World Workshop for Peace



On the bank of the East River in New York City, the world's workshop for peace—the headquarters of the United Nations—adds its modern lines to the mid-Manhattan skyline. Speed Costs Lives, Gas Oil, Tires, Maintenance Says Safety Expert

"When you speed, you're burning up more than the road. You're also burning a good-sized hole in your pocketbook!"

This reminder from Col. E. B. Tilley of Houston, president of the Texas Safety Association, spotlights an aspect of speed that is not generally given much attention. It was pointed out by Tilley this week in a discussion of the speed control program of the Texas Safety Association, the Texas department of public safety and the National safety council.

"Excessive speed is rough on a car. The speed demon finds this out when he trades his car in on a new model. He can't get as good an allowance as the fellow who has driven at a more sensible speed. Accelerated speed accelerates depreciation.

"The car that's driven too fast will also cost more in upkeep. If speed is increased from 40 miles an hour to 65, gasoline consumption increases 30 per cent. Oil consumption increases even more and tire wear is 2½ times as great as it is at the lower speed.

"But the greatest cost of unsafe speed is in human lives. Speed contributes to more than 10,000 traffic accidents annually.

"The only safe speed is a speed that's determined by conditions, and the only intelligent speed is a safe speed."

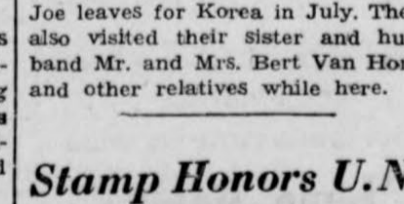

School of Nursing at Wichita General Offers Best Facilities

The Wichita General hospital's school of nursing was established in 1915. There were 16 students in the first class. Since that time 300 young women have been graduated from the school.

Educational facilities are of high quality, consisting of well equipped classrooms, a nursing arts laboratory, reference library, and a variety of clinical services.

The daily average of patients afford excellent opportunity for a variety of clinical experiences. In addition, the clinical experience is broadened to include an affiliation in psychiatry in the John Sealy hospital in Galveston and public health at the Wichita county health unit.

Classes in basic science and liberal arts are given at Midwestern university, from which students can receive an associate of arts degree in nursing.

The faculty is composed of the director of the school of nursing, the nursing arts instructor, the clinical co-ordinator, public health co-ordinator, member of the medical staff, members of the university, and supervisors and head nurses of the hospital.

After completion of the third year program of instruction and experience, students are awarded diplomas in nursing and are eligible to take the examination required by the Texas state board of nurses examiners. A grade of 70 must be made on all examinations. This entitles the nurse to be a registered nurse with right to practice as such in Texas, and by reciprocity in any state in the Union and its territorial possessions.

At this time an essay contest is being sponsored for applicants to the school of nursing and anyone may enter the contest who meets the requirements. Entry blanks can be obtained by writing the School of Nursing, Wichita General Hospital, Wichita Falls, Texas.

The contest closes in August.

Soil Conservation

First blooms on guar seedings have been observed on the Leamon Cook farm 4 miles southeast of Wichita Falls. Cook is trying Madrid clover, guar and chinese red peas in order to determine the legume most suited to his soil and cropping system.

Edward E. Bowlin, District Co-operator farming 6 miles north east of Iowa Park has seeded 14 acres to guar. Bowlin fertilized with 200 pounds per acre of 20% super phosphate.

A. R. Etter, farming 5 miles east of Iowa Park is using large sweeps to stubble mulch his fields. Soil Conservation District technicians are finding a growing interest in mulching, with several cooperators making intensive field trials using sweeps of various sizes.

New cooperators with the district include the following: W. H. McDonald of Wichita Falls and farming 7 miles west of Wichita Falls on Seymour highway, N. E. Guthrie of Iowa Park, L. L. C. Hays of Electra, Donald Parker of Wichita Falls, and Frank Brown, unit 36 Valley farms.

Results have shown that this has been one of the more favorable years for grass seeding and good results have been had, however, rain makes the weed control problem more acute. It will be necessary to control these weeds by mowing or spraying if maximum growth is to be obtained.

R. L. Underwood whose ranch is 4 miles northeast of Iowa Park and 77 Ranch of Iowa Park are cooperators who are now mowing weeds on current grass seedings.

R. L. Goodie of Iowa Park, C. J. Bryans and Merle T. Waggoner of Wichita Falls have secured fish for stock pond stocking. This practice is a part of the district program designed to use each acre to its maximum potential. These fish came from fish and wildlife service through an understanding with Soil Conservation Districts.

Iowa Park Student Wins Trip to National FFA Convention

Eddie Whittenberg has been selected to receive the Wichita Falls City National Bank FFA achievement award which is a paid trip to the national FFA convention in Kansas City in October of this year.

Each year the bank, under the direction of Charles Morrison, farm director, sends three outstanding FFA boys from Clay, Archer and Wichita counties. In this county one boy is selected each year from Electra, Burk Burnett and Iowa Park chapters.

Winners are selected on the basis of leadership, citizenship and achievements.

Eddie served as reporter for the Iowa Park chapter during the past year. He has been on the program of work committee, banquet committee and various other committees. He was on the chapter conducting team and the dairy judging team.

The dairy judging team went to the state contest at Texas A & M college and was awarded a silver emblem. Eddie helped present a parliamentary procedure program for a high school assembly, the PTA and the Lions club.

His chickens were awarded 2nd place in the T-O Fair junior poultry show. In the county 4-H and FFA project show his Black Minorca hens won a blue ribbon and his registered Angus bull won a white ribbon.

Eddie's shop projects included a trash barrel and lid, poultry feeder and repairing farm machinery.

The Iowa Park student is conducting a balanced supervised farming program which includes 16 acres of cotton, 5 acres of alfalfa hay, 18 laying hens, 7 acres of sorghum, 13 acres of sudan, 4 head of livestock two hives of bees and one hog.

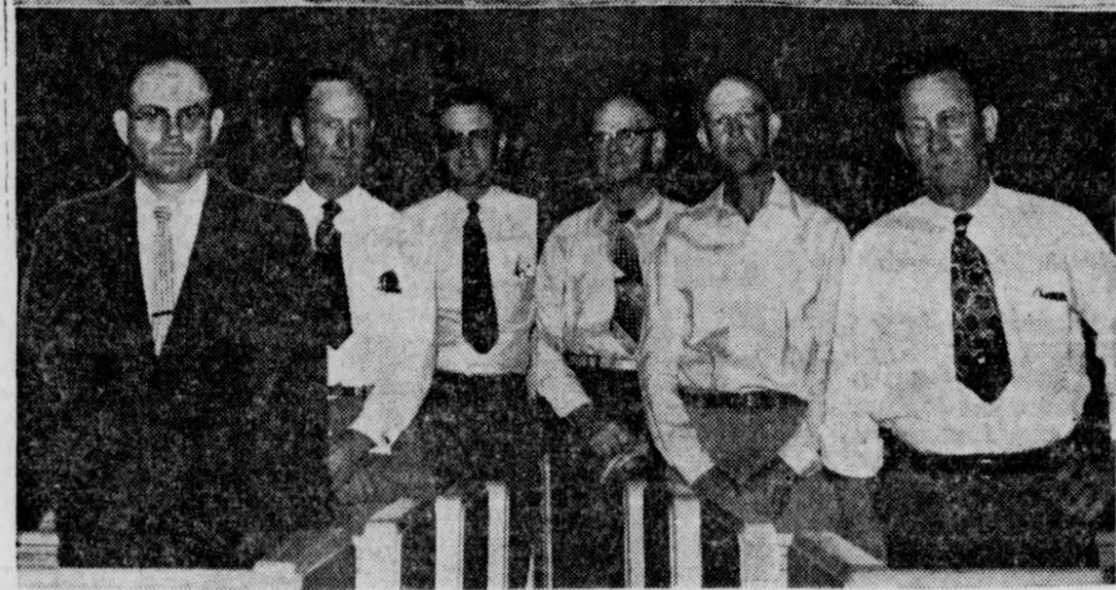
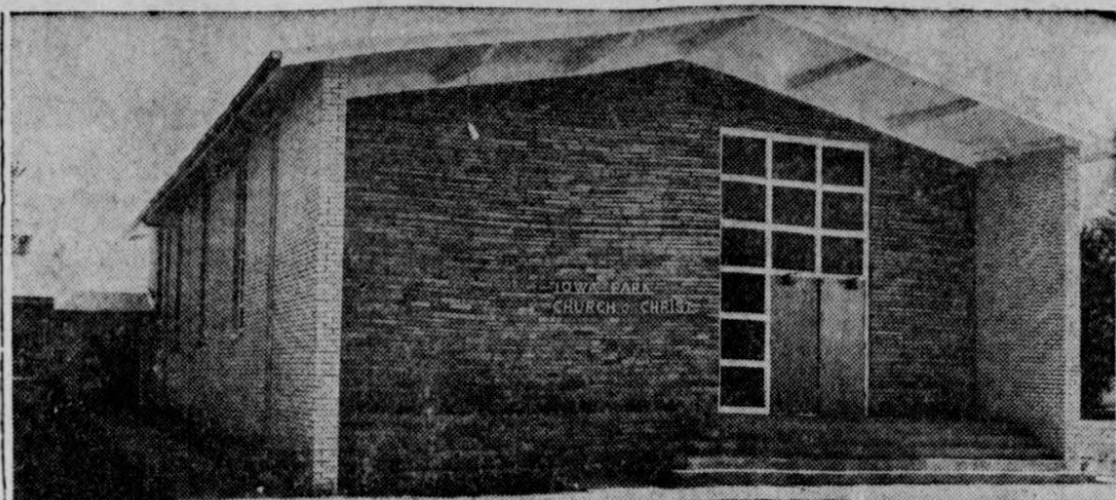

A drinking fountain and rest rooms are found at each side of the foyer.

Cleo Jones, the present minister, who has been working here about three years, was program chairman for the official opening.

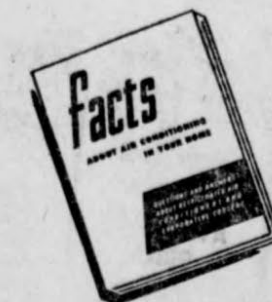

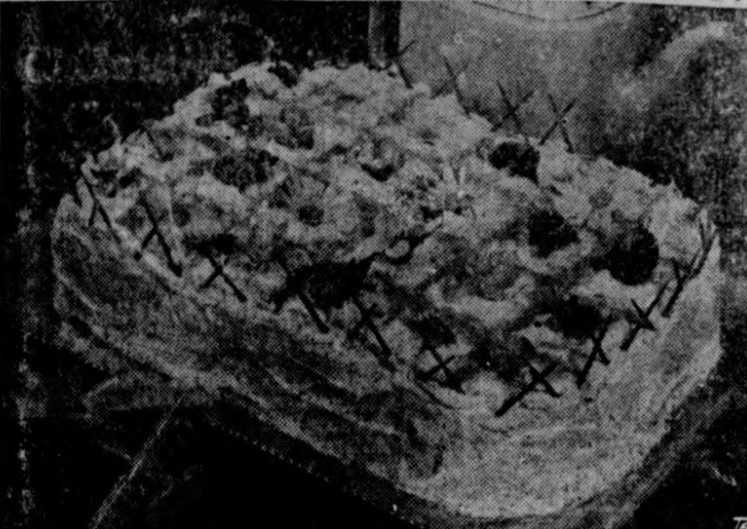

FLOWER GARDEN CAKE

- 1 1/2 cups beet or cane sugar
 - 1/2 cup shortening, use part butter or margarine
 - 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
 - 3 eggs
 - 2 1/2 cups sifted cake flour
 - 2 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 1 cup milk, room temperature
- Measure beet or cane sugar, shortening and flavoring into bowl. Beat with an electric or rotary beater until very light; beat in eggs one at a time; Remove beater. Add sifted dry ingredients alternately with milk, beating well with a spoon after each addition. Pour batter into a well-greased and floured pan (13" by 9"). Bake in a moderate oven (350°F.) for 45 minutes or until toothpick thrust in center comes out clean. Remove from pan; cool on rack. To Decorate—Cover with white frosting. Tint 1/2 cup beet or cane sugar with 12 drops green food color; use to mark 24 squares or garden walks. Top each square with small flowers. Push green toothpicks in around edge of cake for fence. Cut each square for serving. Serves 24.

(Editor's Note: Following are excerpts from a letter written to Mrs. Roy Lakey by Mrs. W. R. Cooper of Dhahran, Saudi Arabia, who is in that country with her husband, chief engineer for an oil company. Mrs. Cooper is the former Miss Daisy Lee Jones of Valley View.)

Our trip was short, but long enough to spend our allotted amount of money, and more. I think we managed to cover the usual tours taken by any tourist with a limited amount of time. It would be nice to go back and go over special places again. It certainly isn't a place I should want to live, but so interesting to visit. I realized how much of my Bible I had forgotten, but recalled much of it with each hour of the trip.

Jerusalem has become so commercialized that often you question in your mind the authenticity of the location, as pointed out to you by the guide. However the town is so small that you know that it all happened there, and whether you are standing on the exact spot at the moment is negligible. As you go over the grounds and follow the trails that Christ passed over in his lifetime, you are filled with awe and consecration.

We took the regularly conducted tours, and that is a must, otherwise you would get nowhere—nothing has any mark of distinction but that needs further explanation for the understanding of the stranger.

The first morning we went to the Garden of Gethsemane. It is now a beautifully kept place, with the huge old twisted bent olive trees—eight of them—under which Christ prayed the last night of his life. There is a cave or grotto under the Church of Gethsemane which is one of the few places we saw that has been preserved in its primitive form, and you have the feeling that it is really as it was during his lifetime.

Here he spent many hours with his friends. Now it has an altar and crude wooden benches, but the walls and floors are the natural stone as it must have been so many years ago. From the garden we were given olive leaves and sprigs of rosemary and lavender. I think that this one visit was worth the trip to me.

From here we went to Bethlehem—ordinarily from Gethsemane we would have followed the Way of the Cross, but Nan had been ill all night and we were doing as much by car that day as we could.

It really is a short distance to Bethlehem, but because of the Arab-Jewish war the main road had been closed, and we had to drive around the mountain, more than twice the distance. On the way we pass Rachel's tomb.

Bethlehem stands on the top of a rocky height. The hills slope down into vine, olive, almond, and fig clad terraces. We were told that in the winter and spring the hillside is beautifully green, but when we were there the summer heat gave us nothing but the desert background. The olive trees were the only green at that time.

Here we stood on a roof top and looked down over the hillside where Ruth worked in the fields of Boaz. Of course we saw the location of the manger and the crib. Now it is all of marble and stone—the wooden cradle has been coated with silver. This is necessary for preservation, but it takes away the realism.

There are a maze of chapels dedicated to one thing or the other—Joseph, Mary, the Holy Innocents (those who shed blood because of Herod's fury), the Milk Grotto in which is a statue showing Mother Mary nursing the Christ Child.

There is a superstition believing that mothers who aren't able to nurse their children, take a piece of soft stone from this grotto, grind it to a powder, mix it with their drink—after this all is well! Who am I to question such faith.

We followed the Way of the Cross, which is the road trod by the Savior after his unjust trial, to Calvary. The scenes enacted along the way are fixed in fourteen stations, indicated by a number or an inscription. At Easter-time those that might be in Jerusalem and wish to do so follow the way of the Cross, pausing at the stations.

We saw the sacred rock upon which Abraham would have offered the sacrifice of his own son. Upon this site Solomon's temple was built. The temple was destroyed, and over the rock is a building now used by the Moslems.

On this tour we also saw the Wailing Wall of the Jews. It is here that the Jews gather and pray and lament, especially on the Eve of the Sabbath and on Feast Days. Since the Arab-Jewish war they cannot come here as it is on the Arab side.

We saw the pool of Bethesda, the waters of which had the power of healing who immersed therein. I wanted to put my hand in the water, but the water was low and difficult to reach so I didn't ask to do so.

One afternoon we went to the Jordan river where Christ was bap-

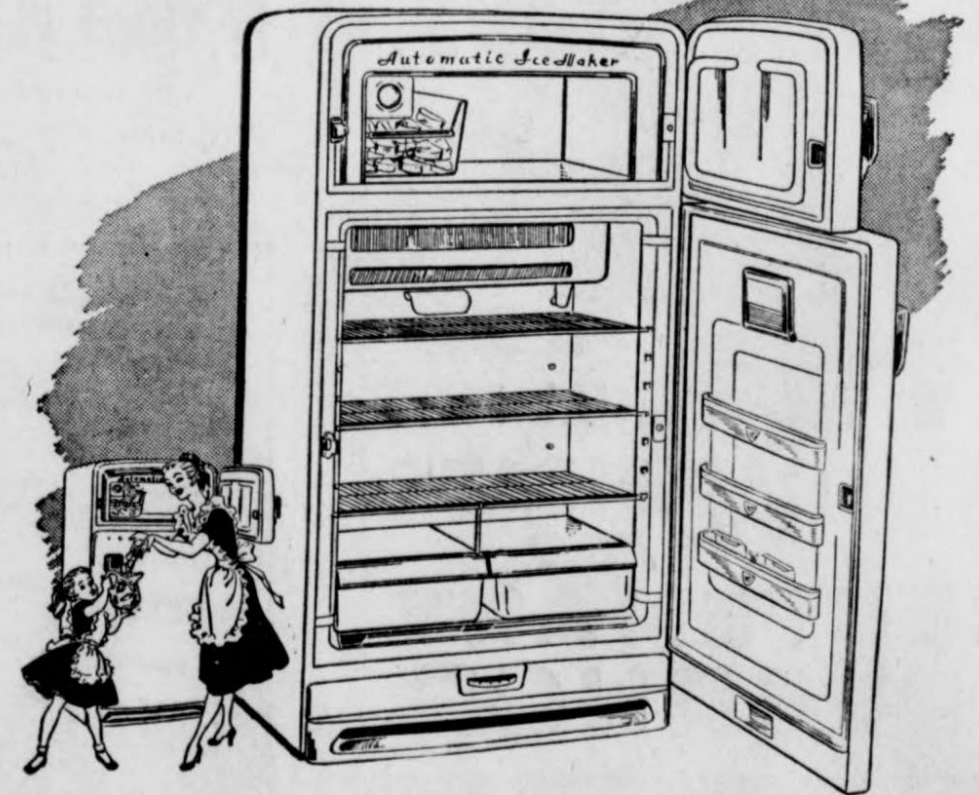
