roup of City View Junioneal from a students, Iowa Park school trustees approved a measure which eliminates future transfers attending classes here. The board amended the district's ransfer policy so that this year's reshman class transfers from City iew will be the last to be accepted ere, "except transfers may be accepted fransfer students." Pritudents.
Prior to voting on the proposed grade City View student, read and grade City View student, read and
presented a letter asking the board to continue toallow transfer students from City View.

She told the board she felt any change in the policy was a "major mistake," and explained she and her friends had been planning for several years on attending school here becaus Miss Hall was accompa four other girls and an adult. The amendment that was later passed stated:
"Beginning on January 13, 1995, the Iowa Park CISD will no longer accept ransfer students who are not
for younger brothers and sisters of ransfer students.
But, just because a transfer stumean the student can core does not year, if they've been having problems during the past fall semester.
"Transfer students will be notified by January 17, 1995, that transfer requests for the 1995-96 school year will be denied for any student involved in any type of discipline or attendance 1994-95 school year," stated another amendment.
A committee of administrators will eview all transfer requests for 1995 96 who are currently enrolled, and is empowered to deny requests submitted by any problem students.
A major concernat the high school campus is crowded conditions, caused by growing enrollment. As of Jan. 12, pus, up from 572 at the same time in 1994.

Besides the per-student state funding the district receives, City View pays $\$ 1,700$ annually to Iowa Park for
each transfer student.

## Police make four arrests
