# Trustees to consider adopting new budget

## Superintendent seeks four-cent increase on tax rate

Iowa Park school trustees will consider a proposed budget for the 1995-96 school year in a called meeting this evening.

The budget being proposed is al-

most \$1-million higher than the past year's budget.

The meeting is to begin at 7:30 in the junior high school library. However, board members are to meet at 6:30 to tour Bradford Elementary, and then the junior high facilities, before starting their session.

Also on the meeting agenda are considering of student transfer requests, employee pay schedules, and employing personnel.

Some of the meeting likely will be held behind closed doors, for discussion of personnel.

Supt. Glen Mitchell is proposing a four-cent increase in the tax rate, to fund a budget of \$9,039,376. The past year's budget was \$8,075,341.

The majority of the increased funding, if the budget is approved, would go toard salaries. The proposal calls for \$6,510,826 in that category, an increase of \$618,641.

The payroll makes up 72.03 percent of the proposed budget.

Other expenditures in the proposal include: \$686,748 for contracted services; \$907,688, supplies and materials; \$276,728, other operating expenses; \$251,563, debt service; \$272,776 for capital outlay, and under the heading "other uses not assigned a function," \$133,047.

Should the superintendent's proposal to increase the tax rate four cents. the new rate would be \$1.20.

Each penny, with the district's values set at \$258,515,242, produces \$25,850.

Tax on a \$50,000 home would rise from \$580 to \$600, if the proposed rate is approved.

Former Iowa Park coach Bill Carter recently captured first in his age group at the United States of America Track and Field National Master's Championships, held at East Lansing, Mich.

Now a resident of Marlow, Okla., Carter directed Iowa Park High to the state track title in 1960. He was the first to be inducted into the Hawk Track Hall of Fame, in 1994.

Carter won the pentathlon event in the 70-74 age group with 3,206 points.

It was his fourth national title in the event, since first entering in 1988. He did not compete last year be-


Americans gained a lot of experience as to how determined the Japanese military was to fight, when our boys battled for every foot of islands they regained in the Pacific.

treatment was dealt military as well as civilian captives of the Nippon military, and Americans were totally unified in their support of our government and military.

Though I was not in that war, I did have conversations with a great many of my friends who were, including one who was in the Battan Death March.

Never, from any of those who had been in the Pacific, did I ever hear a word of humane treatment from any Japanese military personnel.

While the German military was ruthless with particular religious groups and nationalities, I've been told by some prisoners of war of certain acts of kindness being shown.

After four years of war, Americans were absolutely ready for it to end. And when we got word, first of the atomic bomb drops, and then of Japan's unconditional surrender, it was total elation.

Our sense of relief upon hearing the announcement that the war was over will never be forgotten. And the only regret we felt was the loss of all the lives lost in the war -- with absolutely no regret for those who were killed in the atomic bomb blast.

Cemeteries are so often searched for names and dates. Many have lichen-covered tombstones and care must be taken in cleaning to expose the lettering for picture s or rubbings. Some of the old stones are fragile and often times the engraving is almost worn off.

The daily interdependency that is required to make a ranch run smoothly creates a natural bond of support and respect. One wonders if there isn't a lesson, within that ranch unit, after which could be patterned by other families who find themselves in "the fast lane."

During the two-day event, one might see a horse buck a cowboy a little higher than usual, smell the aroma of chuckwagon food a little more invitingly, hear a song that touches a little more deeply -- but there are never any big surprises that makes one wish his/her family had not witnessed a particular scene.

Perhaps that is why the 15-year-old event continues to draw crowds from across Texas and from out of state. It is truly a time of reunion -- the old fashioned way. The ranch families enjoy the annual comradarie with other ranch families, the public enjoys the wholesome family entertainment. It has been called "a visit into the past" because of the unique heritage that the ranches have maintained in their lifestyle.

On August 18 and 19, as the crowds come and as they depart, as the families return to their contemporary lifestyles, one can see smiles of delight and antimated reruns of a spectacular show . . . Could it be that there are wistful lingerings to take some of the quality happenings home -- and let it continue to be a family affair?

The Texas Ranch Roundup is co-sponsored by Budweiser/Falls Distributing and North Texas Rehabilitation Center, with all proceeds going to three Texas charities. West Texas Rehab in Abilene, West Texas Boys Ranch in San Angelo and North Texas Rehab in Wichita Falls have received about \$1,000,000 through the past 14 years.


The evening's activities at the Elks Lodge will include a barbecue meal, catered by one of the classmates. The fee will be \$10 per person.


