1889 and the Clark family, who came in 1913.

Rollin is a native of Birmingham, Ala. Prior to attending Birmingham Southern College, he had served two years in the military. He and a friend from Florida decided when they returned to college they wanted to go to a Christian college. Rollin was raised in the First Christian Church, so they decided on TCU.

Helen was also attending TCU and they had a couple classes together. They both graduated in 1950. She started teaching second grade in Iowa Park. Rollin stayed in Fort Worth to work on his Masters Degree in Sec-

## Arrests solve two cases

The arrest of two young men Tuesday led to solving two cases Iowa Park police began investigating last week.

Jason Leigh Winkler, 17, and a juvenile were taken into custody on charges of theft from a vehicle.

The two reportedly took \$110 worth of food stamps Sept. 17 from a vehicle parked in the 1200 block of South Wall. They had been buying some items from stores with part of them and giving some away.

About \$45 worth of stamps were recovered.

During interrogation, it was determined the two also had committed criminal mischief, by vandalizing a home under construction in the 100 block of Valley Drive.

No charges were filed against them in the criminal mischief case, as the owner agreed to accept \$1,000 in restitution.

However, Winkler was placed in the county jail under \$1,000 bond on the food stamp theft complaint, and the juvenile was turned over to the county juvenile department.

A resident in the 900 block of West Louisa called police Sunday afternoon after having found what was believed to be a live grenade stored in a box.

A bomb squad from Ft. Sill came to the police station Monday, where the grenade had been turned in, and detonated it at the landfill.

Three 17-year-old males were arrested at 10:12 p.m. Saturday in the

1700 block of Northwest Access Road on charges of public intoxication.

Casey Brent Reed was released at 2:50 a.m. after posting a \$280 cash bond and signing a promise to appear; Arnold Deane Bruner was released at 7:50 a.m. after posting a \$130 bond, and John Leslie Frie III was released at 10:25 a.m. on a personal recognizance bond.

When police were called to a residence in the 900 block of South Wall at 12:09 a.m. Saturday, they took Earl Wayne Wilson, 30, into custody on a Class C assault to prevent family violence charge.

"At that time," Rollin said, "the Korean Conflict was escalating and Sheppard Air Force Base was looking for people to teach aircraft maintenance

Rollin and Helen Dale have devoted their lives to promoting the preservation of traditional family values, beginning in their own home.

They always took time out to be involved in their children's activities and take an active interest in what interested their children.

Both Rollin and Helen Dale worked with Camp Fire and he was cubmaster of Pact 236. He also coached Little League 15 years.

They both have always been very active in First Christian Church (Disciples of Christ), and have tried to set a Christian example for their children through the years.

By example, they have taught their children to "be the best that you

can be whatever your goal in life".

When Rollin went to work at Sheppard AFB, he wrote course materials for special training, then got into writing technical manuals. Three of those were put on sale to the general

public through the government printing office.

wrote performance recommendations for military personnel. He also worked with weapons system management when he was training manager, training wing field headquarters, specifically for F-15 aircraft, a fighter type plane. If the government bought or sold F-15s to any base in the world, Rollin set up the program for them.

During his civilian career he received numerous letters of commendation as outstanding civilian instructor. He was nominated for Training Manager of the Year of the entire Training Command, and received many outstanding performance ratings.

After his retirement Rollin received a medal for Outstanding Civilian Service to the Department of the Air Force.

Rollin is very active in the church and has taught fourth and fifth grade Sunday school 42 years. Both he and Helen have served as chairpersons of the church board, and both have served as elders and co-chairpersons of the Worship Department. He has attended the General Assemblies of the church, and has been involved in all phases of church work.

Rollin has assisted with the distribution of government commodities five years. He currently is serving as a board member of The Friendly Door.

Since his retirement, Rollin has been kept busy with family and church work. He likes to do yard work and garden and Helen always cans or freezes the harvest.

During her teaching career, Helen Dale developed the pilot program for Iowa Park's kindergarten at Kidwell. All kindergartens were combined in 1989.

In 1989 she was selected Outstanding Teacher of the Year by the Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce.

Helen Dale has just completed a four-year term on the Board of Department of Church Women of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ in the Southwest).

She has served as consultant for Christian Women's Fellowship for this area, and does workshops for the Women's Retreat, primarily on Worship.

She is currently serving as co-chairperson of Women's Luncheon at the Regional Assembly to be held in Wichita Falls Oct. 15.

Both she and Rollin are elders of the church and Rollin previously served as a deacon. Helen Dale has directed Bible School more than 40 years.

Each year now for about five years, Rollin and Helen Dale have made Mesquite Bean Jelly. They make it and give it to friends and prepare food baskets at Thanksgiving and Christmas to give away.

They have shared their recipe which was developed at Texas A&M.

In late summer or early fall pick a half bushel of mesquite beans at the stage when there is a slight amount of red color on the pods. Wash and break into small pieces.

Add 2 cups lemon juice, 3 or 4 qts. of water and cook one hour over low heat. Take five cups of the mixture and place in large kettle and bring to a boil. Add one box or one bottle of pectin jelling agent. Stir in well and bring to a good boil. Add 7 1/2 cups sugar and cook five minutes. Pour into glasses. Green or red food coloring may be added, or the jelly may be left its natu-

ral color, which is that of apple jelly.

Helen Dale's parents were the late Marshall (better known as Doc Tommy) and the former Helen Dale. He and his brother-in-law, Fenton Dale were partners in the Rexall Drug Store for many years.

The store was a gathering place especially for the young people. Helen Dale said she used to go to the drug store every Saturday and stay because there were always lots of people there.

She remembers the Indians always came in on Saturday in their native dress. They came to visit Tom Burnett, a widely known rancher in the early days of Iowa Park.

Rollin and Helen Dale seem to be doing their part in continuing the family saga of the Clarks and Dales, one of a long line of very stalwart individuals who devoted themselves to educational, religious and medical endeavors.

You can find the "shakers and movers" in Helen Dale's ancestry beyond the two generations that preceded her and left their influence on Iowa Park.

At least back to the mid-19th century, they gave of their time, their means and their caring to build the country, with education and religion always taking priority.

Helen Dale's mother and father, her grandmother Dale and grandfather

and grandmother, Dr. and Mrs. Frank Clark, were very devout members of the Christian Church. Her Grandmother Dale was a charter member of the Iowa Park Church.

Her Grandmother Clark's parents were pioneers in the early development of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ).

Her great-grandfather, Joseph Clark, who was "an educated gentleman among Texas pioneers", among other careers, was an evangelist.

Two of his sons, Helen Dale's great-uncles, Randolph and Addison Clark were founders of AddRan College and both were ministers of the Christian Church, who knew the importance of secular education as well as religious education.

A bronze sculpture of Randolph and Addison, the two brothers of Dr. Frank Clark, was dedicated on the campus of TCU in 1993, 121 years after they founded the college that became Texas Christian University.

Among the 60 descendants of the founders present for the dedication, which was attended by the Roberts and their children, was Randolph Clark's grandson, Dr. R. Lee Clark Jr., (now deceased) the founding director and guide of M.D. Anderson Hospital for Cancer Research, and then of the growing medical program that became the University of Texas at Houston.

Rollin and Helen Dale's children

are Marsha Stallard, who teaches kindergarten in Fort Worth. She has a daughter, Melanie; Mike, who is vice president of Morrison's Plumbing Supply of Fort Worth. He has two children, Tommy and Kimberly; Carey, who teaches home economics in Cedar Hill High School, and Patricia, Field Facility Administrator (office/personnel) manager for Raytheon at Sheppard AFB, and Ken, an agency manager with Practitioner Publishing Co., in Fort Worth.

If the Roberts had any doubt about the example they set for their children, their son, Ken, probably expressed the feeling for each of their children in a letter he wrote to his dad, which in part reads,

"I'm just writing to say that I realize you have worked extremely hard to educate us kids and I really appreciate it. I'm so proud and lucky to have you as a dad, you have been a great example and I hope I don't disappoint you."

All of their efforts in keeping their lives a "family affair" seem to have paid off, and think of the happy

memories they all will have in days to come.

"Of all our institutions, the family matters most, and in this decade of the 20th century, the stakes are higher than ever." (Editor of *Town and Country* magazine).

# As I See It. . . By Bob Hamilton



I've got a couple of questions on unrelated topics of distance and reasoning I'd like to pose to you.

Concerning distance, I'd like someone with the highway department to tell me why one should slow down before entering a curve, and speed up once in the curve.

I'll give you an example that I've mentioned to a few people, none of whom said they had ever paid any attention to the problem.

If you are coming to Iowa Park from the south, on FM 367-368, just before the "Y" where they separate there is a speed limit sign posted for 40 MPH.

Okay, you may respond, why shouldn't there be a need to slow down before entering a curve. And I can't disagree.

But 264 yards from the 40 sign, and 80 yards after leaving FM 367, the speed limit sign says 50 MPH. That's

just as you are getting into the steepness of the curve.

Do you suppose one crew worker knew what the other one was doing when those signs were posted?

Okay, if I've got you scratching your heads on that one, try this one on reasoning.

Our Wichita County commissioners court wants to protect rural homes and property against fire. They've demonstrated that over the years, by helping to fund the various departments' expenses.

But, according to news coming out of Monday's commissioners' meeting, they don't want to accept any responsibility for liability.

It appears all fire departments that respond to calls in the county and outside any cities, whether they are rural departments such as Wichita West and Kamay, have no liability coverage.

And if Iowa Park, Burk Burnett and Electra firemen go outside their city limits, the taxpayers of those three cities are liable for anything.

The commissioners apparently don't want that responsibility, they've said.

Talk about wanting your cake and eating it too.

Folks, if you live or own any property not inside the city limits of Iowa Park, Burk Burnett, Electra and Wichita Falls, I believe if I were you I'd be talking to my commissioners' court.

I think I'd want them to tell me how much fire protection they are going to provide me and mine.

It might have an effect on how I voted in the future, and issues to be discussed with candidates.

### Seeks historical information

Dear Sir/Madam:  
This is quite a strange request but I have high hopes that you might be aware of someone who might know something about my grandmother. Thank you in advance for even tolerating such a letter.

My grandmother's name is Theodocia Blair Terhune. Her obituary appeared in the Iowa Park Herald shortly after her death on April 23, 1912 in Lone Oak, Texas. My father was the younger of the two small children mentioned in the (typewritten) copy that I have. Her sister, Laura, died in 1908. My father was taken to be raised by his paternal grandparents and contact was lost for all practical purposes with the Blair family. My father, James Blair Terhune, is long since dead and I am trying to reconstruct some of the family tree.

In Laura's obituary, her father (my great grandfather) is mentioned. His name is John Sutter Blair and he died April 9, 1895. The copy (in Laura's

obit) mentioned that when he died he left a widow and 6 grandchildren (four girls and two boys). None are named. Laura and my grandmother will account for two of the girls but the rest are unknown to me. A Mrs. R.V. Murray is mentioned among the survivors but it is not clear if this is the married name of a sister. I should surely appreciate any information on these children that could be provided.

Continuing, my great grandmother's name is Mary Wilson Blair. Other than a note from another source that she was born Nov. 8, 1843, I have absolutely no information about her. I know she was alive and probably in Lone Oak in 1895. Any information about her would be appreciated. I'm hoping someone might know the names and information about her parents.

Thank you very much for taking the time to consider this. If there is a charge, please let me know.

## Trees offered by SWCD

It's time again for the annual wind-break and wildlife tree program from the Wichita Soil and Water Conservation District. These tree seedlings greatly enhance wildlife habitats and reduce wind erosion.

Trees offered are conifers and hardwoods. Conifers include evergreen varieties such as Afghanistan and Austrian pines, Arizona Cypress and Redcedar. Hardwoods include Aromatic Sumac (skunkbush), Catalpa, Desert Willow, Russian olive, Sandcherry, Honeylocust, Flameleaf sumac, Nanking Cherry, Green Ash, Little Walnut and Shumard oak.

Wildlife packages are also available again this year. The packages available for wildlife plantings include packets for deer, turkey, squirrel, and quail and pheasant. These packages contain four species of hardwoods best suited for the described wildlife.

Orders are currently being taken and the deadline for ordering seedlings is Feb. 16, at 2:00 p.m. There are limited numbers of each seedling available and are sold on a first-come, first-serve basis; therefore orders will be sent to the Texas Forest Service each Friday to ensure your species request. Payments are due upon ordering, please.

Mrs. Watson is a member of the Wichita County Historical Commission and the organizing executive and Volunteer Archivist at the County Archives.

She prepared the history and applications for two Texas Historical Markers, (Tom Lloyd Burnett Marker and the Tom Burnett Memorial Li-

brary Marker), is contributing writer and a member of the *Wichita Heritage Magazine* publishing committee since its inception.

Mrs. Watson also was contributing historical writer for the *Iowa Park Leader* during the centennial celebration, and has written a 28-page history booklet for First Christian Church of Iowa Park, and served nine years on the Iowa Park City Council.

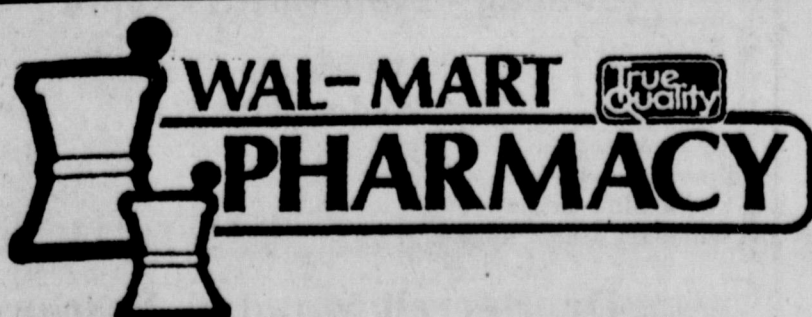

**AUSTIN** — State Comptroller John Sharp says casino gambling proponents will have a "rough row to hoe" in the Legislature because lawmakers are not faced with a money crunch that helped prompt passage of a state lottery.

State leaders recently announced a \$2.2 billion surplus following the first half of the two-year budget period.

Avoiding a tax increase in the next legislative session should be "a piece of cake," Sharp said.

But Jim Lee, president of the Texas Association for Casino Entertainment, said, "I'm certain they can use an extra billion dollars per biennium, which is what casinos will produce."

Lee said casino gambling would bring \$500 million to the state annually and create 70,000 direct and indirect jobs.

Last month, state Attorney General Dan Morales ruled that a constitutional amendment would be required before casino gambling is allowed in Texas.

**Flu shots are encouraged**

With the approach of autumn, it's time for older Americans to take precautions against the pneumonia and flu epidemics that are on the horizon.

Cost of both pneumonia vaccinations and flu shots is covered by Medicare Part B (Medical Insurance) for those age 65 and older.

The national Institute on Aging (NIA), American Lung Association, and the Department of Veterans Affairs have launched a coordinated campaign to encourage elderly people to be vaccinated this fall.

Statistics show they are twice as likely as younger persons to get pneumonia, according to the Department of Health and Human Services.

Only about 20 percent of those over age 65 have taken advantage of the availability of the pneumonia vaccine in the past.

Medicare beneficiaries do not need a doctor's prescription or supervision to have the vaccination covered by Medicare. And, beneficiaries do not pay a deductible or coinsurance amount.

Medicare Part B pays the reasonable approved amount for either shot. If the cost exceeds the approved amount, the beneficiary is responsible for the difference.

**Comptroller 'Liens' on Lawyers**

Meanwhile, the comptroller has begun filing liens against the property of Texas lawyers who have not paid their \$200 annual occupation tax.

Sharp's "Operation: Make 'Em Pay" targets some 850 lawyers who have refused to pay the tax for at least a three-year period and have ignored six past-due statements mailed to them since May 16.

Records show that 8,590 of the estimated 43,000 lawyers are not current on their occupation tax payments, and other tax-dodging lawyers may find liens against their property or freezes on their bank accounts if they don't pay up, Sharp said.

Sharp said the state is due an estimated \$650,000.

**DA Requests Probe of Truan**

State Sen. Carlos Truan, D-Corpus Christi, is denying wrongdoing after allegations were made that he illegally solicited his home county to become its insurance agent.

Nueces County District Attorney Carlos Valdez said he has asked the Texas Rangers to find out whether Truan's solicitation of Nueces County Judge Robert Barnes constituted official misconduct or conflict of interest, according to a report in the *Austin American-Statesman*.

The state's official misconduct law went into effect in January 1993, after Truan had been named Nueces County's agent of record, Truan pointed out, and called the allegations "Republican smear tactics." Truan, an incumbent, is being challenged by Republican Rex Moses on the Nov. 8 ballot.

After receiving a freedom of information request from Moses,

Barnes acknowledged the receipt of an unsigned letter dated September 1990, typed on Truan's official Senate stationery and bearing the name of a Truan aide.

Truan said the use of the stationery by an aide was inadvertent and apologized for the error.

**Bullock Gets NRA Support**

Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock, who is recovering from heart bypass surgery, has received re-election support from the National Rifle Association in his campaign against Republican Tex Lezar.

"Gun owners and sportsmen have always been among my strongest supporters, and I'm pleased to have their backing again," Bullock said. "Hunting and gun ownership are as much a part of Texas as armadillos, the Alamo and high school football."

Bullock, a Democrat, said the NRA noted his help in passing legislation that would have allowed Texans to carry concealed handguns as the reason for its support. Gov. Ann Richards vetoed that legislation.

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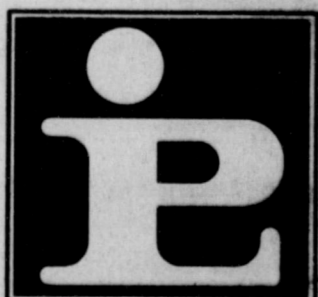
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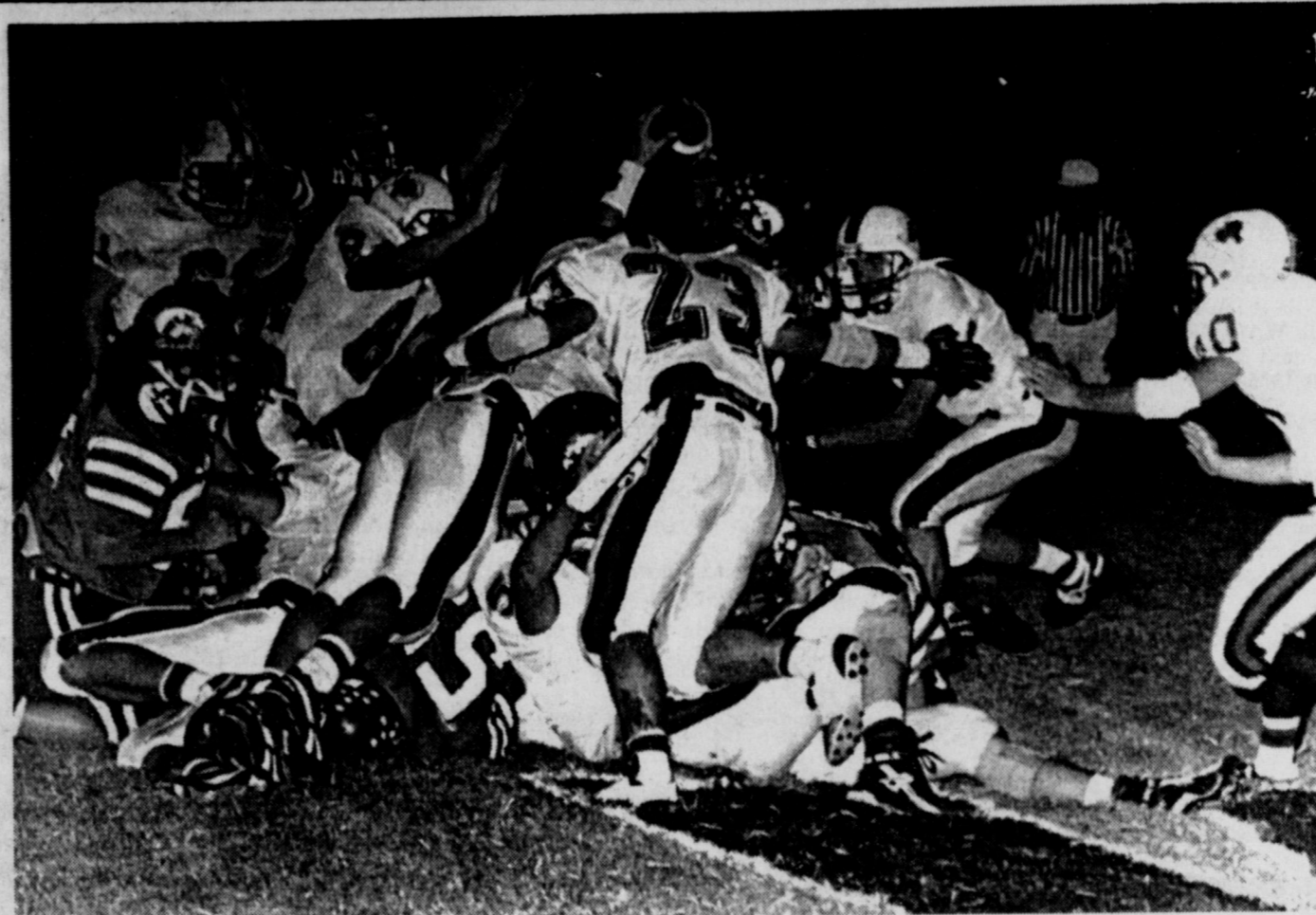

# Hawks almost pull it off

Despite what Iowa Park head football coach Weldon Nelms called his team's "best effort of the year by far," the Hawks came up short in a 22-7 loss to Southlake Carroll Friday night at Hawk Stadium.

But the score doesn't tell the story in this one.

When you looked at this game on Iowa Park's schedule at the start of the season you probably thought the Hawks would be doing good to stay within 40 points of the two-time defending Class 3A State Champion Dragons.

You would have never thought that with 1:56 left in the game that the Hawks would be within one play of tying the score, but that's exactly what happened.

With Iowa Park trailing 15-7 and facing a fourth-and-16 from its own 26 yard line, the Hawks went to the "old A&M trick play." Quarterback Jason Young intentionally threw the ball into the ground towards Robert Klinkerman, who had lined up behind the line of scrimmage near the Southlake sideline. Klinkerman took the ball on the first hop and threw to a wide open Corky Petty who had worked his way 20 yards behind the nearest Dragon defender. But the ball bounced off Petty's chest and fell to the ground ending the upset hopes of the Hawks.

"We'd worked that play into our offense earlier in the week and had planned to run it at some point in the game," Nelms said. "We executed it perfectly, we just didn't catch the ball."

The Hawks started out by fumbling the ball on the second play of the game and turning the ball over to Southlake at the IP 12 just 44 seconds into the contest. But the Hawk defense was up to the test and forced the Dragons to settle for a 32-yard field goal by Kris Brown, who plans to sign with Nebraska and is considered to be one of the best high school kickers in the country.

On their next possession, the Hawks moved the ball to the Southlake 37 but were forced to turn the ball over on downs following a very questionable call on a fourth down run by Chad Simpson.

Simpson, who finished the night with a game high 95 yards rushing on 21 carries, appeared to have made the necessary yardage for the first down but the ball was spotted just short killing a nice drive by the Hawks.

Iowa Park's defense held the Dragons and forced a fumble that was recovered by the Hawks at the 44 and seven plays later. Young dove over from the one to give the Hawks a 7-3 lead with 2:27 left in the opening quarter following the point after by Clint Scobee.

The score remained the same until the 2:48 mark of the second quarter when Brown drilled a 34-yard field goal to cut the IP lead to 7-6.

Brown gave his team a 9-7 halftime lead when he split the uprights from 31 yards out with no time remaining in the first half.

Southlake took the second half kickoff and

marched 63 yards in 10 plays to take a 15-7 advantage with 7:08 left to play in the third.

Twice the Hawks moved the ball inside the Dragons 30 only to turn the ball over on downs to end what would have been the tying touchdown had Iowa Park been successful on the two-point conversion. Southlake added a late touchdown following the dropped pass to make the final 22-7.

"This was by far our best effort of the year," Nelms said. "If you graded the kids on effort you would have to give them an A+, they did a super job against a real tough football team. If we'd had this kind of effort against any of the three teams we've played earlier this year we'd have won all three games. Coach Ledbetter (Southlake's head coach) said he thought "We outplayed them and I agree we just came up short. We gave ourselves a chance to win the game in the end and that's all you can ask for against a team like Southlake."

## Conflicts confusing

Dear Congressman Sarpaluis: I attended your meeting Friday morning in Denton and, after having time to reflect on what was said both by you and some of the other attendees, I feel compelled to make the following comments.

I listened closely to what you said and I feel that maybe you are so involved in explaining yourself that you aren't hearing what you are saying. Specifically, your comment about John Deere stock and how it is going up because of the increase in the tax break for purchasing new equipment. Do you realize that what you are saying is that tax breaks stimulate the economy? Another example that you didn't use, but you voted for is the repeal of the luxury tax. The repeal of this tax is designed to stimulate the sales of the previously depressed market for these high dollar goods. Tax breaks to stimulate the economy... again? It is obvious that you and others that voted for President Clinton's tax bill, know what will stimulate the economy but voted for the opposite.

"Trickle down" is a big negative buzz phrase at the present time but do you realize that when you fight against any idea that will cost jobs i.e. Pantex, you are saying that the "trickle down" from the payroll is vital for the economy of the area. Another way this is sad is when the Chambers of Commerce mention that the money will roll 5-7 times through the community. If "trickle down" is so bad, why do cities, and for that matter you, fight so hard to keep it?

Do you realize that you contradicted yourself numerous times? For instance you said that entitlement programs can't be cut but then said, "unless we change the law." So they can be cut, but only if someone has the guts to sponsor the bill. You mentioned a couple of other programs followed by the same thing, "unless we change the law". Why don't you consider changing the law?

Interest on the national debt is being reduced (you said it couldn't be done) by the refunding of the debt at lower rates. Unfortunately, the Treasury is refinancing with short term debt, not locking in the long term rates. Now I don't understand this at all because President Clinton is touting the lower

interest rates and the fact that homeowners are stampeding to refinance their mortgages at the lower rates thereby having more spending money (is this "Trickle Down" again?) which will stimulate the economy. So if it is good for the citizens why is it bad for the government?

But, with the tax changes both made and planned, to afford these people would I have to raise the price of my products to such a level that sales would suffer. Consequently, I will contract out a number of functions I would like to have in house but now don't make economic

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# GARDENING HINTS

By MARK TERNING, COUNTY AGENT - HORTICULTURE

An age-old, very damaging and difficult to see garden pest has now met its match.

These unseen enemies are actually nematodes. Nematodes are microscopic, worm-like animals that often live in the soil and certain species of which will feed on the roots of developing plants.

Although several types of nematodes are found in vegetable and flower gardens, the root knot nematode, which causes very distinctive galls or swellings on plant roots, is the most damaging.

In fact, the root knot nematode is the single most important pest in Texas gardens, with conservative estimates showing at least 50 percent of home gardens being damaged by this underground enemy.

Plants infested with root knot nematodes are usually stunted, yellow in color and often die prematurely. When removing unproductive plants, examine root systems for the presence of characteristic "knots" or galls (okra, cucumbers, or susceptible tomato varieties are good indicator plants).

Roots should be dug and not pulled from the soil when symptoms are sought. It may even be necessary to wash soil from roots in order to see more definite symptoms.

With legumes such as beans, and peas, don't confuse the beneficial nitrogen nodules with root knot nematode injury.

Nitrogen nodules, attached to the side of the root, can be removed with your thumbnail without destroying the root. Root knot galls, however, are formed within the root and cannot be removed without root destruction.

Traditionally, nematode control has emphasized the use of soil fumigants. There are no longer any soil fumigants available for homeowner usage.

There is hope, however, with Elbon Rye. After several years of testing, cereal rye has proven to be the fastest growing, most tolerant annual grass available to home gardeners in Texas.

Gardeners should be careful to purchase "Elbon" cereal rye rather than annual rye, however. Annual rye is used to overseed lawns and is not recommended for use in your vegetable garden.

There are many advantages to following this practice of planting cereal rye in your garden.

It beautifies this otherwise drab winter area with welcome greenery. It protects your precious topsoil from wind and water erosion. When incorporated in late winter, it will add high

levels of organic matter to the garden soil.

This type of "green manure" crop decomposes rapidly and does a wonderful job of (1) making your sticky, heavy clay soil more friable, easier to work, better drained and more conducive to root growth next spring or (2) helping a sandy soil hold much needed moisture and nutrients.

This additional organic matter also helps by increasing the populations and activities of nematode-trapping fungi, predatory nematodes (yes, there are many helpful nematodes as well as a few "baddies"), and of encouraging the internal parasites of nematodes.

As if these benefits were not enough, research has shown "Elbon" cereal rye to be one of the most effective non-chemical controls for root knot nematodes. The roots of "Elbon" rye serve as a trap crop for this pest.

Once nematodes enter the cereal rye roots, they cannot escape and are doomed.

When the rye decomposes, it releases organic acids which further reduce nematode populations while helping to somewhat reduce the alkalinity of certain garden soils.

In that portion of the garden not being used for winter vegetables, you can start planting cereal rye right now and continue through late fall. It can be planted as late as early November in North Central Texas and still produce a good stand by mid January.

Cereal rye can be planted by merely seeding directly on top of the garden soil. Apply seed at the rate of 1 to 1 1/2 pounds per hundred square feet of garden area to ensure good coverage and adequate growth.

Rake seeds in lightly and keep moist until they're established. Once the rye is established, be sure to water regularly and to fertilize lightly every month for maximum growth.

Shred rye (before it forms seed heads) with string trimmer or lawn mower and till into the soil one month prior to planting so that the extensive and very beneficial rye root system will have adequate time to decompose.

Check with your local nursery, garden center, or feed store for Elbon Rye this fall.

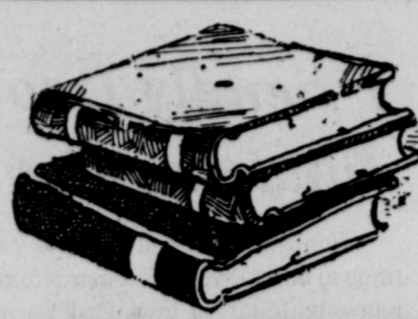
