Homecoming starts today

It's Homecoming 1994 time, beginning with a bonfire this evening and concluding with a banquet Saturday night -- and plenty of activities in between.

A huge bonfire is to be lit at 7:30 this evening, just to the south of Hawk Stadium. Because parking is limited in that area, those attending are encouraged by high school principal Richard Davis to use the space north of the stadium.

A pre-game meal will be served to fans by the FFA Booster Club at the Vocational Agriculture Building, between 5 and 7 p.m.

Prior to the big football game between the Hawks and Vernon Lions, the homecoming queen will be announced and crowned. That is to start at approximately 7:10 p.m., with the game following at 7:30. Candidates this year are Dani Goin, Brandi Catlin, Kelli Thompson and Lori Kasparek, all seniors.

A registration table will be set up next to the concession stand, where former students are asked to register. From that list, a name will be drawn for the honor of "coming-home queen."

Two events are scheduled at the Recreational Activities Center following the football game.

Besides a dance for IPHS students, an informal gathering will be held for the Class of '79. The 15-year reunion is described by coordinators Jeff Watts, Cathy Duncan and Jo Lynn Cockrum as a "come-and-go" party.

Saturday is always a big day for everyone, especially former students.

Starting at 9 a.m., the traditional Whoop-T-Do, sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce, provides entertainment and activities for "homecomers," which is exactly its purpose.

Could it happen again this year? Hawks hosting Lions Friday

Could it happen again this year? Last year, the Hawks jumped up and stunned the third-ranked Vernon Lions 17-14 after all the critics had written Iowa Park off.

This year's game will be the Hawks' homecoming game and it follows an emotionally tough loss to Jacksboro. So with all of the distractions and last week's game still fresh on the minds of all the players, how will Iowa Park respond this week against Vernon?

"On paper, people wouldn't give us much of a chance to beat them," Iowa Park head coach Weldon Nelms said. "But our kids remember last year and know it can be done and they really feel like they can beat Vernon. I look for us to step it up and rise to the occasion. When I took this job, people told me that these kids would play Vernon tough no matter how they played the rest of the year. They just always seem to get up for this game."

Vernon, 3-3 overall and 1-0 in district play, started the season with a pair of losses to two Oklahoma schools. The Lions lost to Altus 29-27 and dropped a 21-20 decesion to Frederick the following week before rebounding against Wichita Falls High School 43-23. Vernon came back to beat Burkburnett 33-28 in week four but suffered its first shutout since being blanked by the Hawks in 1986 when Hirschi held the Lions scoreless in a 9-0 victory. Vernon opened district 33A play last week with a 14-0 win over Graham.

The Hawks have held their own against the Lions over the last 24 years as Vernon holds a slim 13-10-1 record over Iowa Park.

"Vernon is Vernon," Nelms said. "They are always a talented group of kids that have been in the same system for a long time. Their talent level might be down a bit this year. They lost a real good quarterback last year in Enloe to go along with some other key losses. Kyle Williams has done a good job running the offense so far this year for them but right now I think they might be stronger defensively than on offense. They have some real big kids up front that control the line of scrimage which allows their linebackers to run to the football."

The big kids coach Nelms is talking about along the defensive front line average 224 pounds.

Offensively, the Lions are a team that likes to use their speed and get outside. Joining Williams in the backfield for Vernon are 195-pound senior fullback Sjohonton Fanner and Marcus Montes, a 160-pound junior tailback. Williams' favorite receiver is Brandon Favors a big 195-pound senior wide out who has good speed and good hands as well.

Vernon is averaging 245 total yards per game with 153 yards rushing and 92 passing. The Lions are giving up 258 yards per game, 165 on the ground and 93 through the air. Their offensive line averages 218 pounds per man.

"They like to get the ball in the backs' hands and get outside with their speed," Nelms added. "We're going to have to force them to drive the ball on us and not give up any big plays to be successful. We have to be able to mix things up on offense and throw the ball well to counter their big front line."

When asked about all the homecoming activities surrounding this week's game coach Nelms just smiled and said. "Coaches are funny, they don't like change. I've seen games like this where the kids came out really focused and other times where I thought



Jennifer Duggins guest speaker for Amity Study Club program

Jennifer Duggins, on staff as physical therapist at Bethania Health Care Center, presented the program for Amity Study Club Monday evening in the home of Amy Brown. Annetta Reusch was co-hostess.

Mrs. Duggins, the former Jennifer Welch, graduated Iowa Park High School in 1990. She attended Midwestern State University two years and graduated from the University of Texas Health Science Center in San Antonio.

The speaker began by giving the bad and good news about a person's health.

She said, "The bad news is that we can't live forever. The good news is that we can stay young." She explained her statement by saying that with good health habits, people can be physically 30 years younger than those with yoor health habits.

M.s. Duggins said that aging, like health, is now known to be under personal control to a much greater extent than previously thought.

She emphasized that almost all aspects of aging can be modified through exercise.

The speaker explained and demonstrated the three types of exercise: strengthening, stretching, and aerobic.. She said that each type of exercise is needed and helpful, however, she pointed out that aerobic exercise is important for all ages.

Mrs. Duggins encouraged club members by explaining that it is never too late to begin aerobic exercise. She added that it is important for people who do not exercise should start at a very low level and build toward a goal for the next year.

Mrs. Duggins shared handouts with club members and explained much of the material. She advised members to take care of themselves in every way in order to avoid signs of aging and feel more vigor, stamina and wellness in daily activities.

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



Re-elected to district board

Barry Mahler of Iowa Park and Bill Brockriede of Burkburnett were re-elected to the Wichita Soil and Water Conservation District Board of Directors Oct. 4.

Brockriede represents Zone One of the district and Mahler represents Zone Two.

Purpose of the Wichita SWCD, with headquarters in Iowa Park, is to promote sound and responsible soil and water conservation programs on agriculture lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers, ranchers, and local community entities on conservation matters.

The board of directors coordinate the conservation efforts of various local, state, and federal agencies and other organizations. It has authority to enter into working agreements with these govermental agencies and private concerns to carry out its pur-

The five members serving on the district board of directors are responsible for district policies and producers for carrying out the district program within the framework of the Texas Soil Conservation District law.

In Texas there are 213 soil and water conservation districts. Each is a legal subdivision of the state government organized by local agricultural landowners with the assistance of the Texas Soil and Water Conservation Board.

Unlike most other legal subdivisions of state government, SWCDs do not have the powers of taxation or

eminent domain. All conservation programs managed by the district are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator or other potential users of the SWCD programs.



The reality of school bus safety is that more children are hurt outside a bus than inside one.

Durham Transportation encourages all PTAs to publicize the following safety tips to children, parents and motorists:

For Children--

When you get off the bus, take five giants steps away from the bus, out of the "dan ger zone."

Cross in front of the bus, and make sure you can see the driver and the driver can see you.

Never go back for anything, and never bend down near or under bus. For Parents:


Assure your children you won't get mad if they don't go back for a jacket they've left on the bus or school work they've dropped under a wheel.

Encourage them to sit quietly in their seats and follow the driver's instructions on bus safety.

For Motorists:

Stop when the bus' warning lights are flashing or the "stop arm" comes out

The 8th grade A team will travel to Bridgeport next Tuesday to take on the Bulls at 7 p.m.





Brown finished the scoring for Iowa Park in the third period on a 45-yard run on the Hawks' first possession of the second half.



Because Wilcox was asking for considerably less water than Gregg, and because he was not taking water from a transmission line, he would be allowed the water at no cost.

stockmen must go to the city hall for a permit before taking any water. That, and the fact that loading will only be allowed at the boat ramp area on the east end of the dam, regains the city's control of its resources, it was explained.

In other action, the council approved all bids received at a surplus sale Saturday, discussed leasing grazing rights at Lake Buffalo, approved two resolutions and an ordinance for a stop sign.

The city realized \$5,240.75, most of which was from two vehicles, when surplus equipment was sold at auction last weekend. All bids must be accepted by the council before the purchases are consummated, according to sale specifications.

One of the two resolutions approved was a bookkeeping measure, necessary to write off bad debts owed the city for utility bills.

The 12-month balance, which began April 1993, amounted to \$3,810.45. An additional \$6,369.06 owed by Highland Cemetery Association also was written off. That is a traditional action by city councils of Iowa Park. The second resolution expressed

the city's opposition to unfunded state



and federal mandates. Copies will be sent to all elected officials, urging appropriate funding for all future legislation.

The city's code of ordinances was amended to add a stop sign at the southern entrance of Park Place Circle and Johnson Road. Such ordinances are necessary for enforcement purposes.

A decision to advertise for grazing rights at Lake Buffalo was postponed so suggestions of details could be written and considered at the next meeting.

At least two topics mentioned during the general discussion period are to be on the council's meeting agenda in the near future. They are a review of city's investment funds and a possible banning of all guns at Lake Iowa Park and Lake Buffalo.
