# Trustees phasing out City View transfers

Despite a tearful appeal from a group of City View Junior High School students, Iowa Park school trustees approved a measure which eliminates future transfers attending classes here.

The board amended the district's transfer policy so that this year's freshman class transfers from City View will be the last to be accepted here, "except transfers may be accepted for younger brothers and sisters of transfer students."

Prior to voting on the proposed amendment, Misty Hall, a seventh grade City View student, read and presented a letter asking the board to continue to allow transfer students from City View.

She told the board she felt any change in the policy was a "major mistake," and explained she and her friends had been planning for several years on attending school here because they "want a better education."

Miss Hall was accompanied by four other girls and an adult.

The amendment that was later passed stated:

"Beginning on January 13, 1995, the Iowa Park CISD will no longer accept transfer students who are not enrolled in the Iowa Park CISD on that

But, just because a transfer student is already enrolled here does not mean the student can come back next year, if they've been having problems during the past fall semester.

"Transfer students will be notified by January 17, 1995, that transfer requests for the 1995-96 school year will be denied for any student involved in any type of discipline or attendance problem during the remainder of the 1994-95 school year," stated another amendment.

A committee of administrators will review all transfer requests for 1995-96 who are currently enrolled, and is empowered to deny requests submitted by any problem students.

A major concern at the high school campus is crowded conditions, caused by growing enrollment. As of Jan. 12, there were 639 students on that campus, up from 572 at the same time in 1994.

Besides the per-student state funding the district receives, City View pays \$1,700 annually to Iowa Park for each transfer student.

Following a closed meeting, during which trustees evaluated Supt. Glen Mitchell for the past year, trustees reopened the meeting and voted to extend his contract through June 30, 1998.

Bids to replace hail-damaged roofs at Bradford Elementary and Junior High were approved. Lydick/Hooks Roofing bid \$137,436 to do Junior High and Menasco Roofing bid \$105,214 at Bradford.

An additional cost of those projects was \$2,500 for architect Don Daugherity to draft specifications for the work.

Bids also were approved for the purchase of band instruments, submitted by Sam Gibbs and Brooks Mays.

Board members approved a proposal to submit a textbook waiver to the Texas Education Commission which would allow use of a kindergarten textbook "Beginning To Read, Wright and Listen."

A revision to the district's tobaccofree campus policy that was approved last month was proposed and approved. It stated:

"Exception: Smoking and/or use of tobacco products will be permitted only in designated areas during athletic or other events. Signs will be posted to designate the areas where smoking and/or use of tobacco products is prohibited."

But during the past year, he was a key worker in the construction of the nearly-completed youth gymnasium which is an Optimist Club project next to the Recreational Activities Center.

Sefcik served his civic organization as the general contractor for the construction, requiring untold hours of effort on a daily basis.

"We're glad to be here," Powers said about locating the plant in Iowa Park. "We made the right decision. This community is made up of more givers than takers."

The local plant is part of a network of Cryovac North America, said the native of North Carolina. He proudly pointed out that Cryovac has just completed its 32nd consecutive year of continuous sales growth.

# RED-LETTER DAY Kamay phone customers looking toward Wednesday

This coming Wednesday will be a red-letter day, especially for residents in the Kamay telephone service area.

That is the day extended local calling for all customers of the area will be activated by GTE Telephone.

Telephone communications between the Kamay area and Iowa Park, Holliday and Wichita Falls will no

longer cost a long distance charge.

From Wednesday on, it will no longer be necessary to dial "1+" before the number when placing calls between these communities.

A per-line increase in the total monthly bill of \$3.50 for residential customers in the Kamay exchange will replace the long distance fees. Businesses will have an \$7 fee assessed.

Many residents of the area have reported monthly bills of \$100 to over \$250 as the average, because of long distance charges.

Extended Local Calling came about when Kamay service area residents took advantage of Senate Bill 632 and Public Utility Commission Rule 23.49 (c), by petitioning and then voting for the change.

The city has received a sales tax rebate check this month from the state for \$16,666.70.

According to the state comptroller's report, that is a 14.43-percent increase over the \$14,564.30 rebate check received in January of 1994.

One of our subscribers called last week to say that she had misplaced a recipe for "banana bread cooked in fruit jars" that had been in the Leader a few months ago. She asked if we might re-run the recipe.

We checked back and found that it was one of the recipes Kathy Riggins brought for our Cook of the Week column on Oct. 20, 1994. So, in response to the request, we are running the recipe again.

#### Canning Jar Bread

8 pint-size, wide-mouth canning jars 2/3 cup shortening

2 2/3 cup sugar

4 eggs

2/3 cup water

2 cups bananas

3 1/3 cups flour 1/2 tsp. baking powder

2 tsps. baking soda

1 1/2 tsp. salt

1 tsp. cinnamon 1 tsp. cloves

1 cup chopped pecans

Wash and dry (wide-mouth) canning jars. Grease well. Pre-heat oven to 300 degrees.

Cream shortening and sugar. Add eggs to mixture. Add water and bananas and beat well. Add with spoon the remaining ingredients.

Fill jars 1/2 full. Bake in preheated oven 45 to 55 minutes. When done, remove one at a time from oven. Put scalded lid on each one and seal. Can be used as gifts. Use ribbons or appropriate ornaments to decorate the jars.

#### **Light & Fruity Pie**

1 - 3 oz. pkg. jello

2/3 cup boiling water 2 cups ice cubes

3 1/2 cups or 8 oz. ctn. Cool Whip Fruit (optional)

8 or 9-inch graham cracker crust

Completely dissolve gelatin. Add ice cubes and stir until gelatin thickens. Remove any unmelted ice. Using a wire whisk, blend in whipped topping, then whip until smooth. Fold in fruit and chill in crust.

#### Salmon Southern Cornbread

1 can salmon

1 cup sifted flour

1 cup corn meal 4 tsps. baking powder

1/4 cup sugar

1/2 tsp. salt 1 egg, beaten

1 cup salmon liquid and milk

1/4 cup butter or other fat, melted Drain and flake salmon, reserving

Sift together flour, cornmeal, baking powder, sugar and salt.

Combine egg, salmon liquid and milk, and butter. Add to dry ingredients and mix just enough to moisten. Stir in salmon. Bake in greased 8x8x2inch pan at 425 degrees 25-30 minutes. Serves 6.

#### **Chocolate Pudding Cake**

1 cup flour

1 cup sugar

1 stick oleo, softened

1 cup pecans, chopped 1 large pkg. chocolate pudding mix

2 - 8 oz. pkgs. cream cheese

1 large container Cool Whip 1 Hershey bar

Mix flour, oleo and pecans, then mash into 10"x12" cake pan. Bake at 350 degrees until golden brown.

Mix sugar slowly into cream cheese and 1/2 ctn. Cool Whip. Spread over baked crust.

Mix pudding according to directions on box and pour over cake.

Dissolve lemon jello in 1 cup hot water. Melt marshmallows in other cup hot water. Mix together and let

Mix together pineapple, cream cheese, salad dressing and whipped cream; add to first mixture and let set.

Mix raspberry jello and pour over first mixture. When set, cut in squares and serve on lettuce leaves. Top with salad dressing.

#### Green Enchilada Casserole

1 doz. com tortillas

1/2 cup shortening 1/2 cup finely chopped onion

2 cups grated Cheddar cheese

1 cup milk 1 can cream of chicken soup

1/4 cup chopped green chilies or jalapeno peppers

Fry tortillas in hot fat until they bubble. Drain and place a layer of tortillas in shallow 3-quart casserole. Top each tortilla with onion and cheese. Continue process until all tortillas are used. Combine milk, soup and green chilies; pour over tortillas. Bake in 350 degree oven 30 minutes. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

#### Grandmother's Fresh Apple Cake

2 1/2 cups flour

2 tsps. baking powder

1 tsp. each - soda, salt, cinnamon,

vanilla 2 cups sugar

1 cup salad oil 2 eggs

1 cup nuts

1/2 cup coconut

3 cups fresh apples, peeled & diced



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1 - 6 oz. pkg. butterscotch chips

Put oin in large bowl. Add sugar and eggs and dry ingredients all at once. Beat until smooth. Add vanilla and fold in apples, nuts and coconut. Put in greased and floured loaf pan and sprinkle with butterscotch chips. Bake 55 minutes at 350 degrees.

A bundt or angel food pan may be used if preferred.





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

I've always believed when I wanted to make more money, I would have to work harder to earn it. Our "equal opportunity" employees in the Postal Service apparently feel just the opposite.

This latest increase in postage -- in case you didn't know it, the hike wasn't only for your letters -- is costing us in the newspaper business a bundle.

What brought this comment about was a telephone call we had Monday from Joe Owen in Middleton, Calif.

Subscriber Joe wanted us to know that he had just received two issues of the newspaper: Jan. 5 and Dec. 15. But he still had not received the Dec. 22 or 29 issues at that time.

I guess they're still sitting on some dock somewhere. Sorry, Joe. We've got more than 30 cents postage already invested in each of those copies. And since the service has been paid for, I feel you should have your papers.

Now. I mentioned the seating in the high school gymnasium for fans.

The District 3-AAA committee has decided that fans should be separated by the playing court, in order to avoid any conflicts like happen from time to time.

I can't really disagree with that. It makes sense.

But. At least in our case here at home, it also means Hawk and Lady Hawk fans have less room to sit than do the visiting fans.

The reason is, almost the entire front row is taken up with players and coaches of the two teams, as well as the time keeper and scorers.

In other words, Iowa Park loses approximately 10 percent of its allotted seating because of the arrangement. And common sense will tell you that there normally will be more local fans than visiting fans.

Maybe we should reverse the sides, as long as the rule is in place, and let the visitors sit on the side with all the players and other personnel, and let our fans sit on the side with more available

Stopping at 4-way signs, especially at Yosemite and West Highway during the pre-school morning rush, is an exercise in frustration.

Why? Because many drivers either don't know the ethics of such a situation, or they want to act like big city folks and do as they wish.

Folks, it's just a simple procedure of taking turns. After east-bound and west-bound vehicles in the front row pass through the intersection, the northbound and south-bound traffic get their

And for some of the more ignorant, if a west-bound needs to turn south and waits for the on-coming traffic to pass through the intersection. the north-bound and south-bound traffic is to allow that turning vehicle the opportunity to continue.

Also, those vehicles stopped in the second row at the intersection are to stop and allow other traffic to proceed before they go. Just because the vehicle in the front row passes through the intersection does not mean that the driver in the second row can gun his engine and follow directly behind.


In that case, the second-row driver is ignoring the stop sign.

I've been known to flash my lights and blow my horn, when someone does that when I'm at an intersection.


