There'll be plenty of turkey on the tables in Iowa Park for Thanksgiving, if all the drawing winners choose to serve it that day.

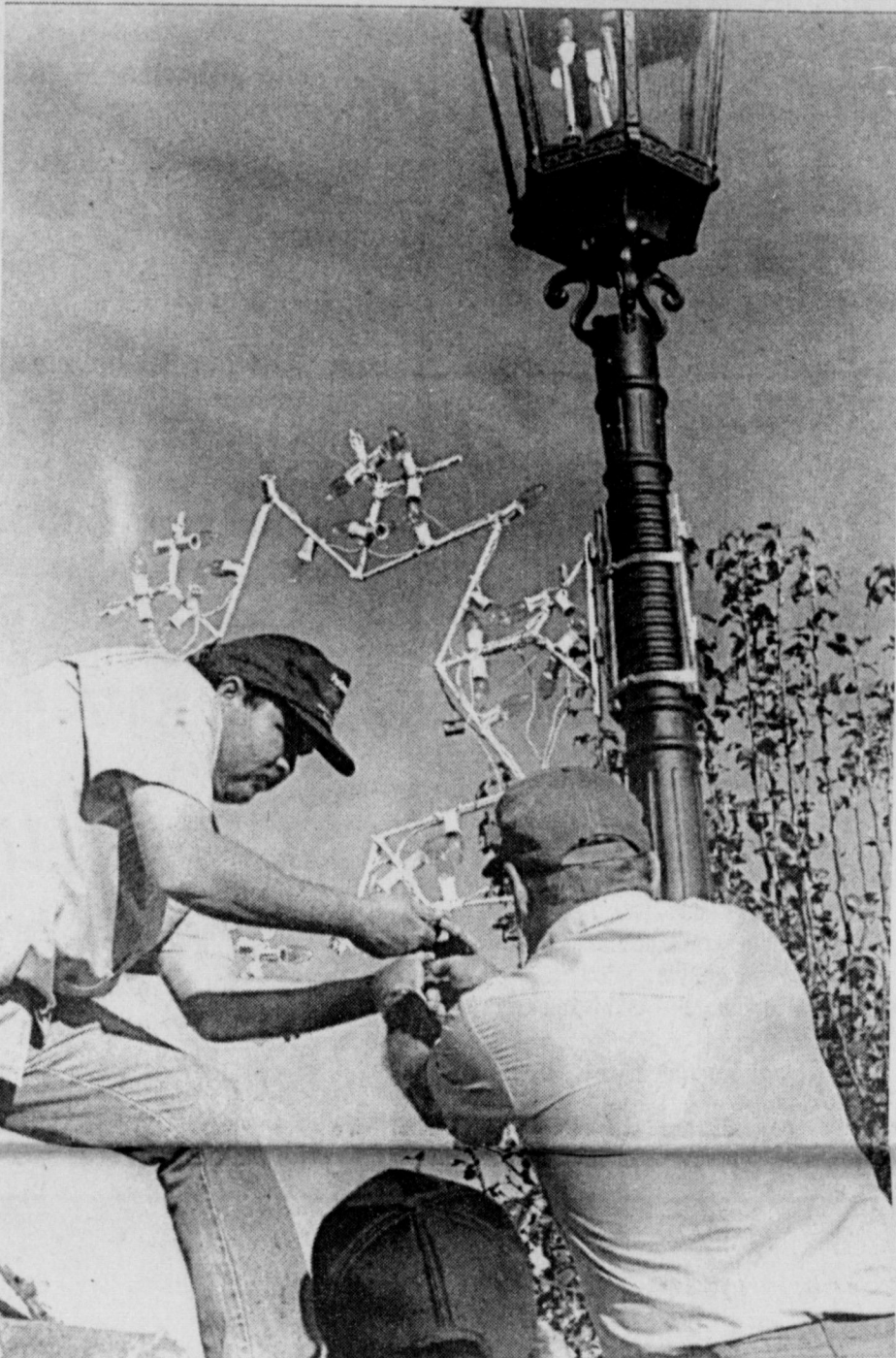

Sales tax total growing

Iowa Park has led every city in Wichita County almost every month this year in its percentage of increase in sales tax collections.

And the latest report is no exception.

The city received a \$30,687.24 check this month from the state comptroller's office, reflecting taxes collected on sales in September and also businesses reporting on third-quarter collections.

Though that was only 2.62 percent more than the November check received in 1993, it was great enough to maintain the city's percentage of increase for 1994.

So far this year, Iowa Park's sales tax collections are running 7.11 percent greater than the same period in 1993. Though the 11-month period, the city has received \$222,703.62, according to the state comptroller's office.

Driver dies in fiery crash

A Holliday man was killed Monday night when his tractor-trailer overturned on a sharp curve between Kamay and Valley View on FM 1206.

Though no positive identification has been made, officials believe the victim to be Glenn Gordon, 44.

Gordon, an independent trucker, was hauling oil field pipe in a 1981 GMC tractor-trailer for Hollitex Supply of Holliday. Department of Public Safety officers believe that when Gordon rounded the curve the load of pipe he was hauling shifted, causing the rig to flip upside down in the ditch and

trapping Gordon inside. The cab of the truck then caught fire, ignited by leaking diesel.

A Kamay resident who lives nearby heard the crash and reportedly tried to save Gordon by using his pickup and chains in an attempt to pull the truck upright.

DPS officers were dispatched to the scene at 7:15 p.m.

Iowa Park firemen arrived on the scene with the Jaws of Life around 7:45 and assisted in removing the man from the truck. He was pronounced dead at 8:25 p.m. by Wichita County Medical

Examiner Melvin Joyner.

Joyner said the body was sent to the Southwestern Institute of Forensic Sciences in Dallas for positive identification.

Just five hours later, DPS officers and Iowa Park firemen were dispatched out when the rear trailer tires on an 18-wheeler caught fire as it was travelling south on Hwy. 287 near Peterson Road.

No one was injured in the accident, which melted the tires off the trailer.

According to Bill Gilmore, crews were still cleaning up the site at 6 a.m. Tuesday.

Familiar topics face council: rural firefighting, hunting

Two familiar subjects will again be on the city council's business agenda when aldermen meet at 7 p.m. Monday in council chambers.

One concerns hunting at Lakes Iowa Park and Lake Buffalo, and the other topic is rural firefighting services.

A public appearance has been requested by Rick Medford, with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Dept., to discuss game law violations at the lakes.

Following that discussion, an ordinance amending the city's existing ordinance that would prohibit any rifle, side arm, hand gun, crossbow, com-

pressed air gun or air gun on any property owned by the city, "regardless of the location of the property," will be considered for adoption, according to the agenda.

Administrator Mike Price is to discuss the possibility of entering into a contract with Wichita County to provide rural firefighting services.

Action will be considered on three different bid topics, including a lease for grazing rights at Lake Buffalo, advertising for bids to construct a new sewer line to the Industrial Development Corporation property, and purchasing a new police cruiser.

The administrator is also to discuss holding only one meeting in December, possibly on the third Monday, and setting of rates for using city-owned equipment on private property.

Two other topics are on the meeting's tentative agenda. One is a public hearing for a grant, and the other, if approved, would support application for the 1994 Texas Home Investment Partnership Program.

Toll-free calls for rural area set for Jan. 25

Expanded toll-free local calling for the Kamay telephone service area is targeted to begin Jan. 25, according to Hardy White, general manager-customer operations for the GTE Western Division.

Once begun, phone calls between GTE customers in Kamay and Iowa Park, Holliday and Wichita Falls will no longer be charged a long distance fee. And visa versa.

"GTE is pleased to offer Expanded Toll-Free Local Calling to the Kamay exchange," said White. "We believe this new service addresses the needs of our customers that were not addressed under their current calling plan."

Once the service is operational, all customers will have the service for an additional monthly fee of \$3.50 for residential customers and \$7 for business customers.

The implementation of the service may require modification to some telecommunications equipment such as fax machines, speed calling, PABXs, key systems, automatic dialers and other equipment that may restrict or automatically dial long-distance customers.

Residents of the Kamay area voted overwhelmingly to request the telephone company to initiate the service.

Area firemen save home of Valley View woman

A Valley View home sustained heavy damage in a fire Friday morning, apparently started by pillows stacked next to a gas heater.

Firemen were dispatched at 9:47 a.m. to the home of Mrs. Doris Moore

on Fuller Lane. Two units from Kamay, and one unit each from Iowa Park and Wichita West responded to the blaze.

The damage, limited to the living room, dining room and kitchen, is estimated between \$10,000 and \$15,000. Firemen said because the doors to the

bedrooms were closed, nothing in those rooms received any damage.

Reconstruction of the home began the same day, according to a spokesman from the Kamay Volunteer Fire Dept.

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As I See It. . .

For the life of me, I can't understand why the Wichita County commissioners court has been reluctant to comply with the cities of Iowa Park and Burk Burnett, when it comes to a rural firefighting agreement.

Nor can I understand why more rural residents than the few from around Burk Burnett haven't been more vocal in expressing their desires to the commissioners during meetings.

Since last March, our two cities have been telling the county court that they needed the commissioners to pay a more realistic amount to the cities so their equipment could fight fires in the rural area, as well as taking responsibility for liability when those firemen venture outside their city limits.

There have been meetings after meetings, both with the commissioners, one of a committee named by the commissioners, and others of rural departments.

As of this past Monday, it appears a narrow, 3-2 margin of the court is in favor of paying the realistic amount that firefighting costs city taxpayers.

But there seems to be a hangup concerning coverage of liability. That, I don't understand the most.

The way it is now, the taxpayers of Iowa Park are picking up the major tab of fighting rural fires in this area. And that includes liability insurance.

Why should my neighbor and I pay for a service we don't receive, and those who receive it not have to pay for it?

It's always been that way. So why change it?

A couple of ideas kicked around by the rural departments has been for

maybe two new "substations" to be built, and their members man that equipment and fight the fires Iowa Park and Burk Burnett stop fighting.

Has anyone thought yet about the response time these departments have? Oh, it is reasonable, and those volunteers are dedicated and sincere in their acceptance of the responsibility.

But the members are spread out to wherever they work, not in concentrated areas such as they are in our cities. It takes time for them to report to where their equipment is stationed, and then additional time to travel to where the fire is located.

I'm concerned about all the many homes we have in the immediate area of Iowa Park, but not inside the city limits, if our volunteers are prohibited from taking the equipment outside the city.

I watched the situation several years back, when Wichita Falls stopped its firemen from going outside those city limits. And I criticized that city for allowing those firemen to park on one side of the road while a home burned on the other side.

But now I know why that decision was reached, even though it is distasteful.

Iowa Park and Burk Burnett have given Wichita County an ultimatum: pay your rightful share of rural firefighting, and cover that action with liability insurance. And do it by January 1.

Maybe you can get a grasp of how callous some of the commissioners court members can be about this situation, when I relate to you a comment Judge Nick Gibson reportedly made to Iowa Park Mayor Wayne House,

concerning our volunteer emergency medical personnel responding to wrecks and that kind of situation outside the city.

They have, in case you didn't know, saved many lives and assisted in comforting many injured.

When the mayor reminded the judge that our city was asking only for financial assistance to fight fires, and the EMTs hadn't even been mentioned, Gibson responded, "I haven't asked you to send them."

Folks, Wichita County has for years had an outstanding program of volunteer firefighting. It can continue. But a bunch of you had better get with your commissioners and let them know your feelings about this situation.

We only have through New Year's Eve to achieve an acceptable solution.

Such opposition, says HUD, violates the Fair Housing Act Amendments of 1988, which are supposed to safeguard the housing rights of the disabled. As we stated in this space last week, HUD and the federal courts have defined addiction and alcoholism, as well as AIDS and mental illness, as federally protected disabilities.

And we think the dictatorial government of Haiti should be toppled!

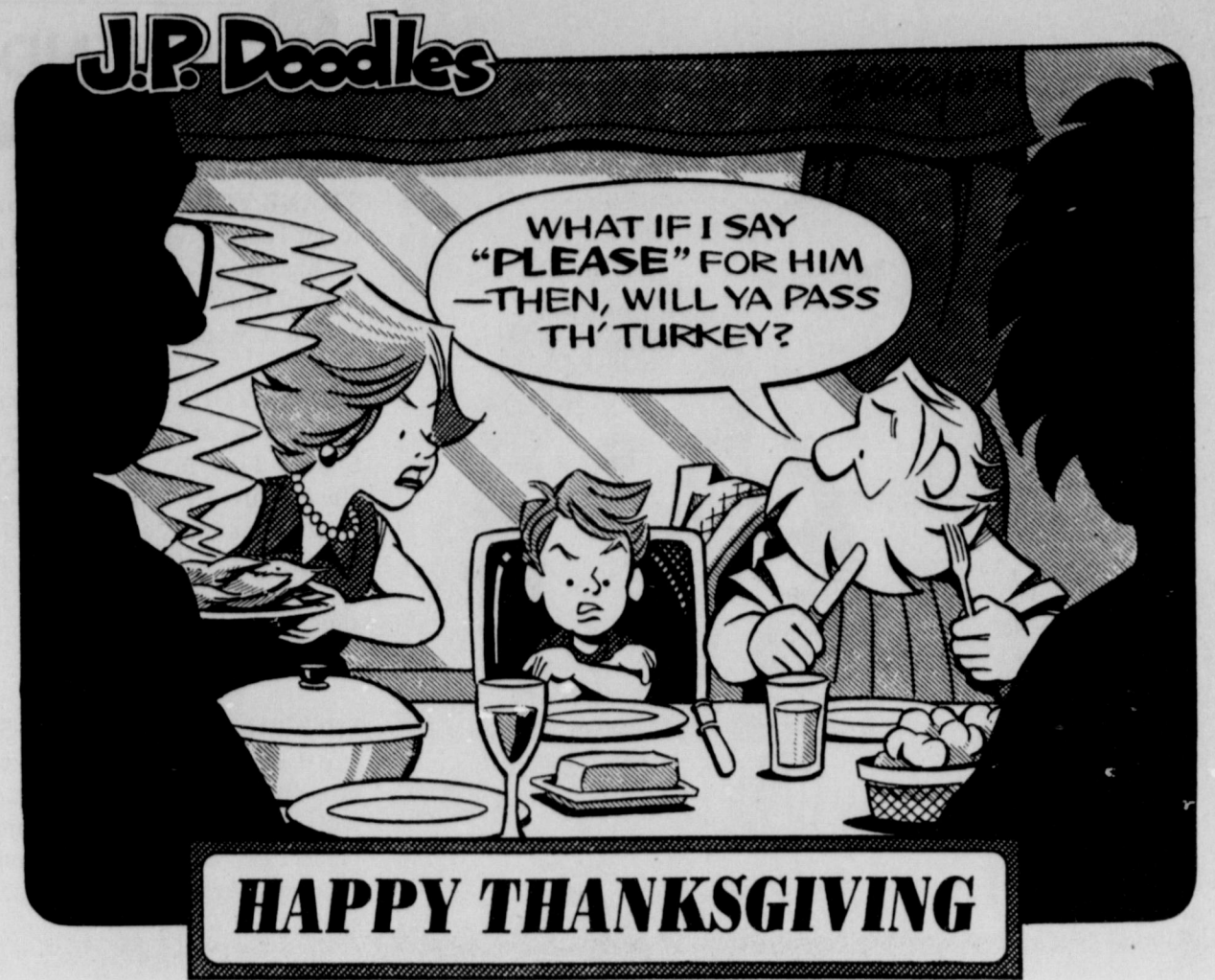

Hawks beat Childress, 77-64

The Iowa Park Hawks didn't score 115 points in their game against Childress Saturday but the results were still the same.

The Hawks said hello to the win column for the second time in a row this season with a 77-64 win over the Bobcats. Childress evens its record at 1-1.

Once again it was sophomore Nick Black who led Iowa Park with 27 points including a pair of three-point bombs. John Lucas finished with 14 points and Rylan McNeil added 11 for the Hawks.

Childress held a 9-8 lead late in the first quarter until Black and Rudy Hawkins hit back-to-back three pointers to put Iowa Park on top for good 14-9. The Hawks went on to outscore the Bobcats 20-13 in the first quarter.

The Hawks stretched the lead to 16 at 32-16 with 4:45 remaining in the first half on a pair of layups by Black. After Childress had pulled to within 10 at 24-34, it was the long range bombs by the Hawks that built the lead back up to 16. Michael Fallon hit the first of his two treys and Black drained his second with 1:28 left in the second quarter to give Iowa Park a 40-24 advantage.

The two teams both scored 19 points in the third quarter with the Hawks holding a 59-45 lead with only eight minutes remaining.

The Bobcats pulled to within 10 at 67-57 with 2:01 left in the game but Iowa Park hit its free throws down the stretch to preserve the 77-64 win.

"This was a completely different game than the last one," head coach Tim Clark said. "It was real physical out there but we kept our composure and did a good job. This is the type game we will be playing when district rolls around. You don't have many games like the one we played against Peaster."

David Seal, a 6-6 post, led the Bobcats with 17 points, followed by two players with 11.

"I thought we did a good job against their big man," Clark added. "He handled the ball real well and they had to use him to break our press and that took him out of his game I think. This was a good game for us. We got the chance to play a lot of kids and we

hustled a lot."

The Hawks will be looking to run

their record to 3-0 Tuesday night when they play host to Eastland.

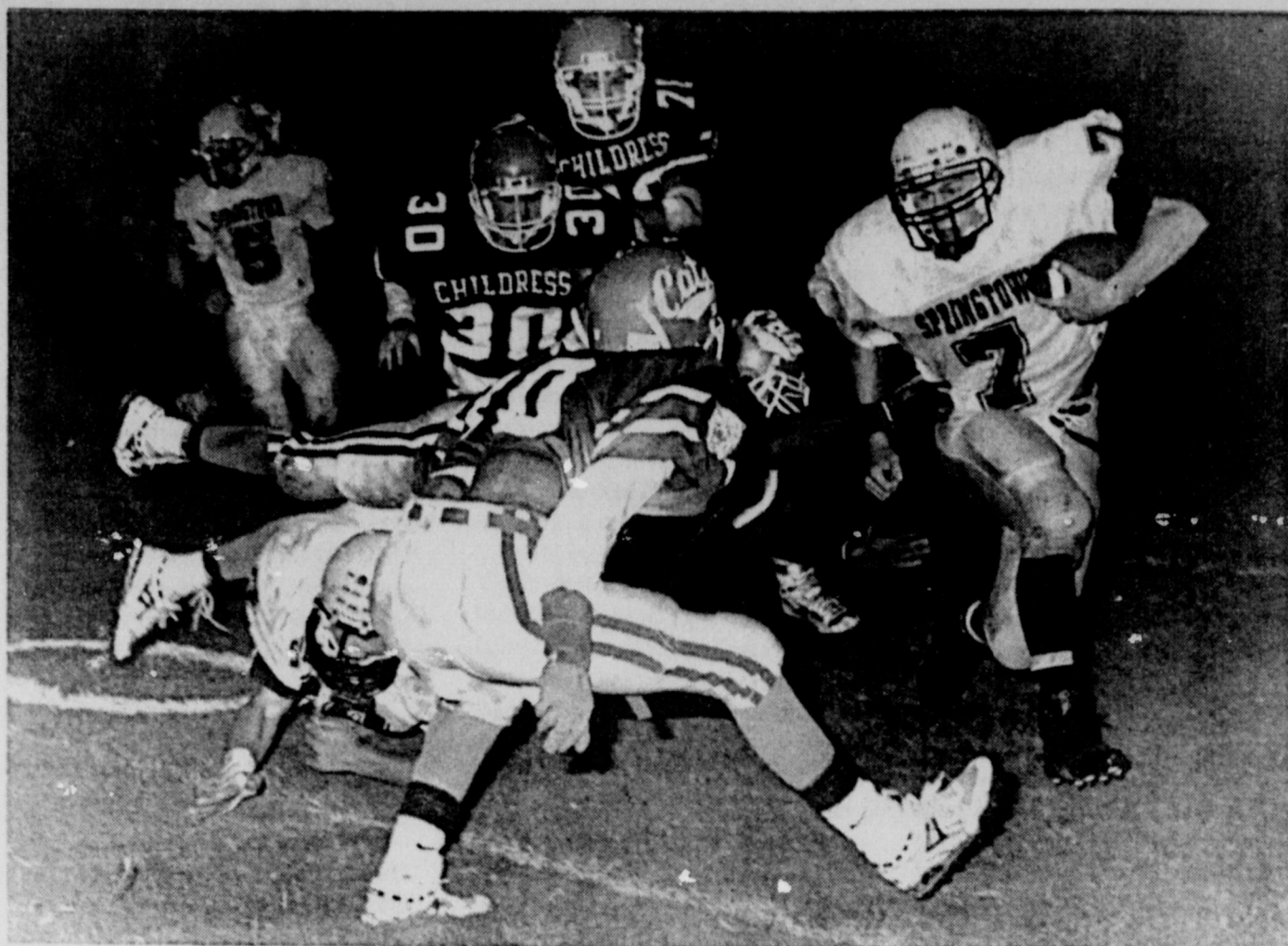

Porkeys demolish Bobcats

Springtown scored on its first six possessions en route to a 42-18 romp over the Childress Bobcats Friday night at rain-soaked Hawk Stadium.

The Porcupines (9-2-1), scored on drives of 72, 78, 48, 61, 72, and 63 yards but picked up only 13 first downs for the entire game. Springtown advances to the Regional round of the playoffs where they will square off against sixth-ranked Ballinger Friday night at 7:30 p.m. at Farrington Field in Ft. Worth. Childress finishes the season with a 9-3 mark.

Springtown's tailback Dakon Doggett, who finished the night with 184 yards rushing on only 8 carries, scored on the first play from scrimmage on a 72-yard run to put the Porcupines on the board. Brad Haugen kicked the first of his 6 extra points to give his team a 7-0 lead only 16 seconds into the game.

Following an 11-play drive by

Childress that resulted in a 29-yard field goal by Matthew Vitela, the Porcupines took over on offense and again it was Doggett who carried the load. Doggett accounted for all 78 yards of the two-play drive, scoring from 44 yards out to boost the lead to 14-3 with 7:13 left in the first quarter.

The Bobcats fumbled on their next possession and 6 plays later, quarterback Mark Mathis hooked up with Donnie Hamilton on a fourth-and-three for a 14-yard touchdown pass to give Springtown a 21-3 lead.

Three plays into the second quarter, the Porcupines made it 28-3 when Corey Gilley, who finished with 153 yards rushing on only 5 carries, found the end zone from 57 yards out.

Childress cut the lead to 28-10 when quarterback Jason Keys found James Sparkman, who finished with 11 catches for 88 yards, all alone in the end zone for a 15-yard touchdown. With just 1:10 left before half, Gilley

gave his team a 35-10 lead when he dove over from the 1 to cap a 72-yard drive that consumed 3:37 off the clock.

The Bobcats took the ball to open the second half and held it for all but 88 seconds of the third quarter but were outscored 7-0 when Gilley scored on a 38-yard run midway through the period.

Childress' final score came on a 1-yard run by Yandy Yarbrough early in the fourth quarter. Yarbrough finished the night with 116 yards rushing on 23 carries.

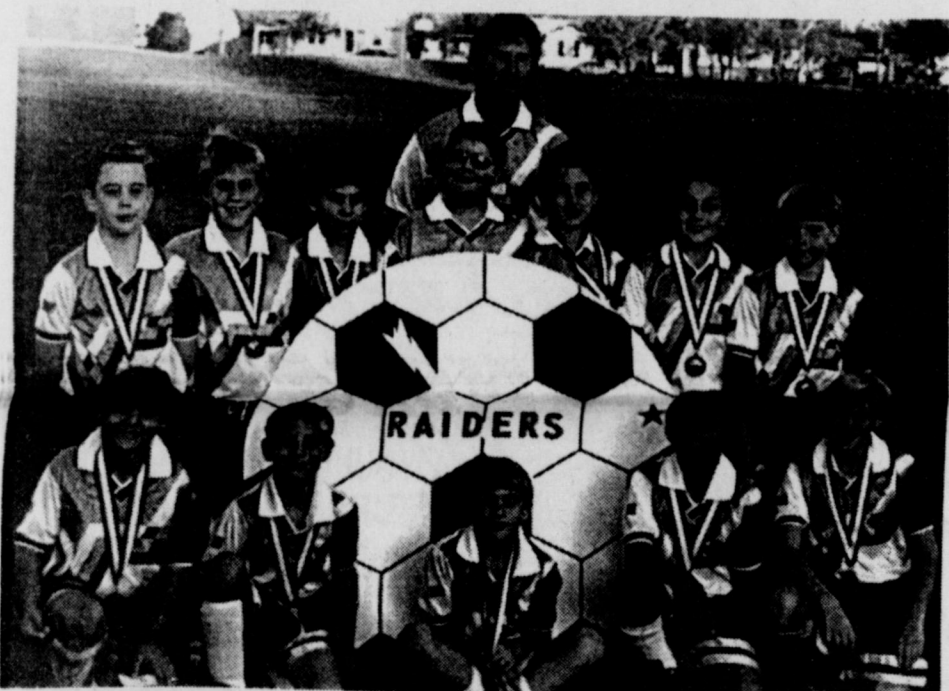
HAWK 8TH

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GARDENING HINTS

By MARK TERNING, COUNTY AGENT - HORTICULTURE

Texas is the second-largest producer of pecans in the United States.

The 1994 pecan crop in Texas is estimated to be 10 million pounds. Oklahoma is predicted to have a 16 million pound crop consisting mainly of native pecans.

Consumers can count on a plentiful supply of quality pecans for sale in the local area as we go into the holiday season.

Pecans represent a major economic force for this reason. Within a 60-mile radius of Wichita Falls there is normally about two million pounds of pecans harvested each year.

Buyers pay fair market value for pecans and that money is circulated back into our local economy. Pecans are a rapidly-growing segment of our horticultural industry in this part of the state.

It is true that some pecans are actually better than others. A quality pecan will have a high percentage of edible kernel. Pecan grading is a process that we use to determine what percent of a pecan is actually good and edible kernel.

Pecan quality is what pecan shows are designed to determine. Each year the Texas Agricultural Extension Service hosts pecan shows across the state and in Wichita County.

Homeowners and commercial growers have a chance to learn about pecan quality, growing pecans, and

orchard management by participating in pecan shows.

The 1994 Wichita County Pecan Show is set for Friday, Dec. 2 at Sikes Senter Mall in Wichita Falls.

If you enter a pecan sample, we will identify the variety, rate the quality and award your entry with a ribbon or plaque. You also have a chance to advance to regional and state pecan show competitions.

Entering a sample is easy. *Gather a minimum of 40 uniform pecans of the same variety and place them in a paper bag with your name, address, telephone number and variety of pecan if known.

Do not polish the pecans. Simply remove the green husk and dust off any dirt. Submit as many different varieties as you wish, but only one sample per variety. Keep each variety in a separate paper sack.

* Deliver entries to the Wichita County Extension Office at 1626 Midwestern Parkway in Wichita Falls, Berend Brothers in Burkburnett, or K&K Grain Elevator in Electra.

* All entries must be delivered to one of the above listed locations by 5 p.m. November 23 so that pecan processing can be done prior to the show date.

* Exhibits on pecans, pecan growing information, and pecan entries with awards will be on display all day on Dec. 2.

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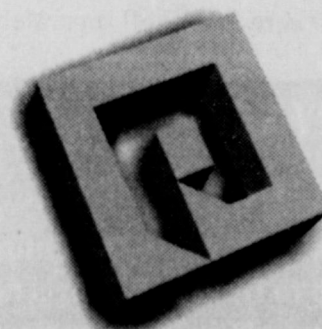

AUSTIN - Comptroller John Sharp last week proposed cuts in the state budget totaling \$2.1 billion during the next biennium and \$4.6 billion over the next five years.

In a 734-page report, titled "Gaming Ground" - the latest phase of his Texas Performance Review - Sharp proposes 400 ways to trim government waste and spending.

If adopted, Sharp's proposal would eliminate 11,683 teachers and state employees by 1996, resulting in a combined savings of \$934.8 million in salaries and from the state's projected share of retirement funds.

Teacher groups criticized the proposal. Texas Federation of Teachers spokesman Eric Hartman, in a *Houston Chronicle* report, said the surplus in the Teacher Retirement System should be used to increase benefits, rather than be "siphoned to make up for the shortfall in revenue."

Sharp's proposals include:
- Adopting early retirement incentives for state employees.
- Decentralizing the public school system to ease more local control.
- Cutting prison system costs through precise deployment of guards, deporting nonviolent foreign prisoners and making inmates pay sales taxes on purchases.

- Expanding the use of the ATM-style distribution of welfare benefits, which is now being tested in a pilot program.

- Allowing Texas residents to prepay college tuition for minors at current tuition rates.

- Revoking \$567 million in state-authorized bonds that won't be used.

- Expanding electronic access to legislative bills and other state information.

Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock and House Speaker Pete Laney released statements saying they will study Sharp's proposals.

Garza Nominated for S of S
Gov.-elect George W. Bush has nominated Cameron County Judge Tony Garza as secretary of state.

If approved by state Senate confirmation, Garza will serve a concurrent term for Bush.

The secretary of state's duties include:
- Authentication of public laws;
- Keeping a record of all

official acts and proceedings of the governor.

- Handling all corporate charters, and

- Running state elections.
Bush called Garza, 35, "a man of excellence," and said he nominated the Hispanic Republican to show his administration's openness to "people of excellence from all walks of life in our state."

Richards to Lead Demos?

Gov. Ann Richards' name was circulated last week as a possible replacement for National Democratic Party Chairman David Wilborn.

White House Press Secretary Dee Myers, who was traveling with Clinton last week in Southeast Asia, confirmed that Richards is "definitely in the running" as a possible replacement.

The job pays \$100,000 a year, about the same as Richards gets from the state payroll.

Meanwhile, Richards rejected the speculation saying, "I have no plans to become chairman of the Democratic National Committee." She declined to comment further.

The outgoing governor's spokesman, Chuck McDonald, said Richards is receiving many offers for things she can do after she leaves office in January.

Texas to Get Education Grant

Texas will receive \$7.1 million in federal funds to develop a comprehensive, statewide school improvement plan.

The Education Department grant was awarded to Texas under the Goals 2000 education reform legislation signed this year by President Clinton.

The state and communities will coordinate to develop school improvement plans stressing academic and performance standards, increased parental involvement, training and professional development for teachers.

U.S. Rep. Rita de la Garza, D-Mission, said at least 60 percent of the funds will be distributed directly to local elementary and secondary education reform. The money will be allocated on a competitive basis by the Texas Department of Education.

Other Highlights
- Attorney General Dan Morales is investigating the background of Court of Criminal Appeals Judge-elect Steve Mansfield. Allegations are swirling that the Houston Republican has no proof of his experience as a criminal lawyer and that he has lied about his age. If Mansfield were disqualified from serving, the governor would name a replacement.

- Mexican American Democrats of Texas last week urged a boycott of California-related products and entertainment after that state voted to deny education and other services to illegal immigrants. State Rep. Robert Abouz, D-Dallas, who heads the group, asked Hispanics to boycott "anything connected to California - even Mickey Mouse."

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
