### **Government by Law** Was First Expressed On July Fourth, 1776

Our Declaration of Independence, signed 178 years ago, is considered by lawyers as expressing a basic principle of our American way of life-our belief in a government of laws rather than a government of men, and in certain individual rights that must not be denied by

governing bodies. The indictments set out in the document against King George III of Great Britain charged him with numerous violations of that tenet. Among the complaints enumerated

### Mrs. Maggie Cobb. **Pioneer Resident**, **Dies in Wichita Falls**

Funeral services were conducted Tuesday afternoon at 4.00 for Mrs. Maggie Cobb, 79, grandmother of Mrs. Pete Guthrie, at the Fain Memorial Presbyterian church in Wichita Falls, where she was a member.

Rev. L. M. Kennedy, pastor, officiated. He was assisted by Rev. B. L. Baits, Cumberland Presbyterian minister.

The body lay in state from 3:00 to 4:00.

Burial was in Highland cemetery of Iowa Park under direction of Tanner Funeral Home. The Iowa Park chapter of Eastern Star conducted graveside services. Mrs. Cobb was born August 30.

1874 in Bethel Springs, McNary county, Tenn. She moved to Wichita county about 55 years ago and lived in the Beaver Creek community several years befor moving with her family to Iowa Park.

Mrs. Cobb was a former member of the Iowa Park Presbyterian church and was a charter member of the local Eastern Star chapter, which was organized in 1910.

She had made her home with her daughter Miss Flora Cobb, Wichita county district court clerk, who at one time was city secretary of Iowa Park for many years before starting work at the county courthouse. Mrs. Cobb died Monday morning

at her home in Wichita Falls. She had been in failing health since 1946 from leukemia, but was able to live a normal life, and she enjoyed meeting her friends, espe cially on Pioneer Day at the Texas-Oklahoma Fair.

Besides her daughter Flora, Mrs. Cobb is survived by two other daughters Mrs. Henry McMurray of Wichita Falls and Mrs. John Tucker of Gladewater; three sons Carl and Hershel of Wichita Falls and J. C. of Tishomingo, Okla.; a brother, Troy Lain of Memphis, Tenn.; a sister Mrs. John Hendricks of Bethel Springs; seven grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren. A total of 370 Americans will die in highway accidents during the three-day July Fourth weekend, ac-

the Association of Casualty and a year. Surety companies. The estimate breaks down the causes of the fatal accidents into six principal categories:

Speeding is expected to kill 123; excessive use of alcohol will account for 82 more, both motorists and pedestrians; failure to keep to the right of the centerline, 37 deaths; failure to yield right of way, 26; over fatigued drivers or drivers actually asleep at the wheel, 23; and miscellaneous causes, 79.

The national highway death toll for the Memorial Day weekend, not counting those who were injured but didn't die until sometime after the weekend was over, was 362. The association had predicted 380 deaths.

The last two should never be breathed or come in contact with the skin and all others should be washed off the hands with soap and water as soon as possible after contact.

MALATHION - A compound of parathion is a fly spray that will kill all flies that are resistant to DDT, indane, and toxophene. This insecticide had a 2 to 3 week residual kill and can be used with safety when directions are followed. It cannot be applied to animals or on the feed.

Fifteen people lost their lives last year by the careless use of insecticides. Be sure you know what you are using and that you know how to use it.
