Most storm damage in rural areas

Residents of Iowa Park got the better part of storms that occurred during the past week.

Little or no damage was reported, but 2.07 inches of precipitation were measured at the city's waste water treatment plant.

Plant manager Burl Yoder reported four different measurements: .76 Wednesday; .96 Friday; .20 Sunday, and .15 Monday.

Though electricity blinked at homes and businesses Friday night, all the damage reported -- mostly caused by winds -- was to the southeast of the city.

Rural areas lost electrical power

from two causes, winds and lightning.

Power lines, mostly in the FM 367 area east of the city, were downed by broken tree limbs and fallen trees. Additionally, numerous lightning strikes knocked out power in other areas.

Dale Cox, local TU Electric representative, said some 20 poles were downed, and three crews from Graham were called in to assist area crews make repairs.

A fallen tree was reported as blocking traffic on Wellington Lane. And an electrical line was down in the alley behind 107 East Garden.

The electrical storm caused nu-

merous alarm systems to sound off.

Robert Lunney reported considerable damage to his property on South Peterson Road, including partially destroying his barn.

Lunney said the wind was a "backlash," coming out of the East after the main storm had passed over.

Area residents also were awakened early Monday morning by a loud and brilliant storm.

Iowa Park volunteer firemen were alerted by the weather bureau at 8:15 p.m. Sunday that the area was under a tornado watch. However, most of that storm did not cross the Red River out of Oklahoma.

Police calls are numerous

Iowa Park police handled a wide range of calls during the past week, ranging from thefts and arrests to accidents and a charge of sexual assault.

The theft reports began early, with a business in the 500 block of East Highway alleging the theft of a tricycle being taken from in front of the store at 4:10 p.m. Wednesday of last week.

Two theft reports were received within the same hour Sunday.

An employee of a business on West Highway told police \$200 of her personal funds had been taken.

Then, a resident in the 300 block of South Victoria filed a report that sometime between July 1 and 23, more than \$1,500 worth of jewelry had been stolen. Actual value is yet to be determined, but among the items taken were an assortment of gold chains, rings, charms and earrings.

A parent reported a son's theft of a ring from a local business. The youth was escorted to the store to return the ring, valued under \$20, and when the manager decided not to press charges, the parent insisted a police officer talk with the youth and explain the harm. One did, according to the police blotter.

Five arrests were included during the week's police blotter listings.

Police took Harry L. Skinner Jr.,

30, into custody Thursday afternoon on two outstanding warrants issued by the Wichita County Sheriff's Office. The warrants were for forgery and organized criminal activity.

Skinner was transported to the county jail by a sheriff's deputy.

At 10:51 p.m. Thursday, a patrolman stopped a vehicle in the 800 block of east Highway, and determined that the driver, Raymond Cliff Teague, 31, was driving while his license was suspended.

Teague was arrested and taken to jail under a \$300 bond.

Police arrested Lee Harrison Haynes, 18, at 12:09 a.m. Saturday on an outstanding warrant issued by the county sheriff's office.

The charge against Haynes is credit card abuse. He allegedly made \$262 worth of long distance calls by using someone else's credit card number.

He was transported to county jail under a \$7,500 bond.

David John Escobedo, 28, was taken into custody at 6:59 p.m. Saturday at Lake Iowa Park, on a charge of public intoxication, other.

The arresting officer determined Escobedo was intoxicated, and found a marijuana cigarette butt in the vehicle. He was released at 11:57 p.m. after paying a fine of \$180, according to the police blotter entry.

Officers arrested Russell Dale Patterson, 23, at 7:17 p.m. Tuesday, who was known to have an outstanding warrant for his arrest issued by the county sheriff's office.

The warrant for Patterson was attorney off bond for driving while license suspended.

He was turned over to a sheriff's deputy at 10:15 p.m. to be transported to the county jail.

Police responded at 2:12 p.m. Friday to the scene of an accident in the 700 block of West Louisa.

According to the report, a boy riding a bicycle struck a parked vehicle and broke off a front tooth when he hit the vehicle's windshield.

The parent of a seven-year-old boy filed a complaint that he was sexually assaulted July 17 by an 11-year-old. The case has been filed through juvenile court, police said.

Bridget Walls and Michelle Clough were hostesses for a personal shower and a Jamaica shower was given by the bride's co-workers at K-Mart.



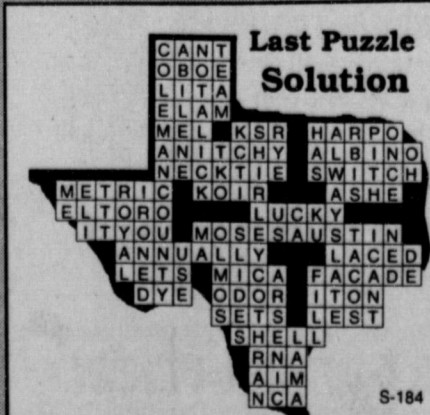

And, like the Holliday ride, you'll have to enter to get a map of where the 100K, 50K and 10K routes will be run.

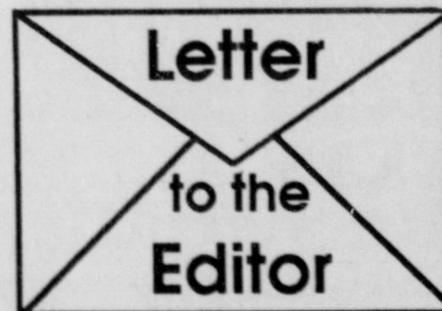

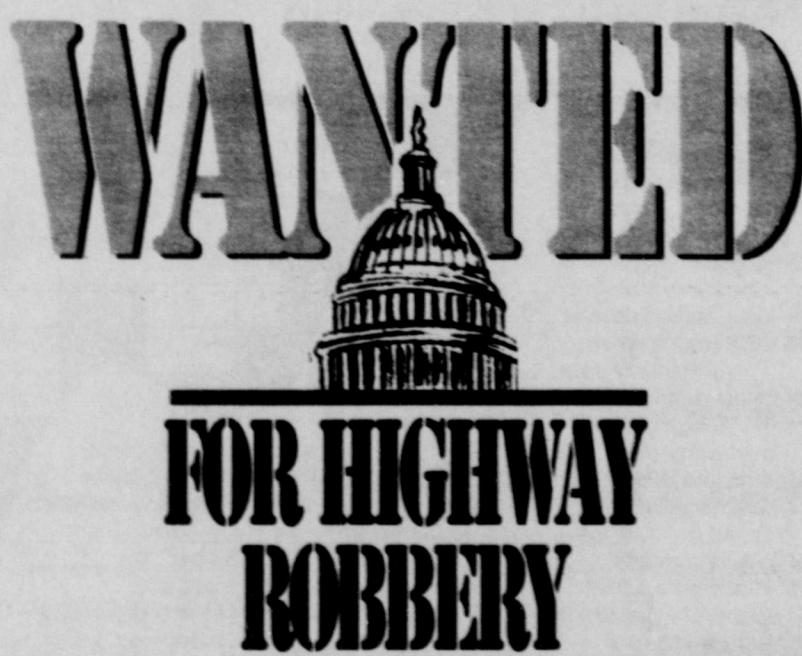

An Immigration Experiment
Most of the migration into the colonies was unorganized and mostly without direction. An exception was in Georgia.

In 1732 England started an immigration which was an effort by both humanitarian and imperialistic groups.

England faced a very serious situation with an increased prison population. Some were imprisoned for convicted crimes and there were also those incarcerated for debt. This was becoming very costly to the taxpayers, mostly the landed gentry.

A plan evolved where during the 18th century criminals had a choice of execution or transportation to the colonies for 14 years of indentured servitude. Some 50,000 convicts came to the colonies under these circumstances. Many Americans didn't like this, but it did limit prison costs in England and did offer felons the chance to become productive workers.

At this time George II issued a charter to Gen. James Oglethorpe and his associates that was different from any other British grant. Georgia was established under the control of trustees.

This colony would relieve the British prisons, reduce the poor tax, and in Georgia protect the southern

frontier from the French in Louisiana and the Spanish in Florida.

The trustees envisioned a paternalistic economy and society because the settlers would be those who supposedly failed in England and must be protected. Many left Georgia after serving their indentured time.

Migration tended to be lateral in movement and many Texans have roots in Georgia or a southern state. A search of the indentured servants might reveal early ancestors.

Emigrants to America, Indentured Servants Recruited in London 1718-1738 by John Wareing, is now available in the Genealogy Department of the Tom Burnett Memorial Library, and may be helpful in your research.

The following books, including Immigrants to America, Indentured Servants Recruited in London mentioned above, Civil War Genealogy by George K. Schweitzer, and Howard County Heritage 1988 (Arkansas) have been recently donated to the Iowa Park Genealogical and Historical Society by Mayre L. Wiseman of Wichita Falls, and the members wish to express their appreciation for her interest and generosity.

Teri likes to cook, and is sharing some good recipes with our readers this week. She said the recipe for "Taco Soup" is good and she uses it a lot when they are having company. One of her favorite desserts is the "22-Minute Cake," a recipe she got from her father.

Italian Casserole

- 1 cup small macaroni
- 3 Tbsps. butter or margarine
- 1 onion, chopped
- 1 clove garlic, crushed
- 2 cups canned tomatoes
- 1 Tbsp. tomato paste
- 1 red pepper, chopped
- 1 green pepper, chopped
- 1/2 lb. salami or low fat sausage
- 10 black olives, halved
- Salt
- Pepper
- 1/4 lb. Mozzarella cheese

Cook the macaroni in plenty of boiling, salted water for 10 minutes or until tender but still firm. Rinse under hot water and drain well. Place in a shallow oven-proof dish.

Meanwhile, heat butter in a pan and fry onion and garlic gently until soft. Add undrained tomatoes, tomato paste, red and green peppers, salami, olives and stir well. Simmer, uncovered, for 5 minutes. Season with salt and pepper.

Pour over the macaroni, stir, and cover with the sliced cheese. Bake uncovered in a moderate oven, 350 degrees, 20 minutes until cheese has melted. Serve with salad and bread.

COOK OF THE WEEK

Taco Soup

- 1 1/2 to 2 lbs. ground beef or turkey
- 1 pkg. taco seasoning
- 1 large diced onion
- 1 can chopped green chilies
- 1 can hominy
- 1 can pinto beans
- 1 pkg. Hidden Valley Ranch dressing mix
- 1/4 tsp. chili powder
- 1 large can ranch style beans
- 3 cups stewed tomatoes

Brown beef and drain. After browning beef, put into a larger soup pot. Add Hidden Valley mix, taco seasoning, onion and chili powder to the meat. Then add the following ingredients without draining: green chilies, ranch style beans, hominy, pinto beans, and tomatoes. Simmer until bubbly. Serve with chips and Cheddar cheese on top. This is a great recipe if you are expecting company because it is easy and serves at least six to eight people.

Saucy Turkey Pot Pie

- 2 envelopes (3/4 to 1 oz. ea.) turkey gravy mix
- 1 Pkg. (10 oz.) frozen mixed vegetables, thawed
- 1 1/2 cups cooked, cubed turkey breast
- 1 cup evaporated skimmed milk
- 1 Tbsp. all-purpose flour
- 1 deep-dish pie crust, frozen
- 4 slices Swiss cheese, cut in half diagonally

In medium bowl, combine gravy mix, vegetables, turkey, evaporated milk and flour. Pour into frozen pie crust. Bake in preheated 375 degree oven, on preheated baking sheet, 45 to 50 minutes.

Arrange cheese slices on top of pie. Return to oven until melted. Let stand 10 minutes before serving.

22 Minute Cake

- 2 cups flour
- 2 cups sugar
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. soda
- 2 sticks butter
- 3 1/2 Tbsps. cocoa
- 1 cup water
- 1/2 cup buttermilk
- 2 eggs
- 1 tsp. vanilla

Mix flour, sugar, salt and soda in large bowl. In sauce pan, melt butter with cocoa and water. Bring to a boil; add to flour mixture. Let cool a little then add buttermilk, eggs and vanilla. Bake in sheet pan 20 minutes at 400 degrees.

Icing

- 1 stick butter
 - 3 Tbsps. cocoa
 - 1 cup pecans
 - 1/3 cup buttermilk
 - 1 box (16 oz.) powdered sugar
- Bring butter, cocoa and milk to a boil. Add sugar, mix well. Add pecans. Pour on cake while cake is still hot.

Cheese Cake

- 3 - 8 oz. pkgs. cream cheese
- 1 1/2 cups sugar
- 1/8 tsp. salt
- 4 eggs
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 2 cups sour cream
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 2 tps. vanilla
- 1 - 9-inch crumb crust

Crust: Make and chill: Mix 1 1/2 cups graham cracker crumbs, 1/4 cup sugar, 1/4 tsp. nutmeg, 1/2 tsp. cinnamon, 1/4 cup nuts. Blend with 1/2 cup butter. Press firmly over bottom and 2 1/2 inches up on sides of heavily buttered 9-inch spring form pan. Chill crust. **Cake:** Let cream cheese soften in large bowl. Blend in 1 1/2 cups sugar and 1/8 tsp. salt. Then beat until fluffy. Add eggs one at a time - beating well after each addition. Beat in 1 tsp. vanilla and pour into crumb crust. Bake at 350 degrees 50 minutes or until firm in center. Remove and let stand 15 minutes.

Reset oven to 450 degrees. Combine sour cream, 1/4 cup sugar and 1 tsp. vanilla in small bowl. Spread over the top of cake. Return to oven at 450 degrees 10 minutes or until topping is just set. Cool on wire rack, then chill completely, preferably overnight.

The Iowa Park Major League All-Stars' fine season finally ended last Saturday with a 7-1 loss to Weatherford in the Sectional Tournament in Plano.

The Hawks finished the post season with a 7-2 mark with both of the losses coming in Plano last weekend.

Iowa Park opened the tournament in dramatic fashion with a thrilling 5-4 come-from-behind win over the Abilene All-Stars on Thursday night.

The Hawks fell behind 3-0 after

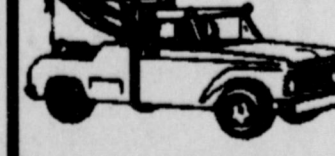

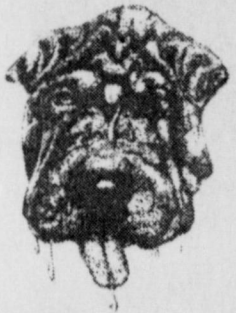
