"We may have been 0 and 10, but not in effort," head football coach Weldon Nelms told a near-capacity audience at Saturday night's annual football banquet.

Slightly fewer than 300 players, dates, parents and fans attended the event, held in Iowa Park High School cafeteria.

The banquet's keynote speaker was Jim Clapp, who quarterbacked the 1969 state champion Hawks and is now an assistant coach at Holliday High School.

Commenting on that 15-0 season, Clapp recalled, "It was unique. Everybody got to play, except a couple of games - Hirschi and Big Lake. We were afraid of losing, not who we were going to play."

Installed as new officers of the Athletic Booster Club, which annually sponsors the banquet, were: Dennis Yeager, president; R.D. Trammell, vice president; Barry Spruiell, second vice president; Shirley Trammell, secretary, and Jan Yeager, treasurer.

Serving as officers during the past year were: Randy Scobee, president; Dennis Yeager, vice president; R.D. Trammell, second vice president; Shirley Trammell, secretary; treasurers, Kay Brown and Candy Moser, and Sherry Ross, parliamentarian.

Players on the varsity, junior varsity and freshman teams were individually introduced, as were members of the coaching staff.

Two events during the banquet drew special reactions from the large audience.

The first was when Robert Wilcox corrected the speaker who said he had been announcing Hawk home games 46 years. Wilcox corrected him by saying it was now 47 years.

The other was when Coach Nelms was presented with a football which had been signed by all the seniors of the 1994 team.

Nelms received a standing ovation from the audience.

A video film of the season was shown during the catered dinner.

Police discover man using another's name

Iowa Park police arrested a man last week who had been using another man's identity four years.

Police received a call from a man who explained he was applying for a driver's license, but was refused because he had a driving while intoxicated arrest on his record.

After he explained he had never been in Iowa Park, but instead had been living in Huntsville, local authorities wanted to know more about the man they had handled earlier.

Police had earlier arrested a man who identified himself as Jimmy Joe Martin, 40, for DWI. He was released after paying his fine.

The man was known to have been residing in Iowa Park, and employed by an electrical contractor at the new prison on FM 369.

The imposter was taken into custody Thursday at the construction site for questioning. And after a period of time, he admitted he had been using Martin's name four years.

Martin was his former brother in law.

So, a citation was issued to Gary

Pate, his real name, to report to municipal court on a charge of false identification to a police office.

Later Thursday evening, a patrolman stopped a vehicle on Valley Drive and arrested the two occupants on charges of public intoxication.

Tony Dwayne McClinton, 30, was released five hours later after paying a \$280 fine, and Tracy Zay Lauderdale, 31, was fined \$130 and released.

When an officer stopped a vehicle at 3:02 p.m. Saturday in the 100 block of West Park on a traffic violation, a computer check determined one occupant was wanted on outstanding warrants.

A warrant was on file for Jeremy Dell Sellers, 17, issued by Wichita County Sheriff's Office for bond forfeiture and theft.

The other occupant, John Paul Houston, 20, was arrested on a charge of possession of drug paraphanelia, and booked at the police station.

Sellers was turned over to a sheriff's deputy an hour later, to be transported to county jail. Houston was released after signing a promise to appear in

municipal court.

The vehicle in which they were riding was impounded, according to the police blotter.

Police were summoned to a residence in the 900 block of East Washington at 7:21 a.m. Saturday, where a man had reportedly attempted to commit suicide by slicing his wrist with a knife.

The man was transported by ambulance to a Wichita Falls hospital for treatment, and then committed to the state hospital on an emergency order.

Police are investigating a reported burglary of a habitation in the 1000 block of West Louisa. A bracelet valued at \$246 was reportedly taken some time between Jan. 20 and Jan. 27. The

A groundbreaking ceremony for Iowa Park's new senior citizen center will be held Saturday.

The new home of the Friendly Door will be in the 800 block of Third Street, on the north side of the Recreational Activities Center.

Following the 11 a.m. ceremony, the Iowa Park MuleSkinners will begin serving a cornbread and bean lunch, topped off with banana pudding and tea, in the RAC.

The feed is a fund-raising project of the MuleSkinners. Tickets will be \$3, with children five and younger free.

Entertainment during the hour-long meal serving time will be provided by the high school and junior high choirs.

Capping off the event will be a cake auction. The cakes will be provided by teachers of the Iowa Park school system, and Friendly Door

members.

Proceeds from the feed and auction will go to the Friendly Door Building Fund.

At last accounting of the Fund, which was the first week of January, \$30,203 had been deposited.

However, donations since that time have not yet been reported, including a pledge of \$10,000 to be received in \$2,000 increments over a period of five years from Cryovac, and others.

- * Approve/reject allowing employees to give one annual leave day a year to another employee who has an extended illness and who has used all state sick leave days and annual leave days.

- * Consider adding girls softball and volleyball programs. (Coach Nelms will discuss the two programs. Information concerning the cost of each program will be discussed.)

GARDENING HINTS

By MARK TERNING, COUNTY AGENT - HORTICULTURE

Follow this Garden Checklist for your late January to February lawn care, gardening and landscape activities.

PLANTING

* Plant containerized or ball and burlapped landscape plants.

* Plant fruit trees, berries and pecan trees. Local nurseries have excellent selections this time of year.

* Plant cole crops such as cabbage, broccoli, brussels sprouts, and cauliflower. Onions, asparagus, and seed potatoes can also be planted. Ask your local county extension office or a nursery professional for a recommended variety list.

* Transplant existing landscape plants as needed.

* Sow fescue seed later in February. Heavily shaded areas should be planted with a shade-loving ground cover.

* Transplant and divide summer and fall flowering perennials.

* Install pansies, petunias, dianthus, and snapdragons for cool-season color.

FERTILIZERS

* Apply 21-0-0 fertilizer to pecan trees in late February.

* Feed established asparagus plantings with a high nitrogen fertilizer.

* Apply a 3-1-2 or 4-1-2 ratio lawn food to fescue and ryegrass lawns in late February or early March. Apply same fertilizer to cool-season bedding plants.

PRUNING

* Prune peach and plum trees to develop an open-center plant.

* Complete shade tree pruning to remove weak limbs and encourage strong branching. Do not top shade trees.

* Prune evergreens and summer flowering shrubs. Do not prune spring flowering plants until after blooming period.

* Remove winter damage foliage on Asian Jasmine, liriopse, and mondograss.

* Prune bush-type roses in mid-February. Do not prune climbing roses until after bloom.

WEED AND PEST CONTROL

* Apply pre-emergent herbicides to prevent warm season annual weeds in home lawns. Local nurseries, garden centers, pest control outlets, and lawn care operators have products and services available.

* Apply dormant oil to fruit trees, pecans, and other scale or gall prone plants. Apply when air temperature is above 40 degrees to prevent plant damage.

* Spot spray broadleaf winter weeds with a broadleaf herbicide when temperatures are warm (65-70 degrees) for best results.

* Watch out for aphids on bedding plants and other ornamentals. Treat as needed with an appropriate insecticide.

* Follow all label rates and directions when using any pesticides or fertilizer.

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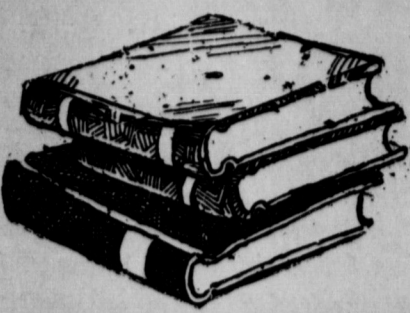

Members of the Iowa Park Garden Club took an educational field trip Friday to the Vetro-Tex CertainTeed plant at 4515 Allendale Road in Wichita Falls.

Guy Smith, training supervisor, and his assistant George Weist, took the group on the guided tour.

CertainTeed has had a plant in Wichita Falls many years. Recently the plant was enlarged and the name changed to Vetro-Tex CertainTeed.

The tour guides explained to club members the process of making fiberglass. They visited the Control Room where several computers are set up to show every part of the plant.

It was explained that when a problem arises anywhere in the plant, the operator on duty can instantly get it corrected.

The plant produces two million tons of fiberglass a month. It is in production 24 hours a day, seven days

a week. The fiber glass is sent to all parts of the country to be used on items from parts of cars to serving trays.

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As I See It

As I sat there Saturday night in the high school cafeteria, hearing Jim Clapp speak at the annual football banquet, memories of the 1969 Hawk season so flooded my mind I could hardly concentrate on what he had to say.

Jim was asked to speak because he's a former Hawk, went on to college and became an educator and coach, and because this is the 25th anniversary of Iowa Park High's state football championship.

Because 1969 was long before any of this crop of athletes were even born, there's no way they could realize what a competitor their speaker was when he was wearing Green and White. I can assure them that Clapp was a good'un.

He was the quarterback who led the deep-talented Hawks through 15 winning games in '69, outscoring their opponents 638-112. Gosh, in their seven district games they racked up 377 points and allowed only 41.

Clapp only carried the ball 51 times in those 15 games, but he gained 256 yards for a 5.0 average.

He scored all three touchdowns in the tough state semi-final game against Jacksboro, that Iowa Park won 21-0, and finished the season with 44 points.

The Hawks rarely passed the ball that year -- they didn't need to -- but 12 touchdowns were pass receptions. I can't remember how many of those were Jim's tosses.

He even kicked an extra point in Iowa Park's 80-8 win over Memphis.

But Jim wasn't used exclusively on offense. Very few of the players were in those days. He also was a key in the proud Mean Green Defensive Machine.

In fact, one of his plays on defense was credited, in part, to the death of a fan.

It was the third game of the season, here at home, against Wichita Falls Hirschi.

Iowa Park was leading 21-14. The Huskies had marched to Iowa Park's two yard line and had two plays to run with only 32 seconds remaining on the clock.

Hirschi's best back got the ball,

started to his right, and cut up field toward the goal line.

But that was when Coach Tommy Watkins' "monster man" -- all 145-pounds of Jim Clapp -- grabbed the runner's elbow and shook the ball loose.

A young sophomore named Steve Webb fell on the ball, on the one-foot line. And Clapp used the remaining time on the clock, along with Hirschi's times out, on a couple of quarterback keepers to salvage the victory.

Almost immediately after Clapp's dislodging the ball from the runner's grasp, a Wichita Falls man named Lynn C. Vaughn suffered a heart attack in the visitors' stands, and was dead upon arrival at the hospital.

How good a football team was Hirschi? Well, they were the only team in 1969 to defeat the Wichita Falls High Coyotes, who finished the season 14-1 and claimed the state championship of their division.

That game, and the state quarter-final against Big Lake, were the only close games Iowa Park had that year.

And it was in the Big Lake game, played in Lubbock, that Clapp again played a major part. But in an entirely different way.

He was on the sidelines most of that contest, having had his bell rung.

Jim took a hard hit from Big Lake's extra large defenders early in the game. His timing was off after that, but he had been in on several plays before the coaching staff realized he had a problem.

Oddly enough, he was pulled after recovering an opponent's fumble.

But he stood on the sidelines, trying to get his head to clear, until the final two minutes of the game. The score was tied at 7-7.

Steve Catlin filled in for Jim at quarterback. He did as best he could, but Steve had very little experience at that position.

Anyway, to make a long story a little shorter, a junior halfback named Jeff McDonald broke loose on an unbelievable play, and raced 82 yards for his second touchdown of the night.

Iowa Park won 14-7.

Clapp, who was an assistant coach here for a few years in the 1980s, is

now an assistant at Holliday. And you know how the Eagles play outstanding football.

One message he left Saturday with the audience caught my attention. He's critical of breast-beating, attention-grabbing of football players today.

He's not alone.

But it's not necessary to brag, by one means or another.

"If you do anything worth telling about, somebody else will tell it," Clapp said.

Oh, those memories of the fall of 1969! Those two close games. And then the climax, in Arlington, when Iowa Park surprised all those sports-writers in the south part of the state by lambasting Houston Klein High School 31-14 for the state Class AA title!

I hope all those Hawk football players paid close attention Saturday night to what Jim Clapp had to say. It came from a man who has been there.

Jim Clapp was a good'un.

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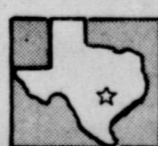

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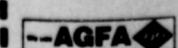


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Austin Notebook

With murder trials on television, lawsuits a topic on "Oprah," and a rising enrollment at law schools across the country, Americans have become very familiar with the phrases, "I'll see you in court" and "So sue me!" It seems every time the news is on, we hear about outlandish settlements like the woman who was awarded \$2.7 million after she spilled hot McDonald's coffee in her lap and sued the restaurant because the beverage was too hot and caused minor burns. These cases have become commonplace in our society and are, unfortunately, an everyday part of our lives.

These cases certainly make good stories, but behind those stories are some very real problems -- problems that are hurting you and hurting the state of Texas in countless ways.

One way these frivolous lawsuits, like suing McDonald's over hot coffee, hurt you is by clogging the court schedule, preventing honest citizens with real injuries from reaching the courts and settling their cases.

Another way is by driving up the cost of liability insurance, both for business and for you. That \$2.7 million wouldn't come from McDonald's profits, you know. It would come from their insurance company, and the insurance company would get the money from our premiums.

Further, these lawsuits often raise the cost of consumer products. Because businesses like restaurants and manufacturers and entertainment establishments have to spend more money protecting themselves, they are forced to raise the cost of a Big Mac or a pickup truck or a movie ticket. Again, this ends up costing you, the consumer, as well as hurting the businesses. All it takes is one frivolous lawsuit to force a small enterprise to close its doors.

Finally, these lawsuits cost Texans jobs. New businesses and industries are reluctant to move to Texas or expand their current operations. It is far less risky to set up in another state than to take a chance at rising costs of liability, high settlements and other damages. It is much more prudent for them to take those hundred or thousand or ten thousand new jobs elsewhere than to risk the uncertainty of the Texas courts.

These problems are a reason that changes in lawsuit procedures, or "tort reform," has become a major issue for the legislature this season. I have personally co-authored several bills in the hopes of curbing frivolous lawsuits and making the Texas court system more evenhanded and consistent.

One possible reform that I and other legislators have suggested is to limit the monetary amount of punitive damages, or money awarded for things other than expenses. For example, if your automatic garage door malfunctions and smashes the hood of your car, the court may ask the manufacturer to pay actual damages -- the cost of repairing your car -- plus punitive damages, an additional amount as "punishment" for their product's malfunction. By limiting punitive damage awards, there is far less chance of a multi-million dollar settlement and less incentive to bring a frivolous case to court in the hopes of "hitting the jackpot."

Do these reforms mean that ordinary, honest citizens will no longer be compensated if they are hurt? Absolutely not. No one is trying to take away your right or the right of any Texan to sue for damages (actual and punitive) if you are injured because of another's negligence or malice. You will still be entitled to payment for hospital bills,

property damage, loss due to fraud, and so on. Additionally, you will still be able to collect punitive damages. Further, your access will actually improve as reform reduces the numbers of suits being heard and frees up the court's busy schedule.

The objective of tort reform is not to limit your rights or deny you protection as a consumer. The purpose of tort reform is to level the playing field and to make the system work for all of us by stopping the abuse of the system.

I hope you share my belief that we need to put the "just" back in Texas justice and that current tort reform legislation is the way to do it. Together with groups like the North Texans Against Lawsuit Abuse, I have really worked to put this legislation on the fast track. That forward momentum was recently strengthened when Governor Bush declared the issue an "emergency," giving the legislature clearance to consider and vote on legislation at a faster than normal pace.

I'm confident that some type of tort reform will pass and be enacted this year. Please let the legislature know how you feel about stopping frivolous lawsuits and lawsuit abuse. By working together on this and other important issues, I think we really can make a difference for Texas.

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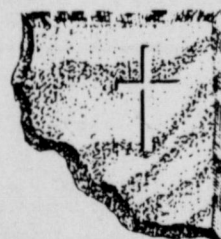

Family reunions are a great time for reminiscing, catching up on events in each others lives, and maintaining close family ties. Often, many good ideas are formed. A good example of this is "The Hicks Family Cookbook" that Shirley (Mrs. Carlton) Hicks told us about.

The idea for the cookbook developed at the Hicks Family Reunion, held each year in Fredericksburg. One of Shirley's sisters-in-law, Janet (Mrs. Robert) Hicks of Arlington, coordinated the effort and put everything together on a computer. Beatrice Hicks Miller and her daughter assisted in the assembly. All of the sisters, sisters-in-law, nieces - any family member who wanted to, sent in recipes.

The 172-page book took over a year to complete, and cost about \$15 a piece for materials.

The recipes were departmentalized and put in a computer. The pages were enclosed in plastic sleeves and combined in a looseleaf notebook with tabbed divisions. There is a space in the back for family pictures. One of the nieces took a family picture, had it enlarged, and it is included in each of the cookbooks.

Shirley said they began with 50 cookbooks, and "they were gone fast."

Shirley and Carlton are long-time residents of Iowa Park. Carlton was general construction instructor at Iowa Park Junior High and retired in 1984. Shirley worked 22 years as office manager for Crawford Dry Wall and Painting, then was employed as financial secretary for the Woman's Forum in Wichita Falls. She retired in 1993.

She is a member of Women of Rotary, 23 Study Club, a charter member of Iowa Park Arts & Crafts Association, and a member of First Baptist Church where she is president of Hope Sunday School Class.

Shirley's hobbies include oil painting (old houses and windmills), sewing, and all kinds of arts and crafts. She said when they made a trip to Virginia, she was able to see some old barns that she had painted from pictures.

The recipes this week are taken from the "Hicks Family Cookbook." Shirley said that Carlton's mother was a wonderful cook, but she cooked by "pinch and dab." Her recipe for "Hot Water Cornbread" is one of their favorites, so they figured out how to make it and included the recipe in the book.

Mom Hicks'**Hot Water Cornbread**

2 cups white cornmeal (self-rising or cornbread mix won't work)
2 cups flour
1 1/2 tsp. salt

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COOK OF THE WEEK

Boiling water (about a quart, more or less)

Pour boiling water over the meal, flour and salt mixture. Make a stiff dough. Pat out into thick patties. Fry in hot cooking oil until brown. (This is delicious served with cooked cabbage, or buttered with jelly or jam. It was one of the Hicks' kids favorites when they were growing up, and still is.)

Broccoli Cornbread

1 - 10 oz. pkg. chopped broccoli
4 beaten eggs
1 tsp. salt
1 chopped onion
1 box cornbread mix
2/3 cup cottage cheese
1 stick melted margarine

Put all ingredients in bowl and mix well with spoon. Put in a lightly greased 9-inch square pan and bake 25 or 30 minutes or until done.

Family Favorite

1 box macaroni & cheese dinner
1 lb. ground beef
1/4 cup chopped onion
2 Tbsps. chopped green pepper
1 can cream of mushroom soup

Prepare macaroni and cheese dinner as directed. Brown meat; drain. Add onion and green pepper; cook until tender. Combine all ingredients in casserole. Bake 20 minutes at 350 degrees. Serves 6.

TO PREPARE IN MICROWAVE:
Prepare dinner as directed. Crumble meat into casserole. Add onion and green pepper. Microwave on high 4 to 6 minutes or until meat loses pink color when stirred. Drain. Add remaining ingredients; mix well. Microwave 8 to 10 minutes or until hot, stirring every 4 minutes. Stir before serving.

Holly's "Tippy" Chicken

2 med. onions, cut in chunks
2 green bell peppers, cut in slices
2 red bell peppers, cut in slices
1 lb. skinned, boneless chicken breasts, cut in small pieces
1 clove garlic, mashed
1 Tbsp. butter or olive oil
1/2 cup white wine or cooking sherry
1 tsp. oregano leaves
Salt and pepper to taste

Saute garlic in oil or butter. Add chicken, vegetables and coat in oil or butter. Add wine and spices. Cover and cook on low until chicken is done. Serve over cooked noodles.

Carrot Cake

2 cups grated carrots
1 cup pecans, chopped
1 cup (small can of crushed pineapple in heavy syrup is best)
2 cups sugar
3 cups flour
1 1/2 cup vegetable oil
2 tsp. cinnamon
1 tsp. soda
1/2 tsp. salt
3 eggs
1 1/2 tsp. vanilla

Mix together all the dry ingredients. Put pineapple, oil and vanilla in large mixing bowl and mix well. Add eggs, carrots and pecans, and mix. Add dry ingredients, mixing well as you add. Pour into lightly greased and floured cake pan. You can use either a bundt pan or a large rectangular cake pan. Or, you can bake it in two or three regular size loaf pans. It is delicious hot from the oven, or it freezes well if you like to make it a head of time.

This is Carlton's favorite and he prefers it with no frosting. If desired, it may be glazed with a plain glaze, or it may be frosted with your favorite cream cheese frosting.

Wanda's Beefy Baked Beans

1/2 lb. ground beef
1 - 31 oz. can pork and beans (or 2 small cans to equal)
1 medium onion, chopped
1/2 green pepper, chopped
1/2 cup catsup
1/2 cup dark corn syrup
2 Tbsps. prepared mustard
4 slices bacon, cut in half

Cook ground beef until browned, stirring to crumble meat. Drain well. Combine beef and next 6 ingredients. Stir well. Spoon mixture into lightly greased 12x8x2-inch baking dish. Arrange bacon on top of beans. Bake at 400 degrees 40 minutes. Serves 8.

Hazel's No-Fail Pecan Pie
(Makes 2 pies)

5 eggs
2 cups sugar
1 2/3 cup white corn syrup
2 3/4 cups pecans
3 rounded tablespoons flour
Pinch of salt
1 tsp. vanilla
4 Tbsps. butter or margarine

Mix all together well and pour into unbaked pie shell and put in slow oven (300 degrees) 1 hour. Makes 2 large pies.

Alisa's Vegetable Pizza

1 can crescent rolls
1 pkg. cream cheese (at room temperature)
3 Tbsps. real mayonnaise
Seasoning (1 use about 1/2 small pkg. of dry Ranch Style mix)
Raw vegetables (cut up in small pieces - broccoli, carrots, mushrooms, cauliflower, green and/or red bell peppers, etc.) You can "ad-lib" with the vegetables using as many or as few as desired.

Unroll crescent rolls and pinch edges together to form a crust in a 9x13-inch pan or pizza pan, lightly greased. Brown in 400 degree oven until golden brown. Remove and allow to cool. Blend cheese, mayonnaise, and seasonings together until smooth. Spread on top of crust. Then place vegetables on top, sprinkled or arranged. If desired, sprinkle finely shredded Cheddar cheese on top of veggies. Chill at least one hour before serving.

Holly's Sweet Potato Casserole

3 cups cooked sweet potatoes (either fresh or canned)
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 tsp. salt
1/3 stick margarine

1/2 cup milk
2 eggs
1 tsp. vanilla

Topping

1/2 cup brown sugar
1/3 cup flour
1/3 cup melted margarine
1/2 cup chopped pecans

Mix the first seven ingredients and place in casserole dish. Combine the remaining ingredients (topping) and sprinkle over top of casserole. Bake 20 minutes in 350 degree oven.

I usually double the topping mix to cover the potato mixture thoroughly. You can also use 1/2 teaspoon each of cinnamon and nutmeg in both potato mixture and topping mix for added flavor.

Kathy's Easy Chicken & Pasta

1 lb. skinless, boneless chicken breasts, cut up
1 - 10 3/4 oz. can cream of chicken soup
1 pkg. (about 16 oz.) frozen seasoned pasta and vegetable combination

In skillet, heat 1 tablespoon oil. Add chicken and cook until browned. Add soup, 1/2 cup water and vegetable combination. Cover and cook 5 minutes or until vegetables are tender, stirring often. Serves 4.

Janet's Peanut Butter Pie*Delicious!*

1/2 cup peanut butter
8 oz. pkg. cream cheese
1 cup powdered sugar
1 large ctn. Cool Whip

Cream together peanut butter, cream cheese, and powdered sugar. Fold in large Cool Whip. Put into graham cracker crust. Place in freezer. Remove about 30 minutes before serving.

King Ranch Chicken

4 large chicken breasts - boned, boiled and diced. (Save chicken broth.)
10 corn tortillas

1 can cream of chicken soup
1 can cream of mushroom soup
1 can Rotel tomatoes with chilies
1 cup chicken broth
1 1/2 cup shredded cheese
1 large onion, diced

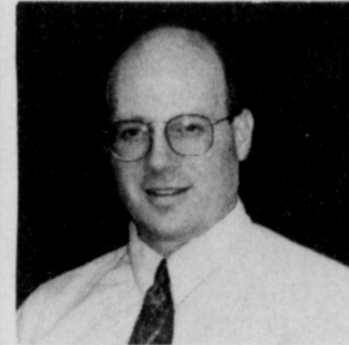
Line a 10x13-inch casserole with 6 of the tortillas, broken into pieces, with 1/2 of the chicken and 1/2 of the onion. Mix together soups, tomatoes and chicken broth and pour 1/2 over the layers. Top with 1/2 of the cheese, and then repeat the layers. Top with the other half of the cheese and bake 1 hour at 350 degrees.

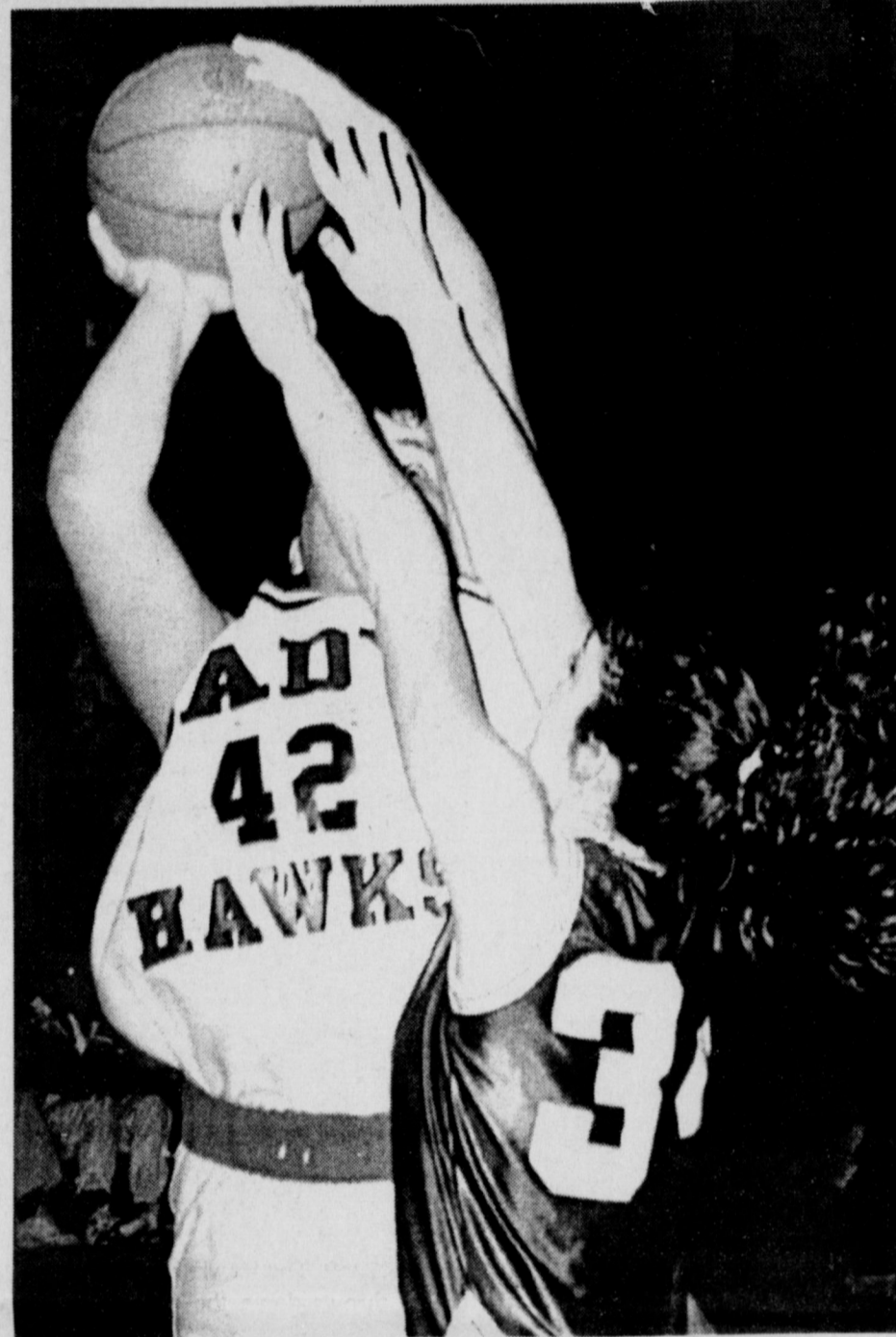

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

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Hawks extend season record to 22-4
