## Council names streets for summer attention

The city council finalized its list of streets to be improved by slurry applications this summer, during Monday night's meeting.

And in addition to a plan to overlay the downtown streets with asphalt, a proposal to enhance parking and appearance in one of the blocks also was approved.

Streets to be slurred this summer include:

100-400 blocks, South Jackson;  
500-900 blocks, South Yosemite;  
100-300 blocks, East Ruby;  
100-400 blocks, West Ruby;  
100 block, North Texowa;  
500-1000 blocks, Pasadena;  
100-1000 blocks, East Bank;  
200-400 blocks, West Clara;  
500 block, North Second; and,  
100-300 blocks, West Crystal.

Additionally, two half-block streets off Mary Drive will receive slurry applications, as well as the northwest entry to Lake Gordon.

During the discussion, aldermen also indicated they wished asphalt overlay work on three blocks of North Third and the 300 and 400 blocks of Louisa, all to be done during summer of 1996.

A plan proposed by Mayor Wayne House, to install three six-foot by 33-foot concrete dividers between the

traffic and parking areas in the 300 block of North Wall was approved.

The plan was approved by a 3-2 vote, however, because it included each of the three dividers to have a natural gas light included. Aldermen Mark Raby and Tracy Fears opposed the plan.

Two other major street improvement projects are in the process of being developed. One is to widen and overlay Magnolia from West Highway to Johnson, and the other is a plan to upgrade Johnson from West Highway to Smith Road for a truck route.

The mayor told aldermen that city administrator Mike Price is coordinating the plan for Magnolia with county commissioner Gordon Griffith, because the south side of that street is not inside the city.

Improvement on Johnson Road for a truck route would not be at city expense, if a grant being sought is approved, Price told the council.

A second public hearing on the grant to acquire infrastructure project funds through the Texas Department of Commerce was held on that subject.

At the same time, Bell Processing is also seeking a similar grant, because the firm plans to establish a recycling center on its property south of Smith Road.

The city's grant request is for \$308,500, Price said.

Aldermen agreed to accept bids on four motorized pieces of equipment that were made at a recent surplus auction.

They included: Tim Rich, \$850, for 1981 one-ton cab and cassis; \$1,150, Joe Picard for IMT mowing tractor; and Deryl James, \$400 and \$950 for 1988 and 1990 model police cars.

Following a brief executive session, listed on the agenda to "discuss purchase, exchange, lease or value of real property," the mayor said only that no action would be taken by the council.

Aldermen also approved transferring \$36,000 of excess funds to the employee benefit trust fund.

During the general discussion period, the council was informed by Belvin Lytle, public works director, that a letter had been mailed to a property owner in the 500 block of Rebecca, in order to correct a situation which violates city ordinances. The owner is to appear in municipal court, he said.

Also discussed was a plan to hold one or two public discussions in the future, concerning the cable television franchise renewal sought by TCI, in order to hear from citizens on the topic.



**CLOSE CALL** - A fire erupted Tuesday morning in the front yard of 1615 Johnson Road, when a ditching machine cut into a natural gas line. T.J. Bean, the operator, said he was digging a ditch for a yard sprinkler at the time. He said he had been assured by a Lone Star Gas representative that the line was deeper than the 10 inches he was digging. He shut down the machine, which was totally destroyed, when he realized the line had been cut, and the motor backfired, igniting the spewing gas. No injuries were sustained in the incident. Iowa Park firemen extinguished the blaze, and stood by until pressure was cut off by a Lone Star employee.

## Man arrested here wanted in Archer

Iowa Park arrested a man here for public intoxication, but he wound up in the Archer County jail.

Ben Gregory Henderson, 39, was taken into custody at 9:24 p.m. Friday in the 400 block of East Highway, on a charge of public intoxication.

When the radio dispatcher made a regulation check on the computer, it turned out that two warrants for his arrest were outstanding from Archer County.

They were for driving while intoxicated and failure to appear in court. And the total bond on those warrants was \$10,000, according to records.

Henderson was taken to the local police station, where his rights were read by Justice of the Peace Bill Robinson. He signed a promise to appear in municipal court here, and was turned over to an Archer sheriff's deputy at 12:20 a.m. to be transported to Archer City.

Another man was arrested at 12:26 a.m. Friday, and was sent to Wichita County jail on a charge of unlawful carrying weapons.

Jeffery Lee Davenport, 17, was

stopped in the 900 block of South Wall because his pickup's lights were not all working.

The officer searched the vehicle and found a wooden club and 12-inch knife, resulting in the charge. He was turned over to a county deputy at 3:15 a.m. to be transported to Wichita Falls, according to the police blotter.

Police stopped a vehicle at 4:59 a.m. Wednesday near Park Plaza and West Highway, and reported the passenger was intoxicated and described him as being belligerent.

The passenger was identified as Christopher Williams, 20. The driver, Jeffrey Kaspar, also 20, was cited for having a minor in possession in his vehicle, according to the report.

The mother of a male juvenile took her son to the police station Friday afternoon, after he had reportedly been assaulted by another juvenile.

Because the alleged assault took place at Country View Park, outside the city, county officials were notified, and the youth was taken by private vehicle to a Wichita Falls hospital.

## School needs, personnel on agenda for trustees

Recommendations on facility needs of the Iowa Park school district, personnel and a closed meeting with parents are on tap for tonight's school board meeting.

To begin at 6:30 p.m., the meeting will be held in the junior high library.

Recommendations on present and anticipated school facility needs will be presented by specialist Gary Keep.

Each of the campus principals have earlier presented their recommendations, and that information, along with other data, has been taken into consideration by Keep.

The first of two executive sessions on the meeting's tentative agenda concerns "discipline." Sub topics are listed as "parent complaint" and "City View parents' request."

The second session closed to the

public is listed as "personnel." During that period, trustees are to receive resignations, consider new personnel, and reassign personnel.

No action can be taken by the board during a closed session, according to the Open Meetings Law. Action can be taken, if desired by the board, once the meeting is resumed in open session.

Besides the closed sessions and regular monthly department reports, other topics on the agenda include:

- \* presentation of Beautification Award from the Texas Urban Forestry League;

- \* accept/reject bank depository bid for next two years;

- \* consider requests for additional personnel needs for the 1995-96 school year.

## Building permits over \$2-million

With only half the year gone by, Iowa Park building permits have already vaulted over the \$2-million mark.

June's permit total of \$296,702 was short of May and April, which were \$365,948 and \$411,547, respectively, but still comparatively high when compared with years past.

## COOK OF THE WEEK

Following a request a few weeks ago from one of our readers who was looking for a recipe for baked "Empanadas," the *Leader* received responses from California and Virginia.

Edwin M. Davis from Hemet, Calif., and Margaret Virgin Bitler of Yorktown, Va., sent in their recipes for the dessert turnovers.

The first recipe is the one sent in by Davis:

### Empanadas

3 cups all-purpose flour  
2 tps. baking powder  
1/2 tsp. salt  
1/2 cup lard or shortening  
2 eggs  
1/2 cup milk  
Pumpkin filling  
Fat for deep-fat frying (optional)  
Powdered sugar or granulated sugar

Stir together flour, baking powder, and salt. Cut in lard or shortening till mixture resembles cornmeal. Beat eggs with milk. Add to flour mixture, stirring till combined (use hands if necessary).

Form dough into a ball; cover and chill 1 hour. Divide dough into 16 portions. On lightly floured surface, roll each part to a 6-inch circle. Place about 3 tablespoons pumpkin filling on each. Moisten edges with a little water; fold in half, pressing edges with a fork to seal. Fry or bake as directed below. Makes 16.

To fry: Fry empanadas, a few at a time, in deep hot fat (375°) about four minutes or till golden, turning once. Drain on paper toweling. Sprinkle with powdered sugar.

To bake: Place empanadas on baking sheet. Brush tops with a little milk; sprinkle with granulated sugar. Bake in 400° oven about 15 minutes or until golden brown.

**Pumpkin Filling:**  
Stir together:  
1 - 16 oz. can pumpkin  
1 cup packed dark brown sugar  
3/4 cup chopped walnuts  
1/2 cup raisins  
1 tsp. ground cinnamon  
1/4 tsp. ground cloves  
Makes about 3 cups.

For another filling: Well-drained crushed pineapple makes a tasty fill-

ing too. You will need about 3 cups, measured after draining to fill 16 empanadas.

Margaret Virgin Bitler sent in the following definition and recipe for empanadas:

P. 69 "The Joy of Cooking."

Turnovers, Rissoles or Fried Pies  
These triangular or crescent-shaped pastries make attractive canapes. If baked they are turnovers. If deep-fat-fried, you may call them fried pies or the more erotic one of rissoles or empanadas.

Roll to the thickness of 1/8 inch any pie crust. Cut it into 2 1/2 inch rounds or squares. Place any filling in the center of each, brush the edges lightly with water. Fold the dough over into crescents. Bake in a 400° oven until brown.

### Empanadas De Calabaza (Pumpkin Empanadas)

2 (16 oz.) cans pumpkin  
2 cups sugar  
1 (2-inch) stick cinnamon  
2 tps. ground cinnamon  
1/2 tsp. ground nutmeg  
1/2 tsp. ground ginger  
3 cups all-purpose flour  
1 1/2 tsp. salt  
1 cup shortening  
3/4 cup beer

Combine first 6 ingredients in a large heavy saucepan; bring to a boil, stirring constantly. Reduce heat, and simmer 1 hour or until thickened, stirring often. Remove and discard cinnamon stick; let pumpkin mixture cool.

Combine flour and salt; cut in shortening with pastry blender until mixture is crumbly. Make a well in center of mixture.

Add beer, stirring with a fork, until dry ingredients are moistened.

Shape into a ball. Flour hands and shape into 1 1/2 inch balls; roll or flatten to 1/2 inch thickness on a lightly floured surface. Let stand 30 minutes.

Roll each dough round into a 4-inch circle. Place about 3 tablespoons pumpkin mixture in center of each circle, and fold pastry in half. Moisten edges with water and press with a fork to seal. Place on ungreased baking sheets.

Bake at 400° 18 to 20 minutes or until edges are lightly browned. Yield: 1 1/2 dozen.

## Public assistance sought by state for storm damage

Public assistance to compensate local and state government for repairs in seven North Texas counties has been requested by the Texas Division of Emergency Management.

The funds would be used for infrastructure and debris removal in Wichita, Childress, Collingsworth, Foard, Hall, Hardeman and Hemphill counties, as well as eight others in the state.

All the counties have been adversely affected by late spring weather systems, prompting Gov. George W. Bush to issue the request for federal assistance.

**Motion Sickness**

- Motion sickness—the most common medical problem of traveling—is usually experienced as dizziness. It is also sometimes accompanied by nausea, vomiting and pale or clammy skin.
- To minimize motion sickness, ride where your eyes will see the same motion that your body and inner ears feel. For example, sit in the front seat of the car and fix your eyes on a distant, stationary object. If you are in a boat, look at the horizon.
- If you are prone to motion sickness, do not read while traveling, and do not sit facing backward.
- Avoid watching or talking to someone who is experiencing motion sickness.
- Avoid strong odors and spicy or greasy foods that may unsettle your stomach, especially just before or during travel.
- In addition to these self-help measures, there are several medications available that minimize the effects of motion sickness.
- If you experience severe motion sickness, or any other type of dizziness, consult a physician who specializes in disorders of the ear, nose and throat.

Price and Paralee's children were Charlie William, Mary Lucinda Raglin Franklin, Sallie Raglin Harrison, Oscar Taylor "O.T.", Minnie Odessa Raglin Coffman, Arnon Bert "Chock", Lydia Lee "Lillie" Raglin Henson Davis, Johnny Price, Laura O'Donald Raglin Miller and Monte "Buss".

Some members of Price's brother, Andrew Jackson Raglin's family would come when possible and a granddaughter, Lillie Raglin Cooper and her husband, Elmo, hosted the reunion one year in Idabel, Okla., and a grandson and wife, Grady, and Lillian Raglin hosted the reunion in Hobbs, N.M.

In 1977 Gladys Raglin Davis Bailey, daughter of Price's brother, Green Thomas Raglin, attended the reunion in Shawnee, Okla., and was regular in attendance many years, coming from Lometa, Calif., to be with her cousins.

Soon it became apparent that some members of the family wanted to know more about their heritage, and a great-great-grandson of Price's, Tommie William Choate and his wife, Audrey Joan Martin Choate, began searching census records.

Finally they found a family in Titus County, Tx. on the 1850 Census, but could not be sure it was the correct family since Price R. Raglin was not born until 1862. Tommie called his aunt, Mrs. Parks, and named off the children, and she assured him that this was indeed the correct Raglin family,

because her father, Charlie, had often spoken of his Uncle Ike, Uncle Green, Uncle Andy and Uncle Bill.

Through the coordinated efforts of Charlene and Doyle Parks and Tommie and Audrey Choate and with the help of many others the puzzle took shape.

It was learned that Samuel Milton Raglin married Sarah "Nancy" White in Bibb County, Ala., in 1837 and they had Louisa Raglin, Samuel Raglin, Jr., and twins, Nancy Elizabeth and Marion.

There is no knowledge of the time of Sarah's death, but Samuel Milton married Mary Rita Parker in 1847 in Bibb County, Ala., and they had Henry T. Raglin in 1847, before coming to Titus County, Tx., and before the birth of Martha Amanda (called Add) March 24, 1850.

It has now been established that Samuel Milton was the father of 15 children: Louisa, Samuel Jr., Nancy Elizabeth Raglin Wells, Marion (died before 1860), Henry T., Martha Amanda Raglin Ard, William Preston "Bill", James Isaac "Ike", David E. "Dave", Mary E., Andrew Jackson, "Andy", George, Price R. "General Price", Green Thomas "G.T.", and Sarah Raglin Hurt.

A high point of the Iowa Park assembly of the family was the presence of Lydia Lee Raglin Henson Davis who will be 97, Aug. 6, and the presence of Laura Raglin Miller who just celebrated her 93rd birthday in May.

Lydia Lee lives in Stillwater, Okla., and accompanied her son and daughter-in-law, Ray and Mike Henson, to Iowa Park. Laura had been visiting her daughter, Ann Miller Adam and her husband, Odie, and came with them. They returned her to her home in Detroit, Tx., with another daughter, Freeda Miller Adams.

Another highlight was the presence of Melody Raglin, great-granddaughter of Green Thomas Raglin, who had taken his wife Mary Ann Wells and their son, Theodore Raymond "Ted" to Iowa to live. There they had a daughter, Gladys.

Melody is the granddaughter of Ted, and the daughter of Erwin Doyle Raglin. This Iowa branch of Raglins was her only known Raglin kin until her great-aunt, Gladys Raglin Davis Bailey, put her in touch with the Texas Raglins who have reunions every year.

Rep. Finnell welcomes bill

Rep. Charles Finnell welcomed news from Washington, D.C. that the U.S. Senate passed legislation last week which would allow states the latitude to set speed limits on four-lane divided

state highways through rural areas.

Finnell, a vocal advocate of states having this authority, passed a House concurrent resolution (HCR 127, 74th Legis.) expressing Texas legislative intent that each state should be able to make its own speed limit decisions.

In 1991, Finnell passed the bill increasing speed limits on such state highways from 55 to 65 mph effective immediately upon final passage of this legislation currently pending in Congress.

The federal measure, S. 440 by Sen. Nickles of Oklahoma, was passed by the Senate by vote of 65 to 35 and now goes to the House for action.

"After our five-year effort, it appears our states rights regarding transportation are getting some respect in Washington," Finnell said. "It's very important that citizens now focus on urging members of the U.S. House to advance this vital transportation and states rights measure to the President's desk for his signature."

For example, according to Texas Department of Transportation officials monitoring the legislation at Finnell's request, commercial vehicles such as concrete trucks or tandem axle dump trucks would be limited to 55 mph.

On the other hand, a one-ton pickup with dual rear wheels or a 15-foot moving van would likely be under the weight limit.

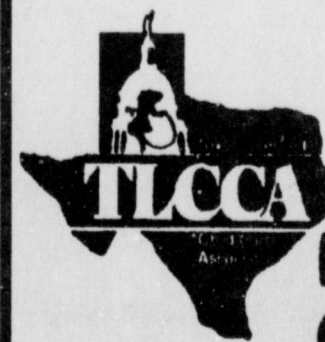
