


# **RETIRED OPTOMETRIST** Likes what he sees in classics

# **Trustees hear options** on meeting space needs

Approximately two hours, of Thursday night's marathon school board meeting was consumed by a consultant making recommendations on how to improve campus facilities to meet current and future needs.

The meeting began at 6:30 p.m. and adjourned at 1:05 a.m.

In the latter part of the meeting, which was held in the junior high school library, two executive sessions were held. One was to hear complaints and requests from parents, and the other concerning personnel.

The consultant, Gary Keep, of SHW Group Inc., a firm of architects and engineers, offered five alternatives on how the district can increase its facilities to handle anticipated student enrollment.

According to his figures, there were at the end of the school year 1,990 students enrolled. Total capacity of the four campuses in the district is 2,008. And the anticipated increase in enrollment over the next five years is 2,341.

Despite having constructed additional classrooms at both the high school and junior high, both campuses are currently overcrowded, Keep told the board.

Iowa Park High School has 574 pupils with a capacity of 550, and the anticipated enrollment was put at 729. The junior high has 493 pupils with a capacity of 480, and the five-

year forecast is for 516. Neither of the elementary build-

ings are overcrowded, according to his figures, but will be within five years.

Kidwell has 440, with a capacity of 461, but 569 are anticipated in his projections. Bradford has 483 pupils with a capacity of 517, but the projection in five years was set at 527.

Keep's five alternatives ranged in cost from \$11,238,000 to \$12,888,000 to increase facilities to meet future enrollment figures.

The consultant was employed to make his study and recommendations. He has done similar work for the district in the past.

Each of the campus administrators have earlier made their recommendations for campus improvements.

No indications have been forthcoming from trustees or administrators on what will be undertaken to increase facilities, nor has any time line been set to make a decision.

Following the consultant's presentation, Mrs. Rick Frazier approached the board with a request to install a hand rail between the high school main building and the "A" building to aid her daughter.

She said the rail, as well as the elevator in the main building which is part of Keep's recommendations, would meet the requirements of the Americans with Disadvantages Act.

Board chairman Keith Fischer told Mrs. Frazier that the board would take

# May disappointing for sales

May apparently was a "downer" for business in Wichita County, according to a report on sales tax collections.

All four cities in the county had lower sales taxes collected that month than in May of 1994, reports the state comptroller's office.

However, despite the fact that Iowa Park's sales tax rebate check dropped 5.95 percent, \$17,462.82 as compared to \$18,567.91 last year, this city still leads the other three in sales tax gain for the year.

According to the comptroller's report, Iowa Park has thus far received \$143,855.12, which is a 10.81-percent gain over the \$129,817.08 received at this time in 1994.

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

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
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

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I've complained about these events in the past, because they cause problems for lots of people, especially those who live or need to travel the routes the rides take.

Wichita Falls gets a lot of mileage with its Hotter 'n Hell Ride. National publicity is received ... and warranted. But our communities that are burdened with the hundreds of riders who pass through are not able to share in all that national publicity.

Routes through Iowa Park cost our taxpayers, because our police department is obligated to provide traffic control.

Yet, Iowa Park is never mentioned in all that publicity.

And just try to get from point A to

point B in the country, if your route is being used by a bicycle ride.

Wichita Falls got even more publicity last week by hosting a national junior competition. But you know what? Only one day's competition out of four was held inside the Wichita Falls city limits.

The rest was out in the rural areas, and people in those areas never knew what days the competition would be held. They were never warned.

Also, those adults who came in their cars to watch were never instructed that they shouldn't park in the driveways of residences.

I know of one man who had to park his car on the roadside when he got home, and wait until the owners of two vehicles returned to drive away that afternoon.

Now we've got a new bicycle ride scheduled for the area. It will be the "Holliday Heat Stroke Ride" on July 29.

And guess what? The only way you can find out if your rural road will be a ride route is to contact the spon-SOLS.

Their advance publicity states that there will be three routes available, from 95 K to 24 miles.

But, if you want to know where their routes are, you've got to participate and that information will be in your packet.

People who like to ride bicycles get a lot of good exercise from the activity. Communities or organizations that sponsor the events get a lot of publicity.

But residents along the routes, and people who have to travel those routes, get the bad part to which I earlier referred.

# **GARDENING HINTS**

# By MARK TERNING, COUNTY AGENT - HORTICULTURE

The heat of July is here for Texoma gardeners. Plant care and maintenance is critical during the summer months. Texoma residents have asked the

following questions during the past week. Q. Where in the world is the

Wichita County Extension Office? A. We recently moved our office

location to the Galaxy Building in Wichita Falls. Our exact address is 4309 Jacksboro Highway, Suite B. Our phone number has remained the same 766-0131.

Q. I have an automatic sprinkler system for watering my lawn. How

often should I water the lawn to keep it green and healthy? The system will deliver a half-inch of water in 30 minutes.

A. You are one of the smart few who actually has measured how much water your system delivers. Most people never measure water output and run their sprinkler system on a hit and miss basis. Warm-season lawns will normally require about one inch of water every five or six days through summer. Adjust your system so that water is applied efficiently. Apply enough water to penetrate the soil without creating run-off. Remember

to adjust your system according to seasonal rainfall patterns also to avoid wasting water.

Q. My twelve year old Red Oak is yellowing and some of the branches are dying back. Another Red Oak planted at the same time in my back yard in Wichita Falls looks great. What is the problem?

A. The leaves you mailed are a text book example of iron deficiency. Yellowing leaf tissue between green veins are the classic symptoms. If you look around town, you will see other Red Oaks with iron deficiency. Treating the trees with an iron fertilizer in a chelated form will provide the best results.

Products such as Lib-Fer Fe or Spring 138 have given good results on iron deficient trees. Check with a gar-






## DOOR-TO-DOOR SALES

den center or chemical distributor for iron fertilizer.

For your information, most of the red oaks which are severely iron deficient are crosses of Pine Oak and other non-adapted oak species. Shumard Oak and Texas Red Oak are the only oaks which will tolerate alkaline soils without iron deficiency problems.

Q. I have three apple trees planted in an Iowa Park landscape. The trees are three years old and now all of the leaves are turning brown around the edges. Is this an insect problem and how can I control it?

A. The problem is not a result of insect damage, however, heat and lack of adequate water will cause leaf scorching. Browning or scorching of leaf edges is a signal to increase your watering program. The recent triple digit temperatures with no rainfall have caused many plants to leaf scorch and defoliate. Regular deep watering at the dripline of trees will reduce the stress of a blistering hot Texoma summer.

Q. My eastern red cedars in Devol, Oklahoma are rapidly turning brown and dying.

A. There are several possible problems with your cedars. Lack of water, twig blight, and more commonly spider mites can cause the type of damage you have described. Spider mites have been all too common on tomatoes, marigolds, and evergreens this year. Check for these very small, reddish insects by shaking several branches over a piece of paper. Look for these tiny moving insects on the paper. You can also in severe infestations find webbing in the plant foliage. When spider mites are a problem the product Kelthane will provide good control.
