## Springtown, Childress play here Friday for area crown

### Neither team a stranger to Hawk football fans

Iowa Park's Hawk Stadium will be the site of a Region One area playoff football game Friday night between two teams very familiar to Hawk fans -- the Childress Bobcats and Springtown Porcupines.

Childress finished its regular season with an 8-2 record. The Bobcats' only losses were 12-9 to Holliday and 20-18 in the final contest of the regular schedule to Amarillo River Road.

Fort Worth Brewer 22-19 and Iowa Park 49-7, to close out their non-conference schedule.

Springtown breezed through its district schedule, beating Diamond Hill-Jarvis 59-0, Lake Worth 54-12, Decatur 42-6, Aledo 37-24 and Boyd 24-0, to finish 8-2 for the regular season.

Kickoff time will be at 7:30 p.m. The Bobcats knocked off Friona 20-3 in their first round of the state UIL playoffs, while the Porcupines had to rely on first downs after being tied 28-28 by Dist. 3-AAA runner-up Graham. The Porkeys had a slim, 5-4 margin in that department.

Their non-conference wins were 21-0 over West Texas High in their opener. After the loss to Holliday, the Bobcats shut out Electra 44-0 (that was the week following the Tigers' 47-13 thumping of the Hawks), Floydada 35-6 and Hamlin (who beat the Hawks 22-13) 21-14.

Though Springtown scored more points against regular-season opponents than did Childress, 346-233, the Bobcats allowed fewer points than did the Porcupines, 85-136.

Opening district play, Childress posted four consecutive victories: 23-13 over Perryton, Tulia 20-14, Sanford-Fritch 26-0 and Dalhart 16-6.

Both teams have dominated play in their games against Iowa Park. In fact, the Hawks are 2-6-1 over the past 26 seasons against them.

After knocking off 4-A Azle 32-9 in their season opener, the Porkeys suffered two consecutive losses, 33-9 to Alvarado and 26-21 to Breckenridge, before getting back on track by edging

After the Hawks beat the Bobcats 41-14 enroute to the state title in 1969, Childress has beaten Iowa Park 22-6

## School district names Teachers of the Year

After recognizing their elementary and secondary Teachers of the Year, school trustees made quick work of their 22-item agenda Thursday evening in only one hour.

Each year the district selects Teachers of the Year, not only for local recognition, but also to be considered on the regional and state levels.

This year's recipients are Jo Ann Hale for elementary teacher and Earnie Reusch for secondary teacher. Both received certificates from board president Keith Fisher.

Trustees approved the hiring of Ladena Louise Welch to replace Nancy Padgett in the administration office.

Mrs. Welch has been employed the past seven years by the Wichita County Appraisal District. Mrs. Padgett recently submitted her resignation, explaining plans to move from the district.

She was selected from a list of 36 applicants, trustees were told.

While no patrons of the school district requested an appearance before the board during a period on the agenda for that purpose, one person, a teacher, did address trustees.

Elementary teacher Mary Helen Schell said she wanted to tell board

members that, for the first time in all her years teaching experience, during the past six-weeks period, 20 of her class' 21 students made an "A" in mathematics.

Mrs. Schell virtually bubbled as she proclaimed the reason for the outstanding grades was the newly-adopted Saxon Math program, which, she says, making the learning of math "fun" for the students.

The board approved re-appointment of Marc Newman to the Wichita County Appraisal District board.

## Police report four arrests

Three of the four arrests were on charges of public intoxication, and the other was for assault.

Police took Gary Douglas Green, 19, and Jayson Lee Houston, 20, into custody at 1:37 a.m. Saturday on charges of public intoxication, in the 400 block of West Daisy. Both were released at 7:48 a.m. after signing promises to appear in municipal court, according to the blotter entry.

After a domestic disturbance was reported Saturday evening at the Gordon Griffith Football Field, police arrested Ricky Wayne Carroll, 33, into custody on a Class C assault charge.

Carroll was released shortly after being booked in at the police station when he posted a \$130 cash bond.

Two days later, Carroll returned to the station and filed two charges against his wife, one for assault and the other for disorderly conduct, police reported.

The third public intoxication arrest made during the week was at 9:06 p.m. Tuesday in the 1300 block of Bluejay, when William Ray Hill, 56, was taken into custody. Hill was released at 3:31 a.m. Wednesday after posting a \$130 cash bond, according to the blotter entry.

**Steak and Brown Gravy**

- 2 lbs. sirloin steak
- 1 can mushrooms
- 4 pkgs. brown gravy mix
- 1 tsp. seasoned salt
- 1 tsp. lemon and pepper seasoning
- 1 tsp. Nature's seasoning

Brown sirloin steak with seasonings until done - add a little water to keep from burning. Drain the excess fat and return to skillet.

**Meatballs**

- 1 1/2 lbs. lean ground round
- 2 eggs, beaten
- 2 Tbsps. fine dry bread crumbs
- 2 Tbsps. instant minced onion
- 2 Tbsps. dried parsley flakes
- 1 1/2 tsps. salt
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 1 Tbsp. lemon juice
- 3 tsps. instant beef broth
- 3 cups boiling water
- 3 Tbsps. all-purpose flour
- 1/4 cup cold water
- 1 Tbsp. Worcestershire sauce
- 3 Tbsps. hamburger relish

Lightly combine ground beef, eggs, bread crumbs, onion, parsley, salt, pepper and lemon juice in a large bowl. Shape into balls.

Dissolve instant beef broth in water in a large saucepan; bring to boiling; add meatballs. Bring to boiling again, lower heat, cover and simmer 15 minutes. Remove meatballs to platter.

Mix flour and cold water to a smooth paste and stir into simmering broth. Add Worcestershire sauce and hamburger relish. Continue stirring over medium heat until sauce thickens and bubbles - 3 minutes. Pour over meatballs.

- 6 medium-size pork chops
- 3 medium potatoes
- 1 can cream of mushroom soup
- 1 medium onion chopped
- Salt and pepper to taste

Slice potatoes and onions. Place them in bottom of casserole dish. Pour

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## Lita Watson reviews local history for combined meeting of study clubs

Lita Watson was guest speaker for the combined meeting of Twenty Three Study Club and Amity Study Club Monday evening at Tom Burnett Memorial Library.

A member of the Wichita County Historical Commission, and organizing executive and volunteer archivist at Wichita County Archives, Mrs. Watson reviewed the history of Iowa Park.

The meditation was given by Dorothy Palmer, who read two poems, "If All That We Say", author unknown, and "It Always Depends On the Threads That You Use", by Alice Morrison.

Preceding the program, an ensemble composed of Fatsy Todd, Wanda Singer, Pat Aulds and Colleen Roberts, accompanied by Joyce Rentschler, pianist, sang, "Clubwoman's Song", by Dr. Ruth D. Treanor, and "High Hopes."

Joy Belle McKinnon reported that a two hour documentary film entitled, "One Woman-One Vote" is now being filmed. It depicts the battle of women's right to vote. The film will air early in 1995 on PBS.

Mrs. Watson pointed out that development of the railroad in the 1870s

and 1880s greatly influenced settlement of Iowa Park. Land developers from Iowa decided the central part of the county would provide a park-like community for new residents.

The selection of a county seat was a major concern, and Iowa Park lost its bid to Wichita Falls after several elections.

Interesting citizens who helped build the town and surrounding area include rancher Burk Burnett, his son Tom, D.C. Kolp, who platted Iowa Park, and Joseph Kemp, who developed three lakes suitable for irrigation.

In 1913 oil was discovered in the area resulting in many businesses coming to Iowa Park.

Mrs. Watson related that Iowa Park hosted the Texas-Oklahoma Fair 34 years, beginning in 1928. The Fair was held each October and lasted one week, with as many as 250,000 people attending.

Several club members contributed recollections of the Texas-Oklahoma Fair as well as the various buildings and events in early day Iowa Park.

Besides a great entertaining evening for football fans, there's also a surge in business for local establishments. All this makes it worthwhile.

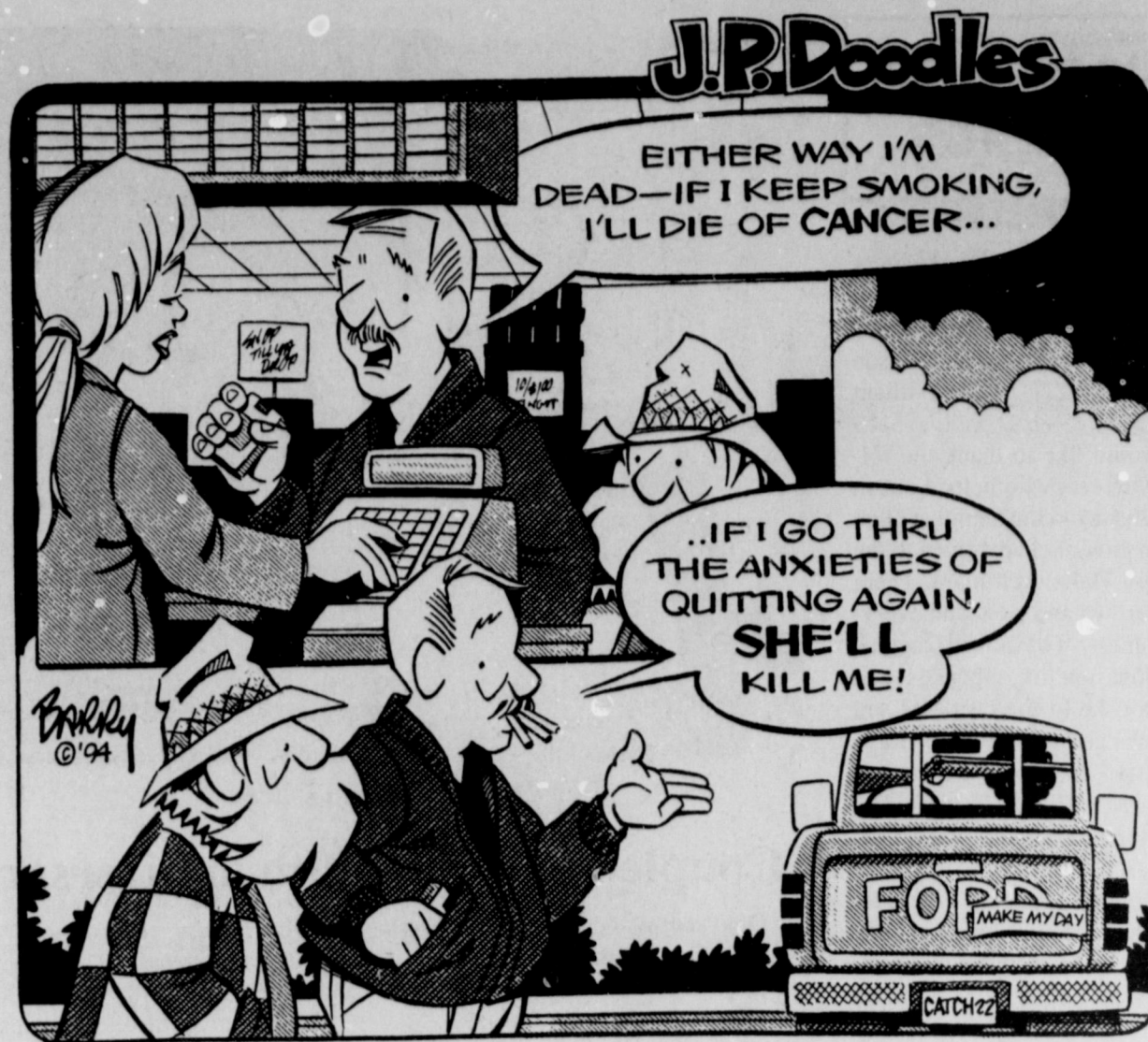
\* To all the area members of the National Rifle Association, I've got one word for you: CALFROPE!!!

approve desk purchase bids submitted by Indeco Sales. The bids, as it turned out, did not meet specifications, so new bids will be sought.

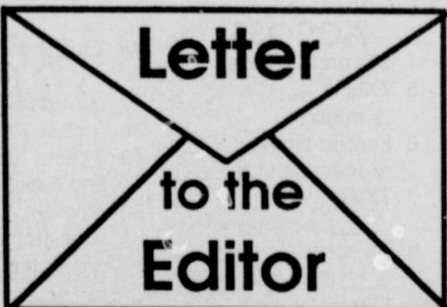
Trustees took no action on a proposal to grant a tax abatement for Cryovac, but they are to study recommendations from attorney David Thompson, a specialist, and act on a proposal at the December meeting.

A policy prohibiting the use of tobacco products within any indoor school facility was approved.

Three of the district's four campuses are reporting increased enrollment over this time in 1993, Supt. Mitchell reported.

Kidwell is up by 10,472 from 462; junior high 503 from 486, and high school 641 from 573.

Bradford has dropped from 497 to 484, making the district total 2,100, as compared with 2,018.

## Council makes no changes in hunting at either lake

City aldermen agreed that no changes were needed in allowing hunting at the two lakes west of town, but will consider issuing a variance on a year-to-year basis so solicitations can be made for Food Bank contributions.

The city had earlier received a request to stop allowing hunting at Lake Iowa Park and Lake Buffalo, citing livestock in the area being shot.

Aldermen agreed that the city's allowance of hunting only with shotguns posed no threat to livestock, and should be allowed to continue.

Bird hunting at Lake Iowa Park, which is now inside the city limits, is permitted, but during bird hunting season only, according to the city's ordinance.

Several hunting enthusiasts were in the audience and later expressed their appreciation for the council's stand on the issue.

Concerning guns other than shotguns being fired at the lakes, Iowa Parkan Carmen Lozipone told the council, "A few meathheads who go out with pistols, but I can't believe legal hunters would be penalized. I will call the game warden if I see someone

breaking the law. The few that go out there with rifles are not from Iowa Park."

A suggestion that the telephone numbers of game wardens and other authorities be printed on signs at the entrances to the lakes appeared to be well-received by the council.

Karla Hopper appeared before the council to request that the city issue a waiver from an ordinance prohibiting distribution of leaflets, which would allow Scouts and Cub Scouts to solicit food donations for the Food Bank.

She said she and other Scout leaders were unaware of the city's anti-litter ordinance when the youth distributed door hanger notices a few days earlier, and apologized for using that means in violation of the ordinance.

The council agreed to consider such a request each year, in an effort to continue the project which assists needy families.

Mrs. Hopper told the council the net result of her youth group's efforts was that 2,300 pounds of donated food were collected, and more was yet to come.

Mayor Wayne House asked aldermen if they still stood by the council's earlier decision to cease allowing the volunteer fire department to go outside the city limits to fight fires, unless the county meets certain conditions.

Those conditions, House explained, are that the county increase its funding of rural firefighting from \$14,400 annually to \$30,000 and also to provide liability insurance, by the first of January.

The mayor said another meeting was to be held Wednesday of this week between him, the mayor of Burk Burnett and the county judge, in an effort to resolve the situation.

House said the county commissioners had asked that the two cities extend their cutoff deadline six months, to allow more time for consideration or development of alternatives, for which each city would receive \$6,000.

Aldermen scoffed when it was pointed out that the amount actually was less than the county has been paying.

During the general discussion period, the mayor asked aldermen under what conditions should the city respond to request to use its slurry machine on private property, such as parking lots of churches and organizations.

The general response was, as long as it is done legally, which means the city is fully reimbursed for all costs.

# Thomas bids Iowa Park farewell

J. W. Thomas recalled fond memories of friends and family before bidding Iowa Park a final farewell last week.

Thomas, 83, moved to Irving last week at his daughter's request that he live in a nearby nursing home. "Carol wants for someone to make my bed, cook my meals, and make sure I take my medicine," Thomas said.

Thomas, his wife Ruth, and daughter Carol moved to Iowa Park in 1942. He lived in the same house for over 51 years.

"Ruth and Carol wanted me to sell the house, but I couldn't. I had six pecan trees making good crops," he said.

"We lived here 51 years. It sure is hard to think about selling this old home," Thomas said, voice wavering and a tear in his eye.

Thomas owned the Bell Service Station 24 years. "I knew everyone in town until I sold the station in 1971," Thomas said.

During the gas wars the cars would line up. Thomas sold gasoline for 19 cents a gallon when the going rate was close to 35 cents.

Thomas admitted that Ralph Stone was his favorite employee. "Ralph was my best employee, he only had one arm you know?" Thomas' niece, Karoline Blair Smith, added, "He could change a flat faster than anyone you ever saw."

Current Volunteer Fire Department Chief, Danny Skinner knew Thomas well. "I met J. W. when I was

four or five years old," he said. "My dad used to haul stuff off from the station for him."

Thomas served 20 years on the Volunteer Fire Department, from 1952 to 1972. Thomas never had to rescue a person from a burning building, but, he did recall fighting the worst fire in the history of Iowa Park in 1958.

"We had a fire downtown that burned half a city block. We fought the fire from 10 p.m. until daylight when we finally got it under control," Thomas said. Skinner, age 11, remembered the fire too. "I think they had to use a wrecking ball to level some of the buildings to stop the fire from spreading," Skinner said.

Included in the fire department's scrap book is a story about J. W. Thomas which Skinner shares: "Traditionally here in the department, if a person gets into trouble, he has to make up for it, usually with donuts. One time J. W. missed a training drill.

Later that day the other volunteers spotted him pulling a boat into town. J. W. was bragging about the fish that he caught. His fellow volunteers decided that J. W. could make up for his absenteeism by providing the department with a fish fry." Skinner said.

"J. W. will be missed. I know that I will miss him," Skinner said.

Thomas served as a member of the Chamber of Commerce. He has been an active member of the Masonic Lodge, since 1946.

He was married to Ruth 61 years. They traveled the country together

visiting several Blue Grass festivals. Ruth passed away in May 1994.

"I couldn't have lived in a more friendly town than Iowa Park. I couldn't have picked a better place to raise my daughter than Iowa Park. I sure am going to hate to leave," Thomas said.

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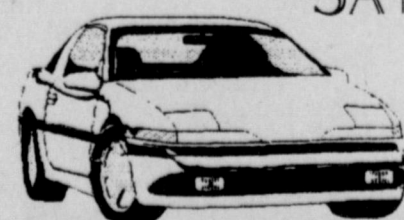

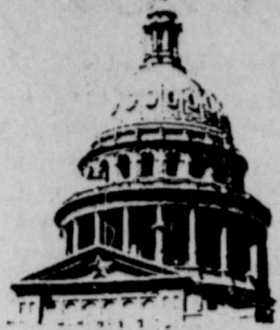

AUSTIN — During her campaign, Gov. Ann Richards ridiculed a man who she said woke up one day and decided he wanted to be governor of Texas. That man is now Gov.-elect George W. Bush.

On Nov. 8, Texas voters turned their backs on the incumbent Democrat's long record as a public officeholder and weren't convinced by her "smear" ads. Bush, a Republican, won with 53.5 percent of the vote to Richards' 45.9 percent.

The day after the election, Bush said he believed he had a mandate to overhaul the state's juvenile justice, public education and welfare systems. He congratulated his party mates and held out his hand to Democrats, saying, "This is not a Republican agenda, because there will be a lot of Democrats who will support my plan to make our schools better, our streets safer and the welfare system more responsible."

**Bullock Scores Easy Win**

Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock, Texas' most powerful officeholder, is now the state's highest-elected Democrat.

Bullock, 65, overwhelmingly defeated Republican Tex Lezar of Dallas to win his second four-year term. Bullock garnered 62 percent of the vote to Lezar's 38 percent.

"This election is not so much a victory for me as it is a victory for Texans who want their problems solved without partisanship or gridlock," said Bullock.

**Hutchison Defeats Fisher**

U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison is returning to Washington with a full six-year term and a Republican majority in Congress for the first time in 40 years.

Hutchison, the state's first female senator, easily defeated Dallas financier Richard Fisher with 62 percent of the votes to Fisher's 37.3 percent.

"I think we are going to see some significant legislation passed immediately," Hutchison said. She predicted that the GOP Congress would approve term limits, staff

cuts and a constitutional amendment requiring a balanced federal budget.

**Veteran Democrats Defeated**

Four longtime Democratic officeholders shared Richards' fate. For months, political talking heads accurately predicted that the mid-term election would be a plebiscite against incumbents, liberals and President Bill Clinton.

Voters rejected four veteran Democrats: State Sens. Carl Parker of Port Arthur and Steve Carriker of Roby, and in the House, Betty Denton of Waco; and U.S. Rep. Jack Brooks of Beaumont.

Parker, 60, who was elected to the state Senate in 1976, also served 14 years as a state representative. He was elected to the Texas House in 1962 — three years before his Republican opponent was born.

Michael Galloway of The Woodlands, a 29-year-old independent oil and gas producer — and political novice — claimed 53 percent of the vote to Parker's 47 percent.

State Sen. David Sibley, R-Waco, told the *Houston Chronicle* Parker was "the ideological and intellectual leader of the liberal group" in the Senate.

Carriker, 43, was defeated by Tom Haywood of Wichita Falls.

Carriker served in the House from 1983-88, and the Senate from 1988.

Meanwhile, Denton, 48, lost to Republican Barbara Rusling of China Spring, after serving in the House for 17 years.

Brooks, whose hold on the 9th Congressional District in East Texas spanned 42 years, would have been the senior representative in Congress had he been re-elected. He lost to Steve Stockman, a 37-year-old accountant from Friendswood.

**GOP Takes RR Commission**

As further proof that Texas is a bona fide two-party state, Republicans staged an unprecedented sweep of the Texas Railroad Commission, with the first woman ever elected to the post winning one of two seats on the ballot this year.

GOP challenger Charles R. Matthews of Garland defeated Democratic Chairman James E. Nugent for a full six-year term, ending more than 40 years of government service for Nugent.

In the other race, Democratic incumbent Mary Scott Nabers was beaten for a two-year term by GOP challenger Carole Keeton Rylander, a former three-term mayor of Austin.

Nabers became the second consecutive woman appointed to the commission by Gov. Richards to lose her job at election time. Lena Guerrero was the first.

**Lake Gordon stocked with channel catfish**

Several area lakes, including Iowa Park's Lake Gordon, were recently stocked with advanced channel catfish fingerlings by the Inland Fisheries Division of Texas Parks and Wildlife Dept.

Lake Gordon received 985, according to Scott Robinson of the TPWD.

The fish were approximately eight inches long, and the stocking rates were based on the surface acreage they cover.

Other lakes stocked included: Old Petrolia City Lake, 1,150; Archer City Lake, 1,300; Tucker (near Strawn), 1,700; Jacksboro City Lake, 3,000, and Cooper (near Olney), 7,450.

The fish were hatched in the spring and raised in hatchery ponds throughout the summer until they reached an average length of eight inches.

Fish raised at the hatchery in this manner have a good chance of surviving to adulthood after they are stocked. When smaller two-inch fingerlings are

stocked the rate is much higher because they often fall prey to largemouth bass and other predatory fish.

Eight-inch catfish are large enough to avoid being eaten by most predatory fish present in Texas lakes.

The channel catfish are stocked as part of the TPWD's continuing efforts to provide the best possible fishing to North Texas anglers, Robinson said.

Fish populations in all public waters are monitored by TPWD

# Hawks open with 115-107 victory

The Iowa Park Hawks opened the 1994-1995 basketball season in an big way Tuesday night as they ran away from the Peaster Greyhounds 115-107.

And if you were at the game and you blinked, you probably missed 10 or 15 points being scored as both teams wasted little time in getting up and down the floor.

Iowa Park used a balanced scoring attack to hold off Peaster as five different Hawks reached double digits in the scoring column. Nick Black, a 6-0 sophomore forward, led the way with 28 points, followed closely by John Lucas, a 6-2 senior post who finished with 25. Michael Fallon, a 5-

10 junior forward also hit the 20 mark as he finished with 21 points. Rounding out the double digit scorers were Rylan McNeil and Brent Kotulek, each tossing in 11.

The Hawks opened an 8-point lead with 1:16 left in the first quarter when Corky Petty scored on a rebound to give Iowa Park a 25-17 lead. The Greyhounds closed to within 5 as the first eight minutes came to a close. Jason Etier led the Hounds by scoring 11 of his game high 35 in the opening period to keep his team in the game.

Iowa Park stretched the lead back up to 9 with 5:51 left in the first half when Kotulek hit a pair of free throws, Black converted a layup and Lucas drained a 10-footer to boost the lead to 37-28. The Hawks maintained the 9 point advantage through the rest of the quarter and took a 56-45 lead into the locker room at the half.

With 5:20 left in the third quarter, the Hawks opened their biggest lead of the night when Fallon drilled a three-pointer to give his team a 68-55 advantage. But Peaster didn't stop running as they trimmed the Iowa Park lead to 3 at 79-76 with 28 seconds remaining when Mat Keller scored 6

straight points, all on the inside.

Iowa Park built its lead back to 13 with 5:21 left in the contest when Fallon converted on a three point play to put the Hawks on top 97-84. Fallon also put the Hawks over the century mark later in the quarter when his layup with 4:24 left gave the Hawks a 101-88 lead. Peaster never got closer than 8 the rest of the way as Iowa Park hit its free throws down the stretch to preserve the win.

"I was real happy with the way we controlled the ball against their press," Iowa Park head coach Tim Clark said. "They kept expecting us to die but I thought we were in better shape than they were and it showed late in the game. We played within ourselves tonight and didn't make a lot of silly mistakes. We knew coming into the game that they would try and run us out of the gym but our kids like to play the up-tempo game too."

"I think one of the keys in the game tonight was our depth off the bench," Clark added. "Every time I put someone in to take the place of a starter, we didn't lose a beat. I thought our

conditioning was ahead of scheduled and that can be contributed to the work the kids have done on their own to get ready to play this year. We did a super job of rebounding tonight and limited them to very few second shots."

The Hawks next action will be Saturday afternoon when they play host to Childress at 2:30 p.m. The game had been scheduled for Friday night but had to be moved due to a football playoff game.

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# New classes better prepare students

Young people in Iowa Park should be better prepared for their role as responsible adults because of a new class begun this year at the junior high school.

Principal Randy Lovelady along with two of his teachers, George Brandt and Jeff Standard, thought it would be good to offer a class that educates the students on responsibilities they would face as adults.

The result was a class on Civic Responsibilities, taught by Jeff Standard, and a class called Career Exploration, taught by George Brandt.

There are 12 students in each class which is an elective course for eighth graders. Students taking one of the classes for the first semester, will change to the other class for the second semester.

Standard said that the purpose of the Civic Responsibilities class is "to open the students' eyes to the responsibilities they have in the community."

The first six weeks they learned about recycling and protecting the environment. The second six weeks was devoted to learning about non-profit organizations, service clubs and civic groups. They learned what services they provide, how they raise money, membership requirements, etc. The class has visited meetings of the local Lions Club and Rotary Club, and representatives from service organizations, the volunteer fire department, and chamber of commerce have spoken to the students.

During the third six weeks, they will be working with local businesses learning about business structure, taxes, and what different taxes are used for.

The students are recycling aluminum cans and, at the end of the semester, will use the money for a pizza party. They are also looking into ways to recycle paper.

Standard said the students are becoming aware of things around them and realize that eventually they are the ones who will have to assume the positions of leadership and responsibility in the community.

In the class on Career Exploration, instructor Brandt said that the foremost objective is to prepare the student for high school. Also, to help them in making decisions on a curriculum that will be beneficial whether they are planning on going to college or going directly into the work force.

His students learn about the high

school vocational programs, and have speakers from all the high school vocational departments who tell about their programs and the criteria the students have to meet.

During the first six weeks the class learned how to figure the cost of living and gained an idea of how much money it takes for food, housing, clothing, etc. One study was on how to choose a car, pay for it, insurance, and other costs involved. They will study the steps involved in getting a job and plan to have speakers in different career fields.

Speakers they have heard already include a teacher, coach, and police officer.

In the future they have scheduled an Air Force pilot, realtor, postal service worker, veterinarian, and a lawyer.

Brandt said that near the end of the semester, his class would take a field trip, during the class period on three days, and visit the high school. There they can observe what the students are doing, and make the transition to that campus next year easier for the students.

Lovelady said that the classes seem to be going well and he expects the enrollment to increase.

As far as civic responsibility goes, the students are already getting involved. They have ordered 100 trees that will arrive in the spring, and next year will order 200 more that will arrive in the spring of 1996. With these they are going to start a tree nursery and, when the trees are large enough, they will be transferred to parks and other areas to help in the city's beautification efforts.

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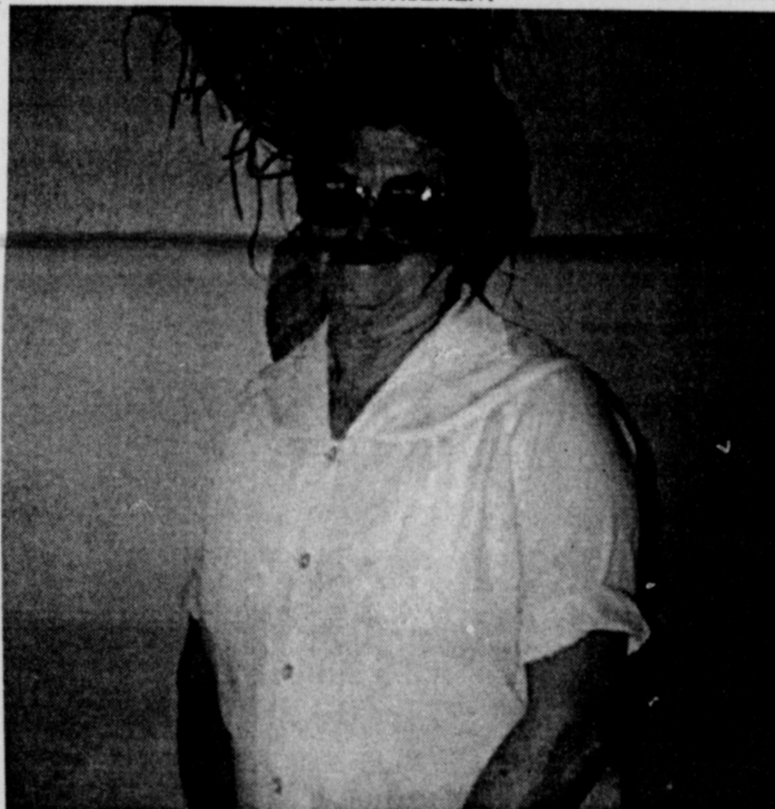

## GARDENING HINTS

If you would like to learn more about pecan tree management, if you would like to find out what variety of pecan you have in your yard, if you would like to learn how to evaluate pecan quality, if you are interested in utilizing pecans as a cash crop, if you would like to be recognized for your pecan growing abilities, then you should submit a pecan entry for the 1994 Wichita County Pecan Show.

Pecan entries are very easy to enter in the show. Simply place 40 pecans of one variety in a paper bag with your name, address, and variety (if known) written on the bag.

Only one entry per variety per person is allowed. However, you can enter as many different variety samples as you wish.

Deliver your show entries to the Wichita County Extension Office at 1626 Midwestern Parkway in Wichita Falls by 5 p.m. Wednesday, Nov. 23.

All entries will be processed to determine kernel quality. Ribbons and/or plaques will be awarded to participants in the show. The top entries will progress to regional shows and possibly to the state pecan show.

Commercial producers as well as

homeowners are welcome to compete in the show.

The actual show will be held on Dec. 2 at Sikes Senter Mall.

All pecan entries will be on display with ribbons and awards attached. The county's pecan committee will be on hand to answer your pecan growing questions and interpret the results of any entry.

Everyone has a chance to learn about pecan quality and the local pecan industry by simply attending the show.

# McGruff riding shotgun in TU Electric trucks

McGruff the Crime Dog has begun riding shotgun on TU Electric trucks in a program with law enforcement agencies to help protect children.

TU Electric announced that it will implement the McGruff Truck Program in partnership with law enforcement agencies throughout its service area, which includes Iowa Park.

The program sets up safe havens for children by putting McGruff decals on approved utility vehicles with two-way communication. The utility employee will call the local law enforcement agency for a child who needs help.

"We'll Call for Help" is the message of the McGruff Truck Program.

McGruff is a symbol recognized by 99 percent of children nationwide as the dog that helps "Take a Bite Out of Crime."

Decals of McGruff with its detective-style trench coat will be placed on more than 1,500 TU Electric ser-

vice vehicles in 372 cities in 88 counties in North Central, East and West Texas, making it the largest McGruff Truck Program of any utility company in the U.S.

TU Electric implemented the McGruff Truck Program because of a growing concern about child safety in the cities it serves and interest from law enforcement agencies.

"We are excited about this program and the contribution it will make in the communities we are privileged to serve," said TU Electric manager Dale Cox. "We're out in the neighborhoods in highly visible vehicles, making us natural partners in this community effort," Cox said.

Through school and police programs, children will be told how to signal a McGruff-marked vehicle in emergencies. They should alert a McGruff Truck by waving both arms above their head and yelling "help."

A child who is alone might need

assistance from a McGruff Truck if lost, frightened by a stranger or other incident, threatened by bigger children, or injured.

TU Electric has sent this information via video and classroom posters to elementary schools throughout its service area. The program is also explained in the company's October electric bill insert.

According to law enforcement agencies in other areas that have McGruff Trucks, they have been effective deterrents to potential troublemakers preying on children.

However, utility employees who work from a McGruff Truck are not crime-fighters. Their role is to call for appropriate emergency assistance when signaled for help by a child, and to remain with the child until emergency help arrives.

McGruff Truck is a program of the National Crime Prevention Council. It is a companion to the McGruff House

and other McGruff crime protection programs operated in conjunction with law enforcement and taught in many schools. McGruff Truck was begun in 1991.

Companies participating in the program are carefully screened and must adhere to strict guidelines for McGruff-marked vehicles. Only government or publicly regulated utility companies with clearly identified vehicles are considered for the program.

McGruff Truck is presently being used by 51 utility companies, involving more than 15,000 vehicles in 14 states.
