Whoop-T-Do set Saturday

The weather forecast promises to be great Saturday, which is one of the biggest activity days of the year in Iowa Park.

Whoop-T-Do, a carnival-like activity without the big rides, will be set up on Wall and Cash streets, beginning at 9 a.m. and concluding around 4 p.m.

Sponsored by the Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce, Whoop-T-Do is designed to provide an activity between Friday night's football game and Saturday night's Ex-Student Association banquet, for people here attending homecoming.

The event also provides an opportunity for non-profit organizations in the school district to have fundraising activities, such as food booths, games, etc.

Throughout the day, choirs, bands and other groups perform on a stage for the audience's entertainment.

And a highlight each year is the first program of the day. Starting at 9 a.m., the annual Turtle Trot will get underway, with the winning entry be awarded \$25 by Dutton Funeral Home.

Could it happen again this year?

Hawks hosting Lions Friday

Could it happen again this year?

Last year, the Hawks jumped up and stunned the third-ranked Vernon Lions 17-14 after all the critics had written Iowa Park off.

This year's game will be the Hawks' homecoming game and it follows an emotionally tough loss to Jacksboro. So with all of the distractions and last week's game still fresh on the minds of all the players, how will Iowa Park respond this week against Vernon?

"On paper, people wouldn't give us much of a chance to beat them," Iowa Park head coach Weldon Nelms said. "But our kids remember last year and know it can be done and they really feel like they can beat Vernon. I look for us to step it up and rise to the occasion. When I took this job, people told me that these kids would play Vernon tough no matter how they played the rest of the year. They just always seem to get up for this game."

Vernon, 3-3 overall and 1-0 in district play, started the season with a pair of losses to two Oklahoma schools. The Lions lost to Altus 29-27 and dropped a 21-20 decision to Frederick the following week before rebounding against Wichita Falls High School 43-23. Vernon came back to beat Burk Burnett 33-28 in week four but suffered its first shutout since being blanked by the Hawks in 1986 when Hirschi held the Lions scoreless in a 9-0 victory. Vernon opened district 3-

3A play last week with a 14-0 win over Graham.

The Hawks have held their own against the Lions over the last 24 years as Vernon holds a slim 13-10-1 record over Iowa Park.

"Vernon is Vernon," Nelms said. "They are always a talented group of kids that have been in the same system for a long time. Their talent level might be down a bit this year. They lost a real good quarterback last year in Enloe to go along with some other key losses. Kyle Williams has done a good job running the offense so far this year for them but right now I think they might be stronger defensively than on offense. They have some real big kids up front that control the line of scrimmage which allows their linebackers to run to the football."

The big kids coach Nelms is talking about along the defensive front line average 224 pounds.

Offensively, the Lions are a team that likes to use their speed and get outside. Joining Williams in the backfield for Vernon are 195-pound senior fullback Sjhontont Fanner and Marcus Montes, a 160-pound junior tailback. Williams' favorite receiver is Brandon Favors a big 195-pound senior wide out who has good speed and good hands as well.

Vernon is averaging 245 total yards per game with 153 yards rushing and 92 passing. The Lions are giving up

258 yards per game, 165 on the ground and 93 through the air. Their offensive line averages 218 pounds per man.

"They like to get the ball in the backs' hands and get outside with their speed," Nelms added. "We're going to have to force them to drive the ball on us and not give up any big plays to be successful. We have to be able to mix things up on offense and throw the ball well to counter their big front line."

When asked about all the homecoming activities surrounding this week's game coach Nelms just smiled and said. "Coaches are funny, they don't like change. I've seen games like this where the kids came out really focused and other times where I thought

Prior to the big football game between the Hawks and Vernon Lions, the homecoming queen will be announced and crowned. That is to start at approximately 7:10 p.m., with the game following at 7:30. Candidates this year are Dani Goin, Brandi Catlin, Kelli Thompson and Lori Kasperek, all seniors.

A registration table will be set up next to the concession stand, where former students are asked to register. From that list, a name will be drawn for the honor of "coming-home queen."

Two events are scheduled at the Recreational Activities Center following the football game.

Besides a dance for IPHS students, an informal gathering will be held for the Class of '79. The 15-year reunion is described by coordinators Jeff Watts, Cathy Duncan and Jo Lynn Cockrum as a "come-and-go" party.

Saturday is always a big day for everyone, especially former students.

Starting at 9 a.m., the traditional Whoop-T-Do, sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce, provides entertainment and activities for "home-comers," which is exactly its purpose.

The old Tanner Building at Cash and Wall, now occupied by the Friendly Door, will serve as a gathering place for former students to rest and visit during the day.

From 1 to 3 p.m., a party will be held for all members of the Class of 1964. It will be held at Faith Baptist Church, 411 South Wall, according to coordinators Gay Campbell Williams and Judy Calloway Reid.

The weekend's activities will climax with the annual Ex-student Association's banquet that evening at the high school cafeteria.

Continuing a tradition established a few years ago, all classes whose year ends in "four" will receive special recognition and members are encouraged to sit together during the banquet.

Storm costs to be told

Damage from the Oct. 3 hail storm will have the attention of the trustees, when the school board meets tonight.

The meeting is to begin at 8:30 p.m., instead of the usual 7:30, in the junior high school library.

The agenda calls for two declarations of emergency, including: replacing four airconditioner coils on the northwest wing and another on the music room at Bradford Elementary; and to replace the roof of the transitional living center at the junior high school.

In addition, Supt. Glen Mitchell is to give the board a detailed report on other damaged areas on school property.

Other items on tonight's agenda include:

- * accept/reject bids for junior and senior high classroom furniture;

- * accept/reject student transfer request;
- * hold second reading of School Board Policy Update 45.

Other business on the agenda include reports on cafeteria, transportation and taxes, as well as accepting resignations and employing personnel.

Supt. Mitchell, besides his report on hail damage, is to report enrollment figures, the TASA/TASB convention, T-Star, a school board planning meeting to be held Oct. 22, and study a tax abatement request by Cryovac.

Potato Casserole

- 2 lbs. frozen hash browns (thawed)
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 1/2 cup chopped onions
- 1 can cream of chicken soup

Mix the above ingredients together and add 2 cups grated cheese and 2 small cartons of sour cream. Pour into a 13x9x2 casserole. Mix 2 cups crushed corn flakes with 1/4 cup butter and sprinkle over top. Bake in 350 degree oven 45 minutes.

Tallarin

- 1 - 8 oz. pkg. small noodles (cooked)
- 1 whole chopped bell pepper
- 2 chopped garlic buttons
- 1 can Rotel tomatoes & chilies
- 3/4 can water
- 2 lbs. ground beef
- 2 large chopped onions
- 1 lb. grated cheese
- 1 can tomato soup
- 1 tsp. salt
- 2 tsps. chili powder

Brown meat, onion, bell pepper and garlic. Add chili powder, tomato soup and rotel. Layer cooked noodles, meat sauce and cheese into large casserole dish. Leave enough cheese to sprinkle over top for the last 20 minutes of cooking. Bake 1 hour at 300 degrees.

Red Velvet Cake

- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 eggs
- 2 oz. red food coloring
- 2 Tbsps. cocoa
- 2 cups flour
- Pinch salt
- 1 tsp. soda
- 1 cup buttermilk
- 1 Tbsp. vinegar
- 1 tsp. butter flavoring
- 1 tsp. vanilla

Cream shortening, sugar, eggs, red food coloring, vanilla and cocoa; mix well. Add salt, flour alternately with buttermilk. Add soda, vinegar

and butter flavoring and blend in. Pour into greased pan and bake 30 minutes at 350 degrees. Used a powdered sugar frosting on cake when done.

Phyllis's Chicken Casserole

- 4 chicken breasts
- 3 med. potatoes, sliced into rounds
- 5 carrots, sliced into rounds
- 1 can green beans
- 2 cans cream of chicken soup
- 1 sliced onion

Place chicken breasts in oblong pan. Place potatoes, carrots, green beans and onion on top of chicken. Pour soup over all the other ingredients. Do not dilute soup. Cover pan and place in 400 degree oven. Cook for 1 hour and 15 minutes.

Each month the Iowa Park Garden Club selects a yard for the honor of Yard of the Month. The same yard cannot be chosen but once every five years.

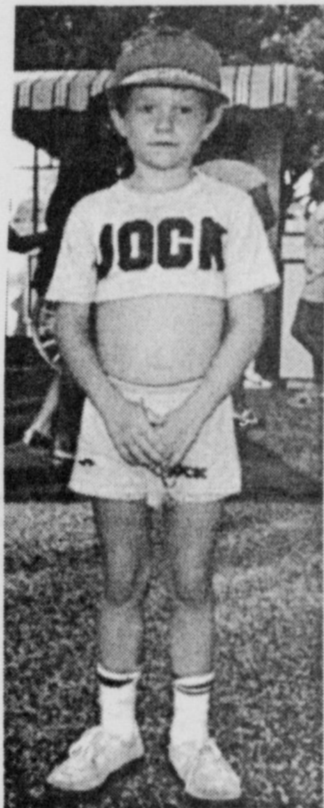

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Jennifer Duggins guest speaker for Amity Study Club program

Jennifer Duggins, on staff as physical therapist at Bethania Health Care Center, presented the program for Amity Study Club Monday evening in the home of Amy Brown. Annetta Reusch was co-hostess.

Mrs. Duggins, the former Jennifer Welch, graduated Iowa Park High School in 1990. She attended Midwestern State University two years and graduated from the University of Texas Health Science Center in San Antonio.

The speaker began by giving the bad and good news about a person's health.

She said, "The bad news is that we can't live forever. The good news is that we can stay young." She explained her statement by saying that with good health habits, people can be physically 30 years younger than those with poor health habits.

Mrs. Duggins said that aging, like health, is now known to be under personal control to a much greater extent than previously thought.

She emphasized that almost all aspects of aging can be modified through exercise.

The speaker explained and demonstrated the three types of exercise: strengthening, stretching, and aerobic. She said that each type of exercise is needed and helpful, however, she pointed out that aerobic exercise is important for all ages.

Mrs. Duggins encouraged club members by explaining that it is never too late to begin aerobic exercise. She added that it is important for people who do not exercise should start at a very low level and build toward a goal for the next year.

Mrs. Duggins shared handouts with club members and explained much of the material. She advised members to take care of themselves in every way in order to avoid signs of aging and feel more vigor, stamina and wellness in daily activities.

I mentioned that I went to my reunion in Hereford a few years back, actually we've lived here long enough

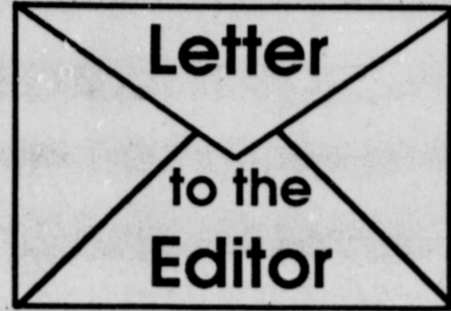
now that I relish seeing "youngun's" coming back to Iowa Park who don't get to make it very often. It's a real treat when I get to renew our acquaintance.

Letter to the Editor

An asset to the town
Dear Sir,

On Tuesday October 4th my son Thomas was travelling from Colorado to Texas when he experienced mechanical trouble with his 1962 International Scout. He was moving to Chicago and he had all his belongings in his truck. He planned to visit with us in Texas on his way to Chicago. He managed to reach the FINA service station at Jackson (Johnson) road and 287 before his truck died. For the next eight hours the two young men at the service station helped him in every way. There was a problem with the alternator and electrical wiring that was very difficult to repair. My son and the two young men at the service station worked on the truck for most of the day but were unable to repair it.

Later that afternoon my son called me in DeSoto and a mechanic friend of mine and I drove up to Iowa Park. It was raining very hard when we arrived and the two young men at the station let us push the truck under the gas pump overhang so we could work on the truck out of the rain. We were finally able to get the truck running. It turned out to be a very difficult wiring problem. We left Iowa Park at 7:30 pm and returned safely to DeSoto.

Re-elected to district board

Barry Mahler of Iowa Park and Bill Brockriede of Burkburnett were re-elected to the Wichita Soil and Water Conservation District Board of Directors Oct. 4.

Brockriede represents Zone One of the district and Mahler represents Zone Two.

Purpose of the Wichita SWCD, with headquarters in Iowa Park, is to promote sound and responsible soil and water conservation programs on agriculture lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers, ranchers, and local community entities on conservation matters.

The board of directors coordinate the conservation efforts of various local, state, and federal agencies and other organizations. It has authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purposes.

The five members serving on the district board of directors are responsible for district policies and producers for carrying out the district program within the framework of the Texas Soil Conservation District law. In Texas there are 213 soil and water conservation districts. Each is a legal subdivision of the state government organized by local agricultural landowners with the assistance of the Texas Soil and Water Conservation Board.

Unlike most other legal subdivisions of state government, SWCDs do not have the powers of taxation or eminent domain. All conservation programs managed by the district are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator or other potential users of the SWCD programs.

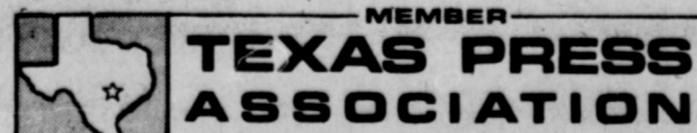

School Bus Safety Week October 16 - 22

Reprinted from the Sept. 1994 issue of Texas PTA Communicator

School buses are one of the safest forms of transportation in the nation - nearly 2,000 times safer than the family car.

The reality of school bus safety is that more children are hurt outside a bus than inside one.

Durham Transportation encourages all PTAs to publicize the following safety tips to children, parents and motorists:

For Children--

When you get off the bus, take five giant steps away from the bus, out of the "danger zone."

Cross in front of the bus, and make sure you can see the driver and the driver can see you.

Never go back for anything, and never bend down near or under bus.

For Parents:

Assure your children you won't get mad if they don't go back for a jacket they've left on the bus or school work they've dropped under a wheel.

Encourage them to sit quietly in their seats and follow the driver's instructions on bus safety.

For Motorists:

Stop when the bus' warning lights are flashing or the "stop arm" comes out.

Texas PTA's legislative efforts during the 73rd Legislative Session (1993) assisted in getting the penalty

for passing a school bus that is loading or unloading children enhanced from "no less than \$50 and no more than \$200" to "not less than \$200 and not more than \$1,000."

On conviction of a second or subsequent offense, the court may order that the person's driver's license be suspended for a period of up to six months beginning on the date of conviction.

Jacksboro edges Hawks, 20-14

Despite coming into the district opener with an 0-5 record, the Iowa Park Hawks haven't made any excuses for the way they've played thus far, and aren't making any now. But Friday night's game against Jacksboro gave them every reason to start.

The Hawks came out on the short end of a 20-14 decision to the Tigers, who benefitted from several calls that forced Iowa Park to battle back against Jacksboro all night long.

Midway through the opening quarter, the Hawks moved the ball to the Tiger 8 after starting on their own 27 thanks in part to the running of Corkey Petty. Petty, who finished the night with a season high 109 yards rushing on just 12 carries, had runs of 33, 16, and 11 yards to help Iowa Park move into scoring territory. But a holding call on second-and-4 and a 4-yard loss on the next play forced the Hawks to try a long 41-yard field goal by Clint Scobee that fell just short leaving the score 0-0 with 2:21 left in the first quarter.

On the second play of the second quarter, the Tigers mishandled an Iowa Park punt and the loose ball was recovered by Tony Galliton for the Hawks. Iowa Park took over on its own 37 and quickly marched 63 yards in only four plays to take a 6-0 lead. The drive was highlighted by an 18-yard reception by Oddus Merrifield from Robert Klinkerman and a fourth-and-1 run by Jason Young to keep the drive alive. Petty finished the drive by sweeping left and dashing the final 26 yards to the end

zone to give his team an early lead. Scobee tacked on the point after to make the score 7-0 with 9:01 left in the first half.

The scoreboard operator didn't have long to rest before Jacksboro's Yancey Laake took the ensuing kickoff 83 yards for a touchdown to cut the lead to 7-6 just seconds later. A bad snap on the extra point left the Tigers trailing by one.

The Hawks moved the ball to the Jacksboro 27 on their next possession only to fumble it away with 6:28 remaining on the clock.

The Tigers took over and marched to the Iowa Park 5 ten plays later and had four tries from there to find the end zone but the Hawk defense stiffened and forced Jacksboro to try a 21-yard field goal with 1:05 left to play in the first half. Stewart Chalmers' kick sailed wide left and the Hawks held on to a slim 7-6 lead.

The Hawks opened the third quarter turning the ball over twice on fumbles with the second coming at their own 25. The Tigers took over and ran off seven plays before facing a big third-and-9 from the 10. On the play both the Tiger receiver and the Hawk defender fell to the ground in the end zone and the closest official signaled an incomplete pass. But another official from the far side of the field ran in and called interference on Iowa Park giving Jacksboro a first-and-goal at the 3 as the third quarter came to an end with the Hawks still clinging to a 7-6 lead.

The Tigers' Will Ramage plowed over from

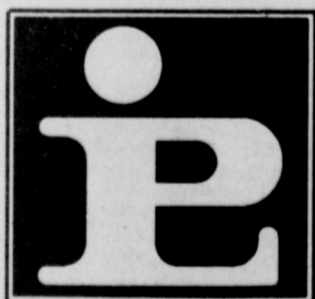
the 1 on the first play of the fourth quarter to make the score 12-7. Matt Fryar ran in for the two-point conversion to boost the Tiger lead to 14-7. Jacksboro stretched its lead to 20-7 on its next possession when Ty Pippin hit Chalmers with a 50-yard TD pass.

The Hawks pulled to within 20-14 with 3:22 left to play when Klinkerman hit Petty in stride with a 35-yard touchdown pass to keep Iowa Park's hopes alive.

The Hawk defense forced the Tigers to punt with 2:33 remaining giving Iowa Park one last chance but on fourth-and-1 from the Tiger 41 Chad Simpson's run was marked short of the first down by the officials to end the threat.

"This was definitely our toughest loss of the year," Iowa Park head coach Weldon Nelms said. "We felt like we played well enough and deserved to win. The officiating was a big factor. It seemed like every call was a big momentum swing, but I still felt like the kids were going to come back and win despite all the adversity."

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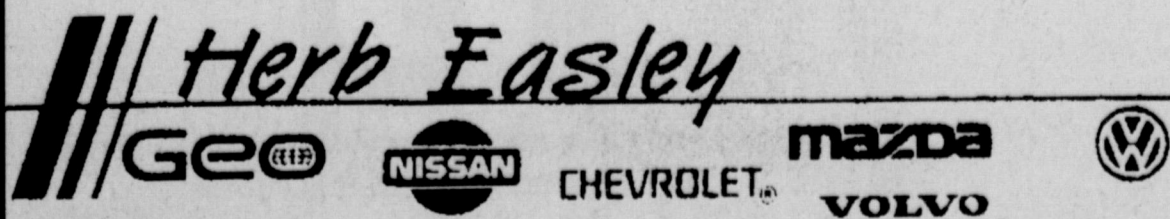

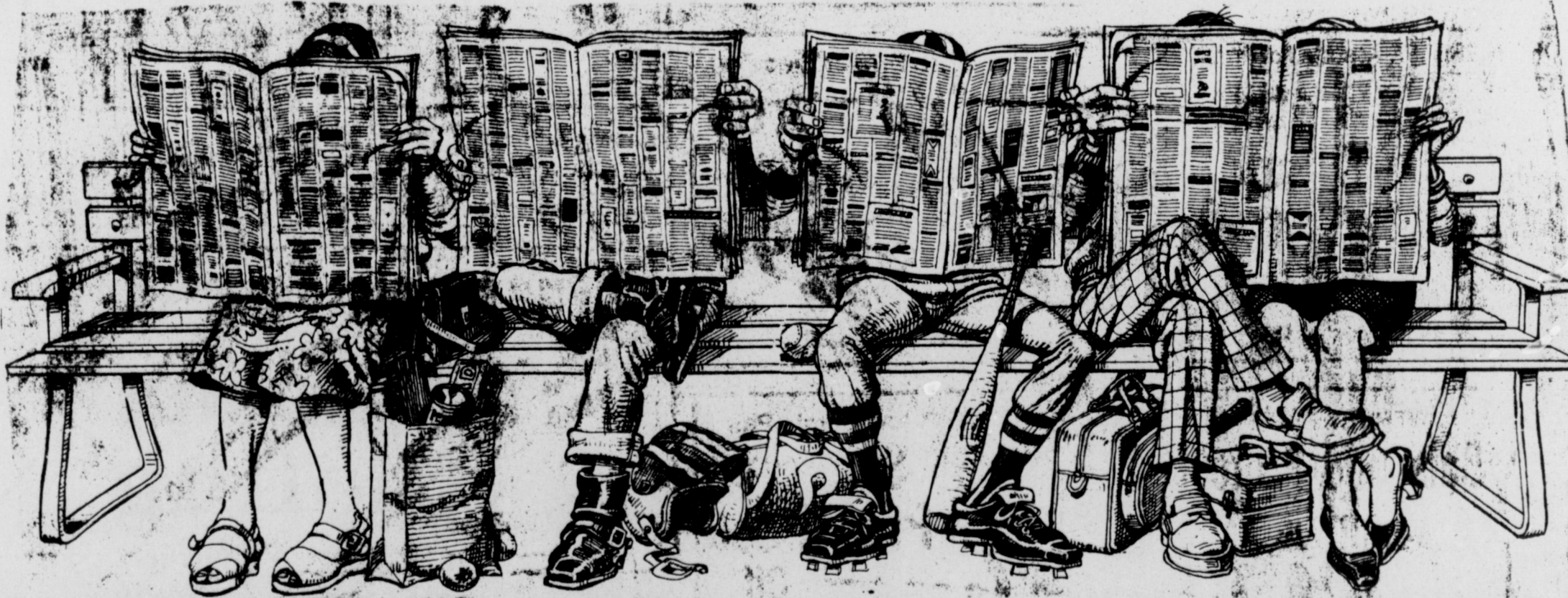


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City to allow stockmen water

Stockmen in the immediate Iowa Park area who need water for their animals will be allowed to get what they need from Lake Iowa Park, so long as they make contact at city hall first.

That was the decision of the city council Monday night, following a request from Robert Wilcox.

Wilcox explained that he has been purchasing treated water and hauling it in his own tanker to three metal tanks for his cattle.

After explaining that his stock appreciate raw water rather than treated water, he asked permission to draw

water from Lake Iowa Park, which is near his farm. He did not ask for the water free, and said he would gladly pay for it.

His was the second request to purchase raw water for a stock tank. At the previous council meeting, H.K. Gregg's request to tap a transmission line that cuts across his property was allowed, but had to be metered.

Because Wilcox was asking for considerably less water than Gregg, and because he was not taking water from a transmission line, he would be allowed the water at no cost.

However, he and any other area

stockmen must go to the city hall for a permit before taking any water. That, and the fact that loading will only be allowed at the boat ramp area on the east end of the dam, regains the city's control of its resources, it was explained.

In other action, the council approved all bids received at a surplus sale Saturday, discussed leasing grazing rights at Lake Buffalo, approved two resolutions and an ordinance for a stop sign.

The city realized \$5,240.75, most of which was from two vehicles, when surplus equipment was sold at auction last weekend. All bids must be accepted by the council before the purchases are consummated, according to sale specifications.

One of the two resolutions approved was a bookkeeping measure, necessary to write off bad debts owed the city for utility bills.

The 12-month balance, which began April 1993, amounted to \$3,810.45. An additional \$6,369.06 owed by Highland Cemetery Association also was written off. That is a traditional action by city councils of Iowa Park.

The second resolution expressed the city's opposition to unfunded state

and federal mandates. Copies will be sent to all elected officials, urging appropriate funding for all future legislation.

The city's code of ordinances was amended to add a stop sign at the southern entrance of Park Place Circle and Johnson Road. Such ordinances are necessary for enforcement purposes.

A decision to advertise for grazing rights at Lake Buffalo was postponed so suggestions of details could be written and considered at the next meeting.

At least two topics mentioned during the general discussion period are to be on the council's meeting agenda in the near future. They are a review of city's investment funds and a possible banning of all guns at Lake Iowa Park and Lake Buffalo.


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

Student foils burglary

A student returning home after school Tuesday apparently disrupted the burglary of his home in the 1000 block of East Ruby.

The student told police that when he was dropped off in front of his home, he could see a red pickup in the back yard, and when he walked around the house, he saw a large man get into the vehicle and drive away.

A television set had already been taken from the house, but was left in the back yard. Signs in the living room also indicated the intruder had designs on taking other items, had he not been interrupted.

Police are continuing their investigation, based on what information the student was able to provide.

There was another burglary, however, that apparently was not interrupted.

Sometime between Oct. 1 and 5, someone took an estimated \$1,000 worth of items from a storage shed at a home in the 1300 block of North Fourth. The items included a chain saw, dust-buster, fishing rods, suitcases, tools and a ceiling fan, according to the report.

A camper shell left by a local resident at a business in Wichita Falls to be sold on consignment was reportedly stolen sometime in August, and the owner spotted it here in Iowa Park.

After filing a report of having sighted the shell Tuesday of last week, the owner, the man in possession and a witness met in the office of Justice of the Peace Bill Robinson, for a property hearing.

Judge Robinson found ownership with the original owner. Then, the owner settled with the man in possession for a \$400 payment. The judge was satisfied that the man who was in

possession of the shell did not steal it in Wichita Falls.

Four arrests were made during the past week, according to the police blotter.

A patrolman took James Russell Sims, 20, into custody in the 200 block of East Poe Thursday, on two outstanding traffic warrants, for exhibition of acceleration and speeding.

Sims was released after paying fines of \$290.50, according to the report.

Another officer on patrol shortly before 11 p.m. Tuesday noticed a car weaving on East Ruby, and stopped the driver. All three male occupants were taken into custody on public intoxication charges.

They included Stanley Wayne Britt, 27, Russell Dean Eaton, 24, and Tommy Lynn Darby, 36. All were later released after signing promises to appear in municipal court Oct. 25.

One report of criminal mischief was turned in to police during the week. The owner of a van said a side window of the vehicle was broken out sometime Sunday night while it was parked in the 1300 block of Westridge, apparently by a pellet or BB gun.

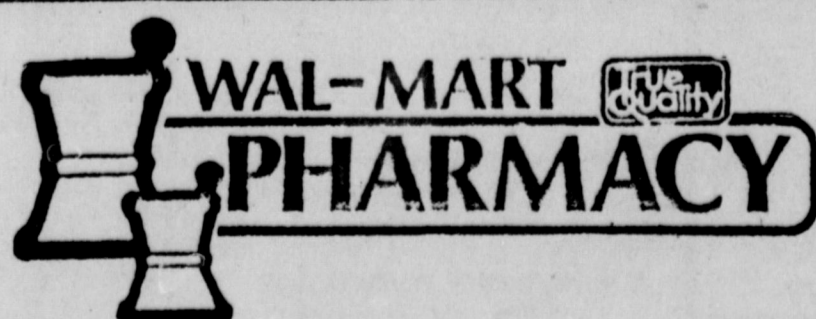
