# Retiring . . . after half a century

Missing!! One smiling face customers have become accustomed to associating with the pharmacy business through a half century---personable Louise Berry.

Many people have come to think of Louise as a permanent fixture in the pharmacy, that originally was opened by her late husband, Alan. Although it has been in three locations and had three owners since 1945, Louise has always been there. But, the close of 50 years in the business came July 1 for her.

Hughes Pharmacy will honor Louise at a reception Friday. Refreshments will be served from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m.

The "drug" store business had seen a number of owners in Iowa Park since shortly after the town was settled in 1889. The early stores had mostly patent medicines sold over the counter. Then they were owned by early-day doctors who compounded their own prescriptions.

Alan W. and Louise Berry bought their store from I.W. Austin in 1945 after he had operated it 23 years. At that time the store was located on the south side of Cash Street. There was Metz Cafe on the corner of Cash and Wall Streets, next was Homer Blalock's Barber Shop, another building, Berry Drug, the Post Office and Bradford Hardware. The Berrys remained in that building 10 years.

Louise remembered her husband bought what would be an unusual array of items for today's modern pharmacies. One was a complete line of veterinary supplies, dehorners, and other instruments and supplies to fill the needs of the ranchers and dairy farmers in the area. Now these items have to be bought from a vetinarian supply company, or a vetinarian.

The mortar and pestle were necessary fixtures in those years when the pharmacist compounded most of his own medicines, mixing liquids and using the mortar and pestle to grind or pound the various ingredients to fill capsules.

Three doors down from the drug store was a Piggly Wiggly store. Piggly Wiggly then built the building where Food Depot is now located. When they moved the Berrys bought the building they had occupied from the late T.J. Pace.

Before they moved into the building a fire destroyed the pool hall, Frankie's Apparel and Black's Market, located across the street. Louise remembers that Forest Bates Barber Shop, Curtis Sewell Barber Shop and Pybus Cleaners, all located on the north side of Cash, had moved some things from their buildings into the vacant building the Berrys bought until they could make whatever repairs were needed to their buildings.

The Berrys moved into their building, modernizing their facilities and adding new lines of merchandise and new soda fountain. But the principal department continued to be the drug department, with Berry filling an average of 40 prescriptions a day, including refills. Berry Drug also served

as the local bus terminal.

The grand opening in their new building was in 1956. Louise remembers the store was crowded throughout the open hours. "Lottie Lochridge played the organ for us," Louise recalled.

Berry died in September 1961. In June 1962, Louise sold the store to A.K. "Bumps" and Ina Settle of Wichita Falls. Berry Drug then became Settle Drug. He operated the store in the same location 10 years. Louise continued to work for him. In 1972 Settle built the building at the present location of the store, 120 Park Ave. Louise moved with him.

When he sold the store to Joe Hughes in 1986, he told Hughes, "Louise goes with the store."

Louise said, "I guess Joe took him seriously because I worked for him almost 10 years." She worked full time for Settle and has worked part time for Hughes. The name was changed to Hughes Pharmacy in October 1990.

Louise is a native of Graham, as was her mother before her. She graduated Graham High School and attended TWC a year and a half and then at mid-term, Dec. 25, 1936, she married a young registered pharmacist from Coleman, and she never returned to college.

Louise and Alan were married in Graham and lived there until 1942. Alan took a job as phamacist for Miller Drug Store in Archer City where they lived three years before moving to Iowa Park.

In Archer City the Berrys also operated the old Royal Theater, which has been commonly known as "The Last Picture Show", since it was popularized as such by Archer City native and novelist, Larry McMurtry in both book and film.

"When we moved here there weren't any street signs, "Louise said, "people would come in the store and ask where someone lived. If we could find out who they lived near, we could send them in the right direction."

She continued, "When we moved here there was only one law officer. That was Bill Detliff. After him there was Henry Jones, still only one." She added, "There have been a lot of changes in the 50 years since we moved here."

They came to Iowa Park and took their place in the activities of the town. Alan was a gregarious, civic minded individual. He was commonly known as "Doc" as are many pharmacists. The little children knew him as "Pappaw" because that is what he called himself to them.

Louise worked most of the time and hasn't had a lot of time for social activities. But, she has been ready to help in activities for the good of the town. She was always ready and willing to help with school functions when her two sons were in school. She served as a room mother 12 years.

Louise always helped at the Texas-Oklahoma Fair. She remembers picking, shelling and canning blackeyed peas and making squash relish to exhibit in the Women's Division. And she always worked in the junior and senior booths.

She is an inactive member of Epsilon Sigma Alpha, and an active member of First Presbyterian Church. She does a lot of visiting at the nursing homes and hospitals, and checks in on people she knows are ill.

Louise is sure she · ill be doing more of that and more church work in the future.

"I plan to do some of the things I haven't had time to do and work. I

# Fireworks problems numerous

Had it not been for fireworks, Iowa Park police wouldn't have had many entries on their blotter the past week.

There were 14 complaints turned in to the department since Wednesday of last week, all relating to persons violating the city ordinance prohibiting the setting off of fireworks inside the city.

At least three warnings were issued to persons who had repeat contacts for the violation.

The radio dispatcher also sent Iowa
Park and West Wichita volunteer
firemen to at least six grassfires, all
resulting from fireworks.

Four arrests were included in the week's police blotter, however none of them related to fireworks.

# Streets top topic for city meeting

Street improvements will be the major topic of Monday night's regular meeting of the city council, according to the tentative agenda released Wednesday.

The meeting is to begin at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

Administrator Mike Price will ask the council for authority to implement improvements in the downtown business area.

Besides the overlaying of the old, cracked concrete surfaces, some plans for installing lights on the east side of the 300 block of North Wall will be considered.

At the council's last meeting,
Mayor Wayne House pointed out he
felt the need of the lights, not only to
improve the appearance of that block,
but also to better designate lanes of

traffic and parking.

The mayor also asked aldermen to allow installation of gas lights there, as an extension of similar lights which were placed in the median of West Park.

A list of streets to receive an application of slurry this summer also will be considered. Suggestions have been entered earlier by council members, and Monday's action will finalize that plan.

A second public hearing required on a grant application will be held, and if no opposition is expressed, that will be followed by adoption of a resolution.

Funding through the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs Texas Capital Fund Infrastructure Grant Program is being sought

The groom's heart shaped chocolate cheesecake was served with mints, nuts, M&Ms and champagne punch.


For travel on their wedding trip the bride wore a white shorts set with rhinestone covered bodice.

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





#### EIGHT WAYS TO PREVENT SKIN CANCER

The American Academy of Dermittology recommends the following precautions to lessen the chance of developing sitin cancer.

- Minimize Sun Exposure, especially during the peak sun hours of 10:00 AM and 2:00 PM when the sun's rays are the most intonse.
- √ Apply a Sunscreen liberally and frequently, and reapply every two (2) hours when working, playing, or exercising outdoors. Sunscreens with a Sun Protection Factor (SPF) of at least 15 are recommended for protection against skin cancer and premature aging of the skin. Even on cloudy days, these precautions should be followed.
- √ Wear Appropriate Clothing during prolonged periods in the sun, including a hat, long-eleeved shirt and pants.
- √ Beware of Reflective Surfaces. Sand, snow, concrete, and water can reflect up to 85 percent of the sun's damaging rays.
- √ Avoid Tanning Salons and Sunlamps since the ultraviolet rays emitted by these artificial sources are similar to those in sunlight and can cause sunburn. premature aging, and increased risk of skin cancer.
- √ Protect Children by keeping them out of the sun or minimizing sun exposure and applying sunscreens beginning at six months of age.
- √ Teach Children and Teenagers sun protection, since sun exposure damage accumulates over the course of a lifetime. One severe childhood or adolescent sunburn will double the risks of developing skin cancer.
- V Examine Your Skin and your children's regularly for any changes in moles, freckles, or skin discoloration.





With all the residential construction underway in Iowa Park, it's well worth noting that three properties of long-time Iowa Park families have recently been put up for sale.

Do the names of George, Crawford and Van Horn sound familiar?

Asks city for help

cently had a for-sale sign placed at the driveway of her home, and it is likely to garner considerable attention, as will the other two places.

The George land encompasses almost all the land bounded by US 287, Texas Ave., Bell Road and Victoria, leaving out only the old red-brick home now owned by Mr. and Mrs. Mark Toby, which faces Texas.

The western portion of that property, in case you haven't heard, was once a nine-hole, sand-green golf course.

The W.T. Crawford residence should be familiar to everyone, especially if they've ever attended a football game at Hawk Stadium. It's located directly across Johnson Road from the stadium's east ticket office.

Then, in that same neighborhood, the old Van Horn place has gone on the sale block. That's all the virgin land between Johnson Road westward almost to the creek, with the railroad on the south and US 287 on the north. except, of course, the school district's land.


I have to question the responsibility of our city officials to allow this to

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

Cook the bacon well done, not burnt. Place on the 8-inch plate and crumble when cool.

When the potatoes are done, remove to the paper lined bowl; set out of the way. Dump the bell pepper and celery into the skillet and saute; stir them around a bit. When the pepper and celery are about done, add the onion and garlic and stir real well. When the veggies are cooked, then get the bowl of potatoes and dump them back into the skillet.

Pour in the well-beaten eggs and stir to mix well. When they are done, it's time to eat.

This omelet is not pretty, just close your eyes and enjoy. It works well for a cook-out at the lake side, and even sometimes for supper.

The formulas and procedures shown are practical and not time consuming. It's the grub we want to consume, not the minutes on the clock.

#### **Baked Chicken Breasts**

A quickie for those times when kin folks drop in unexpected.

Pre-heat oven to 350 F.

1/2 chicken breast per person. Skin it and smear both sides with margarine Sprinkle on some Italian seasoning, garlic powder, pepper (red or black).

Place breasts in a pyrex dish; set on middle rack of the oven; turn after 30 minutes.

After 20 more minutes, turn back over and sprinkle a little Parmesan cheese on each breast and cook an additional 5-10 minutes.

Remove from the oven and you have your meat course. If you have a microwave, bake a few potatoes, throw together a salad, and sit down to eat.

A nice aspect of this chicken thing is that your total worktime preparing and turning the breasts should not exceed fifteen minutes. The salad maybe 10 more minutes, and washing the potatoes and turning them in the microwave, five more.

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

#### NEWS OF THE IOWA PARK GENEALOGICAL & HISTORICAL SOCIETY

The U.S. Federal Census was first taken and recorded in 1790. It has become one of the most important historical records of great sigificance in our country.

These records in the government archives contain much information about ordinary citizens in 1790 and each census since that time has provided a wealth of information.

The information not only has provided us a view of the past but has influenced our way of life.

To genealogists the early censuses give us a general view of our ancestors' household. They list only the name of the male head of the family, followed by the number of male and female members in age groups: under 10 years, between the years 10-16, 16-25, 25-45.

This gives some idea of the number of children in the family. However, one needs to bear in mind each member of the household may not be closely related. They may be cousins, hired help and at times other kin or friends.

William Thorndale and William Dollarhide have published three important works that have been reprinted and two are in paperback. Valuable reference books for libraries, both public and private, are must





But the Sheppard team didn't quit as they rallied in the top of the final frame to score a run and have the run that would have tied the game at 4-4 thrown out at the plate in the top of the sixth.
