## Sales tax total growing

tion. The city received a $\$ 30,687.24$ check this month from the state comptroller's office, reflecting taxes
collected on sales in September and collected on sales in September and also businesses reporting on third-
quarter collections. Though that was only 2.62 percent more than the November check received in 1993, it was great enough to maintain the cit 1994.

So far this year, Iowa Park's sales tax collections are running 7.11 percent greater than the same period in 1993. Though the 11 -month perio the city has received $\$ 222,703.62$, ac cording to the state comptroller's of

## Driver dies in fiery crash <br> A Holliday man was killed Mon-

day night when his tractor-trailer overturned on a sharp curve between Kan and Valley View on FM 1206 .
Though no positive identific has been made, officials believe the victim to be Glenn Gordon, 44. Gordon, an independent trucker,
was hauling oil field pipe in a 1981 GMC tractor-trailer for Hollitex Supply of Holliday. Department of Public Safety officers believe that when Gor-
don rounded the curve the load of pipe don rounded the curve the load of pipe
he was hauling shifted, causing the rig to flip upside down in the ditch and
trapping Gordon inside. The cab of the truck then c
ing diesel.
A Kamay resident wholives nearby heard the crash and reportedly tried to save Gordon by using his pickup and chains in an attempt to pull the truck upright.
DPS officers were dispatched to the scene at $7: 15 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$.

Iowa Park firemen arrived on the scene with the Jaws of Life around 7:45 and assisted in removing the man from the truck. He was pronounced dead at
8:25 p.m. by Wichita County Medical

The way it is now, the taxpayers of owa Park are picking up the major tab of fighting rural fires in this area. And that includes liability insurance.

Within a 60 -mile radius of Wichita Falls there is of pecans harvested each year Buyers pay fair market value for pans and that money is circulated back into our local economy. Pecans are a rapidly-growing segment of our norticultural industry in this part of the state.

The 1994 Wichita County Pecan how is set for Friday, Dec. 2 at Sikes Senter Mall in Wichita Falls. If you enter a pecan sample, we will identify the variety, rate the quality and award your entry with a ribbon or plaque.
